Concerning the escape of Dillinger from Little Bohemia Resost run by Winetka on Spider Lake, closest R. R. station Mercer, in Iron County, Wis.

It would appear Winetka was not a stranger to Dillinger, who had visited that section previously.

The writer is familar with the surrounding country having staid at Deer Park Lodge, resort, on Manitowish Lake. Spider Lake, in which I have fished, is not far north of Manitowish Lake. Spider empties into Stone Lake, and Stone empties into Manitowish. north to south. Koerner's (not Turner's Resort) is on Stone Lake. This resort, I have understood, when in that section, is a hang-out for gamblers et al from Chicago and doubtless "Little Bohemia" is in the same class. These resorts are an over-night ride from Chicago, on the Ashland Division of the C. & N. W. Ry. Closest R. R. stations are Mercer and Manitowish.



I telephoned Chicago and gave Mr. Purvis the information obtained from Mr. Rorer to the effect that a note was found under the rug in Dillinger's room, containing the following information:

Under the rug in Dillinger's room was found a little penciled notation at the top of which appeared the words 'Red Hair', and that under that appears 'Perl Hellman', with a little 'a' over the top of Perl indicating that it should be Pearl. Then the address 305 Harrison Street, Wishawka, Indiana, appears. Under that there is a notation which looks like a telephone number, 'ked 7357', there is a line drawn under that and beneath the line there appears '3307 Wine Boulevard, Apartment 705".

I also advised Mr. Purvis of the letter written to Lieutenant Piquette which was found in Dillinger's room. Mr. Purvis advised that the wrist watch and two rings mentioned in this letter had been obtained and were now in the possession of the Marshal.

Mr. Purvis advised that the two cars which were taken were being brought into Chicago, that the Buick coupe is a very good car and that he plans to use it.

I inquired as to the informant at Columbus, and Mr. Purvis stated that he would get in touch with him soon and advise him that he would have to produce the goods before any more money would be paid.

In addition to the above I gave Mr. Purvis the description which Mr. Rorer gave of the individual named Pat, who it is thought might be Pat Riley.

With regard to the shooting of the C.C.C.worker, Mr. Purvis advised that there wasno question that the individuals in the car heard the command to halt, and that there was no other alternative than to stop them when they refused to halt as Dillinger could have been in that car.

Mr. Purvis stated that he could/state definitely that any persons had left the rear of the building as he was on the other side and could not see from his position. In regard to the shooting of Agents Baum, Newman and the constable, Mr. Purvis advised that he had left before the complete inquiry into that affair had been finished and that he could not state definitely just what had happened.





MEMORANDUM FOR MR. COWLEY

Reference is made to your request as to whether the Division had a record and photograph of PatoReilly alias PatoRiley, who is the all-round handy man for Harry Sawyer, the well-known St. Paul gangster. A search of the files reflects that Pat Reilly's name had not come up prior to the developments in the Dillinger case at St. Paul, Minnesota about two weeks ago. The reports received do not reflect a description, criminal record or police number, nor has a photograph been received from the St. Paul Office.

With your consent, I called Mr. Clegg at St. Paul today for information concerning this, and he stated the St. Paul Police Department did not have a record of arrest of Pat Reilly and that no photograph of him had been located; that Reilly was a former mascot of the St. Paul American Association League Baseball Team. I suggested to Mr. Clegg that possibly a photograph of the baseball team could be obtained, in which there appeared Pat Reilly. However, Mr. Clegg stated that such a photograph could be located but would probably be of little value, inasmuch as it was several years ago, when Reilly was a kid, that he acted as mascot. I suggested to Mr. Clegg that Dr. Mortenson, who has treated Pat Reilly might be able to give a detailed description of him, through which a record might possibly be located, in the files of the Identification Unit. Mr. Clegg stated that this would be given attention immediately and that such information as could be obtained would be forwarded.

Mr. Clegg, during the conversation stated that the Attorney, Piquet from Chicago, who has formerly been employed by Evelyn Frechette, was at that time in the St. Paul Office, and was demanding to see Evelyn Frechette; that Piquet had with him a Treasury check in the amount of \$50, payable to Evelyn Frechette, drawn on Account F-35, Authority #5, Treasury #17418, and drawn by the Keshena Indian Agency by W. Beyer, which Attorney Piquet desired to give to Evelyn Frechette.

