Special Agent Hardy telephoned at 1:50 A. M. from Voss Birchwood Lodge, Rhinelender, Wisconsin, in connection with the Dillinger matter and submitted the following information.

Mr. Clegg, Mr. Rorer and group of Agents are on Highway about 50 miles north of Rhinelander, Wis. where they think they have Dillinger and his gang surrounded in place there. This place is called "Little Bohemia", located on a lake in the midst of wooded country. It is operated by a man named Emil Winetka. This place is located in Vilas County.

Several of the officers have been wounded, including Newman and McIntire, although information was vague and uncertain. Newman was reported wounded in the head, not seriously. was reported to be in the hospital at Ironwood, Michigan. reported to have been wounded was a constable by the name of Christianson who had been working with Agents. It was also reported that Baum of the Chicago Office was injured. Three or four others were shot, some of whom were dead, or least one to his knowledge

Upon questioning by Her Contag Agent Hardy stated that there was no question of Dillinger's identity. That seven men and three women were in the hotel and he was not certain whether any of them had escaped from the hotel.

A car from outside had driven up and started shooting. The occupants of this car had stolen a Packard car, about a 1928 model, bearing Wisconsin license #3111, to make their getaway.

The Sheriff and a group of his men were working with Agents and most of the men from the Chicago Office were on the scene.

Agent Hardy could be called at Rhinelander Exchange, Rhinelender, Wisconsin, care of Voss Birchwood Lodge, Wisconsin which is about two miles from scene of action

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MEMORANDUM FOR THE DIRECTOR

Special Agent Hardy called at approximately 2:15 A.M. and submitted the following information:

Dillinger is supposed to be surrounded at a place about 50 miles north of Rhinelander, Wisconsin, on Highway No. 51. This is a resort called little Bohemia. Seven men and three women were at the hotel awaiting the arrival of another party who were to join them from Minneapolis. This party arrived after the place had been surrounded and some shooting occurred. Someone was killed and Agent surrounded and some shooting occurred. Someone was killed and Agent Hardy did not know whether it was an officer. Agent or guest at the hotel. During the fray Agents Newman and McIntire and a constable named Christianson were shot. Agent Baum was also injured. Some of named Christianson were shot. Agent Baum was also injured. Some of the mob apparently attempted to escape in one of the cars which became disabled and they then stole a Packard bearing Wisconsin license #3111. The Ford Coupe which Newman & McIntire were using was seized by the gang apparently after they had been wounded. This car is a 1934 Ford Coupe, bearing Wisconsin license #166529.

Agent Hardy said it was thought Dillinger had been injured. He was shooting from the hotel although it is not certain he is still there. The building is surrounded by officers, but has not yet been thered. The Sheriff is gathering a posse and the Chicago office has been notified to send more men.

resort gave the alarm as the officers approached the place to surround it. Shooting was done either by the party coming from Minneapolis or by some of the men who escaped from the hotel and joined the newcomers. The first shooting seems to have occurred some distance from the hotel. The first shooting occurred when the car in which Agents Newman and McIntime Second shooting occurred when the car in which Agents Newman and McIntime was riding pulled up to the gangster's car and was immediately fired on. The gangsters seemed to have deliverately aimed at the heads of the Agents, probably aware that bullet proof vests were being worn by the Agents. The gangsters then made off with the Agents' car. An exchange of shots occurred at the hotel during which one man was shot while running from the hotel, apparently by the men in the building. The constable seems to have been accompanying Agents Newman and McIntime.

Agent Hardy advised that there were about 18 or 19 of our men there and that the Sheriff had several there. More men were coming. Agent Hardy was advised to remain near the phone if not needed at the scene and relay any information and report any and all developments.

MEMORANDUM FOR THE DIRECTOR.

Special Agent Hardy called at 3:50 A. M. and advised that Agent Baum was dead. John Morris, a C. C., C. worker, was also dead and two others, John Hoffman and John Warren, were wounded. Neither were members of the gang. It was not known whether these men were shot by Agents or the gangsters. One of the gang is believed to have been wounded as he was seen falling out of the car. He was picked up by his companions and put back in the car.

Agent Hardy advised that there were numerous roads of exit. The Sheriff was calling a posse together and the roads we being covered to the best extent possible.

