March On Washington For Peace in Vietnam, Washington, D. C. November 27, 1965

On November 3, 1965, a confidential source made available a circular which was distributed in bulk to members of the 11th Assembly District Communist Party, United States of America (CP, USA) Club at a meeting of this club on October 29, 1965.

Arthur reight. Chairman of this CP. USA club, at the meeting neget all those present to participate in the march. In addition he urged that they give these circulars to their friends and in turn urge them to participate in the march.

This circular which is entitled "March On Washington For Peace In Vietnam" with a subtitle "A Call To Mobilize the Conscience of America" and which is undated contains information concerning details of the above march.

It is self explanatory and is attached hereto.

This march is being sponsored by the National Committee for a Sane Nuclear Policy to protest United States policy in Vietnam.

Erich Fromm

On June 29, 1962, a confidential source made available information concerning individuals scheduled to attend the World Congress for General Disarmament and Peace, Moscow, Russia, July 9-14, 1962. Included among these individuals was Erich Fromm, a writer and lecturer. The source described Fromm as somewhat influenced by a psychoanalysis point of view and as one who holds a "social-democrat viewpoint". It was stated that his writings on Berlin have called for a new approach by the United States on the basis of no war over Berlin.

The 1962-1963, edition of Who's Who In America described Fromm as a psychoanalyst born in Frankfurt, Germany, in March, 1900. The occupations of Fromm include lecturer and author.

A second confidential source advised on March 7, 1960, that Doctor Fromm Was a sponsor of the New York Council for a Sane Nuclear Policy.

A third confidential source advised on April 5, 1962, that Fromm was a member of the Socialist Party - Social Democratic Federation.

March On Washington For Peace In Vietnam, Washington, D.C., November 27, 1965

The November 23, 1965, issue of the New York Times, a New York City daily newspaper, contained an advertisement entitled March On Washington For Peace in Vietnam, with the subtitle "A Call to Mobilize The Conscience of America" on pages 28 and 29.

Page 28 contains the list of sponsors for the march.

This list is attached. It should be read in alphabetical order, inasmuch as the sponsors were listed in alphabetical order in the advertisement.

It is to be noted that "The Worker," an East Coast Communist newspaper, in its issue of December 15, 1065, on page 4, contains a photographic reproduction of the advertisement appearing in "The New York Times."

> Mr. Hoover's warnings against Soviet espionage was termed 'sententious poppycock' by Ferry at the FFR conference in Seattle." "Perhaps Ferry and his associates might have Mr. Hoover's latest statement on Communism which was broadcast by him on July 15, 1962. The Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI) chief said, in part: 'Nothing will take the place of responsible knowledge in our fight against Communism -- a knowledge anchored in faith in God. We can defeat Communism because we have the superior values, the superior way of life. The task will not be easy. But we can win if each of us is willing to do his share. We must meet Communism with facts, not hysteria. Never must we be guilty of witch hunts or vigilantism. Truth is our best weapon "Mr. Hoover has the facts on Communism. of attack. Ferry and his friends seem to have the hysteria, the viglantism and a penchant for name-calling and witchhunting. Maybe this is why Henry Ford II, who bankrolled the Ford Foundation, long since renounced it."

"The New York Times", in its late city issue of November 2. 1965, on page 4 set-forth, a letter to "The New York Times" dated November 16, 1965, from Edward P. Gottlieb, Chairman. War Resisters League. The letter entitled "Ruling on Communists" with the subtitle "To the Editor" stated: "Those of us who have argued for the American way of life with Communists here or in personal confrontation in Moscow must take new heart with the 8-to-0 registration decision of the Supreme Court and your own unqualified approval (editorial November 16). As a confirmed pacifist, I am joyful over this victory, non-violent and spiritual in the cold war. Americans everywhere, will find it ever so much easier to represent their country as a bulwark of freedom. The response they receive will be measurably favorable to the promotion of the democratic process everywhere. relative degree of threat of the Communist Party in America or abroad ought not to vitiate our own dedication to the principles which we traditionally believe are fundamental to a free human society."

The December 24, 1962, issue of "New America", self described as the official publication of the Socialist Party-Social Democratic Federation (SP-SDF) contained an article which stated, "Michael Harrington, editor of 'New America', leaves for Europe the first of the year. The author of 'The Other America' is going overseas to 'work on a new book. While Harrington can no longer serve as editor of 'New America' he will continue as a leading contributor."

