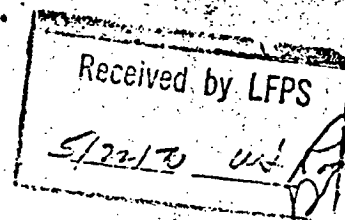

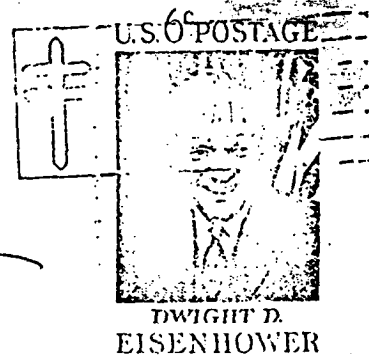

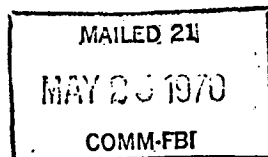

McCarthy Asks CIA-type Group for Congress

Rep. Eugene McCarthy (D., Minn.) said Friday he will seek legislation which would establish a joint congressional committee on intelligence and information, early this month.

The St. Paul congressman will fly to Washington Monday for the opening of the second session of the 85th congress Tuesday.

"Such a committee would operate in much the same way as the joint committee on atomic energy," he said. "It would have knowledge of procedures and operation of the central intelligence agency (CIA) and other intelligence agencies."