Subsequently, he called, advising that after Carroll's arrest on August 18, 1926, he had been released, the date not being shown on their records, Carroll being subsequently re-arrested on September 30, 1926, on a charge of bank robbery; being acquitted of this bank robbery charge on January 20, 1927, upon the establishment of an alibi. Thereafter, on January 28, 1927, the complaint against Carroll for larceny of an automobile was dismissed by the Prosecuting Attorney at St. Joseph, Missouri.



Dillinger at Mooresville is located one one road with no trees, fence or other protection in front of it, about 75 to 100 feet back off the road on knold which causes it to sit out from the houses, there is a road that runs in the back of it approximately a quarter of a miles with an open field between it and the houses and barns of the home of John W. Dillinger about one half mile beyond the house is the County road which connects these two racks placing the property in which the Dillinger home is located in a sort of a triangle. There is no cover at this place whereby the place can be observed the the nearest house to it is the home of a very close friend for whom John at one time worked and the house immediately to the Dillinger home is the house to the bouse of a fellow named ASmithers who is also a close personal friend of the father's and who is considered a questionable character and would not give any information in any which would lead to cause the apprehension of Dillinger. The only possible way to cover the pr the road was by cruising the vicinity, which activity was also being carried on I understand by the Indianapolis Police. Agents Wynn and Littleheles . had proceeded to Kokomo, Ind., to check the activities of Pearl XE liot who was at one time connected with the outfit and was picked up with them in Tucson. On that

same Saturday night Agent Johnson was covering various matters here at the Hotel in lining up the general details of the work for the new men who were coming in and also on this night it was reported from Chicago that EvelynoFrechetti would come in an a plane from that paint judging from a telephone call received by a private pilot there which indicated that it was her although she had not identified herself and everybody was on duty all night in order to cover this matter and be available for it. On Sunday the various men were divided into crews! Geraghty and Donegan first went to 930 Dailey Street where they picked up Mary Kinder moving from this address to 516 Luett Street and thereafter proceeded to Mooresville after covering the filling station where Hubert Dillinger and Fred Hancock worked. Sears and Weeks proceeded to Noblesville to check further the vicinity of the wreck there for any further information. Wynn and Littlehales were still located at Kokomo and vicintizaty checking further as to Pezzl Elliot and her activities she having been reported seen in that vicinity. Geraghty and Donegan picked up the car of Hubert at the father's house and and passing the house on the second trip they had proceeded down the road and they went into Mooresville to check up on his activity there and picked up Fred Hancock and Hubert in the car and at this time the car with the Indiana license which was purchased as later shown in Indianapolis on Saturday was proceeding ahead of the other car and returned in the direction of the home of the father John W. Dillinger, and thereafter they followed him out the road leading to Springfield but could not locate his car. At this time they noticed the Ford which was brougt here on Saturday as was later shown standing along the road with three girls in the car and after proceeding gown the road they again picked up Hubert's c ar and a party in it who later proved apparently to be Norman and in following them to a certain turn they turned to the right and the Agents turned to the left as apparently Hubert had made them following him and at this time Eubert who was driving noticed them apparently through the mirror, and Norman Hancock placed his hands to his face and ducked down into the car, apparently to avoid being seen. It was pater shown through an interview with Hubert Dillinger, Norman Hancock and Norman, Hancock that apparently the four cars proceed out of the place, Hubert and Norman in the first carwhich belonged to Hubert, proceeded down to the gate and picked them up, apparently the Ford V8 Sedan which was standing on the road was the next car out of the place which was followed then by the car occupied the Ardry Hancock, the mother of Fred Hancock and the sister of Halant John Dillinger . The last car to have leave the place was the car waxof Fred Hancock and the Agents taking the car which apparently contained the best possibilities took the car of Rubert Dillinger which eluded them in the vicinity of the home there on the back roads. This car was subsequently checked up through the license numbers on the car and was found to have been sold on Saturday and the license had not yet been registered having been issued by the Hoosier Auto Club here which was closed at the time and the registeration had not yet reached the state Bureau.

The balance of the Agents were distibuted on various activities, Barber and Smith arrived in late that day had also proceeded to Mooresville to assist in

the activities there and later they picked up the car of Hubert Dillinger in front of 516 Luett Street, which was immediately thereafter raided but no one was there except Mary Kinder and her Mother. Hirsh(?) was here covering the activities at the airport and Johnson was at the Hotel inorder to place the warious men as they arrived in the city.

