K1 through K10 Ten pages of the known handwriting of subject Wesley Hampton, all of the specimens are written on one side of the paper in ink, each sheet identified by the K number on the back.

K11 One envelope bearing the purported handwriting of the subject Wesley Hampton addressed to "Margaret E. Cason, New York.....".

K12 First sheet of accompanying letter bearing the purported handwriting of the subject Wesley Hampton, beginning, "I am your most welcome letter....".

K13 Second sheet of accompanying letter bearing the purported handwriting of the subject Wesley Hampton, beginning, "Probably I will drive out to.....".

K14 Envelope in envelope is a small card identified as, "Wesley Hampton Electric & Steam Register.....".

K15 submitted as a fingerprint card bearing the fingerprints of "Wesley Hampton".

Results of examinations

It was concluded that the handwriting on the extortion letter designated in the laboratory as 46-7000, Q1 through Q3, was done by Wesley Hampton, whose known specimens of handwriting are listed above as specimens K1 through K14. Specimens Q1 through Q3 were transmitted to the Technical Laboratory from the Investigative Division on December 23, 1940, in connection with the case entitled "John Rogers; Mrs. Frances Partine, (Miss Frances Partine) Victim; Extortion", Serious File 9-7000.

It was further concluded that Wesley Hampton, Kl through Kl4, did not write the extortion letter submitted in connection with the case entitled "Anonymous Communication Addressed to E. Lehman, Governor, State Capital, Albany, New York" and designated in the laboratory as 62-59486, specimens Q1 and Q2. This extortion letter was forwarded to the Bureau from the New York Office under date of August 24, 1940.

It was also concluded that Wesley Hampton, Kl through Kl4, did not write the extortion letters submitted in connection with the case entitled "Unknown Subject; Congressman Michael Joseph Kennedy - Victim; Extortion" and designated in the laboratory as 9-6706, specimens Q1 and Q2 and specimens Q3 through Q11.

It is noted that the letter listed as specimens Kl1 through Kl3 bearing the purported known handwriting of the subject, Wesley Hampton, is much better for comparison purposes than the remainder of the specimens submitted, inasmuch as a certain amount of disguise is apparent in the dictated specimens. In this connection, if testimony is desired in this case, it is suggested that an effort be made to prove the authorship of the letter designated as Kl1 through Kl3.

In accordance with your request, specimens Kl1 through Kl4 are being returned to you herewith, photographic copies having been made for the completion of the laboratory's files.

If testimony is desired in this case, it will be necessary to notify the Bureau in ample time to permit the preparation of charts and the arrangement of commitment.

Results of examination.

It was concluded that specimens Q4 and Q5 were prepared on the same Underwood typewriter as specimens Q1, Q2, Q4, Q5 and Q6 referred to in Laboratory Report #35899 dated June 14, 1940, a copy of which was forwarded to the New York office in connection with the case entitled John Rogers, with aliases; Chairman, National Labor Relations Board - Victim; Wage and Hour Administration - Victim; Governor Herbert H. Lehman - Victim; Extortion, Bureau file #62-55640. It is noted that specimen Q1 is an envelope postmarked New York, N.Y. October 25, 1939 1:30 PM addressed to "Chairman of the N.L.R.B., Washington, D. C." Specimen Q2 is the accompanying typewritten letter beginning "in Closed find First Example....." and signed "John Rogers, Engineer". Specimen Q4 is a typewritten letter dated December 16, 1939 at Brooklyn, New York beginning "Now as there is nothing left....." and ending "Please do something ????". Specimen Q3 is a typewritten letter addressed to "Wage &

Hour Administration, Washington, D. C." beginning "its allways good for a Sneeze.....". Specimen Q3 was concluded to have been written on a Remington Noiseless typewriter equipped with Elite type, and therefore on a different machine than the other specimens just referred to.

It was concluded that the typewritten letter headed "Brooklyn, N.Y., December the 28th, 1939 to the National Labor Board Racket, Washington, D. C." beginning "a few lines to you Blind Guides at the Wheel....." and ending "Yours Truly, Isaac Kibser, addressed Kimberly Hotel, 74 & Broadway, Manhattan, N.Y.C. No answer, Please do something, No answer necessary, etc.", likewise was done on the same typewriter as the several specimens referred to in the preceding paragraphs. This is the evidence referred to in the report of Special Agent L. Levin made at New York City, May 9, 1940 in connection with the case entitled John Rogers alias Isaac Kibser, Chairman, N.L.R.B. - Victim; Wage and Hour Administration - Victim, Bureau file #62-55640.

