SYNOPSIS OF FACTS:

Various activities of Agents in the Cincinnati District outlined with no definite information as to the location of Subjects. The Kentucky license plates found on the abandoned Ford Sedan at Portage, Wisconsin, were issued to Mrs. E. K. Rogere, Postmistress, Guthrie, Ky., who bears an excellent reputation. No information obtained that any of Subjects have been in the vicinity of Guthrie.

DETAILS:

AT CINCINNATI, OHIO

A long distance telephone call was received from the St. Paul Office on the 23rd instant indicating that a 1933 model Ford V-8 DeLuxe Coach, maroon color, had been reported stolen at St. Paul that date having Minnesota license B 455-209. It was suspected that some of the Subjects had taken this car and might be on their way South.

Agent immediately contacted Special Agent E. O. Harris at Columbus, Ohio, Special Agent Chapman Fletcher at Dayton, Ohio, and Special Agent F. E. Hurley at Louisville, Kentucky, requesting them to contact local officers and have them be on the lookout for the car in question. Telegrams also were sent to the Chiefs of Police at Evansville and Madison, Indiana, at which points bridges cross the Ohio River. A like telegram was sent to the Chief of Police, Lexington, Kentucky. However, no trace of the car in question was reported to the Cincinnati Office.

On 4-25-34 a long distance telephone call was received at the Cincinnati Office from Special Agent in Charge H. H. Purvis at Chicago to the effect that Sheriff Shumann of Springfield, Ohio, had reported that six men in a Ford V-8 Sedan stopped at a filling station near London, Ohio, and inquired where they could locate a physician. One of the men appeared to be wounded in the head. The Sheriff stated he had notified the Sheriffs of Columbus and Lebanon, as well as the State Highway Patrol.

Special Agent Bliss Morton, Cincinnati, gave this information by telephone to Special Agent Chapman Fletcher at Dayton, Ohio, who immediately proceeded to the vicinity of Springfield and London and ascertained that a small town Constable, whose name has not yet been furnished the Cincinnati Office, had seen a car drive by with four or five men in it, one of whom appeared to have a bandage on his head. The car did not stop. The Constable mentioned this to the loafers up town and later some contractor, who had heard of the Constable's report "played a joke" on the Constable by telling him that the car in question had stopped at some filling station and one of the men had asked for a Doctor and the contractor believed the car might contain Dillinger and his gang. On that suggestion the Constable had immediately notified the Sheriffs. However, the Sheriffs had made efforts to locate the car in question but had failed. The results of Agent Fletcher's inquiry at Springfield were given by telephone to Supervisor Cowley at Washington and the Chicago Office.

At about 1:30 A. M., 4-26-34, Special Agent Chapman Fletcher at Dayton, Ohio, telephoned the Cincinnati Office and contacted Special Agent H. E. Roberts and stated that a press dispatch had been received at Dayton from Columbus, Ohio, advising that about 6:00 P.M. a maroon colored Ford Coach bearing Wisconsin license tags had been noticed at Akron, Ohio, and its occupants had made inquiry as to the direction of Columbus, Ohio; that about 10:30 P.M., at Columbus, Ohio, a car fitting the same description, bearing five male occupants, accosted Tom Jaeger, Columbus, Ohio, and asked for the name of a physician in Columbus. He noted the muzzle of a long barrel shot-gun in the hands of one of the individuals in the front seat, and also a bandage around the head of one of the rear occupants; that the Columbus police were making a detailed investigation of all doctors and hospitals at Columbus, Ohio, endeavoring to ascertain if the individual in this car might be members of the Dillinger gang.

Special Agent Morton at Cincinnati got in touch by long distance telephone with Special Agent H. D. Harris at Columbus, Ohio, requested him to obtain all available information concerning the Cincinnati Office. Special Agent Harris shortly thereafter telephoned Agent Morton at Cincinnati, stating that he had contacted the police of Columbus and informed

him that at about noon, the 25th of April, a maroon colored Ford V-8 Sedan bearing Illinois license plates #118-191 had been seen at Mogadore, Ohio. It had contained five or six men who had held up a bank at Mogadore and who had obtained a small sum of money from the bank and had carried off two bank employees. This car had driven north from Akron and had released the two men shortly after leaving the city. Nothing further was known concerning it.

Agent Harris also obtained from the police the information that about 10:00 P.M., four or five men in a Ford car had accosted Tom Yaeger, Columbus, Ohio, and requested directions to a doctor; that one of the men appeared to have his head tied up, and that Yaeger had seen a long barrel shot-gun in the car. Yaeger had stated that the car had a white license plate. The police had sent out crews but had been unable to locate any such car, and had broadcasted the information over the state in order that the car might be watched for and had also sent out a broadcast that hospitals and doctors should report anyone calling for treatment of a head wound.

Agent Harris was compelled to leave Columbus, Ohio, early on the morning of the 26th to appear as a Government witness in the U. S. Commissioner's Court at Steubenville, Ohio. He requested Lieut. Tom Scully of the Columbus Police Department to obtain further information on this and telephone Agent Horton. Lieut. Scully telephoned Agent Horton at Cincinnati about twelve noon, 4-26-34, and stated as follows:

A man named Thomas Yaeger, age 40, 317 South Eureka Ave., employed as a city foreman in the Street Repair Department for the last five years, is the originator of the information in this matter. Yaeger had stated that at 9:45 he was walking east on the north side of Sullivan Ave., between Eureka and Wayne, when a dark colored Ford V-8 Coach going west on Sullivan Ave. with two men in the front seat, and three or four men in the back seat, was noticed. Yaeger at this time was at the corner of Sullivan Ave., and the car slowed down but did not stop. One of the men in the back seat had what appeared to be a bandage on the left side of his face, covering his ear. Yaeger noticed what appeared to be the barrels of three shot guns sticking out between the two men in the front seat. One appeared to be octagon shape. When they slowed down one of the men yelled: "Heh, Buddy, where's a doctor's office around here?" Yaeger told them to go to the next carline and turn north in Eureka Ave. The men sped west on Sullivan Ave., honking the auto horn and going at a high rate of speed. Yaeger talked with a man at a filling station on Wayne and Sullivan, and they also had noticed the car going by. The front license plates were on the right side of the front bumper and appeared to be dark numerals on a white background. The license number was not obtained. The car appeared to be a very dark color and dirty. Yaeger noticed the driver, who had a peaked face, and the other man in the front seat had a round face, dark hair,

hanging over the forehead, and wore a brown hat. He could not describe the others in the car. Yaeger called the police immediately by telephone, and at their request he waited on Sullivan and Wayne until they arrived, and gave them directions in which the car had gone. Squads in four police cars immediately searched Columbus but found no trace of any such car. They likewise visited doctors in the neighborhood and broadcast that doctors and hospitals should be on the lookout for a wounded man. Broadcast also was given to other law enforcement officials over the state.

In this connection, Lieut. Scully states that he resides on Sullivan Ave., some four or five blocks east of the point where Yaeger states he saw the car. At the time the car was allegedly seen by Yaeger, Lieut. Scully states he was sitting in the front room of his home, looking out towards the street. He feels very certain that if such a car had gone by, and especially if the driver had been honking the horn, he would certainly have noticed it. He states that while Yaeger does not bear a bad reputation, Lieut. Scully nevertheless somewhat doubts the accuracy of his statements.

Special Agent in Charge Connelley on 4-20-34 wired direct to the San Francisco Office to check the identity of [REDACTED] on the possibility that Subjects might be there or might be contacting that residence. Telegraphic reply was received from the San Francisco Office advising that Clyde E. Duncan and wife have resided at Oakland about two years, originally coming from Indiana, where they have relatives, and that Duncan is employed as a painter and has no police record at Oakland.

Following is a memorandum submitted by Special Agent H. S. Roberts concerning an inquiry at Hamilton, Ohio, 4-26-34:

b7D Referring to a communication received by Acting Special Agent in Charge Bliss Morton, relative to confidential informant [REDACTED] furnishing this office information on 4-25-34 relative to a telegram received at Hamilton, Ohio, addressed to Maude Filler, 1276 Azel Ave., Hamilton, Ohio, Agent interviewed George A. Zetler, Postal Clerk, Hamilton, Ohio,

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who stated that he had received request from the Western Union Office early that morning relative to the address of Maude Filler; that in checking back records it was found that one Clifford Filler, formerly resided at 1123 Azel Ave., and in 1931 moved to R. R. #6, thence later to R. R. #2, on Starr Ave., and from there no address was furnished. Postal Carrier #28, Allan Linn, Hamilton, Ohio, advised that he formerly carried mail to 1123 Azel Ave.; that he knows Clifford Filler and his wife, Maude Filler, slightly; that they are Kentuckians and their present address is unknown to him; however, he suggested that James Stewart, 1131 Azel Ave., might know of their address and furnish information relative to them. He recommended Mr. Stewart very highly.

Miss Margaret Schneider of the Western Union, Hamilton, was interviewed and advised that her messenger boy left a notice at 1276 Azel Ave., about 8:00 A.M., 4-25-34, and after being unable to find anyone living at that address; however, at 10:30 a lady called and advised that she was with Mrs. Maude Filler, for whom a notice had been left at 1276 Azel Ave., whereupon Miss Schneider delivered the message by telephone to the alleged Maude Filler.

James Stewart, 1131 Azel Ave., was interviewed and advised that he had lived in that vicinity for over 25 years; that he was personally acquainted with Martha E. Smith of Kerby Knob, Ky., mother of Mrs. Maude Filler; that Mrs. Smith is a very fine lady. He stated that he is not so well acquainted with Clifford and Maude Filler; however, his wife, whom Agent also interviewed, had advised him that she conversed with Mrs. Filler recently and ascertained that her husband was some place in northern Ohio working on some Government bridge or job. Mr. Stewart advised that Mrs. Clifford (Maude) Filler resides at the rear of 1276 Azel Ave., on the alley, at the present time. (This may explain why the Western Union boy was unable to deliver the telegram).

Agent interviewed T.E. Payne, 1100 Ross Ave., who operates a grocery store at this address. He stated that he has personally known Mr. and Mrs. Clifford (Maude) Filler for five years; that they trade with him regularly and are very fine type of people; that Mrs. Filler is a Kentuckian and her husband was formerly employed by the Sinclair Oil Company about three years ago; however, when his wife became ill it was necessary for him to quit his job because it entailed considerable traveling. He stated that recently Mr. Clifford Filler has returned to his job with the Sinclair Oil Company and travels from place to place painting oil stations for this company. He stated that he believes Clifford Filler owns a Chevrolet Coupe, however, he would not be positive.

It was ascertained on a second visit to the Post Office that Marcum's drug store in West Hamilton, Ohio, is located under Station "B" of the Hamilton Post Office. Mr. G. Marcum was interviewed and advised Agent that Mr. and Mrs. Clifford (Hanks) Filler receive mail through General Delivery in that Post Office at the present time and have so received mail off and on for about five years. He displayed a letter postmarked Ketchy Knob, Ky., dated 4-24-34 from Mrs. Martha E. Smith to Mrs. Hanks Filler and stated that he also knows Martha E. Smith, who is the mother of Mrs. Filler, and knows of nothing against their reputation and character.

From investigation, it would appear that Mr. Filler was engaged in lawful pursuits and occupation and it appears that there would be no connection between the Dillinger gang and the telegram sent by Mr. Filler to his wife, relative to obtaining a machine at Dayton, Ohio, on the night of 4-26-34.

* * * * *

Special Agent Chapman Fletcher, Dayton, Ohio, reports that he and Special Agent G. H. Treadwell are continuing to watch the apartment of Mary Longnaker but no events of any importance have been noted. Special Agent Fletcher reports, as follows, 4-24-34:

Up to noon today there have been no further developments of interest. Special Agent Treadwell and this agent are continuing to cruise in the car in the vicinity of 214 Clay Street and the Stricker Hotel. Mrs. Lucille Stricker was contacted by telephone today for the main purpose of showing her Agents were still on the job and that while Dillinger was reported elsewhere she was still to maintain a close watch and advise of any suspicious persons or cars in her neighborhood.

Immediately after telephone conversation with Special Agent in Charge Connelley on the night of 4-23-34, this agent got in touch with Sergeant C. C. Cadot of the Dayton Police and he advised he had a few minutes before broadcasting over the Dayton Police radio the lookout for Ford V-8 Deluxe Coach, Minnesota 1934 license #B 455 209, maroon color. He stated he received this information over the Columbus State Police Radio and Columbus had received the information from St. Paul by radio. It seems they have a good radio hook-up. Arrangements have been made with the Night Clerk in the Gibbons Hotel, Dayton, to turn his radio on the Dayton Police and he will call Agent if anything of importance is broadcast.

Special Agent F. E. Hurley at Louisville, Ky., has made the following observations on his inquiries in the western section of Kentucky, 4-25-34:

- 7 -

AT LEBANON, KENTUCKY

Agents A. C. Russell and Hurley on 4-25-34 again interviewed Assistant Postmaster Burke. Efforts have been made to locate one Miss Mayme Duss, or some such name, a reported friend of Mrs. Frank Whitehouse, and a supposed correspondent with a Mrs. A. Karlson, sister of Subject John Hamilton's wife. Ascertained from Burke that he has been unable to locate any such person, unless it is one Miss Mayme Dunn, a more or less distant relative of his. Ascertained that Miss Dunn and Mrs. Frank Whitehouse have been friends for a long time; that Miss Dunn is a member of a poor, but respectable family; that she is more or less acquainted with members of the Whitehouse bootleg crowd; that she seldom leaves Lebanon for any length of time; that she is rarely out of town, as a matter of fact. Ascertained that she is a girl of good reputation except that she conducts a small eating and drinking place in town; that many of her patrons are of the young and cheap character; that she has never been involved in scandal or in doubtful affairs other than to accept and sell bootleg beer and whiskey. She is about 25 years of age, tall and slender, very dark brown hair; medium complexion, attractive, single, good looking and dark blue eyes.

Chief of Police Bob Gordon, Lebanon, also knew Mayme Dunn but no one by the name of Mayme Duss, Burns or such a name. Messrs. Gordon and Burke believe that the Mayme Duss previously reported is none other than Mayme Dunn; that some one may be addressing a letter or two to her for Mrs. Frank Whitehouse; that possibly a letter received from Mrs. Karlson by her was only a friendly note, they having met somewhere through Mrs. Whitehouse. The Chief corroborated the statements of Postmaster Burke. He doubts that Mayme Dunn is, or ever has been, involved in shady business other than to sell beer on a small scale and in conjunction with her eating place.

[REDACTED] contacts being maintained, if necessary, Miss Dunn can be interviewed, but it is thought undesirable at this time. b7E

AT BRADFORDSVILLE, KENTUCKY

Assistant Postmistress Mrs. Alva Spaulding, Bradfordsville, stated that neither she nor Mrs. Ghall, the Postmistress, has learned anything of more recent value. No results to report. The same is true in the case of Town Marshal Ray Alstatt. The latter states that Frank Whitehouse has apparently discontinued his bootlegging activities. He has not been seen in the vicinity of late. The homes of Frank and Hugh Mullins, Bradfordsville, are being watched by representatives of Mr. Alstatt and Frank Gabehart, Bradfordsville, Ky. Several visits by Mr. Alstatt and Gabehart to Jones Fork region convinced them that members of the Dillinger gang have not been seen in the vicinity. Ray Overstreet, rural carrier, Bradfordsville Post Office, advised that he has noticed no suspicious activities of late; that the Mullins and the Morgansons act normally and at ease; that there are

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no indications that Dillinger has been in the region since his last visit, a few days after his escape from jail, Crown Point, Indiana, last March. Contacts are being maintained.

AT LEBANON, KENTUCKY

[redacted] garageman, friendly to agent and an informant, stated that Frank Whitehouse has discontinued his activities as a bootlegger; that he is living quietly and in the open as of late; that in a recent conversation, Whitehouse emphatically declared that "Dillinger is crazy", that he will soon get shot full of holes; that he is a "D--- fool". He further told [redacted] when questioned as to Dillinger that should the latter come to Lebanon Mo., Dillinger, could have his home but that he, Whitehouse, would immediately move out. [redacted] is convinced that Whitehouse is not going to get involved with the Dillinger gang; that he has been invited to do so in the past but that he declined; that he is further convinced that Whitehouse is too smart to get tangled up with Dillinger especially at this time when his life is in danger and all trails are hot. Whitehouse has so expressed himself, according to [redacted]. The latter is undoubtedly playing fair with Agent. He also stated that Mayme Dunn is well known to him; that he is sure that Miss Dunn would never get involved in such a desperate and criminal gang as the Dillinger gang. He speaks of her past and as to her character and reputation very much as did Chief of Police Gordon and Assistant Postmaster Burke. The latter statements as to Miss Dunn were not provoked by Agent. They were given when a question was asked as to a Miss Mayme Dunn. [redacted] suggested that Agent might mean Miss Dunn. He could think of no other person of that name or a similar name. The nature of the inquiry was not revealed.

AT PERRYVILLE, KENTUCKY

With Agent A. C. Russell, Postmaster John J. Farrell, Perryville, was interviewed relative to one Jesse Dillinger, reported uncle of Subject Dillinger. It was learned that Dillinger is a highly respectable man, a retired farmer; that he gets his mail out of the Danville Post Office. The relationship is doubted.

AT DANVILLE, KENTUCKY

Postmaster Heardon, Danville, stated that he knows Jesse Dillinger very well; that so far as is known, he is not related to Subject Dillinger. The former is one of the most respected citizens in the county.

Fred Hart, a retired farmer and a close neighbor of Jesse Dillinger, stated that the latter is not related to Subject Dillinger; that he is certain that they are not of kin.

