


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
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Schington, B. October 16, 1933 MEMORANDUM FOR THE DIRECT 94409 Upon receipt of the attached memorandum from J. W. Brabner Smith, dated October 14, 1933. I conferred with Mr. Frank M. Parrish. 4r. Parrish stated that he had previously talked to Mr. Smith and felt that it might be a good idea to have one of our Agents contact Congressman Kloeb of Ohio and volunteer to cooperate, to a limited extent at least, with the authorities of Allen County, Ohio, in their efforts to identify and apprehend the killers of Sheriff Jess Sarger. I thereupon called the Detroit Office and advised Agent in Charge Larson of the telegram received from Congressman Kloeb and of the suggestion of the Department, and directed that he communicate with the Allen County authorities and offer such cooperation as might be practicable in the way of identifying latent fingerprints, or forwarding the fingerprints of any convicts who were suspected of this crime. Larsen of the Detroit office was in to see him with reference to this case, and informed Mr. Botkins that the Department of Justice would gladly circularize these wanted men, but did not want to do so, until he contacted me so that there would not be a duplication of efforts. We shall be glad to discuss the matter with your man if the meeting can be arranged by you.

I feel certain that your Bureau has been advised of the names of the men wanted in this case, but in the event that the information has not reached you the following is the list; Charles Makley, John Hamilton, Edward Shouse, Russell Clark, Henry fierpont, Harry Copeland, and John Dillinger. They all have been indicted for Murder, Jail Delivery and Bank Robbery. There is ONE THOUSAND DOLLAR REWARD on each of their heads, DEAD OR ALIVE for their return to Allen County. We have late pictures of the majority of these men in this Bureau, if you so desire to use them.

With assurances of my desire to co-operate with you in this case or in any other in which our services will be of assistance to you. Anxiously awaiting a reply from 3 you in regard to the above mentioned case, I remain,

ENEMS OF MESING

I desire to acknowledge receipt of your communication of the 18th instant with reference to your conference with Mr. Ernest Botkins, Prosecuting Attorney of Allen County, Lima, Ohio, and with reference to the jail delivery and the murder of the Sheriff of Allen County.

As indicated in your latter, a memorandum has been received from Mr. Larson, Special Agent in Charge of the Detroit Office of this Division, and I have since taken steps to cooperate actively with the Indiana State authorities in their efforts to bring about the location and apprehension of the escapes from their institution, who, I understand, form a part of the group which caused the jail delivery and murder of the Sheriff at Lima, Ohio.

With reference to your remarks relative to circularisation of the men who are wanted for this offense, I believe it would be well for Mr. Botkins to proceed with the preparation and distribution of his circulars, and in the meantime I shall place in our bulletin, "Fugitives Wanted by Police", the names, descriptions and fingerprist classifications of the individuals in question. This bulletin, as you probably know, has a circulation of approximately 7,000. Of course, wanted notices will be placed in our identification files immediately so that in the event any of these persons are apprehended you may be notified promptly.

I would suggest, too, that in the event you receive information said you desire to check at points distant from Lima, I shall said to cause an appropriate inquiry upon receipt of your request, and I trust that our cooperation will prove of assistance in the cause and of these persons.


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



Dear Sir:-

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With reference to telephone conversation with Acting Special Agent in Charge N. B. Klein, October 24, 1933 Agent Klein immediately contacted Mr. Matt Leach, Chief of the Indiana State Police at Indianapolis, Indiana by telephone and also arranged with Agent Bliss Morton at Indianapolis to contact the Indiana State Police as to this matter, in order that they might forward to us complete information as to the various prisoners who had escaped and, also, it was arranged that Mr. Leach would forward to the Division complete information as to the various persons concerned with this activity, and this was done by Mr. Leach in his letter of October 25, 1935 addressed to the Division at Washington, D. C., copy of which was later furnished to me by Walter Mentzer of the Indiana State Police, who is working on this case at Hamilton, Ohio.

In detailed conversation as to this matter by Agent Bliss Morton, with Captain Matt Leach of the Indiana State Police at Indianapolis, Indiana, he furnished us the information as indicated above, which was furnished to the Division in letter of October 25, 1935.

Captain Matt Leach advised Agent Morton in subsequent conversation of October 26, 1933 that the men who escaped from the State Prison have not been identified as connected with any of the bank robbers

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jobs subsequent to their escape, despite newspaper stories, however, in this connection it will be noted that this is at variance with statement in his letter of October 25, 1933 wherein he advised that it has been an established fact now that Dillinger, Pierpont, Clark and Makley have been identified as the hold-up men in the Central Mational Bank at Greencastle, Indiana October 24, 1933.

He further advised that Dillinger when arrested at Dayton, Ohio released his Essex Terraplane automobile to Attorney Eagan, Dayton, Ohio and the latter turned the car over to Dillinger's brother, who lives at 409 LaSalle St., Indianapolis, Indiana; that the brother, in turn, transferred same to Mrs. John Dillinger, 1052 S. 2nd St., Hamilton, Ohio October 6, 1935; that thereafter she was issued Ohio license plates A 63,167 on this car; that these same plates were used on a Studebaker car in connection with the robbery of the bank at Greencastle, Indiana; that one MarylKinder, 930 Daily St., Indianapolis, Indiana is suspected of being connected with Dillinger in his operations and in this connection, this same information, of course, has appeared in the newspapers, together with the picture of this woman. The State Police have not been able to locate her, but have questioned her mother, and sister-in-law; that Dillinger uses the name of John Donovan; that he had rented an apartment as John Donovan at Gary, Indiana with Sam AGoldstein, now serving a sentence in Michigan City, Indiana State Penitentiary that he, Captain Leach advised he did not wish Dillinger's brother talked to or arrested at present, as he has the brother's house covered and his watching his movements.

In connection with the contact with the Indiana State Police, I understand that Special Agent in Charge Larson of the Detroit office, as per information furnished by Agent Bliss Morton was at Indianapolis on October 27, 1933 to confer with Captain Matt Leach, who apparently was out of the City.

Contact was also had with Mr. Robinson, Assistant Superintendent of the Division of Criminal Identification, State of Chic, London, Chic by telephone and he advised Special Agent N. B. Klein that he would forward to us immediately he had same prepared, circulars or identification orders of the State, as to the possible seven persons involved in connection with the Lima, Chic murder of the Sheriff, there, which he desired us to forward to points in Southern Chic, Southern Indiana and Northern Chic, as to which latter, we will immediately forward the supply furnished to the Detroit Office, in order that they may furnish same to their mailing list.

Reference is made to letter of the Detroit office under date of October 20, 1933 referring to the activity of Special Agent in Charge Larson at Lima, Ohio and particularly to that portion indicating that Fred Pierpont had furnished them rather definite information that a number of these Fugitives were located at 1052 S. 2nd St., Hamilton, Ohio or located in a cottage along the river bank, out of Hamilton, Ohio and in this connection, yesterday, I conferred with Mr. Walter Mentzer of the

Indiana State Police, who has been handling the investigation at Hamilton, Ohio and Mr. A. E. Lincoln, Chief Deputy Sheriff, Butler County, Hamilton, Ohio who called at the Division office here and advised that upon the arrival of the Indiana State Police and other officers at Hamilton. Ohio on the night of October 15, 1935 at approximately midnight, they contacted the Chief of Police Calhoun and advised him of their mission and thereafter. it was suggested that one of the Indiana State Police accompany the Chief of Detectives on an observation of the house at 1052 S. 2nd St., Hamilton; Ohio, which they did about 12:30 A.M., and at this time they noted a light in the house and all the blinds were closely drawn. Also, they noted that there were two cars in the garage at 1052 S. 2nd St., and 1054 S. 2nd St. That they thereafter returned, apparently to headquarters, and debated upon the next move necessary and thereafter at about 7:30 A.M. October 15, 1935 they raided this address, and at this time they found nobody there; the beds had not been slept in the night before and one of the automobiles in the parage previously above noted, had disappeared.

Mr. Mentzer indicated that possibly they had been tipped off in Hamilton, Ohio as to this; that they then thereafter proceeded to the house on the river bank, near Hamilton, which had apparently been occupied by the five men and apparently they thereafter left shortly before the arrival of the officers. Apparently there is no question but what the five men concerned are those referred to in the letter of the Detroit office under date of October 20, 1933 and were the persons responsible for the killing at lime, Ohio and as will be noted, due to the manner in which they endeavored to apprehend them, they apparently were warned of the efforts of the officers being made to apprehend them.

