The reference files of "Chicago's American" were checked by SA on July 30, 1965, and disclosed a clipping from the "Chicago Daily Tribune" identical to that mentioned above, but contained no additional pertinent information regarding CHANCELLOR.



Chancellor is the National Broadcasting Company correspondent who was named by the President on 7/28/65 as Director of the Voice of America. Request received 7/27/65 from White House for investigation of Chancellor.

Investigation now complete, except for a few isolated leads. Chancellor was a reporter for the "Chicago Sun-Times" from 1948 to 1950. Since 1950 he has been employed as news commentator and news correspondent by the National Broadcasting Company in Chicago, Vienna, Moscow, London, Brussels, New York and Washington, D. C. Since September, 1964, he has been a White House correspondent.

Two Chicago criminal informants, one of whom is a homosexual, have advised that Chancellor is known in homosexual circles in Chicago as "one of us and friendly to us." It was stated that Chancellor is referred to by "fags" as "Mother Chancellor." They advised that in conversation with other "queers" in Chicago the others had indicated Chancellor was queer, but they had never been "out" with him; however, he "traveled with the crowd." It was said he had frequented a night club in Chicago known as a "queer joint" and belonged to the "home crowd," which means he does not openly display his affections, but does so only with a select group in secure places.

Chancellor has been arrested on four occasions by the Chicago Police Department. On 3/27/49 he was arrested for being drunk, was found not guilty and was discharged. On 8/13/49 he was arrested for speeding, being under influence of liquor and no driver's license, the disposition of which was "bond forfeiture and capias issued." We are checking out court records on this which have not been available.

On 2/11/51 he was arrested for being found on the roof of the Ambassador East Hotel late at night in Chicago, the disposition of which was "discharged." The implication was that he was possibly a peeping Tom, but he

explained he had formerly lived in that hotel, as his mother had been housekeeper, and had played on the roof as a child. He said he was returning to a scene of his childhood. After the officers verified that he had lived there and his mother had been the housekeeper there, he was released.

He was also arrested on 5/10/51 after being observed during early morning hours on the fire escape of an apartment house in Chicago.

walking down the alley by the hotel heard footsteps and ran up the fire escape to avoid whoever was following him.

Chancellor was afforded a jury trial, lound not guilty and was discharged. Details of this arrest appeared in Chicago newspapers at the time.

he has heard from unrecalled sources that Chancellor had homosexual tendencies.

Investigation of Chancellor was otherwise favorable and all other persons interviewed (we interviewed 68) described him as an excellent news commentator and reporter whose morals, character, reputation, loyalty and associates are above question and recommended him. No one stated that he has a problem of alcohol, but many advised that he is a moderate drinker.

We have checked appropriate arrest records everywhere Chancellor has lived in the United States. In connection with his work he has traveled to practically every state in the Union as well as numerous foreign countries and, therefore, due to the magnitude of the task, we are not checking police records in every city in which he has visited as a newspaperman.

. BIOGRAPHICAL DATA

Birth

Mr. Chancellor was born on July 14, 1927, in Chicago, Illinois.

Education

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Mr. Chancellor attended DePaul Academy, Chicago, Illinois, from September, 1941, to March, 1944, when he withdrew. The records of that academy do not indicate the reason for his withdrawal. Those records indicate that on June 12, a diploma on the basis of passing United States Armed Forces of Institute tests on a high school level.

He attended the University of Illinois, Chicago, Illinois, from September, 1947, to January, 1949, when he was dropped from the rolls for scholastic failure. He received no degree and there is a notation in his record stating, "No transcript. May not reregister until clears with library." A representative of that university stated that the notation indicates he checked books out of the library while attending the university and never returned them.

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Since-May, 1950, Mr. Chancellor has been employed as a news correspondent and news commentator by the National Broadcasting Company, Incorporated (NBC), in Chicago, Illinois; Vienna, Austria; London, England; Moscow, Russia; Brussels, Belgium; New York, New York; and Washington, D. C.

Military Service

Mr. Chancellor enlisted in the United States Army on November 6, 1945, as a private. He was honorably discharged on July 3, 1947, as a technician fifth class. His record is clear.