Proprietor of the hotel had come out and advised that most of themen had made their escape from the house, but that the women were still there. Themen had gotten away at the beginning of the shooting, using three cars. These cars are as follows:

1930 Ford Coupe, 4 cylinder, Model A, Wisconsin license #92652, Motor #2980001. Three men in this car. 1934 Ford Coupe, black body, equipped with spotlight, Wisconsin license #166529. Padkard Sedan, blue body, Wisconsin license #3111.

The St. Paul and Chicago Offices were broadcasting the numbers and descriptions of these cars.

I called Special Agent Hardy at approximately 7 A.M. and he advised me at that time that the three women with the Dillinger gang at the hotel had been taken into custody, but that he did not know their names. Further information had been treceived that Agent McIntire had not been injured as had been previously stated. Agent Newman was quite seriously, but probably not fatally, wounded.

I requested Agent Hardy to ask one of the Inspectors or Mr. Purvis to get in touch with the Division and submit a report at the earliest possible moment.

Dear Sir:

Reference is made to Division telegram received at this office today requesting that action be taken looking toward the prosecution of persons who have been involved in aiding or assisting Dillinger or members of his gang.

It will be noted in previous reports and correspondence from this office that Opal Long, alias Bernice Thompson, a sweetheart of Russell Clark and who was arrested with the gang at Tucson, Arizona, on January 25, 1934, is now residing at the home of Andy Strachen, 75 Windemere Street, Highland Park, Michigan. Mrs. Strachen is a daughter of Mrs. May Clark, mother of Russell Clark.

It is also noted in reports received at this office that Opal Long was at St. Paul, Kinnesota, on the day Dillinger escaped from the apartment house and there is every indication, of course, that this women has aided in harboring Dillinger and other members of the gang. It is my belief that she will eventually depart from Detroit for the purpose of going to the gang's hideout and, for this reason, I believe that it would be advisable to continue our twentyfour-hour surveillance over the house in which she is residing as it is felt that valuable information might be secured in watching her movements.

It will be observed that Pat Cherrington is alleged to be a sister of Opal Long and she, Pat, is evidently with the Dillinger gang at the present time. Her child, June Young, age 12, is also living at 75 Windemere and undoubtedly this woman, Pat Cherrington, will attempt to make a contact with either Opal Long or her child at some future date. Agent contacted Chief of Police Cook, Ft. Thomas, Ky., and inquired if he was acquainted with parties living at 22 Southview Ave., and was informed that Richard Zimmer and wife lived at this address, and added that he did not know anything about the man other than he was connected with Fort Thomas. Agent then inquired whether there was anyone he would recommend talking to and obtaining from them information regarding the Zimmers and was advised that Patrolman Ross of the Ft. Thomas police force lived close by. Chief Cook advised that Mrs. Ross would be the party to contact but added that she probably could not be counted on to keep agent's visit confidential, and suggested that the information be obtained through Patrolman Ross from his wife. Agent asked that this be done and no information was obtained from Mrs. Ross, but Patrolman Ross contacted a Mrs. Greenwood, Tower Hill Road, Ft. Thomas, Ky., who formerly lived next to the Zimmers and she informed Ross that Mrs. Zimmer had a son and daughter, by a former marriage. She did not know their names but said that they were living at Indianapolis, Ind., the address she did not know. She also stated that Mrs. Zimmer's first husband was living around Indianapolis somewhere, and that she thought that one of the children was living with him.


Agent then contacted Mrs. Hobbs, 507 Military Park, Ft. Thomas, under pretext and was informed by her that Mrs. Zimmer's maiden name was Baugh; that she (Mrs. Zimmer) formerly lived at Indianapolis, and that she had two children, a son and daughter, who were raised by the Baugh family at Indianapolis, children, a son and daughter, who were raised by the Baugh family at Indianapolis, the Hobbs stated that as far as she knew the son and daughter were both married, and one of them was living with the Baughs at the present time, at least as far as she knew.

Agent then interviewed Mr. and Mrs. Hollenbeck, 18 Southwise Ave.; under pretext, and was informed that Mrs. Zimmer had two children by a former marriage, and that the son was married and lived at Indianapolis, Ind., and that the daughter was not married. Mrs. Hollenbeck was formerly married to a Baugh and that either Mrs. Zimmer's son or daughter was living there.

Sergeant Arthur Levins, Recruiting Office, Fort Thomas, Ky., was then contacted through Col. T. P. Bernard of the Recruiting Office and was informed that he had known Richard Zimmer for about 12 or 14 years, having worked with him in the Recruiting Offices of the Fort. Sergeant stated that he did not know Zimmer intimately. He knew nothing really had about him, but stated that at

added that he did not see any reason for distrusting Zimmer. Levins stated that Zimmer was a very good clerk.

