Regant Mr. Vance: Your name is what? Edwin Sauger. You are the night man at the lain Street Garage? There the Sheriff keeps his automobile? Yes. And were you in the garage this norning, when Dillinger came in there? Yes, I was working on a car there. Just tellus the circuistances. Well, I was working on a car, when Blunk and Dillinger - I didn't know him -Did you recognize Blunk? Yes. Mr. Regan: What time were you through this norning? I am through at 7:00, but I had to come back. And I saw the machine gun, which is natural, they are always in there, I paid no attention; they asked me which was the fastest car. Q Tho asked that? Dillinger did that, I guess, I never looked up; I kept on working, and I told them, the "V-8", and I got to kidding him, and he got kind of hard, and I looked up; Blunk pushed me, so I thought it was about time to go; he told me to go. Did Dillinger have a machine gun? A Absolutely. Tas there a colored fellow along? Yes sir. Did he have a machine gun too? Yes sir. Did Blunk have a machine gun? Not a thing. Mr. Regan: Q About what time was this? A About a quarter after 9:00. Q How did they come in? A Through the back door. Where is the back door? A where the street car uses to back there. Mr. Vance: That is really a side door? To the north side of the building? You were in the shop?

Just tell us, in your own way, the circumstances in connection with what happened there this morning, what you were doing in the jail, how you were in that portion of the jail that Dillinger was in, etc. I was back to let the men out, to clean up the jail, and then
I go back to lock then up. I have done that every morning for almost six years, except the time I was away. You were back there in that portion of the jail where Dillinger was cleaning up? Yes, twenty-five times a day.
On that occasion?
On that occasion, I went back there to let the prisoners out,
to clean up, and lock up again.
Were these men in their individual cells when you went back there? No, they woren't in their individual cells. But they had been in the night? Yes: What time were they let out of their individual cells into this day room? I should say five minutes after 8:00. And about what time was it that you went back there to clean up? A quarter to 9:00; 8:45. And at that time, these men, including Dillinger, who had been in that block of cells, were out in that day room, is that right? Yes. What did you do when you went back there? I opened up the Jail, all the day rooms, let the men out of the day rooms into the corridor, with their brooms and nope, to clean up. Including Dillinger? Including Dillinger. And then I stationed the guard that was with me, looking down through this glass door of the corridor, to watch them all the time I was out there, and watch them while I went through the rest of the jail and came back. The guard that you stationed was in this sort of a little hallway, is that Tight? Yes. Where these steps are that go up on to a higher level? And between the place where the guard is, thereis one barred door, is that right? Yes. And one steel door? One steel door.

Between the place where the guard is and the corridor where these

And who had the key for that door? I had; that atcel door docan't look with a key; there is a lever, I had the lever box locked, and I had the keys away with me. You had them on your person then? I had them with me. So that you, yourself, were looked in there?
No, I mean't looked in any place; the platform wasn't looked.
The door that you call No. 2 door, is the barred door? That is the barned door. I am talking about the two doors that are up on the platform; there is a barred door and a steel door? Yes sir. Then you go into that corridor, in front of the cell box? Was this berred door, which I will call the No. 1 door, was this locked? No. It was unlooked and open? Yes. How about this steel door? It was locked. And was it locked when you were on the inside? I wasn't on the inside. How did you get in there to clean up the cells? The prisoners do that work all inside of the jail, themselves. So that there was a locked door between you and these prisoners that were inside? F You are asking no some things that I am not going to be able to clear for you right - The reason that the prisoners clean that fail is that Mrs. Holley and Lew don't trust the trustics inside that jail. So that there was nobody inside but the prisoners? Nobody watching at all, but there was a men watching through the glass in the door; he was out on this platform; I went through the jail and came right back to him again; I had the keys with me while I was up there.

And youleft this guard stand there while the men were cleaning up the corridors end the cells? Yes. Then you came back down, was the guard still standing there watching? He was. On Saturday morning, we give out the toilet paper and soap He was. and everything they use.
Then you went to the office end got the scape, and went back? Yee. Tas the (ward still there? Then, did you see anything wrong when you came back there with the supplies? A I never got a chance to see anything wrong; I opened the woor, and the guard was standing there and the porters were in back of me; they carried a large pan with the supplies in it; I opened the door, the fellow stepped through with the soap box, and I had to step back to let him up with the big pan -

He came back again, after he went out, with two tomades; he asked Farshall Heateley where the ton ice were, and Isashall told him which office they were in.

Mr. Vance:

Then what did Dillinger say there, let's keep on this conversation.?

He said, in "Here is my pet."

He was talking to you at the time?

Tes, he said, "Don't you believe that is a wooden piston, come here and frisk me, see if I have not anything else onme." I said, "Oh, never mind, I will take your word for it." He had a tormic in his hand; he took the pistol out and rapped it on the side of the door frame." I was absolutely rapped it on the side of the door frame; it was absolutely wood.

I couldn't answer that question, because I was looked in the cell Here is what I want go to get - did this fingerprint man, Blunk, as you call him, did he get entirely out of view of Dillinger?

A That I couldn't answer, because I was locked up at the time.

Statement of Matt Brown, taken in office of Prosecuting Attorney, On March 7, 1934. Mr. Estill: What is your name? Matt Boown. Where do you live?
In Eagle Creek Township, in Lake County, on a farm.
You are, and have been, for some time past, quite active in this organization that you have in Lake County, that co-operates with the Sheriff's office in running down chicken thieves and hog thieves, etc, is that right? I have been the president of that for three or four years. Mr. Barce: Q What is your age, Mr. Brown? A Seventy-five years old. Mr. Estill: Mr. Brown, you were among the men that werehelping to guard the jail over here during the time Dillinger was here? I had just arrived in time to get locked up. I say, you had been on there other days? for some little time. Just where were you stationed and what were you doing on the day of his escape? I had just arrived at the jail and hadn't yet been stationed any place. Were you called in there and locked up in the jail? I Was. Where were you at the time that you were called? I was in the office at the jail. That is this outer office, right by the entrance? Right by the jail office. Who called you? I didn't just know the man at that time, but I guess I know enough about it to answer it. Well, who was it. A Blunk, they called him.

Q Ernest Blunk, the finger print man?

A Yes, they said the finger print man.

Q You knew him by sight, did you not? You knew that he did work around there?
I had seen him there often, but I didn't know his name at the time.
Where was he when he called you? When he called me, he was in the alley, leading into the jail proper. You mean the corridor running down -Yes, and I was in the office, this side as you go into the jail; was in, I suppose you would call it the public part; hadn't yet been stationed. Q Was there a door locked between you and him?

about Baker. How long after Baker left before Blunk called you? Not very long. Two or three minutes? A Probably two or three minutes.
Q Do you think that door was left or en when Exex Blunk called Baker there? I do, I think it was left open. Now, who was in there with you at this time, after Baker left?