The two Agents who were cruising in the vicinity of the Father's home were armed with revolvers only because of the fact thatthere were not sufficients arms to cover all of the places in the territory here, we were covering Lebanon, Ky., with two Agents, and Hampton, Ohio, with three Agents and _____, Ohio with three . Agents with the possibility of Dillinger showing up at anyone of the points

being covered.

As to the present cover being maintained on the home of John W. Dillinger and the other places here in this vicinity, the men have been patrolling the the place and vicinity for 24 hours continously, the neighbors and of such character as to make it hard to get a cover for a man, we located one farmhouse which was some distance but we could use glasses and immediately this became known to the neighbors who are very inquisitive which eliminated the possibility of using that point, so the real cover now is being maintained by a surveillance of the place and vicinity by cruising night and day with the available Agents as they can be placed and also cover the additional work here. We have a room located across the street from Mary Kinder where the men have been on duty 24 hours a day. We have now located a house in which we can secure a room across from the filling station where we can watch this place which is open from eight to eight and the place where in the past the contact has been made by Dillinger when he arrived in town throught his brother Hubert. In addition to that we also now have the situation at Muncie where SAC Larson is located and Agent Wood is with him tonight at this point. There is also a possibility here through a brother of Mrs. Pierpoint who I understand from the Detroit Office has dismappeared from Leipzig, Ohio driving a trailer and a Auburn car which she had proceeded previously and there is no information as yet as to where she is located. If surveillance is to be maintained on her brother at Muncie it will require at least four additional Agents for that point alone. Agent Geraghty had to return to New York on subpoens. Agent Wood will have to go to Cincinnati tomorrow morning inorder to take care of matters there inasmuch Agent Klein had to proceed to Patterson, N.J. as his Mother is reported to be dying. We have three men located in Dayton, Ohio, Roberts, Treadwell and Fletcher, Agent Harris is Columbus is maintaining contact with his informant Hamilton, Ohio, we have a place located there where if the outfit comes in there for cover they will und ubtedly contact them. Agent wood is located in Muncie with SAC Larson at the present time . Agents Russell and Hurley are covering & the vicinity of Lebanon, Ky.,. The situation here is that if we are to maintain surveillance 24 hours in all of these places it will be necessary to have additional men as we will have to have about four men to cover the situation at Muncie and possibly we should have about six more men in Indianapolis to cover such places as Mary Kinder's and the John W. Dillingers place at Mooresville and Hubert Dillinger.

We have definitely the promise of Norman Hancock aFred Hancock and Hubert Dillinger without the others knowing it that they will turn up Dillinger should

he come in there inorder to avoid the possible charges against the family and also to avoid the possibility of some of them being killed should he be taken at one of these places should he arrive there. We also have our informant located in the home of Hubert Dillinger who will report to us any activities he learns at any time.

The information is as I have previously advised over the telephone that Hubert Dillinger was driving the car at the time it was wrecked at Noblesville Ind., and for that reason he is growing apprehensive as to the possibilities of prosecution of himself as well as that of his Mother and Father, and for that reason he has agreed very definitely to furnish us with information and if he does nt live up to it we will get the same information from the informant whom we have placed in Hubert's home. Hubert has taken his wife to live with her Grandmother at Bloomington, Ind., because apparently he was aprehensive that somethingh would happen to her, in fact the night that he took her to Bloomington was the night that the Police, Station in Warsaw, Ind., was robbed on the following morning at about 1:15 AM."

Mr. Connelley stated that in view of the fact that Dillinger had been seen up at Sault Saint Marie on Tuesday it is possible that he might be showing up most any time in the vicinity of Indianapolis and therefore he felt that more Agents would be needed to adequately cover the the various places now under surveillance.

Mr. Martin J. Willan called on the telephone. He advised that he has a summer home in Northern Wisconsin and that he would like to make a suggestion relative to raids conducted in an effort to apprehend Dillinger. He suggested that when making plans to conduct raids the Division should contact the Game Warden; that the Game Warden knows all roads and by-roads and he also can get in touch with hunters who are experts in the use of rifles; that the roads should be blocked about a mile from the place where the raid is to be made, and not close by, by the use of trucks; that the men with the rifles should be placed behind trees, and that this action could be taken even in cities, he having in mind the apartment from which Dillinger escaped in St. Paul. Mr. Gillan was advised that the suggestion was an excellent one, provided there was sufficient time in which to so block the roads, but that in the case he had in mind the Division did not have time to make these arrangements.

