

Reference is made to your air mail special delivery letter
to me in care of the Seattle Field Division under date of July 23,
1937, in which you request me to prepare an article suitable for pub-
lication in the FBI Law Enforcement Bulletin concerning some interesting
subject discussed at the Thirteenth Meeting of the International
Criminal Police Commission at London, England, which I attended.

You will recollect that in my conference with you relative

the latter part of August, rather than not later than August 10, 1937
as instructed in your letter. I feel that this will be a much
more satisfactory plan and will permit me to write a much better
article, since I would have to rely entirely upon my memory if the suggested
article were prepared here or in San Francisco.

Supplement to Justification of Estimates

SALARIES AND EXPENSES, FEDERAL BUREAU OF INVESTIGATION

INTERNATIONAL CRIMINAL POLICE COMMISSION

Last Meeting

13th (Annual) meeting was held in London, England, June 7 to 11, 1937. 48 Delegates attended, including the American delegate, representing 31 countries. German delegate did not attend.

Number of Members

Approximately 48 members, representing about 31 countries.

Cost of Membership

Not in excess of \$1,500 per annum. In this connection, the following is quoted from the report of the American delegate who attended the 13th meeting: "In this connection, it was pointed out to the officials of the Commission by the United States delegate that the cost to the United States, should the United States decide to become a member of the Commission, would be entirely disproportionate, in view of the fact that the Commission apparently based various countries' contributions on population rather than proximity to

the seat of activities of the Commission, to wit, Vienna, Austria, and that it was obvious that the smaller European countries with much smaller populations than the United States would receive far greater practical benefits from the activities of the Commission than the United States could possibly hope for."

"The officials of the Commission agreed that this was true and pointed out that no country would be called on annually to contribute more than seven thousand Swiss Marks (approximately \$1,500), and that the Commission was desirous of having the United States become a member regardless of any amount contributed. They indicated strongly that the Commission would be willing to accept any reasonable amount annually, suggested by the United States, and should it be deemed advisable for the United States to join the Commission, this particular matter could be definitely settled before the United States agreed to become a permanent member."

Advantages of Membership

The report of the United States delegate on this subject is quoted, in part, as follows:

"Within the next decade, it is very probable that the organization will play an increasingly important part in the detection and apprehension of criminals in Europe and in cooperating

with the British Isles and Possessions, as well as with the United States of America, in criminological matters generally."

"It is certain that the opportunity afforded American delegates to meet outstanding foreign law enforcement officials would redound to the general benefit of law enforcement throughout the United States and that at such a conference of the Commission a wide-spread United States delegate could undoubtedly obtain data, particularly of a scientific nature, which would prove helpful to the advancement of modern criminology in this country."

"The work done and suggestions made by the Commission relative to certain scientific developments in criminology having to do with the control of narcotic traffic, the suppression of counterfeiting and the illegal forging of passports (all of which have been set out in detail above) should prove very helpful to the Department of Justice, the Treasury Department and the State Department."



At unanimous wish of the Commission's members I would like to publish this address in our official paper "International Public Safety" and I beg to ask if you will give your consent to it.







RE: INTERNATIONAL POLICE COMMISSION

Reference is made to my memorandum to you under date of October 13, 1937, concerning the above-mentioned subject, which is attached hereto.

I talked to Judge Holtroff of the Department late yesterday afternoon concerning this matter. He was of the same opinion as you concerning the securing of enabling legislation for membership in the International Police Commission. He stated it is a clumsy way of handling it; that there would be a lot of red tape, and there was no way of telling when such enabling legislation could be secured. He stated he saw no reason on earth why the Bureau could not include this membership in its own appropriation and suggested that we go back to Mackey on it. The Judge stated that in so far as he could see, it has nothing to do with foreign relations - it is merely a police and law enforcement proposition and an item which rightfully would belong in our appropriation and not in the quota appropriation of the State Department.

RE: INTERNATIONAL POLICE COMMISSION

Reference is made to your statement before the Bureau of the Budget Committee yesterday concerning the 1939 appropriation estimates, particular reference being made to the change in phraseology including \$1500 for attendance at the annual meeting of the International Police Commission.

