



Agent Harris instructed not to go to St. Joseph and that any arrangement regarding the payment of expense money would have to first be authorized by Special Agent in Charge, M. H. Purvis, of the Chicago then stated he would wire or telephone to Mr. Purvis direct having Mr. Purvis send Harris the money, the in turn could then pay the sum to him. Agent Harris stated further that he had been advised by Assistant Ua S. John Dillinger may clude the federal agents for the present, but it is encouraging to remember that Uncle Sam's officers never forget and that no case is closed until the object of the search is taken or known to be dead.

It is this sort of detective work, this form of relentless pursuit, that affords hope and promise that the more defiant of the major criminals, such as Dillinger, cool, clever, sourageous outlaw, can be suppressed and brought before the bar of justice in the United States.

J. Edgar Hoover, director of criminal investigation of the United States department of justice, has declared "endless war" on the Dillinger gang. The other night a party of young detectives selected by Mr. Hoover closed in on a Dillinger lieutenant in St. Paul. By bringing sub-machine guns quickly into play before the bandit could use his own weapons they captured one of two men of the Dillinger gang and also a woman suspected of being an ally of the widely-sought and muchwanted killer, robber and prisonbreaker,




Mr. Clegg called me from St. Paul on Tuesday evening concerning the action brought by Mrs. Daisy S. Coffey, Manager of the Lincoln Court Apartments at 93-95 South Lexington Avenue, St. Paul, Minnesota, to garnishee the Ford automobile which was abandoned in front of her building on March 31st and the Terraplane automobile in which Eddie Green and Mrs. Bessie Skinner, alias Green, were driving on April 3rd, on which date Green was shot.

He stated that a hearing on this matter was coming up today and he wanted to verify his conversation with you over the telephone that the Division should endeavor to reimburse Mrs. Coffey for the damages done to her building amounting to \$175.71. He felt that if we could assure Mrs. Coffey that the Division would attempt to meet these expenses, she would withdraw any claim to the automobiles and in all probability in due course of time the Division would procure complete ownership to them. Mr. Clegg stated he discussed this matter with you over the telephone and you told him you thought it would be wise to pay these expenditures.

I informed Mr. Clegg that I thought he should state to Mrs. Coffey that we would endeavor to meet these expenses subject, of course, to any regulations of the General Accounting Office which would preclude payment of damages of this kind. He stated he would take such action and he felt that this would take care of the matter.

Concerning the efforts to acquire possession of a Ford automobile and a Hudson automobile, which apparently had been possessed by gangsters concerning whose activities the Division is conducting an investigation, you are advised that Mrs. Daisy S. Coffey, Manager of the Lincoln Court Apartments at 93-95 South Lexington Avenue, St. Paul, Minnesota, has through her attorneys sought to garnishee the Ford automobile which was abandoned in front of her building on March 51, 1934, when an effort was made to shoot Special Agent R. C. Coulter and a police officer, and in which car was found a machine gun; also the Hudson automobile believed to have been abandoned at Mankato, Minnesota, by Tommy Carroll and Homer Van Meter; also the Terraplane automobile in which Eddie Green and Mrs. Bessie Skinner, alias Green, were driving on April 5, 1934, on which date Green was shot.

In this connection, you are advised that the hearing on the suit of Mrs. Coffey is scheduled for May 1, 1934, and Mrs. Bessie Skinner has retained counsel who will seek to retain for the benefit of his client the Terraplane automobile. I feel that an effort to obtain possession of this automobile, which was shot through the motor with a high-powered rifle bullet, would be futile. Special Agent in Charge Werner Hanni of the St. Paul office has obtained an itemized statement of Mrs. Daisy S. Coffey of the damages done to her apartment building on the occasion of the shooting on March 31, 1934; and it is for the collection of these damages that she has sought to attach the three automobiles. It is doubted that she will be able to establish that Eddie Green is liable civilly for any portion of this amount. Her claim on the Terraplane automobile, therefore, will likely fail.

On April 16, 1934, Mrs. Bessie Skinner, with aliases, was interviewed further, and the following additional information was obtained:

Volney Davis, one of the members of the Barker-Karpis gang, she believes at one time lived at Neosho, Missouri, and he either moved from Neosho to Sapulpa, Oklahoma, or he moved from Sapulpa to Neosho, she does not recall which as this is based upon her recollection of information obtained some time ago.

