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In early 1944, the "Independent Voters Committee of the Arts and Sciences for Roosevelt" was reportedly formed in New York City. The "Sunday Worker", Communist news organ, in issue of December 24, 1944, carried an article entitled "Artists State Fermanent Show for Folitical Action". This article revisled that a new "Independent Ditizens Committee of Art., Sciences and Professions" had been organized for political action to insure victory and security. According to the article, this committee was an outstrive of the Independent Voters Co mittee which had campaigned so actively and effectively for the re-election of President Roosevelt. Among the initiating sponters of this new organization were April Adumic, James Carney, Bartley Crum, Howard Fast, Paul Robeson and Edward G. Robinson. The sponsors mentioned above were reliably reported to have close Communist affileiations and connections.

The articles of incorporation of the "Free Morld Association of Hollywood" were filed with the los angeles County Clerk on March 17, 1944. The wording of the articles indicated a strong attitude against all forms of totalitarianism including Communism.

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The "People's world" for April 21, 1944, closely indicated the method of attack planned by the Communist Party against the Motion Picture Alliance and was set out. The article was entitled "Screen workers Spur MPA Fight" with a sub-neading "Pressure Group Flot to Capture Industry Spurs Rally for Freedom". The article in the "People's world" waswritten by Dolph Winebrenner. One of the paragraphs being set up vertabim reads as follows:

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



On July 12, 1947, a "Conference on Thought Control" was held at the Beverly Hills Hotel, Los Angeles, California. The conference was sponsored by the Arts, Sciences, and Professions of the Progressive Citizens of America. Paul Draper, a well-known dancer, spoke at this conference. The speech concerned his part in the production of the movie, "Time of Your Life," written by William Saroyan.

During the reading of the script, Draper noted that he was to speak a line which ridiculed Hitler and had the effect of calling Hitler the most serious menace of the day. Draper, realizing that the script should be revised, asked his director what line should be substituted for the Hitler line. The director told Draper to substitute the name Stalin for Hitler. Draper said that he could not say such a line in the movie.

Draper said that he talked to Jimmy Cagney, the producer, "Grips" and many other people around the studio lot. His director told Draper to substitute the name Molotov for the name Stalin.

braper saw a representative of the J. Arthur Rank Productions with his script problem. He was told that they would not allow the distribution of any film in England that contained derogatory remarks concerning the Soviet Urion. Draper then went back to see Jimmy Carney and told him about this decision. Draper said that things began to happen and the lines were taken out of the script immediately and lines of no political significance were substituted.

At the end of a conference, during a panel forum, someone asked why Saroyan couldn't sue Jimmy Cagney for changing his script. Draper said that that would be impossible inasmuch as through the sale of the script, Saroyan had forfeited all rights to the use of his script and anything could be done with it that the producer wished.

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


The August 21, 1940, issue of "Washington Times Herald" carried an item stating that Chairman MARTIN DIES of the House Committee Investigating Un-American Activities said today that JAMES CAGNEY and two others (whom he named) were not and had never been sympathetic to the Communist movement. According never been sympathetic to the announcement a few minutes after conto the item, DIES made the announcement a few minutes after concluding a hearing with CAGNEY who flew to San Francisco from Massachusetts to deny charges previously filed with DIES.

The Los Angeles News for October 2, 1946, contained an erticle under the caption "More Actors Irked by Red Stooge Story". The article stated that the "anti-Matthew Woll faction in Holly-wood was bolstered yesterday by the addition of two more actors who said they resent the ATL Vice-President's action in branding them Communist stooges". The article listed JAMES CAGNEY as one of those named by WOLL as glamorous traitors. The article quoted of those named by WOLL is ridiculous. I won't even dignify it with a statement. WOLL is just trying to make himself a big fellow at other people's expense".

ALLEGATIONS OF MEMBERSHIP IN COMMUNIST PARTY DOMINATED ORGANIZATIONS.

The "New Theater" Magazine for April, 1934, announced a motion picture costume ball to be presented by the Film and Photo League April 27th at Webster Hall, 119 East 11th Street, New York City. The article listed JAMES CAGNEY as one of the sponsors of the ball. The "New Theater" Magazine was cited as a Communist front by the Special Committee on Un-American Activities March 29, 1944. The Film and Photo League was described in the 5th report of the California Senate Fact-Finding Committee on Un-American Activities as "a Communist front for revolutionary films".

The "Daily Worker" for April 23, 1936, contained an article entitled "Left Theater Takes Stock" by BEN IRWIN. The article announced that the Biannual National Conference of the "New Theater" Magazine was held during the previous weekend in "New Theater" Magazine was held during the previous weekend in "Thilsdelphia, Fennsylvania. The artricle stated in part as foltows: "The delegates from the Contemporary Theater of follywood, where it is CARREY and LICHED THAREER are to appear in a stage production of 'Bury the Lead", now being prepared ... were especially greated when they told of the sensation that this new and powerful anti-war play made in their community after a public play reading of it ...".

The New Theater Magazine was cited by the Special Committee on Un-American Activities on March 29, 1944, as a Communist front.

The 5th report of the California Senate Fact-Finding Committee on Un-American Activities for 1949 lists the Contemporary Theater as a Communist front.

A weekly organizational bulletin of the "North American Committee to Aid Spanish Democracy" dated May 19, 1937, page 5, states that JAMES CAGNEY was a sponsor of the Los Angeles Chapter of the above organization in 1937.

The North American Committee to Aid Spanish Democracy was cited as a Communist front by the Special Committee on Un-American Activities January 3, 1940.

The publication "Social Justice" for April 10, 1939, formerly published by Reverend CHARLES COUGHLIN, contains an article under the caption "Communism is Passe; It's 'Democracy' now". The article reads in part as follows: "Communism is out of date, it has socially taken over the more respectable name of Democracy. AND the cultural center for this Communist 'Democracy' is to be the new Hollywood. The Communist Daily Verker (January 7) lists its 1938 honor rell for service to Cormunism -- pardon us 'Democracy' -- says: 'Pictured above the seven of a score or more of Hollywood lightlights who greatly aided the couse of progress during the last year they have also shown their sympathy on many occasions for Loyalist Spain and have generously contributed money and talent to its aid The photograph referred to above was regrinted in the "Social Justice" issue of April 10, 1939 previously mentioned, and included in the group of seven individuals appearing in the photograph was JAMES CAGNEY.

The above issue of "Social Justice" also carried a photograph of an ambulance together with a placard reading "The Motion Picture Artists Committee sends this ambulance to help the defenders of Spanish Democracy". Standing alongside the ambulance in the photograph appeared LIONEL STANDER. Among the several names listed on the side of the ambulance appeared the name JAMES CAGNEY.

The North American Committee to Aid Spanish Democracy was declared by the Attorney General on April 21, 1949 to fall within the purview of Executive Order 9835.

The 4th report of the California Senate Fact-Finding Connittee on Un-American Activities for 1949 states: "The fourth ficture Artists Committee was an affiliate of the Morth American Consists to Aid Spanish Democracy, which was also part the contain to aid Spanish Communists".

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


The "Federated Press" for September 30, 1937, lists fifteen leading movie actors and actresses who had signed their names to two ambulances for Spain. The name of JAMES CAGNEY appeared on the list.

On August 22, 1938, testified before the House of Representatives, Special Committee on Un-American Activities.