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Chief of Police Bob Sale, Danville, stated that he has heard nothing of late relative to Dillinger's whereabouts except as told in the newspapers. He suggested that Deputy Sheriff Cochran, Liberty, Ky., be interviewed because the latter is a former Federal Prohibition Agent and is said to have conducted an investigation as to Dillinger.

AT LIBERTY, KENTUCKY

Agents Russell and Hurley interviewed Cochran, Prosecuting Attorney Charles Fair, Sheriff D. C. Gibbs relative to Dillinger and his movements. Nothing was learned that has not been previously reported. These men will fully cooperate and can be depended upon. They are crack shots and men used to Kentucky mountain life.

AT LOUISVILLE, KENTUCKY

Chief of Police Carl Million, New Albany, Indiana, reported quite recently two men telephoned at Elliott's filling station, New Albany, telephone #322, to Midway #1601, Chicago, Ill. The men spoke in code such as "the baby is sick" and "the strings are too long". The rest of the conversation was equally unintelligent to H. B. Sommers, the attendant at the Elliott filling station. The call was put in at 8:35 P.M., 4-16-34. The descriptions of the men were too vague to be of value. The car they were driving is not known as they parked it some distance away in the dark. The license plates were not obtained. Their identity could not be established. Possibly the call can be traced and be of some value. The men acted very mysteriously. It is thought that they may have been George T. Williams and Robert J. Hern. This latter suggestion is only a hunch with no evidential backing.

The police at Louisville have no additional reports to make as to Dillinger.

Inspector H. H. Clegg telephoned the Cincinnati Office on the evening of 4-25-34 from St. Paul, Minn., stating that 1934 Ford Sedan, motor #884515, was found at Portage, Wisc., bearing 1934 Kentucky license #781-779, which had been issued to Mrs. W. E. Rogers, Guthrie, Kentucky, for an Essex Coupe. The Ford Sedan in question had previously been seen at St. Paul bearing 1934 Minn. license plates #B 420-213.

Special Agent F. E. Hurley conducted the following investigation on 4-26-34:

AT GUTHRIE, KENTUCKY

The recent request of the Cincinnati Office to trace the theft of Kentucky 1934 license plates #731-779 developed that they had been issued to Mrs. Woodfin E. Rogers, Postmistress, Guthrie, 4-6-34. They covered an Essex Coupe. They were stolen at night from close to her home on 4-11-34. Neither she nor Judge Rogers has any idea as to the identity of the thief.

Mr. Claude Kimbrough, partner of Mr. Rogers, stated that he has no idea as to the identity of the person who stole the plates. He obtained them for Mrs. Rogers at the request of Mr. Rogers. The latter was Speaker of the House, Kentucky Legislature. Rogers bears one of the finest reputations in the region. He is above suspicion. Mr. Kimbrough is a man of the same type. They are highly intelligent, extremely well educated and are good business men. Chief of Police Dave Minns, Guthrie, stated that he knows of no person who might be connected with the Dillinger gang who resides at or near Guthrie. Minns is a young, live and alert officer. The Dillinger case is of great interest to him. He has several confidential informants in the city. None of them has reported any Dillinger angle to him. He cannot give any idea as to the identity of the person who stole Mrs. Rogers' license plates, other than to state that she may have had them stolen in Hopkinsville, Ky., inasmuch as she had been in that city shortly before her return to Guthrie about 8:30 P.M., 4-11-34. He advised that Mrs. Rogers does not know for a certainty where and when she lost the plates. This latter statement is given in confidence.

Nothing could be learned at Guthrie of value to this investigation. The persons interviewed will continue their investigations and will report any later fact of value.

In this connection, attention is invited to the report of Special Agent J. M. Towler, Birmingham, Alabama, dated 4-20-34, indicating that persons suspected of being Dillinger and some of his gang were in Nashville and other points in Tennessee on or about April 9 and 10, 1934. It is altogether probable that after they left the vicinity of Nashville they headed North and stopped at Guthrie, Kentucky, long enough to steal the license plates from Mrs. Rogers' car, it being noted the said plates were reported stolen on the night of 4-11-34.

Reference is made to the article appearing in the Washington Post of April 26, 1934 relative to the police of Staunton, Virginia searching Baltimore and Ohio Train No. 6, eastbound, for John Dillinger.

You are advised that this search was occasioned by the following information received by Lt. Talley of the Metropolitan Police:

Lt. Talley was confidentially informed by the Western Union that the following telegram had been sent from White Sulphur Springs, West Virginia:

"8:52 P.M.
White Sulphur, W. Va.

"Staunton 500
"John Dillinger
c/o Train No. 6
Staunton, Va.

arrive 10:57 P.M.

"104 is going strong; cocktails lasting unusually long; ice is cold; water is wet; just shook up the last one yet.

/"Nuts and Bolts, 104."

Captain Harris of the Staunton Police force made this search at the request of Lt. Talley.

The Pittsburgh Office was telephonically contacted and an immediate investigation was instituted at White Sulphur, West Virginia and it was ascertained that this wire was sent to John Allen Dillon by F. E. Driscoll, Purchasing Agent of the Erie Railway

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

Special Agent M.C. Falkner, at Eagle River, Wisconsin, on April 24, 1934, interviewed P. J. Gaffney, undertaker and County Coroner, who stated that no inquest had been held as to Agent W. C. Baum and Eugene Phillip Boisoeneau; that the body of Agent Baum, accompanied by Agent K. R. McIntire, left Eagle River at 9 A.M. April 24, 1934, enroute to Rhinelander, Wisconsin; that the departure was in the hearse belonging to Bert Surges of Eagle River; that he gave Agent McIntire a copy of the death certificate, and of the expenses incident to the embalming of Baum's body and transportation of the body to his place of business in Eagle River, and from there to Rhinelander, Wisconsin; that the total amount of this bill is \$345.00 which Agent McIntire advised him would be taken care of after he arrived in Chicago.

With reference to the body of Eugene Phillip Boisoeneau, Mr. Gaffney stated that it was being held in his establishment pending arrangements for burial to be made by the officers of the Citizens Conservation Camp to which Boisoeneau was attached.

Agent inspected Mr. Gaffney's records which reflect Boisoeneau's name to be as above set out, indicating that his father is dead; his mother is Mrs. Phillip Boisoeneau, Mellon, Wisconsin; and he is 28 years of age.

Agent Falkner interviewed Bert Surges, who stated that he resides in Eagle River, Wisconsin, and owns and operates an ambulance and a hearse; that he was present when Agent Baum's body was embalmed; that one shot only was evidenced, which entered just above the heart, and the point of exit was below the left shoulder, indicating that the shot must have been fired at a point above the position in which Baum was sitting when struck; that apparently the bullet went through his heart; that Agent McIntire accompanied the body in the ambulance

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from Eagle River to Rhinelander, Wisconsin; that he, Surges, drove the ambulance, leaving Eagle River at 9 A.M. and arriving at Rhinelander, at 9.50 A.M.; that at Rhinelander the body was placed on the train for Chicago, Illinois; that Agent McIntire left on the same train, which was the Chicago and Northwestern Railroad, and departed from Rhinelander at 9.58 A.M. on April 24, 1934.

I talked to Mr. Clegg last night. He advised that Mr. Rorer had just called and stated that there had been no petition filed at Rhinelander, Wisconsin; that the petition filed at Mercer, Wisconsin, had on it between 30 and 40 names; that Mr. Rorer, when he first called and advised that there were seven names on the petition, had only been shown the first page containing the seven names; that Mr. Rorer had contacted the Sheriff and County Attorney at Rhinelander and they were both displeased because they had not been advised and taken into the confidence of the Division before the raid, but that after discussing the matter with them for about two hours they were both left in good spirits. Mr. Clegg stated that Mr. Rorer had pointed out to them that they were not in the county in which the raid was conducted and consequently had no jurisdiction.

Mr. Clegg stated also that the Police Department at Minneapolis had arrested a girl friend of Alvin Karpis and that they were questioning her then but that up to date she had not given any information and had denied acquaintance with this gang; that the indications were she was also a close associate of Dr. May.

Mr. Clegg stated that there was a rumor to the effect that Volney Davis, a member of the Barker-Karpis gang, was in the city and that the Division had a man working under cover at a hotel where it was reported Davis would likely be.

Mr. Clegg stated, further, that he was proceeding to Mercer, Wisconsin, tonight at seven o'clock for the purpose of attending the Coroner's inquest and requested advice as to the nature of the testimony to be given by him, asking whether he should prepare a statement to read at the inquest or whether the testimony should be oral. He stated that he was inclined at the present time, though he had not had time to give the matter enough consideration, to believe that the testimony should be oral. I am strongly of the opinion that Mr. Clegg's testimony should be oral and frank. I see no reason why the Division should not disclose the facts as known to Mr. Clegg. Mr. Clegg also suggested the advisability of requesting that the inquest be held in private chambers and not made public. I am of the opinion that this is not possible; that it must necessarily be an open hearing. However, I will have this matter taken up with Mr. Parrish.

Mr. and Mrs. R. L. RITTER, proprietors of the Heidel Hotel, advise that CHARLES MAKLEY, as J. C. DAVIES, and RUSSELL CLARK, as L. L. LONG, registered at the hotel on January 1, 1934, giving their address as Daytona Beach, Florida, and occupied Rooms 110 and 111; that on January 2, 1934, DAVIES telephoned long distance to Chicago, Illinois, and on the same date sent a telegram to the same party at Chicago, Ill. Mrs. RITTER advises that she made a copy of the telegram which she turned over to the Sheriff's office after the apprehension of the DILLINGER mob on January 25, 1934. Informants further advise that MAKLEY and CLARK left the Hotel on January 6, 1934, at which time they stated that they were going to California.

Mr. RITTER further advises that on January 19, 1934, HARRY PIERPONT, as R. E. MCGEE, registered at the hotel and left again on January 20, 1934. PIERPONT had no telegrams or phone calls.

Informants further advise that BONNIE WYATT, Mrs. MADGE RITZER and Mrs. ANNA SIEBERT BARTLETT were the only persons who contacted MAKLEY and CLARK during their stay at the Heidel Hotel.

MAURICE T. GUINNEY, Deputy Sheriff, advised that Mrs. RITTER gave him a copy of the telegram sent by CHARLES MAKLEY on January 2, 1934. This telegram is as follows:

"Eugene Bartlett, 3550 W. 60 St., Chicago, Ill.

Say old man what has happened here I am and no Eugene stop saw the sister and she did not even expect you out here this year stop Bob was here and has gone let me know if you expect to come out here at once if not I am going out.

Heidel Hotel

Sheriff JOHN BELTON and Under-sheriff C. S. Farrar advise that after the receipt of the above information, Mrs. ANNA SIEBERT BARTLETT was brought to the Sheriff's Office and there telephoned to her brother, ROBERT BARTLETT at Chicago, Illinois. Sheriff BELTON informs that ROBERT BARTLETT, over long distance telephone, denied that he was acquainted with the activities or personnel of the DILLINGER mob.

A. A. SUNDIN, manager of the local Mountain States Telephone and Telegraph Company, located the record of the long distance phone call referred to in the interview with Mr. and Mrs. R. L. RITTER. This phone call was placed at 3:39 A. M. on January 2, 1934, to EUGENE BARTLETT, 3550 West 60th Street, Chicago, Illinois, telephone number Hemlock 2018, and was placed by Mrs. DAVIES, Room 110, Heidel Hotel. Mr. SUNDIN further advised that an application for installation of a telephone had been received for the address at 927 No. Second Avenue, but that the telephone had not been installed up to the time of the capture of the DILLINGER mob.

Chief of Police C. A. WOLLARD advised Agent that he had also received information that MAKLEY had contacted EUGENE BARTLETT, Chicago, Ill., by telephone and telegram and that he wired Chief of Detectives Shoemaker, Chicago, Illinois, and in return he had received a signed statement from EUGENE BARTLETT dated January 27, 1934. This statement is as follows:

4th Division Headquarters

January 27th, 1934

Statement of Eugene Bartlett 3550 W. 60th Street regarding telegram sent by one J. G. Davis from Tucson Arizona to Eugene Bartlett.

- Q. What is your name and address?
A. Eugene Bartlett 3550 W. 60th Street Chicago Ill.
Q. What is your telephone number?
A. Pros 10258
Q. What is your occupation?
A. Brakeman for the C. B. & Q. Railroad.
Q. How long have you been employed there?
A. 14 years.
Q. I will show you a copy telegram addressed to Eugene Bartlett, 3550 W 60th St, is this you. It is signed by Mr. J. G. Davis.
A. Yes. It is me.
Q. Do you recall of receiving this telegram?
A. Yes. I do.
Q. Do you know this Mr. J. G. Davis?
A. I never knew anybody by that name.
Q. Did you know who it was sent by at the time you received this telegram?
A. No. I did not.
Q. Were you contemplating a trip to Arizona?
A. For the last ten years I have been making a trip to Tucson, Arizona, annually, about the first part of the year, I fully intended going this year in fact I had transportation but I mentioned the fact to Mr. Charles McGray, (who I now know is Charles Makley) and he in turn stated that he might see me out there, after finding out the character of this man, I immediately changed my plans because I did not want to be seen in his presence or have anything to do with him. I went to Breckinrider Springs, Missouri on January 5th, 1934 and registered at the Udell Apartments, next to the Bath House (Doctor Ball's Bath House) instead.
Q. Do you know a person by the name of Bob, that was mentioned in this telegram?
A. Yes. He is my Brother.
Q. Do you know where he is now?
A. He is in Chicago now, in his office in the Conway Building.
Q. What business is he in?
A. Real Estate Business.
Q. Does your Brother Bob know this man Charles McGray, alias Charles Makley?
A. No, he does not, he never saw or heard of him. In fact at the time this telegram was written he did not know that I knew him.

- Q. Did you know that your Brother was in Tucson, Arizona at the time this telegram was written.
- A. No. I did not know.
- Q. Did you ever know of your brother going to Tucson Arizona.
- A. He goes there every year, his family lives in Phoenix Arizona and I have a sister by the name of Mrs Helen Jacobs, who owns and operates a small Maternity Hospital, known as the Stokes Nest in Tucson, Arizona, and my Brother visits her in Tucson when he goes to Arizona.
- Q. Does your sister, Mrs. Helen Jacobs know this man Charles Makley.
- A. I believe it is the first time this man ever saw my sister, he just went there and looked her up.
- Q. Did you know at the time that you make a statement in this office on January 2, 1934, that Charles Makley would be in Tucson Arizona or that he was contemplating going there.
- A. No. Only that he stated he might see me there and I did not think any more of it.
- Q. If you knew that this man named Mr. J. C. Davis was Charles Makley would you have notified the Police.
- A. I most surely would.
- Q. Will you sign this statement.
- A. Yes.

EUGENE BARTLETT

He further advises that he received a letter from JOHN STEGE, Supervising Captain, 4th Division Headquarters, Chicago Police Department, January 27, 1934. A copy of this letter was received from Chief of Police WOLLARD and will be forwarded to the Chicago Office. A portion of the letter is quoted as follows:

"It is further requested that a letter be sent air-mail to the Chief of Police at Tucson, Arizona, informing that Eugene Bartlett is a reputable citizen of our City."

CHESTER SHERMAN, City Detective, gave Agent seven snapshot photographs found in the effects of ANN MARTIN. These photographs will be forwarded to the Chicago Office for use in investigation. Detective SHERMAN also gave Agent a letter which had been torn by one of the DILLINGER mob at the time of the apprehension. This letter has been pasted on three sheets of paper and will be forwarded to the Chicago Office to be compared with other handwriting on file there in an attempt to identify the handwriting.

At the time of the apprehension of HARRY PIERPONT on January 25th, 1934, PIERPONT attempted to chew and swallow a note which was taken from his mouth by arresting officers. Detective SHERMAN gave Agent this note, which evidently consists of two pieces of paper. The first one has the name

EUGENE BARTLETT thereon, but the address is not legible. The second evidently is the address of Mr. JOHN PETERSON, 88 Wabasha, St. Paul, Minnesota. Detective SHERMAN also gave Agent three sales slips taken from the effects of ANN MARTIN. These also are being forwarded to the Chicago Office for their information.

FRED W. FICKETT, Judge of the Superior Court, Pima County, Tucson, Arizona, advised Agent that a clerk in his office had made a thorough check of the money taken from the DILLINGER mob, which is now in the safety deposit vault of the Consolidated National Bank. Judge FICKETT gave Agent a copy of the description of this money, which will be forwarded to the Chicago Office.

Agent, Judge F. W. FICKETT and City Detective CHESTER SHERMAN checked the personal effects of the DILLINGER mob, which were in the safety deposit vault of the Consolidated National Bank and the following information is noted:

In the effects of HARRY PIERPONT was found a portion of a note, which, when pieced together with the note which HARRY PIERPONT attempted to masticate and swallow, indicates that EUGENE BARTLETT resides at 3550 W. 60th Street, Chicago, Ill.

In the effects of CHARLES MAKLEY was found a photograph of two women seated on the rear bumper of a car. On the back of this photograph appears the following: FLORENCE REEVES, Room 211, Heidelberg Hotel, Tucson, Arizona. The woman on the right has been identified as FLORENCE REEVES, but the woman on the left has not been identified. A pocket notebook was found in the effects of HARRY PIERPONT. This notebook contains various figures which are meaningless to Agent and will be forwarded to the Chicago Division Office.

In the effects of HARRY PIERPONT was found a repair bill which indicated that on January 12, 1934, some repair work was done on a Buick Sedan by the Ungar Buick Company of Miami, Florida.

Operator's license No. 51130 in the name of JOHN DONOVAN, 2916 East 10th Street, Indianapolis, Indiana, was also found.

