BLUNK PLEADS NOT GUILTY TO AIDING DILLINGER FLIGHT

Crown Point, Ind., April 18.— (UP)—Ernest Blunk, fingerprint expert indicted on a charge of aiding the escape of John Dillinger from the county jail here, pleaded not guilty before Special Judge Maurice E. Crites today.

Blunk, indicted with Sam Cahoon, turnkey at the jail, was ordered to trial May 7 after Judge Crites overruled a defense motion to quash the indictment.

The attorney for Blunk asked an early trial and told the court that Criminal Court Judge William J. Murray, who discharged the finger-print expert after his indictment, had promised to reinstate him if he was cleared of the charge.

Ready to Prove Bribery.

Indianapolis, Ind., April 18.—
(UP)—The state virtually is ready to prove that John Dillinger, Indiana's most notorious outlaw, bribed his way out of the Lake county jail March 3, Edward J. Barce, a deputy attorney-general, said today.

"Only one minor link is missing in the chain of evidence to prove that certain jail employes, took a large sum of money from Dillinges," he announced.

DILLINGER IS SUSPECTED

TAUNTS POLICE ON DILLINGER'S ESCAPE HERE

Girl Seized In Cafe Asserts
Outlaw Was by Her Side;
Doctor and Nurse Arrested

John Dillinger, wounded as he machine-gunned his way out of a St. Paul police trap March \$1, was revealed yesterday by his Indian sweetheart to have been at her side when agents captured her here on April 8.

With the arrest of a Minneapolis physician and nurse yesterday, charged with treating the killer's wound, came the first definite knowledge that he had been winged by police builets. Dillinger was ahot in the leg.

Evelyn Frechette, dusky Menomines girl friend of Dillinger, taunted her federal agent captors with the declaration that he sauntered away unobserved as the dozen of them surrounded her in the restaurant at 418 N. State st.

BONDS SET AT \$25,000.

Dr. Clayton E. May and Mrs. Gurniath Ladelle, nurse, are charged in Minneapolis with conspiracy to harbor a fugitive. Their bonds were fixed at \$25,000 after hearing before a United States commissioner.

Blood stains found in the apartment from which Dillinger fied with the Frechette girl, as the government claims, put agents on the trail for a physician who had treated the wounds.

Meanwhile, in Chicage, the Frechette girl, still denying her guilt, waived examination when arraigned before United States Commissioner Edwin K. Walker and was held for removal to St. Paul to be tried on charges of harboring a fugitive.

Held under \$60,000 bonds, she probably will be taken to St. Paul Friday. Her fingerprints, found on a powder puff in the apartment, led to her arrest.

SAYS OUTLAW ON SEA.

Louis Piquette, Dillinger's attorney who appeared for the girl, said the outlaw was on the high seas, "bound for parts unknown."

Both Piquette and the girl claimed that Dillinger was seated with her at the restaurant counter when the agents swooped in.

She declared that he, with a smile at her, walked out with people sitting next to them when they arose to pay their bill at the height of the uproar caused by the raid.

Girl Bares Dillinger Escape in Cafe Here

That was the amazing story told exclusively to The Chicago American today by Evelyn Frechetti, sweetheart of the notorious Indiana fugitive, who was seized in the restaurant two or three minutes after Dillinger had gone.

In the presence of her lawyer, Louise Piquett, the Frechetti girl, who is to be returned to St. Paul on a charge of harboring the outlaw, said:

"John and I drove to the State-Austion restaurant at 418 N. State st. I had been with him several times in the week previously and we had visited many public places.

We were in that place stepo time and had met a couple of friends—who are in no linked with John-when suddenly, from both doors, a lot of federal agents streamed in. They carried shotguns, machine guns and pistols. I learned later that Purvis (Melvin H. Purvis, head of the division of investigation here) was leading them.

"The agents told everybody to stand where they were. John and I, like the others, obeyed. The agents questioned 'legitimate' persons and then told them to beat it.' John walked out with this bunch-just as cool as could be."

WENT TO HIS CAR

The much-wanted Dillinger/went to the car, parked fifty feet away, Evelyn said. The girl was then recognized and arrested by the agents. Just as they were emerging from the restaurant, she declared, Dillinger was driving unhurriedly away.

MEMORANDUM FOR SPECIAL AGENT IN CHARGE M. H. PURVIS.

On Wednesday, April 18, 1934, Special Agents W. Carter Baum, J.J.Metcalfe, and myself, at your instructions, using one of the Division cars, accompanied a Deputy U.S.Marshal and three Chicago Police squad cars in bringing Evelyn Frechette from the Cook County Jail to the United States Commissioner's office on the 8th floor of the Federal Building, for the purpose of having her waive removal hearing to St. Paul. We left the Cook County fail at about 1.35 P.M. and arrived at the office of the U.S.Commissioner on the 8th floor of the Federal Building at approximately 1.50 P.M. when Evelyn Frechette was taken from the car in which she was riding with a Deputy U.S.Marshal and certain Detectives from the Chicago Police Department squad cars, she was immediately rushed through the lobby of the Federal Building into an elevator and from the elevator on the 8th floor to the U.S. Commissioner's office, at which latter place she was immediately seated at the counsel table. The Deputy U.S. Marshal sat immediately behind her and her attorney Louis Piquett, immediately in front of her on one side of the table, and on the other side of the table were Assistant U.S.Attorney Hall and myself. The other members of the guard were seated in other places in the Commissioner's office, and various newspaper reporters upon learning that she was in the Federal Building immediately flocked into the Commissioner's office. The discussion of the waiver of removal and certain other matters were engaged in between Miss Frechette's attorney, Assistant U.S.Attorney Hall and the Commissioner, which consumed approximately fifteen minutes. Evelyn Frechette was then taken from the Commissioner's office to the office of the U.S. Marshal, on the same floor, where she was placed in the temporary lackup, out of my sight, for approximately twenty minutes, during which time the arrangements were made by Assistant U.S.Attorney Hall and Chief Deputy Marshal King with Federal Judge Sullivan, to have her appear before him for the formal signing of the removal order. She was then taken directly to Judge Sullivan's Court, where the formalities consumed approximately five minutes, and from Judge Sullivan's Court was immediately taken down the elevator out to the cars which brought her to the Federal Building from the jail, and was immediately returned to the County Jail.