As was suggested by Mr. Mackey of the Budget Bureau, I today contacted Mr. Hosmer, Budget Officer of the State Department, for the purpose of ascertaining whether the State Department would desire to include this item in its regular appropriation bill. After discussing this matter with Hosmer and after he had collaborated with one of his assistants, Miss Bogdon, he advised me that his recommendation concerning this item would be for the Department to first secure appropriate legislation authorizing attendance at the meetings of the International Police Commission. He stated that the State Department in all instances secures, if possible, authorizing legislation for such meetings and that in the present appropriation bill all such items are either covered by special legislation or by special treaties. He stated that if the authorizing legislation is secured, then there would be no difficulty in the future in securing the necessary funds each year. He stated he was certain that in the event authorizing legislation for attendance at these meetings was not secured, the members of the Appropriation Committee in the House and in the Senate would strike the item from the Appropriation bill. He pointed out further that in the event authorizing legislation is enacted, no member of either House can ever delete the item from any subsequent appropriation bill merely by arising and making a point of order on it.

Mr. Hosmer further stated that after authorizing legislation was secured, he was sure that the proper appropriation to cover it would be the State Department's appropriation which covers all such meeting attendances. He exhibited to me some 20 or 25 committees comparable to this that are now included in the quota section of the Department of State Appropriation bill.



MEMORANDUM FOR MR. TOLSON

RE: 1939 BUDGET

There is attached hereto a memorandum from Mr. T. D. Quinn, under date of November 30, 1937, to which he attached a photoautographic copy (galley proof) of the estimate for the Federal Bureau of Investigation as it will appear in the 1939 budget.

Under the phraseology underscored, attention is invited to the additional phraseology as follows: "cost of membership (not to exceed \$1500) in the International Criminal Police Commission." This additional phraseology would make it possible for the FBI to attend the meetings of the International Criminal Police Commission.

With reference to Personal Services, Field, attention is invited to the fact that for the 1938 estimate they are allowing the same personnel as the Bureau estimates for the fiscal year 1938 -- total field personnel of 1,303 persons with a gross salary allowance of \$3,245,630. They allow, however, a net amount available for field personnel of \$2,852,240, the difference of \$392,440 being considered as lapses. Computing it in this manner reflects that the Bureau of the budget is allowing the Bureau all that it originally asked for; however, it is taking into consideration a lapse figure which the Bureau did not consider in its estimates. It is undoubtedly the contention of the Budget Bureau that there are bound to be lapses during the next fiscal year and those lapses should at least equal the lapses estimated for 1938.

Mr. Butts has orally advised the Bureau that the only person who could possibly change the estimate as is reflected in the attached galley proof is Mr. Bell, Acting Director of the Budget. I do not believe that you desire this matter to be handled through him and recommend that the Bureau in its justification before the House Committee mention this matter.





MEMORANDUM FOR THE DIRECTOR

RE: INTERNATIONAL CRIMINAL POLICE COMMISSION.

You will recall that recently at the appropriations hearing, Mr. McFall suggested the desirability of having a bill introduced authorizing the Bureau to accept membership in the International Criminal Police Commission. He stated he felt it would be desirable to get a bill of authority on this matter inasmuch as the inclusion of this membership in each year's appropriation might this year or at some subsequent time result in a point of order being made against this particular phase of the appropriation and he thought it might be well to anticipate this.

I spoke to Judge Holtzoff, who stated he had conferred originally with Mr. Bailey of the Budget Bureau on this matter and they had agreed that since it costs approximately \$500 to get a bill through Congress, they both thought it would be desirable to include the phraseology in our appropriation. Judge Holtzoff suggested that if Mr. McFall desired to do so, he might include this as a separate item at the end of the appropriation so that if any objection is made to it, it will not affect the rest of the appropriation and will not make it necessary to return the appropriation estimate to the Committee on Appropriations for revision.