Levins stated that there might be a possibility of determining the names and addresses of the children by checking the records of the Adjutant General's Office in Washington, D. C. and check the enlistment papers for the names of the dependents of Zimmer at the time of enlistment. There would be two sets of papers, he thought, due to the fact that Zimmer re-enlisted after he had left the Service around 1923.

Agent then contacted Sargeant-Major Barret at Headquarters Office but Barret was unable to furnish any additional information.

Mr. Robert Kimble, clerk at the Newport Post Office, Ft. Thomas Branch, Ft. Thomas, Ky., informed agent that Mrs. Zimmer corresponded with people out in the country outside of Indianapolis, Ind., and agent asked if the names Wright and Baugh were familiar to him and he said that he believed those were parties she corresponded with, and that her daughter probably lives there and writes to someone by that name. He added that Mrs. Zimmer had mentioned just recently that she was to be a grandmother soon. This would indicate that either the son or daughter was married. Kimble stated that she was a very gabby woman, very loud in her talk, and that she had a few, if any, friends, and was always into a

meighborhood scrap, and that she ordinarily does not associate with anybody. He added that she comes in the Post Office two or three times a day and he said that he would try to find out from her in an indirect way just where her children lived and their addresses and to whom married.

Agent then interviewed J. J. Nassano, the mail carrier who sarries to 22 Southview Ave., Ft. Thomas, Ky., but he was unable to give any information regarding mail being sent by Zimmers to Indianapolis, and upon request of agent he referred agent to Mrs. Tenner, 15 Southview Ave., Ft. Thomas, Ky., who might give agent some information.

Mrs. Tenner was then contacted by agent but she could not give any information whatever.

Agent then contacted Mm. A. Eimer, Postmaster, Hewport, Iy. who furnished the former address of Richard Zimmer, which was 1019 Park Ave.,. Newport, and he also gave addresses of people living close by that might possibly furnish agent information regarding the Zimmers. The addresses given were, as follows:

1013 Vine St., Newport, Ky. 1011 Park Ave., Newport 1017 Park Ave., Newport 1027 Park Ave., Newport

Agent conducted discreet investigations at the above addresses but no information was obtained. It may be noted here that Agent conducted discreet neighborhood investigations at the addresses furnished by Sergeant Levins and no information was obtained.

Agent searched the marriage records at the Campbell County Court House, Newport, Ky., and found no marriages under the name of R. C. Wright or Baugh. Under the name of Zimmer two or three marriage licenses were recorded but from the information contained therein there was no indication that the parties were related to Mr. and Mrs. Richard Zimmer, of Ft. Thomas, Ky.

The Cincinnati Office at Fort Thomas, Kentucky, will interview Mr. Kimble at the Fort Thomas branch of the Newport Post Office relative to whatever information Mr. Kimble has obtained from Mrs. Zimmer.

Tith/reference to the matter mentioned on the second page of report of Special Agent Bliss Morton, Cincinnati, Ohio, dated 4-27-34, concerning the joke played on a Town Constable near Springfield, Ohio by causing him to believe Dillinger had been seen in that vicinity, Special Agent Chapmon Fletcher, made an investigation and reported as follows:

Upon receipt of your telephone call yesterday Treadwell and I proceeded to Springfield, Ohio, and contacted George W. Banham, Sheriff, who said he had no information other than furnished our office that a telephone call had been received from the Sheriff at London, Ohio, saying six men with one apparently injured in the head had been seen to pass through London in a Ford V-8 Sedan. Frank Haerr his deputy was assigned to assist us and we proceeded to London, Ohio, where we contacted Sheriff J. A. Maxwell who said he knew nothing other than his son who is his deputy had informed him he notified the Springfield Sheriff by telephone of the car having been seen in London.

We next saw E. L. Maxwell, Deputy Sheriff at London who said he had telephoned the Springfield police the information furnished him by Wilson Carl the Town Constable.

