The "Saturday Evening Post" for July 27, 1940, contained an article by Benjamin Stolberg entitled "Madam Secretary, a Study in Bewilderment" which dealt with the life and activities of Frances Perkins. In this article, Stolberg stated "Perkins is not a Communist nor even remotely a Communist sympathizer. She represents a classic type of soft-minded liberals whom the Stalinsts behind the scenes know how to exploit for their own purpose. (39-915-9615)

On October 21, 1940, a former member of the Communist Party, whose reliability is not known, advised this Bureau that he had heard remarks at Communist Party meetings to the effect that Frances Ferkins favored Communist Party policies. Prederick Joubert Duquesne, a convicted German espionage Agent, in 1941, reportedly said that Frances Perkins was a close friend of Ivan Herodni, a Russian writer and that he was the "go-between" between Frances Perkins and the Russian Andassador in Sweden. Reverend Denald Lethrop, Minister of the Community Church, has, over a period of years, been affiliated with numerous organizations cited as Communist by the Attorney General or the House Committee on Un-American Activities. the National Small Businessmen's Association, and the House Committee on Un-American Activities, have issued statements voicing unfavorable comments regarding the reported actions of Frances Perkins in withholding the deportation of aliens who were reported to be Communists. This criticism pertains to such well known individuals as Harry Bridges, the prominent west coast labor leader, and Frank Borich, mentioned 45666 (61-7587-2-10, 61-7582, Volpg. 2201 and Vol. 4, pg. 2927; 94-1-7451-A; NY Times 7/29/40)

In November, 1947, an informant of known reliability furnished this Bureau with copies of a pamphlet is sued by the Institute for American Democracy, 360 Lexington Avenue, New York City, entitled "Community Projects." This pamphlet indicated that the Institute for American Democracy had retained Madam Frances Perkins to write a weekly release to the labor press of the United States and that nearly 1,000 labor papers received this material at that time. This informant further advised that although the Institute for American Democracy had numerous non-Communists on its governing body, it also had some outstanding "left-wingers and pro-Communists" among its leaders. This Bureau has conducted no investigation concerning the Institute for American Democracy.

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

and thus closely ligned with Harry Bridges, had told him of a telephone conversation between Bridges and Mrs. Perkins in which name was mentioned feels from this information that Mrs. Perkins had conferred with Bridges and was seeking his advice at that time. It appears that is inferring that Bridges had some influence with Mrs. Perkins.

also reported that Victoria Stone, a member of the Central Committee of the Communist Party of America, had told him that Frances Perkins was recommended to President Roosevelt for Secretary of Labor and that the recommendation had come from Mrs. Roosevelt. Mrs. Roosevelt is alleged to have learned of Mrs. Perkins through Mary Van Kleek, who according to had served with Victoria Stone on the Central Committee of the Communist Party of America.

A review of Bureau files reflects that no investigation has been conducted of Mrs. Frances Perkins, but that on April 26, 1952, a memorandum was furnished to the White House as result of a name-check request. This memorandum pointed out that Bureau files contained no information that she was or had been a member of any organization cited by the Attorney General within the purview of Executive Order 9835, the House Committee on Un-American Activities, or any other public committee. 

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