In connection with the car which remained in the garage at 1052 S. 2nd St., we had previously been advised by Chief of Police J. C. Calhoun that they had recovered this car; that they believed it had been used by the parties who were identified as having killed the Sheriff at Lima, Ohio, that is evidently Dillinger, Pierpont and one John Hamilton, Michigan City Penitentiary #11965; that they had left this car at the address, however, as will be noted when this car was recovered there was nobody at home at either address and no information could be obtained that anyone was in possession of this particular car, at any time; that this car was a black Ford V-8, two door Sedan, 1930 model worth apparently \$500.00, motor #18394929, bearing Illinois license 1935 #1268040; that the Automobile Protective and Information Bureau, Chicago, Illinois had reported that this car was stolen from W. H. Underwood, 1337 Fargo Ave., Chicago, Like, we work 6, 1933. Chief of Police Calhoun indicated that Mr. and Ers. Stanley Wagner and Mr. and Mrs. Leroy Hooten, who had been living at 1052 S. 2nd Sta; were now located at 215 W. Chestnut St., Hamilton, Ohio; that the Chief had interviewed these people and they denied any knowledge concerning this car; that in connection with the information furnished by Fred Pierpont, Dillinger stal, were located at a camp near Venice, Ohio Bridge, Colerain Pike near Hamilton em that they had located this camp and same showed signs of very recent occupancy, and that a note was found on the table "Thanks Dillinger, for the new soat"

They advised that a bill was also found set this coat, showing that a lady's Lapin jacket had been purchased at Rollman's Cincinnati Ohio for cash, October 13, 1933.

Mr. Calhoun was of the opinion that this car had been driven by Dillinger, et al., and that Mr. and Mrs. Wagner and Mr. and Mrs. Hooten knew the whereabouts of these men, as they apparently had spent considerable time with them at the camp, above referred to. He was of the opinion that possibly if the Wagners and Hootens were arrested for violation of the National Motor Vehicle Theft Act, they might be induced to tell something as to the location of these parties.

In this connection, Special Agent Wood conferred with United States Attorney Canny as to the possible issuance of a warrant for the Wagners and Hootens and he indicated, at that time, he did not believe there was sufficient upon which to file against them, as to this particular automobile, however, this will be considered further in the possible working-out of the case.

According to Mr. Lincoln, Chief Deputy Sheriff, Hamilton, Ohio the Hosten family is now living on State Route #4, Middletown-Hamilton Pike, which is just beyond the Fair Grounds, outside the city limits; that Mrs. Leroy Hooten is the former wife of Bob Kolker, convict, who served sentence at Atlanta Penitentiary, and she is the sister-in-law of Russell Oclark, one of the gang sought in connection with this matter; that Stanley Tagner, who lives at 1052 S. 2nd St., Hamilton, Ohio and owns this property and the property at 1054 S. 2nd St., Hamilton, Ohio is the father of Mrs. Hooten; that there is a son Walter Wagner, also living at this address, Walter Wagner being a taxi driver in Hamilton, Ohio.

Mr. Lincoln advised that George Wagner lives at 215 W. Chestmit St., Hamilton, Ohio; that George Wagner is a relative of Stanley Wagner and apparently these people are still located at 1052 S. 2nd St., as Mr. Lincoln and Mr. Mentzer have been making observations of the place as late as October 27, 1935.

In connection with the above indicated information, it has been indicated by the officers who conferred with me that there is some apprehension of a leak in connection with their contact with the police at Hamilton, Ohio and it was suggested that possibly the Indiana State Police could designate one or more under-cover men to work at Hamilton, Ohio in order to cover the movements of the Wagners and the Hootens, whom it is believed will contact these parties, particularly if they are hiding out in the vicinity of Hamilton, Ohio. Arrangements were made to render every and all possible assistance to Mr. Mentzer in connection with his work at Hamilton, Ohio or the under-cover men whom they desire to place there with the possibility in mind that some contact may be made with these various persons, although apparently they have been

to raid the place in question.

Special Agent Bliss Morton at Indianapolis, Indiana has been instructed to keep in close contact with Captain Leach of the Indiana State Police and we will endeavor to render any and all possible assistance to the Indiana State Police as to this in accordance with instructions of the Director, it being indicated that it was his desire that we cooperate fully with them in every manner possible and if necessary, use any and all Agents of the office for this, however, that we were not to take the initiative in the activity as against these FUGITIVES.



Dear Sir:

Reference is made to telephonic communication received from Mr. Vincent Hughes on 10/14/33, requesting that efficials at Lima, Ohio be contacted for the purpose of this Division's rendering aid with regard to the murder of Sheriff Jesse Sarber at Lima, Ohio on 10/12/33 during a jail delivery at which time a prisoner, John Dillinger, escaped from the county jail.

Dillinger, a former convict of the Indiana State Prison, Michigan City, Indiana, was incarcerated in the county jail at Lima, Ohio on a charge of bank robbery which occurred at Bluffton, Ohio. He was arrested by the Dayton, Ohio Police and subsequently removed to Lima on 9/28/53.

Accompanied by Special Agent (A) Genau, I proceeded to Lima on Saturday afternoon, following the call received from Mr. Highes, and immediately went into conference with the Prosecuting Attorney, Mr. Ernest M. Botkins; Chief of Police J. W. Cooke; Inspector of Police B. J. Rooney and Detectives Clyde Dickson and James Goodwin who were engaged in this investigation. Also, an interview was had with Mrs. Jesse Sarber. wife of the slain sheriff, and Deputy Sheriff W. L. Sharp. It was 👑 determined through the above mentioned interview that at about 6:00 P.M. on the night of 10/12/33, three men entered the sheriff's office, stating that they were from the Indiana State Prison and came to get John Dillinger who was a parolecfrom that institution. The sheriff, who was seated at his deak, asked the man who was doing the talking, for his credentials and simultaneously the individual pulled a gun and advised the sheriff that that was his authority. It appears that the sheriff evidently made a move to reach his own gun which was on the desk and as he did so the slayer ... fired a bullet through the sheriff's abdomen. He then quickly jumped on the sheriff and began beating him on the head with the butt of a pistol. sheriff fell helpless to the floor.

The second man then asked Deputy Sheriff Sharp for the keys and Mrs. Sarber, who was also seated in the room during the time of the shooting, rushed to the spot where the keys were kept and handed them to the criminals to avoid any further killing. The door of the jail was then opened and the three men commanded Deputy Sheriff Sharp and Mrs.

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Sarbar to enter the jail, leaving the sheriff dying on the floor. They then called for Dillinger who hastily prepared himself to leave and after firing another shot into the jail proper, evidently to prevent any of the other inmates from following them, the criminals looked the jail doors and fled. Deputy Sheriff Sharp stated that he could see one man standing outside of the door leading to the sheriff's office, apparently on guard.

From all indications there were five shots fired - one which hit the sheriff, two others which were evidently fired at the sheriff but missed - one striking the desk and ricocheting to the other end of the room - the third striking the wall; the fourth was fired inside the jail and there is a bullet hole in one of the doors leading from the sheriff's office, indicating that one shot had gone in that direction. However, only four bullets were found.

Following the escape it was learned that two pistols had been stolen from the sheriff's desk by the killers, viz. #1 - 38 Police Special nickel plated Colt #557614-N. On the side of the handle of this gun was stamped "Property Allen County Sheriff"; #2 - 58 Colt, Detective Special Blued Steel, 2" barrel, #410172-A-1. This gun belonged to the sheriff. The other was the property of Deputy Sheriff Sharp. The keys which were furnished by Mrs. Sarber were also taken by the bandits.

A period of about 15 minutes elapsed before the sheriff was given medical aid and he died in the hospital two hours later. The authorities at Lima advised that evidently the blows on the head caused his death as the bullet into the abdomen did not hit any vital spots. Mrs. Sarber and Deputy Sheriff Sharp remained looked in the jail for 20 or 25 minutes until the looks could be knocked off to effect their release.