Wilson Carl was interviewed and advised that about 12:15 P.M. April 25, he had been standing on the main street of London and had observed six men in a black V-8 car. He did not notice the direction from which the car came and he would have paid no particular attention to the car but for the fact that he looked at the front plate and it was yellow and as the car passed he observed three men in the rear seat the one on the left apparently wounded in the head as he had his head in either a towel or bandage and appeared to be suffering. He says he then noticed that the rear license on the car was green and this aroused his suspicion. He said a short time after this he was told by Homer Plymul a local contractor that he Plymul had been working on High Street in London which Carl mays is on Highway 42 and about noon a Black V-8 Ford had stopped him and one of the men in the car had inquired as to where they could locate a doctor residing outside of the town and that Plymul told him there were six men in the car and that the front license was yellow and the rear license green and that one of the men in the rear seat was wounded. He said he then informed Deputy Sheriff E. L. Maxwell of London of having seen the car and also told Maxwell of his conversation with Plymul. He said the car proceeded about one block further on Main Street and turned east which is in the direction of Highways 42, 38 and 142. He said he had made inquiry but could locate no one except Plymil who had seen the car.

We next saw Homer Plymul, who according to Deputy Sheriff
Maxwell is a contractor and highly respected citizen of London. Present at

Special Agent H. D. Harris, of the Cincinnati Office, has submitted a memorandum as follows:

AT COLUMBUS, OFFIC.

Mr. Em. J. Moore, Secretary to Governor George White, notified me today that a letter was received yesterday addressed to the Governor and signed "J. Obillinger"; that this letter was immediately placed in a cellophane envelope previously left by this agent, and as I was out of town, was turned over to Postmaster Nate McCoy. This letter was postmarked at Columbus, Chic, and was to the effect that Dillinger was in Columbus to look after the men in the penitentiary and to see that the Governor took some action regarding them.

Postmaster McCoy was interviewed and he advised that as soon as he received this letter he took it to Chief of Police Fred Kundts who had an attempt made to bring out latent fingerprints, which was unsuccessful; that the letter was then sent to the Post Office Inspector in Charge, Washington, B.C. and that a copy was not kept.

Chief of Police Kundts advised me that he had a copy of this letter made but that he had left it at his home today, and that he would furnish me with a copy tomorrow. In the meantime, it is assumed that the Division can secure the original from the Post Office Inspector in Charge, Washington, D.C., if such action is desired.

Special Agent F. E. Hurley, of the Cincinnati Office, has submitted a memorandum from Louisville, Ky., reading as follows:

AT LOUISVILLE, KY.

Information was received at Pelice Headquarters, Louisville, about three P.M. April 27, 1934, to the effect that Dillinger and his gang were seen at Sullivan, Indiana, about 9:00 A.M. today driving south. The report was telegraphed by Director Feeney, Indiana State Director of Public Safety. One of the cars was described as being a Dodge, a Ford Sedan and a Plymouth Sedan. The cars carried Hisconsin license plates. The numbers were not given or known at Louisville. The occupants were reported to have been seen carrying machine guns and rifles. Police guards were posted at the two Chio River bridges, Louisville. Agent accompanied the Police detectives. Nothing of value was noted. No subsequent reports were received from out of the city authorities.

The Cincinnati Office received telegraphic inquiry from the Birmingham Office as to whom Indiana license 212477 was issued, stating the tag had been seen on a black Graham Paige Sedan. Through Special Agent in Charge E. J. Commelley, Cincinnati, engaged at Indianapolis, Ind. it was ascertained that the Indiana State Automobile Registration Records show this license to that the Indiana State Automobile Registration Records above this license to have been issued January 2, 1934, to high McCain, R.R. 5. Meethers, Sheriff Petersburg, Ind. who replied by telegram that these licenses plates had been issued to High McCain for a Chevrolet Coupe and that the licenses plates were on his car and that neither the car nor the license plates had been stolen. 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




In connection with the cover, which is being maintained at Indianapolis, Indiana, at the various possible places which subject Dillinger will contact, we are, at present, maintaining a twenty-four hour surveillance, by at least two agents, upon the home of John W. Dillinger, Sr., just outside of Looresville, Indiana, we being located for observation purposes, in the barn of the farm located directly across the road, about one hundred yards from the Dillinger home. We are also maintaining, in so far as possible, a twentyfour hour surveillance upon the home and garage of Jesse Richardson, located on South Street, Mooresville, Indiana, the garage of Jesse Richardson being apparently the garage in which Dillinger concealed the Ford V-8 Sedan, purchased at Indianapolis, Indiana, April 7, 1934, on the night of this date, prior to his leaving this vicinity on Sunday, April 8, 1934. We are also maintaining, in so far as practical, a twenty-four hour surveillance, by cruising, upon the home of Harry E. Baugh, Mars Hill, father-in-law of Hubert Dillinger, the halfbrother of subject Dillinger; also upon the home of Hubert Dillinger, Kerr St., and First Avenue, Mars Hill; also the home of Macey Davis, 1704 Second Ave., Mars Hill, which is the home in which John Dillinger arranged contact on Sunday night, April 8, 1934, with Norman Hancock, Audrey/Hancock and Emmit/Hancock, as well as Mr. and Mrs. Pierpont and Mary Kinder, before leaving Indianapolis, this being the point to which John Dillinger, Evelyn Frechette, Mary and Alberta Hancock proceeded, upon leaving Mooresville, Sunday, April 8, 1934.

