PMORANDUM

Re: Telephone conversation
between Director and Mr. Tamm.

Mr. Tamm advised of the call from Frank Waldrop.

Mr. Tamm advised that they have a press release ready to send to Colonel Gates on the Mational Bank of Detroit case, advising of the conviction of James J. O'Shea. Mr. Hoover stated it was all right to send this.

Mr Tamm advised that the Texas Court of Criminal Appeals had awarded a new trial to Lebman, the gun dealer in San Antonio, on the grounds that the lower court erred in its instructions to the jury.

Mr. Tamm advised that R.W.S.Barnett is President of the Fidelity Building and Loan Association and that Marcus Borchart is Secretary. Mr. Hoover stated that he believes the latter is or was formerly in the Department. Mr. Tamm stated he would check on this. Mr. Tamm advised the matter is still in conference between the bank examiners and the commerci auditors but the Field Office is keeping in touch with them. Mr. Hoover stated that when it is referred to us it should be pursued vigorously. Mr. Tamm advised Mr. Hoover of the other members of the Board of Directors.

Mr. Hoover instructed Mr. Taum to check and have Mr. Pennington find out what condition the American Building Association is in.

Mr. Tamm advised of the telegram from Omaha regarding the kidmaping and killing of Henry Plummer; that this looks like the work of the lumatics who escaped from the Minnesota State Institution; that there is no indication of any interstate transportation.

Mr. Tamm advised of the request from the Post Office Inspectors for a ballistics examination in connection with the gun taken from Harry Campbell. Mr. Hoover stated it was all right to do this.

Mr. Tamm advised that the trial of O'Conner Williams has been set for June 22nd and that Mr. Keith and Mr. Ladd will be necessary witnesses.

Mr. Tamm advised of the request of Lieut. Truscott of the Metropilt Police Department, who is in Birmingham, to go over the facts of the case involving E.P.Dickerson of the Metroplitan Police Department, WSTA, with Agent Obenshain, with the intention of later requesting the Bureau to authorise this

Agent to appear before the Police Trial Board. Mr. Hoover instructed Mr. Tamm to wire the Birmingham office to inform the Lieutenant that the matter should be taken up with the Washington headquarters of the Bureau. Mr. Hoover stated that in the event they request Agent Obenshain to appear before the Police Trial Board he would be willing to have him do this.

Mr. Tamm advised that with regard to the impersonation case in New York which Mr. Hoover inquired about, the matter has been handled by the New York office since last January and five or six reports have been submitted. Mr. Hoover instructed Mr. Tamm to ask Mr. Whitley why he let the U.S.Attorney get ahead of him on the matter.

Mr. Tamm advised of the letter from SAC Stein, in which he advises that Karpis advised that he went to an attorney in Dayton, Ohio named John Egen and had this attorney write into the Bureau to see what the status of the charges against the Delaney woman were and that the attorney told Karpis it was too hot. Mr. Tamm stated he was having the files checked for this letter. Mr. Hoover stated that if such a letter was written, Mr. Connelley should be instructed to thoroughly interrogate this lawyer. Mr. Tamm advised that Karpis was also interrogated as to the name of the contact whom he alleges had a hold on some Bureau agent through which Karpis was able to obtain Bureau reports; that Karpis would not divulge the name of the contact, stating that it was a professional man; but stated that the agent at the time was working out of the Detroit office in Ohio territory; that Karpis when asked if he recalled the contents of any reports, stated he recalled one in which the advisibility of picking up the Angus brothers in Toledo was discussed and which also contained the statement of th Mr. Tamm advised that 570 Mr. Tamm should call McKee and advise him to continue questioning Karpis in order to learn anything more along this line. Mr. Tamm advised that Mr. Connelley is taking Suran and Sullivan with him to Toledo; that he is there now. Mr. Hoover stated that Mr. Connelley should stay at Toledo until the matter there is cleared up.

Mr. Hoover instructed Mr. Tamm to send a teletype to Mr. Hanson instructing him to call Mr. Hoover immediately at the Hotel New Yorker.

It Tolson stated that in the material sens him on the Police, he did not see the memorandum on the case solved by the police in Connecticut as a result of information received by him while in training school. Mr. Tolson stated he also desired any other material on the accomplishments of the Police Trainees after they had gone back to their respective departments upon completion of the training course.

Mr. Tolson stated that with regard to the figure of .12,000 Amurders being committed each year, he would like to know how many murderers are released from prison each year; that this might possibly be in the book issued by the Bureau of Census.