It appears that while Dillinger was incarcerated in the jail he had dropped statements to other prisoners, mentioning the name of Harry Pierpont, indicating that Pierpont was an escape from the Indiana State Prison and that his home was near Lima. A search of records was immediately made and it was found that Harry Pierpont was one of the convicts who escaped from the Indiana State Prison at Michigan City, Indiana on 9/26/33, during the wholesale escape there. A photograph of Pierpont was secured and when shown to Mrs. Sarber she partially identified it as the man who shot the sheriff.

A posse was immediately formed which was led by Chief of Police J. W. Cooke of Lima, Chio, and a search was made of the premises occupied by Harry Pierpont's parents and brother, about four miles from Laipsic and about 35 miles from Lima. This search took place about 10:00 P.M. on the night of the slaying, 10/12/33. No trace of the bandits

was found and there was nothing on the property to indicate that the killers were in that vicinity. However, an Oldsmobile Coach, Motor #113694, was found in the barn without license plates. When first questioned, Fred Pierpont, brother of the convict, stated that he owned the car, but later changed this and told several conflicting stories regarding the car, finally stating that an individual had appeared at his house about three weeks previous and had left the car for repairs. (It may be stated here that Fred Pierpont is a mechanic and occasionally repairs automobiles.)

Upon carefully going into this angle the Police Department learned that a car answering the description of an Oldsmobile had been seen in the vicinity of a bank which was robbed in St. Marys, Ohio on 10/3/33 and there appeared to be a definite connection therefore between this car and the bank robbery at St. Marys. The Police at Lima immediately dispatched a wire to the Automobile Protective and Information Eureau at Chicago, requesting to be advised if they had any information regarding this particular automobile, and in response they received a wire dated 10/14/35 from the above organization, advising that this Oldsmobile was sold by the Sheair Motor Sales Company of Chicago to one Arthur S. Cherrington, 2318 Sunnyside Ave., Chicago, and that same had not been reported stolen. The Automobile Protective and Information Bureau also advised that they had made an inquiry at the above address and learned that Cherrington had rented an apartment there from 9/5/33 to 9/15/33, and that no forwarding address had been left.

Following the receipt of this wire Fred Pierpont was further interrogated and he stated at that time that Cherrington was the name of the man who left the car in his garage to be repaired, and later identified the photograph of Harry Copeland who was a parole from the Indiana State Prison and also wanted in the holdup of the Daleville Bank, Daleville, Indiana on 7/8/33, as being Cherrington. Deputy Sheriff W. Le Sharp, who was in the sheriff's office during the time of the shooting, partially identified the photograph of Copeland as the man who held the gum on him, Sharp. He also positively identified the photograph of Harry Pierpont as the man who shot the sheriff.

Fred Pierpont, the authorities advised upon our arrival at Lima, emphatically denied that he had any knowledge regarding the whereabouts of his brother or his brother's activities. Special Agent Genau and myself arrived at Lima about 8:00 P.M. on the night of 10/14/35 and after being informed of all the facts regarding this offense, it was deemed advisable to further interrogate Fred Pierpont. This interrogation lasted until 5:00 A.M. on the morning of 10/15/33, and although it was clearly indicated at that moment that he desired to talk and was in

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possession of valuable information, he stated that he desired to consult his attorney and his father and mother before making any statement. We immediately took this matter up with the Prosecuting Attorney, Ernest M. Botkins, and the interested police officials, pointing out that it would be well to ascertain the attitude of his attorney, Mr. Warren of Leipsie, and attempt to have him request his client to give the necessary information. It was ascertained that Fred Pierpont's mother had taken an antagonistic attitude toward the police and not much co-operation could be expected from her. However, it was felt that with the assistance of the attorney she could be persuaded to render assistance.

Upon interviewing Mr. Warren, the attorney, and following a lengthy talk with him, it was determined that he would assist the authorities in every way possible, and following a general consultation between Fred Pierpont, his attorney and his parents, he talked freely and made a very complete statement. This statement has not as yet been prepared by the stenographer at Lima, but a copy will be forwarded to this office at the earliest possible date.

Fred Pierpont related in substance that shortly after the escape of the ten convicts from the Indiana State Prison on 9/26/33, his brother, one of the convicts, and four other men, three of whom were also escapes, and the fifth, Harry Copeland, a parole from this institution and now wanted for bank robbery, appeared at his home late one night. He stated that their appearance was a complete surprise to him as his brother had not notified his family that he was intending to come to Leipsic. He stated that these five men stayed at the house for a short while and visited the entire family and then departed. His brother, Harry, at that time told him, Fred, that he had an Oldsmobile automobile which was not stolen but which one of the men who is now known to him as Copeland, alias Cherrington, had purchased, and that he would give Fred this automobile if he would call for it at Hamilton, Ohio where the gang indicated they were staying. Harry Pierpont furnished his brother with the address "1052 South 2nd Ave., Hamilton, Ohio".

Within the course of the next two or three days Fred, with his mother, father and grandmother, drove to Hamilton in the family automobile and upon arriving at Hamilton Fred separated from the other members of the family and proceeded to the above address. He stated that he had no intention of remaining there but planned to secure the Oldsmobile and immediately drive back to Leipsic. Fred stated, however, that upon his arrival at Hamilton his brother informed him that the bill of sale on the car had not arrived from Chicago where the car was purchased, and that he, Fred, would have to remain there until the next day for the purpose of securing the bill of sale. Fred stated that he went back to the spot

where his family were waiting and informed them to drive back to Leipeic and that he would remain in Hamilton over-night. Fred Stated that the five men listed below, four of whom escaped from the Indiana State Prison on 9/26/35, and the fifth, Harry Copeland, alias Cherrington, were in the house at 1052 South 2nd Ave. and remained there with him during the night of 10/2/35:

#1 - Harry Pierpont, Indiana State Prison #11014, sentenced 5/6/25 for bank robbery to 10 to 21 years; description - age 31; height 6' 1"; weight 162#; medium build; eyes grey; hair chestnut; complexion light; scar 1" in back of head.

#2 - Russell Clark, Indiana State Prison #11261, sentenced 12/12/27 for bank robbery to 20 years; description - age 55; height 6' 1'; weight 167#; eyes grey; hair dark chestnut; medium build; scar middle of back; body covered with small moles.

#3 - Charles Makley, Indiana State Prison #12636, sentenced 6/25/28 for bank robbery to 10 to 20 years; description - age 44; height 5' 7m; weight 180#; build medium heavy; eyes grey; hair dark chestnut; complexion medium dark; tip of left index finger amputated; right leg short - limps slightly.

#4 - Edward Shouse, Indiana State Prison #13915, sentenced 6/4/30 for auto theft to 25 years; description - age 27; height 5° 7½°; weight 150#; eyes medium blue; hair medium chestnut; complexion medium dark; build medium; scar depressed middle forehead; brown mole on right cheek.

#5 - Harry Copeland, alias Arthur S. Cherrington, Indiana State Prison #12251; description - age 58; height 5° 11"; weight 160#; brown eyes; hair dark brown; complexion fair; usually wears heavy mustache.

Fred want on to state that on the morning of 10/3/35 his brother, Harry, informed him that the gang was going away for the day and for him to make himself at home, and that they would be back in the evening with the Oldsmobile car. Fred stated that on the afternoon of 10/5/35 he went with a woman who was in the house, known to him as "Nona", to a small cottage along the banks of a river, about 12 or 14 miles from Hamilton, where they took a great quantity of groceries. He stated that it appeared to him as though someone was just going to move in; that with this woman he returned to 1052 South 2nd Avenue and shortly after their return the gang appeared and he was then given the Oldsmobile car which he drove back to Leipsic, his home. Fred stated that he believes there were Illinois license plates on the automobile before it was turned over to him. (Here

it is interesting to note that on 10/5/33 the bank robbery took place at St. Marys, Ohio, at which time an Oldsmobile automobile was seen. It therefore appears that the gang want out on this bank job while Fred Pierpont remained in Hamilton.)