Of course, he has had no contact with the Division concerning this matter. His article, however, is certainly sound in so far as facts are concerned. In the Dillinger case I have been impressed by the fact that our Agents have come nearer to getting Dillinger than any of the various State officials, and we have only been looking for him on the ground of having stolen an antamobile, and we have a rather weak case upon that angle, whereas he is wanted by the many local law enforcement officers for murder and more serious crimes than automobile theft. I thought you might be interested in reading Mr. Cullan's article.

Mr. Rorer telephoned today, and this communication is in confirmation of my telephone conversation with Mr. Cowley.

Mr. Rorer stated that he ascertained that two newspaper men representing the Wisconsin News of Milwaukee were responsible for the petition. One of these individuals is a camera man by the name of Al Mahlberg, and the other is a reporter by the name of A. S. Alekson. These two reporters arrived at the Little Bohemia grounds on the morning after the shooting and endeavored to obtain photographs of one of the gangsters' cars, a Buick, in which was placed all the baggage and luggage belonging to the mob that was there. The agents refused to permit them to take these photographs, and I assume they were following the cue that I had previously given when other newspaper reporters and photographers had endeavored to photograph this car on the inside of the garage and I courteously requested them not to do so, after they had obtained photographs of the artillery, and they very courteously refrained from taking the photographs.

These two men employed Mr. Herbert M. Peter of Mercer, Wisconsin, to drive them around while they made their inquiries, and he drove them around for two days. They decided to go to Eagle River, Wisconsin, to obtain photographs of the three girls being held there. Wisconsin, to the station and four men were present, and the newspaper They went to the station and four men were present, and the newspaper men inquired of those present to the effect that "you all must feel bad about not being in on the raid last night", and they further asked the men present why they did not get up a petition asking for a suspension of responsible persons and investigation of the affair.

One of the men present told the newspaper men that Mr. Lewis A. Gebr, the Postmaster at Mercer, was planning to write a story for the Kilwaukee Journal, in which story he intended to portray the

feeling that the local sharp-shooters and crack markamen and deer hunters should have been called in on the raid and arrangements made to block the bridges over which the bandits must pass.

One of the newspaper men then got Mr. Peter to take them over to see Postmaster Gehr. The reporters had to leave on the train, but drew up a rough draft petition, which was believed to be drawn up by Mr. Aslekson, and Mr. Gehr took charge of the petition. Gehr made the remark that he wanted some names on the petition before the newspaper men left.

That night, namely April 24, 1934, was the occasion for the regular biweekly meeting of the Mercer Lakeland Association, an organization which boosts the resorts of that county. The meeting was a regular meeting, and the question was put before the meeting as to whether a petition should be circulated and it was agreed that such a petition should be prepared. Mr. Peter advised Mr. Rorer that he was sorry that he had anything to do with it.

Mr. Rorer interviewed Postmaster Gehr, who admitted that the newspaper men started the petition; but Mr. Gehr expressed the opinion that the petition should be left where it was until it was responsible for bringing about investigation to find out why local individuals were not let in on the raid. Mr. Rorer attempted to explain to Mr. Gehr.

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Mr. Rorer stated that Ed Sargeant, a constable at Mercer, was somewhat peeved because he was not in on the raid, and Sargeant had taken it upon himself to boost the petition.

Last night, Mr. Rorer advised, Tony Richard of Mercer, Wisconsin, was in Vilas County at the Northern Lights Hotel where Mr. Rorer is staying. Richard asked Henry Kuhnert whether they were preparing a petition over there and indicated he believed one should be prepared as it was felt that local officers should have been called in on the raid. Mr. Kuhnert, the manager of the Northern Lights Hotel, stated he saw no need for such a petition.