Marital Status

Mr. Chancellor is presently married to the former Barbara Upshaw and resides with her 3126 Woodley Road, Northwest, Washington,

The records of Cook County Domestic Court, Chicago, Illinois, indicate that on October 22, 1957, Constance Herbert Chancellor, as plaintiff, filed a suit for divorce against Mr. Chancellor, as defendant. The plaintiff charged that on April 9, 1955, the defendant willfully deserted and absented himself from the plaintiff without reasonable cause for over one year. The defendant filed an answer on October 30, 1957, denying the allegation. The plaintiff was granted a divorce on November 13, 1957,

II. RESULTS OF INVESTIGATION

Miscellaneous

An informant who has furnished reliable information in the past and who is familiar with criminal activities in Chicago, Illinois, and who is a homosexual, advised that Mr. Chancellor is known in "homosexual circles" in Chicago as "one of us and friendly to us." The informant stated that a few days after Mr. Chancellor's appointment as Director of the

Voice of America was announced in the press, he (the informant) remarked to a homosexual friend that "one of us," meaning Mr. Chancellor, is "getting up in the world," referring to the recent appointment. The informant stated that Mr. Chancellor is not personally known to him, but he had heard of him through his (the informant's) homosexual associates before reading of Mr. Chancellor's appointment. The informant further advised that he had mentioned the appointment of Mr. Chancellor to ' "homosexual friends" and one homosexual named "Joe," last name unknown, remarked that he did not like Mr. Chancellor because, when he used to see him at a "North Side homosexual hang-out," he (Mr. Chancellor) "thought he was a big wheel." This informent further stated that homosexuals do not normally learn the complete names and addresses of their friends, unless one takes the other to his residence. He added he has no further information concerning "Joe." The informant further advised that Mr. Chancellor may be known to homosexuals by name due to his prominence, but he (the informant) seriously doubts that any homosexuals would admit having any knowledge of Mr. Chancellor.

Another informant*who has furnished reliable information in the past and who is familiar with criminal activities in Chicago, Illinois, advised that he is aware of Mr. Chancellor's recent appointment and, although he is not personally acquainted with Mr. Chancellor, knows him to be referred to by "fags" as "Mother Chancellor." The informant further stated that in conversation with two "queers" with whom he is acquainted he mentioned Mr. Chancellor's appointment and asked them 1f Mr. Chancellor is "queer." Both answered, "Yes, he is one of us," but they said they have never been "out" with him. Both stated they did not know who had been "out" with Mr. Chancellor, but said he "traveled with the crowd." Both stated that Mr. Chancellor had been to the Blue Dahlia, a night club in Chicago which is known as a "queer joint." This informant stated that these two persons referred to Mr. Chancellor as belonging to the "home crowd," meaning that he does not openly "display his affections," but does so only with a select group in "secure places."

An individual who identified himself only as "a police officer and good Democrat" telephonically advised the Chicago Office of the FBI that the Administration of President Lyndon B. Johnson should know that Mr. Chancellor had been "locked up" a number of times by the Chicago Police Department. The caller

stated that Mr. Chancellor was arrested about six years ago on morals charges, once "on Elm Street" and another occasion at the Ambassador East Hotel. He said that in connection with one of those arrests Mr. Chancellor was found hiding on a roof with binoculars in his possession.

Credit and Arrest Checks

The records of the Chicago Police Department, Chicago, Illinois, indicate that Mr. Chancellor was arrested on March 27, 1949, on a charge of "disorderly conduct - drunk," the disposition of which was "discharged" on March 28, 1949. The records contain no additional information concerning that arrest and it has been determined that the arresting officers are either deceased or do not remember the arrest.

The records of Municipal Court, Chicago, Illinois, indicate that Mr. Chancellor was arrested on March 27, 1949, and charged with violation of Municipal Code 193-1-1, "disorderly conduct - did make or aid in making an improper noise, riot, disturbance, breach of peace or diversion tending to a breach of the peace within the limits of the city." It was indicated that Mr. Chancellor was found lying intoxicated in a vacant lot at the intersection of Ohio and Dearborn Streets. It is indicated he waived a jury trial and was found not guilty and was discharged on March 28, 1949.

The records of the Chicago Police Department also indicate that on August 13, 1949, Mr. Chancellor was arrested on a charge of "speeding, being under influence of liquor and no driver's license," the disposition of which was "bond forfeiture and capias issued September, 1949." The records do not indicate whether the capias was served or dismissed and there is presently no warrant outstanding for Mr. Chancellor. The records contain no additional information concerning that arrest and it has been determined that the arresting officer is deceased.