Subsequent to my discussion with Judge Holtzoff, I telephoned Mr. McFall and told him of Judge Holtzoff's suggestion. He stated he would keep this in mind and that he was not particularly concerned with the matter inasmuch as there had been no intimation that any objection would be made to the provision. He stated he merely felt that at some time in the future when an opportunity presents itself to do so, we might keep in mind the desirability of special legislative enactment on this particular point.

RE: Invitations from Italian Police.

Dear Sir:

While I was in Rome, Doctor Antonio Pizutto of the Italian Police sounded me out concerning the Bureau's attitude in receiving certain invitations to visit the Italian Police. When I suggested to Pizutto that the invitations be submitted to the Bureau for consideration by you, he "broke down and admitted" that the Italian Police first wanted to determine your receptiveness and that their government would not like to issue such invitations unless they were accepted. I obtained the impression that the Italian government is very sensitive in this respect and also uncertain of their standing in the United States. Pizutto asked me if I would endeavor to determine your attitude upon my return to the United States and advise him informally. I told him I would keep the thing in mind. The two invitations are as follows:

First, an invitation from Senator Arturo Coccini, Director General of the Italian Police, to you to visit the police at Rome in the event you come to Europe to attend the Congress of the International Criminal Police Commission at Bucharest.

Second, an invitation that you attend or send Bureau representatives to attend the annual Police Festival at Rome in October 1938. This is an elaborate affair lasting several days during which the police are reviewed by Duce Mussolini. Foreign police visitors are usually on the reviewing platform with the Duce. I think it is quite political and the date of the celebration coincides with the date of the Fascist march on Rome. I was told that last year the police of six foreign nations were represented. These I noticed were all "dictator" countries, Germany, Austria, Poland, and I believe one or two South-American nations. The visiting representatives are the guests of the Italian government during their stay and I take it, are well entertained.

I suggest that these two matters be considered by the Bureau. I gathered that the invitations if issued, would be issued through the Italian Embassy. My own views are that the first invitation would be a natural one for you to accept if you go to Europe and I am sure you will be well received in Rome. The second one I feel is more political than police and I would not recommend acceptance. If the Bureau concurs with me regarding the latter, it can be forgotten and no further mention made thereof to Pizutto. On the other hand I believe it would be well to advise Pizutto informally whether you would have the time to visit Italy in the event you go to Europe.

MEMORANDUM FOR THE FILE

Mr. Cozier of the Department called me and said that the matter of the Bureau's becoming a member of the International Criminal Police Commission had been referred to him for the purpose of his drawing up substantive legislation on the subject, and there were a couple of questions which had come up.

He said that on the question of the fee of \$1,500, he did not know whether this amount covered only the membership fee, or whether it covered the expenses of the delegate and other incidental expenses in addition to the membership fee. He said that in looking over a similar project, he noticed that there were provisions to the effect that the Secretary of the Treasury was authorized to pay the expenses of the delegate at the annual meeting of the committee, together with the clerical expenses and other incidental expenses in connection with the delegate's proceeding to the meeting, and he was wondering whether similar provisions should be incorporated into the bill which he is presently drafting on the instant subject.

Further, he said that if the \$1,500 is the membership fee, it is possible that the Commission might change the membership fee, and if the new fee were larger, we would be limited to the fee of \$1,500 which had been appropriated for that purpose.

I told Mr. Cozier I would discuss this situation with the Director today and call him back.

I called Mr. Cozier and told him that I had discussed with the Director the questions which he had raised about the above matter, and that the Director says the amount specified; that is, \$1,500, is only for the membership fee, and that the Director has no objection to an appropriation from year to year for anything else which might come up.

Last summer it was the pleasure of this Bureau to have one of its representatives address the Annual Convention of the International Crime Commission, and I am enclosing a copy of the address which was delivered by Inspector E. H. Crane Lester in London, to either with a copy of the FBI Law Enforcement Bulletin containing a write-up regarding the Annual Convention of this organization.