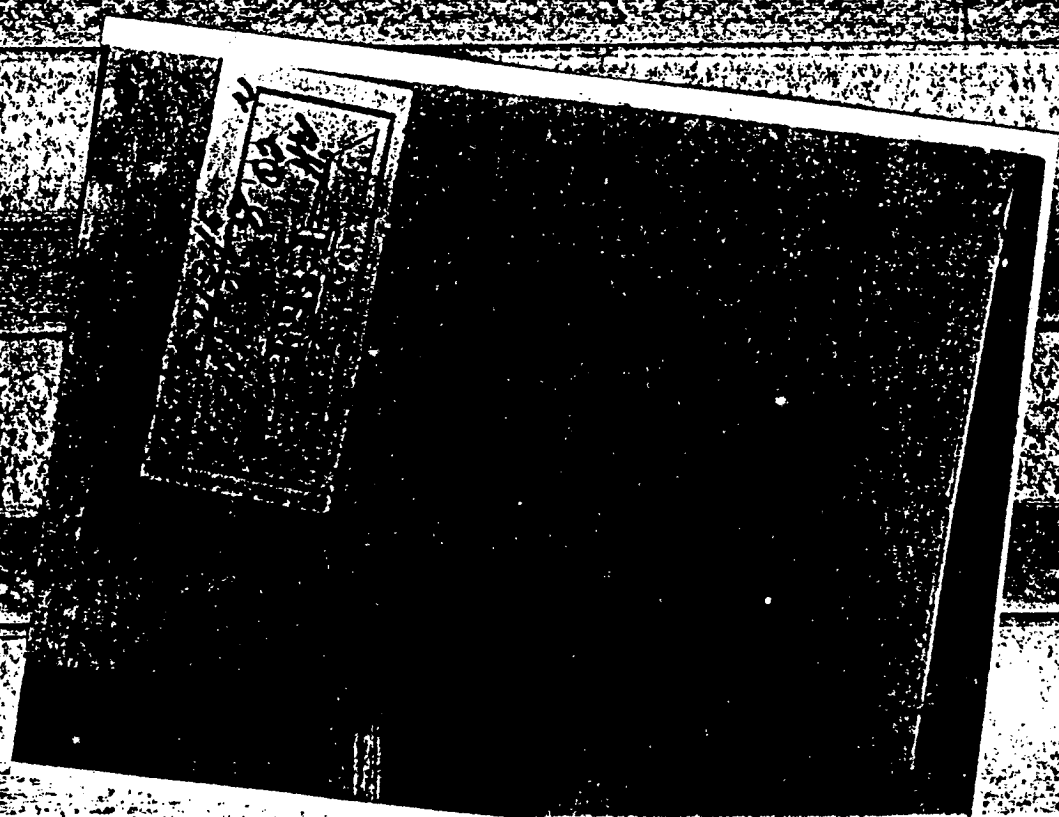

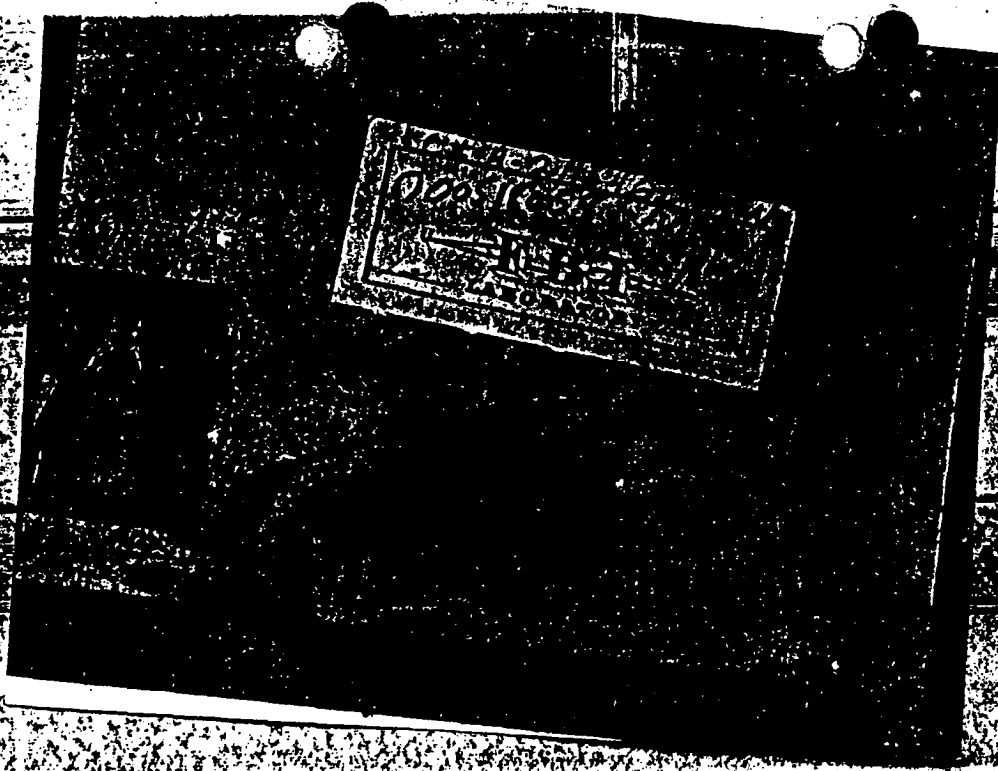

Attached relates that Fernando Bachelet, First Secretary of the Embassy of Chile, was in New York City on 1-31-72 with Chilean Ambassador Orlando Letelier. While in New York City they had lunch with some people from the "New York Times" and "The Nation." Following the luncheon they met with Peter Yarrow, whose wife is a niece of former U.S. Senator Eugene McCarthy. Yarrow reported his interest in going to Chile and wanted assurances that he could meet with people from all different sectors. He was assured he could do this without being concerned about surveillance by security personnel. A press release reportedly would be made on the day Yarrow appears in Chile.

Information in attached is being disseminated by teletype to Dr. Henry A. Kissinger at the White House, and to the Secretary of State. Copy is being sent Attorney General by messenger.

Reference my memorandum earlier this morning concerning captioned matter.

SA Bowers telephoned at 11:50 a. m. with additional details on the captioned matter as follows:

Senator Fulbright (D - Arkansas) told the press just now that the vote was 14 to 5 (Senator McCarthy had stated it was 13 to 5) for increasing the membership on the CIA watchdog committee. Senator Fulbright said that Senator McCarthy offered three amendments to the resolution (attached) prior to a vote on the resolution at 10:00 this morning. These amendments are numbered 1, 2 and 3 in red on the attached resolution. Specifically, the first amendment eliminated the phrase in the resolution "(including but not limited to the Federal Bureau of Investigation)." The second amendment has to do with section 5 of the resolution and eliminated the provision the committee could employ and fix the salaries of persons working for the committee. The third amendment eliminated the reference to expenses of the committee to be paid from a fund.