Those records further indicate that on February 11, 1951, Mr. Chancellor was arrested on a charge of "disorderly conduct - found on roof of Ambassador East Hotel," the disposition of which was "discharged" on February 13, 1951. Those records contain no additional information concerning that arrest.

Chicago, Illinois, advised he is a former officer of the Chicago Police Department and recalls answering a burglary complaint with Officer which was received from the Ambassador East Hotel. He stated that he and went up the fire escape of the hotel to search the roof and found Mr. Chancellor hiding behind an air vent. said he does not recall Mr. Chancellor's having any binoculars in his possession. He stated they questioned Mr. Chancellor who advised that many years ago he lived in that hotel as his mother was the housekeeper. there. He told the officers that he used to play on the roof and the fire escape and had returned that night due to a desire to visit a scene of his childhood. he considered the story very strange since it was past midnight at the time. He added that Mr. Chancellor was taken to the police station where it was verified that he formerly resided at the Ambassador East Hotel and his mother had formerly been the housekeeper there. His employment as a news reporter was also verified and he was shortly thereafter released. he recalls Mr. Chancellor quite clearly as he has observed him on television on several occasions since that time. He advised that shortly after the arrest on February 11, 1951, Mr. Chancellor was again arrested in connection with a very similar incident, the details of which he does not know. He stated that he knows nothing else concerning Mr. Chancellor, but has always felt there was "something wrong" with the story Mr. Chancellor gave on the occasion of his arrest on February 11, 1951.

Chicago, Illinois, advised he vaguely recalls arresting Mr. Chancellor sometime during 1951 and believes the arrest was made on the fire escape of some hotel in Chicago, the name of which he does not recall. He stated it is his impression that Mr. Chancellor was arrested for being intoxicated, but he does not recall any other facts concerning the arrest. He said he does not recall Mr. Chancellor's having any binoculars in his possession.

The records of the Chicago Police Department also indicate that Mr. Chancellor was arrested on May 10, 1951, on a charge of "disorderly conduct - arrested on fire escape at 78 East Elm Street," the disposition of which was "discharged May 21, 1951;" The records indicate that the complainant was The records contain no additional information concerning that arrest. It has been determined that the arresting officers, with the exception of Officer are either deceased or do not remember the arrest.

He advised that Mr. Chancellor was apprehended, at which time he observed Mr. Chancellor

He said that, to his knowledge,

Mr. Chancellor was not intoxicated at that time and he believes it quite possible that Mr. Chancellor was "peeping in apartment windows." He added that he has no firsthand knowledge that Mr. Chancellor is other than a normal, healthy and masculine individual, but has "heard stories" from sources, the identities of which he does not now recall, which indicate that Mr. Chancellor "may have" homosexual tendencies.

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Chicago, Illinois, advised he recalls assisting in the arrest of an individual in 1951 who was found on a fire escape of an apartment house. He advised he does not recall the name of the arrested person. He stated that, on answering the call, he climbed the fire escape, where he found the arrested party on the second floor level. He said that he believed that person was charged with disorderly conduct in the absence of any proof of more specific charges. He stated he does not recall any other circumstances concerning the arrest.

The records of Municipal Court, Chicago, Illinois, indicate that Mr. Chancellor was arrested on May 10, 1951, for violation of Municipal Code 193-1-1. He posted a cash bond of \$100 and on May 25, 1951, was afforded a jury trial and was found not guilty and was discharged.

In the May 11, 1951, issue of "The Chicago Tribune" there appeared an article captioned, "Can't Explain Presence on Fire Escape-Seized." The article indicates that Mr. Chancellor was arrested early on the morning of May 10, 1951, on the fire escape of a building located at 78 East Elm Street. The article indicated that Mr. Chancellor could not explain his presence on the fire escape and had been booked on a charge of disorderly conduct.

The records of the City News Bureau of Chicago, Chicago, Illinois, contain an item dated May 22, 1951, which indicates that Mr. Chancellor was seized on May 10, 1951, on the fire escape of an apartment building located at 78 East Elm Street, Chicago, Illinois. It was further indicated that at a preliminary hearing Mr. Chancellor had pleaded for leniency, telling the court his job was at stake and his wife was expecting a baby. He stated he had been drinking and had cut through the alley by the apartment house while on his way home, when he heard footsteps. He said he climbed the fire escape because he feared to be seen.