Bessie Skinner was shown the photograph of a girl, which photograph, I am informed, came from the apartment of Myrtle Eaton, 565 Portland Avenue, St. Paul, Minnesota. She identified this photograph, which bears the inscription, "Love, Dodo", as a niece of Bill Weaver. who she stated is a member of the Barker-Karpis gang. This photograph was contained in a folder in which appeared the name "Miller", who appearently was the photographer, but the address of this photographer has obviously been scraped off the folder. By using a reading glass, however, the first four letters could be identified as "West". I conferred with photographers and at the Wright Studio in St. Paul, I exemined a list of photographers belonging to some kind of photographers association and included in this list was the name Millers Studio, Westplains, Missouri. When Bessie Skinner was informed that this was probably the address, she expressed the opinion that this girl identified as Bill Weaver's niece had taught school at Westplains. She did not believe that it was her home, but she recalled that the girl was a school teacher. She still contends that Weaver and his relatives are from Arkensa

She further advised that about one year ago, William Weaver lived at 241 Brimhall Street in St. Paul in an apartment house on the corner of Brimhall and St. Clair Street. In this apartment with William 934 Weaver for a time lived his sister, his niece whose photograph is above

described, a nephew who is five or six years of age, and another nephew by the name of Eugene who is about 22 years of age. Eugene was in this apartment with William Weaver to her knowledge as recently as December, 1933. The best description she could furnish of William Weaver's sister was that she is about 45 years of age, rather heavy set, had light brown hair which was turning gray, and she thinks that it is possible that her name might have been Sue (note particularly a letter received by Myrtle Eaton from Newport, Arkansas, signed by "Sue" described in a letter dated April 16, 1934).

Bessie Skinner stated that Bill Weaver owned his own furniture which he purchased from some concern on Cedar Street in St. Paul located between 6th and 7th Streets, and it was on the left of the street while proceeding from 7th to 6th. The only furniture company listed in the telephone directory with such an address is the Summerfield Furniture Company. She stated that she understood that Weaver had stored his furniture in a storehouse which was used by this furniture company and that probably this company had transfered his furniture from the apartment to the store house and had moved it on the occasions since its purchase whenever Weaver moved. The furniture, she believes, was purchased about one year ago in the winter. She advised that Bill Weaver moved out of an apartment on Dale Street to the apartment on Brimhall Street.

She advised relative to Ray Karpis that when he was in St. Paul in the spring of 1933, he was driving a Graham Sedan which was marcon colored; that later, she understood, he purchased a Graham Sedan or Graham Coach which was dark blue or black.

Concerning Volney Davis, she recalls that she had heard him state that when he got enough money, he intended to buy an Auburn automobile.

Concerning the shooting of Edward Green on April 5, 1934, Bessie Skinner alias Bessie Green advised Mr. Nathan, and subsequently repeated this information in the presence of both Mr. Nathan and me, that she was sitting in the car waiting for Green to return from the house located at 778 Rondo Street when she turned and saw him on the ground. Realizing that he had previously been operated on for rupture and seeing the bag which he had evidently had in his hand, she was of the opinion that the carrying of this weight had caused a further rupture and that he had collapsed in the street. She stated positively that she did not see anyone do any shooting. She did not, in fact, hear any shooting. She did not see Green at the time he was shot, and her first knowledge of the fact that he had been injured by a shot was when she got to him as he lay in the street, following the shooting.



Reference is made to my letter of April 18, 1934, covering investigation made by Special Agent L. E. Kingman at Daytona Beach, Florida, in connection with the information received by the Division through a Congressman, which had come from Judge Charles Corn of Harrodsburg, Kentucky, to the effect that several days ago a message was sent from Harrodsburg by a man who looked like Dillinger to Mrs. George T. Williams at 300 Main Street, Daytona Beach, Florida.

At Daytona Beach, Agent Kingman made inquiry at the Postal Telegraph Company office to ascertain whether Mrs. George T. Williams had received any messages recently from anyone in Harrodsburg, Kentucky. He was informed that Mrs. Williams had received no such telegrams and that there is no Postal office in Harrodsburg; however, on March 21, 1934, George T. Williams sent her a Postal telegram from Atlanta, Georgia. Copy of this telegram was not available. About a year ago, George T. Williams sent Mrs. Williams a Postal telegram from Shelbyville, Kentucky, a copy of which telegram was not available. The manager of the Postal Telegraph Company, O. E. Sandstron, at Daytona Beach, has agreed to place a cover on all telegrams received by Mrs. Williams and will immediately advise this office of their receipt and contents.