I would like to commend to your attention the work done by Norman Thomas and his supporting Post War World Council.

On a remarkably small budget, the Post War World Council is able to maintain facilities and a channel through which Norman Thomas can voice his conscience (which is so often the conscience of all of us) and suggest possible alternatives. He has never been one to criticize in a vacuum.

The sharpening of crisis in the Middle East has set back many of our best hopes: the ending of nuclear weapons' tests, general disarmament, the strengthening of the United Nations as an instrument of the world's growth to fraternal and economic cooperation.

During the past year, Norman Thomas has taken a leading role in the campaign to build a sane nuclear policy, in organizing a conference to examine workable political settlements that are necessary to universal and controlled disarmament (a conference in which I was glad to take part), established the precedent of the right of individuals to petition the UN (this in connection with a protest to the Trusteeship Council to forbid the United States' using the area of the Marshall Islands for bomb tests), and headed an effort to secure a special meeting of the General Assembly of the UN to consider the execution of Imre Nagy and his associates.

These are the highlights. The list could go on and en. I know of few organizations which put money to such rapid and effective use.

I do not think you need to be convinced by a long letter of details but, if you should want more information before sending a contribution, I should be happy to ask the Council's office to write you further. AN AFFEAL TO THE

FOR PEAC WITH HONO

IN VIETNAL

T IS NOT EASY for Americans to believe that the mess in Vietnam is as bad as it is.

The news is of military coups and demonstrations by the Vietnamese people against the U. S.-backed government; of the torture of 13-year-old boys and the spraying of poisons from the air to destroy crops and livestock; of the napalm bombing of native villages and the herding of civilians into stockaded villages, which are essentially concentration temps. The news is of military deleat and senseless deaths.

MOST AMERICANS are used to thinking that the United States stands for freedom, democracy and peace—and that if the United States gets involved in a foreign war it is on the side of the people. It has taken Americans a long time to realize that this is not the case in Vietnam. Now that we have the facts, we have no honorable choice but to insist on an immediate withdrawal of American troops and an end to all military aid to the Saigon government.

Senator Wayne Morse (Oregon) has made the issues clear: "There are no Chinese soldiers fighting in Vietnam; there are no Russian soldiers. The only foreign troops are American... the unilateral war being conducted by the United States in Vietnam must be stopped; and the only force that can stop it is American public opinion."

WE SUMMARIZE a few key facts from the daily press, in case you missed any of these:

On Torture

"Terror is used for interrogation, as propaganda, as punishment and as revenge... Chances of surviving field interrogation are often extremely poor. Death can come for prisoners under the tracks of armored vehicles, by decapitation or by bleeding to death after both hands have been chopped off or by a bullet through the head. It's all part of the war in South Vietnam." (Long Island Newsday, Oct. 26, 1964)

On The Claim "We Are Defending A Free People" Walter Lippman declared last April: "The truth, which is being obscured from the American people, is that the Satgon government has the allegiance of probably no more than 30 per cent of the people."

The United States did not allow free elections in South Vietz-Mark, an provided in the Geneva appearant at 1964. The reasons are made clear in the following statement by General Elsenhower. Richard Starnes wrote in the New York World Telegram January 4, 1965: "There is not one shred of credible ev dence that the bulk of munitions used by the Vietcong original in the north. At the outset, the Vietcong used crude home made weapons, but the bulk of their arms now are capture or otherwise acquired from the woefully inept defenders of South Vietnam."

On The Menace Of Communism

Norodhom Sihanouk, head of the government in neighborin Cambodia, has stated: "The more the Americans fight Communism in the way they are fighting it in South Vietnam, the more they'll spread Communism over the region. It is still not too late to stop the war and save South Vietnam from complete Communization." (William Worthy, York, Pa. Gazette and Daily, Dec. 31, 1964)

It may well be that some form of Communism will come to Southeast Asia, whether the United States continues to intervene or not. But in any case, the United States does not have the right to tell the people of Southeast Asia what form of government they must have, any more than the Russians of Chinese do. Continuation of the war increases the danger of domestic totalitarianism or additional loreign intervention

· HERE ARE OTHER THINGS at stake in the continued American aggression in Vietnam in addition to the lives and freedom of the Vetnamese people, important as these are. It is perhaps impossible for most Americans to compare their present responsibility to speak out against the war in Vietnam with the responsibility of the Germans to speak out in the early days of Hitler. Everyone knows that we have no Hitlers here, in power or close to power. But one wonders what limits there are to the atrocities Americans will go along with, so long as they are explained, however falsely, as necessary for the maintenance of democracy.