Information has been received from other appropriate credit reporting and law enforcement agencies indicating that their files contain either no record or no additional pertinent information concerning Mr. Chancellor or his close relatives.

Informants

Other informants who are familiar with certain phases of homosexual activities in appropriate areas have been contacted and have advised that Mr. Chancellor is unknown to them and they have no information concerning him.

II. RESULTS OF INVESTIGATION

Interviews

Jacob K. Javits, United States Senator from New York, was interviewed in Washington, D. C., and advised he has known Mr. Chancellor for several years as an outstanding news commentator. He stated that Mr. Chancellor is very capable and outstanding in every respect. He said he has had no social contact with Mr. Chancellor other than at official functions. He favorably recommended Mr. Chancellor for a position of trust.

Robert F. Kennedy, United States Senator from
New York, advised through his
in Washington, D. C., that he knows Mr. Chancellor by reputation
only and has had no personal contact to any extent with
Mr. Chancellor. He stated he knows nothing derogatory about
Mr. Chancellor.

b1C NBC, Washington, D. C., advised he has been since Mr. Chancellor became a White House correspondent in stated that he also knew Mr. Chancellor slightly in the past when he was assigned to and Mr. Chancellor was assigned to the Chicago Office of NBC. said that he is also socially acquainted with Mr. Chancellor and Mrs. Chancellor, whom he considers a very reputable person. He stated that since he has known Mr. Chancellor he has never heard anything of a derogatory nature concerning his morals, character, loyalty or associates. He highly recommended Mr. Chancellor for a position of trust and responsibility.

Chicago, Illinois, was

interviewed in She advised that

that she recalls that Mr. Chancellor was arrested on one occasion in Chicago when he became intoxicated and climbed up a fire escape on a building.

Stated she does not recall complete details concerning the matter, but believes the arrest was made because of previous robberies which had occurred in the vicinity of that building. She added that he was "cleared" and no serious charges were made. She said that Mr. Chancellor is ordinarily a moderate drinker who is also moderate in all his personal habits. She stated that he is mentally and emotionally stable and is well respected by his associates.

She recommended him for a position of trust and responsibility.

NBC, Chicago, Illinois, advised he has known Mr. Chancellor for over 15 years both socially and professionally. He stated he considers Mr. Chancellor to be "first-rate" professionally and an individual who is morally sound and well regarded by all who know him. He advised he has never known Mr. Chancellor to drink intoxicants excessively or to drink "on the job." He stated he recalls that in 1951 Mr. Chancellor was arrested at the Ambassador East Hotel. He said he does not know the exact charge made against Mr. Chancellor at that time, but believes there was an indication he was a "Peeping Tom," He stated he recalls that Mr. Chancellor had been drinking at the time and does not put any credence in the "Peeping Tom" charge. He said that the Ambassador East Hotel at one time had been home to Mr. Chancellor as his mother was formerly the housekeeper at that hotel. stated he also recalls that Mr. Chancellor was arrested again shortly after his first arrest and believes he was also drinking at that time. He advised that Mr. Chancellor and his first wife, at that time, "were not getting along," which he believes to have been the cause of Mr. Chancellor's drinking. He said he does not know the differences which existed between Mr. Chancellor and his first wife other than "plain incompatibility." He stated there

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was no scandal attached to their divorce. He added that

Nr. Chancellor is a loyal American whom he has never known to
belong to any questionable organizations and he recommended

Nr. Chancellor for a position of trust and responsibility.

He said he does not know anything concerning that arrest which could be considered adverse concerning Mr. Chancellor's character as he was "picked up" on suspicion. He explained that Mr. Chancellor is a native of Chicago and had previously resided at the Ambassador East Hotel where his mother had been housekeeper. He stated that at the time of the arrest Mr. Chancellor's wife was expecting a child. He added that Mr. Chancellor had been out drinking, walked by the hotel and seeing a fire escape, decided to climb it.

