Mr. Tamm advised of the call from Frank Waldrop.

Mr. Tamm advised that they have a press release ready to send to Colonel Gates on the National Bank of Detroit case, advising of the conviction of James J. O'Shea. Mr. Hoover stated it was all right to send this.

Mr. Tamm advised that the Texas Court of Criminal Appeals had awarded a new trial to Lebman, the gun dealer in San Antonio, on the grounds that the lower court erred in its instructions to the jury.

Mr. Tamm advised that R.W.S. Barnett is President of the Fidelity Building and Loan Association and that Marcus Borchart is Secretary. Mr. Hoover stated that he believes the latter is or was formerly in the Department. Mr. Tamm stated he would check on this. Mr. Tamm advised the matter is still in conference between the bank examiners and the commercial auditors but the Field Office is keeping in touch with them. Mr. Hoover stated that when it is referred to us it should be pursued vigorously. Mr. Tamm advised Mr. Hoover of the other members of the Board of Directors.

Mr. Hoover instructed Mr. Tamm to check and have Mr. Pennington find out what condition the American Building Association is in.

Mr. Tamm advised of the telegram from Omaha regarding the kidnaping and killing of Henry Plummer; that this looks like the work of the lunatics who escaped from the Minnesota State Institution; that there is no indication of any interstate transportation.

Mr. Tamm advised of the request from the Post Office Inspectors for a ballistics examination in connection with the gun taken from Harry Campbell. Mr. Hoover stated it was all right to do this.

Mr. Tamm advised that the trial of O'Conner Williams has been set for June 22nd and that Mr. Keith and Mr. Ladd will be necessary witnesses. Mr. Hoover stated this was all right.

Mr. Tamm advised of the request of Lieut. Truscott of the Metropolitan Police Department, who is in Birmingham, to go over the facts of the case involving E.P. Dickerson of the Metropolitan Police Department, WSTA, with Ag Obenshain, with the intention of later requesting the Bureau to authorize this.

Agent to appear before the Police Trial Board. Mr. Hoover instructed Mr. Tamm to wire the Birmingham office to inform the Lieutenant that the matter should be taken up with the Washington headquarters of the Bureau. Mr. Hoover stated that in the event they request Agent Obenshain to appear before the Police Trial Board he would be willing to have him do this.

Mr. Tamm advised that with regard to the impersonation case in New York which Mr. Hoover inquired about, the matter has been handled by the New York office since last January and five or six reports have been submitted. Mr. Hoover instructed Mr. Tamm to ask Mr. Whitley why he let the U.S. Attorney get ahead of him on the matter.

Mr. Tamm advised of the letter from SAC Stein, in which he advises that Karpis advised that he went to an attorney in Dayton, Ohio named John Egan and had this attorney write into the Bureau to see what the status of the charges against the Delaney woman were and that the attorney told Karpis it was too hot. Mr. Tamm stated he was having the files checked for this letter. Mr. Hoover stated that if such a letter was written, Mr. Connelley should be instructed to thoroughly interrogate this lawyer. Mr. Tamm advised that Karpis was also interrogated as to the name of the contact whom he alleges had a hold on some Bureau agent through which Karpis was able to obtain Bureau reports; that Karpis would not divulge the name of the contact, stating that it was a professional man; but stated that the agent at the time was working out of the Detroit office in Ohio territory; that Karpis when asked if he recalled the contents of any reports, stated he recalled one in which the advisability of picking up the Angus brothers in Toledo was discussed and which also contained the statement of [REDACTED]. Mr. Tamm advised that they are checking the reports for this report now. Mr. Hoover stated that Mr. Tamm should call McKee and advise him to continue questioning Karpis in order to learn anything more along this line. Mr. Tamm advised that Mr. Connelley is taking Suran and Sullivan with him to Toledo; that he is there now. Mr. Hoover stated that Mr. Connelley should stay at Toledo until the matter there is cleared up.

Mr. Hoover instructed Mr. Tamm to send a teletype to Mr. Hanson instructing him to call Mr. Hoover immediately at the Hotel New Yorker.

RE. TELEPHONE CONVERSATION BETWEEN MR. TAMM AND MR. HOOVER

Handwritten: Washburn deny to deny dip Press Release

Mr. Tamm advised of the apprehension of Leland Harvey, bank robbery, by the police near Nashville. Mr. Tamm advised he had authorized SAC Stapleton to issue a joint release with the police on this. Mr. Hoover instructed Mr. Tamm to advise Mr. Stapleton that he, Mr. Hoover, wished it added to the release that Mr. Hoover personally wished to express appreciation for the magnificent cooperation of the Tennessee police.