Mr. Tolson advised that Mr. Keith had informed them he had not received notice of the SAC Conference; that perhaps Agent Thompson ha not sent the notice to Mr. Seith and that in view of this Mr. Quinn should check up to make sure that Mr. Connelley had received his notice. Mr. Tolaga stated that he had recommended to Mr. Glegg that he suggest to the Director the names of any other persons he might think the Director would want to attend the school, such as Agent Thompson, etc., and that Mr Quian should theck up on this and have Mr. Clagg prepare this list, which Mr. Telson believes should include Mr. Lester, Agent Thompson, and the supervisors.

Mr.Quinn advised that Mr.A Mcanally was in his office with Mr. Whitley. Mr. Hoover instructed Mr. Quinn to see that a good four was put on for him and that he was given anything he wanted; that Mr! McAmally according to Mr Whitley, wishes to write an article pointing out that hidseping is not the only thing the Bureau does. 

O MEMORANDUM

While talking with the Director on long distance the lights in the office suddenly went out. This was at approximately 10:25 P.M. The Director was informed of the occurrence and writer moved to the window in an effort to read the remaining material that was to be called to the Director's attention. George Gutteridge then came into the office and lit matches while writer read the letters to the Dir. The Director then gave writer some instructions which he was smable to take down with pencil being away from the desk and in the dark and of course depended on the recording machine for verification. It was not discovered until later that the recording machine had ceased to function as soon as the power had been thrown off.

Mr. Quinn was immediately notified after writer had called the guard room and talked with the engineer who explained that the power was to be thrown off-from 10 to 1 o'clock so that certain work could be done. Both the engineer and the guard insisted that they had had no knowledge previously that the power was to be thrown off but that they had merely been informed that certain work was to be done and the guard was to admit at 10 o'clock the electricians who were to do the work. Mr. Peck, the engineer called at the office after the power had been restored and explained as indicated above. He also talked over the telephone with Mr. Quinn. Mr. Hodson the acting Sergeant of the Guard also came to the office and protested that he had had no knowledge that the power was to be turned off.

The home telephone number of Mr. Gavenaugh was also secured and Mr. Quinn was placed in communication with Mr. Cavanaugh.

On September 19, 1938 a MR. DANA HOGAN, Room 6204, Bilt-more Hotel, telephoned advising that he is Chairman of the Distinguished Guest Committee of the American Legion and that he was anxious to get in touch with you in order that an aide could be assigned to you for the purpose of escorting you to the Commander's Dinner for Distinguished Guests on the night of the 19th. After my conversation with MR. HOGAN, MR. TOLSON called the office and I conveyed this message to him.

MR. CHARLES FORD of the Republic Studios also telephoned on the morning of the 19th, stating that he would appreciate my telling you or MR. TOLSON that if you had time he would like to have you telephone him. MR. TOLSON was also subsequently advised of this.

MR. HARRY TANNER, Vice-President of the Los Angeles Adventurer's Club, telephoned on the morning of the 19th stating that the Adventurer's Club and the Board of Supervisors for Los Angeles County were giving a dinner in honor of Mayor-elect FLETCHER BOWRON of Los Angeles and DOUGLAS CORRIGAN, the trans-Atlantic flyer, on the evening of September 20th at the Biltmore Hotel. MR. TANNER extended a cordial invitation to you and your party to attend this function as guests of the Los Angeles Adventurer's Club. He stated that many of the outstanding citizens and public officials of Los Angeles would be in attendance at this dinner. I subsequently conveyed this message to MR. TOLSON and when he informed me that it would not be possible to accept this invitation, I so notified MR. TANNER.

On the 19th, MR. W. P. HENDRY, Chief of Police at the Metro-Goldwyn-Mayer Studio in Culver City, telephoned stating that he would like to be remembered to you and to MR. TOLSON, adding again that he wondered if it was going to be possible for you to visit them at the M.G.M. lot. Again he reiterated that he knew MR. MANNIX would like to have you and your party at a luncheon.

MR. TOLSON was advised of this by telephone.

On September 20, 1938, MR. EUGENE BISCAILUZ, Sheriff of Los Angeles County, telephonically advised that he and his son, who is a student at the University of Southern California, are both members of Kappa Alpha. Sheriff BISCAILUZ said that the local Chapter at the University of Southern California, knowing that you are a member of this fraternity, is very anxious to entertain you at a luncheon at the fraternity house and the Sheriff's son had been requested to endeavor to make these arrangements through the Sheriff.