Of that arrest the following morning after Mr. Chancellor had been released.

deceased, who was formerly NBC Vice President in charge of the Chicago area of the arrest of Mr. Chancellor and Mr. Kopf wanted to discharge Mr. Chancellor.

advised that he believes Mr. Chancellor is a fine young man and it would be unfortunate if the arrest in Chicago adversely affects his future. He said Mr. Chancellor is able to maintain a confidence and has never had a problem with alcoholic beverages. Added that Mr. Chancellor is a very capable reporter and commentator and he knows nothing of a derogatory nature concerning him. He advised that Mr. Chancellor has never displayed any effeminate characteristics. He said Mr. Chancellor's character and reputation are excellent and he recommended him for a position of trust and responsibility.

, NBC, New York, New York, advised he has known Mr. Chancellor together in Chicago, Illinois, He stated that Mr. Chancellor's father died when Mr. Chancellor was a young boy and his mother, who was the housekeeper for several hotels in Chicago, reared him. He said he is aware that Mr. Chancellor is divorced from his first wife, but Mr. Chancellor never discussed the divorce with him and he knows nothing concerning the circumstances of the divorce. He stated that Mr. Chancellor is devoted to his present wife and family and to his profession and is one of the finest persons he has ever had the privilege of knowing. He advised that ar. chancellor's integrity and personal morals are above reproach. He added that Mr. Chancellor is extremely versatile in his ability to converse with people from all walks of life and is a "brilliant" choice for the position to which he has been appointed by President Johnson. He further stated that Mr. Chancellor is a dedicated and loyal American and he recommended him for a position of trust and responsibility. 61C

Chet Huntley, NBC, New York, New York, advised he has known Mr. Chancellor both socially and professionally since 1955. He stated that he has worked with Mr. Chancellor in London and Paris during overseas assignments and considers him an excellent correspondent. He said he is acquainted with Mr. Chancellor's present wife and considers her a highly reputable person. Mr. Huntley stated he has never had any reason to question Mr. Chancellor's integrity or morality and would have no hesitancy in recommending him for the position of Director of the Voice of America.

he and Mr. Chancellor have been associated both socially and professionally for approximately ten years. He stated that during that period nothing of a derogatory nature concerning Mr. Chancellor has ever been brought to his attention. He said that he is acquainted with Mrs. Chancellor and considers her a reputable person. He stated that Mr. Chancellor's character, reputation, loyalty and associates are above question and he recommended him for a position of trust and responsibility.

Chicago, Illinois, advised that he has been acquainted with Mr. Chancellor fer many years and considers him an intelligent, capable and respected member of his profession who will be an asset to the Federal Government. He stated that he is aware that Mr. Chancellor was arrested in 1951 on the roof of the Ambassador East Hotel and believes there were "questions" concerning Mr. Chancellor's conduct on the hotel roof but his activities there were never positively determined. He attributed Mr. Chancellor's presence on the hotel roof to a "youth escapade." He stated that he considers Mr. Chancellor to be normal in his associations with members of both sexes and has never doubted his moral character. He advised that he has confidence in Mr. Chancellor's loyalty, and he recommended him for a position of trust and responsibility.

further stated that on one occasion, the time of which he does not recall, and while Mr. Chancellor was working for the "Chicago Sun-Times," a night club which was frequented by homosexuals was raided by the Chicago Police Department and a large number of persons were arrested. He stated that while some of the persons arrested were homosexuals, many of those arrested were only in the night club to observe the antics of homosexuals.

who was a friend or and employed by the "Chicago sun-Times" had been present at the night club but was released when he said he was a friend of the stated he has never established whether the person released was identical with Mr. Chancellor or was another employee of the newspaper.

Evanston, Illinois, advised that

their divorce was amicable and the grounds of desertion were used to satisfy the laws of the State of Illinois. She stated that she is a success of their marriage." She stated that Mr. Chancellor and his first wife were young, ambitious and impatient and "had not worked to make a success of their marriage." She stated there was no scandal attached to their divorce.

stated that she knows of Mr. Chancellor's arrest on the roof of the Ambassador Rast Hotel in 1951. She advised that Mr. Chancellor had grown up in that neighborhood and his mother had formerly been the housekeeper of that hotel. She stated that she believes his presence there was due to the overindulgence 41 alcohol and further stated it was reasonable for him to be "out" during early morning hours because his duties often required that he work until midnight or later.

Mr. Chancellor's character, loyalty, reputation and associates. She stated she has no knowledge of Mr. Chancellor's having been arrested on any other occasion or having been involved in any incident which would reflect adversely upon him. She said she considers Mr. Chancellor to be an experienced newspaper reporter, and she highly recommended him for a position of trust with the Federal Government.