At no time up until the time Evelyn Frechette was placed in the temporary lockup in the Marshal's office, or from the time she was removed from this temporary lockup and taken to Judge Sullivan's Court, and thence to the County Jail, was she out of my sight for one moment, and during the time that she was in my sight I can state positively that she did not

visit with or speak to any newspaper reporter. This is particulary true as to the time she was in the Commissioner's office. I note from one or two newspaper articles of last evening, and this morning, that the newspapers claim that she told the story accredited to her while in the Commissioner's office. She positively did not speak to a single newspaper reporter while in the office of the U.S.Commissioner, as I sat directly across the counsel table every moment.

While she was held in the temporary lockup in the U.S.Marshal's office I do not believe that newspaper reporters were permitted to enter either the lockup or the hallway leading thereto, so that they could talk to Evelyn Frechette. Her Attorney Louis Piquett was permitted entry to talk with her during the time she was in this lockup. I wasin the front part of the U.S.Marshal's office during the time she was in this temporary lockup, and know of my own personal knowledge that the various newspaper reporters whom I know by sight, as being assigned to the Federal Building, were constantly either in front part of the Marshal's office, or out in the hallway. I recall particularly Messrs Sommerfeldt of the Hearst papers and Er Dorr of the Daily News, neither of whom could have contacted Evelyn Frechette while she was in the lockup, and therefore did not contact her during the entire time from the moment she left the Cook County Jail until she returned to the Cook County Jail until she returned to

It is my opinion that Evelyn Frechette was not interviewed by newspaper reporters as alleged in the articles printed, but that the storey carried in the papers was given to the reporters by Louis Piquett, her attorney, for the purpose of endeavoring to belittle the work and activities of the Division of Investigation, he naturally having no love for the organization, in view of the fact that through it, and the cooperation of the U.S.Attorney's office, the U.S.Judges, and the U.S. Commissioner, he has been frustrated in every attempt to secure a reduction of the \$60,000 bond, and to delay the removal proceedings.

taken back to St. Paul as soon as he orders her extradition there.

The removal warrant, Assistant District Attorney Hall said, will be turned over to the marshal to be served upon Miss Frechetti, "if she can be found."

The removal warrant was signed by J. J. Waters, a federal agent. It lists the woman as Evelyn Frechetti, Evelyn Frechette, Ann Martin, Mary Evelyn Frechetti, Evelyn Sparks, Evelyn Frisbette, Grace Edwards, Mrs. John Dillinger and "Dillie."

It accuses her of conspiring with "Bess" and Edward Green to harbor Dillinger, knowing him to be a fugitive.

The district attorney's office denied any knowledge of her whereabouts, while Mr. Purvis, at the same time, openly admitted having her in custody. The hearing on the habeas corpus petition filed by Attorneys Louis Piquett and Paul Pomeroy was continued to give Mr. Hall more time to locate the woman.

Mr. Piquett, who was Dillinger's lawyer at the time he bluffed his way out of the Crown Point jail with a whittled pistol on March 3, said Evelyn's sister, Frances, was arrested yesterday. Evelyn was seized Monday. He did not seek Frances' freedom, however.

The day's developments in St.

The day's developments in St. Paul, officials said, definitely linked Evelyn Frechetti with Dilinger and his pals as women's fingerprints found in an apartment on Lexington av, there were identified as here.

The Lexington av. apartment in St. Paul, authorities there said, bore considerable evidence that it was a hangout of such notorious members of the Dillinger gang as John Hamilton, who is wanted for the murder of a Chicago police sergeant, and Tommy Carroll, suppected bank robber.

FIND \$4,500 IN BANK

Among other avidence discovered today in St. Paul was \$4,500 in \$5 bills found in a bank safety deposit box on directions of Beth Green, wislow of Eugene Green, who died yesterday of bullet wounds suffered in a battle with police three days after he escaped with Dillinger from the apartment.

Authorities were seeking to determine whether the money was part of the ransom in a kidnaping or part of the loot from bank robberies.

In filing his petition for a writ of habeas corpus, Attorney Piquett said he had "information and belief" that Miss Frechetti was being held either by District Attorney Green, United States Marshal Leubenheimer, Mr. Purvis or Sheriff Meyering.

Judge Woodward instructed the lawyer to inquire of the district afterney's office whether she was being held. Assistant District Attorney Hall conferred with Purvis and was informed that Evelyn was not in the custody of his department.

REPORT DILLINGER'S SWEETHEART HELD BY FEDERAL AGENTS

Federal officials last night refused to confirm a report that they had arrested and were holding Evelyn Frachette, sweetheart of John Dillinger. Attorney Louis P. Piquett, counsel for Dillinger, said he received an anonymous telephone call, informing him that the Frachette girl was arrested Monday night by government agents in the State-Austin Inn, 416 North State street. He declared that he would file a petition for a writ of habeas corpus in the federal court today for her release.

Mclvin Purvis, chief of the Chicago bureau of investigation of the department of justice, when questioned concerning the report, said: "I have no comment to make."

Chicago avenue police questioned John Skefington and Leo Dondia, owners of the inn, and learned that at 11 o'clock Monday night a girl and a man were drinking beer there when two men entered with drawn pistols, produced government badges and took the couple away. Employes at the inn said they believed the girl was Miss Frachette.

ESCAPE IN AN AUTO

Pana, Ill., April 19.—(F)—A quartet of polite robbers held up the Pana National Bank before it opened for business this morning andescaped with \$27,629.04 in each and securities.

Armed with pistols, the men forced bankemployes to open the vault almost an hour before the bank was scheduled to open its doors at 9 a. m.

Rumors at once flooded this Christian county city that the leader of the gang was John Dillinger; the nation's most hunted fugitive whose name has been connected with many bank robberies since he escaped from an Indiana jail two months ago.

months ago.

Definite descriptions were not obtained, however, and there apparently was no evidence to connect Dillinger with the mine who ate breakfast at a near-by cafe before going to the bank.

Ernest Butteffield, a jeweler who watched the getaway, said he thought the leader, who limped, resembled Dillinger's photographs.

Last week the Warsaw (Ind.) police arsenal was despoiled of its choicest stock of rifles and pistols by a pair of desperadoes, and a night policeman said Dillinger was one of them.

The latest rumor of Dillinger's exploits was a bank robbery as Shreveport, La., yesterday, in which it was thought by Shreveport police that he participated.

DOCTOR, NURSE, CONFESS AIDING FLEEING KILLER

Desperado Wounded as He Fought Police and U. S. Agents.

HUNT HIM ON BORDER

St. Paul, Minn., April 18.—(UP)

John Dillinger, clusive Indiana outlaw, escaped from a St. Paul apartment three weeks ago with a policeman's bullet in his body, it was disclosed today with apprehension of a Minneapolis physician who dressed the wound and a nurse who assisted.