Senator Fulbright told the press that the reason for eliminating the two references to employees of the committee and salaries is because if the committee has no staff, it would be unnecessary for the Rules Committee to pass upon the full resolution. The Senator said he hoped the resolution would now go directly to the Policy Committee and thereafter to the full Senate for a vote.

Reference is made to your memorandum to Mr. Tolson of May 14, 1966, captioned "Senate Foreign Relations Committee, Senate Resolution 210, Overseer Group on Foreign Intelligence Activities."

Dan O'Brien, Administrative Assistant to Senator Bourke B. Hickenlooper (R - Iowa), called SA Bowers early on the morning of 5/16/66 and advised he has now obtained a copy of the resolution introduced by Senator Eugene J. McCarthy (D - Minn.) to establish the Committee on Intelligence Operations. Bowers contacted O'Brien and obtained the resolution, a copy of which is enclosed.

Senator Clifford P. Case (R - N.H.) was unavailable for interview today due to an infected eye. In his absence, Bowers talked with his Legislative Assistant, William Korn. Korn was familiar with the resolution in question and stated Senator Case had withheld a decision concerning the resolution up to this time. Senator Case abstained from voting on the preliminary vote last Thursday, 5/12/66. It was explained to Mr. Korn that inclusion of the FBI in this resolution is grossly misleading since the FBI has no foreign intelligence responsibilities, our activities being restricted to the continental limits of the United States. He was told that we have liaison representatives in several foreign countries but that they are not operative and are there purely to carry on liaison with police agencies. Korn stated he most certainly would bring our views to Senator Case's attention so that he will have the benefit of all pertinent facts when the resolution is considered at the Senate Foreign Relations Committee meeting on 5/17/66.

Senator George D. Aiken (R - VT.) has been out of the city for over a week due to the recent death of his wife. Bowers talked with his Legislative Assistant, Charles Weaver. Weaver said the Senator is

expected to return late today and definitely intends attending the Senate Foreign Relations Committee meeting on 5/17/66. He said Senator Aiken had avoided committing himself as yet concerning the McCarthy resolution although some efforts had been made to obtain a commitment from him. Our position was explained to Weaver, who commented that he had been somewhat surprised that the FBI was included in the resolution. He stated he will see the Senator as soon as he reaches Washington later today and will promptly furnish him the information which was given to him by Bowers.

Senator Gale W. McGee (D - Wyo.) is in Wyoming and not expected to return for several days. McGee earlier left his proxy with Senator McCarthy concerning McCarthy's resolution to establish the Committee on Intelligence Operations. In Senator McGee's absence, Bowers talked with his Legislative Assistant, Tom Wilson. Wilson stated he certainly has no authority to change or withdraw Senator McGee's proxy. After our position was explained to him, however, he commented that this information appeared to cast a new light on the resolution and may cause Senator McGee to wish to restrict his proxy with respect to the inclusion of the FBI in the resolution. Wilson stated he expects to be in touch with Senator McGee later today, at which time he will pass on to him the FBI's position and determine if he wishes any change regarding his proxy.

Hugh Overton, head of The American Legion in Alabama, telephonically contacted me today and advised he has been in touch with Senator Sparkman (D - Ala.) and Sparkman has promised that he will oppose the inclusion of the FBI in the McCarthy resolution. Bowers has been in touch with Senator Sparkman's assistant, Tim Ford, who stated the Senator wishes to personally discuss this situation with an FBI representative. Bowers is standing by to see the Senator late this afternoon as soon as the Senator is able to meet with him.

Efforts also have been made during the day to see Senator Frank J. Lausche (D - Ohio) and/or his assistant to enlist his support to exclude the FBI from the McCarthy resolution. As of 3:30 p.m. neither the Senator nor his assistant has been able to be contacted but further efforts are being made to see one or both of them. Assistant Director Sullivan is contacting Senators Pell and McCarthy. You will be advised of results of all contacts. For information.