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NBC, New York, New York, advised that he has known Mr. Chancellor both socially and professionally advised that he is aware that Mr. Chancellor and his first wife were divorced and there was no scandal or notoriety connected with that divorce. He stated that the divorce was based on their inability to "get along." stated that he considers Er. Chancellor's integrity and "personal morality" to be impeccable. He advised that Mr. Chancellor has always felt that a person should serve his country and consequently accepted his present appointment at a personal financial sacrifice. He stated that Mr. Chancellor is one of the five best journalists in the United States, and heriselbuthat President Johnson could not have picked a better man as Director of the Voice of America. He advised that Mr. Chancellor's loyalty is above question and he highly recommended him for a position of trust and responsibility.

he worked with Mr. Chancellor on the and knew him professionally prior to that time. He described Mr. Chancellor as a very intelligent and cooperative person who is "wonderful" to work with. He stated

that while working on the traveled together on many occasions and became well acquainted with each other. He said he has great respect for Mr. Chancellor's mentality and ability and admires Mr. Chancellor as a person. He stated there has never been any question in his mind as to Mr. Chancellor's character, personal morals and integrity, and he believes Mr. Chancellor to be a loyal American who is worthy of a position of extreme trust.

has known Mr. Chancellor since the late 1950s when they were both employed by NBC in Chicago, Illinois. He said that he has had close contact with Mr. Chancellor on a professional basis only and is not acquainted with the other members of Mr. Chancellor's family. He described Mr. Chancellor as an intelligent: person who possesses a great deal of common sense and President Johnson could not have selected a better man to direct the Voice of America. He stated that Mr. Chancellor has the ability to handle controversial and delicate matters with balance and fairness. He advised that, to his knowledge, there is nothing whatsoever in Mr. Chancellor's background that might prove embarrassing in the future such as drinking, homosexuality or "anything of that nature." He highly recommended Mr. Chancellor for the position to which he has been appointed.

NBC, New York, New York, advised that he has known Mr. Chancellor since 1953 both socially and professionally. He stated he Mr. Chancellor's with NBC since that time. He advised that there are very few men whose friendship he values as much as he does Mr. Chancellor's. He stated that Mr. Chancellor is a man of basic honesty "with no sham" about him. He advised that he is also acquainted with Mr. Chancellor's present wife

drawn up by NBC have a strong "morals clause" and the network is very careful concerning that clause because a breach of the clause could be very damaging to the network. He advised that Mr. Chancellor has had: this clause explained to him, fully understands it and has never indicated that there has ever been anything in his background which would have violated the clause.

He stated that as far as he is concerned, hr. Chancellor is a man of integrity who possesses good personal morals and who is worthy of the position to which he has been appointed.

Mr. Chancellor since 1952 when they met at a political convention in Chicago, Illinois. He stated that since that time he has had professional and social contact with Mr. Chancellor in London, England; Paris, France; Washington, D. C.; and New York City. He advised that during the period of time he has known Mr. Chancellor nothing of a derogatory nature has been brought to his attention concerning Mr. Chancellor's character, associates, reputation or loyalty. He highly recommended Mr. Chancellor for a position of trust and responsibility.

advised he first met Mr. Chancellor in 1958 when Mr. Chancellor was being transferred from Chicago, Illinois, to New York City and

has been previously married. However, he said he has never met kr. Chancellor's first wife. Advised he has nothing but the highest praise for kr. Chancellor and stated he has never had any reason to question his character, loyalty, reputation or associates. He recommended kr. Chancellor for a position of trust and responsibility.

Forty-four other persons, consisting of associates, acquaintances, present and former co-workers and supervisors and neighbors, were interviewed and advised that Mr. Chancellor is a loyal American whose character, reputation and associates are above question. Those acquainted with the other members of his family advised they are all reputable persons. He was described as one of the finest news reporters in the United States who is sincere and patriotic and who is concerned about the welfare of his country. Several persons advised that he accepted his present appointment with the Federal Government as he felt a moral obligation to serve his Government. None of them furnished any information indicating that Mr. Chancellor possessed homosexual tendencies or effeminate characteristics. He was further described as a "man's man" whose morals are above question. Many persons stated that Mr. Chancellor does not indauge in the excessive use of alcoholic beverages, but is a moderate drinker. They highly recommended him for a position of trust and responsibility.