Mr. Tamm advised of the apprehension of Robert Alfred Powell in Detroit in connection with an extortion. Mr. Hoover authorized a release on this to be issued from Detroit jointly with the police there.

Mr. Tamm advised of the request of Mr. Williams in the Antitrust Division for Mr. Plummer to proceed to Oklahoma today. Mr. Hoover stated this was all right.

Mr. Tamm stated that in connection with the matter in which Jack McFall was interested, the colored nurse who was picked up in Pensacola is on the verge of childbirth; that she has an attorney and will probably fight removal. Mr. Hoover stated the attorney will probably contest this and the matter should therefore be laid before the U.S. Attorney.

Mr. Tamm advised of the disbarment by the Illinois Supreme Court of Louis Piquett, and W.M. O'Brien, the attorney who defended John Paul Chase and that the Chicago office has been requested to get the details.

Mr. Hoover inquired as to the status of the appeal byaska. Mr. Tamm advised that this was refused on June 1 by the Supreme Court.

Mr Hoover inquired when the mandate would be put in effect in committing Laska to the penitentiary. Mr. Tamm stated he would find out about this. Mr Hoover stated he wanted to see there was no holdup on this.

Mr. Tamm advised of the call from Mr. Barnes of the Treasury Department relative to the Lindbergh ransom money, in which Mr. Barnes stated the amount represented by the bills would be deposited to the account of Colonel Lindbergh through the Federal Reserve Bank but that the bills would be kept intact.

Mr. Tamm advised of the new extortion case which the Washington Field office is working on, and of the apprehension of a suspect in connection therewith.

Mr. Tolson stated that in the material sent him on the Police, he did not see the memorandum on the case solved by the policeman in Connecticut as a result of information received by him while in training school. Mr. Tolson stated he also desired any other material on the accomplishments of the Police Trainees after they had gone back to their respective departments upon completion of the training course.

Mr. Tolson stated that with regard to the figure of 12,000 murders being committed each year, he would like to know how many murderers are released from prison each year; that this might possibly be in the book issued by the Bureau of Census.

Mr. Tolson advised that Mr. Keith had informed them he had not received notice of the SAC Conference; that perhaps Agent Thompson had not sent the notice to Mr. Keith and that in view of this Mr. Quinn should check up to make sure that Mr. Connelley had received his notice. Mr. Tolson stated that he had recommended to Mr. Clegg that he suggest to the Director the names of any other persons he might think the Director would want to attend the school, such as Agent Thompson, etc., and that Mr. Quinn should check up on this and have Mr. Clegg prepare this list, which Mr. Tolson believes should include Mr. Lester, Agent Thompson, and the supervisors.

MEMORANDUM

Re: Telephone conversation between
Mr. Quinn and Mr. Tolson.

Mr. Quinn advised Mr. Tolson of the figures of the murderers turned loose from penitentiaries, stating in 1932, 3,529 were released and in 1933, 3,290 were released.

Mr. Quinn advised that Mr. Clegg only recalled the case in Connecticut, with regard to the accomplishments of the Police Trainees after leaving the school; that Mr. Clegg is, however, looking up all the other trainees and will prepare a memorandum on any other cases he finds. Mr. Tolson instructed Mr. Quinn to send anything up today which might be good, if anything additional were found.

With regard to the agents attending the SAC school, Mr. Quinn advised that Mr. Clegg is preparing a memorandum of those who have already been invited and of those whom he suggests being invited and that he will go over this list with the Director when he returns. Mr. Tolson stated that notice should be sent to Mr. Connelley and Mr. Keith that they are to attend the SAC school. Mr. Quinn stated that he advised Mr. Clegg to get letters out today. Mr. Tolson stated that no leave would be granted to any SAC or supervisor during July. Mr. Quinn reminded Mr. Tolson that Gus Jones had been granted leave after the close of the school, which had been approved by the Director.

Mr. Tolson instructed Mr. Quinn to check up on the clerical appointments and to see that these are pushed vigorously, as he would like to see that as many of these are gotten out as possible; that there has been too much delay in the investigations of the applicants.

Mr. Quinn advised that Mr. McNally was in his office with Mr. Whitley. Mr. Hoover instructed Mr. Quinn to see that a good tour was put on for him and that he was given anything he wanted; that Mr. McNally according to Mr. Whitley, wishes to write an article pointing out that kidnaping is not the only thing the Bureau does. Mr. Quinn advised that Mr. McNally wishes to get a story along this line and thinks he can get it syndicated on the front page.