The following information concerning the automobiles in possession of the DILLINGER mob was found in the personal effects which are being held in the safety deposit vault of the Consolidated National Bank. On December 27, 1933, Buick Sedan, Motor No. 2966900, Serial No. 2707596, was registered by J. C. DAVIES, an alias of PIERPONT, at Tallahassee, Florida, and 1934 license No. W-3789 was issued. At this time PIERPONT gave his address as 930 Daly St., Indianapolis, Indiana. On December 25, 1933, Mrs. J. C. DAVIES made application at Jacksonville, Florida, for license on a Ford Deluxe Sedan, Motor No. 807064, and license No. 24148 was assigned. At this time Mrs. DAVIES gave the address of 901 Atlantic Avenue, Daytona Beach, Florida. On January 17, 1934, at Jacksonville, Florida, an application for 1934 registration was made by Mrs. J. C. DAVIES on a Studebaker Sedan, engine No. C-24036, serial No. 8048838 and license D-13373 was assigned. At this time Mrs. DAVIES gave the same address as above.

On January 10, 1934, at Miami, Florida, CHARLES MAKLEY as J. C. DAVIES registered a letter, registry number being 21850.

The following names and addresses were also obtained from the effects of the DILLINGER mob; Mr. ~~W~~DIETSCHMAN, telephone Daly 5160, Milwaukee, Wisconsin; H. HUGHES, 6916 Forrer Street, Dearborn, Michigan, near corner of Warren and Division.

In the effects of HARRY PIEPONT was found a receipt for electric light and gas, which indicated that on January 25, 1934, PIEPONT, as J. C. EVANS, made application for that service at the address 725 North Third Avenue, Tucson, Arizona.

Agent interviewed P. M. HATCHER, Manager of the Congress Hotel. He advises that persons now known to him as CHARLES MAKLEY and RUSSELL CLARK registered at the Hotel on Sunday evening, January 21, 1934, at about 8:30 P. M., and resided there until the hotel fire on Tuesday morning, January 23, 1934, at about 7:30 A. M. They were assigned to Rooms 329 and 330, and had no long distance telephone calls or telegrams charged to the hotel bill, although there were eleven local telephone calls. Mr. HATCHER exhibited the registrations and list of telephone calls which had been saved from the fire. He further advises that this list had been provided to the Police Department who had made a check of the local calls and found that these calls were to real estate people.

Mrs. C. F. NELSON, telephone operator at the Congress Hotel, advises that there were no telegrams or long distance telephone calls sent out or received by MAKLEY or CLARK during their stay in the Congress Hotel.

WALTER RIDENOR and RICHARD OVERLY, bell-hops at the Congress Hotel, could offer no further information concerning activity of MAKLEY and CLARK while at the Congress Hotel.

H. B. SPARKS, 203 South Cherry Street, advised that he checked MAKLEY and CLARK into the hotel on Sunday evening, January 21, 1934. He advised that he and his wife were in the rooms of MAKLEY and CLARK, due to some plumbing repairing, but they did not see any pistols or machine guns. Mr. SPARKS stated that MAKLEY and CLARK tipped very liberally while at the hotel, but that otherwise there was no indication that these men were gangsters.

Mrs. MADGE RITZLER, address Hopi Lodge, Apartment 2, Alameda St., called at Agent's room at the hotel, where she was interviewed. Mrs. MADGE RITZLER advised that she was introduced to MAKLEY and CLARK by Mrs. ANNA SHERBERT BARTLETT, who stated that MAKLEY and CLARK were friends of her brother who resides in Chicago. She stated she went on various parties with MAKLEY and CLARK when they were first in Tucson from January 1 to 6, 1934, and that when they returned she also was on parties with them, and on one occasion MAKLEY and CLARK used her 1931 Chevrolet Sedan, 1934 California license No. 6-2-1851, to make a trip to Nogales, Arizona. She further advised that she and FLORENCE REEVES made the trip to Nogales with them.

She further advised that on Monday night, January 22, 1934, she made a tour of the various road-houses in the vicinity of Tucson with MAKLEY and CLARK, and that she went to their rooms at the Congress Hotel about five o'clock Tuesday morning with them, and that she was in the room with OPAL LONG and MAKLEY and CLARK at the time of the fire.

She further stated that she was arrested with CHARLES MAKLEY by Officers of the Police Department on January 23, 1934. MADGE RITZER states that BONNIE WYATT, FLORENCE REEVES, Mrs. ANNA SIEBERT BARTLETT and herself were the only persons contacted by MAKLEY and CLARK in Tucson. She denied that she knew MAKLEY and CLARK previous to being introduced to them by Mrs. ANNA SIEBERT BARTLETT. She advised that she came to Tucson, Arizona, from Kansas City, Missouri, with her mother about Thanksgiving of 1933, and that her husband is employed by the Kansas City Fire Department. She further advised that BONNIE WYATT is also from Kansas City and that BONNIE WYATT has returned to her husband, also a city fireman in Kansas City, Missouri.

Mrs. ANNA SIEBERT BARTLETT was located at a rooming house at 36 East Pennington Street. She stated that she met MAKLEY and CLARK on January 1, 1934, at the Heidelberg Hotel, at which time they stated that they were friends of her brother, EUGENE BARTLETT, in Chicago; that thereafter she introduced MAKLEY and CLARK to the various entertainers at Charlie Chase's Restaurant and accompanied them on two or three parties. She stated that she did not see them when they returned to Tucson about Jan. 19, 1934.

She further stated that on the morning of January 2, 1934, MAKLEY called her brother, EUGENE BARTLETT, by long distance telephone, and that she was in the room during the conversation and talked to her brother who advised her to keep away from MAKLEY and CLARK; also he did not give her any reasons for doing so. She stated that her brother EUGENE comes to Tucson during the winters and was supposed to have been in Tucson sometime in Jan., 1934, but evidently canceled the trip when he found out the character of MAKLEY and CLARK. She believes that her brother EUGENE knows something about MAKLEY and CLARK on account of the warning she received over the telephone. She further stated that she does not believe that BONNIE WYATT, FLORENCE REEVES or Mrs. MADGE RITZER knew MAKLEY or CLARK prior to the time she introduced MAKLEY and CLARK to the women. She further advised that she has another brother, ROBERT BARTLETT, in the real estate business in Chicago, Illinois.

GEORGE HULL, bartender at the Tamarack Inn, advised that FLORENCE REEVES is his sister, and that she is now residing with Mrs. W. E. CRAVIS at 523 North Volutia Street, Wichita, Kansas.

No leads are being set out in this report to interview any of the persons mentioned, but it is left to the discretion of the Chicago Office as to whether or not information contained in this report would be helpful in locating Subject DILLINGER.

The Division has received the report of Special Agent C. J. Endres, dated at Los Angeles, California, April 24, 1934, in the case entitled "John Herbert Dillinger, with aliases, Fugitive, Identification Order 1217, et al; National Motor Vehicle Theft Act; Obstruction of Justice" and desires to call your attention to the information obtained from Mrs. Hodge Ritser, appearing in the last paragraph on Page 6 that Mrs. Ritser and Florence Reeves made a trip in January, 1934 from Tucson, Arizona to Nogales, Arizona with Charles Makley and Russell Clark, who at that time were members of the Dillinger gang. It does not appear in the report that inquiries were made of Mrs. Ritser as to the purpose of this trip to Nogales, Arizona and what, if any, contacts were made there by Makley and Clark.

The Division suggests that this be given immediate attention in order that additional connections of the Dillinger gang may be obtained.

MEMORANDUM FOR THE DIRECTOR.

Mr. Clegg called from St. Paul and advised that the newspaper had the story concerning Mr. Mortenson; that he had been suspended as City Health Commissioner and that he had also made a statement to the Press indicating that on March 14 some unknown individuals came to his place with bullet-wounds, requesting to be treated. He gave them some superficial treatment and requested them to return the next day; he said he had not known their identities until after the shooting on Lexington Avenue on March 21 when he saw their photographs in the newspaper and recognized one of them as being John Dillinger.

Mr. Clegg stated he had also been advised by an Associated Press representative that Ludwig Schmidt was in custody at Chicago, Illinois; that he had verified this information from the Chicago Office; that the Chicago Office had indicated that they had not had time to interview Schmidt. Mr. Clegg stated that the Associated Press representative had been very cordial to him and had given him considerable information and that he proposed to allow the Associated Press representative to obtain a copy of a photograph from the Saint Paul Office of Ludwig Schmidt, the representative promising that he would not reveal the source of the photograph. Mr. Clegg stated he thought this should be done in view of the fact that the representative had been so congenial with him and had submitted considerable information. I told Mr. Clegg I thought there would be no objection to such procedure.

With regard to the petition being circulated in Wisconsin requesting the suspension of Mr. Purvis, Mr. Clegg telephoned and advised that the postmaster at Mercer is said to be the individual who started such petition. Mr. Rorer interviewed the postmaster, Mr. Gehr, who stated that there was such a petition but that he was not circulating it and had nothing to do with it. The petition was found in a store run by M. E. Brandt in Mercer, Wisconsin. He advised Mr. Rorer that the petition was drawn up by two newspaper men who wrote the petition yesterday. They got a local individual to present it before the regular meeting of the Mercer Lakeland Civic Association, and it was voted to circularize a petition asking for an investigation of the shooting. The newspaper men were believed to be from Milwaukee. One of them is thought to represent the Wisconsin News from Milwaukee, and the other from the Milwaukee Sentinel. An individual by the name of Peters, the local citizen, was going around with them, introducing them, and also introduced the petition at the regular meeting of the Association. Mr. Clegg read the petition to me. This petition, Mr. Rorer states, has been in Brandt's store all day. It has a total of seven names on it. Up to 3:30 this afternoon, these names were the following: Cristene Rotuski; Vera Brandt; Ruth H. Miller; Elva Mussel; Guy Wing; Mark Swarengin; and M. E. Brandt, Jr. Mr. Rorer stated that the first three were certainly women, and probably the fourth one, and the seventh one is the son of the owner of the store. The storekeeper said he was not circulating it and was not urging any one to sign it. He had not signed it himself, although two members of his family had, namely, Vera and M. E. Brandt, Jr. He said that in view of the vote of the Civic Association, it had been left in his store so that any one who wanted to might sign it. Mr. Rorer stated there was not any excitement in the vicinity; that there appeared to be more in the papers than the facts justified; that there was no vigor being expressed at the meeting of the Association so far as could be learned, it being a regular meeting; and that there was no wave of resentment displayed in the meeting. The response is apparently very insignificant due to the fact that only seven had signed the petition. The two newspaper reporters have not been definitely identified. Mr. Rorer has an appointment to interview Peters tonight in an effort to definitely identify the reporters. After that he will proceed to the other four towns where petitions are said to be circulated. Mr. Clegg stated he instructed Mr. Rorer to notice particularly whether the phraseology is identical and to explain to those people circulating such petitions that they were unnecessary and that he was left in that vicinity to make such an investigation, and was doing it. Mr. Rorer thought there was no occasion for alarm, that there was no feeling among the citizens, and that the whole thing was concocted for a newspaper story. I explained that the difficulty is that because of the manner in which this matter is played up in the press, the feeling of the public might be so aroused as to cause serious trouble. I requested Mr. Clegg to have Mr. Rorer obtain the full information so that I might transmit

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it to the Attorney General for use at the press conference tomorrow. Mr. Clegg stated he had instructed Mr. Rorer to handle this matter exclusively, turning the other investigation over to other Agents. Mr. Rorer felt he could probably stop the entire matter; that he thought the petitions "would die a natural death." Mr. Rorer thought this action by the newspapers was a malicious attempt to embarrass Mr. Purvis. I advised Mr. Clegg of the memorandum which I today drafted to the Attorney General, setting forth the exact details of this occurrence, and advising that Mr. Clegg was in charge rather than Mr. Purvis. I told Mr. Clegg I desired to supplement this memorandum tomorrow morning with another one, setting forth this angle, and also calling attention to the activities of "Horse Face" Thompson in St. Paul. Mr. Clegg called attention to the fact that Thompson is not covering our office at St. Paul now; that another representative has taken his place, who is more cordial. We agreed that the proper action to take would be not to make a public denial of the various allegations made against us.

I instructed that Mr. Rorer in making his investigation not try to suppress the petition or interfere with it, but to give the citizens the facts and point out how it was handled and how unfair these statements are.

Purvis, the trump cards will not be with him for all the deals in this game of evading the law. Being an officer with fourteen years of mixing with the transient public has taught me that it is by cooperation of the various law enforcement bodies that success alone can be attained. Should my suggestions in this or any other matter pertaining to your office be of value, sir, I will be willing to aid as best I can. I should like to meet you at some future date and talk things over as concerns investigations in the northern part of the state, for I can suggest a man who is able to give wonderful help to you due to his past work in the entire upper section of the state in addition to his being a perfect woodsman who can and does keep sealed lips when sealed they must be.

Excuse my apparent intrusion in writing to you. I met a Virgil Peterson then in with your department some months back. This the reason for my sending this note, and I believe he may have mentioned talking with me about his seeking information on material as to Miller and Bailey due to the City Manager of Two Rivers thinking he saw one of these men.

Mercer Petition Urges Federal Bureau Chief's Suspension for Inquiry in Gang's Escape

WISCONSIN (AP)—A petition asking the suspension of Marvin H. Purvis, chief of the federal bureau of investigation in this area, pending an investigation into the escape of the James Dillinger gang from a hideout here here was being circulated here Tuesday.

The petition was presented at a meeting here Tuesday night at 30 Madison of the National Development Association. It was addressed to the department of justice, saying: "We respectfully petition for the suspension of Marvin H. Purvis, chief of investigation of the federal bureau of investigation of the United States department of justice, on the night of May 21 in regard to the Dillinger gang hideout here. It is requested that he be brought to trial at the earliest possible date."

MEMORANDUM FOR MR. CLEGG *H.C. [unclear]*

With reference to the identity of Dr. N. G. Mortinsen, M.D., 360 Bremer Arcade, St. Paul, Minnesota, who is alleged to have administered to the wounds of John Dillinger, this doctor is also mentioned in connection with the activities of the Barker-Karpis gang, as reflected in the report of Special Agent O. G. Hall, dated at St. Paul, Minnesota, July 27, 1933, rendered in the case entitled Vernon C. Miller, with aliases (deceased), et al., Obstruction of Justice.

On page 3 of this report it appears that when the individuals identified as members of the Barker-Karpis group rented the premises at 204 Vernon Avenue, St. Paul, from James P. McLaren, the owner, the individuals gave as references the names of Dr. N. G. Mortinsen, 360 Bremer Arcade and Thomas J. Newman, attorney at law, Commerce Building.

Mr. McLaren advised Agents that before renting the premises he telephoned Mr. Newman and was informed by Mr. Newman that J. Stanley Smith (the alias used by the Barkers when renting the premises) was "all right so far as Newman knew", Newman stating that he had done legal work for Smith who was employed by the Federated Metal Company, of St. Louis, as a salesman. Mr. McLaren also stated that he attempted to call Dr. Mortinsen, but was unable to reach him.

An interview had with Dr. Mortinsen is reflected in the following quoted paragraphs taken from the report of Special Agent Hall, referred to above:

"Dr. N. G. Mortinsen, 360 Bremer Arcade, who was given as a reference by Smith but who was not contacted by McLaren, was interviewed. In addition to the giving of his name as a reference, the further lead in that connection was that when the house was searched by McLaren, he found in the bath room a small medicine bottle containing gonorrhoea medicine which had been given to some individual on February 16, 1932, by Dr. Mortinsen. Dr. Mortinsen stated, after searching his records very thoroughly, that he doubted that he would have made a record because he suspected that the patient was a transient recommended to him probably by some druggist. Dr. Mortinsen has a considerable

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business of that nature, is the only doctor specializing in that type of ailments in that section of downtown St. Paul. He is a well known doctor.

"Dr. Mortinsen was shown the photographs of individuals previously mentioned as well as the photographs of Francis Keating and Thomas Holden, but he could identify no one. He promised his cooperation and requested that photographs of all suspects be given to him and stated that he will most certainly inform this office should any of them appear in his office. The necessary arrangements were made with him by the St. Paul Office."

Paragraphs taken from the same report reflect the results of an interview had with Attorney Newman:

"Mr. Thomas Newman, attorney at law, Commerce Building, who was given as a reference by J. Stanley Smith when renting the house from James P. McLaren was interviewed. Thomas Newman was engaged to represent Mrs. Fern Sankey, participant in the kidnaping of Charles Boettcher, II, of Denver and Haskell Bohn of St. Paul, Minnesota. For some reason or other, shortly before the trial, Newman withdrew from the case, it being rumored that the purpose of the withdrawal was to cause an adjournment until the fall term of the Criminal Court at St. Paul. The clientele of Mr. Newman is composed to some extent of local hoodlums. Mr. Newman advised that an individual giving the name of J. Stanley Smith appeared at his office in March, 1933, and endeavored to employ Newman to act as his attorney to collect a note due from John Bovard, Olive Street, St. Louis, Missouri. On April 30, this individual again appeared at Newman's office and again on May 13, 1933. On the first two occasions, Newman wrote letters to Bovard to an address on Olive Street at St. Louis, Missouri, requesting payment of a \$250 promissory note payable on demand made by John Bovard. On the back of this note there was an endorsement that \$87.50 had been paid, leaving a balance of \$162.50. On the third visit on May 13th, the individual Smith requested that the copies of the letters which Newman had written to Bovard be given to him as Smith intended to go to St. Louis and wanted the copies in the event the person Bovard denied receiving the communications. From that point, the story of Mr. Newman becomes involved and garbled. He stated that Smith took the letters as they were written to the Post Office and registered them, according to

his own statement. Newman also claims that he (Newman) wrote the letters as his stenographer was not at the office when Smith visited him and consequently there are no stenographic notes, Newman writing the letters himself. He stated there are no copies of the correspondence in his office. Newman was questioned at considerable length regarding this matter but nothing further was obtained from him that would be of value. He stated that on the first visit, the man was accompanied by a woman but he did not look at her so he could describe her. The photographs of the several individuals previously mentioned herein were shown to Newman. When he examined the photograph of Karpis, he looked at same for a considerable length of time and indicated without saying anything that probably some consideration should be given to that photograph. When asked if Karpis was the individual, Smith replied he could not say that he was as he was very poor at identifying people.