Mr. Gillan advised that Mark Sullivan is one of his closest friends; that he was here during the War and that he had done some confidential work for George Peeke, of the Shipping Board. Mr. Gillan said that he would appreciate an opportunity to call at this office and I advised him that I would be glad to see him. He was thanked for his suggestion.

MEMORANDUM FOR THE DIRECTOR

Last night, April 25, 1934, I called the Chicago Office and talked with Acting Special Agent in Charge Billings, in order to obtain a photograph of George ("Baby Face") Nelson, Illinois State Penitentiary #5437, to be used on an Identification Order. which was being prepared. I informed Mr. Billings that Nelson's picture had appeared in a Chicago Police Department Bulletin, a copy of which the Division had; however, that since this picture could not be clearly reproduced, it was desired that the Chicago Office obtain last night either from the Chicago Police Department or the Illinois State Penitentiary, a glossy finished photograph of Nelson, and that it be forwarded to the Division not later than last night, by air mail, special delivery. I also requested him to obtain from the Illinois State Penitentiary, a list of all relatives of Nelson, if available. Mr. Billings was informed that the Division desired this photograph to be used on an Identification Order. He advised that this would be attended to.

This morning I noted a telegram from the Chicago Office, received late last night, signed by Special Agent in Charge Purvis, in which it was stated that that office had been unable as yet to obtain a list of the relatives of Nelson and that the Division would be advised further today. Inasmuch as the telegram did not refer to the photograph of Nelson, I called Special Agent in Charge Purvis on the telephone for information as to whether the photograph had been forwarded. Mr. Purvis, after making inquiry in the office, advised that the photograph had not been forwarded but that same would be done immediately. I them informed Mr. Purvis as to my request of Mr. Billings, advising him that the Identification Order was ready to be printed and was being held up, pending the arrival of this photograph was mailed immediately.

MEMORANDUM FOR THE DIRECTOR.

In connection with the newspaper article appearing in the Washington Times on April 25, 1934, I communicated with Special Agent in Charge Purvis by telephone and advised him of the accusation made by Oscar G. *Olander. State Commissioner of Public Safety of Lansing, Michigan, to the effect that Federal Agents had refused to cooperate with Michigan State Treepers at Sioux Ste. Marie and Rhinelander or Mercer, Wisconsin. I read this part of the article to Mr. Purvis. He stated that though he was not in Sioux Ste. Marie himself no such request had been made of him by Mr. Olander or any member of his force and that he knew of no such request being made of any of the Agents from the Chicago office. He stated further that it was reasonably certain that no such request was made in that the information concerning Dillinger came from the Sheriff's office at Sigux Ste. Marie and that his men proceeded there immediately without contacting any officers outside of the Sheriff and his Deputy at Sioux Ste. Marie. In connection with the general accusation that the Division had failed to cooperate with local authorities Mr. Purvis was of the opinion that same should be ignored. Concerning the charges made by Commissioner Olander Mr. Purvis stated that he had always been on very friendly terms with him and that Olander had offered full cooperation. Though he stated he did not consider it of much importance he thought it would be all right for Mr. Larson to contact Mr. Olander to determine whether he had been accurately quoted.

I also talked with Mr. Clegg in connection with this article and advised him that the newspaper indicated that petitions were being filed at Rhizelander, Ironwood, Eagle River and Mercer, Wisconsin, for the suspension by Mr. Purvis. Mr. Clegg stated that he did not know of the petitions being filed in the communities other than the one at Mercer and that Mr. Rorer was now endeavoring to determine the source from which this petition emanated; that when he next heard from Mr. Rorer, who was going to report to him, he would advise him of the other petitions and request that the source of same also be determined. Mr. Clegg stated that in his conversation with Mr. Rorer he asked whether his, Mr. Clegg's, presence was necessary in that vicinity and Mr. Rorer stated that in his opinion there was no reason why he should come there; that things were going along nicely and were very quiet. Mr. Clegg stated that he thought it would probably be advisable for Mr. Larson to