After fleeing to Indiana, where he raided the Warsaw (Ind.) police station last Friday for bullet-proof vests, Dillinger is believed to have doubled back on his trail and is being sought along the Canadian border.

Dillinger's injury, suffered in a gun battle with a St. Paul policeman and a federal agent, was disclosed in a confession which department of justice investigators said they had obtained from the physician and the nurse.

Rearched Records for Class.

A Search through the records of all hospitals and physicians in the twin cities preceded the discovery of the clews that resulted in the apprehension of the couple and their "confession."

Charges of conspiring to harbor a fugitive were filed against the pair in a complaint, naming them as Dr. Clayton E. May and Mrs. Gurniath Ladelle, both of Minneapoils.

They were arraigned before United States Commissioner W. T. Goddard today and held in bonds of \$25,000 each. The case will be given to a federal grand jury, which convenes here next Tuesday.

Dillinger was wounded March 31, when he machine-gunned his way out of an apartment where he and two other persons had been surprised by a federal agent and a police officer in the course of a routine investigation.

Sergt. Harry Cummings, veteran detective, is believed to have fired the shot that winged the fleeing desperado as the federal agent, R. Nalls, fought a gun battle with Eugene Green, St. Paul ex-convict, in another part of the building.

Red Head Starts Auto.

The third person routed out of the apartment was a mysterious red-haired woman, who ran out of the building with Dillinger and started the automobile in which the trio escaped.

The automobile was taken from a garage several doors away and the wheel was turned over to Dillinger despite his wound.

In the snow at a spot where Dillinger waited for the woman to back up the machine bloodstains from his wound were found.

Three days later Green was cornered in the Negro section of St. Paul and wounded five times when he made a threatening gesture toward federal agents. He died in a hospital eight days later.

BLUNK PLEADS NOT GUILTY TO AIDING DILLINGER FLIGHT

Crown Point, Ind., April 18.— (UP)—Ernest Blunk, fingerprint expert indicted on a charge of aiding the escape of John Dillinger from the county jail here, pleaded not guilty before Special Judge Maurice E. Crites today.

Blunk, indicted with Sam Cahoon, turnkey at the jail, was ordered to trial May 7 after Judge Crites overruled a defense motion to quash the indictment.

The attorney for Blunk asked an early trial and told the court that Criminal Court Judge William J. Murray, who discharged the finger-print expert after his indictment, had promised to reinstate him if he was cleared of the charge.

Ready to Prove Bribery.



Patrol Northern Indiana After Jail Raid by Dillinger

(Pictures on back page.)

Warsaw, Ind., April 18.-[Special.] -America's public enemy No. 1, John Dillinger, who visited Warsaw at 1 o'clock on the morning of Friday the 18th and left his calling card, in the form of a badly battered head on the shoulders of Night Police Officer Judd H. Pittenger, has again disappeared, without leaving a forwarding address.

No trace of Dillinger or his companion, identified by Officer Pittenger as Homer Van Meter, 26, an escaped Indiana convict and a henchman of Dillinger, has been found since the two made their escape in a dark colored sedan. Indiana state police offi-cers, rushed here early today by Capt. Matt Leach, have been busy all day patroling highways searching for just the resemblance of a clew to his whereabouts.

Accosted on Street.

Dillinger and the man suspected of being Van Meter, accosted Officer Pittenger as he was making his rounds in the heart of the business section early Friday morning. Both were armed with sub-machine guns.

"We want your vests," Dillinger said quietly as he accosted the policeman. "Where are your keys to the police station?"

Pittenger denied having the keys as he stalled for time, hoping that some one would come to his aid. He seized the gun held by Dillinger and the two Pittenger's back and Dillinger was away to the north.

quoted as saying:

"Don't be a dwant to kill you."

Officer Pittenger said "I don't want to be killed." I have two kids at home."

Struck Four Times.

The two bandits then disarmed Pittenger and struck him three blows over the head and one on the back.

The bandits then marched the officer one block through an alley and half a block along a main street to the jail, concealing their guns under their overcoats and warning him not to make a noise or give a signal.

They followed him up the stairs to the police station which is on the second floor of the city building, over the fire station. Pittenger turned on the light and had an opportunity to compare Dillinger with a large picture of the desperado on the police bulletin board. He was positive of the identification.

After unlocking the door leading to the inner office of the station. Van Meter tore open a glass case on the wall, containing three bullet proof vests. He also picked up a revolver.

JUDGE SETTLES DISPUTE WITH DILLINGER JURY

Expunges Report on Jail Break from Records.

(Picture on back page.)

A settlement of the controversy between Judge William J. Murray of the Lake county, Ind., Circuit court and six grand jurors who aroused the judge's anger by criticisms contained in their report on the escape of John Dillinger from the Crown Point jail was arrived at yesterday. This settlement seemed to be satisfactory to

Judge Murray, who had cited the grand jurors to show cause why they should not be held in contempt, listened to an answer in which the six asserted they had only tried to carry out the court's orders and had no intention of casting personal aspersions upon him. He then expunged the report from the records and ordered the grand jury discharged.

Judge Accepts Answer.

"I am sorry that this has come up, gentlemen," Judge Murray said. "It is not pleasant for the court. I accept the answer. It was unfortunate that you were not better advised."

The grand jurors, in the original report, had sharply criticized the judge for failing to order Dillinger, the most notorious of present day criminals, confined in the Michigan City prison rather than in the Crown Point jail while he was awaiting trial for murder.

Indictments against Ernest Blunk and Sam Cahoon, deputy sherif and jail turnkey, who were accused of willingly aiding Dillinger in his flight, will stand, it was said. It was indicated that Judge Murray plans no more action against Special Prosecutor Martin J. Smith and Deputy Attorney General Homer Barce, advisers of the grand jury in their investigations.

Arraign Dillinger that In Cancago the focus of the arraign the Dillinger case was the arraign ment of Evelyn Frechetti, the publish's woman companion before United States Commissioner travel. Walker. A removal warant for her return to St. Paul was presented, but on motion of the government there was a continuation of the hearing until April 23. "This man Dillinger," said Mr. Green, "is the most dangerous criminal in this country. To set bonds of less than \$200,000 in this matter will place the full responsibility for her appearance on the commissioner."

When the demand for such a high bond was first made by Assistant United States Attorney Austin Hall, there was a vigorous protest from Miss Frechetti's attorney, Louis Piquett.

Dillinger Grand Jurors
Apologize to Judge.