Fred further went on to state that on Wednesday evening. 10/11/33, the five above named individuals again came to his home at Leipsic late at night and stated that they desired to remain there overnight; that they were driving two automobiles - an Essex Coach and a Chrysler Sedan. He was unable to give a description of the license plates but believes that one of the care bore Illinois plates; that they remained at the house over-night and on the following day, 10/12/53, which was the day the sheriff was murdered, they all departed in the two cars - his brother and another convict in the Essex and three in the Chrysler. This departure took place about 4:00 P.M. He stated that one car headed toward Lima and the other in the opposite direction. (Here it is interesting to note that it takes approximately one hour to drive to Lima and the murder took place at 6:00 P.M., which definitely places the five above named man in that vicinity at that time.) This evidence, together with the identification made by Mrs. Sarber, the sheriff's wife, and Deputy Sheriff W. L. Sharp, indicates very definitely that the five above named men committed the crime and effected the escape of John Dillinger.

During the interrogation Fred picked out the photographs of these five men and identified them as the persons who stayed at the home of his parents on the night of 10/11/33. (It may here be stated that neither Mrs. Sarber nor Deputy Sheriff Sharp have been able to identity the third man who was in the sheriff's office.) It appears that he stayed in the background. It was also known that the fourth man was at the side door and it is believed that the fifth was either at the front door of the sheriff's residence or in the automobile. Fred denied being implicated in the St. Marys bank robbery and offered proof as to places he visited in Hamilton while there on 10/3/53. It was ascertained that the authorities at St. Marys have secured the names of witnesses there who claim that they will partially identify Fred as being the driver of the Oldsmobile car, which is alleged to have been used in the robbery. In view of the above Fred is at the present time being held by authorities pending further investigation, and to avoid any further possible jail delivery, he has been removed to the county jail at Wapakoneta, Ohio without the knowledge of the public.

Following the statement made by Fred his mother, who denied any knowledge of ever having seen her son since his escape, corroborated her son's statement about the convicts coming to her home,

which strengthened the prosecution against the five men.

The interrogation of these people lasted until approximately 7:00 o'clock Sunday evening and with all of the information furnished, together with the address at Hamilton, Ohio and that of the cottage along the river banks, a posse was immediately formed and the authorities made a speedy trip to this point where they were met by several other officers from Indiana and points in Ohio. Fred warned the authorities to use extreme precaution, stating that he was well aware of the fact that the convicts would not be taken alive and that they had a great amount of ammunition and guns.

Special Agent Genau and myself remained at Lima and worked out various angles of the crime with the prosecuting attorney. Upon the return of the authorities we were advised that a very extensive search was made at Hamilton and it was found that the five convicts had evidently left the above address on the night previous. In searching the house they found several pieces of clothing and indications therein reflected that the convicts had evidently left hurriedly. Also, a practically new Ford V-8 automobile was found in the back yard. This car was described as 1933 model, speedometer reading 4582 miles, bearing Illinois license plates #1264040, Motor #1839492. It is believed that perhaps the above described license plates were the ones issued for the Oldsmobile car in Chicago. The authorities found no one at the cottage on the river banks nor at the house at 1052 South 2nd Ave., and further investigation along these lines is now being made. The authorities stated that in regard to the house on the river banks near Hamilton, it was determined through the owner that five men who enswered the descriptions of the above named individuals, had rented the house for a period of one week, but he was unable to furnish any further information regarding them. The Oldsmobile car above referred to is at the present time in a garage in Leipsic, Ohio, being held by the authorities.

A copy of this communication is being forwarded to the Chicago office with the suggestion that the names of the convicts mentioned herein be furnished to the Police Department at that city, together with the information concerning the purchase of the Oldsmobile car, evidently by Copeland using the alias of Cherrington and giving the address of 2318 Sminyside Avenue, Chicago. It is believed that perhaps all of these men were together in Chicago and perhaps all stayed at the above address there, and possibly were involved in several crimes during their stay in that city. Along this line the Federal Reserve messenger holdup is suggested in which a patrolman was killed.

Capt. Matt Leach of the Indiana State Police, who is

carrying on an extensive search for the convicts who escaped from the Indiana State Prison, informed me at Lima that he would forward photographs of the men with complete descriptions and other essential information to this office. We have on hand only the photographs of Copeland, alias Cherrington; Makley; Harry Pierpont and John Dillinger. Two of each of these are being forwarded to the Chicago office for identification purposes. It should, of course, be remembered that Dillinger was incarcerated during the time that the men are alleged to have been in Chicago. It is presumed that the photographs of Shouse and Clark, who are also escaped prisoners from the Indiana State Prison, are in possession of the Chicago Police.

If such action is deemed advisable by the Police, it is suggested that the photographs be exhibited to the person from whom the apartment was rented on Sunnyside Avenue, and to the salesman of the Sheair Motor Sales Company, Chicago, who sold the Oldsmobile car to Cherrington.

It has been ascertained that these five individuals are extremely "hard-boiled" and the robbing of banks appears to be merely a pastime.

Mr. Ernest M. Botkins, Prosecuting Attorney at Lima, informed the writer that authorities from the Ohio State Identification Bureau at London, Ohio, are conferring with him regarding the issuance of identification orders. In view thereof it does not appear necessary for the Bureau to render any assistance along this line.

John Dillinger who escaped from the county jail during the murder of the sheriff at Lima, is described as follows: Alias John Donovon Hall; age 30; height 5' 7gm; grey eyes; hair light chestnut; medium complexion; Indiana State Prison #15225. It is respectfully requested that wanted notices be posted with the Identification Unit of the Division against the fingerprints of all of the convicts listed herein.

The bullets found in the sheriff's office, referred to in this communication, are being forwarded to the Division with the request that an examination be made to determine the caliber and type of gun from which they were fired, which information will be furnished the prosecuting attorney. These bullets which are wrapped separately in small boxes and forwarded with this communication are described as follows:

#1 - is the bullet which hit the sheriff and was found by Sergeant Harry Grant and Patrolman Carl Bowers of the Lima Police Department.

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#2 - bullet which hit the deak and was found by Sergeant Grant and Patrolman Bowers.

#3 - bullet found by Sergeant Swaney of the Lima Police Department.

#4 is a shell extracted from an automatic pistol. It appears that this shell was attached to the bullet which struck the sheriff.

In view of the possibility of the gang's returning to Chicago, it is requested that the Chicago office advise the Police Department there to be on the lookout, bearing in mind that they were last seen by Fred Pierpont in possession of an Essex Coach and a Chrysler Sedan.

OHIO, INDIANA Police Search Through Area

Slayers of Sheriff Sarber Believed to Have Returned to Venice Base.

Cincinnati, Oct. 16 (F)—A hundred officers from Ohio and Indiana moved through Big Miami river camps near Venice, 20 miles north of here, in search of John Dillinger, accused bank robber, and three men who released him from jail at Lima, O., last Thursday after killing Sheriff Jess Barber, 50.

The officers said they believed the band that freed Dillinger lay in waiting near Venice before making the Lima raid. Finding is Hamilton, O., of a car believed to have been used in that foray, they said, made it seem likely the band had returned to the riverside base they had established.

Lima officers, led by Chief J. W., Cook and Detective Chief B. J., Roney, searched the camping area throughout Sunday night. Monday reinforcements came from the ine-

Genau and William Larson, the agents assigned, questioned Frederick Pierpont, route 3, Leipsic, brother of Harry Pierpont, fugitive from the Indiana prison at Michigan City, and identified as the triggerman in the shooting of Sheriff Sarber last Thursday night.

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The Division's file in this case indicates that on Derober Lie 1933. Br. Brabner Saith of Mr. Keepen's office called Mr. Hughes by telephone W and stated that he was in receive of a telegram from a Sheriff in Chio asking the assistance of this Division is the investigation of the shooting of the Sheriff at Liva. Mr. Suith stated that he had talked with Mr. Parrish who felt that it would be a good idea to have an Agent contact the Chic people and make an offer of cooperation, and perhaps accomplish something in the way of fingerprint identification. Mr. Hughes advised Mr. Smith that inasmuch as the case was entirely without the jurisdiction of the Division it should be submitted by him to the Director in writing. Accordingly, on October 14th Mr. Buith directed a memorandum to this Division advising that he had just received a telegram from Congressman Frank L. Klosb of Chio, requesting that the Federal Government lend every available resource to aid in the search for the killers. Upon receipt of this memorandum Mr. Hughes conferred with Mr. Parrish, who suggested that an Agent of this Pivision contact Congressian Kloeb and volunteer to cooperate to a limited extent with the authorities of Allen County, Ohio, in their afforts to identify and apprehend the killers of Jesse Sarber. Mr. Hughes then called the Detroit Office and advised Ar. Larson of the telegram received from Congressman Eleeb, and requested that he communicate with the Allen County authorities and offer such cooperation as might be practicable in the way of identifying latent fingerprints or forwarding the fingerprints of any convicts who were suspected of this crime.