SHERIFF BISCAIWZ said that he appreciated that you were very busy during your stay in Los Angeles, but that he knew the members of the fraternity would be elated to have you as their guest, adding that he also was very anxious to meet you while you are in the city.

SHERIFF BISCAILUZ is one of the popular public officials in Los Angeles, having during the past several weeks been re-elected to the position of Sheriff at the primary elections with a majority of more than 500,000 votes, a greater majority than any other candidate for public office, who was elected at the primaries, received.

On September 20, 1938 a woman giving the name of MISS

On September 20, 1938 a MR. ROBERT G. LODUCKS, 6114 Harcourt Avenue, Los Angeles, telephone, University 3217, called stating that he had been reading in the newspapers the comment about your address on the night of the 19th and he said that in connection with the thought of "character building" that he believed you had stressed a very vital factor in our lives, stating that it is "the biggest thing in our country". He said that he wanted you to know that it is absolutely necessary that this thought be put over and that the public realize the importance of character building. MR. LODUCKS stated that he is an attorney, but by necessity is a lecturer and that he has lectured on this thought, stating that he is frequently misunderstood and that he was pleased to learn that you had stressed this point.

On September 20th, Mr. CHARLES FORD of the Republic Studio telephoned the office stating that he planned to call you at the Biltmore Hotel and leave word that he had phoned.

On September 20th, MAJOR HARRY E. SMITH, newly elected Sheriff for Jefferson County, Birmingham, Alabama, who will take office there on January 1, 1939, telephoned me stating that he was here to attend the American Legion Convention and that he would perhaps remain for a few weeks thereafter. I know MAJOR SMITH from my service in the Birmingham office. He was in charge of the National Guard Range there which is utilized by the Agents of the Birmingham Division for their firearms training.

MAJOR SWITH indicated that he had been hopeful of attending the F.B.I. National Police Academy before assuming the duties of Sheriff in Birmingham, but realizes that because there will not be another class until possibly in January of 1939, it will be impossible for him to do so. I have made arrangements to spend several hours with MAJOR SMITH on Thursday, September 22, 1938, in visiting the various law enforcement agencies in Los Angeles, the MAJOR stating that he is interested in seeing how these agencies operate here. He indicated that he would like to have an opportunity of meeting you while you are in Los Angeles, but on the other hand, stated that he realizes that you are very busy and that this may not be possible. I will communicate with the Bureau and the Birmingham office concerning the day that I spend with MAJOR SMITH.

Page Four.

On September 21, 1938 the Secretary to MR. RUPERT HUGHES, the writer, telephoned stating that MR. HUGHES was very anxious to get in touch with you. It was learned from her that MR. HUGHES' telephone number is Hillside 7497, which message was conveyed to MR. GUY HOTTEL shortly after MR. HUGHES' secretary called the office.

On September 21st, MR. WALTER L. BOWERS, who is an attache of the State Attorney General's office, State Building, Ios Angeles, California, telephone Madison 1271, telephoned stating that the State Bar Convention is being held at the Hotel Huntington in Pasadena, California, and that the Law Alumni Association of the University of Southern California will hold a luncheon at the Hotel Huntington at noon on September 22nd. MR. BOWERS stated that the Alumni Association wanted to extend to you an invitation to attend this luncheon on the 22nd with the hope that you possibly could make a talk for a few minutes.

MR. BOWERS, as you will recall, is the same gentleman who, prior to your coming to Los Angeles, as is indicated in a memorandum that I furnished to you on your arrival in the city, had wanted you to attend a meeting of the Alumni Association of the University of Southern California in Los Angeles on September 14th. Inasmuch as MR. HOTTEL, in a telephone conversation with me on the morning of the 21st, indicated that your party was perhaps going to La Jolla on the 21st, and in accordance with the conversation that I had with MR. TOLSON on the 21st prior to your departure for La Jolla, I telephoned to MR. BOWERS stating that I had been in touch with you about this invitation and that while you appreciated the invitation, you had to leave the city quite unexpectedly, for which reason you were unable to accept the invitation.

On September 21st, after speaking to MR. TOISON about your inability to accept the luncheon engagement with the Kappa Alpha Fraternity extended to you through Sheriff BISCAILUZ, I communicated with the latter and being unable to reach him, left word at his office that you left the city quite unexpectedly and that you regretted that you were unable to accept the invitation.