Agent Kingman also determined that during the latter part of March, 1934, Williams was absent from Daytona Beach, Florida, and returned to that city on or about the first of April and left again about April eighth, at the same time that a new Essex terraplane was stolen from its owner, J. C. Harper, the theft of which has been covered in a previous communication to the Division.

J. E. Watkins, Superintendent of the Western Union Telegraph Company, Jacksonville, advised that he had made a thorough check of his records and could not locate a copy of a telegram from George T. Williams to Mrs. Williams at Daytona Beach, originating at Harrodsburg, Kentucky; however, he stated that this person received the following two telegrams from Jackson, Mississippi:

Williams also left about the same time, and on the date of the investigation the present whereabouts of Hearn and Williams was unknown. However, they are supposed to have gone to Detroit. At the time they left Daytona Beach, a new Essex Terraplane two-door 1934 model coach automobile was stolen from the dealer, Huckabee-Sellings Kotor Company, which is described, Motor No. 56004. Serial No. 377890, and that this car has mot been recovered. The officers investigating the theft of this car found some papers which were in the car at the time it was stolen, at a place where Hearn is known to have loaded and unloaded quantities of liquor.



Reference is made to teletype message received from the Division on April 15, 1934, inquiring particularly concerning the representations made by attorneys to obtain the release of Bessie Skinner, with aliases, on a writ of habeas corpus. This is to confirm information subsequently furnished that the attorneys who presented the petition were Edward K.\*Delaney, Joseph P. Tracy, and Edmund Burke.

On at least two occasions prior to the filing of the petition, one or more of these attorneys called on me personally in the hall outside the Division's St. Paul offices and stated that they represented the Green family, and that they wanted to know whether they could talk with Mrs. Bessie Green, or Skinner or some other name which they may have at that time used. I informed them that to do so would interfere with the investigation which we were conducting and I assured them that Bessie Green had not requested the services of an attorney and she had not asked to see them. They withdrew for the time being, and about two days later returned and asked whether our investigation was completed; and I informed them that it was not. They then stated that they desired to make formal demand to see this woman, and I informed them rather positively that formally or informally, it could not be done; that the woman in question had not asked for counsel and in particular had not asked to see any of the gentlemen who were inquiring for her on that occasion. They stated that their only recourse would be to obtain a court order, and they left the building.

On April 7, 1934, there was filed before the United States
District Court for the District of Minnesota, a petition in the matter of
Beth Green, also known as Beth Hines, against Special Agent in Charge
Werner Hanni, Sheriff George H. Moeller, and Chief of Police Thomas E.
Dehill. Mr. Hanni was served with a writ calling for his appearance at
a hearing on the petition at 4:00 p.m., April 10, 1934. On this occasion,
Assistant United States Attorney George Heisey, representing the defendants
Hanni, Moeller and Dahill, moved the dismissal of the petition on the ground

The court, represented by United States District Judge Joyce, then heard from the attorneys Delaney, Tracy and Burke through their spokesman, Mr. Burke. The spokesman represented that the woman was being held; that they had not been permitted to see her, and then apparently were about to initiate a claim that on the morning of April 10th there had been filed against Beth Green and Edward Green a complaint charging them with conspiracy to harbor and conceal John Dillinger, a fugitive from justice. When they started to discuss this point, Assistant United States Attorney Heisey interposed an interruption to explain that that was not the issue before the court, when one of the attorneys (believed to be Tracy) made a motion with his hand in the direction of Mr. Heisey as if inviting him to sit down and not to interfere. This seemed to be contrary to the desires of Judge Joyce, however, who informed Mr. Tracy that he (Judge Joyce) was giving commands and issuing instructions in the court, and he permitted Mr. Heisey to continue.

The defendants then moved a reduction in bond, claiming that Beth Green was not charged with a crime of murder or kidnaping and that the \$25,000.00 bond which had been fixed was unreasonable and that it should be greatly reduced. The court informed them that they had not presented a motion to that effect and in the absence of such formal motion, the court was not in a position to entertain their informal motion at that time.

These attorneys moved the court to issue an order permitting them to interview Beth Green, and Mr. Heisey called the attention of the court to the fact that he had been informed that Beth Green did not want to be interviewed by these attorneys. The three attorneys seemed to doubt this representation, and Judge Joyce ordered Beth Green brought before the bar. He caused her to stand along side the three attorneys and asked her to look at them. He then asked whether she had ever seen them before. She said, "No." Judge Joyce then inquired whether she had engaged them to represent her. She said, "No." He then inquired whether she had sought legal representation. Her reply was, "No." The court immediately announced that court was adjourned.