That there hereby be created a Select Committee to be known as the Committee on Intelligence Operations and to consist of 9 Senators, of whom 3 shall be appointed by the Chairman of the Committee on Appropriations from among the members of that Committee, 3 shall be appointed by the Chairman of the Committee on Armed Services from among the members of that Committee, and 3 shall be appointed by the Chairman of the Committee on Foreign Relations from among the members of that Committee. No more than 2 of the members appointed from each such standing committee shall be from the same political party. The Chairman of the Select Committee shall be elected by the members.

Section 2

It shall be the duty of the Committee on intelligence operations to keep itself fully and currently informed of the activities of the Central Intelligence Agency, the Bureau of Intelligence and Research of the Department of State, and other agencies of Government (including but not limited to the Federal Bureau of Investigation) insofar as the activities of such agencies relate to foreign intelligence or counter-intelligence. The Committee's duties shall include, but not be limited to, review of the budgets and appropriations for intelligence and counter-intelligence activities and legislative oversight of the coordination of such activities among the various agencies concerned and with the foreign policy of the United States.

Section 3

The Committee, or any duly authorized subcommittee thereof, is authorized to sit and act at such places and times during the sessions, recesses, and adjourned periods of the Senate, to hold such hearings, to require by subpoena or otherwise the attendance of such witnesses and the production of such books, papers, and documents, to administer such oaths, to take such testimony, and to make such expenditures as it deems advisable.

Section 4

A majority of the members of the Committee or any Subcommittee thereof, shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business except a lesser number to be fixed by the Committee shall constitute a quorum for the purpose of taking sworn testimony.

Section 5

The Committee shall have power to employ and fix the compensation of such offices, experts, and employees as it deems necessary in the performance of its duties. The Committee is authorized to utilize the services, information, facilities and personnel of the various departments and agencies of the Government.

Section 6

The Committee shall take special care to safeguard information affecting the national security.

Section 7

The expenses of the Committee shall be paid from the contingent fund of the Senate upon vouchers approved by the Chairman.

Reference is made to my memorandum to you earlier today concerning captioned matter.

O.C. Late on Monday, 5/16/66, SA Bowers talked with Senator John Sparkman (D - Ala.). The Senator stated he was somewhat confused about the resolution and the FBI's concern with it. He was told that the FBI's only concern is the fact that the FBI has been included since the FBI has no foreign intelligence or other foreign responsibilities. It was pointed out to the Senator it would be grossly misleading and inaccurate to lump the FBI into this resolution dealing with foreign intelligence agencies. The Senator stated he appreciated our clarifying this matter for him, adding that he certainly will be alert for any opportunity to support the FBI's position when this resolution comes up for discussion at the Senate Foreign Relations Committee meeting on Tuesday morning, 5/17/66.

O.C. Bowers also saw Ray White, Administrative Assistant to Senator Frank Lausche (D - Ohio) late on 5/16/66. The Senator was not available for contact. White stated it was "a fair assumption" that Senator Lausche is opposed to the resolution in its entirety. Our position and reasons for excluding the FBI from the resolution were detailed for Mr. White, who stated he would pass this information along to the Senator. He stated it certainly appeared inappropriate to have the FBI included in the proposed resolution.

This afternoon W. C. Sullivan talked to Senator Claiborne Pell, whom he has known for some years, about the Committee on Intelligence Operations. Senator Pell was very friendly and said that he did

not think we need be concerned for this wouldn't pass anyway. However, since the question had been raised, Senator Pell said that the only reason why we were included is because of our operations in the Dominican Republic. He said if this did pass, which he doubts, the moment the FBI withdrew from the Dominican Republic it would be excluded from this resolution.