"Newman, as a point of information, is very friendly with certain members of the St. Paul Police Department; that he had considerable influence under the regime of Chief Thomas Brown."

This investigation was conducted April 19 and 20, 1934 by Special Agent S. W. Hardy, in the Dillinger case, under instructions from Mr. Clegg to ascertain the reputation, standing and past activities of the three attorneys who appeared in the writ of habeas corpus matter for HENRY HETH GREEN in Federal court, April 10, 1934, these attorneys being EDWARD J. DELANEY, 728 Globe Building, residing 1302 Hague Avenue; JOHN EDWARD BURKE, 1036 Minnesota Building, residing 693 Portland Avenue; and Joseph P. Tracy, 728 Globe Building, residing 705 Grand Avenue, all of St. Paul, Minnesota.

Records of the supreme court of the State of Minnesota show that DELANEY was admitted to State practice September 14, 1933; that BURKE and TRACY were both admitted to State practice August 30, 1930.

Records of the Federal court, St. Paul, Minnesota, reflect that BURKE on April 9, 1934 moved the admission of both TRACY and DELANEY, and that on May 25, 1931 BURKE was admitted.

United States Commissioner William T. Goddard of St. Paul, Minnesota, was interviewed and with regard to BURKE refers to the case of U. S. vs John Joseph Wolfe and Joseph William Phillipi, being criminal docket 5763 and 5773 of the United States District Court, St. Paul, Minnesota; states that BURKE represented one of these defendants about December 17, 1933; that he, as Commissioner, set the bond for BURKE's client in the second case as BURKE's client already having made bond in the former case -- that BURKE objected to his client having to post a bond in the second case, insisting that the bond in the first case would cover both cases, which was not satisfactory and not allowed by Commissioner Goddard; that later that day BURKE phoned Goddard advising that he had just posted bond before the United States Clerk in the second case, whereupon GODDARD asked him how much additional bond had been posted with the Clerk for the second case and BURKE advising that the bond for the first case had been made to cover both cases by order of Federal Judge Matthew J. Joyce. Commissioner Goddard states that he then went to the office of the Clerk of the United States District Court, St. Paul and was advised that such an order by Federal Judge Joyce had been received, BURKE having just been in the office about the matter prior to Mr. Goddard's inquiry. Mr. Goddard states that he then went to Judge Joyce and it developed that BURKE had secured the order regarding the bond in the first case covering both cases without disclosing to Judge Joyce that he had been before Commissioner Goddard in the second case and that Commissioner Goddard had set an additional bond in the latter case; that thereupon Judge Joyce summoned BURKE to his chambers (in Goddard's presence) that Judge Joyce told BURKE he had deliberately misrepresented the facts in the case to him by having gone to Commissioner Goddard who had set a bond and not disclosing to the Judge that this action had been taken; that Judge Joyce said to BURKE that he had deliberately lied to the court about the facts, and "you will learn that when you want anything from this court that you have to tell the truth and the whole truth about the matter.

that then Judge Joyce said he would withdraw his order regarding the bond and went to the Clerk's office and tore the order up.

The records of the Clerk's office show criminal docket 5773 and 5765 in which the defendants are John Joseph Wolfe and Joseph William Phillipi, and in which BURKE is one of the defense attorneys, charging violation of the National Prohibition Act. In file 5773 temporary bond was filed December 9, 1932 before Commissioner Goddard in amount \$3,000.00 for Phillipi's appearance in United States District Court and bond dated November 21, 1932 for Phillipi's appearance before United States Commissioner November 25, 1932. These two cases were made during November and December, 1932, one being for violation of the National Prohibition Act at Salby and Avon Streets in St. Paul, the other for a similar violation at 541 University Avenue in St. Paul. In docket 5765 there appears to be a bond executed by WOLFE, December 19, 1932 for his appearance before United States Court in amount \$1,000.00 and a surety bond not exceeding \$5,000.00 for his appearance which bears date of December 17, 1932; there also appears to be a bond dated November 21, 1932 for Wolfe, being a surety bond in amount not exceeding \$2,000.00 by WOLFE bearing same date in amount \$2,000.00 for his appearance before the United States Commissioner.

In the BETH GREEN matter, the records of the Clerk, U. S. District Court reflect that on April 7, 1934, order and petition for writ of habeas corpus was filed in the case of "BETH GREEN, also known as BETH HINES vs. WERNER HANMI, et al", in which Attorneys Delaney, Tracy and Burke, who have signed and verified the petition as attorneys for BETH HINES, states that they "have been retained in her behalf by her relatives and family". It is noted that this petition is not verified by any member of BETH GREEN's family or by any of her relatives. The records of the Clerk's office show that the \$5.00 fee to file this suit was deposited by Attorney Burke. The records further show that on April 10, 1934, motion by the United States Attorney to discharge this writ was granted by the court.

George Heisey, Assistant United States Attorney, St. Paul, Minn., who handled the BETH GREEN writ of habeas corpus for the Government, states that at the hearing before Federal Judge Joyce April 10, 1934, Attorneys Delaney, Burke and Tracy were in the court room and represented to Judge Joyce that they had been retained by friends and relatives of Beth Green to represent her, however, that they did not advise the names or identity of the relatives and friends of Beth Green who had employed them; that MRS. GREEN stated that she did not know these attorneys; that they did not represent her and that she did not want them to represent her. Mr. Heisey states that it appeared from the preceding that these attorneys were either out to get some publicity or had seen the newspaper accounts of her arrest, which showed that she had approximately \$1500.00 when arrested, and were taking a chance on volunteering

He knows each of these three attorneys intimately and he advised that Burke worked for Thomas McMeekin, who is St. Paul's outstanding lawyer for the defense of criminals; that he was with McMeekin for approximately three years while he was going to the St. Paul College of Law; graduated from the St. Paul College of Law and was admitted to practice during the summer of 1930; that he then formed a law partnership with Jerome Hoffman, which extended from approximately 1930 to late 1933; that he has been advised by certain members of the County Attorney's office that they put very little confidence in his word; that it is rumored that Hoffman, about the end of 1933, split the law partnership because he could not rely on Burke; that it is also rumored that Burke has been indulging in intoxicants to an extent which interfered with his position and perhaps this was the reason that Hoffman dissolved the partnership; that Burke has always been known as a criminal lawyer and the rumor around St. Paul is that the law firm of Hoffman and Burke had a connection with what is known as the Minneapolis Syndicate, composed of Barney Berman, Isadore Blumenfeld, Clifford Skelly (all of whom were known as money changers in the Urschel Kidnaping case) also Isadore Wolk, brother of Charles Wolk, who was tried in connection with the Urschel Kidnaping Case; Jack Pfaiffer; Leon Glickman (who is an ex-convict) and Thomas Banks; however, [REDACTED] has

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has no evidence other than street rumor by which this can be proved and requests his name be kept confidential in furnishing this data.

Regarding Mr. Delaney, [REDACTED]

[REDACTED] states that Delaney is now running for Justice of the Peace in Ramsey County, Minnesota; that he is a new comer in the practice of law, just having graduated from the St. Paul College of Law in 1933 and has only practiced approximately one year; that he comes of a good family in St. Paul; that Delaney has a brother working at Montgomery Ward in Minneapolis and [REDACTED] stated that James Green, who is a brother to the common law husband of Beth Green also works at the same place and may have contacted Attorney Delaney in this manner, however, he has no direct information that this is the fact.

Regarding Mr. Tracy, [REDACTED]

[REDACTED] states that Tracy's father has been in the real estate, insurance and bonding business in St. Paul for a number of years and that Attorney Tracy is a brother of James Tracy, professional bondsman in St. Paul.

[REDACTED] Tracy graduated from the University of Minnesota during the summer of 1930 and was admitted to the practice of law in St. Paul; that he has been very active in church work in St. Luke's Church in St. Paul and is head of the Young Men's Club there; that he has not had very much practice of any kind, just starting out in the law business and has not been known heretofore as a criminal lawyer; that he has no reputation to speak of as a lawyer as he has only been practicing a couple of years and has not, as yet, acquired a large practice or reputation.

Mr. M. J. Doherty, who is president of the Ramsey County Bar Association, Mr. Ed. Baer, who is Secretary of the Grievance Committee, and Mr. Earl Jackson, who is chairman of the Grievance Committee of the Ramsey County Bar Association, were each interviewed and stated there have been no complaints reached them concerning Delaney, Burke or Tracy; that Mr. Delaney and Mr. Tracy are newcomers among the lawyers of St. Paul and have not yet had time to work up a reputation as lawyers; that they are looked upon merely as young lawyers just starting in and nothing detrimental has been said heretofore about them.

Mr. Doherty did not know Burke, however, BAER and Mr. Jackson each advised agent that Burke had worked in the office of Attorney Thomas McMeekin for several years while going through the St. Paul College of Law; that McMeekin's reputation was that of a criminal lawyer, who represented the underworld of the Twin Cities; that Burke and McMeekin separated about 1930-1931 and since that time Burke has been in a law partnership with Jerome Hoffman in the Minnesota Building in St. Paul and seems to have practiced criminal

law extensively and to have foreclosed a number of mortgages for the building and loan association of which John Scott, a city official, is an officer; that they do not regard Burke as being a lawyer of any great ability.

Similar statements concerning Burke were received from the following outstanding lawyers of St. Paul: WILLIAM H. OPPENHEIM; FREDERICK N. DICKSON; DANIEL E. WILLARD, Jr.; W. A. SOBEL. Attorney George W. Jensen of the Oppenheim law firm states that he knows Burke quite well; that he has seen BURKE within the past year on a number of occasions with underworld characters; that he seems to frequent night clubs and beer parlors and to drink to excess; that BURKE has the name of being a criminal lawyer but that he does not seem to have a great deal of ability as an attorney. Mr. Daniel E. Willard, Jr. and Mr. George W. Jensen state that Mr. Delaney and Mr. Tracy are young lawyers, who have only had several years' practice in St. Paul; that their reputation appears to be good and that they have never been in any trouble so far as is known.

At the County Attorney's office, agent interviewed Assistant County Attorney James Lynch, who stated that Delaney, Burke and Tracy were all well known to him; that Delaney is running for the Justice of the Peace at the present time, seems to be a likeable young man, has only been out of law school a few years and has just started his practice of law and has never been in any trouble; that his character and reputation seem to be good.

With regard to Mr. Tracy, Mr. Lynch states that Tracy is just starting in the practice of law and has a good reputation; has never been in any trouble as far as he knows and while not a profound student of the law and not looked on as a lawyer of any great ability, is a likeable young man.

With regard to Burke, Mr. Lynch states that about April 11, 1934, Burke told him that BETH GREEN was a client of Delaney's prior to her recent arrest in St. Paul April 3, 1934; that Delaney got Tracy to assist him and that both Delaney and Tracy came to him (Burke) to get Burke to help them in the writ of habeas corpus matter; that Burke also told Mr. Lynch that a brother of Beth Green's hired Delaney in this case to represent her in the writ of habeas corpus action which was heard in Federal Court April 10, 1934. Mr. Lynch states that Burke also told him that he had been in one previous "jam" with Federal Judge Joyce before this writ of habeas corpus action which was heard April 10, 1934, but Burke claims that he was right and that Judge Joyce was wrong in the first matter. (This apparently refers to the Wolfe and Phillippi case noted previously).

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Mr. Lynch further states that newspaper Reporter Ray Snyder of the St. Paul Pioneer Press told him that on Saturday, April 7, 1934, Attorney BURKE telephoned him asking Snyder to come over to BURKE's office that he had a story which he desired to have printed which proved to be the story that BURKE was filing the writ of habeas corpus for BETH GREEN. (This should be noted from the ethics angle of Burke's securing publicity.) That Ray Snyder also told him that Burke made a similar call to the St. Paul Daily News to give them the story of filing the writ of habeas corpus for BETH GREEN. Mr. Lynch stated that Burke got his training in the office of Thomas McMeekin and may be a distant relative of McMeekin's; that McMeekin is looked upon by the County Attorney's office as a representative of underworld characters and uses unscrupulous methods in some instances to try to win criminal cases; that in this environment, Burke got his training among the wrong lines and that he associates with and is too close to the criminals of the Twin Cities for his own good. Mr. Lynch points to the State case of GEORGE YOUNG and JOSEPH SHAFER, which was tried in District Court in St. Paul, Minnesota, for approximately five weeks during October and November, 1933. YOUNG and SHAFER were charged and convicted for the murder of two men at Snelling and University Avenues in St. Paul; that the defense in this case was nothing but perjury from beginning to end and McMeekin and Burke were the defense attorneys; that one or the other of these attorneys had to get the witnesses to commit this perjury, and it is Lynch's private opinion that the only reason McMeekin had Burke as an attorney in this case was to handle the witnesses and get their testimony lined up the way McMeekin wanted them to testify which consisted of their committing perjury; that the witnesses for the defense in the Young-Shafer case were all bootleggers or underworld characters of the Twin Cities; if they were men of any other character than this, it might be possible to go to them and ascertain from them who got them to testify and commit perjury in that case; however, since they are bootleggers and criminals and underworld characters, Mr. Lynch doubts very much whether they would tell the truth about either McMeekin or Burke influencing them to commit perjury in their testimony the way Mr. Lynch states they did.

Mr. Lynch further states that Burke told him on April 11, 1934 that he personally moved the admission in Federal Court of Delaney and Tracy April 9, 1934 at St. Paul, Minnesota, for the purpose of having them appear as attorneys in the writ of habeas corpus action in which they claim that they represented MRS. BETH GREEN.

STATEMENT OF MRS. EDWARD A. CROMPTON

My name is Mrs. Edward A. Crompton, nee Jean Angela Delaney. I also, after arrest April 23, 1934, gave my name as Ann Southern and Anne Sothern. I give this statement voluntarily, without threat promise force or coercion from any source, knowing my Constitutional Rights, that I need make no statement, and that any statement I make can be used in a subsequent prosecutive action.

I am 22 years of age, born at Cincinnati, Ohio, February 1, 1912; my father, Fred Delaney, and mother, Helen Delaney, are dead. I have one sister, Mrs. Pat (Helen Babe) Reilly, who is the wife of Pat Reilly, whose St. Paul Police Dept. photo #22456 under his alias Albert W. Reilly. The Reilly's live with their five-year old son on Thomas Avenue in St. Paul, Minnesota. I am not divorced but in early 1933, I separated from my husband, Edward A. Crompton, a night club entertainer of Chicago, Ill. I also know, and am a friend of Tommy Carroll, whose St. Paul Police Dept. # is 23979, and I identify Carroll's photo which is before me as being that of this man whom I know as "Jack".

After leaving my husband in Chicago in early 1933 I went to live in a room on Normal Boulevard in Chicago by myself, working as a cashier and waitress at the Subway Cafe on South 63rd St. near Ellis, in Chicago, until about Nov. 30, 1933 -- then I went to St. Paul, Minn. alone by train to visit my sister. Mrs. Pat. Reilly, who lives on a duplex on Thomas Ave. in St. Paul. I stayed with my sister a short time -- never did work at all in St. Paul -- and met Tommy Carroll, under the name of "Jack", in St. Paul at a nite club on University Ave. (I don't recall the name of the night club). Carroll was introduced to me as "Jack" by a girl whom I only knew as "Alice". I started going with Carroll off an on. I stayed with Carroll about a week as man and wife at a small apartment hotel in St. Paul in December, 1933. I don't recall the name or location of this apartment hotel. Shortly after Xmas 1933 I went back to Chicago by train alone, living at an apartment hotel at 63d & Kenmore for about two months, and then moved to another apartment hotel at 65th & Kenmore, living alone at these places. I don't recall the names of these apartment hotels. I met Carroll again at the "Nitty Nite Club" on Clark St. in Chicago about April 10, 1934 and made an appointment to meet him at 1800 Clark St., Chicago, Wednesday night Apr. 18, 1934 to go on a trip together with him. I met Carroll there about 11 P. M., Apr. 18, 1934. Marion Marr and the man called "Slim" were with Carroll in a Black Buick Coupe when I met them there. Carroll was driving the coupe. Marion Marr is one of the girls who was arrested with me at Little Bohemia Lodge in Vilas County, Wis., Apr. 23, 1934, and "Slim" I describe as being about 30 to 35 years old, about 5' 11" or 6' 0" tall, thin build, had medium dark brown straight hair, his weight I judge being 150 to 160 lbs. I got in the Buick and the four of us drove from Chicago to a roadhouse about 100 miles from Chicago where we stopped to eat in the early morning hours. We drove into Wisconsin going very slowly, stopped to eat at several places, and arrived at Little Bohemia Lodge in Vilas County, Wisconsin, in the afternoon of Thursday, Apr. 19, 1934. At Little Bohemia Lodge, Apr. 19, 1934, I saw my brother-in-law, Pat Reilly. He stayed there Apr. 19, and 20, and left on Apr. 21, 1934. I think that Reilly knew Carroll as I saw them walk off together at Little Bohemia Lodge. When Reilly left on Apr. 21, 1934 I did not know whether he was going to return or not.

secured a room on the second floor. Then Van Meter told me that we were going up north, so I bought some outing clothes with the money he gave me; and on Thursday morning Apr. 19, 1934 Van Meter and I took the train from Chicago, Ill. to a town near Little Bohemia Lodge, Wis. and were met at the depot in that town by a man named "Shorty" who evidently was a friend of Van Meter, as they spoke to each other, and Van Meter introduced me to "Shorty", and Shorty drove us in the same Ford Sedan which was later seized by officers in the garage at Little Bohemia Lodge, to that Lodge. Van Meter evidently didn't know previously much about Little Bohemia Lodge, as he questioned Shorty about it, and Shorty told him it was a large place and all about the Lake. Shorty is not anyone whose photo has been shown to me. Shorty is about 25 to 30 years old, dark hair, light brown eyes, about 5'4" or 5", heavy muscular build, but short stature, swarthy complexion. (I do not recognize him as being the same party as "Baby Face" Nelson, whose photo has been shown me.)