The reported handwriting of John Rogers listed in the Laboratory as specimens K1, K2 and K3 is different from the handwriting appearing on specimens Q1 and Q2 submitted in connection with the case entitled Anonymous Communication addressed to "H. Lehman, Governor, State Capital, Albany, New York, N.Y.", Bureau file #62-59486 and referred to in Laboratory Report #37402 dated September 3, 1940, a copy of which was forwarded to New York. It is therefore concluded that this questioned handwriting was not done by the writer of K1, K2 and K3. It is further concluded that the writer of K1, K2 and K3 did not write the questioned handwriting appearing on specimens Q1, Q2 and Q3 submitted in connection with the case entitled John Rogers; Mrs. Frances Perkins, (Miss Frances Perkins) - Victim; Extortion, Bureau file #9-7068 referred to in Laboratory Report #39705 dated January 9, 1941, a copy of which was forwarded to the New York office.

For record purposes, it is noted that the evidence listed in the Laboratory as specimens Q2 and Q3 in the instant case is identical with the evidence referred to in connection with the case entitled John Rogers; Mrs. Frances Perkins, (Miss Frances Perkins) - Victim; Extortion, Bureau File #103-6033.

In accordance with your request, the original evidence listed above as specimens K1 and K2 is being returned to your office herewith, appropriate photographic copies having been retained for the completion of the Laboratory's files. The remainder of the evidence submitted in connection with this case is being retained in the files of the Laboratory.



In May, 1950, Miss Perkins visited New York City, called on
Henry Taylor, head of the Steel Institute, and requested upon him to meet
John L. Lewis in secret if he wished to prevent a strike in the steel in-
dustry. Miss Perkins told Mr. Taylor that Lewis was to the City, and that
she could arrange an immediate "get together". Lewis was in the City at
the time. Taylor informed Miss Perkins that he could not make any move
without first consulting his Board; that they had already adopted extreme
policies towards the possibility of demands being made upon them by the
Lewis outfit and a strike.

Miss Perkins then resumed her journey which ended in France.
There, at a later date, she dined with Taylor, who had also called for
Perkins a few weeks after Miss Perkins. John L. Lewis followed. Miss
Perkins and Lewis are known to have conferred in London. Undoubtedly,
these three individuals conferred before returning to the States. In
this connection it is interesting to note Upper one or two floors in the
steel industry.

to the steel magnates, giving for them a vision of the job they were going
to do? Did Miss Perkins cause the steel magnates to perceive the vision

The following is a summary of the Social Security Bill presented by Miss Fannie Postini, principal speaker at the meeting of the National Council of Social Service, held in New York City, with the cooperation of the National Council of Negro Women, and the Negro and Social Service Federal Council of the National Council of Social Service, April 6, 1935, at George's Room, Improvement Annex, New York City

Miss Fannie Postini, principal speaker

Miss Postini spoke on Social Security under governmental control — that what we need in America is a just government — a just system — that we must come to recognize that this is the way to social security. It will be a moral obligation meeting upon us all to approach the problem of social security. Then we will then gradually accomplish what we have to accomplish in this field. Any of these designs for up to solve the social problem are bound to be governmental. (Miss Postini is very passionately letting you know that these experiments will not be as successful as the N.R.A., in other words it is a legend from which to emerge.) The people for the past 20 years have been waiting for some kind of guarantee (Security) that in society will bring us to a new realization of social justice—the sake of the honest of unreported children—that this should be taken care of by the government. (Here she was referring to the Child Labor Amendment.)

Title 8 of the permanent Bill for old age insurance allows a person \$20.00 a month on which to live—this she said may cause some question as to whether \$20 is adequate—but when we look back under the N. R. A. State relief—these persons have only been getting \$10.00 a month. Miss Postini said that the way they would finance the Old Age Insurance is by laying taxes of tax of 1%, 2% and 3% tax gradually increasing it, which will take care of all expenses. (See last page Manifesto Page 20 Item 2) as follows: "A heavy progressive of graduated income tax."

Title 9—of the Bill—covers the unemployment insurance and this is taken care of by laying a tax on employers of 3%—which will be remitted to employees who contribute to their State. The employer will have to pay a 3% tax to the Federal Government. (Also see Manifesto)

The sub-committee will make its report in a few days on Social Security and Health Insurance—to reach a balanced money between our productive (industrial) and consumptive (living) power. (Refer to Manifesto page 20). In reaching our people and in an attempt (attempt) for this great purpose, we must have progress for this country on a national basis of welfare. One of the main causes in the past has been that we did not set up a system that adapted to the size of us all. So therefore we must strive in a broader basis for higher production and higher living & a greater standard, and with obvious reference to the spirit of the Declaration of 1776, that man continually calls for the freedom of man, however this has no Christian doctrine. These ideas seem to be brotherly love, shown in poverty and suffering as we have observed in Russia, Spain and Ireland. Miss Postini also spoke of working on a world Democracy. (Here I refer you to all countries like, West Asia, Latin America—all countries wait for a Democracy)

They used to put everyone under the social security act with the exception of the Farmers and the Household help. This time right in with the meeting held on the Workers Relief under the Roosevelt, in New Jersey for their Negro (Negro) and colored men of Negroes on the workers.