The Division is now in receipt of a letter from the Detroit Office, dated October 20, 1933, in which Mr. Lerson states that he and Special Agent (A) Genau, in compliance with the telephonic request of Mr. Hughes, proceeded to Lima, Ohio on the afternoon of October 14th and went into conference with Prosecuting Attorney Ernest M. Botkins, Chief of Police J. M. Cook, Inspector I Police B. J. Rooney and two detectives who were engaged in the investigation, and also interviewed Mrs. Sarber, the Sheriff's wife; that they determined that all about 6 P.M. on October 12, 1933 three men entered the Sheriff's Office stating that they were from the Indiana State Prison and came to get John Dillinger, who was a parole from that institution, Dillinger being at that time incarcarated in the prison. The Sheriff esked the man who was doing the talking for his credentials and simultaneously this individual pulled a gun and advised the Sheriff that that was his authority. It appears that

Sheriff evidently made a move to reach for his gun and as he did so the slayer fired a bullet through the Sheriff's abdomen and then jumped upon the Sheriff and began beating him on the head with the butt of the pistol, The Sheriff fell helpless to the floor and died about two hours later. The second man then asked Caputy Sheriff Sharp for the keys and Mrs. Sarber, who was also seated in the room during the time of the shooting, handed them to the criminals. Following the escape it was learned that two pistols had been stolen from the Sheriff's desk by the killers. One was a 38 Police Special nickel plated Colt #557614-N. On the handle of this gun was stamped "Property Allen County Sheriff". The second gun was a 36 Colt, Detective Special Blued Steel, 2" barrel, #410172-A-1. This gun belonged to the Sheriff. The other was the property of Deputy Sheriff Sharp.

And the state of the It appears that while Millinger was incorporated in the Jail he had made statements to other prisoners, mentioning the name of Harry Pierpont, indicating that Pierpont was an escape from the Indiana State Prison and that his home was near idma. A check of the records indicated that Harry Pierpont. was one of the convicts who escaped from the Indiana State Prison at Michigan City, Indiana on September 26, 1933. A photograph of Pierpont was secured and when shows to Mrs. Serber she partially identified it as the man who shot the Sheriff. A posse was immediately formed by Chief of Police J. W. Cook of a Line, Chio and a search made of the premises secupled by Harry Pierpont's parents and brother, about four miles from Leipsic and about 35 miles from Line. This search took place about 10 P.H. on the night of the slaying, October 12, 1933. So trace of the bandits was found by the posse, which reported that there was nothing on the property of the Pierpont's to indicate that the Killers were in that vicinity. However, an Oldsmobile coach, where Motor #113694, bearing no license plates, was found in the Pierpont bara. Fred Pierpont, brother of the convict, made a number of conflicting statements to the police officers concerning this car. Police officers later determined. however, that an automobile answering the description of the Oldsmobile had been seen in the vicinity of St. Harys, Ohio on October 3, 1933 at which time and bank at St. Marys was robbed. Investigation by the police disclosed that this car was sold to one Arthur B. Cherrington, 2318 Sunnyside Avenue, Chicago, Fred Pierpont later identified the photograph of Cherrington as being the individual who left this car at his place, Cherrington being also known as Harry Copeland, who was a parole violator from the Indiana State Prison and who was also wanted in the hold-up of the Deleville Bank, Deleville, Indiana. Deputy Sheriff W. L. Sharp, who was in the Sheriff's office at the time of the shooting, partially identified the photograph of Copeland as the man who held the gun on him. He also partially identified the photograph of Harry Pierpont as the man who shot the Sheriff.

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Fred Pierpont had repeatedly denied to local authorities that he knew enything about the whereabouts or activities of his prother Harry Special Agent in Charge Larson and Special Agent (A) Genav, after interrogating Fred Pierpont for a considerable length of time, succeeded in obtaining information from him to the effect that shortly after the escape of the ke ten convicte from the Indiana State Prison on September 26, 1933 his brother, one of the convicts, and four other man, three of whom were also bacapes, and Harry Copeland, a parole from the Indiana State Prison, appeared at his home late one might, visited the family for a short time and departed; that Harry Pierpont at the time of this visit told him that he had an Oldsmobile automobile and that he would give it to Fred if he would call for it at Hamilton, Ohio at 1052 South Second Avenue. Within the course of the next two or three days Fred stated that he, his mother, father and grandmother, drove to Hamilton in the family automobile, and that after separating from the other members of the family he proceeded to the above address for the purpose of obtaining the Oldsmobile; that upon his arrival at Hamilton his brother informed him that the bill of sale on the car had not arrived from Chicago, where the car was purchased, but that if he, Fred, would remain there until the next day he could obtain same: that he stayed there that night with his brother, Harry Pierpont, Indiana State Prison #11014, Bussell Clark, Indiana State Prison #11261, Charles Makley, Indiana State Prison #12636, Edward Shouse, Indiana State Prison #13915, and Harry Copeland, Indiana State Prizon #12231; that on the morning of October 3rd his brother Harry told him that the gang was going away for the day and that they would back in the evening with the Oldsmobile car; that the above mentioned individuals did return that evening, at which time he obtained the par. On October 3, 1933 a bank robbery took place at St. Harys, Chio, at which time en Oldsmobile automobile was seen.

Fred Stated further that on Wednesday evening, October 11, 1933, the above named five individuals again came to his home at Leipsic late at night and stated that they desired to remain there overnight; that they were driving two automobiles, an Essex coach and a Chrysler sedan; that on the following day, October 12, 1933, which was the day the Sheriff was murdered, they all departed in the two cars. It takes about one hour to drive from Leipsic to Lima and the murder took place at 6 P.M. This evidence, together with the identification made by Mrs. Earber, the Sheriff's wife, and Deputy Sheriff W. L. Sharp, indicates rather definitely that the five above named men committed the crime and effected the esdape of John Dillinger.

Fred Pierpont, during the interview with these igents, identified the photographs of the above mentioned individuals as being the parties who stayed at the home of his parents on the night of October 11, 1933. Fred Pierpont is at the present time being hald by authorities, pending further investigation.

Pollowing a statement made by Fred, his mother, who had previously denied any knowledge of ever having seen her son since his escape, corroborated her son's statement about the convicts being at her home. Investigation by local authorities at Hamilton, Ohio indicates that the mob left there as October 13th.

The bullets found in the Sheriff's Office have been received by the Division and have been sent to Mr. Appel for the purpose of an exemination.

Specimen #1 - This bullet is in good condition, has six grooves with a twist to the left and 1 cannelure, is metal coated, the length is .586 plus inches and the diameter .358 inches. The weight is 129.2 plus grains. From this it is concluded that the gun used was a 38 Colt automatic which is 52 inches long.

Specimen #2 - This is a metal coated bullet which has six grooves with a twist to the left, the cennelure as not visible. The diameter measures .354 to .404 inches, averaging .379, and the weight is 130 plus grains. From this it is concluded that this is the same kind of a bullet as specimen #1 and it was fired from the same kind of gun, that is, a 38 caliber Colt automatic. There are some small partions of the grooves left, but it is doubtful whether they could be used to identify the weapon as could those on specimen #1.

Specimen $\frac{\pi}{1}3$ - This is a lead bullet which has been deformed. It has plaster adhering to it. There are 2 cannelures. The diameter is .312 to .377 inches. There are 4 visible grooves and it is concluded that there are 6 in all. It is difficult to diserve the twist of the grooves which, however, at the base where they are least distorted, appear for the short distance which is visible to slant to the left. This bullet weighs 149 plus grains and it is concluded that the weapon was a 38 caliber Colt long revolver. There is a possibility that it is a 38 caliber Coltspecia

view of the fact that the weight may have been changed because of the condition of the bullet. The conclusion is based on the fact that the weight nearest to that of the bullets used in a 38 caliber Colt long revolver. It might be possible to make an identification from marks on this bullet.