A man named "Slim" came to Little Bohemia Lodge with Marion Marr and Mrs. Edward A. Crompton, in a Buick car driven by the man whom Mrs. Crompton has identified as Tommy Carroll. There were from seven to ten men who seemed to be in the bunch with whom Van Meter was associated at the Little Bohemia Lodge on Apr. 19, to 22d, but I did not pay much attention to them, noticed that they were playing cards together, and did not recognize any of them as being John Dillinger and his associates, whose photos have been just shown to me. These parties may have been there but I just don't recognize them from the photos. If Pat Reilly was there I did not see him.

The glasses found in my possession on arrest were purchased by me in St. Paul during Mar 1934 from Geo. J. Schmidt, oculist, 11 East 7th St. Paul. On the evening of Sunday Apr. 22 1934 Van Meter packed his and my bags, put them in the same Ford car which "Shorty" had driven us to Little Bohemia Lodge in, and told me that we were going to leave. One car of the men left the Lodge Apr. 21, 1934, but I don't know who was in it, or whether they were coming back. About 9:30PM or 10PM Apr. 22, 1934 I was in my bedroom at the Lodge, heard the dogs barking, and shooting start from both inside and outside of the Lodge, and the seven or eight men with whom Van Meter had been associating, together with Van Meter, ran away from the Lodge, leaving me, Mrs. Crompton and Marion Marr, deserting us.

I have read the foregoing statement, and it is true. I sign it voluntarily and willingly, in the presence of U.S. Marshal John M. Comford, Madison, Wis; Chief Deputy Sheriff Joseph P. Shaughnessy, Madison Wis; and S.W. Hardy, Special Agent, Division of Investigation, U.S. Dept. of Justice.

recall going either alone or with Van Meter to visit anyone in the Santa Monica Apartment Bldg at 33rd & Girard, Mpls. at any time. I deny going to John Dillinger's apartment there at any time. If Van Meter went to Dillinger's apartment there he must have had some other woman with him, as it was not me. I have read numerous newspaper accounts during Feb. March and April 1934 concerning John Dillinger, seen News Reels of him; and know he was captured at Tucson, Arizona, taken to Crown Point, Indiana, where he broke jail, stole the lady Sheriff's car which he escaped in to Chicago, Illinois, because of which the federal and state officers were trying to apprehend him, and that he was "wanted" by the U.S. Government on a warrant.

About the first week in February 1934 Van Meter and I returned by train to Chicago Ill. and started living in an apartment under the name of Mr. and Mrs. Ted Anker. I do not recall the address of the apartment, but it was in the 4000 block of a street running parallel to Clark, and 2 or 3 blocks east of Clark on the North Side, in Chicago, the apartment being the third one from the corner (4000). We stayed in that apartment a month, up until early in March 1934. He would leave the apartment about 7 or 7:30AM each morning and return about 5:30PM each evening (this was similar to the way he lived in Mpls. too). He never told me what his business was. He never seemed to have very much money, but we always had enough to live on comfortably. He never told me the address of any business he was connected with, and never introduced me to any of his friends, except that the day I first met him he was with a young man who used the name "Eddie".

About March 15, 1934 Van Meter and I went to St. Paul, Minnesota by train. I took him to the home of Pat Reilly and Helen (Babe) Reilly, on Thomas Ave. in St. Paul, Minn. This is the first time he met them. Van Meter and I stayed at the Reilly's home that night, and the next night he went back to Chicago by train, leaving me in St. Paul, at the Reillys. I needed medical treatment, and Mrs. Helen (Babe) Reilly recommended Dr. Plankers, whose office is in the Hamm Bldg., in St. Paul, so I went to Dr. Plankers, who said I needed an operation for female trouble. Van Meter, before leaving, had told me to phone him if I needed anything at a certain phone number in Chicago, Ill. which number I do not now recall, but it started as follows "SEELY 9 ---". Van Meter wrote this number down on the blotting paper side of a small blotter, the upper side of which carried the ad of some barbershop, and gave this number to me to phone him at. I do not have the number of the blotter now, as I left it on the dresser at Babe Reilly's when I left her home Apr. 17, 1934. This number can probably be traced through the Phone Co. at St. Paul, because about Mar. 19 or 20, 1934, I placed a phone call to Van Meter (under his alias of Ted Anker) --station to station call-- using the Pay Phone Booth in the Drug Store at Rice and University Ave., in St. Paul, Minn. Another party answered at the Chicago phone number, who called Ted to the phone, and I told him I would need money for the operation. The place he talked to me from sounded like a drugstore or poolroom as I noted there was a lot of noise. Van Meter sent me \$75 for downpayment on the operation, this coming by mail. I went to the Samaritan Hospital in St. Paul Mar. 21, 1934 had the operation by Dr. Plankers, and stayed at the hospital until Mar. 31, 1934. Van Meter came to St. Paul while I was at the hospital, came to see me several times at the hospital -- I don't know where he was staying in St. Paul, but he was there for about one week before I got out of the hospital Mar. 31, 1934. Van Meter paid Dr. Plankers and the hospital bill, which was about \$200, and on Mar. 31, 1934 he took me to the Reilly's home, and then he went to Chicago that night on the train, telling me to rest up a couple of weeks and then to come to Chicago and to phone him

STATEMENT OF MISS MARIE MARION CONFORTI.

My name is Marie Marion Conforti. I also have used the aliases MRS. ROSE ANCKER, and MRS. TED ANCKER, and MRS. THEODORE ANCKER, and MRS. JOHN OBER, and "MICKEY", and MARIE COSTELLO.

I give this statement voluntarily to the Division of Investigation U.S. Department of Justice, without threat, promise, force or coercion from any source, nor inducement from any source; knowing my Constitutional Rights, that I need make no statement unless I so desire to; and that any statement I may make can be used in a subsequent prosecutive action.

I am unmarried, am 21 years of age, was born at Chicago Illinois April 14, 1913; my father Rocco Conforti died in 1933, and my mother Mrs. Elinor Krouse Conforti is an invalid in the Oak Forest Sanitarium at Oak Forest, Illinois. Up till Christmas 1933 I worked for my living as a saleslady at Scott's 5' to \$1 Store located on North Avenue between Crawford and California Sts. in Chicago Ill. and lived alone in a rooming house at 1740 Adams St., in Chicago.

I know Homer Van Meter, whose police photo #14991 is before me as I make this statement. I know Homer Van Meter under the name of Ted Ancker and Theodore Ancker, and also as John Ober, and I have lived with him as his wife in Chicago, Minneapolis, St. Paul Minn. and Little Bohemia Lodge, Wisconsin, from about Christmas 1933 to Apr. 23 1934, when I was arrested at Little Bohemia Lodge, Wisconsin. I also know Pat Reilly, alias Albert W. Reilly, St. Paul Police Dept. photo #22453, which photo is before me as I make this statement. I also know the man named "Jack" who was at Little Bohemia Lodge with Mrs. Edward A. Crompton (alias Ann Sothern), and whom Mrs. Crompton has identified as being Tommy Carroll, St. Paul Police Dept. photo #23979, whose photo is before me as I make this statement.

I met Mrs. Pat (Helen Babe) Reilly, wife of Pat Reilly, at a beer tavern in Chicago during the summer of 1933, and was with her for three evenings, got to know her quite well, and when she returned to her home in St. Paul Minn. she gave me her address, and she invited me to visit her. I worked until Christmas 1933 in Chicago Ill. and then met Van Meter, just picked him up, and about Jan. 1st 1934 I started living with him as his wife, although we were never married. Van Meter took me from Chicago Ill. about Jan. 1, 1934 to Minneapolis Minn. by train, and we rented apartment 201 at 3310 Fremont Ave. South, in Minneapolis under the name of Mr. and Mrs. John Ober. Van Meter told me his right name was Ted Ancker, but suggested that we rent the apartment in the name of Ober and that we use that name instead of his own right name because the Chicago Police were looking for him under his right name, that he had committed a crime with a bunch of hoodlums at Taylor and Racine district in Chicago and that this was what the Chicago Police wanted him for; and told me that he had previously been in the liquor racket. When we first arrived in Minneapolis I noted that he went directly to 3310 Fremont Ave. as he seemed to know we could get an apartment there. I do not know any of Van Meter's relatives. He told me his parents were dead. While we lived at 3310 Fremont Ave. S. in Minneapolis during January 1934 I met Bessie Randall, who also uses the name of Beth Green and who is the woman of Eddie Green, Bessie Randall living on the corner of 3rd & Fremont Ave. Minneapolis Minn. at that time. I never knew her man Eddie Green. Bessie Randall and I visited back and forth during January 1934 when we were neighbors in Minn. and

From the way Carroll talked I believed he was a gambler—he always seemed to have plenty of money. On arriving at Little Bohemia, Carroll told me to keep to myself and not to talk to the other men whom I saw at that place. I therefore kept mostly with Marion Marr and the girl who gave her name as Rose Ancker, after we were arrested together. I did not listen to much of the conversation which the men had at that place.

I have been shown photos of numerous other men, including that of John Dillinger, and do not recognize them as being those of men I saw at Little Bohemia Lodge, however as I did not pay much attention to the men there it is possible that Dillinger was there and I did not recognize him. At the time I left Chicago with Carroll Apr. 18, 1934 and at the time I was at Little Bohemia Lodge Apr. 19 to 23, 1934, I knew that John Dillinger was a fugitive from justice being sought by officers of the government for having stolen the Sheriff's car at Crown Point, Indiana, and for escaping from jail there, and for bank robberies. I had read about him in papers as being the one who the papers said had done these things.

I know Bessie Randall, whom I understand uses the name of Beth Green. She lived at the 3300 block of Fremont Ave. in Minneapolis, Minn. in December, 1933. She lived there alone at that time. I met her through mutual friends, Mr. McTige and his wife Mrs. Alice McTige, and their daughter Peggy McTige who live in a 2d floor apartment on Dale St. between Grand and Lincoln Avenues, in St. Paul, Minn. I had gone to school with Peggy McTige in Chicago. During December, 1933 I stayed with Bessie Randall at her home in Mpls. off and on at different times.

I never saw Rose Ancker (whose true name I understand is Marie Marion Conforti) before I met her at Little Bohemia Lodge April 19, 1934. I had only met Marion Marr once before we left Chicago Apr. 18, 1934 — which was at the "Nuttie Nite Club" in Chicago the same time I saw Carroll there about April 10, 1934, at which time she was with this same man called "Slim" who went from Chicago, Ill. to Little Bohemia with us. On the night of Apr. 19, 1934 Marion Marr, Slim, Carroll and I stayed in the cabin next to the Lodge; the night of Apr. 20, 1934 we all four stayed in the main Lodge; the night of Apr. 21, 1934 we all four stayed in the cabin again; and on the night of Apr. 22, 1934 Carroll and "Slim" had told Marion Marr and myself to pack our bags, and we had done so, and the bags were in the car since about 5 P. M. or 6 P. M., and we were still waiting at Little Bohemia Lodge about 9:30 P. M. or 10 P. M., when I heard the dogs start barking and shooting from both outside and inside the Lodge, and the seven or eight men of the group which Carroll and Slim associated with, left the Lodge.

I never did stay at 3310 Fremont Ave., Mpls., Minn. or visit any parties there with the name of Ober. I have never visited the girl using the name of Rose Ancker (whom I understand also used the name "Mickey" and "Marie Costello") or Homer Van Meter, (whose photo has been shown me) at that address.

I have read the foregoing statement, and it is true. I sign it willingly

MEMORANDUM:

Photographs of MRS. JOSEPH J. MAHR alias MARION VIRGINIA MAHR were exhibited by Agent Costello and this Agent to MRS. BESSIE GREEN on April 26, 1934, and she advised that this woman was MRS. JIMMIE (BABY FACE) NELSON'S wife and she advised that she has two children, a boy four years of age and a girl two and one-half years of age; that she saw them together several times in Minneapolis; that she visited at their apartment located on 27th Street, somewhere in the vicinity of Hennepin Avenue, which apartment was located on the corner; that they subsequently moved to an apartment on 17th and La Salle, Minneapolis, which she thought was across the street from a vacant lot and up farther towards the lake, near the Buckingham Hotel. She advised that NELSON'S mother was living with the above individuals at the time and they had the four year old boy with them but that the little girl was living with someone in Chicago, name unknown. She advised that about a week prior to the shooting at 93 South Lexington, on March 31, 1934, NELSON, his mother (name unknown), and his wife and little boy drove to California, and that she did not know when they returned.

Photographs of ANN SOTHERN were exhibited by the above Agents to MRS. GREEN and she advised that this girl was known by the name of MARJORY, or JEAN, and that she thought her last name was COMPTON, or COMBSON; that this particular girl is married to a man who is, or used to be, with WAYNE KING'S Orchestra; that she first met this girl about the first of the year when THOMAS CARROLL brought her to her apartment on Fremont Avenue, in Minneapolis. She advised that ANN SOTHERN is CARROLL'S girl friend; that ANN SOTHERN is a sister-in-law of PAT REILLY'S, being a sister of MRS. PAT REILLY, who lived near Como Avenue on Thomas Street, St. Paul, Minnesota, in a four-plex made of stone, probably two or three blocks from Como Avenue. She advised that this girl is sometimes called "BABE".

Photographs of MARIE MARION COMFORTI alias MRS. THEODORE (ROSE) ANCKER were exhibited by the above agents to MRS. GREEN and she advised that she knew this girl by the name of "MICKY"; that this girl was VAN METER'S girl friend; that she was at the Samaritan Hospital for treatment in St. Paul, under the name of MARIE COSTELLO. MRS. GREEN advised that she first met MARIE COMFORTI when VAN METER and COMFORTI lived together in the next apartment building to 3310 Fremont Avenue South, Minneapolis, under the name of OBER; that VAN METER and this girl lived together in this apartment building for about four weeks during the first of the year.

THE DILLINGER TRAIL

IS NOT ON AMERICA

Editorial Phila
A Vast Inefficiency in Dealing With
Crime Is Demonstrated by This
Paroled Convict's Career *Lady*

THE Attorney General of the United States, Homer S. Cummings, asks for armored cars, as well as some more airplanes, to hunt down John Dillinger.

The people of the United States wouldn't know whether to roar with rage or roar with laughter about this if they were not so aware of the thirteen dead men on this thug's trail, the \$1,000,000 or \$2,000,000 he has cost since his "parole" and the odor of national disgrace that surrounds the whole silly Dillinger business.

This man is not merely a symbol of crime. He is a symbol of stupid officialdom, of political incompetents intrusted with the important duties of a Sheriff's office, of grafting or inane prison officers and guards. He is a symbol of diffused and confused authority; of little police departments maintained by "local pride" in defiance of the needs of the time, often composed of men who know as much about real police work as Julius Caesar knew about relativity.

He is a symbol of a cooling parole system—that coddled him out of jail less than a year ago on the plea that he was not a "habitual criminal."

Within three months he committed, aided by other criminals as desperate as he is, a series of bank and other robberies. He was arrested. His confederates came to the Ohio jail where he was confined to await trial, shot the Sheriff dead and all escaped, to resume their widespread banditry which, to date, is estimated to have produced losses exceeding \$500,000, while intensive efforts to catch this one man are figured to have cost \$1,500,000 up to now.

He is held responsible for recent threats of death sent to the Governor of Ohio unless he reprieves some of Dillinger's murderer friends, waiting in the condemned cell of Columbus Penitentiary. And now that institution is being fortified for fear of an attempt by him to release these killers, as he did once before.

Dillinger's career for weeks and months demonstrates an utter collapse of ordinary police efforts to deal with him. He has carried his insolence to raiding police stations and stealing from them weapons and bullet-proof vests. He has coolly revisited his home town, to bask in the stares of old neighbors too frightened to do anything about it or so steeped in sickly sentimentality that some of them have been circulating a petition for an amnesty for him.

As if in answer to that, Dillinger calmly progressed through various States, to hole up in a resort roadhouse, where he made a prisoner of the proprietor and his family and had his ease in his inn.

If any man proves the necessity for a national form of police activity against dangerous criminals under existing conditions, Dillinger does. And it was appropriate enough that Federal Secret Service men, by the scores, were sent to take him at that resort when the "hot tip" finally got into headquarters.

The Federal agents may not be blamed so much for holding aloof from local authorities. They have had plenty of experience with "hick cops." But they must sustain their own assurance by results.

And their method of approach to the roadhouse, so that Dillinger and his associates fled by an unguarded rear approach and got away, reflects little credit on them. They are good men; brave men, but their failure to approach more cautiously and to guard and block all nearby roads, considering the force they had at hand, entitles the neighboring Wisconsin woodsmen to jeer.

Every hour this man, with thousands hunting him, has kept his dangerous freedom has increased the reproach he represents to American civilization.

Back of him are the figures of the Kellys, the Baileys, the Pretty Boy Floyds, on down to any little thief paroled last week through the influence of a politician-lawyer. Back of him are the weakly administered jails, the police departments brazenly controlled by politics; the twaddle of sentimentalists who yearn to "rehabilitate the criminal"—and the stacks of quashed indictments and writs of habeas corpus that are moldering into dust in county courthouses all over the land.