There is attached hereto a copy of the pleadings, including the order of issuence of the writ of habeas corpus and the petition for such writ.

As an indication that Delaney is in fact a representative of the Greens, there is attached hereto a written order to Mr. Hanni to turn over the personal belongings of Eugene Green to Edward K. Delaney, the attorney, and it bears the signature "Mrs. Margaret)Green". The order is written in ink. Of course, the belongings in question are largely in the possession of the Ancker Hospital; and the United States Attorney has informed me that the coroner is the proper person to receive these belongings and to make proper disposition of them. Mr. Delaney will be informed as to this when he calls later today.

I have not considered it advisable at this time to call on the Green family to determine whether in fact these three attorneys were authorized to appear in behalf of Beth Green as having been retained by relatives and members of her family. Some of the members of the Green family have, in fact, been rather hostile. FrankiGreen and JimmielGreen are brothers of Eugene Green, deceased. Frank Green was brought into the office on the night of the shooting, but on account of the condition of his brother, he was released; and at the hospital, he would from time to time go in and talk with his brother and his part of the conversation on many occasions was largely, "Don't talk, Eddie. Don't talk." This finally grew so annoying that I ordered him barred from the hospital, and when young Delaney came to me later agreeing that Frank Green would behave himself. I then permitted him to return to the hospital to visit his brother on occasions. Mrs. Green, the mother of Eugene Green, deceased, called at the hospital on several occasions; and whenever Eddie Green was about to talk, she would begin to read out of her prayer book rather loudly. However, there was no interference with her plans in this direction as there was ample time for Eddie Green to talk when she was not there.

An attorney employed by Bessie Green, alias Bessie Skinner, today to straighten out her personal affairs informed me that he plans to make a contact with the Green family to determine their attitude and he will inform me as to their attitude toward Bessie Green. Upon receipt of this information, we will be governed further as to the appropriate time to confer with this family as to whether they did or did not seek counsel to represent Bessie Green in the petition for a writ of habeas corpus.



MEMORANDUM FOR THE DIRECTOR.

In connection with the attached teletype message from Mr. Purvis advising that his informant at Columbus. Ohio, had wired him requesting \$50 or \$75 more and also indicating that he had contacted a newspaper reporter and had offered to sell the Dillinger story to him for \$3,000 and had also indicated that he was a Special Agent of the Division of Investigation, I talked with Mr. Purvis and discussed this matter with him. Mr. Purvis stated that the informant had given information to the effect that Dillinger was going to be at St. Joseph. Michigan, this coming Saturday or Sunday and that though he had some question as to the reliability of the informant he felt that if there was anything to the information submitted if we did not continue his employment until after the date Dillinger was supposed to be in St. Joseph he would probably get information to Dillinger which would prevent his apprehension at that time, assuming that the information is correct. I suggested to Mr. Purvis that he contact Agent Harris at Columbus, who is in contact with the informant and have a straight talk with the informant and offer him a smaller sum, after which more money can be advanced, if the information submitted by the informant proves accurate. Mr. Purvis stated that he would do this but that in the event the informant refused to come through without the payment of \$50.00, he believed that that amount should be advanced and that he then be dropped if his information is not accurate. I authorized the above procedure and requested that he advise the Division the results of the contact made by Agent Harris with the informant.

I HAVE RECEIVED A TELEGRAM FROM REQUESTING ME TO WIRE HIM FIFTY TO SEVENTY FIVE DOLLARS AT ONCE IN CARE OF AGENT HARRIS. HE STATES FURTHER IN HIS TELEGRAM THAT VERY IMPORTANT DETAILS FOR SATURDAY OR SUNDAY. I ASSUME THAT THIS IS IN CONNECTION WITH THE MEETING THAT SAYS DILLINGER WILL HAVE SATURDAY NIGHT AT ST JOSEPH MICHIGAN WITH PRIOR TO EMPLOYMENT OF THIS INFORMANT I IMPRESSED ON HIM THE NECESSITY FOR KEEPING HIS ACTIVITY QUIET AND I DO NOT KNOW WHETHER SPECIAL AGENT HARRIS IS HANDLING HIM IN THE PROPER FASHION. HOWEVER IN CONTACTING THE CLEVELAND FREE PRESS NEWSPAPER AS AT INTIMATING THAT HE IS A FEDERAL AGENT IT WIGHT BE WISE AND DESPENSE



In confirmation of teletype message of April 16, 1934, you are advised that at the request of Mr. Purvis, the following bullet proof vests were forwarded to the Chicago office by Railway Express, collect, on the evening of April 16, 1934: Two super vests, Nos. 3226 and 3227, as well as five regular vests.