Senator Pell said, "I am committed to support this; however, I would also like to help out the FBI and I offer a suggestion to you." Sullivan asked him what it was. He suggested that when Sullivan took this up with Senator McCarthy, that he recommend to the Senator that the name of the Bureau be excluded from this resolution and also the names of other agencies so that the key sentence would read as follows: "It shall be the duty of the Committee on Intelligence Operations to keep itself fully and currently informed of the activities of said Government agencies insofar as the activities of such agencies relate to foreign intelligence or counterintelligence."

Senator Pell pointed out again that they were concerned only with intelligence information that was used in the formulation of foreign policy. Sullivan had previously explained to the Senator that the operations of the Bureau are wholly divorced from the formation of domestic or foreign policy. He agreed with this with the exception that our work in the Dominican Republic in the minds of some had injected us into the policy forming area. Sullivan thanked Senator Pell for his interest in this matter and his suggested compromise.

Sullivan next talked to Senator Eugene McCarthy. Senator McCarthy, like Senator Pell, said that if it was not for the Dominican Republic operation, we would not have been named. Sullivan called his attention to Senator Pell's suggested compromise relating to the elimination of the names of agencies. It was noted that he was quite interested in this and wanted to be certain that Senator Pell had made the suggestion him self. Sullivan assured Senator McCarthy he had. Senator McCarthy said he would be glad to consider the elimination of all names; however, he was afraid if he did there would be confusion as to who was and who was not covered in the resolution. Nevertheless, Senator McCarthy

said he would consider it and also give further thought to Sullivan's suggestion that the FBI be excluded. Like Senator Pell, Senator McCarthy was very gentlemanly and friendly. Both wanted to be remembered to the Director.

We are closely following this matter and will promptly advise the Director and Mr. Tolson concerning the outcome of the meeting of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee on Tuesday, 5/17/66, as soon as facts are known. We have made arrangements to obtain this information.

Senator Eugene McCarthy (D - Minn.) on Thursday, 5/12/66, before the Senate Foreign Relations Committee, proposed a resolution establishing a Senate committee to oversee the activities of the Central Intelligence Agency (CIA) and to additionally have jurisdiction over all of what is known as the "intelligence community." The resolution would replace the informal "watchdog group" (presently headed up by Senator Richard B. Russell, Chairman, Senate Armed Services Committee) with a nine-man standing committee, with three members each from the Armed Services, Appropriations and Foreign Relations committees.

The "test vote" on 5/12/66, at a meeting of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee was 11 in favor of the resolution and six against the resolution. Senator Case (New Jersey) abstained from voting. The vote was against "tabling", consequently, giving the resolution a second opportunity to be voted upon at a future meeting of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee on Tuesday, 5/17/66. A second vote could not be taken inasmuch as Senator Lausche walked out of the meeting on Thursday, 5/12/66, and, therefore, failed to allow a quorum.

The Senators in favor of the bill naturally believe they won a victory on 5/12/66 in view of the 11 to six vote against "tabling". Proxy votes were cast for Senator Gale McGee of Wyoming and Tom Dodd of Connecticut. The proxy votes were cast by Senator McCarthy who offered the resolution.

The votes stack up like this: FOR: Fulbright, Mansfield, Dodd, McGee, Sparkman, Gore, Church, Clark, Pell, and Morse.

AGAINST: Mundt, Hickenlooper, Williams (Delaware), Lausche, Carlson, Symington. Case and Aiken abstained.

ACTION BEING TAKEN:

I talked with Judge Gartland, Administrative Assistant to Dodd, on Saturday morning, 5/14/66. Dodd is in Connecticut. Gartland told me he was satisfied he could have Senator Dodd withdraw his proxy from Senator McCarthy. Gartland fully understands the absolute desirability of the FBI being excluded from this resolution.

I talked with Senator Karl Mundt, [REDACTED]

Senator Mundt agreed to stand up at the Foreign Relations Committee Tuesday morning, 5/17/66 and argue that the FBI should be excluded on the basis it has no foreign intelligence jurisdiction. He was given ample ammunition in this regard.

Senator Eugene McCarthy, who proposed the resolution, is making speeches in Minnesota over the weekend. Assistant Director W. C. Sullivan will see him first thing Monday morning 5/16/66. Senator McCarthy is an extremely liberal person on the intellectual side. While Sullivan does not know him personally, they have mutual friends who can gain entrance for Sullivan.