Mr. Olander in connection with his alleged statement, provided that Mr. Larson and Olander were on friendly terms. In connection with the matter of the Attorney General issuing a statement to the effect that the Division did not call upon local authorities for assistance because of the insufficient time and the necessity for immediate action he was inclined to recommend against such a statement on the grounds that it would probably lead into an endless controversey and might not be able to be defended successfully. He stated, however, that in connection with Senator Copeland's statement to the effect that a decided lack of cooperation had existed between Federal. State and local agencies he thought it would be advisable for the Attorney General to issue a statement to the effect that the Division of Investigation had received wonderful cooperation from local authorities throughout the middle west in this case; that though the statement of Senator Copeland may have been aimed at the Division the local authorities throughout the middle west had interpreted it as a criticism of them and had been quite concerned. Mr. Clegg stated that the accusations aimed at the Division in the newspaper article which was read to him in part did not concern him but that the Copeland statement did in that local authorities were interpreting it as a criticism of them. In connection with the statement indicating the lack of judgment on the part of Agents Newman and Baum Mr. Clegg stated that he thought it useless to endeavor to determine the source of this information in that it would probably be impossible and, further, that there were other matters which he considered more important which should be given immediate attention.

I then contacted Mr. Larson, of the Detroit office, concerning the purported statement made by Commissioner Olander. Mr. Larson advised that he had just had a conversation with Lieutenant Donald Leonard, of the Michigan State Troopers, who advised that he had heard from Lansing that when the Agents arrived at Sioux Ste. Marie and were in conference with the Sheriff a Lieutenant of the Michigan State Troopers offered to cooperate with the Division and Sheriff in causing Dillinger's apprehension and was curtly advised by a Division Agent, name unknown, that when the Division wanted the assistance of the Michigan State Troopers it would so advise them.

I then endeavored to contact Mr. Purvis, who was out of the office, and talked to Mr. Waters who advised that Agents Reinecke, Lockerman, Brown, Rice and Faulkner proceeded to Sioux Ste. Marie in connection with this matter and consulted Sheriff Welch and his Chief Deputy, McKee; that he now understands from Agent Lockerman that there was a Lieutenant of the Michigan State Troopers at the Sheriff's office at the time but he was not in the conference and that some statement may have been made to him concerning the proposed raid but he would have to determine the statement and the source of same. After the facts have been obtained from Mr. Purvis or Mr. Waters I will so advise Mr. Larson and request that he contact Mr. Olander and advise him that the incident at Sioux Ste. Marie was regrettable and the result of an over-zealous Agent and did not reflect the attitude of the Division.

Mr. Clegg called about 3:30 P.M. from St. Paul and stated that they had succeeded in locating a photograph and fingerprints of PatoBeilly, the first lieutenant of Harry Sawyer; that Pat Reilly was arrested under the name of Albert W. Reilly by the St. Paul Police Department on Jammary 7, 1931 for investigation and was released. His description is as follows:

Remarks: He is believed to be heavier and probably slightly taller.

Mr. Clegg stated that the Police advised that copies of the fingerprints were not forwarded to the Division; however, photographic copies are being obtained as soon as they can be developed, which will be the first thing in the morning; that three copies of Reilly's photograph have been obtained, one copy of which was forwarded to Inspector Rorer and another copy to Agent Hardy at Madison, Wisconsin, where he is questioning the girls who are being held in the jail there; that Agent Hardy has advised that the three girls gave their names as Rose/Ancker, Ann Southern and Marion Marr; that they refuse to give any information but will be questioned until they do. Mr. Clegg will send the photograph and photographic copy of the fingerprints the first thing in the morning by air mail special delivery.

I have called the Identification Unit and given them the police number, fingerprint classification and description of Albert W. Reilly in order that a check could be made for a further record. A report of the results of their search has not been received.



MEMORANDUM FOR MR. TO-SON. LUEXED

In_reply to your inquiry contained on the Director's meaning by 34 pril 9th, attached, concerning the fingerprints of the women arrested with Dillinger at Tucson, Arizona, I beg to advise as follows:

When it was brought to my attention, through the Posting Section the fingerprints of these women had not been received from the Tucson Police Department, I dictated the letter dated March 7th, calling the attention of the Chief of Police at Tucson to this fact. This letter was forwarded as a Cliff matter of record and the usual follow-up was noted in the files. In this connection it is noted that the Tucson letter did not indicate specifically that the fingerprints of these women had been forwarded to us. The followup was not dispatched to the Tucson Police before the matter came directly to the Division's attention during the latter part of March, when an inquiry was made here whether Ann Martin's fingerprints had been received. At that time I telephoned Mr. Stableton, informing him that we had written the Tucson Police suggesting that these prints be forwarded.