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DIVISION OF AVESTIGA OCT 31 U. S. DEPARTMENT OF JU- The cartridge, specimen #4, bears the mark 38 ACP, Remumo on the base. There are marks on this cartridge similar to those made by a Colt automatic and it is an automatic type cartridge as shown by the shape of the base. This is probably one of the cases from which specimens 1 and 2 were fired. An attempt should be made to find the other ejected cartridge case as it will help in any identification which may be attempted.

The specimens will be retained in the laboratory, in order that quick comparisons may be made, until their return is requested.

Perference is made to telephonic communication received from Mr. Vincent Hughes on 10/14/83, requesting that efficials at lime, this be contacted for the purpose of this Division's rendering aid with regard to the murder of Sheriff Jesse Serber et Lime, this on 10/12/88 during a jail delivery at which time a prisoner, John Dillinger, escaped from the county jail.

Dillinger, a former convict of the Indiana State Prison, Michigan City, Indiana, was incorporated in the county juil at Lina, Chie on a charge of bank robbery which occurred at Bluffton, Chie. He was arrested by the Dayton, Chie Police and subsequently removed to Lina in 9/28/83.

Accompanied by Special Agent (A) Gener, I proceeded to Line on Saturday afternoon, following the call received from Mr. Hughes, and immediately went into conference with the Prosecuting Attorney, Er. Ernest M. Botkine: Chief of Police J. W. Cooke: Inspector of Police B. J. Rooney and Detectives Clyde Dickson and Jenes Goodwin who were engaged in this investigation. Also, an interview was had with Mrs. Jense Serber. wife of the alain sheriff, and Deputy Sheriff W. L. Sharp. "It was determined through the above mentioned interview that at about \$100 7,36 on the night of 10/12/33, three non entered the sheriff's office, stating that they were from the Indiana State Prison and some to get July Dillinger who was a perole from that institution. possession of valuable information, he stated that he desired to consult his attorney and his father and nother before making any statement. We issuediately that this matter up with the Prosecuting Actorney, Ernest H. Botkins, and the interested police officials, pointing out that it would be well to ascertain the attitude of his attorney, Mr. Varron of Inipole, and attempt to have him request his glient to give the accessary information. It was ascertained that Fred Pierpent's nother had taken an antagonistic attitude toward the police and not much co-operation could be expected from her. However, it was felt that with the assistance of the attorney she could be persuaded to render assistance.

Upon interviewing Mr. Marron, the attorney, and following a longthy talk with him, it was determined that he would assist the authorities in every may possible, and following a general consultation between Fred Pierpont, his attorney and his parents, he talked freely and made a very complete statement. This statement has not as yet been prepared by the stanographer at Line, but a copy will be forwarded to this office at the earliest possible date.

Prod Pierpont related in substance that shortly after the escape of the tem convicts from the Indiana State Prison on 9/26/35, his brother, one of the convicts, and four other mem, three of whom were also escapes, and the fifth, Harry Copeland, a perole from this institution and now wanted for bank robbery, appeared at his home late one night. He stated that their appearance was a complete surprise to him as his brother had not notified his family that he was intending to come to Leipsie. He stated that these five men stayed at the house for a short while and visited the entire family and them departed. His brother, Harry, at that time told him, Fred, that he had an Oldsmobile automobile which was not stolen but which one of the men who is now known to him as Copeland, alias Cherrington, had purchased, and that he would give Fred this automobile if he would call for it at Hamilton, Ohio where the gang indicated they were staying. Harry Pierpont furnished his brother with the address "1052 South End Ave., Hamilton, Ohio".

Within the course of the next two or three days Fred, with his mother, father and grandmother, drove to Remilton in the family automobile and upon arriving at Hemilton Fred separated from the other members of the family and proceeded to the above address. He stated that he had no intention of remaining there but planned to secure the Oldsmobile and immediately drive back to Leipsie. Fred stated, however, that upon his arrival at Hemilton his brother informed him that the bill of sale on the ear had not arrived from Chicago where the car was purchased, and that he, Fred, would have to remain there until the next day for the purpose of securing the bill of sale. Fred stated that he went back to the spot

where his family were vaiting and informed them to drive back to Leipsie and that he would remain in Hamilton ever-night. Fred Stated that the five men listed below, four of them escaped from the Indiana State Prison on 9/26/35, and the fifth, Harry Copeland, alias Cherrington, were in the house at 1052 South and Ave. and remained there with him during the night of 10/2/35:

Fred went on to state that on the morning of 10/5/83 his brother, Harry, informed him that the gang was going away for the day and for him to make himself at home, and that they would be back in the evening with the Oldsmobile ear. Fred stated that on the afternoon of 10/5/83 he went with a momen who was in the house, known to him as "Hone", to a small cottage along the banks of a river, about 18 or 14 miles from Hamilton, here they took a great quantity of groceries. He stated that it appeared to him as though someons was just going to move in; that with this momen he returned to 1058 South 2nd avenue and shortly after their return the gang appeared and he was then given the Oldsmobile ear which he drove back to Leipsie, his home. Fred stated that he believes there were Illinois license plates on the automobile before it was turned ever to him. (Here

It is interesting to note that on 10/8/83 the bank rebbery took place at St. Narys, Ohio, at which time on Oldsmobile entemobile was seen. It therefore appears that the game went out on this bank job while Fred Pierpont remained in Bemilton.)

Frod further west on to state that on Vednesday evening. 10/11/85, the five above moved individuals again same to his home at ... Leipsis late at night and stated that they desired to remain there evernight; that they were driving two entombiles - on Ensex Cooth and a 🐍 Chrysler Seden. He was mable to give a description of the license plates but believes that one of the care bore Illinois plates; that they remained at the house over-night and on the following day, 10/12/55, which was the day the shoriff was murdered, they all departed in the two ears - his 🕸 brother and another convict in the Essex and three in the Chrysler. This departure took place about 4:00 P.M. He stated that one car headed toward Lima and the other in the opposite direction. (Here it is interesting to note that it takes approximately one hour to drive to line and the murder took place at 6:00 P.M., which definitely places the five above maned men in that vicinity at that time.) This evidence, together with the identifieation made by Mrs. Sarbar, the sheriff's wife, and Deputy Sheriff W. L. Sharp, indicates very definitely that the five above mened men epomitted the crime and effected the escape of John Dillinger.

During the interrogation Fred picked out the photographs of those five men and identified them as the persons who stayed at the 🐔 home of his parents on the night of 10/11/35. (It may here be stated that noither krs. Serber nor Deputy Sheriff Sharp have been able to identity the third men who was in the sheriff's office.) It appears that he stayed in the background. It was also known that the fourth man was at the side door and it is believed that the fifth was either at the front door of the sheriff's residence or in the extomobile. Fred denied being implicated in the St. Marys bank robbery and effered proof as to places he visited in Hemilton while there on 10/3/33. It was ascertained that the authorities at 3t. Marys have secured the menes of witnesses there who claim that they will partially identify Fred as being the driver of the Oldsmobile car, & which is alleged to have been used in the robbery. In view of the above Fred is at the present time being held by authorities pending further investigation, and to avoid any further possible jail delivery, he has been removed to the county jail at Tapakoneta, this without the knowledge of the public.

Following the statement made by Fred his mother, who denied any knowledge of ever having seen her son since his escape, proborated her son's statement about the convicts coming to her home.

The interrogation of these people lasted until approximately 7:00 etalock Sunday evening and with all of the information furnished, together with the address at Banilton, Ohio and that of the cottage along the river banks, a posse was immediately formed and the authorities made a speedy trip to this point where they were met by several other officers from Indians and points in this. Fred warned the authorities to use extreme presention, stating that he was well sware of the fact that the convicts would not be taken alive and that they had a great amount of examinition and gime.