The Lake County grand jury at Grown Point, Ind., yesterday purged itself of contempt before Judge William J. Murray when the six members filed affidavits that they had not intended to cast reflections upon the court in their report criticizing Judge Murray for making possible the escape of John Dillinger.

In their report the jurors expressed the opinion that Judge Murray erred in advising against the transfer of the outlaw to the Michigan City penitentiary after his return from Arizona.

When Attorney Fred Crumpacker, for the jurors, presented a statement of the jurors' position to the court, Attorneys Joseph Conroy and William F. Hodges, as friends of the court, objected that it was more objectionable than the original report.

After a conference the objectionable passages were deleted and the toned-down statement was accepted by the court as satisfactory. He dismissed the citation for contempt and expunsed the original report from the record.

John Dillinger apparently made a clean getaway from the law again today with All of northern Indiana and the Chicago area thrown into intense excitement as he was reported seen at various places after boldly raiding the police station at Warsaw, Ind., and stealing two revolvers and three bullet-proof vests.

Harried police squads dashed hither and thither over Indiana highways in search of clues to the clusive desperado's whereabouts and tracing down reports that he was seen in several localities with a man companion, supposedly the same one who accompanied him on the impudently daring Warsaw raid.

FARMER BATTLES POLICE.

The Dillinger search resulted directly this afternoon in a brisk gun battle between two squads of deputy sheriffs and highway polities and a farmer, Frank Long, who lives near Eina Green, a faw miles from Warsaw and who has threatened to kill any police who sought to arrest him on a warrant charging non-support.

The shooting caused considerable excitement until it was learned that Dillinger did not figure in it.

VANISH INTO AIR.

But all the mad activity by police was in vain and the apparently hottest clue of all collapsed dismally after brief investigation.

Dillinger and his unidentified companion had apparently vanished into thin air in his customary manner after impudently capturing the night policeman of Warsaw marching him to the police station on the second floor of the town half and then coolly leeting the police

Soon after the Warsaw raid state police, vigilantes and deputy sher-iffs apread fan-like over all of northern Indiana, vainty seeking a

trace to the desperado's whereabouts.

Union Miles, a small town not far from Laporte, became the focal

point for the most intense activity during the morning when a woman reported she saw Dillinger boldly kidnep a man on the street there.

Sheriff Alfred Norris and Deputy Sheriff Taylor Ray raced to Union Mills from the county seat, Laporte, and questioned the wo-man, Mrs. R. C. Wheeler, wife of a filling station owner.

She told of a carload of men, one of whom she described as resembling Dillinger, entering Union Mills and seizing a man, forcing him into their car. Then, she said. all sped away toward Chicago.

The alarm was flashed to the police of surrounding towns and Chicago police ordered a strict watch kept upon highways anterng the city from the south.

Then the Union Mills angle colapsed when it was discovered that he "kidnaping" actually was the rrest by a Hammond police squad of Sam Cammine, charged in a warrant with robbery. "Dillinger" surned out to be one of the police-

Meanwhile the search in the teritory around Wasaw was carried m vigorously by thirty deputies and tate police under Sheriff Harley Person, Lieut. Raiph Liggett of the tate force, and Chief Frank Lucas f Warsaw.

Acting on a "tip" that Dillinger ontacted a friend last night in Warsaw, a detail of police was staloned to watch an undisclosed ummer resort locality where the riend suposedly rented a cottage or Dillinger to use as a hideaway. Down in Warsaw, a placid Kos-ciusko County seat of 6,000 inhabitants, Dillinger-positively identified through police photographsand a man companion raided the police station in the Town Hall.

The companion of Dillinger wa partially identified by photographs as Homer Van Meter, 37, of Fort Wayne, Ind., who served time in the Michigan City prison for a bank rebbery at Huntertown, Ind., and was paroled last May on the same day that Dillinger was paroled. The men became close pals in prison. DESTINATION A PUZZLE

Policeman Judd Pittenger, who had been kidnaped and later broke away from the desperadoes, was the hero of the hour. In the excitement of his recital it developed that a second car, carrying two or three men, had been parked near Dillinger's machine and had followed the leader in a scorching exit from Wareaw.

The cars headed north out of the county seat, but there was a suspicion they might have back-tracked and were heading southward for Dillinger's home town in Moores-

ville, Morgan County. Hours later, the two-car cavalcade had not been sighted by any of the state and county squads who were patroling every highway. while, back in Warsaw, Policeman Pittenger was holding the citisenry breathless as he recounted his night's experience as follows:

"I was patrollng my beat and was standing on Buffalo st. at an alley near Center st. (the town's main thoroughfare), when two men approached.

"I didn't know it then, but I learned later the men had been eyeing me for a half hour. Both arried machine guns, and as they approached from the rear I had no chance to draw my revolver.

"The smaller man came up to me, shoved his machine gun at me, and I recognized him at once as Dillinger. I grabbed the gun and deflected it Then the other, larger man pressed his machine gun against my back. Dillinger said, quietly enough:

"Now, you don't want to die."

"I answered: "No, I don't. I've got a wife

and two stide. The outlaw said, persuasively:
"Airight, then let go that gun."

HE "LET'S GO THAT GUN."

Pittenger saw the futility of resisting, he said, and complied. The pair marched him through the alley block and a half to the Tow Hall on Center st, on the account floor of which is the police statistics En route, the officer said, Dillinger remarked

Hunt Dillinger's Cash

John Dillinger's money cachs was hunted this afternoon in a raid on the Lincoln safety deposit vaults at 2805 North Clark street. The clew to Dillinger's safety box, where he is believed to have his "fall money," maybe many thousands, came out of the recent raid in St. Paul when Dillinger, a male confederate and a woman tompanion escaped. The box key was found in the apartment there.

While the raid was in progress United States District Attorney Dwight H. Green charged before United States Commissioner Edwin K. Walker that Dillinger had posted \$45,-000 with a surety company here. The charge was made on a plea that a bond of \$200,000 be fixed for Evelyn Frechetti, charged with aiding and abetting Dillinger's escape. The commissioner, after a lengthy argument, set the woman's bond at \$60,000. Hearing on her removal to St. Paul has been set for April 23.

John Dillinger, who is regarded as the most desperate outlaw in America, today met a policeman who had the courage to try to take his machine gun away from him and who lives to tell the tale.

The hero is Judd Pittinger, who, recognizing Dillinger after being cracked in the head, wrestled with the ace desperado at Warsaw, Ind. Chief of Police Frank Lucas of Warsaw today told, with a degree of understandable pride, how Pittinger fought with the Hoosier wood carver.