Senator Hickenlooper is out of town this weekend. I talked with Dan O'Brien, his long-time Administrative Assistant. O'Brien will speak to Senator Hickenlooper Sunday night 5/15/66, and have the Senator stand up at the Foreign Relations Committee meeting Tuesday, 5/17/66, and argue at great length that the FBI should be excluded from this resolution. O'Brien was furnished sufficient facts for Hickenlooper to use. O'Brien explained that McCarthy and Fulbright have introduced this resolution strictly for the purpose of forcing Senator Richard B. Russell, Chairman, Senate Armed Services Committee, to put three members on Russell's "watchdog group" which currently

He thinks he can obtain all the Republican votes on the Foreign Relations Committee with the exception of perhaps two.

Senator Russell agreed it will be a "monstrosity" to lump the FBI into this resolution. He pointed out that "one little leak" by the Senate Foreign Relations Committee concerning FBI's classified information could dry up FBI sources over night in the United States.

Senator Russell plans to make a speech on the floor of the Senate Monday. He will indicate the inadvisability of passing the resolution and will specifically indicate that it is most illogical to make the FBI a part of this resolution.

An attempt was made to contact Senator Lausche (D - Ohio) but his office was not open on Saturday. SA Bowers will see Senator Lausche the first thing Monday morning, 5/16/66.

In the absence of Senator Sparkman who is in Alabama campaigning for re-election, I talked with his Legal Assistant Tim Ford. I explained our position to Ford and told him it was inadvisable to include the FBI in the McCarthy resolution. Ford agreed and stated that Senator Sparkman would be advised of the FBI's feelings by telephone on Sunday, 5/15/66. He stated that Senator Sparkman would probably call me on Sunday. If not, an appointment will be set up for SA Bowers to see Senator Sparkman Monday morning, 5/16/66.

Hugh Overton, Head of the American Legion in Alabama, who knows Sparkman quite well, will call Sparkman over the weekend and insist he support the FBI's position. *(This has been done)*

Mike Marvin Watson told me Saturday morning the President had already spoken to Senate Majority Leader *Montana* Mansfield. As a result, he said, Mansfield refused to attend the meeting of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee on Thursday, 5/12/66. He is, however, indicated by a newsclip as having voted against tabling the resolution. Watson feels the President can either change Mansfield's vote or at least have him abstain. *O.C.*

Dan O'Brien, Senator Hickenlooper's Administrative Assistant, called at 12:30 p.m., 5/14/66, and stated he had learned from reliable sources on the Hill that Senator McCarthy had not planned to include the FBI in his resolution, and our inclusion was a result of Senator Fulbright's desires to "spread the resolution out so it will include the entire intelligence community." In this manner, Senator Fulbright hopes to force Senator Russell into accepting at least three additional members on his "watchdog group."

* *O.C.* Assistant Director W. C. Sullivan will see Senator Claiborne Pell, Rhode Island, the first thing Monday morning, 5/16/66. Sullivan knows Pell personally. We hope at least to change Pell's thinking so that he will agree not to include the FBI in this resolution.

A C.I.A. CHECKREIN WINS SENATE TEST

Plan for an Overseer Group
Gets Tentative Approval of

WASHINGTON, May 12—A proposal for a new and broadened Senate committee to oversee the Central Intelligence Agency won a surprisingly easy victory today in a test vote in the Foreign Relations Committee.

Opponents of the proposal reverted its final approval only when Senator Frank J. Lausche, Democrat of Ohio, walked out of the meeting room and left no quorum present.

Senator Stuart Symington, Democrat of Missouri, then exercised a parliamentary right and objected to a vote when quorum was not present. Final action was thus postponed until Tuesday, when the committee meets again.

The test vote was 12 to 6 against tabling, and thus killing a resolution by Senator Eugene J. McCarthy, Democrat of Minnesota.

The resolution would establish a formal Senate committee of five members, empowered to employ a staff, to oversee the agency's foreign intelligence operations.