Close Relatives

Mr. Chancellor's father, Estil M. Chancellor, is deceased. His mother, Mollie Barrett Chancellor, resides in. Highland Park, Illinois. He has no brothers or sisters.

Passport Record

The records of the Passport Office, Department of State, indicate that Mr. Chancellor has been issued two passports since March 27, 1958, for travel to numerous countries throughout the world on business. Those files contain no derogatory information concerning him.

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Information has been received from the following governmental agencies indicating their files contain either no record or no additional pertinent information concerning Mr. Chancellor:



Reference is made to memorandum W. V. Cleveland to Mr. Gale in captioned matter dated 7/30/65, which approved an interview of Secretary of Labor Wintz regarding Chancellor.

Secretary Wirtz was interviewed by Liaison 8/5/65, at which time he advised that he has been acquainted with Chancellor for approximately the past year, having had between 15 and 20 official-type meetings with him. These meetings were in the nature of a Government official being interviewed by a news reporter. Secretary Wirtz explained that he has been in Chancellor's company socially on but two or three occasions in the private homes of mutual friends. Wirtz commented that he was very favorably impressed by Chancellor and on the basis of his contacts with him would unqualifiedly recommend him for a position of trust in the Government. He stated that Chancellor is highly reliable, of good character, and has impressed him as a person who is completely loyal to the U. S. He explained that he is not acquainted with any of the members of Chancellor's immediate family but could have met Mrs. Chancellor socially on one occasion. Aside from his own personal contacts with Chancellor, Wirtz advised that no information of a derogatory nature has ever been brought to his attention concerning Chancellor's loyalty to the U.S., his character or habits.

said that the records indicate that the Windup Tavern in 1947 was described as a "rotten place with perverts" and "homosexuals frequent, and indecent exhibitions".

on January 14, 1949, and soon thereafter went out of business.

A review of Chicago Vice Report Number 43651 consisting of 46 pages concerning a raid conducted by the Chicago Police Department on the Windup Tavern on January 9, 1949, disclosed no references to the appointee. There were several persons arrested by the first name "JACK", but all had last names other than CHANCELLOR.

In most instances there was no descriptive data recorded concerning any of the persons arrested in that raid.

Bureau files reflect we previously did a name check on captioned individual. Shortly thereafter, Marvin Watson called me and stated the President desired a full field investigation conducted immediately. He added that the President planned to go ahead and name Chancellor as Director of the Voice of America without waiting for the full field investigation to be completed. Watson told me that the President was satisfied on the basis of the name check and that the President had personally known Chancellor for years, consequently there was no need to wait for completion of the full field investigation.

I told Watson that the President was needlessly going out on a limb and that it was dangerous business to announce an appointment without having the benefit of a full field investigation. Watson stated that the President was adamant in his views and that he would not wait. A memorandum is in the file reflecting this conversation.

The Director transmitted to Watson by letter dated August 6, 1965, delivered the same date, the results of the full field investigation on Chancellor. (Copy attached.) Our investigation reflects 4 arrests in Chicago, Illinois. Two of the arrests, 3/27/49 and 8/13/49, reflect charges of drunkenness. Of these arrests, one disposition indicated "discharged" and the second disposition indicated "bond forfeiture." The third and fourth arrests, 2/11/51 and 5/10/51, reflect charges of "disorderly conduct." Chancellor was found on the roof of a local hotel in one of these arrests and the disposition was "discharged." In the fourth and final arrest, Chancellor was found on a fire escape of an apartment building. There was no additional information concerning this latter arrest. While there was no substantive information to indicate homosexuality, it would appear that Chancellor could have been a "peeping tom." One homosexual indicated to the Agents that, "Mr. Chancellor is known in homosexual circles as one of us and friendly to us."

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DeLoach to Mohr memo, 8/11/65 Re: John William Chancellor

On 8/6/65, I told Watson of the above-mentioned facts and handed him the report. I mentioned that while there was no substantive evidence to indicate Chancellor was a homosexual, his file nevertheless clearly indicated sufficient evidence to reflect on his character.

reviewed Chancellor's file and had forwarded it to her for filing in a closed envelope. She stated the President had made no comment regarding the matter. She added, however, that Leonard Marks, Director, his had confided to her that the results of the FBI investigation on Chancellor.