Mr. Rorer subsequently telephoned that he had been to Eagle River, Wisconsin, and there was no petition there. He had conferred with Sheriff Tom McGregor, as well as with an undersheriff, and he found that they had a rather good attitude but they felt somewhat badly about Senator Copeland's statement that there had not been proper scoperation. Mr. McGregor stated that at 10:15 p.m., he

received a telephone call from a Special Agent from the home of Mr. Voss, asking him to block the roads, and that he immediately started to telephone to have bridges and roads blocked, and he notified all residents in the community that he could reach to put their automobiles out of commission.

The Milwaukee Sentinel, Mr. Rorer stated, carries a splendid editorial today, critical of the criticism that had been made concerning the raid, stating that there was no occasion for such criticism and that the best action that could be taken was taken in connection with the raid.



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

MEMORANDUM FOR THE DIRECTOR.

In connection with the conditions in the Oklahoma City office, as outlined by Mr. Nathan in his telephone call with you on April 20, 1934, I discussed these matters with Mr. Brantley, who advised that in his opinion two Agents should be assigned to work exclusively on the Gallatas case and of the personnel now assigned to his office recommended Agents Black and Marshall for this assignment; that two Agents should be assigned exclusively in the Oklahoma City territory to work on the Barrow case and recommended Agents Deaderick and Smith; that two Agents should be assigned to work exclusively on the Floyd and Richetti case ami recommeded Agents Chipman ami Hartin, that two Agents should be assigned to work exclusively on the Bremer case, primarily looking toward the apprehension of the Barker and Karpis gang, and recommended Agents Hansen and Franklin. Mr. Brantley is of the opinion that the Dillinger case does not require special assignment in the Oklahoma City territory at this time, there being no indication that Dillinger has ever been in that district or that his hide-outs or contacts are in the section but that leads such as have been coming into Oklahoma City in connection with this case chuld well be handled as general assignments; they, of course, to be given preference over other matters.





With reference to the attached telegram signed by J. E. Davis and sent from Alexandria, Virginia, April 28, 1934 advising that he has important information about J. D. of <u>Indiana</u>, I wish to advise that upon receipt of this telegram, I contacted Acting Special Agent in Charge Pennington of the Washington Field Office and instructed him to have an Agent proceed immediately to Alexandria, Virginia to locate J. E. Davis and obtain whatever information he had.

About noon on April 28, 1934 Mr. Pennington called me and advised that Agent Stein had returned from Alexandria, Virginia and suggested that I talk to Agent Stein. Agent Stein advised that W. E. Davis was now confined in the County Jail at Alexandria, Virginia, having been removed from the State of Indiana in connection with an impersonation case being investigated by the Division. Davis stated that he was confined in the same jail with Dillinger at Crown Point, Indiana prior to Dillinger's escape on March 3, 1934 and that while he did not become intimate with Dillinger, they did exchange greetings practically every day. Davis is not in the possession of any information concerning Dillinger or his whereabouts, but said he expected to be released on bond on April 30th or May 1, 1934, at which time he expected to proceed to Indiana for the purpose of obtaining information concerning Dillinger.

Agent Stein stated that Davis appeared to be sincere, that he did not ask for any promises of leniency in his case and that Davis stated he would come to the Washington Field Office immediately upon his release on bond before proceeding to Indiana.

I instructed Agent Stein to insist upon Davis' reporting to him in the event he was released on bond and to assure him that it would be worth his while financially if he could furnish information to the Division which would result in the apprehension of Dillinger; however, that, of course, no promises should be made to Davis in connection with the case in which he was involved.



JOHN DILLINGER et al National Motor Vehicle Theft Act

Dear Sir:

In tracing 38 caliber Colts Superautomatic pistol that was obtained from bandits in recent Dillinger fight in Wisconsin, the Dallas office ascertained that this gun was shipped by Wolf & Klar, Fort Worth, Texas, to H. S. Lebman, 111 South Flores Street, San Antonio, Texas.

Lebman operates at this address a saddlery and harness shop. He also operates as a gunsmith and handles second-hand guns.

Lebman was questioned by the Police here at the time Tommie Carroll shot and killed City Detective H. C. Perrow, at which time Perrow and three other detectives were attempting to execute a pick-up order that had been issued by the Chief of Detectives for Tommie Carroll and H. L. Keith. At the time Carroll escaped after shooting Perrow, he commandeered a truck and left the truck about one block from Lebman's place of business. Investigation developed that he had gone into Lebman's place and obtained a pair of trousers to aid in changing his appearance, as at the time he shot the City Detectives he was dressed in riding breeches and boots. He made good his escape from San Antonio. At the time in cooperation with local police I arrested H. L. Keith at the Aurora Apartments. The Identification Unit identified Keith, who was at that time using the name of Chas. W. Fisher, as being wanted for several Post Office robberies in Wisconsin and Minnesota. He was returned to Wisconsin and upon entering a plea of guilty was sentenced to eight years in Leavenworth Penitentiary. A full report was made on this under the name of H. L. Keith with aliases. At that time there was no information available as to the identity of any persons who might have been in San Antonio with Carroll and Keith.