Accosted in Alley.

Pittinger was accosted by Dillinger and Howard Van Meter, paroled Indiana convict, in an alley. He said he recognized the notorious outlaw immediately. After they knocked him in the head, he said, they forced him to take them to police headquarters. But not until after he had struggled with Dillinger for his machine gum. Van Meter frustrated him.

Meter as telling him, "this is John Dillinger."

"I know it is," Pittinger replied.
"I've got a wife and kids."

That's why you're still alive."
Dillinger said harshly and ordered him to police headquarters, where the arsenal was taken.

Pittinger alammed the door on them there and later said that if the door had been equipped with a lock they would be there yet. Dillinger and Van Meter took three bulletproof vests, two revolvers and fled.

Meanwhile Indiana again has taken up the search for Dillinger.

Flurry Over Another Chase.

There was a flurry of excitement through northern Indiana when squads of Hammond police dashed over to Union Mills and arrested a man named Camini, charged with robbery and murder. The resort became widespread that Dillinger

There, he reported, the two men looted the armament case, and while they were doing it Pittinger fled. The two raiders chased after him, and they had a scuffle on the stairway, awakening Paul Hodges, city fireman. He saw Dillinger and his companion leave.

Last night's raid was the third of its kind attributed to Dillinger and his mob. Last Oct. 14, two days after the gang had released the desperado from the Lima (O.) jail after killing Sheriff Jesse Sarber,

JUDGE PURGES JURY CITED

Crewn Point, Ind., April 13.—(P) Judge William J. Murray today purged of contempt the six grand jurors who criticized him in their report on John Dillinger's break from the Crown Point jail.

The contempt citation was dismissed by Judge Murray after the six men had filed an answer in which they disavowed any intention of casting aspersions on the court.

The grand jurors had criticised the judge for failing to order Dillinger's transfer to the state prison for safekeeping pending trial on change of slaying Patrick O'Malley East Chicago policeman.

DHLLINGER PAL Dies; Quiz Girl!

Eugene Green, first of the Dilinger mob to be felled by bullets of federal officers, died in a St. Paul (Minn.) hospital yesterday as Department of Justice agents in Chicago questioned Evelyn Freschettl, reputed sweetheart of the autlaw.

Green was shot in a trap three days after Dillinger had fied from a St. Paul hideout with his assistance.

After critically wounding Green, agents seized his wife, who is still being held in the Minnesota city on a charge of conspiring to harbor a fugitive.

Long sought for aiding Dillinger in his escape from the county jail at Crown Point, Ind., Miss Freschetti was arrested Monday night in a restaurant at Austin av. and State st. She has been held by police since then and has been questioned several times by Department of Justice agents.

She has been identified as the woman who, posing as Dillinger's wife, visited him at Crown Point shortly before he brazened bis way out with a wooden revolver.

DILLINGER'S AUTO IS TRACED TO WOMAN BUYER IN INDIANAPOLIS

Indianapolis, Ind., April 10.—[Special.]—Ann Martin, alias Martini, the French-Indian woman who was captured with John Dillinger when he and three other members of his gang were caught at Tucson, Ariz., in January, bought an automobile for Dillinger here last Saturday, it was asserted tonight.

Carrying a purse crammed with \$10 bills, the woman paid cash for an automobile at a downtown salesroom, but when a check was made on the address she gave it was found to be the home of one of Dillinger's nephews, Fred Hancock, who disclaimed any knowledge of the gangster's whereabouts.

The same car was reported seen in Pittsburgh Monday, driven by Dillinger, whose hair, it was said, had been dyed red. With him, according to reports, was John Hamilton, his gunman companion, whose hand was described as being mutilated. Hamilton was wounded in the holdup of the East Chicago bank raid in which Patrolman William O'Malley was alain, it is charged by Dillinger.

The desperado and a companion fied from an automobile which was wrecked near Noblesville early Saturday, it is believed here. In this car a machine gun and a card bearing the name of a St. Paul, Minn, film were found, adding strength to the belief Dillinger had driven south after he escaped from Minneapolis authorities.

DILLINGER JURY FACES CONTEMPT CITATION TODAY

State's Attorney Robert G, Estill of Lake county, Ind., who was preparing to prosecute John Dillinger for murder when the desperado escaped from the Crown Point jail, said yesterday he was undecided what stand he would take in the proceedings today when six grand jurors are to appear to face a citation for contempt of court,

Prosecution of the contempt charge comes under the statutory duties of his office, Mr. Estill explained, but he added that he could delegate an assistant to appear for him inasmuch as he was one of the Lake county officials whose conduct in the Dillinger case was investigated by the jury.

Objects to Language.

The jurors were cited by Circuit Judge William J. Murray because of "scandalous and contemptuous" language in the report today made on Dillinger's jail break. The court took exception to the part of the report which criticized him for not having ordered the transfer of Dillinger to the state penitentiary at Michigan City. Judge Murray holds that the transfer could not legally have been made unless Dillinger's life was in danger.

It was reported in Indiana yesterday that the judge believes the jurors were "unduly influenced." He will seek to determine, it was said, what means were taken to influence them. The jury report declared that State's Attorney Extill was in no way to blame for the escape.

Creatures of the Court

It was explained that under the Indiana law the grand juryrs are "creatures of the court" and answerable to the judge for all their actions and the language of their report. Although grand jury reports have been frequent in Indiana, it was said there is no precedent for citing an entire jury for contempt.

Philip Lutz Jr., attorney general of Indiana, has ruled that the jurious were within their rights in making any findings they saw fit. His deputy Edward J. Larce, is expected appear today to defend the jurious.

OUTGE CITES DILLINGER JURY FOR'CONTEMPT'

Action Looked Upon as Touching Off Political Blast Fuse; Court Charges 'Defamation'

Angered by the grand jury report which held him partly to blame for John Dillinger's escape from the Crown Point jail, Criminal Gourt Judge Murray of Lake County, Indiana, launched contempt of court action against the six jurors yesterday.

His action is looked upon as touching off the fuse of a big political explosion, because the disciplinary steps against the jurors are believed to be but a prelude to punitive measures against Prosecutor Robert G. Estill and his associates.

Estill has already said he would defend the jurors against any consequences of their activities and he is expected to appear with them when they go before Judge Murray on Monday.

JUDGE HUNTS INFLUENCE,

The judge has indicated his determination to learn whether the jury's findings were influenced by Estill, former Judge Martin J. Smith, the special deputy prosecutor, and Assistant Attorney General Edward Barce. If he finds evidence of such influence, he has hinted, he will also cite these three for contempt.