The reference to the recent inquiry of the Division as to the value of the super vests when compared with the regular vests, you are advised that I have inquired of a number of agents who have made use of the vests and one of the agents, Mr. O. G. Hall, who has conferred with a representative of the Federal Laboratories, Inc., mammfacturers of these vests. The unanimous opinion was expressed that the super vests are preferable. The manufacturers represent that these super vests will repel a bullet fired from a .38 super automatic, while no such claim is made as to the regular vests. It is to be recalled that in the apartment formerly occupied by John Dillinger, there was found a .38 super automatic pistol. I am informed that the weight of the super vests is not such as to hinder the necessary movements of an officer who may possess a gun at the time he is on duty, and the additional weight of the super vests is more than compensated for by the additional protection afforded.

I was also informed by Mr. Hall that this company likewise makes a super super vest which a bullet of even greater velocity and power will not penetrate. However, it is feared that the weight of such a vest would make it cumbersome; and the recommendation was therefore made that if such a vest were available in Washington, it be examined to determine whether it is too heavy; and if it is found to be too heavy, it is recommended that each office be supplied with the required number of super bullet proof vests and that the regular vests on hand at the St. Paul and the Chicago offices be exchanged for super vests in accordance with an understanding which the Division has with the Federal Laboratories, Inc.

The bullet proof wests which were confiscated during raids made on the apartments of John Dillinger and Edward Green fail to show from exterior exemination any identifying marks as to the manufacturers. Two of the vests in question are of a blue serge variety, and examination of them disclosed signs indicating that bullets have penetrated these vests. The third is of a brownish-gray appearance and there are no outside identification marks on it. These three vests are being transmitted to the Division under separate cover.


On April 14, 1934, information was received by idvision Agents to the effect that Milinger and one of his associates called be a doctor at Louisville, Kentucky, for the purpose of receiving medical treatment for a bullet would in his leg received at St. Paul, Minnesota, on March II, when he escaped from the apartment on Lexington Avenue. He was positive in his identification of Dillinger and stated that an appointment had been made with him for " Tuesday. Accordingly, proper arrangements were made so that Dillinger would have been taken into custody had he put in his appearance. The Division received the above information through a local officer et Louisville, Lentucky, who apparently later gave the information to press representatives sho published the story in the Louisville papers on Tuesday, the day which Dillinger san expected to put in his appearance. This, of course, ruled my possibility of causing his apprehension at that time.

then information was received by the Division through a confidential informat to the effect that Dillinger was hiding out at Elkhart, Indiana. Division agents proceeded to South Bend, which is about fifteen miles from Elkhart, where plans were made to definitely establish the location of his hide-out and effect his apprehension. During the course of this investigation a newspaper article was published at South Bend to the effect that Dillinger had been seen in South Bend by a druggipt. 



#### MEMORANDUM FOR THE DIRECTOR.


Special Agent in Charge Purvis called last night in connection with the Agents at Saulte St. Marie, Michigan. He said that they had Hamilton's sister in custody and were endeavoring to obtain the names of a number of other friends of Dillinger and Hamilton, all of whom will be questioned; that the facts indicating that Hamilton's sister had harbored Dillinger and Hamilton had been presented to the United States Attorney, who advised that if it would assist the Agents in their investigation he would authorize the filing of a complaint. Mr. Purvis stated that she had been very frank about Hamilton and Dillinger's visit; that she was the mother of a baby about two years of age and that it was questionable whether a jury would convict her on this charge. He stated, however, that he believed the United States Attorney would want him to recommend either for or against prosecution. Mr. Purvis was of the opinion that the prosecution would not aid in determining the whereabouts of Dillinger and Hamilton. On the contrary he stated that she might be made a good source of information for future activities of Dillinger in the event she were treated well and not prosecuted. Mr. Purvis wanted to know what attitude he should take. I told him that he should present the facts developed concerning the harboring of a fugitive charge to the United States Attorney and let him act accordingly without making any recommendation.