Arthur Miller, whose recent play, Incident at Vichy, deals with Nazi persecutions of the Jews, has written: "Who among us knew enough to be shocked, let alone to protest at the photographs of the Vietnamese torturing Vietcong prisoners, which our press has published? The Vietnamese are wearing United States equipment, are paid by us and could not torture without us. There is no way around this - the prisoner crying out in agony is our prisoner." (New York Times Magazine, January 3, 1965)

The prospects for the future are terrifying if those of us who live in the most powerful nation in the world, a nation loaded with money and overkill, fail to do what we say the Germans should have done when atrocities were being committed in their name and with their knowledge.

W E MUST INSIST on immediate withdrawal of all U.S. troops from Vietnam, even though the situation may remain a tragic one. Many problems will remain, but withdrawal of U.S. troops will provide the only chance that the people of South Vietnam can become masters of their own destiny. Then the way will be open for genuine negotiations about the problems of Southeast Asia, as distinct from manipulation by outside powers, and for friendly aid to the stricken peoples of the region, if they ask for it. This is the only peace with honor that is possible in Vietnam. End the War in Vietnam.

On June 29, 1962, a confidential source made available information concerning individuals scheduled to attend the World Congress for General Disarmament and Peace, Moscow, Russia, July 9-14, 1962. Source described Fromm as somewhat influenced by a psychoanalysis point of view and as one who holds a "social-democrat viewpoint". It was stated that his writings on Berlin have called for a new approach by the United States on the basis of no war over Berlin.

A third confidential source advised on April 5, 1952, that Fromm was a member of the Socialist Party-Social Democratic Tederation.

WARCH ON WASKINGTON FOR PLACE IN WETNAM A Call To Mobilize the Conscience of America

WE SEE no gain coming from the war in Vietnam. We see only the growing victimization of the Vietnamese people, the erosion of a better society at home, and the clear possibility of a world conflict.

Caught between terror, torture, and the senseless use of force, the Vietnamese people have seen their land turned into a bloody testing ground by the Vietcong, the Saigon government, by the North Vietnamese and the United States. Caught between a commitment to eradicate racial injustice and poverty at home and a growing involvement in an Asian land war, the Johnson Administration will inevitably turn its resources and energies toward the military conflict.

Caught in a competition for the loyalties of the poorest nations, the Soviet Union and China will seek to prove their militancy by aiding North Vietnam, thus increasing the chances of a direct clash with the United States.

WE SEEK to end this war.

WE AFFIRM that no party to the conflict, the U.S. included, has done all it can to bring about negotiations, and since the war will ultimately end at the conference table, we ask new actions to speed that day.

WE arrive support for tell the efforts riscluding those of the United Nations Secretary General. U Thank and Pope Paul, to bring the dispute to the conference table, and we welcome a wider role for the United Nations in pringing about negotiations and in implementing any agreement.

WE RECOGNIZE that the U.S. cannot negotiate an end to the war by itself, but we believe there are things our government could do which it has left undone, that could lead more quickly to negotiations. And we believe we can help build the public understanding through which our government can vigorously pursue the path of peace.

TOWARD THE GOAL OF A NEGOTIATED SETTLEMENT IN VIETNAM

WE ASK that our government call for a cease-fire, and to this end; that the bombing of North Vietnam;

light the introduction of additional men and materiel, and ask the other side to do the same.

WE ASK that our government state the conditions under which it will accept peace in Vietnam, and to this end;

Rolterate U.S. support for the principles of the 1954 Geneva Accords—the eventual withdrawal of all foreign military forces a prohibition against military alliances, the peaceful reunification of Vietnam, and self-determination for the Vietnames people.

Declare U.S. acceptance of negotiations with all concerned parties including the Vietcong, a primary combatant;

Declare U.S. agreement to constitution of a representative new government in South Vietnam as part of the settlement.

Beclare U.S. support for U.N. or other international machinery and guarantees to supervise the cease-fire, provide for peacefic establishment of a new government in South Vietnam, protect the rights of minority groups and protect the neutrality of North and South Vietnam.