In view of the facts existing in this case, I shall take steps to see that our follow-ups are followed at earlier dates, or at least that in matters of this character, affecting notorious criminals, the attention of the interested field office is called to the failure of the arresting department to submit fingerprints. Ordinarily the Identification Unit does not follow the transmittal of fingerprints by law enforcement agencies, because if there is a Federal interest in the case, the field office is charged with the responsibility of making certain that the fingerprints are submitted to us.

This situation brings to mind the thought that it might be advisable. because of the fast-moving recent developments, for a definite arrangement to be made at the seat of government to insure that fingerprints of all notorious criminals arrested are received here. Such an arrangement, I believe, could be effected through the interested supervisor at the Division proper submitting short memorandums by routing slips, if necessary, to this Unit to "flag" certain records expected from certain points and we could then keep in constant touch with the situation. In the instant case I am frank to admit that it was only a coincidence that we happened to write to the Tucson officials at all, suggesting that these prints be forwarded. If the Tucson authorities had not sent a letter which seemed to indicate that the prints had been forwarded, the Identification Unit would have had no method of knowing the names of the individuals arrested with Dillinger at Tucson and would, in the absence of the advice from the Tucson officials as to the names of these persons whose fingerprints presumably were forwarded, have assumed that the prints all persons arrested there had been taken and

transmitted to us in the usual manner.

It would seem that some steps should be instituted locally to insure the receipt of all records of this character here and not to place too much reliance on field offices. In this connection the field offices probably would take steps to see that we receive fingerprints only in instances where a Federal case is involved; yet in many of these cases I rather fancy that important potential Federal subjects may be overlooked.

I called Agent Coulter at St. Paul relative to the information to the effect that Dillinger is now reported to be in St. Paul. Agent Coulter advised that he had just received this information; that three men had abandoned the Ford Coupe in South St. Paul and had stolen a Ford DeLuxe Coupe; that it is a dark colored machine with red wire wheels; that the car was last seen about an hour and fifteen minutes ago on the Ford road south of the Twin Cities; that he did not know in what direction it was going. Agent Coulter advised that before the Ford Coupe was abandoned this morning there was a shooting about ten o'clock in St. Paul Park: that this Coupe was shot at by a Deputy Sheriff: that the Deputy advised that he had shot the man in the middle. Agent Coulter advised that when he received information to the effect that the Ford DeLuxe Coupe was last seen one of the men in it was wrapped in a blanket, which indicated that he was shot by the Deputy Sheriff. Agent Coulter is sending two Agents to South Saint Paul to take care of the matter.

Agent Coulter later called and advised that the machine which was stolen was a Ford V-8, 1933 model Marcon Deluxe Coach; Minnesota 1934 license tags B-455209; owner, RoykFrancis; car taken in a "Stick-up" between St. Paul and South St. Paul; information received by St. Paul Police Department at 1:21 P. M. today. The car that was abandoned contained a considerable amount of blood. Police are broadcasting this information and the country around St. Paul is being scoured. I will advise the Chicago office and Mr. Connelley at Indianapolis of the description of the above car, probably being used by Dillinger at the present time. Agent Coulter was requested to keep the Division advised of any developments and that a number of Agents would return to St. Paul shortly.



MEMORANDUM FOR THE DIRECTOR

Mr. McIntyre, News Editor of the Micago Tribune called at 4 A.M. and stated that he had some confusing reports which he thought Mr. Hoover would be interested in. His report says that Federal Agents at Mercer, Wisconsin had shot and killed one man and wounded two others, who were C. C. C. workers and an : oil station attendant. These people had been brought into a hospital at Ironwood where his reporter was at the time. These men were listed as Eugene Dorsonsay, John Morris and John Hoffman. The three men were leaving camp when told to halt and apparently not hearing the command they continued moving and were shot by the Agents. He also had a report that Mr. Hoover was quoted by the Associated Fress as having said that Dillinger was definitely surrounded in the woods near Mercer, Wisconsin. Mr. McIntyre suggested that possibly the Dillinger report is confused with the killing of the C. C. Worker, and wanted to know if Mr. Hoover was speaking of the same affair. I advised Mr. McIntyre that I had no information that such a statement had been made by Mr. Hoover, but that if he did it was undoubtedly correct. He asked how to get in touch with Mr. Hoover and I advised him I could not reach him and that I knew of no way to do so.