This Dillinger is obviously getting himself properly posed for the inevitable bullet that will end his career. But that won't end what he means, and what others like him will mean, until we smash the shackles of politics and precedent that protect the criminal.

And we need no military tanks to do that.

A telegram was received from the Detroit Division office on April 26, 1934, reflecting that both Williams and Hearn are in custody in Detroit and that the car they stole in Daytona Beach on April 8, 1934, has been recovered, and that Williams is not identical with Homer Van Meter.

To the Division's copies of this letter there is being attached fingerprint card of Robert J. Hearn obtained by Special Agent Shivers from the Daytona Beach, Florida, Police Department, covering his arrest at that point on November 1, 1933, charged with carrying concealed weapon. He was sentenced to pay \$100.00 fine or serve sixty days in jail for that offense. His fingerprints are being forwarded for comparative purposes and the Division is respectfully requested to return same to the Jacksonville office for transmittal to the Daytona Beach Police Department. The return of this card was requested.

Investigation was made by the writer at Daytona Beach, Florida, April 22 and 23, 1954, to determine if George F. Williams or Robert (Bob) Hearn is identical with Homer Van Meter, a Subject in this case, pursuant to telegraphic advice from the Cincinnati Office that Williams had been positively identified in Louisville, Kentucky, as Homer Van Meter, when he tried to dispose of the Essex automobile described in the report of Special Agent in Charge R. A. Alt, entitled George F. Williams, Robert (Bob) Hearn, National Motor Vehicle Theft Act, Jacksonville file number 26-3702.

The photograph of Homer Van Meter, stated that there is no similarity between the two, and stated positively that Williams is not identical with Van Meter.

Mr. J. T. Cook, Agent for the Essex automobile at Daytona Beach, informed Agent that he has been advised by Deputy Sheriff Jimmy Durden, 330 Fairview Street, that the wife of Williams, who is operating the sandwich shop, has heard from him from Louisville, Kentucky, and Detroit, Michigan, since the automobile in question was stolen on April 15, 1934.

Mr. Durden, on being interviewed, stated that Frank Carter, a brother-in-law of Williams, who works at the latter's barbecue stand, occupies a garage apartment in the rear of his home. He stated that he personally knows Williams and Bob Hearn, and on viewing the photograph of Homer Van Meter, he stated that it slightly resembles Williams, but that it was not identical with either. Carter stated that Hearn is a known bootlegger, and formerly was employed by the Peninsular Life Insurance Company as its representative in Daytona Beach; that he bears a bad reputation in the city. Mr. Durden arrested Hearn several months ago for carrying concealed weapons. At that time he was connected with the Police Department. Hearn's fingerprints were taken. A copy was obtained. Mr. Durden placed Agent in communication with Frank Harper, brother-in-law of George T. Williams, and on being contacted, he stated that he and Williams married sisters, who were the daughters of J. T. Weston, 125 Arlington Street, Daytona Beach, Florida, and a former bridge tender at High Springs, Florida. He stated that Williams married Charles Weston in August, 1931, at Daytona Beach, Florida; that his home is originally in Shelbyville, Kentucky; that he has been in Daytona Beach for ten years or more, and when he was a young boy he was employed as a messenger by the Western Union Telegraph Company, later being connected with the ABC Bakeries as a baker; that for the past four years Williams has been operating a barbecue stand and lunch room, known as the Gassy Island Barbecue Stand, 300 Main Street, Daytona Beach, Florida. Carter further stated that Williams is the son of Mrs. John P. Eagle, who for the past twelve years operated the Eagle Room Apartment at 511 Ridgewood Avenue, Daytona Beach, Florida; that Mrs. Eagle died about one year ago and was taken to Shelbyville, Kentucky, for burial, the home of the Williams family. Mr. Carter further advised that he has been keeping up with Williams since he disappeared from Daytona Beach immediately after the instant automobile was stolen on April 8, 1934. Harper is now employed in the barbecue stand owned by Williams. He stated that, on either the 18th or 19th, Mrs. Williams received a telegram from her husband from Detroit, Michigan, and later in the night got a collect long distance telephone call from him from Detroit, and in overhearing the conversation he learned that Bob Hearn was with him. The telephone call was made from Detroit collect to telephone 9204, Daytona Beach, which is the telephone of Mr. T. J. Colson, operator of a Gulf Oil Filling Station in front of the Williams barbecue stand. Mr. Carter further stated that on April 19th or

20th, 1934, Mrs. Williams received a night message letter from her husband from Detroit, Michigan, through the Western Union Telegraph Company, that he did not read the message, but Mrs. Williams informed him after receiving it that she expected her husband back most any time, but that he would have to lay low for awhile. He stated that if Williams and Hearn returned to Daytona Beach and went into hiding he would probably have to serve them with food, and in case he learned their whereabouts, he would notify Deputy Sheriff Durden, who stated he would immediately contact Special Agent in Charge R. A. Alt. Photograph of Homer Van Meter was exhibited to Mr. Carter. He stated that it bore a slight resemblance to Williams, and in no way resembled Bob Hearn.

It was later ascertained that he is twenty-five years old at the present time. Mr. Carter is endeavoring to secure a photograph of Williams, which will be forwarded to the Jacksonville Office as soon as it is obtained. Carter personally knows Williams and Hearn, and he stated that the photograph of Van Meter is not identical with either.

Mr. Carter further informed Agent that Williams was at one time a messenger for the Western Union Telegraph Company at Daytona Beach. This was verified through officials of the company, who stated that the exact employment record could not be obtained. However, it was recalled that the person operating the Coney Island Barbecue Stand, George T. Williams, is the same man who, as a boy, was a messenger for this company.

George Haney, Detective, Daytona Beach Police Department, advised Agent that Robert (Bob) Hearn is well known to him. He viewed the photograph of Homer Van Meter, and stated they are not identical.

Mr. H. M. St. Sing, Bookkeeper for the ABC Baking, informed Agent that George T. Williams was employed by that company as a baker during the period from about November, 1931, to June, 1932. He stated that this same person is now operating the Coney Island Barbecue Stand at 300 Main Street. On viewing the photograph of Homer Van Meter, Mr. St. Sing, stated that it does not resemble Williams and that these men are not identical.

Mr. J. U. Harper, 411 Wisconsin Street, Daytona Beach, the owner of the instant Essex Sedan automobile, advised that it was stolen from him on the night of April 8, 1934, from in front of the Empire Theater, where he had parked it. He stated that earlier in the day he had driven to the Coney Island Barbecue Stand in the automobile, and there saw Hearn and Williams; that both of them noticed the automobile, and asked him where he was going and where he would be that night; that he informed them he was going to the Empire Theater; that after discovering the loss of his automobile, he contacted Chief of Police Haney, advising him of the previous meeting with Hearn and Williams, and in company with Chief Haney, he proceeded to the barbecue stand, where Williams was found to be on duty; that he then went to the Williams residence and saw that Hearn was there. This was just a short while after the automobile was stolen.

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Mr. Harper stated that he has known Robert Hearn for the past two years. Mr. Harper is now an agent for the Peninsular Insurance Company, and he stated that up until about a year ago, Hearn was also employed by the same company, working during the year of 1931 as its agent in that city. He is the son of Charles Hearn, who resides at 2 Halifax Street, Daytona Beach. Mr. Harper, after viewing the photograph of Homer Van Meter, stated that it is not identical with either Williams or Hearn.

Sergeant T. H. Johnson, Police Department, Daytona Beach, Florida, who knows Bob Hearn very well, stated that it is not identical with Homer Van Meter. Mr. Johnson further advised that on November 1, 1933, Hearn was arrested by former Police Officer Durden for carrying concealed weapons, and on November 11th, was sentenced to pay a fine of \$100.00 or serve sixty days in jail for that offense. Sergeant Johnson furnished Agent with a copy of Hearn's fingerprints, taken at that time, which are being transmitted to the Division for comparative purposes, with the request that the fingerprint card be returned to the Jacksonville Office for transmittal to the Daytona Beach Police Department.

Deputy Sheriff Jimmy Durden, the Police Department and Mr. A. F. Tash will keep the Jacksonville Office advised of any developments of value in locating Hearn and Williams.

An effort was made to trace the telephone call reported to have been made by Williams to his wife, as recited above, and it was learned that the record of this call, if made, would be in the Jacksonville Office of the telephone company.


MEMORANDUM FOR MR. TOLSON

With regard to the telegram received from Mr. Moley requesting the numbers appearing on the Thompson machine guns seized in Wisconsin in connection with the Dillinger case, please be advised that in compliance with your instructions I communicated with the Chicago Office and in the absence of Mr. Purvis talked with Mr. Harold Nathan.

Mr. Nathan stated that they had one of the Thompson machine guns at that office and the other was at the St. Paul Office, that the number of this machine gun had been completely obliterated, further that they had in their possession also two Winchester rifles taken in connection with the Dillinger case, one a 351 caliber bearing number 41806 and the other a 30 Winchester rifle bearing number 1046510. I then called Mr. Clegg at St. Paul in an effort to secure the number from the other machine gun and was informed by him that the gun formerly in possession of the St. Paul Office had been shipped to the Division on April 25th and that the number of this gun had been completely obliterated.

I then prepared a telegram for the Director's signature, addressed to Mr. Moley in New York City, advising him of this fact and further informing him that the guns were being shipped to Washington and an effort would be made to bring out the original numbers and that, if successful in this regard, he would be advised further in the premises.

Marr, alias Marian Virginia Marr, Bessie Green has identified her as the legitimate wife of Baby Face Nelson; that she is the mother of two children, a boy 4 years of age and a girl 2½ years of age; that the blonde girl is married to some night club entertainer in Chicago; that on the back of her photograph appears the name Ann Sothern; that she is the sister to the wife of Pat Riley; that she is married; that they have information that she admitted to some man who is a tap dancer or orchestra player in Chicago that she has been living with Tommy Carroll most of the time she has been in the Twin Cities, which would rather definitely indicate that Tommy Carroll, Homer Van Meter and Baby Face Nelson were all there on the night of the raid; that the blonde has stated that Tommy Carroll was there and a boy named Slim was also there; that she said that her brother-in-law, Pat Riley, was there; that they failed to identify the photographs of Dillinger and they claimed they did not know Homer Van Meter.

Mr. Clegg advised that Pat Riley's father is dead and the only known relatives of Riley are his wife and mother but they don't know where they are and cannot find anyone who does.





MEMORANDUM FOR MR. NATHAN

On April 27th, I conferred with Mr. Parrish to determine whether coroners' inquests are necessarily public in the States of Minnesota and Wisconsin.

Mr. Parrish had the matter looked up and stated that in Minnesota there is no requirement that a coroner's inquest must be public, whether public or private being at the discretion of the coroner. A coroner is required, however, to file a transcript of the testimony obtained at the inquest with the Clerk of the Court immediately.

Mr. Parrish further stated that the situation in Wisconsin is practically the same; that he had discussed the matter with Mr. Keenan and that Mr. Keenan had communicated with the United States Attorney with reference to the coroner's inquest in Wisconsin and it was decided that the coroner's inquest there should be public, but that efforts should be made not to have the names of the Agents brought out in the hearing.



A. B. Nelson, locksmith of Norfolk, was gotten out of bed about 2:30 A.M. Tuesday, April 24 by a phone call from a man who wanted a car key made. Nelson told the man it would cost him a dollar which was satisfactory. He dressed and met the man at his shop, made the duplicate key for a Buick car. Nelson did not keep number on key. The stranger laid down two dollars and went off. When Nelson asked him his name he said, "John Dillinger". He was rather quiet and didn't seem to be joking. Nelson claims not to have realized the significance of the name. I showed Nelson six unnamed pictures and he picked out Dillinger's picture and said the man looked "something like that" but couldn't give a description of the man except he wore a cap, was about 5'11" and didn't act like a crook, nothing unusual about voice. 

on each side of Mr. and Mrs. Little who are living at the park. Little saw and talked with the party next morning before they left about 9 A.M. Looked at photos but said he didn't think they looked like the campers. Little seemed to examine the Dillinger photo several times. I asked him why and he said he had seen it in the papers and that caused him to pay the most attention to it. Before leaving the campers swept out their cabins and burned everything and left no clues. Told Little they were from the Wisconsin woods and were headed for Texas. They went south on 81. Little saw several rifles in car and trailer and said he heard they carried revolvers but thought they were only tourists trying to find a place where the depression was not so bad. One man was said to be 40 to 45 and heavy, one woman dark haired, other about 20 or 22 and blonde. One man about 35, wore light cap, about 5'6" heavy set. The boss of the outfit was not the driver. The night marshall of Pierce (Henry Reimers) talked with some of the party but I couldn't find him. The people around the park felt sure the party stayed there all night and that none of them was the man who had a key made in Norfolk. One woman near park looked through the pictures and picked out Dillinger as looking like the 35 year old man with light cap who seemed to be the boss. Didn't say where they had stopped the night before or where they expected to stop following night.

The photos used in these tests were John Dillinger, John Hamilton, Jos. Fox, Jos. Burns, Clyde Barrow and Bonnie Parker. Interviewed House (night man at park), Mr. and Mrs. Talbert (owner), Mr. and Mrs. Little (living at Park) and a neighbor woman whose name I didn't get.





In regard to information desired with respect to the names and addresses of the witnesses desired by the United States Attorney 80 St. Paul, in connection with the theft of Ford V-8 four-door sedan, motor No. 256447, the car used by John Dillinger and Herbert Youngblood at the time they made their escape from the County Jail at Crown Point, Indiana, I desire to state that this car was the property of Edwige Lillian Holley and was stolen by Subject Dillinger from the Main Street Garage.

The witnesses who can properly testify as to the theft of this particular car are Ernest Blunk, Crown Point, Indiana, and Edwin Saager, also of Crown Point, Indiana. Ernest Blunk, however, is at the present time under indictment in Lake County, Indiana Court at Crown Point, Indiana, on a charge of aiding and abetting the escape of Subject Dillinger from the Crown Point Jail.

Edwin Saager is the night man and mechanic at the Main Street Garage immediately adjoining the Criminal Court House in Crown Point, Indiana. He, together with Blunk, was present at the time Subject Dillinger stole the automobile in question and was with them when the car was driven by Ernest Blunk at the direction of Subject Dillinger, who had a machine gun pointed at him during the entire trip until they reached a point in Indiana a short distance out of Peotons, Illinois.

Both Ernest Blunk and Edwin Saager can testify that in addition to the theft of the automobile in question from the Main Street Garage at Crown Point, both of them were released by Subject Dillinger near Peotons, Illinois, when Subject Dillinger took the wheel of the car and drove it away.

This automobile was recovered on March 8, 1934, in front of 1057 Ardmore Avenue, Chicago, Illinois, by officers Louis Hyde of the State's Attorney's office.



It was ascertained by Special Agent J. V. Blake at Jackson, Mississippi, that the Mississippi Education Association is a highly reputable organization of public school teachers in the State of Mississippi. The Secretary of the Association is W. H. Taylor, whose office is located in the Mississippi Education Association building at 219 North President Street, Jackson, Mississippi. The building which the association occupies was erected in 1929 and was first occupied during November of that year. Mr. Taylor advised that he has been secretary of the association during the entire time since the building was constructed. The hardware for the building was furnished on contract by the Adkisson Hardware Company, of Jackson, Mississippi. The Secretary, Mr. Taylor, stated that when the building was taken over by the Association all of the keys were given to him by the contractor. There were three keys for each lock, each group of three keys being fastened together on a wire ring. Mr. Taylor had all of these keys with the exception of a few for the outside doors which were in use on the original rings in a drawer of his desk. Among the bunches of keys were found three keys on one ring, each bearing the number 145023. The three keys bearing this number were tried in the various doors in the building and it was found that the only door which they would fit was the lock to a door leading into the assembly hall. There are four doors to this hall, and Mr. Taylor advised that none of these doors have been locked since the association has been occupying the building; that there has never been any occasion to take any of the keys from the ring; and that the three original keys are still on the ring.

At the Adkisson Hardware Company, Capitol Street, Jackson, Mississippi, Mr. R. E. Adkisson, President, advised that he recalls filling the

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order for the Mississippi Education Building, but that the order was filled by contract, and was booked direct from the manufacturer; that he has no record of same, and would not know where he could locate same.

Mr. Taylor, Secretary of the Mississippi Education Association, volunteered to lend one of the three keys bearing #145023 for purpose of comparison. However, since it does not appear that the key found in Evelyn Frechette's possession came from or might have any connection with the Mississippi Education Building, no further action is being taken in the absence of a request.



MEMORANDUM FOR THE DIRECTOR.

Agent Hall called from St. Paul and stated that he had received a telephone call from Mr. Rorer to the effect that last night at 9:45 at the Lac du Flambeau Reservation George Nelson stole a car and left the reservation; that he is undoubtedly headed in the direction of St. Paul; that he went west on Highway #70; that Nelson has been at an Indian's house at the reservation since Monday; that the owner of the car, a mail carrier, went to the reservation to go fishing with an Indian; that Nelson grabbed the men and made one of them ride with him as far as the main highway; that the owner of the car did not report the theft until 10:45 last night; that he reported same to the Sheriff at Eagle River; that the Sheriff had the roads blocked but as the theft was not reported until one hour after it occurred this action was taken too late to effect an apprehension. Agent Hall stated that the car is a Plymouth Sedan with a blue body and black top; that it has a yellow stripe and wooden wheels; that three fenders are dented; that the right front fender has been welded; that it has 18,000 miles on the speedometer; that two license numbers have been reported, i. e. 3137 and 3731, Wisconsin tags; that both of the men have identified Nelson as the man who took the car and that this information is being broadcast over all commercial and police stations. Agent Hall will call in the event of any further developments.