With regard to Agent (A) Risler's transfer to Aberdeen, Mr. Quinn advised that there were four accounting cases out there and Mr. Quinn believes he should go there. Mr. Hoover stated this was all right; that he wanted to be sure, however, that there was enough work in that district to warrant Risler going there, so there would not be any criticism coming forth in regard to sending a man out there when there was no work to be done.

Mr. Quinn advised of the letter received from Pete Coulson, of the Franklin Institute, at Philadelphia, Penna. in which he stated he would like to get the Director to appear on a program there before July 12th, which program would call for the Director to speak before a group of police officers in the afternoon and a group of laymen at night; that the purpose of this program would be to pay tribute to the work of the Bureau and the Director. Mr. Quinn advised that he talked with Mr. Whittier concerning the Institute and concerning Mr. Coulson; that Mr. Whittier advised that Mr. Coulson is a high type man; that, however, the above request is the desire for some good advertisement for the Institute; that the Franklin Institute is an organization similar to the Rockefeller Institute in New York; that it is back by some of the leading people in Philadelphia. Mr. Hoover instructed Mr. Quinn to have Mr. Vetterli ascertain confidentially the facts concerning the Franklin Institute; that he, Mr. Hoover, believes it might be some sort of a promotion project and in the event it is he would not want to appear on such a program as is proposed by Mr. Coulson. Mr. Hoover stated that Mr. Quinn should wire Mr. Coulson and advise him that the Director is out of the city but that his letter will be called to the Director's attention upon his return.

Glendale, California, and Mr Hoover stated these would be all right.

Mr. Hoover stated that Mr. Quinn should call James T. Williams, Jr. Chief Editorial Writer for Hearst papers, and state that Mr. Quinn was calling for Mr. Hoover to find out if the people in Kansas wanted to send a Kansas State policeman to the Police School, which starts on July 6th; that Mr. Hoover would be glad to send the invitation provided the selection would be made by the Governor.

Mr Quinn inquired about the Gatham County, Georgia police department and Mr Hoover stated this should be checked.

Mr. Hoover inquired how many would be in the next Police School and Mr. Quinn advised that thirty-two have accepted to date but that it was possible that at the last moment some might drop out; that the purpose of the supplemental list just read to Mr. Hoover was for the purpose of feeling out these departments in order that they could be invited in case some of those who had already accepted did drop out. Mr. Hoover instructed Mr. Quinn to send him the list of the police departments who have already accepted in addition to the list just read to him with the exception of the Joplin, Missouri police department.

Mr. Hoover stated that the Herald and other papers coming out at 8:30 PM should be checked each evening in order to see if there are any stories pertaining to the Bureau in them, so they can be read to Mr Hoover when he calls.

Mr. Hoover inquired if Mr Quinn had talked with Mr. Waldrop and Mr. Quinn stated that he had not but that he would try to get in touch with him as soon as possible.

Mr. Quinn advised of the invitation received from the League of Municipalities of North Carolina for the Director to speak at their meeting at Wilmington, N.C. on the evening of July 17th. Mr. Hoover instructed that a letter be prepared declining this due to previous commitments.

Mr. Quinn stated that he was having Mr. Vetterli check up on the Franklin Institute. Mr. Hoover stated he was interested in finding out who the people backing the Institute were.

Mr. Quinn advised of the memorandum from Mr. Coffey and the letter from Mr. Whitley concerning the Bureau's exhibit in New York, in which they advise that the Bureau is being referred to as the Scientific Crime Detection Bureau of the Department of Justice in invitations issued by the Bar Association. Mr. Hoover stated that a large and impressive sign should be placed by the exhibit indicating in large letters that it is an exhibit of the Federal Bureau of Investigation. Mr. Quinn advised that Mr. Coffey wants to know if it is all right to talk on the lie detector. Mr. Hoover stated that it would be all right for him to talk on this but that he should take the position that it is merely in an experimental stage; that it is viewed by the Bureau only as a collateral aid and not as a certain process of deduction. Mr. Hoover stated he did not think the lie detector nor the x-ray machine should be taken to New York. Mr. Quinn advised that Mr. Coffey desired to take some men from the Laboratory with him to New York and Mr. Hoover stated this was all right.