Special Agent Denen and myself remained at Line and forked out various engles of the crime with the prosecuting attorney. Upon the return of the authorities we were advised that a very extensive search was made at Hamilton and it was found that the five convicts had evidently left the above address on the night provious. In searching the house they found several pieces of clathing and indications therein reflected that the convicts had evidently left hurriedly. Also, a wife prestically new Ford Y-8 automobile was found in the back yard. car was described as 1935 model, speedometer reeding 4562 miles, bearing Illinois license plates \$2864040, Motor \$1839462. It is believed that perhaps the above described license plates were the ones issued for the Oldsmobile car in Chicago. The authorities found no one at the cottage on the river banks nor at the house at 1062 South And Ave., and further investigation along these lines is now being made. The authorities stated that in regard to the house on the river banks near Hamilton, it was determined through the owner that five men who enswered the descriptions of the above nesed individuals. had rested the house for a period? of one week, but he was unable to furnish any further information regarding them. The Oldsmobile car above referred to is at the present time in a garage in Leipele, Ohio, being held by the authorities. THE REPORT OF THE PARTY OF THE

A copy of this communication is being forwarded to the Chicago office with the suggestion that the names of the convicts mentioned herein be furnished to the Police Department at that city, together with the information concerning the purchase of the Oldsmobile car, evidently by Copeland using the alias of Cherriagton and giving the address of \$316 Sunnyside Avenue, Chicago. It is believed that perhaps all of those men were together in Chicago and perhaps all stayed at the above address there, and possibly were involved in several Grimes during their stay in that city. Along this line the Federal Reserve messenger holden is suggested in which a patrolmen was killed.

Capt. Matt Leach of the Indiana State Police, who is

Sarrying on an extensive search for the sonviets the escaped from the Indiana State Prison, informed as at Line that he would forward photographs of the men with complete descriptions and other essential information to this effice. We have on head only the photographs of Sepaland, alias Cherrington; Makley; Marry Pierpoint and John Dillingar, Two of each of these are being forwarded to the Chicago effice for identification purposes. It should, of course, be repembered that Dillingar was incarcerated during the time that the men are alleged to have been in Chicago. It is presumed that the photographs of Shouse and Clark, who are also escaped prisoners from the Indiana State Pyleon, are in possession of the Chicago Police.

If such action is deemed advisable by the Police, it is suggested that the photographs it exhibited to the person from whom the spartment was rented on Sunnyside Venue, and to the salesman of the Sheair Motor Sales Company, Chicago, who sold the Oldsnobile car to Cherrington.

It has been essertained that these five individuals are extremely "hard-builed" and the robbing of banks appears to be morely a pastime.

Mr. Ermest M. Bothine, Prospecting Attorney at Line, informed the writer that authorities from the thie State Identification pursan at London, Ohio, are conferring with him regarding the issuance of Mentification orders. In view thereof it does not appear necessary for the Dursau to render any assistance along this line,

Mr. Gates telephoned this morning with reference to the escaped convicts in Indiana. He stated that he had discussed the matter with the Attorney General, who told him that he had turned the matter over to me, and said that he would like to extend aid if we could; that the Attorney General is personally interested in the situation there. I told Mr. Gates that we had offered assistance with reference to fingerprint matters, but in so far as helping to catch them is concerned, we were not. I said that we would do anything that we could consistently in the matter, but that I had received no word from the Attorney General.

Mr. Valker Stone called to state that Mr. Glendon had informed him that a communication addressed to the Attorney General by Mr. Stone concerning the escaped convicts in Indiana, had been referred to me. Mr. Stone advised me that he received a wire last night from his editor, telling him of the situation, and requesting that Mr. Cummings be contacted to ascertain if Federal aid would be offered. Mr. Stone agreed to send me a copy of the wire.

Mr. Glendon called to advise me that he had referred Mr. Stone's letter to me.

After receiving these communications I telephoned Mr. Stone to advise him that I was contacting the Cincinnati, Chicago and Detroit offices of the Division, instructing them to render such assistance as we can.

I telephoned Mr. Larson at Detroit. Mr. Larson informed me that he contacted the prosecuting attorney yesterday, and he was going to send him a copy of the statement taken; that he had gotten in touch with the Identification Bureau in London, Ohio, and informed them that we would distribute identificstion orders, but could not issue them. I instructed Mr. Larson to again get in touch tith these people and indicate that we are entirely willing to cooperate to the fullest extent. Mr. Larson also stated that he had talked to Captain-Leach (?) of the Indiana State Police, located at Indianapolis, who agreed to give him complete particulars as to all the men who escaped, but that it had not been received as yet. I instructed him to again contact the Captain and that a duplicate copy be sent to this office. Mr. Larson had also made arrangements to see a Lieutenant of the Michigan State Police who had information, and had requested the prosecuting attorney and the officials at Lims to contact him immediately when information was received of value. I told Mr. Larson to keep in touch with the Cincinnati and Chicago offices by telephone and to keep the Division informed. RECORDED

I talked to Mr. Klein at Cincinnati relative to this mattern CI instructed him to obtain information as to the number of convicts who escaped and an indication of those who had been captured or killed. I told him to advit the local authorities of our willingness to cooperate.

On October 26, 1933, Special Agent in Charge Larson telephoned Mr. Hughes of the Division requesting authority to proceed to Indianapolis, Indiana, for the purpose of conferring with Captain Leach of the Indiana State Police concerning the escape of the 10 sonvicts from the Indiana State Penitentiary. The files do not contain a report covering the activities of Agent in Charge Larson at this point.

The Division is in receipt of a letter dated October 28, 1933, from the Cincinnati office, copies of which were furnished the Petroit and Chicago offices. Ir. Connelley in this & letter reports that he has been in conference with Walter Mentser of the Indiana State Police and has offered every assistants that can possibly be randered by this Division under the circumstances. Mr. Connelley has furnished the Detroit and Chicago offices with information obtained from the Indiana State Police concerning the various subjects, setting out their correspondence, visitors, etceters, while they were incorcerated in the Michigan City Peni-It does not appear, however, that photographs were furnished with Mr. Connelley's letter and I am arranging to have photographs furnished to all of the interested offices. Mr. Connelley in his letter makes reference to a possible violation & of the National Motor Vehicle Theft Act on the part of Mr. and Mrs. Stanley Wagner and Mr. and Mrs. Lercy Mooten, who are known to have assisted in harboring the fugitives in this casa,

Mr. Connelley reports that Special Agent Bliss Norton at Indianapolis, Indiana, has been instructed to keep in close contact with Captain Matt Leach of the Indiana State Police in order that he may be kept advised of the progress being made in this investigation.

Warden Kunkel was unable to advise if the Division had been notified by telegram or otherwise to place wanted notices for the escapes. He was informed regarding the proper procedure to take in all escape cases where it is known that the fingerprints of the escaped convicts are on file with the Division at Washington. Subsequently, Warden Kunkel furnished this office with a photograph of each of the escapes and their associates. Photostatic copies of the photographs are being attached hereto for your information.

Om October 24, 1933, Special Agent T. E. Billings conferred with William Schoemaker, Chief of Police, Chicago Police Department, who advised that about moon on that day one Edwin J. Leeper, 6044 Stony Island Avenue, Chicago, a former convict of the Indiana State Prison, had appeared at the Detective Bureau and stated that he had observed two men in a Buick Sedan on the streets of Chicago that day, and that he recognized one of them as Joseph R. Burns, Indiana State Prison No. 8703, and he believed the other was Charles Makley, Indiana State Prison No. 12636. Leeper stated that when he observed Burns and Makley, they were engaged in repairing a tire on a car, and while so engaged a Studebaker Sedan with three or four men drove up and after some conversation with Burns and Makley, the men in the Studebaker departed.

Special Agent W. A. Smith ascertained, through Lieutenant John Howe, Chicago Police Department, that he has several men working on the prison break exclusively, and there are several members of the Indiana State Police who are working in Chicago with Lieutenant Howe. The Chicago and Indiana State Police are checking all known hang-outs, telephone numbers and addresses in this vicinity, with a view of ascertaining contacts of the escapes. Lieutenant Howe will provide this office with all available information in instant case and continue cooperating with the Indiana State Police and this Division with a view of apprehending the escapes.

Special Agent W. J. Devereux has been instructed to continue assistance with the State Police at South Bend and Fort Wayne, Indiana, with a view of collecting and submitting additional data which may lead to the location of the escapes.

General information regarding the escape has been broadcast throughout this vicinity and related in press reports.

An agent from this office will obtain all additional data possible at Michigan City, Indiana, and this office will continue to cooperate with the local and State Police, furnishing you the available facts at intervals.