MEMORANDUM FOR THE ATTORNEY GENERAL

In regard to the latest developments concerning the Dillinger investigation, I wanted to advise you that at approximately 9:45 p.m. yesterday, George Nelson, one of the Dillinger gangsters and the man who shot and killed Agent Beun and also wounded Agent Newman, stole an automobile on the Lac du Flambeau Indian Reservation. It is believed that he is headed in the direction of St. Paul as he went west on Highway No. 70. Agents of this Division, together with local authorities, immediately initiated an investigation, and it has been ascertained that George Nelson has been cared for at the Indian Reservation in an Indian house since some time on last Monday. The owner of the automobile which he stole last evening is a mail carrier. He had gone to the Reservation to go fishing with an Indian. Nelson made the owner drive the car with him as far as the main highway. The owner did not report the theft until an hour later. The local authorities had all roads blocked, but as the theft was not reported until one hour after it occurred, it may be that this action was too late to effect an apprehension. The description of the car with its license numbers has been broadcast to all law enforcement officers in that section of the country. The Agents of our St. Paul Office are out on the highways in the vicinity of St. Paul in an effort to apprehend Nelson should he make an effort to reach the Twin Cities. Similar action has been taken also by Agents of the Division who are at points south of the place from which Nelson stole the automobile.

MEMORANDUM FOR THE ATTORNEY GENERAL

In order that you may be fully advised concerning certain recent newspaper comments, and particularly one emanating from Maroon, Wisconsin, to the effect that a petition has been drawn up and is being circulated among citizens of Maroon, Wisconsin, requesting the suspension of Special Agent in Charge E. J. Purvis, of the Chicago office, as a result of the shooting which occurred near Rhineland, Wisconsin, on the night of April 22, 1934, in an attempt to cause the apprehension of John Dillinger and his associates, I desire to submit the following facts:

To begin with, Mr. E. E. Clegg, Assistant Director, was in charge of this particular investigation and not Mr. Purvis. Upon receipt of advice to the effect that such a petition was being circulated, I immediately caused an inquiry to be made to determine the source from which the petition emanated, and it has been determined that the day after the shooting occurred two newspaper reporters representing the Wisconsin News of Milwaukee, Wisconsin, Al Wahlberg, a camera man, and A. S. Aslekson, reporter, arrived at Maroon, Wisconsin, where they employed one Herbert E. Peter to escort them to different points of interest in connection with the investigation. Peter drove the reporters around for two days, during which time they attempted to obtain photographs of the automobile which contained Dillinger's baggage and munitions. They were not permitted to photograph this car and baggage.

They then proceeded to the Sheriff's office at Eagle River, Wisconsin, to obtain photographs of the three women associates of Dillinger and members of his gang who had been taken into custody at Little Bohemia. The reporters then proceeded to the railroad station where they contacted several men gathered at that point and one of the reporters stated, "You all must feel pretty bad about not being let in by the Federal officers on this raid. Why don't you get up a petition?" A remark was then made that the Postmaster, Mr. Lewis A. Gehr, of Maroon, Wisconsin, had indicated that he would write a story for the Wisconsin Journal, which is a rival paper of the Wisconsin News represented by the reporters in question.

Their driver, Mr. Peter, then took them to see Mr. Gehr, the Postmaster, where the petition was drawn up. The petition was then given to the Postmaster. That night, April 24, there was a regular bi-monthly meeting of the Marcer Lakeland Association, the purpose of which is to boost county resorts, at which time the petition was presented to the association which voted to circulate the same. The petition was then left on the counter in the store operated by Mr. E. E. Brandt and has been signed by seven persons only.

Mr. Gehr, the Postmaster, upon interview, stated that the petition was sponsored by the two newspaper representatives but that since it had been circularized he thought it should be left on the counter of the store until some action was taken to determine why the local sharpshooters were not included in the investigation. It is, of course, obvious that such a procedure was not only impracticable under the conditions which the above investigation was conducted, but was absolutely impossible, in that there was no time. The exigencies of the case demanded immediate attention, information having been received that Dillinger and his associates were then making their departure from the resort.

Newspapers have quoted Mr. Oscar G. Olander, State Commissioner of Public Safety, of Lansing, Michigan, to the effect that he had not been advised of the raids conducted by the Division at Mercer, Wisconsin, and Sault Sainte Marie, Michigan, and that Federal officers had refused to reveal the whereabouts of Dillinger to the Michigan State Police. In connection with the raid conducted at Mercer, Wisconsin, there was, of course, no occasion to advise Mr. Olander of the Michigan State Police, they having no jurisdiction in Wisconsin; nor was there any occasion to notify him after such raid in that the route taken by Dillinger and members of this gang in effecting their escape was not through Michigan but through Minnesota.

In connection with the investigation conducted at Sault Sainte Marie on April 20, 1934, referred to by Mr. Olander, information was received by the Chicago office of this Division from the Sheriff at Sault Sainte Marie to the effect that John Dillinger and members of his gang had been in Sault Sainte Marie. Accordingly, a copy of

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Special Agents was immediately dispatched to this point and an inquiry conducted which disclosed that Billinger and his associates had left Sault Sainte Marie on April 17, 1934. After it had been determined at Sault Sainte Marie that Billinger and members of his gang were not there at that time, and while in conference with the Sheriff, he advised that a member of the Michigan State Troopers was in his outer office and asked if the Agents wanted to see him, whereupon he was advised that there did not seem to be any reason for a conference with the State Troopers at that time, since it had been determined that Billinger had departed from Sault Sainte Marie, Michigan, three days before, and the Agents had no information concerning his whereabouts. Before leaving Sault Sainte Marie, however, the Agents of the Division contacted the Michigan State Trooper and gave him all the information in their possession concerning John Billinger, John Hamilton, and Pat Cherrington, who had departed from Sault Sainte Marie on April 17th.

Mr. Glander is therefore under a misapprehension as to the actual facts in connection with the incident referred to.

The statement made by Senator Copeland to the effect that "a pathetic failure of cooperation between Federal, State and municipal authorities" has existed in the Billinger case has resulted in a development of a very unwholesome condition which would tend to impair and interfere with the cooperation and assistance which we have been obtaining from the local authorities. Our representatives in the Middle West have been in receipt of inquiries from local law enforcement officers concerning this statement. These law enforcement officers have indicated that they were displeased with the statement, and believe it was an authoritative statement representing the views of the Department of Justice, and in view of the assistance and cooperation which they have tendered to our Agents, they have naturally resented this unfair criticism of them. I am informed that representatives of the press have been contacting various police officers throughout the Middle West making the inquiry as to where they have failed to cooperate, as stated by Senator Copeland, and this has naturally put the local police on the defensive. Senator Copeland's statement has had a tendency to tear down the cooperation which this Division has been trying to build up over a long period of time. Our Agents have been receiving generally the fullest and most whole-hearted cooperation from the local law enforcement officers in the Billinger hunt. I believe it will be very helpful if some public statement along this line might be conveyed to the press from you, as it would clear up a wide misunderstanding now existing in the Middle West, namely, that the criticism of the lack of cooperation is an expression of the views of the Department of Justice rather than those of an individual United States Senator.

The above information was communicated to Mr. Cowley who requested that a teletype be sent to St. Paul incorporating the information and requesting verification. I forwarded a message to St. Paul and was later advised by St. Paul that Inspector Rorer who is in that vicinity that no one was surrounded that the Associated Press story was apparently in error.

Mr. Clegg advised further that in connection with Dr. May, who had been arrested for treating Dillinger, newspaper articles in local papers carried the story that Dr. May had stated he had been forced to treat Dillinger at the point of a gun.

MEMORANDUM FOR THE DIRECTOR.

In connection with the report that Dillinger and members of his gang had been seen at Binghamton, New York, last night, Agent Zimmer called and stated that he had talked to Chief of Police Able, of Binghamton, New York, who advised that last night he received a call from Dr. McCann, who is running a road house, who advised him that someone was there who the police might want (he did not indicate at the time that it was Dillinger); that two cars were there; that he did not know the make of them but they were touring cars; that there were six men and three women in the cars; that when he took drinks out to them they gave him a bill in payment thereof, but drove off without waiting for the change; that one car had a 1934 Wisconsin tag, #10649; that the other one had an Illinois number but he had no record of the same.

Mr. Zimmer stated that the Chief of Police informed him that he was under the impression that Dr. McCann was under the influence of intoxicants last night as "he has a pretty big head on him this morning"; that he has a vivid imagination and he, the Chief, doubts whether it is anything but imagination on his part; that as to the report that guns were in the car, the Chief thinks this is a fabrication on his part; that according to the informant the cars headed East; that immediately upon receiving the information same was placed on the teletype; that by the time the officer arrived at the road house the cars were gone. The Chief of Police advised Agent Zimmer that he did not call the Division because he did not think there was anything to the report; that at the time the informant called he did not state it was Dillinger, merely stating that there was someone there wanted by the police; that the informant later stated that it was Dillinger.

Mr. Zimmer was instructed to keep in close touch with the situation and to call the Division in the event of further developments.

MEMORANDUM FOR THE DIRECTOR.

I called Agent in Charge Purvis at Chicago and asked whether he had received further information from William Edward Vidler in connection with the Bremer ransom money passed by him. Mr. Purvis advised that the only information he has given is that he received the money from John McLaughlin, a so-called political leader of the West Side. I inquired as to how much of this money had been identified as Bremer ransom money and he advised that \$2665 had been so identified. Mr. Purvis advised that they are secretly getting warrants out now; that the place was searched yesterday but nothing was found; that the Associated Press has inquired as to whether the Division has this man, stating that their information came from St. Paul, but that no information has been released.

I inquired of Mr. Purvis as to whether he had received any further information as to the location of Dillinger and he stated that an informant told him last night that the underworld reports are that Dillinger is dead; that he had a wound in his back.





My dear Professor Holey:

With further reference to your telegram of April 26, 1934 and my reply thereto, concerning the serial number of one of the Thompson submachine guns seized at Rhinelander, Wisconsin, you are advised that the number has now been determined on one of those guns and the gun has been traced, it being found that it was shipped by the Auto Ordnance Corporation to the Hensen-Dunnegan-Ryan Company at El Paso, Texas in 1929. The gun was sold by the referred to company to the Consul General from Mexico together with fourteen other guns of the same type, i. e. Thompson submachine guns. Inquiry at the office of the Consul General elicits advice that all of these guns were either lost or stolen and accordingly it appears impossible to trace this gun further to ascertain the manner in which it came into the hands of the Dillinger gang.

The other Thompson submachine gun, which was seized in Wisconsin, is being shipped to Washington and an effort will immediately be made here to restore the obliterated serial number with a view to attempting to trace this gun to determine the manner in which it came into the possession of the Dillinger gang. I shall be glad to advise you of the result of the effort to trace the second gun.

I talked to Mr. Clegg at St. Paul at approximately 5:45 p.m. and read to him the personal and confidential letter dated April 25, 1934, received from Mr. Hanni in reply to Division circular letter dated April 10 concerning cooperation with police officials.

With regard to this, Mr. Clegg stated that he discussed this matter with Mr. Hanni and Mr. Rorer before the arrival of the letter of April 10. He informed them that where we had sufficient strength to handle the investigation ourselves, we are supposed to do it; that, in the event it became necessary to solicit outside aid, there should be no hesitancy in doing so; that, however, at all times we were to have the control of any investigation in which we invite outsiders to help; that if we had sufficient men and there was no need for any assistance we should handle it, and even in instances when we did have sufficient men, if there was any doubt in our minds as to any particular power of arrest or any other particular attitude, it would be proper to call in a policeman, a Marshal or a Deputy Marshal to accompany us and we would designate the part he should play; that if we did not have sufficient men we could call in all the men necessary, but a minimum that was necessary, from outside organizations; and that we should have control of it. Mr. Clegg stated that his statement to Mr. Hanni and Mr. Rorer contained in substance the information contained in the Division's letter of Apr. 10 he having assisted Mr. Tolson in the dictation of this letter before his departure for St. Paul. He stated that prior to his arrival in St. Paul both our men and members of the Police Department engaged in raids. Mr. Clegg will discuss this matter with Mr. Hanni. He is leaving at 9 o'clock our time for Wisconsin.

Emil Wanatka, proprietor of the Little Bohemia resort on Holder lake recognized Dillinger when the gang arrived and registered. "Why should I try to take him?" he remarked. "I played cards with him every day. Hey, he had a roll of money big enough to choke a cow."

Wanatka said he and his two employees were virtual prisoners. A machine gun was installed on the roof. Someone was always on guard.

The federal men, reinforced with local officers, began surrounding the resort Sunday night.

About 10 P. M. three men, having regaled themselves with beer, walked out of the Little Bohemia and stepped into their automobile. The waiting officers commanded them to halt. They failed to hear the order because, they said, the radio in their car was on.

Watchdogs began barking. The machine gun on the roof let loose a deadly blast. The officers fled back, and in the cross fire Boismenu, one of the trio who had stopped in for drinks, was killed, Morris wounded, and Hoffman hurt as he fled into the woods. He was captured and taken with the others to a hospital at Ironwood, Mich., 35 miles north.

At the first shot, Dillinger and the rest had dived through a rear window and raced away through the woods, leaving their girls behind them.

The fugitives split up in the darkness. One of them reached a nearby resort just ahead of...







I talked to Mr. Clegg this afternoon at about 7:30 P.M. and he advised that there appeared short articles in most all of the papers out there about the remarks made by Senator Copeland charging a pathetic lack of cooperation between federal, state and local authorities in the search for Dillinger, and that it had made the headline in one of the papers under today's date. However the article was a general one and the charge was not hurled at either the federal, state or local authorities specifically.

He stated that of course they intended to make the raid by themselves, and they were there alone until about dawn when the sheriff came up with his posse, and although he was very cordial to Mr. Clegg and the Agents it is alleged that he made some wisecracks about the government coming in and making a raid without calling him in on it, and although he didn't mention it to our men it was explained to one of the sheriff's deputies who did mention it that they didn't have time to notify the sheriff and that they had to act quickly.

In order that we might have explanatory information so as to justify their acts if it becomes necessary Mr. Clegg advised that the facts are that they arrived there with the full intention of surrounding the place completely and gradually closing in on it and making the raid about day break, and that those on the inside of the house knew about the raid and understood that at exactly 4 o'clock they were to go immediately to the cellar. They arrived in Rhinelander and while trying to get cars, thinking they had plenty of time, they sent their informant and Agent Surran out to the place to see if the subjects were still there or if the plans had been changed any. The Agent and the informant had been gone about fifteen minutes when they returned all out of breath stating that the wife of the informant after driving about 50 miles had met them with the information that the subjects were planning to leave immediately after dinner. And subsequently evidence was found that indicated they were all prepared to leave.

Mr. Clegg stated that it was then after 7:00 o'clock and that they eat dinner up there anywhere from 6:00 to 7:30, and that they were a little more than 50 miles from the place, so it was imperative that they act quickly, there being no time to notify the sheriff, not knowing who the sheriff was, and not having inquired; that the time had come for quick action and they acted accordingly. In fact they didn't know where the sheriff lived.

April 24, 1934

Mr. Clegg stated that it occurred to him that there might be some question as to why the sheriff did put in appearance, but the man on the inside who was shot called an ambulance, and the shooting could be heard for miles around, so the information naturally got out. However immediately after the shooting occurred, in order to preclude the sheriff from coming out and shooting at our men, he sent Agent Newman to telephone the sheriff that it was an official raid. He further advised that in view of the fact that Baum had been riding with Newman, Newman asked if it would be alright for Agent Baum to accompany him that he would like to have some one with him and Mr. Clegg assented, he thinking that it might be a little safer if two of them went, although as it turned out there might not have been any questions asked if the one Agent had gone alone. Mr. Clegg advised that he was not informed as to where they picked up the constable.

Mr. Clegg advised that while they were surrounding the place or while the shooting was going on a car came up from the rear, coming down the same road that they had come over, approaching the place with its lights off. Those nearest the car commanded it to halt which went unheeded and after the second command to halt the car began instead of halting to get away, at which time the boys began shooting at the car. Mr. Clegg stated that the opinion is now expressed by the chief of detectives in St. Paul concerning the shooting at the three men there by the police, that the man who was shot had not been shot by the police, that the man was shot up in Wisconsin, basing his opinion on the theory that the shooting occurred in St. Paul just a few minutes before the car was abandoned, and yet when the car was found the seat had soaked up a large quantity of blood, and he believes that there had not been sufficient time after the St. Paul shooting for the seat to become so thoroughly soaked; that probably the person had been bleeding there for hours.

Mr. Clegg advised that there was also another car that came up without stopping and that they shot at it. It backed out just as rapidly as it could and went down the road, but evidently they shot one of the tires, for there is a service station just a short distance down the road the attendant of which states, according to Mr. Rorer, that a car stopped there with a man and a woman in it and had him fix a tire which he thought had obviously been shot. He thinks that the photograph of Pat Cherrington looks like the woman that was in the car. Mr. Clegg advised that he thought it quite likely that some of the bunch were absent from the house as the girls have said - that the men went for a walk - and that some of them were shot upon their return, although who was hit he doesn't know.

Mr. Clegg advised further that a woman had telephoned their informant last night asking him if he wanted to make \$250, and stating that they wanted him to go into Wisconsin and buy an automobile for a friend of Tommy Carroll's. The informant told her that \$250 looked good to him, and she promised that he would ^{not} get any heat brought on him. So they are going through with the plan tonight. The informant is going out and have a conversation with these people. Mr. Clegg advised that the plans are that he is to get a taxi cab in St. Paul of a certain color in front of a certain Hotel, and he is to ride to Minneapolis in that cab, then he is to get out in front of the Palace theater in

Minneapolis, then walk across the street to the West Hotel in Minneapolis, in front of the West Hotel he is going to get a cab of another color - a Yellow Cab then he is to proceed ^{187th} 5th street in Minneapolis until he comes to some other street, and if a car doesn't contact him at that point he is to keep driving north for several blocks, a car will contact him and someone will be in the car that he knows.