Watson called me at 12:30 p.m., 8/11/65, and asked that I join him and John Macy, Chairman of the Civil Service Commission, in his office at 2:30 p.m. He stated it was a matter of some importance.

Upon joining Watson and Macy in Watson's office, Watson told me that Leonard Marks had seen the President on 3 separate occasions within the past 2 days. Watson indicated that Marks had greatly upset the President concerning the Chancellor case. He added that Marks had told the President that the at U.S. Information Agency had advised him that contacts in the FBI with whom he was in daily communication had told him that the Chancellor investigation had been completed and that there was some question as to Chancellor's morals. The President told Watson to tell me that FBI personnel had no right or authority to "tip off" employees of other Federal agencies regarding matters affecting Presidential appointees. Watson stated the President wanted me to find out if the allegations concerning an FBI employee were correct and that, while the President did not want anything to be submitted to him in writing, he wanted to know the outcome of our inquiry into this matter. I told Watson that I would, of course, immediately check into it and that I would verbally, in accordance with instructions, let him know the results.

Watson stated that the President had also instructed him to tell me that I was to sit down and prepare an analysis of the Chancellor file indicating that there was nothing wrong with Chancellor and there appeared to be no reason why he should not be continued in his job. I told Watson that while I of course wanted to abide by the President's instructions, that it certainly appeared to be a little out of the ordinary for me to "clear" anyone, particularly in the Chancellor case. I reminded Watson that it was the President's decision to go ahead and appoint Chancellor without waiting for the full field investigation to be completed. Watson stated that this was true, however, nevertheless the President wanted a statement from the FBI to put in Chancellor's file.

I suggested to Watson that John Macy, who was present, and I sit down and review this file and draw up an analysis for the President. Watson agreed and stated this would be sufficient. He asked that we have this analysis prepared by 5:15 p.m. that day, 8/11/65. Macy and I retired to Macy's office and then prepared a brief 4-paragraph memorandum reflecting that we had thoroughly reviewed Chancellor's file and that while there had been 4 different arrests of Chancellor there appeared to be nothing of a subversive nature in the file and there was no substantial proof of homosexuality; however, there had been 2 arrests involving possible immorality. Macy stated that in his opinion there was no reason to question Chancellor's background as a result of the investigation.

Watson indicated satisfaction with the above-mentioned analysis and placed the Chancellor file on the President's desk. Watson then reminded me that the President desired to know as expeditiously as possible the results of the inquiry regarding the alleged 'tip off' made to the at U. S. Information Agency by FBI personnel. I told Watson this would be handled today, 8/11/65.

When the Director inquired telephonically as to the reasons for my being called to the White House, I furnished him the above facts. He instructed that this inquiry be conducted on an expeditious basis and that he should be advised as to the results of the inquiry.

Upon leaving the White House, Watson asked Macy upon what authority the at U. S. Information Agency would have to demand the Chancellor file. OBSERVATIONS: It is commonplace for the White House to withhold files from Federal agencies, particularly when there are derogatory facts contained in such files. The Kennedy administration did this in many instances, particularly and others. Usually when such files are withheld, immediately suspicion is aroused by the very fact that the employing agency is not allowed to peruse the file. This may have happened in this particular instance. After starting its investigation the Civil Service Commission found the FBI was already conducting an investigation. Said that he had some difficulty obtaining a copy of the FBI report so that a security clearance could be issued but he was finally successful.

The Chancellor case, explained, came up in pretty much the same way with his first information received from the press. He said he made routine inquiry of the FBI Liaison Agent to ascertain if an FBI investigation was being conducted. This was so that it would not be necessary for him to request Civil Service Commission investigation. On August 6, 1965, was asked to expedite clearance for Chancellor who wanted to leave for Germany in his new capacity on August 11, 1965. then called the FBI to inquire when the report would be made available to the White House, and in the absence of the regular Liaison Agent he was transferred to Special Agent He said told him he had no knowledge concerning the case but that if an investigation was being conducted the results would be furnished to the White House. He said furnished him no information other than this. Subsequently he contacted the regular Liaison Agent, and learned that the report was being furnished to the White House.

then wrote the White House requesting a copy of the FBI report so that security clearance could be issued. He received a reply advising that because this was a Presidential appointment says this is not correct) the FBI report was being retained at the White House.