Mr. Quinn advised of the memorandum from Mr. Clegg re invitations to the next Police Training School in which he suggests certain police departments to be invited in the event any of those already invited drop out at the last moment. Mr. Hoover stated that the question which arose in his mind in connection with this matter was if the Bureau should go to the extent of asking the Dupont people not to manufacture this bullet, as he understood from Mr. Harvey that the Dupont Company would either manufacture the bullet for us or would restrain from the manufacture of it if we desired. Mr. Hoover instructed Mr. Quinn to prepare a memorandum for the Attorney General, advising him of the call and letter from Mr. Harvey relative to this matter and advise the Attorney General of the dangerous character of this ammunition; and further advise him that the Dupont Company has offered to manufacture it for our own use or to restrain from manufacturing it at all if the Bureau so desires; that the Attorney General should be advised that the Director has been asked about it and would like to have the Attorney General's opinion on this matter. Mr. Hoover instructed that this memo be prepared for his signature and held until his return.

Mr. Quinn advised of the letter received from C. William Duncan of the Philadelphia Evening Ledger attaching commendatory articles about the Director. Mr. Hoover instructed that this be held until his return.

Mr. Hoover inquired if anything had been heard from Mr. Waldrop. Mr. Quinn advised that nothing had been heard this morning and that nothing appeared in today's papers.

MEMORANDUM

While talking with the Director on long distance the lights in the office suddenly went out. This was at approximately 10:25 P.M. The Director was informed of the occurrence and writer moved to the window in an effort to read the remaining material that was to be called to the Director's attention. George Gutteridge then came into the office and lit matches while writer read the letters to the Dir. The Director then gave writer some instructions which he was unable to take down with pencil being away from the desk and in the dark and of course depended on the recording machine for verification. It was not discovered until later that the recording machine had ceased to function as soon as the power had been thrown off.

Mr. Quinn was immediately notified after writer had called the guard room and talked with the engineer who explained that the power was to be thrown off from 10 to 1 o'clock so that certain work could be done. Both the engineer and the guard insisted that they had had no knowledge previously that the power was to be thrown off but that they had merely been informed that certain work was to be done and the guard was to admit at 10 o'clock the electricians who were to do the work. Mr. Peck, the engineer called at the office after the power had been restored and explained as indicated above. He also talked over the telephone with Mr. Quinn. Mr. Hodson the acting Sergeant of the Guard also came to the office and protested that he had had no knowledge that the power was to be turned off.

The home telephone number of Mr. Cavanaugh was also secured and Mr. Quinn was placed in communication with Mr. Cavanaugh.

When Miss [redacted] talked with the writer for the purpose of furnishing the address of the apartment, the latter overheard her refer to [redacted] as "the doctor"; however, this title was not used when the call was placed nor in my subsequent conversation with him.

After the Director had talked to the Attorney General, he telephoned me and advised of the results of his conversation with the Attorney General and stated that the Attorney General advised that in the future any matters of such vital importance as this release should not be sent to Colonel Gates, but should be sent directly to and discussed with him or Carnel. The Director instructed that a copy of the release in this case which has already been sent out be forwarded immediately by special messenger to the Attorney General. This was subsequently done.

The Director instructed me to get in touch with Mr. Vetterli in New York and tell him by all means not to say anything to anybody about this case. The Director stated that Vetterli should get in touch with the United States Attorney's office and tell him that instructions had been received from the Attorney General to say absolutely nothing further about any angles of this case in New York. The Director said that nothing further should be sent out by the Bureau about this case without first having received his specific approval.

I told the Director that I had instructed Vetterli in New York to get in touch with the Miami Office and obtain a statement relative to the entire background of this case, so that the Bureau might be fully advised as to the facts and circumstances of this case.

I informed the Director of the incident in New York where Lamar Hardy, United States Attorney for the Southern District of New York, called Tamm of the New York Office and demanded to know the complete facts in this case. The New York office had not been contacted. I told the Director that the Bureau was informed that two Assistant United States Attorneys had been contacted in this matter and authorized prosecution.

I called the Director at this time and informed him that I had been talking with Mr. Cooney who advised that the Levine family was making the release and that Connelley had talked with the Director concerning some agreement with the New Rochelle Police that we would each distribute a wanted circular simultaneously. The Director stated that he had never heard of any such an agreement, but that the only thing Connelley had discussed with him was the matter of a joint search with the New Rochelle Police.

I told the Director that my understanding of his instructions on the circulars was that as soon as the release is made our circulars will be released. The Director stated that these were his instructions and to telephone Connelley immediately to ascertain whether there was some misunderstanding.