In requiring the jurors to show cause why they should not be held in contempt, Judge Murray described their report of April 3 as "destructive of the respect to court of justice" and "in defamation of the judge of this court."

"Scandalous and contemptuous' was the judge's description of the report, which criticized him for falling to transfer Dillinger from the jail to the state penitentiary at Michigan City.

DEFENDS HIS COURSE.

Defending his course, the judge said he lacked authority to transfer Dillinger unless it were shown the jail was unsafe or that the prisoner was in danger of mob vio-

In deschding the jurors, Estatis is expected to refer to Judge Murray's instructions to them to make a full and frank report, "because J, myself, have been criticized"; and to "name the party or parties responsible for said jail break, whether they are criminally responsible to mot "

Murray Charges Inquiry Defamed Him.

Contempt proceedings were started by Judge William J. Murray of the Lake County [Ind.] Criminal court yesterday against the entire county grand jury which investigated the at Crown Point on March \$, and laid a portion of the blame at Judge Murray's door.

Declaring that the grand jury report was in "scandalous and contemptuous language," the judge ordered the six jurors to appear before him on Monday at 9 a. m., and show cause why they should not be held in direct contempt.

Indiana law provides a penalty for direct contempt of not more than six months in jail, or a fine of not more than \$500, or both. Appeal is to the State Supreme court.

Hint Action Against Estill.

There was no confirmation of earlier reports that Prosecutor Robert G. Estill, and former Judge Martin J. Smith, who aided Estill as a special prosecutor in directing the jury's work, would be the targets of similar nction, after the jurors' case was heard.

The jurors, who made their report last Tuesday, are: Donald Purday, a farmer of Hobart, Ind., the foreman; Joshua Tyler, a farmer of Shelby; John Langerman, a medical supply salesman of Hammond; Charles Butt of Gary, a plumber; Walter Powell of Hobart. a mechanical engineer, and Fred Niemeyer, a farmer of Crown Point.

"The report," said Judge Murray, in issuing his order, "is worded in language not contemplated in law. It is lacking in the respect due courts of justice, and judicial officers, and is particularly disrepectful to this par-ticular court and its present judge.

"It is in defamation of the judge, and contains languages which scandal-ize the court."

Cites Transfer Criticism.

The judge cited the passage in the report which criticized him for not issuing an order for the transfer of Dillinger from the county jail at Crown Point to the Indiana state penitentiary at Michigan City, as suggested by Prosecutor Estill.

The court had no authority to order such a transfer, Judge Murray said, unless Dillinger's life were endangered by mob violence. The jury, in the report, had said that the judge "could, and should have ordered the transfer.

The judge, discussing the passage in the report which exonerated Ma Estili and Sherif Lillian Folley, esemed to believe that, by inference, the report of the jury had placed a stigms upon him.

Provoked by Criticism.

Other passages provoking the judge's ire were those criticing Raiph Pierce, Judge Murray's ballit, for not making a proper search of Dillinger and his quarters in the jail, and the conclusion of the report that it was "important that citizens here after look into the qualifications of all candidates for office."

This, the judge ruled, was also con-temptuous. In explaining why he had waited until yesterday to start the contempt proceedings. Judi

FJND DILLINGER CAR IN GARAGE IN MANKATO, MINN.

St. Paul, Minn., April 8 .- (P)-The green automobile in which John Dillinger, outlaw, fled from St. Paul March 21 with another man and a woman, has been found in a garage at Mankato, Minn., it became known here tonight.

The car, it was learned, was brought to the garage by a man said by authorities to have been Tommy Carroll, pal of Dillinger. It had been left with instructions for repainting the wheels, changing hub caps, the name of the car filed off, and the body refinished.

The federal government got a trace of the automobile last week, and since Friday had maintained a guard at the building. The guard was reported to have been withdrawn tonight.

Dillinger and his companions es caped from a St. Paul apartment after a machine gun fight with federal agents. Dillinger was reported to have been wounded in the leg.

Authorities learned Carroll had purchased a light car from a dealer at Maskato. He is believed to have caped in the new machine.

DILLINGER AND AID SLIP OUT OF POLICE NET

South Bend Druggist Tells of the Two Buying Cigarets; Roads Are Combed in Vain

John Dillinger apparently escaped from another trap laid by the police of Indiana and Michigan yesterday.

Dillinger, if it was the desperado, sped by the Niles, Mich., police station early in the morning and disappeared, as state police blocked the roads as far as St. Joseph.

South Bend police were put on the trail when a druggist reported Dillinger and a man believed to be Homer Van Meter gtopped in his store at midnight to buy primers. The two left in a black La Bair was seen by Niles police, traveling north at a high rate of speed. ASKS BOUNDABOUT WAY.

Previously the desperado had stopped at the home of friends in Elkhart and asked directions for a roundabout route to South Bend. He told the friends, whose names were not revealed, that Van Meter was in the car with him.

Roads for a radius of thirty miles were blocked by police and every car stopped, but no trace was found of Dillinger and his companion.

The hunt for the desperado is directed from three centers in Isdismapolis, Chicago and St. Paul. A crew of fifty picked operatives from the Department of Justice has organized a net which they feel confident the clusive criminal cannot escapa.

HELD A GIVING DILLINGER HELP

Bandit's Pay Agent Died in Ambush.

St. Paul, Minn., April 18.—[Special.]
—With the disclosure today that John
Dillinger, Indiana desperado, had been
wounded in his gun battle with police
and federal agents here on March 81,
a Minneapolis physician and his nurse
were taken into government custody.
The physician, Dr. Clayton E. May,
and the nurse, Mrs. Gurniath La Delle,
were charged with conspiracy to harbor a fugitive from justice.

They were arraigned before United States Commissioner W. T. Goddard and pleaded not guilty. Their bonds were set at \$50,000 each and a pre-liminary hearing was set for May 3.

Bandit Shot in Leg.

Dillinger, still at large, and his sweetheapt velyn Frechette, who is now in come in Chicago on a charge of harborn, the gangster from justice, shot their way out of the police trap here. Bloodstains following Dillinger's footsteps indicated he had been sounded in a leg.

Federal thorities said that Dr. May was have been paid \$500 for treating Damger but never received the money. Eugene Green, one of Dillinger's henchmen, was to have taken the money to the physician on April \$, but he was ambushed and fatally wounded by federal operatives as he stopped in St. Paul to get his luggage en route to Minneapolis.