Mr. Clegg stated that the informant [REDACTED]

[REDACTED] He was picked up by the police on some charge and he gave them confidential information that resulted in the conviction of several fellows; they turned him loose but they gave to the newspapers the story that he wouldn't talk, so the crooks believe that he is solid and wont talk. [REDACTED]

Mr. Clegg advised that their original plans were to have one of their men serve as the taxi cab driver, but they abandoned that when they feared to trust the taxi cab company. So they are going to have some men stationed, about one each block unostensible, and the number of the cab will be flashed to them as soon as the informant leaves the hotel, and they will try to watch it that way. But he thinks that their best lead is the information that the informant may obtain. He thinks that the man will probably be given the money tonight and told where to get the car, but he doesn't think that there will be a contact made with Carroll tonight, although the informant does know Carroll personally.

In connection with the last physician, ^{Mortenson} Horton, I advised Mr. Clegg of your opinion that the matter should be given publicity and every effort made to prosecute this man in the state courts in view of the fact that they carry a more severe penalty, if this action would not interfere in any way with there efforts there.

Mr. Clegg advised that he had just been talking to the U S Attorney Mr. Sullivan, who stated positively that they had no evidence, the doctor, positively denying that he knew who the people were and that he didn't desire to entertain any prosecution against Dr. Mortenson himself. Mr. Clegg stated that they could probably force his hand on the matter but it would be hard to prove. He stated that the U S Attorney was in accord with his present view, namely that Dr. Mortenson was the only evidence they had to the effect that Pat^oReilly was the one who brought the men to him, the Dr. having made a statement to that effect. Of course Dr. Mortenson in a position to testify could convict Pat Reilly, but Mr. Clegg thinks that if they prosecute the Dr. he would want to stand mute because to testify might tend to incriminate him.

Mr. Clegg stated that frankly this doctor is not right. That in the place where Frank Nash and the Barker-Karpis mob used to hang out they found a bottle with Dr. Mortenson's name on it, but that he had emphatically denied to Agent Hall at the time that he knew nothing about it, although Hall thought he obviously lied to him.

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April 24, 1934

Mr. Clegg stated that among other things this Dr. has been going about over town talking to his political friends about the matter, and he gave his story out yesterday afternoon to a newspaper reporter justifying his position. That the police department and the political organization that came up for election there today found out about it and went to him and bawled him out. That due to the fact that the newspaper reporter is a friend of the doctors he had the story killed. He advised that the newspaper reporter is a friend of Mortenson and supported him in his race for coroner four years ago, the man who introduced Dr. Mortenson to Harry Sawyer, and Sawyer made a financial contribution to the doctor's campaign. That the doctor gave them the name of the newspaper reporter in confidence, it being Johnson, and that there is a close alliance between the two. The doctor stated his reason for giving out the story was that he understood that one of the other papers had the story and was getting ready to publish it, and he thought that to give out the story first would justify his position in that he did not know who the men were until quite recently and that he was afraid to report it then, and that the treatment he gave was rather superficial.

Mr. Clegg advised confidentially that the accusations made recently about the conditions in the Twin Cities had aroused quite a bit of resentment among the civic organizations there, and that it was his opinion that another statement from Washington might not hurt the Doctor as much locally as we would presume it might. Mr. Clegg advised that Mortenson hadn't been in the office since the first time, but that he thought that after the election today the doctor might come in tomorrow of his own volition and give them some more information; and until he did they had no case against him, other than the State case for not reporting it but he hadn't been advised as to the Supreme Court (State) decisions on the matter as yet; but they did have the doctor in a position to make him testify against Pat Reilly.

Mr. Clegg stated that Mr. Rorer thought it was Pat Reilly and Pat Cherrington in the car in Wisconsin that the men shot the tire off, when it drove up then backed around and drove away from the scene of the shooting.

I advised Mr. Clegg of my view concerning the publicity about the doctor that if it would do the doctor quite a bit of harm and would substantiate the Attorney General's previous statement, that it would be of more importance than the prosecution against Pat Reilly on the charge of harboring, and in addition to that if it proves that Reilly was in Wisconsin we probably have a better case against him there.

In asking Mr. Clegg if he was of the opinion that it would do the Department here more harm than good because of the attitude of some of the citizens up there, he advised that he wouldn't say that it would do them any harm at all, but that his opinion was, although not for publication, that it is quite possible that the statement from upstairs would carry more weight in Washington than it would there; adding that that is where the doctor lives.

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April 24, 1934.

Mr. Clegg stated that it would no doubt ruin the doctor and that Mortenson was afraid of it, but as between the two Pat Reilly was a more dangerous man from their standpoint than Dr. Mortenson - Pat Reilly being the finger man, the man who acting in behalf of Harry Sawyer goes from one place to another and arranges for hide-outs, gets doctors to treat the wounded, gets apartments for them, buys automobiles for them, etc.

He stated that Mortenson was known as the wrong doctor, having some prestige there in the political underworld, and being president of this that and the other, but that his offices were down in a tricky little arcade building, and he feels quite sure that he doesn't draw patronage from the elite of St. Paul at all, and that it might be some very good advertising for him, although he wasn't looking for publicity at all, instead he was trying to avoid it; that he wasn't as important a figure around there as his titles would indicate.

Mr. Clegg advised that it was immaterial to him, but that if he could draw a picture of it as he would like to see it materialize, he would like to get the doctor to testify against Pat Reilly and send Reilly to the penitentiary, and then he would like for a statement to come out of Washington blasting him - of course, he stated that it would be cold then, and if there was going to be any blasting from Washington the time was now ripe for it. But he gave his opinion that if we turn it over to the state and ask them to prosecute, that they will of course do as they want to about it, and the doctor will stand mute and refuse to testify.

Mr. Clegg advised that they had a potential white slave case against Reilly, that they had held a woman there for about a week notwithstanding her challenge that they couldn't hold her more than 48 hours, and that Agent Hall got a statement from her which shows that she travelled from there out into Wisconsin and back into Minnesota and that she slept with Reilly. Although she probably wouldn't testify, he felt it a potential case.

Mr. Clegg stated that he thought that Pat Reilly was the man to get, that frankly they had been informed that if they drug him ~~in~~ and knocked him in the head with something and waited until he came to and then started talking to him that he would give them more information than anybody else possesses in the Twin Cities.

Mr. Clegg stated that he had no preference in the publicity matter, that he would like to see them both blasted, but of course that would be impossible so it was just a matter of choice. He agreed with me however that if they do identify Reilly as one of those in Wisconsin, then there would be no objection to blasting and prosecuting the doctor.

There was some question about the legality of the hearing held at Madison and it appeared federal operatives had taken things into their own hands and were directing the procedure. Commissioner J. J. McManamy was called to the jail office for the hearing but before he went in he said:

"Hearings such as this should be public and open to the public but this is in the hands of the department of justice and it seems I have nothing to say about it."

WANTS PRESS PRESENT.

The procedure is somewhat similar to that invoked when the federal operatives had Roger Touhy and his gang in Milwaukee. However, when the Touhy gang was arraigned, the commissioner insisted that the press be present as representatives of the public and he enforced his order in that respect.

BILL FOR SUGAR LEVY IS PASSED

Measure to Increase Prices Ready for President.

WASHINGTON, April 25—(AP)—The controversy over sugar control which has beset the administration for months was transferred tonight from congress to the White House.

Final action by both senate and house on the Jones-Costigan bill, which calls for a tax to raise the price the producer receives, put the measure in shape to go to the White House. Only the formality of signing by Speaker Rainey and Vice President Garner held it on Capitol Hill.

PROTESTS ARE MADE.

At the White House protests were awaiting the bill. They came from Hawaiian, Puerto Rican and Philippine officials who contended the measure would leave them with surplus sugar stocks, would curtail one of their chief industries and would wreak great damage upon their economic status.

HULL RECEIVES DIPLOMATS TO DISCUSS JAPAN

Italian and Dutch Envoys Consider Ultimatum.

WASHINGTON, April 25—(AP)—Japan's warning that foreign aid to China would be considered as endangering peace in the Far East has resulted in a series of informal conferences between Sec. Cordell Hull and Undersecretary William Phillips and diplomatic representatives of a number of the countries signatory to the nine power treaty. President Roosevelt let it be known that he expected to confer with Hull on foreign affairs, including the Japanese manifesto, but the secretary of state did not go to the White House today.

SEVERAL ENVOYS CALL.

Italian Ambassador Rosso, Chinese Minister Sze and Dutch Minister De With all called at the state department.

Rosso and Sze discussed the general Far Eastern situation with the state department officials, but the Dutch minister denied that his visit had any connection with the Japanese manifesto, although The Netherlands is vitally interested because of the Dutch East Indies. Yesterday Sir Ronald Lindsay, British ambassador, and Andre de la Boulaye, French ambassador, called at the state department.

Neither the White House or the state department gave any indication, however, that the United States would take any official action concerning the Japanese manifesto.

SAITO LEAVES CLIPPINGS.

Hiroshi Saito, the Japanese ambassador, visited the state department late yesterday afternoon at the request of Undersecretary Phillips and said when he parted he had merely left Japanese newspaper clippings containing the "text" of the declaration.

State department officials said Hull had not been able to go to the White House today for a foreign affairs conference with President Roosevelt because of the necessity of preparing a long memorandum on tariff questions.

Britain Asks Tokio To Explain Mandate

By the Associated Press. Developments in other capitals: Great Britain's request for an amplification of Japan's statement was formally delivered in Tokyo. Earlier, a spokesman for the Japanese foreign office said: "Our statement has been made. Let others read it and judge."

Murder Warrant Hunts Machado Deaths of Cuba

NEW YORK, April 25—(AP)—Gen. Gerardo Machado, deposed and exiled former president of Cuba, was sought here today on a federal warrant charging murder.

Government agents and police who want to his home were informed Machado left at 11 a. m. on a "secret mission" and would not be back for several days. It was reported he had headed for Canada.



Mrs. Machado and her secretary, Juliu Fernandez Machado, both insisted they did not know where Machado has. Neighbors told of seeing him at 11 a. m. in a taxicab.

His extradition to Cuba, he is accused by foes of making a reign of terror to keep government in power, will be attempted. The specific charges in the warrant were not made—in fact, precautions had been taken to keep the issuance of the warrant itself a secret.

Comic Opera Cops

There is justice in the indignant petition prepared by residents of Wisconsin's lake country asking Washington officials to rebuke and punish those responsible for the government's share in the Dillinger fiasco.

If ever a police job was badly bungled, the attempt of the department of justice to capture Dillinger in the Little Bohemia resort is that job.

Innocent men were killed and wounded because the impatient, nervous officers turned their murderous fire on the wrong persons. The bandits got away because no attempt was made to block the roads. Proffered aid from men who knew the country was scorned. To add to the debacle, two agents walked up to a bandit and let him shoot them and take their car.

Whatever the mitigating circumstances, and there are probably some, the record is not one for the government to be proud of. It is not one which justifies the high and mighty attitude which the department of justice men assumed on this job and which is characteristic of them on most jobs.

They customarily deport themselves in a manner which indicates their consciousness that they are not ordinary cops. They move with elaborate mysteriousness shrouding their activities

MEMORANDUM FOR THE DIRECTOR.

Reference is made to the article in the Chicago Daily Tribune dated April 24, 1934, which purports to quote certain derogatory statements alleged to have been made by Senator Arthur Robinson of Indiana.

Someone should invite the attention of the Senator from Indiana to the attached clipping which also appeared in this same issue of the Chicago Daily Tribune and recites how four trustees "walked away" from the penitentiary at Michigan City, Indiana, the same Indiana institution from which Dillinger was originally paroled. It is significant to note that three of these trustees were serving life terms for murder and it seems peculiar that such long term convicts should be extended such privileges. The Chief Clerk of the penitentiary is quoted as stating "This walking away from prison by trustees is an annual spring epidemic".

It might also be desirable to call the attention of the Senator from Indiana to the fact that Dillinger was originally paroled from a penitentiary in Indiana, and effected his escape from the Crown Point, Indiana, jail.

Michigan City, Ind., April 21.—(Special.)—Police of northern Indiana were scouring the Michigan City area today in search of four convicts, three of them Negro, who walked away from Warren state prison farm and from Indiana penitentiary itself. The fugitives are:

Leland Phillips, 26, sentenced September, 1926, to life for first degree murder.

Willard Butler, 27, Negro, serving life for second degree murder.

Charles Irwin, 28, Negro, serving life for second degree murder.

Noah Seals, 22, serving three years for second degree burglary.

Phillips and Seals were missed in a midnight check-up at the prison farm, one of three operated to supply the penitentiary with farm produce. Since no trace of the convicts was found officials believe an accomplice picked them up in an automobile. Butler, cook for Warden Louis E. Kunek, and Irwin, office runner in the prison administration building, were missed in the early evening roll call. Chief Clerk Howard C. Crosby reported the latter two were being closely trailed and might be captured soon.

Nevertheless, it may not be amiss to suggest to you that in the opinion of the writer were you informed of the peculiar and detailed circumstances surrounding each of the two episodes wherein Dillinger escaped, you would agree that the plan you outline was not entirely feasible.

No one regrets more than the writer the loss of the lives of those engaged in apprehending Dillinger, and every effort was made to provide reasonable protection commensurate with the nature of their duties.

Let us hope that future efforts will be successful.

MEMORANDUM FOR THE DIRECTOR.

Mr. Larson called from Detroit this evening in regard to the report that the Division had refused aid from State troopers in the attempt to apprehend Dillinger in Wisconsin. Mr. Larson had spoken with Mr. Olander, who stated he had talked with Sergeant Keune and a State trooper named Wilson, who advised that while the agents were in conference with the Sheriff and preparing for the raid they were waiting in the Sheriff's outer office and that they later spoke to the Sheriff and suggested that they would like to accompany the Sheriff and the Federal Agents on the raid; that the Sheriff then spoke to the Agents, and when he returned advised that the Agent stated, "Tell the State Police to go to Hell. When the State Police are wanted they will be called upon". Mr. Larson stated that Mr. Olander is obtaining a complete and detailed report from these officers and that upon receipt of same, he will forward it to Mr. Larson.

Mr. Olander stated that when he was interviewed by newspaper men in regard to Senator Copeland's statement, he stated that his men had offered aid and that it had been refused. He explained to Mr. Larson that he was merely defending his position and that of his men; that he had no ill feeling whatever toward the Division and greatly admired its accomplishments. He showed Mr. Larson a letter dated January 19, 1934 which he had written to Senator Copeland wherein he praised the Division. Olander is closely acquainted with Senator Copeland and this letter was written as an informal note to him. Mr. Olander stated that since the Copeland statement he had been interviewed by numerous newspaper men and particularly questioned concerning Dillinger's presence in Michigan at Sault Sainte Marie and that it was necessary for him to admit that he did not know Dillinger had been there, which put him in rather an embarrassing position and that statements he made were in defense of himself as a result of the criticism he had received because of the Copeland statement rather than a criticism of the Division.

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Mr. Olander said he had heard of the suggested petition to remove Purvis and said he personally would be glad to come to Washington and do what he could to stop anything of that sort; that if the Division was being subjected to anything he had said, he regretted it very much. Mr. Olander stated that Congressman Brown of Michigan had endeavored to get him to make a statement against the Division, but that he refused to do so; that Mr. Olander was leaving for New York tonight and had intended to come to Washington, but that because of Congressman Brown's requesting him to make a statement against the Division, he did not intend to come to Washington and that he did not want to meet the Congressman and would not under any circumstances make a statement against the Division.

Mr. Larson stated he advised Mr. Olander just what happened at Sault Sainte Marie, Michigan in connection with the investigation there as reported by Division Agents; that as soon as he received the report from Mr. Olander from his officers, Mr. Larson will forward it to the Division.

Mr. Olander was extremely friendly and stated that any remarks he had made were intended as "constructive criticism". It was Mr. Larson's feeling that the newspapers had worded the writeup more strongly than the feelings expressed by Mr. Olander..

Mr. Rorer, upon inquiry, stated Hardy was not there.

He stated McIntyre left at three o'clock with Baum's body for Chicago.

Upon inquiry as to the women involved, Mr. Rorer stated the blonde girl appeared to be very much upset and it was believed she might talk. The girls, it is believed, can give information as to the previous whereabouts of Dillinger and his companions. It is understood they left Louis Cernecky's place. Cernecky has known Emily Winetka for fifteen years, both having come from Bohemia.




MEMORANDUM FOR THE DIRECTOR

Special Agent in Charge Connelley, of the Cincinnati Office, telephoned as follows:

He stated that the papers at Cincinnati, Ohio carried a small story to the effect that the home of John W. Dillinger had been raided tonight, which is only a guess. He advised that an informant had given that office certain information; that they had blocked the road beyond Dillinger's house; that the police had guessed that the place was going to be raided, or had been raided, which raid did not take place.

Mr. Connelley advised that information had been received from an informant that the father of John Dillinger had received a letter from Ironwood, Michigan, which stated that John Dillinger was located at Ironwood, or in that vicinity, and was hiding there; that he would remain there for some time, unless the Federals got too "hot". The informant is under the impression that Dillinger's father believes the letter came either from John Dillinger, or one of his associates. Mr. Connelley stated that this information had been transmitted to the Chicago Office with the request that it be given immediate investigative attention.

He stated also that that office had received information that Pearl Elliott was at 614 Cherry Street, Marion, Indiana, which is in the Chicago district. This was transmitted to the Chicago Office with the request that same be checked. It had been learned that Pearl Elliott might be at her mother's home in Franklin; this had been checked thoroughly, but she was not found there.