Mr. Rorer called in about 6:00 p.m. to give the details of the Baum shooting. He advised that Newman was all right, that he did not have a fractured skull and that he was leaving tonight for Chicago by train at 6:53 p.m. with doctors permission. Agest Ryan was going with him.

Mr. Rorer advised that the version that Mr. Newman gave of the shooting was that he and Baum were over at another place putting thru some calls, and a woman at Corners who had heard some of these calls going through and knew that there was some Federal men there, called tham and reported that there was a car parked on the road there with no lights on it. Newman, Baum, and a constable named Christianson got in a Division Ford V8 they had there and started out to see about the car reported without lights. Newman was driving, the constable was in the middle, and Baum was on the right side with a machine gum in his lap; Christianson also had a revolver in his lap.

They saw a parked car in the road at the scene of the call from Corners with no lights on and no one in it. Just as they stopped, right behind the parked car, a man jumped out of the parked car stepped over to their car and pointed an automatic at Newman's head saying, "I know you have bullet proof vests on get out of that car! Newman started to reach for his pistol and the man warned, "Don't you touch that gum; if you do I'll blow your brains out, get out of the car! Rewman opened the door slowly and started to get out on the side where the man was while the other two men Baum and Christianson started to get out on the right side. Just as Newman put his foot on the ground this man hit him over the head, and the next thing he remembers is that he kind of comes to and sees the Ford Coupe he had been driving being backed around and driven off about twenty-five feet away, and he emptied his 45 automatic at it, and feels pretty sure that he must have hit it. Then he jumped up pulled out his revolver and went over to the other car that these other men were in that he had seen this man ge't out of and put his gun on them, and they told him that they were C.W.A. workers etc. on into the house

Mr. Rorer advised that he and Brennen left the place they were covering and hurried to the scene of the shooting and when they arrived the man had gone and Baum was still lying there.

The car had been parked in the middle of the road and there was a fence along the side of the road and the gate was supposed to be shut, so Baum must have fallen over the little one rail fence and spum around for he was about ten yards on the inside of the fence. Mr. Rorer picked him up and he had apparently fell on the machine gum he had for the stock was broken and Baum is quite a heavy man.

Christianson was shot five or six times as well as they could tell they were not sure. Mr. Rorer advised that he might live, the first report being that he had died, but that the hospital had just advised him that he was still alive. The best information that they have is that the shooting was done with a 45 automatic.

Mr. Rorer stated that they had the man who did the shooting identified pretty clearly and that he didn't think that there was any doubt about it, as George Nelson, alias Baby Face Nelson. He is listed on the Chicago police bulletin, and has been mentioned by Bessie at St. Paul who calls him Jimmy and he is known as Jimmy where the shooting occurred. Mr. Rorer stated that Newman hadn't identified him yet as he hadn't seen a picture of him, and that he wasn't sure that Newman got a good look at him at the time of the shooting, but that there was no doubt about the identity, that the man over at the resort where Jimmy had been unhesitatingly picked Jimmy's picture from a group without seeing the names.

Mr. Rorer advised that newspaper photographers had been in and out all morning and had taken pictures of the house, it being a great big resort and impossible to keep them from doing it, and he thinks but he is not sure some of them had taken pictures of the gums while they were scattered out in the little garage for fingerprinting. The gums are not there now they drove them out in two cars this afternoon. Mr. Rorer said that interviews had been requested of him with the girls, but he told them none would be granted under any condition. He advised that there was no jail there, and that tonight the sheriff and two Agents were taking the girls down to the county jail at Madison, Wisconsin, Madison being in the same district it not being advisable to remove the girls from that district. And the two Agents were interrogating them for information. He doesn't think that either of the three is Pat Cherrington; that they are some one that we don't know much about, but of course they have no means of identification as yet.

Bue to the difficulty of getting private phones where he is now Mr. Rorer gave me the following lead and asked that I give it to Chicago. He stated that under the rug in Dillinger's room they found a little penciled notation at the top of which appeared the words 'Red Hair; and that under that appears 'Perl Hellman', with a little 'a' over the top of Perl indicating that it should be Pearl. Then the address 305 Harrison Street, Wishawka, Indiana. Under that there is a notation which looks like a telephone number, 'ked 7357', there is a line drawn under that and beneath the line there appears '3307 Warrens Boulevard, Apartment 705', and that is all there is on the note.