According to department of justice agents, Dr. May and Mrs. La Delle made statements identifying Dillinger as their patient. The seriousness of the gangster's wound was not disclosed. Dr. May failed to make a report of the case, authorities said, although Minnesota law requires the reporting of all cases of gunshot wounds. Dillinger, it was understood, told the physician that the wound was suffered accidentally.

Federal operatives had been hunting for two weeks the physician who treated Dillinger.



Special Agent 7. H. Riss, who with Special Agent M. S. W. Millespie, had been covering a watch at S41 Cornelia Avenue, telephoned the Chicago Division Office at 7 AM. April 13. 1996, and stated he had observed a new-appearing black Ford V-6 Sedan parked around the corner from 841 Cornelia Avenue, this car beauting 1934 Minnesota lisense plates # D95-M64. Agent Rice Later telephoned at 7:40 A.M. advising he had observed two men and a woman entering this car and drive away; that he was able to get a Tairly good look at the men, but from his observations they did not answer to the descriptions of any of the persons in this mass.

Upon receipt of the above information, the Chicago Office sent a teletype message to the St. Paul Office furnishing the above information, and requested that a check be made on the license and the Chicago Office advised. Shortly thereafter a teletype was received from Inspector Clegg of the St. Paul Office, advising that the above mentioned license plates were issued to R. D. Dattin for a 1933 Ford Coupe, motor #18-480865, the address given being 4435 Portland Avenue, but that an investigation revealed that no such address is in St. Paul.

Agent R. G. There a Mrs. Avischious, of the first floor, was interviewed, and the advised that she did not know a Miss Lucile Fields who was supposed to live at this address, and that her son lived immediately shows her and that a Mrs. Stell lived in the passment. Agents interviewed Mrs. Virginia Stell in the basement of this address, and she denied knowing a Lucile Fields or of ever having heard of her.

Since the telephone call of April 18, 1934, ad additional information has been received from The Lucile Fields.

On the morning of April 19, 1954, Mr. Connelley reported that the address given in Louisville, Kentucky by Otto Makbee, former a prisoner in the Indiana State Prison, Michigan City, is false; that no such number was found there; that Kriel is not the sponsor of Malbee and evidently Malbee gave prison officials false information in this respect. He advised that Kriel is a bookmaker in Louisville and is a friend of the Chief of Police; that the Chief of Police talked with Kriel on April 18, and that Kriel denied any knowledge of the matter. It was the opinion that Mr. Commelley that Millinger was in Louisville Saturday night, April 14, 1934, wearing a light brown overcoat mixed with gray and a light brown but with a band darker than the hat, a blue suit, black shoes; that Billinger previously had a light gray summer suit and generally wears his bat well down over his eyes. Mr. Connelley further advised that the doctor who was approached in Louisville positively identifies this man as Dillinger and states that Dillinger kept on hie overcoat and had his hand on his pistol in his pocket all the time he was telking to the doctors that he spoke yery roughly to the doctor, who offered to treat him at that time, Dillinger desiring exray treatment on his left leg; that Dillinger was, however, unwilling to wait for the treatment on Saturday, apparently becoming suspicious and made on appointment for Monday April 16, which he did not keep!

Mr. Larsen reported on the monring of April 19 that Mr. Commelley arrived at Muncie, Indiana, on April 18 at about 8 P.M., and that both Mr. Connelley and Mr. Larsen took the informant for a drive because the informant was afraid to meet them anywhere. He further stated that the informant told them that he had been to Indianapolis and that he had seen Mary Kinder there; that Mr. Larson and Mr. Connelley believed that the informant must have lied about having seen Mary Kinder in Indianapolis because the description given by informant of the woman he saw did not at all fit that of Mary Kinder. However, the informant stated that the woman he saw in Indianapolis was to go to Muncie, Indiana to see one Hught Berry; that Berry, according to Mr. Larson, formerly served time in the Indiana State Prison at Michigan City. The Chicago Office is checking the record of Hugh Berry to varify the same, and the results will be reported at a later date.

Mr. Larsen and Mr. Connelley went to the place operated by Berry in Muncie and watched for a while, but did not see the informant go in. Informant had previously stated that he was to see Berry on the evening of April 18. Later Mr. Larson advised he went in and talked

to Berry under cover and Berry took him in a back room phere My Larson saw the informant; that the informant then lieft and Berry informed Mr. Larson that he fild not know Mary Kinder; that one Russ, last name unknown, has gotten in touch with him about a week ago and wanted Berry to keep two man for him, names unknown at the present time; that Berry told Russ that he would keep them if there were enough money in it for him. Mr. Larson believes that the two men Berry was to keep might be Hamilton and Gillinger, or it might be that Russ wanted Berry to help on a kidnapping of Ball, hereinbefore referred to. Mr. Larson advised he was endeavoring to contact informant again in Muscie; that he plained to leave Muscie about noon and go to Detroit via Chicago. Mr. Purvis advised that Mr. Gonnelley want back to indianapolis at midnight an April 18, 1934. Mr. Larson suggested that the informant could contact Mr. Commaliey at Indianapolis. It was suggested by Mr. Purvis that Mr. Larson remain in Muscie for the purpose of making additional contacts with Berry and the informant, and to remain there until at least April 20, 1934. Mr. Purvis requested advice relative to these plans, which plans were approved by the Division.

Inspector Clegg, at St. Paul, furnished information to Mr. Purvis that the doctor and nurse and Bessie Skinner in St. Paul have advised that Millinger is very fat now and weighs about 187 lbs; that photographs in their possession do not resemble him; that out of the number of characteristic closeups of Dillinger exhibited to the above people, contained on the photograph of group pictures, the above people selected two which resemble him most. This information was transmitted by Mr. Purvis to Agent Donnegan for Mr. Connelley and asked that an effort be made to contact Mr. Larsen in order to give him this information.

According to Mr. Harris, Dotty Humes left on the night of April 18, probably with the men she had been seen with, but he does not know where she went and does not know of any change in her plans.

On April 19, 1934, Agents Van Wagomer and Jamison conducted ar investigation to varify the statement made by Evelyn Frechette to Agent Deadrick on Bunday, April 8, 1934; that she left Indianapolis with John Dillinger in a Ford V-8 Deluxe Sedan, with black body, black wheels, spare tipe on the rear, bearing 1934 Indiana yags a 86-389; and that on that night she and Dillinger had stayed at a tourist camp located on a highway 6 about 84 miles before reaching Chicago; that at this point there is a tourist camp on the right hand side of the road with a white building in front; that they did not register, and that the following day, Monday, April 29, she and Inlinger left the camp in the Ford Sedan shortly after noon and drove around the country until dark.