Knowing what success the police had attempting to obtain information from Lebman, I thought it best to pick him up and bring him to the Division office and question him there. This was done Saturday about 8 P.M. 9 ms was M. COPIES DESTROYER

on Sunday morning about 7 o'clock, we took Lebman to his place of business and searched it. We found, in addition to possibly 200 second-hanf rifles and shot guns, approximately 50 second-hanf pistols and approximately one dozem new pistols of assorted makes. We found one Thompsom sub-machine gun, the breech of which was in Lebman's safe, the balance hidden in his place of business. The serial number of this gun had been removed. On his work bench I found a 45 caliber automatic pistol dismantled and which he was making into a sub-machine gun. I found one new commercial type 45 caliber automatic pistol hidden in the drawer of a desk. I also found one 45 caliber automatic Army pistol that was the property of the United States Government.

ment and supplemental statement attached hereto. He is without a doubt the biggest liar and unprincipled human that I have ever talked to. He has resided in San Antonio for the past 15 years. In fact, he went to school here as he is only about 32 or 33 years of age.

At the time of taking the statement from him, I did not have a picture of George (Baby Face) Nelson. I exhibited to him a photograph of all the Karpis-Barker mob, together with photographs of Dillinger, Hamilton, Bentz and their women. He stated none of these individuals had contacted him. This morning we exhibited to him photograph of Homer Van Meter and he readily and positively identified the photograph as the likeness of Wayne (Huttner, mentioned in his statement. We also exhibited to him photograph of George Nelson, which was received this morning, and he likewise identified it as a positive likeness of Jimmie Williams, also mentioned in his statement. It is my understanding that the description of Jimmie Williams's wife, as mentioned in Lebman's statement, tallies identically with that of the wife of George Nelson.

As will be noted in Lebman's statements, he admits that he was making the 45 automatic into a machine gun for Wayne Huttner, although he claims that this work was ordered last December, and as he had not been in touch with any of the bunch lately, he had not completed the work. The file markings on this gun shows that the work was recently done. A thorough search of his place failed to disclose any record whatever of the purchase, sale or shipment of any guns of any type and Lebman admitted that he kept absolutely no record of the receipt of a gun or the sale of it. I tried in every way to pin him down as to the date of the October shipment to Minneapolis but was unable to establish it. The only thing we found of any interest among his papers was the "Jimmie" letter that I incorporated in his supplemental statement. To show what-a consummate liar this man is, you will note that he furnished me with a name and atreet address in St. Paul to which he claimed he shipped the five machine guns in October and it was not until we found the "Jimmie" letter and confronted him with it that he then admitted that the address contained in this letter was actually the address to which he had shipped the machine guns.

I tried to pin him down as to what made him think of the street address in St. Paul and whether or not he had done any business with any one at that address. He could not explain what made him think of that address and emphatically denies that he had ever done any business with anybody at that address.

The information contained in his statements was immediately telephoned to the St. Paul, Chicago, Kl Paso and Dallas Offices.

We interviewed his wife and her statement is also attached. According to her claims, she only saw the men a few times around Lebman's place of husiness and had accompanied some of them on a pleasure trip to Laredo, Texas, of during which time they did not register at any hotel as they made a round trip in one day.

There is no doubt in my mind but what this man Lebman has been dealing not only with the gangaters mentioned herein but possibly others and it will necessitate a painstaking check of the Express Company's records here to ascertain to what points he has shipped packages that might by their weight or value contain machine guns or other arms. Especially do I desire to establish the date of the October shipment, as the Texas Machine Gun law went into effect October 25th last. This law forbids even the possession of a machine gun except in the hands of law enforcement officials.