Its tentative approval by the Foreign Relations Committee was the strongest move toward strengthening Congressional oversight of the C.I.A. since 1954.

In that year, Senator Mike Mansfield, Democrat of Mon-

tana, now the majority leader, brought a resolution for a joint Senate-House oversight committee to the Senate floor with 34 cosponsors. Ultimately, the resolution was beaten, 59 to 27, with 14 of the sponsors abandoning it on the roll-call.

The likely prospect is that the McCarthy resolution also will face a hard fight on the floor, with defenders of the present "watchdog" system expected to prevail.

The Senate now has two informal subcommittees, one of the Armed Forces Committee and another of the Appropriations Committee, that meet together to review C.I.A. activities. Senator Richard B. Russell, Democrat of Georgia, is the senior member of the nine-man "watchdog" group, which employs no staff.

Several weeks ago, Senator J. W. Fulbright of Arkansas, chairman of the Foreign Relations Committee, proposed that three members of his committee be added to the watchdog group. Senator Russell rejected the proposal, in a letter not yet made public.

The McCarthy resolution went beyond the Fulbright proposal.

In effect, it would replace the informal watchdog group with a nine-man standing committee, with three members each from the Armed Forces, Appropriations and Foreign Relations committees.

The committee would have jurisdiction over all of what is known here as the "intelligence community." In addition to the C.I.A., that would include the Defense Intelligence Agency, the Bureau of Intelligence and Research of the State Department, and other Government agencies dealing in foreign intelligence or counter-intelligence.

The Federal Bureau of Investigation would be included, too, to the extent that it deals with intelligence matters.

Proponents of the resolution, long restive at what they considered the lax operations of the watchdog group, conceded the major significance of their move would lie in getting the Senate to approve the establishment of a formal committee that would include Foreign Relations members.

They said that if the resolu-

tion were approved, they would not necessarily press for the employment of a staff, which presumably would also be privy to the agencies' secrets and classified information.

The proponents contend that the senior members of the Appropriations and Armed Forces committees on the present watchdog group are too protective and do not sufficiently inquire into the effect of the agency's activities on the nation's foreign relations.

Some sources suggested that if the Foreign Relations Com-

mittee approved the resolution Tuesday, as it is expected to, Senator Russell and the present watchdog group might accept the change in order to avoid floor debate about the C.I.A., its activities and the efficacy of Congressional control procedures.

It was more widely believed, however, that Mr. Russell would be able to muster the votes to defeat the resolution on the floor. A proposal to broaden Congressional oversight of the intelligence agency has been approved since Congress established it and the informal watchdog.

The size of the vote against tabling the McCarthy resolution was surprising. It was made possible when Mr. McCarthy cast proxy votes against tabling for Senators Gale McGee of Wyoming and Thomas Dodd of Connecticut, both Democrats. They had generally been regarded as reluctant to change the present system.

All of those against tabling were Democrats. Joining Mr. Lausche and Mr. Symington in opposition to the McCarthy resolution were Republican Senators Rourke B. Hickenlooper of Iowa, Frank Carlson of Kansas, John Williams of Delaware and Karl Mundt of South Dakota.

Long a C.I.A. Critic

Mr. McCarthy, long a critic of the C.I.A. and of the Russell Group, offered the resolution as a substitute for another that would have provided \$150,000 for an investigation of the foreign policy effects of C.I.A. activities.

Mr. Hickenlooper moved to table the McCarthy motion, and lost. Mr. Lausche then moved to send it to the Rules Committee, which ultimately will have to consider it and approve a budget for the proposed staff. That motion, in the nature of a delaying action, was defeated. Then Mr. Lausche left the committee room. Mr. Symington objected to further votes and the whole matter was put over

Senator Fulbright told reporters he thought establishment of the new committee would "tend to modify and even eliminate" uninformed criticism of the C.I.A. and would be "a step toward better relations" with the agency.