On March 16, 1934, there more received in the Myleica of Investigation from the Sheriff at Mason City, Ioue, bone latest fingerprints which had been found on the othering-sheel of an automobile used in a recent beak rebbary at Mason City, Ioue. The Sheriff requested that these latent fingerprints be compared with the fingerprints of John Millinger, whose photograph had been identified as the likeness of an individual she had participated in the rebbary of this bank, and with the fingerprints of Frank Bennis Carpenter, who was believed to be an associate of Februarillinger.

The photographs of Jeim Pillinger and Frank Semis Cappenter, which are attached hereto, disclose a striking resemblance between the two as to facial characteristics, and their physical descriptions appear quite similar. However, the fingerprints of these individuals definitely show that they are not identical. Their descriptions are:



MEMORANDUM FOR THE DIRECTOR

On October 26, 1933, Special Agent in Charge Larson telephoned Mr. Hughes of the Division requesting authority to proceed to Indianapolis, Indiana, for the purpose of conferring with Captain Leach of the Indiana State Police concerning the escape of the 10 convicts from the Indiana State Penitentiary. The files do not contain a report covering the activities of Agent in Charge Larson at this point.

The Division is in receipt of a letter dated October 28, 1933 from the Cincinnati office, copies of which were furnished the Detroit and Chicago offices. Mr. Connelley in this letter reports that he has been in conference with Walter Mentzer of the Indiana State Police and has offered every assistance that can possibly be rendered by this Division under the circumstances. Mr. Connelley has furnished the Detroit and Chicago offices with information obtained from the Indiana State Police concerning the various subjects, setting out their correspondence, visitors, etcetera, while they were incarcerated in the Michigan City Peni-It does not appear, however, that photographs were furnished with Mr. Connelley's letter and I am arranging to have photographs furnished to all of the interested offices. Connelley in his letter makes reference to a possible violation of the National Motor Vehicle Theft Act on the part of Mr. and Mrs. Stanley Wagner and Mr. and Mrs. Leroy Hooten, who are known to have assisted in harboring the fugitives in this case.

Mr. Connelley reports that Special Agent Bliss Morton at Indianapolis, Indiana, has been instructed to keep in close contact with Captain Matt Leach of the Indiana State Police in order that he may be kept advised of the progress being made in this investigation.

Memorandum for Mr. Purvis.

Re: Escapes from Indiana State Penitentiary, Michigan City, Indiana.

Supplementing my memorandum regarding the above subject, dated ovember 8, 1933 I wish to state that during my talks with described aylor, the under cover operator for Warden Louis Lunkel, he mentioned that he had four of the escaped convicts lined up in Ohio, stating that they were around Defiance, Ohio, but would not enlarge on the information, stating that he could get them any time he wanted.

Today I talked with Detective Leo Berner of the South Bend police regarding the information which Taylor might have given the police the same night he talked to me, and Mr. Berner stated that Taylor told him and the other officers that he had four of the escaped convicts lined up near Bremen, Indiana.

It is probable, in view of the varying locations of the four convicts, as related by Taylor, that the whole thing is concected and that there is no truth in anything he says.

From a discussion of this matter with Agent

by Taylor, it is my opinion that he is entirely unreliable
and that the information in his possession is without value
whatever. I will keep in touch with this situation and
inform the Division of any developments.



About 5:00 PM on Monday, November 6, 1933 while at the Federal Building at South Bend, Indiana I received a telephone call from one for Taylor representing himself as being working for Warden Louis Kunkel of the Indiana State Peniteniary, Michigan City, Indiana, in an attempt to locate and apprehend the escape convicts from said penitentiary. This person desired me to meet him across from the post office building as seen as possible and I did so immediately after the call.

Joe Taylor told me hurridly that he had been working under cover two of the escaped convicts, all that afternoon, drinking and playing cards; that just before he phoned me he had driven the two men to a house located at the north west corner of Washington and La Porte Streets, South Bend, Indiana. He suggested that I go with him later that night to meet the two men, representing myself as being an convict, just as he had been doing. I told him that I could hardly work under cover in South Bend since I had been living here too long. He wanted to know then whether I could suggest someone to do such work. I told him that I would call into Chicago and ask you.

Taylor then stated that he wanted to call Warden Kunkel and get — some information and accordingly he accompanied me to my residence where he put in a call for Louis E. Kunkel. Warden of the Indiana State Penitentiary. Lichigan City, Indiana. When the connection was made, I gathered from the one sided conversation that warden Kunkel, upon being told by Taylor that he, Taylor had been with two of the escapes that afternoon, asked him why he did not cause the two escapes to be arrested. Taylor stated over the phone that he had in mind to work along with the two men in South Bend for awhile in hope of getting some information regarding two more of the escapes; that he, Taylor knew where four of the convicts were in Ohio and he thought that he could catch all eight of the men if he were allowed to proceed in his own way. The upshoat of the conversation must have been that Tunkel told him to go ahead and do the job the way he wanted.

Later, after receiving advice from you that it would not be possible to put a man in with the two persons supposed to be the escapes, I informed Taylor who immediately stated that the whole deal was off; that couldn't get cooperation and therefor he was going to drop the entire work. I suggested to him that my idea of the matter was to go and take the two escapes he had lined up and forget about the others for the time being. He stated he didn't want to do that but finally stated he might consider it. I also suggested that the South Bend police be contacted for assistance but he stated that he would not work with the police; that he did not trust them, and that if he decided to 'take' the escapes he would do it himself.

Taylor got in touch with later in the evening and asked me to go out with him which I did. We went to the suspected house and upon being admitted and shown to the room of a man whom Taylor called George, he, Taylor, wanted me to take the man into custody on the theory that he was a member of the 'Hhaki Shirts' from Philadelphia. I told him that I could not take the man into custody for any such reason. I assured myself that the man, who gave his name as George Husvar, was not any of the escaped convicts. Taylor acted pretty tough throughout the affair and I began to entertain doubts as to whether he had ever seen any of the escaped convicts, much less having been around with them all day long.

After I left Taylor for the night, he telephoned me and stated that

he had had Chief of Police Kuespert arrest George Husvar.

The next day, Tuesday, November 7, 1933 I went to Michigan City, Indiana where I had a long talk with Warden Lewis E. Kunkel, of the Indiana State Penitentiary. Mr. Kunkel, in response to my inquiries regarding Taylor, informed me that while Taylor was working for him in trying to get a line on the escaped convicts, he had known nothing of the man before he came to Michigan City a short while after the escape with an introduction from Mr. Chester, secretary to Congressman Pettengill of South Bend, Indiana, Warden Kunkel told me that Taylor had served time at Michigan City prison for forgery some time ago and was supposed to know some of the men who had escaped from the prison and was in a position to get further valuable information. He stated however, that he doubted whether Taylor knew anything more about the whereabouts of the escapes than any ordinary citizen. He stated that Taylor had been running all over the State of Indiana on what were supposed to be 'hot tips' but that thus far there has been no information regarding the whereabouts of any of the escapes, much less the bodies of the escapes. In other words Warden Kunkel is of the opinion that Taylor is a fraud and knows nothing of value.

While at the prison, I informed the warden that he ought to take advantage of our fingerprint division in posting his wanted notices when men escaped the institution and that the best thing to do would be to wire the name and prison number of the escape and later follow the wire with a letter of request. I also told him that if the Division could be of use to him in running out leads in different parts of the country he should get in touch with the Chicago Division office.

After talking with the warden I returned to South Bend and talked with Chief of Police Kuespert who, after hearing of my experience with Taylor, told me that Taylor had appeared at the station late during the night of November 6, 1933 and told them that two of the escaped convicts from Michigan City were in the house at Washington and LaPorte Streets. The police went out to the place and found only Husvar, who was taken into custody but released on November 7, 1933. The Chief expressed the view that Taylor was trying to 'ride' the warden of the penitentiary for what money he could get, and did not possess any information of the whereabouts of any of the escaped men.

My own opinion is that Taylor is either 'stir crazy' or has hallucinations, and has no idea whatever of where the escaped convicts are. I have not seen him since the night of November 6, 1933 but if I do, I intend to try and get him to tell me just what his idea was in telling his 'stories' about the escaped convicts, and how far he thought he could get, by, going around under authority of the prison and getting our division and the police out on a trail that was foolish to start with.

From what Mr. Kunkel told me I think that Taylor will be told to stop operating for the prison and that his help will not be wanted.