The Director stated that he could see no reason for the New Rochelle Police to issue a circular since our circulars cover the whole country, it is a Federal kidnaping case and is not any longer a local case. I told the Director that I would call Connelley to find out if there was some misunderstanding between Cooney and Connelley.

On September 19, 1938 a MR. DANA HOGAN, Room 6204, Biltmore Hotel, telephoned advising that he is Chairman of the Distinguished Guest Committee of the American Legion and that he was anxious to get in touch with you in order that an aide could be assigned to you for the purpose of escorting you to the Commander's Dinner for Distinguished Guests on the night of the 19th. After my conversation with MR. HOGAN, MR. TOLSON called the office and I conveyed this message to him. *not in file*

MR. CHARLES FORD of the Republic Studios also telephoned on the morning of the 19th, stating that he would appreciate my telling you or MR. TOLSON that if you had time he would like to have you telephone him. MR. TOLSON was also subsequently advised of this.

MR. HARRY TANNER, Vice-President of the Los Angeles Adventurer's Club, telephoned on the morning of the 19th stating that the Adventurer's Club and the Board of Supervisors for Los Angeles County were giving a dinner in honor of Mayor-elect FLETCHER BOWRON of Los Angeles and DOUGLAS CORRIGAN, the trans-Atlantic flyer, on the evening of September 20th at the Biltmore Hotel. MR. TANNER extended a cordial invitation to you and your party to attend this function as guests of the Los Angeles Adventurer's Club. He stated that many of the outstanding citizens and public officials of Los Angeles would be in attendance at this dinner. I subsequently conveyed this message to MR. TOLSON and when he informed me that it would not be possible to accept this invitation, I so notified MR. TANNER. *later 10/15 ✓*

On the 19th, MR. W. P. HENDRY, Chief of Police at the Metro-Goldwyn-Mayer Studio in Culver City, telephoned stating that he would like to be remembered to you and to MR. TOLSON, adding again that he wondered if it was going to be possible for you to visit them at the M.G.M. lot. Again he reiterated that he knew MR. MANNIX would like to have you and your party at a luncheon. MR. TOLSON was advised of this by telephone. *later 10-14 ✓*

On September 20, 1938, MR. EUGENE BISCAILUZ, Sheriff of Los Angeles County, telephonically advised that he and his son, who is a student at the University of Southern California, are both members of Kappa Alpha. Sheriff BISCAILUZ said that the local Chapter at the University of Southern California, knowing that you are a member of this fraternity, is very anxious to entertain you at a luncheon at the fraternity house and the Sheriff's son had been requested to endeavor to make these arrangements through the Sheriff.

SHERIFF BISCAILUZ said that he appreciated that you were very busy during your stay in Los Angeles, but that he knew the members of the fraternity would be elated to have you as their guest, adding that he also was very anxious to meet you while you are in the city.

SHERIFF BISCAILUZ is one of the popular public officials in Los Angeles, having during the past several weeks been re-elected to the position of Sheriff at the primary elections with a majority of more than 500,000 votes, a greater majority than any other candidate for public office, who was elected at the primaries, received.

On September 20, 1938 a woman giving the name of MISS [REDACTED] telephone, [REDACTED] called this office stating that she would appreciate your telephoning to her, saying that she had written to you during the past year regarding matters of interest to her. She declined to give any other information about the nature of her business, but an examination of the files in the Los Angeles office indicates that this woman has been a subject of correspondence with you, Bureau file 62-46979, she having written first on December 19, 1936 requesting aid in connection with some Government bonds which she claims her father may have left you, and on January 13, 1937 she wrote to you about the "real cause of cancer".

On September 20, 1938, the secretary of FRANCES MARION, telephoned advising that MISS MARION wanted you to know that her present telephone number is Gladstone 2336.

Page Three.

On September 20, 1938 a MR. ROBERT G. LODUCKS, 6114 Harcourt Avenue, Los Angeles, telephone, University 3217, called stating that he had been reading in the newspapers the comment about your address on the night of the 19th and he said that in connection with the thought of "character building" that he believed you had stressed a very vital factor in our lives, stating that it is "the biggest thing in our country". He said that he wanted you to know that it is absolutely necessary that this thought be put over and that the public realize the importance of character building. MR. LODUCKS stated that he is an attorney, but by necessity is a lecturer and that he has lectured on this thought, stating that he is frequently misunderstood and that he was pleased to learn that you had stressed this point.