While steps have been taken to obtain the necessary appropriations to permit the FBI to join the membership of the International Crime Commission, nevertheless this has not been finally approved. 



The Committee on the Judiciary, to whom was referred the bill (S. 3820) to authorize membership on behalf of the United States in the International Criminal Police Commission, report the same, after consideration, with the recommendation that it do pass.

The purposes and objects of the bill are explained in the following letter from Robert H. Jackson, acting Attorney General of the United States, which is appended hereto and made a part hereof:

MARCH 31, 1938.

Hon. HENRY F. ASHURST,

MY DEAR SENATOR: I recommend the enactment of legislation to authorize the Attorney General to accept and maintain, on behalf of the United States, membership in the International Criminal Police Commission.

The International Criminal Police Commission is composed of the chiefs of law enforcement bodies of 31 European countries. Its activities do not in any manner affect diplomatic relations or political matters, but are restricted solely to the exchange of information relative to technical and scientific methods of crime detection and to the exchange of fingerprints and other data concerning international criminals.

Participation by the United States in the activities of the Commission would be distinctly in the interest of law enforcement in this country. It would afford the Federal Bureau of Investigation of the Department of Justice a medium for the exchange of information with law enforcement officers in foreign countries.

The Congress has heretofore authorized the acceptance of membership on behalf of the United States in a large number of international agencies of various kinds. They include the International Prison Commission, International Commission of Congresses of Navigation, International Geodetic Association, International Joint Commission, Permanent Association of International Road Congresses, Central Bureau of the International Map of the World on the Millionth Scale, American International Institute for the Protection of Childhood, International Statistical Bureau at the Hague, International Labor Organization, Pan American Institute of Geography and History, and the International Council of Scientific Unions and Associated Unions. (U. S. C., title 22, ch. 7.)

2 INTERNATIONAL CRIMINAL POLICE COMMISSION MEMBERSHIP

The estimates of appropriations for this Department for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1939, accompanying the Budget message of the President, contained language intended to permit the payment of the cost of membership in the International Criminal Police Commission. The Committee on Appropriations of the House of Representatives omitted the above-mentioned language from the bill (H. R. 9544) to make appropriations for the Departments of State, Justice, Commerce, and Labor, and suggested that authority for such expenditures be secured by general legislation. On this subject, the committee stated in its report (H. Rep. No. 1830, 75th Cong., 3d sess., pp. 10 and 11) on the bill:

"Although the committee is highly impressed with the desirability of having the United States represented in the International Criminal Police Commission, as advocated by Director Hoover, and provided for in language approved by the Budget, inasmuch as it would entail the writing of legislation in the appropriation bill to accomplish this end, the committee has deleted the language which sought to accomplish this purpose. It is suggested that representations be made to the proper legislative committee in Congress with a view of having legislation passed authorizing our membership in this Commission." [Italics supplied.]

I enclose herewith a draft of a bill to effectuate the foregoing object. The Acting Director of the Bureau of the Budget informs me that there is no objection to the submission of this recommendation to the Congress for consideration.

That's why I am associating to this invitation my warmest personal one and remembering the kind promise you personally made to me on our meeting in October last year, I renew this invitation. As I have communicated to you personally then, I repeat now and ask you to be sure that your participation to our Congress will be appreciated at its high and just value by all members of our Commission, besides it will be a great pleasure for me to have you as a guest in our country.

So, I am asking you to do all is possible not to deprive me of the pleasure having as personal guest, all during your sojourn in our country and I like you to know that besides the excursion down the Danube to the Delta and on the black Sea, I have made all arrangements for a trip in the heart of the Carpathian mountains where you may enjoy - I hope - the angling of brook trout. we have a very fine place there, and the river is quite well populated, so that one can catch as many as 15 to 20

For further information concerning travelling conditions in Europe, I beg you to apply to Mr. Radu Irimescu, former Minister of the Air and our present Minister to Washington, who will most willingly give you all details you may need.

As the time is very advanced, will you please send your answer, which I very much wish to be affirmative, by wire, so that I may be able to make in time the necessary arrangements.