Questions from the floor were to determine who is to pay for Social Security. Miss Postini answered as declining to get into either the Red Cross or the Red Cross Fund of just leaving them as you like. She went on to say that it is better to have too many people in this class than not, so that we can have "more". Bishop Gilbert asked this question and became so forceful in his answer.

should be directed only to Madame Perkins, as I turned towards Madame Perkins and said, "Very well, I will ask Madame Perkins if she realizes that what she has been advertising tonight, all this new social thought, is nothing more than Karl Marx, and how can you advocate the doctrines of Karl Marx, which can be found on page 30 of the Manifesto?" Madame Perkins was visibly disturbed and in her endeavor to reply curtly said: "Because I would rather see it a reality than on page 30, I guess." Then I reminded her that Marx had a social government. Bishop Gilbert was beside himself and accused me of being rude and invited me to sit down. This is the inevitable accusation, when these propagandists realize you are aware of their scheme. I refused to sit down and politely told her and the audience that I would never stop, for I said if it takes my life, America will not be sovietized. Another questioner asked Madame Perkins how she could paint such a beautiful picture, when this government had ordered the plowing under of the cotton and wheat and the killing of the pigs and cattle, when people were in need. Madame Perkins answered by stating that there were no hungry people in the United States and then proceeded to give statistics as to how many people were now employed. She was then asked, "Will this security you advocate apply to the aliens as well as American citizens?" (This was asked because Madame Perkins under mandate of Congress was supposed to have prepared a specified list of aliens which to this day has not been done). She answered that it was only to the care of the citizens.

The many ministers present were quite disturbed and one in particular kept insisting that we stop, but inasmuch as the Federal Council of Churches of Christ has denied the divinity of Christ and most of the ministers have surrendered to the radical forces of today, they naturally didn't like being put in a position as sponsoring the Karl Marxian theories. After the close of the meeting we stood in the back of the church and argued it out with many of the people. Some were with us right from the beginning and others listened and went home thinking and others were definitely with the speaker.

Due to this exposure the speaking tour of Madame Perkins was canceled.
(This was reported in a Hungarian newspaper in Woodbury, Conn., April 8, 1935)

...to the House I would like to add:

On March 1, 1938, in Chicago, Illinois, Mrs. Mary McLean, Commissioner of Conciliation, who charged that she aided communists in the commission of the country, specifically referring to Communist copper initiatives.

She said in part, "You have permitted several sections of our Government, who are conducting an alleged labor organization affiliated with a foreign, pro-American movement, to enjoy the same privileges as those legally guaranteed to labor unions affiliated with the American Federation of Labor; the Railroad Brotherhoods; the Amalgamated Clothing Workers and others of the same high standards."

(He was referring to the Communist Trade Union Unity League, a section of the Red International of Labor of Moscow.)

Congressional Record - February 16, 1938, page 2277, Congressional Record: Thomas of the Blue Committee inserts a letter, written by Miss Pearl, charging that "The public statement of Senator Pritchett, attorney for the defense, to excuse her failure to enforce the immigration laws by��lating them to her personal views concerning the right of the Alien Committee under the Constitution."

Thomas later introduced a resolution to impeach Senator Pritchett for failure to enforce deportation laws. He pointed to her failure to deport other Communists and their leaders from the United States, including Harry Bridges, Freda Sacco and others.

During the debate was also the failure to deport Harry Gold, a Communist scientist, who was here during World War II.

Journal headed by ~~James~~^{Frank} Pinsky, a close friend of Mrs. G. H. Smith and contributor to ~~Books~~^{Books} of the Communist Manifesto, which was given immediate, wide circulation in the United States of America. She was also used by Maxine Lewis and Paul Adams and published in the famous "Wall Street" by ~~James~~^{Frank} Pinsky.

Senator Robert M. LaFollette charged Mrs. Portman of being "a shield for spies" and of "mastering hundreds of criminal and political aliens in the United States". He later made public a list of names of 700 aliens and their criminal records as among thousands, the Secretary not having.

Mrs. Portman defended the proposed Recognition of Russia by the New Deal, stating that it would result in a "substantial stimulus to industry" through large orders provided for American goods.

Under authority of Portman, Mrs. Tolman (anarchist) was permitted to return to the United States of America; Robert Durbin, and a long row of other Communist leaders, some of whom helped create the American League For Peace & Freedom, which communist forces supported the New Deal government so freely. She also gave the Department of Labor Auditorium over to the Communist to form the "Workers Alliance" and the American Youth Congress has also held forth there.

Mrs. Portman cancelled the deportation proceedings of Dr. Ignacio and of Joseph Bent, a member of the Central Committee of the Communist Party and a Communist agent of Columbia, South America, a Communist position.

According to the "Daily Worker" of 10/20/33, she was formerly a member of the Socialist Party.

Chairman Martin Dies of the House Committee investigating Un-American activities on August 21, 1933, charged Mrs. Portman with

overing enforcement of deportation laws and criticised her handling of
the Strother (communist) and Bridges cases. Chairman Dies threatened
an impeachment move against Mrs. Perkins.

According to the "Daily Worker" January 2, 1939, page 1, Mrs.
Perkins was a contributor to that Communist organization.