On September 20th, Mr. CHARLES FORD of the Republic Studio telephoned the office stating that he planned to call you at the Biltmore Hotel and leave word that he had phoned.

On September 20th, MAJOR HARRY E. SMITH, newly elected Sheriff for Jefferson County, Birmingham, Alabama, who will take office there on January 1, 1939, telephoned me stating that he was here to attend the American Legion Convention and that he would perhaps remain for a few weeks thereafter. I know MAJOR SMITH from my service in the Birmingham office. He was in charge of the National Guard Range there which is utilized by the Agents of the Birmingham Division for their firearms training.

MAJOR SMITH indicated that he had been hopeful of attending the F.B.I. National Police Academy before assuming the duties of Sheriff in Birmingham, but realizes that because there will not be another class until possibly in January of 1939, it will be impossible for him to do so. I have made arrangements to spend several hours with MAJOR SMITH on Thursday, September 22, 1938, in visiting the various law enforcement agencies in Los Angeles, the MAJOR stating that he is interested in seeing how these agencies operate here. He indicated that he would like to have an opportunity of meeting you while you are in Los Angeles, but on the other hand, stated that he realizes that you are very busy and that this may not be possible. I will communicate with the Bureau and the Birmingham office concerning the day that I spend with MAJOR SMITH.

✓ On September 21, 1938 the Secretary to MR. RUPERT HUGHES, the writer, telephoned stating that MR. HUGHES was very anxious to get in touch with you. It was learned from her that MR. HUGHES' telephone number is Hillside 7497, which message was conveyed to MR. GUY HOTTEL shortly after MR. HUGHES' secretary called the office. *Letter 10/11*

✓ On September 21st, MR. WALTER L. BOWERS, who is an attache of the State Attorney General's office, State Building, Los Angeles, California, telephone MADison 1271, telephoned stating that the State Bar Convention is being held at the Hotel Huntington in Pasadena, California, and that the Law Alumni Association of the University of Southern California will hold a luncheon at the Hotel Huntington at noon on September 22nd. MR. BOWERS stated that the Alumni Association wanted to extend to you an invitation to attend this luncheon on the 22nd with the hope that you possibly could make a talk for a few minutes. *Letter 10/11*

MR. BOWERS, as you will recall, is the same gentleman who, prior to your coming to Los Angeles, as is indicated in a memorandum that I furnished to you on your arrival in the city, had wanted you to attend a meeting of the Alumni Association of the University of Southern California in Los Angeles on September 14th. Inasmuch as MR. HOTTEL, in a telephone conversation with me on the morning of the 21st, indicated that your party was perhaps going to La Jolla on the 21st, and in accordance with the conversation that I had with MR. TOLSON on the 21st prior to your departure for La Jolla, I telephoned to MR. BOWERS stating that I had been in touch with you about this invitation and that while you appreciated the invitation, you had to leave the city quite unexpectedly, for which reason you were unable to accept the invitation.

On September 21st, after speaking to MR. TOLSON about your inability to accept the luncheon engagement with the Kappa Alpha Fraternity extended to you through Sheriff BISCALUZ, I communicated with the latter and being unable to reach him, left word at his office that you left the city quite unexpectedly and that you regretted that you were unable to accept the invitation.

RE: EMERGENCY TELEPHONE CALLS

In the event it is necessary in the future to have emergency precedence handling of long distance telephone calls from any of the private phones in the Bureau, or in the event the Director wishes to make a long distance call and have it receive emergency precedence handling from his home or from any other phone in Washington not connected with the Bureau switchboard, the following procedure should be followed:

Instead of dialing 211, dial Executive 7220, which is a branch line to the Number One Toll Office. The long distance operator can then be given the details as to whom the Director wishes to speak and the call will be given emergency handling.

In the event some other Bureau official wishes to make such a call, Mr. Hoover's name should be mentioned after dialing Executive 7220.

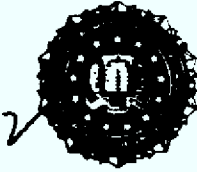

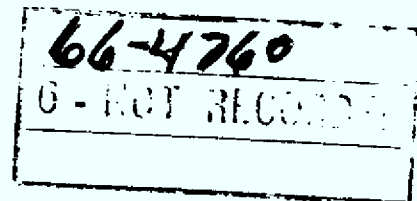

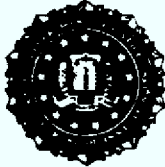