Voting with Mr. McCarthy and Mr. Fulbright against the tabling resolution were Senators Mansfield, Dodd, McGee, John Sparkman of Alabama, Albert Gore of Tennessee, Frank Church of Idaho, Joseph S. Clark of Pennsylvania, Claiborne Pell of Rhode Island and Wayne Morse of Oregon, all Democrats.

Senator Clifford P. Case of New Jersey, a Republican, abstained from voting on the tabling motion.

Mr. Bowers said he has determined the proponents of the measure will attempt to bypass the Senate Rules Committee and take their resolution directly into the Policy Committee.

MC CARTHY'S PROPOSED COMMITTEE ON INTELLIGENCE OPERATIONS:

The proposal to establish the ~~Senate~~ Select Committee on Intelligence Operations was made on May 12, 1966, by Senator Eugene McCarthy (D.--Minnesota) in a resolution he presented at a meeting of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee. The Select Committee as he proposed it would consist of nine Senators--three each from the Appropriations, Armed Services and Foreign Relations Committees of the Senate. The major effect of the proposal would be the addition of three Senators from the Foreign Relations Committee since the present Subcommittee on Central Intelligence Agency already has members from the Armed Services and the Appropriations Committees on it.

The resolution proposed that the Select Committee on Intelligence Operations would "keep itself fully and currently informed of the activities of the Central Intelligence Agency, the Bureau of Intelligence and Research of the Department of State, and other agencies of Government (including but not limited to the Federal Bureau of Investigation) insofar as the activities of such agencies relate to foreign intelligence or counter-intelligence."

A move was made at the meeting on May 12, 1966, when the resolution was first presented to table it. This was defeated by a vote of 11 to six. Senator Frank J. Lausche (D.--Ohio) prevented further votes at that time by leaving the meeting and thus leaving no quorum.

We subsequently made contact with the following Senators (or their top legislative assistants) who are members of the Foreign Relations Committee: John J. Sparkman, Frank J. Lausche, Thomas J. Dodd, Claiborne Pell, Eugene J. McCarthy, Gale W. McGee, Bourke B. Hickenlooper, George D. Aiken, Karl E. Mundt and Clifford P. Case, pointing out the inadvisability of including the FBI under the provisions of this Committee on Intelligence Operations.

The resolution was presented for final action at the Foreign Relations Committee meeting on May 17, 1966. Before any vote was taken, Senator McCarthy proposed three amendments, the first of which was to omit the reference to the FBI. The other two amendments related to the employment of a staff and the payment of expenses. The latter two changes were proposed specifically to avoid the resolution

having to go before the Senate Rules Committee, where Senator Richard B. Russell (D.--Georgia), who heads the current "Watchdog Committee," was almost certain to be able to block it. (Their move worked and the resolution was not referred to the Rules Committee.)

After the changes were made, the resolution was passed by a vote of 14 to five. The vote on the resolution (some cast by proxy) was as follows:

It is interesting to note that Senator Dodd left his proxy for the vote on this resolution with Senator McCarthy. Senator McCarthy, of course, is a member of the Senate Select Committee on Standards and Conduct which soon is to begin hearings regarding Senator Dodd's activities.

PRESENT STATUS OF THE RESOLUTION:

The resolution at present is scheduled to be presented for consideration on the floor of the Senate on Wednesday, June 1, 1966.

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OBSERVATIONS AND SUGGESTIONS:

It is believed that, in his meeting with the Director, [REDACTED] will emphasize that all intelligence agencies--including the FBI--have an interest in countering Senator McCarthy's proposal for a Committee on Intelligence Operations which would include members of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee. He probably will point out that the intelligence work of the FBI and CIA is so closely related that an intrusion upon the operations of CIA cannot help but have an adverse effect upon some areas of the FBI's counterintelligence work--further, that the McCarthy proposal, if successfully put into effect, may be the forerunner to further intrusions into the intelligence community which will eventually engulf also the FBI.

Mr. McCarthy stated "It is my judgment that to permit the Foreign Relations Committee to share this responsibility would strengthen the CIA and help protect it from some of the charges that are made for by acting to formalize the oversight structure, the whole Senate would be meeting its responsibility more effectively."