They also found in his room an envelope addressed to hieutenant\
Piquette and that is intended for a Chicago point. On the inside of
the envelope they found the following typewritten letter about a page
long, which Mr. Rorer read to me:

"It is my desire that you will represent me in procuring my wrist watch and two rings that I have placed in the Broadway Trust and Savings Bank at Broadway and Diversey (or Dibersey). It is probable that the investigating officers have already had possession but I believe that they have placed them back again. If it is necessary that I grant you the power of attorney in obtaining said possessions it is so bequeathed. The key to this particular vault will be presented with this letter. Your immediate action upon this matter will be greatly appreciated

Sincerely yours"

Mr. Rorer advised that the letter was not signed and that there was no key with it as referred to in the letter.

As to the people who have been up there Mr. Rorer stated that the man who runs the place had identified Dillinger, Hamilton, Tommy Carroll, Van Meter, Nelson, and a man named Pat age 30, 5' 8", 150 lbs., light complected, a paunch stomach, very poor teeth, light hair. He requested that I call the St. Paul office and ask them to check to see if this man Pat could be Pat Reilly, advising them that Pat left the resort Friday with a woman and was supposed to return Saturday night but didn't do it. I called Agent Nicholson at St. Paul and advised him of the above mentioned individual.

Mr. Rorer advised that Mr. Hanni and McIntire were taking care of the Baum matter, that he was trying to get him embalmed there and then send him right into Chicago.

In connection with the newspaper men and the publicity I advised Mr. Rorer to be very courteous to them, although apparently they had already taken the pictures.

Mr. Rorer said that he hadn't patched it together yet but he had just received information from one of the Agents working on it that they had found a letter which somebody had tried to chew up. In attempting to put the parts together he said that it appears to be a letter from Louis Company to this man delivered by Helson to the effect that the rest of the parties were his friends and to treat them as such. Of course that isn't definite yet, as the letter hasn't been completely pieced together as yet. Mr. Rorer said that he ask this man if he knew Cernocky and he stated that Cernocky was a friend of his.

Mr. Rorer advised that the Ford car went on to St. Paul and the Buick was sent to Chicago, and that all the exhibits had been taken from there whether or not these exhibits the guns and baggage had been taken to St. Paul or Chicago he wasn't sure but stated that it was his impression that it was all taken to Chicago.

Mr. Rorer was advised that no privelege was to be granted newspaper men to interview or photograph the three girls. Also that one of the cars that was used by the gangsters at the Little Bohemian Club was found abandoned at St. Paul today.

Mr. Rorer advised that they were going to cover everything completely but as quickly as possible and leave as soon as they could get away.

MEMORANDUM FOR THE DIRECTOR.

Agent Hanson called from Birmingham and stated that he had just talked to Agent Fitzsimons in Nashville relative to the holding up of police officers there on the 9th; that Agent Fitzsimons advised that they have identified George Nelson, alias Baby Face (Mr. Hanson is of the opinion that George Nelson is a member of the Dillinger gang inasmuch as his photograph appears on the bulletin that was issued by the City of Chicago, said bulletin containing a photograph of Dillinger) as the man who had the automobile at Nashville - the car that was purchased in Mankato, Minnesota, for which license tags were secured at Murfreesboro under the name of \0sgood; that five men have definitely identified his photograph; that he was seen at Nashville on the 9th. and 10th; that he was seen at the Walker Brake Service Station in Nashville and also at the Cole Motor Company at Nashville; that one man who identified him advised that he saw him there as early as April 6 and also saw him on the 10th; that a negro at the Walker Brake Service Station identified Ludwidx Schmidt as being with Nelson; that the negro said that Schmidt was across the street while Nelson was in the station.

Mr. Hanson stated that they were endeavoring to get the Post Office Department to help them make a census of the apartment houses in Nashville and are also endeavoring to get their permission to have an Agent accompany the mail carrier while making this census. Mr. Hanson advised that he has an Agent at Murfreesboro and three Agents at Nashville working on this matter. He stated that he was going to send another Agent to Nashville to help out in the census matter.