Igents Van Magoner and Jamison left Chicago by way of Boute fl to its intersection with U. S. Boute f6, which is 22 miles south of the Chicago Loop. Proceeding eastward on Boute f6 to the intersection of Burnham and 189th Street, Calumet City, Illinois, they found a roadhouse and tourist camp situated on the north side of highway f6, which is known as The Pines. The main building is painted white and has tourist cabins in the rear, and in other respects appeared to answer to the meagre description furnished by Evelyn Frechette, The manager of the roadhouse, May Banghart, was

interviewed, and he stated that he had purchased this conthouse from Mr. Arthur Mistler, who resides at 7000 State line Street. Ristler stated, however, that on April 8 he had been in charge of the Pines, but demied that anyone had rented a cabin or rooms on Sunday April 8. Kistler stated, however, that either on Saturday, April 7, or on Sunday, April 8, a man and a woman had entered the place; that the woman had remained at the front of the building, and that the man had gone back to the rear where the bar is located and had a conversation with Kistler. Matler stated that this med had fold him that he had just bought new Ford in Ohio, and had griven in from Ohio that day, that he man tired and worn out; that his fest and legs were swelling from the long drive and that he would like to get a gabin and take a shower Kistler told this man that he was unable to accommodate him, and referred him to the Savoy Hotel in Hammond, Indiana, which has a Turkish bath, and recommended that he stay there. Kistler was shown photographs of Dillinger and Evelyn Prephette, and stated that the photograph of Dillinger did not resemble the man who had been trying to rent a cabin from him. Kistler stated he had been unable to get good look at the women and could furnish no description of her-

Mr. P. H. Snyder, manager of the Savoy Hotel, Hammond, Indiana, was interviewed and he produced his register for Sunday, April 8. Only six persons were registered on that date, the only somen being a Ties Smith, address not given, who registered is those 224 at 7 2.16 was severaled.

igents proceeded dust on highway so to a point about a miles beyond Gary, Indiana, but found only one other tourist samp which was open. This camp is known as the Tourist Camp Beautiful Highland, Illinois, and is managed by Malter Hughes. Mr. Highest stated that he had not rented any cabins during the month of April and was quite positive that no man accompanied by a woman had rented a cabin on Sunday, April 8.

Appropriate inquiry was made along the route of filling stations as to locations of other tourist came, but agents were invariably informed that the cames were elosed and would not open until warmer weather. The Pines tourist came, above referred to was the only one noted which appeared in any way to conform to the description furnished by Evelyn Frechette.

In regard to the attached senorandum of April 21, 1934, from Er. Stapleton, commring a conversation which he had with Er. Class concern ing the facts in the case of Dr. H. G. Mortenson, the treated John Dillinger. I believe that action should be taken against Dr. Mortenson of some characters. I note that he violated the State Statute in connec tion with this matter, which apparently carries a more govern possity than the Pederal law covering the harboring of a fugitive, and I think that the Division should take steps to see that this doctor is prosecute under this State law. I note that Mr. Clear is of the opinion that me publicity should be given to the matter et this time, and further is inclined to the view that me action should be taken against Dr. Nortenson because of the possibility that he might be used as a witness against Pat Reilly in the event Reilly is apprehended. We have, apparently, a sworn statement from Dr. Mortenson which I believe would be of evidentiary value in any event. Furthermore, I believe that an example should be made of this physician, particularly in view of his official status in the medical profession in St. Paul. I wish that you would confer with Mr. Clogg by phone concerning this matter, and obtain any further views which he may have upon it. I think the matter is of sufficient importance for a careful and detailed statement to be prepared for the Atterney Constal, as he may desire to make the release concerning the activities of this physician from Mashington, but of course, before doing this, I would like to have the detailed facts from Mr. Clegg, and obtain any visus he may have concerning this possible action, for I do not want to take any action which might in any way interfere with the efforts of Mr. Clegg and the Agents at St. Paul. However, I do not feel Dr. Mortenson is entitled to any consideration, and for that reason should be publicly, exposed and presecuted for the action which he has indulged in-**美工工作**







MEMORANDUM FOR THE DIRECTOR.

I called Mr. Clegg at Rhinelander, Wisconsin, and asked him whether a constable was injured in the shooting that occurred there. Mr. Clegg advised that he understood that a constable or a Deputy Sheriff was shot three times; that he is in a hospital at the present time but that he was not seriously wounded. I asked Mr. Clegg whether the car that Agent Newman was driving was stolen. Mr. Clegg advised that he had heard at first that the car was stolen but later had heard that it was not; that, however, he has not heard all of the details as yet.

In reply to your question as to the details of the shooting, particularly the killing of a C.C.C. man and the wounding of two others, Mr. Clegg advised that as the house was approached some dogs started barking; that three men started to leave the house and enter one of the machines; that they were instructed to stop and were told that officers of the law were instructing them to stop but they refused; that as they started to get into the car our Agents shot at the tires; that as soon as they started firing machine gun fire started from the house between the roof and the ground and the men in the car were shot.

Mr. Clegg advised that it was safe to state definitely that Dillinger, Hamilton, Van Meter and Carroll were in the house but he did not know whether they were there at the time of the shooting as the girl there stated that they left before that; that inquiry was made of the owner of the place and he stated that he was in the beer room at the time and did not know, but that they had not checked out.

Mr. Clegg advised that the Ford V-8 that they now have has the same tags on it that were on the automobile that was used at the time that the Frechette woman was in Chicago; that the car contained Dillinger's baggage; that one of the bags contained a machine gun and a high powered rifle; that they also have another car and both cars are being processed at the present time.



In regard to the attached memorandum dated April 21, 1934, from Special Agent Brik G. Peterson covering a se versation which he had with Special Agent in Charge Connellay, I am willing for the time being that no legal action be taken against Hubert/Dillinger and the members of his family who were present at the farm of the father of Dillinger on April 8th. However, if they do not extend the cooperation which they have indicated they will. I think very definite action should be taken against all, ar at least against those who do not extend such cooperation. on the ground of harboring a fugitive. Will you please keep this matter is mind and inform Mr. Connelley that we want him to be certain to have sufficient facts as that he may at any time, or orders from this office, and proceed against may or all of these persons. I am make strongly of the epinion that any person who renders any aid or assistance to Dillinger and his associates should be immediately arrested under the Federal charge unless such person would prove to be a source of information that might ultimately bring about Dillinger's apprehen sion.