According to Lebman, he first contacted Jimmie Williams and Keith in San Antonio in June. He could not explain why they called on him. He stated they only remained here a few days at that time. He claims the next contact was with Jimmie Williams in September and that Williams only remained in San Antonio about one week and this was the time that the negotiations were made that ultimately resulted in the shipment of the guns to Minneapolis. Lebman claims his next contact was when the five men showed up in San Antonio about November 18th or 19th. It is noted that he claims Jimmie Williams, Wayne Buttner and Tommie McGammon left San Antonio the day previous to the shooting of City Detective Perrow by Carroll and that from conversation he overheard Carroll and Keith were to remain here a while longer and later join the others somewhere in the East. In questioning him concerning the automobiles used by this mob, the only information I could obtain was that contained in his statementsattached. He steadfastly denies that he knew where they were staying in San Antonio except that he knew that Keith was residing in the Aurora Apartments. It has been developed that Tommie Carroll was stopping at the Bluebonnet Hotel under the name of Tommie McLarkin. So far we have been unable to ascertain where the balance of the gang stopped while they were here in November and December. However, every effort will be made along that line.

The United States Attorney here is cooperating to the limit and a complaint was filed this morning charging Lebman with possession of stolen government property, to-wit: the 45 automatic pistol found in his possession. His bond was set at \$2,000.00 which he has not as yet made but probably will.

Arrangements have been made for the full cooperation of State District Attorney Walter Tynan, who states that as soon as Lebman makes bond in the Federal case, he will file on him under the Texas Machine Gun Act which was passed October 25, 1933, and forbids the possession of a machine gun except by law enforcement officials. I have also arranged for the County Attorney to file complaints against Lebman charging him with being a dealer in firearms and not complying with the Texas statute which requires that a dealer be registered and keep a record of each and every gun sold.

It is my belief, and I have so advised SAC Blake at Dallas, that a thorough check should be made of the records of Wolf & Klar, Fort Worth to ascertain from them what record they have of every gun sold Lebman during the past year and a half, as he stated to me that all of the pistols that he handled were obtained from Wolf & Klar. He denied ever obtaining any machine guns from Wolf & Klar and states that the machine guns mentioned in his statement were obtained in the manner indicated. However, this will be thoroughly checked and may be found to be untrue.

I have called in Resident Agent Murphy at Houston to assist us but may have to call on you for one other man as I intend to sift this matter to the bottom.

At the time of the arrest of Keith at the Aurora Apartments, he was in company with one Chas. Nelcey, who, on account of his having no previous criminal record, was released by the San Antonio Police Department. It is believed that this is the correct name of that man as he had been in San Antonio for several months at the time Carroll-Keith and their mob came here. Lebman admits that he has been in correspondence with Nelcey who is now supposed to be located at 2315 Kemper Lane, Cincinnati, Ohio, and that he sold Nelcey's gun case that was bought through Wolf & Klar, Fort Worth, Texas, and shipped direct to C. H. Nelcey at the Cincinnati address mentioned, on Feb. 24, 1934. Nelcey's San Antonio Police number is 8331, and, for the information of the Cincinnati office, he is described as follows:

Age 35; height 5 feet 7; hair medium chestnut; eyes gray green; complexion ruddy; native New Haven, Conn.

I am furnishing the Cincinnati office with a copy of this letter and enclosures together with a photograph of Nelcey and it is suggested that a thorough check be made of this man as he may be in touch with some of this gang.

Gus T. Jones Special Agent in Charge.

I, H. S. Lebman, after being duly warned of my constitutional rights that I do not have to make a statement and that any statement I may make concerning this matter may be used against me, make the following free and voluntary statement to Gus T. Jones, Special Agent in Charge, W. S. Division of Investigation, Department of Justice, at San Antonio, Texas concerning any and all pistols, machine-guns, and other firearms I have sold and delivered to certain individuals.

In June, 1933 one Jimmie Williams and a man named Fisher or Keith came to my place of business, lll South Flores Street, San Antonio, Texas. They were traveling in an Essex 1933 model terraplane sedan, dark blue in color, and bearing either Minnesota or California license plates. At that time they had with them a woman whom Williams said was his wife, described:

Age 25 or 27, Height about 5° 5°, Weight about 125, Light complexion, Light brown hair, brown eyes, Irregular teeth, Spoke bad English, appeared to be uneducated.

Williams and the woman had a little boy about five years of age, light brown hair, who they called Ronald. There was also with them an elderly woman over 50 years of age with gray hair, who did not get out of the car and who I took to be the mother of either Williams or his wife.

Keith had no woman with him and is the same man who was arrested in the Aurora Apartments on or about December 12, 1935 in connection with the shooting of City Detective Perrow. These people remained in San Antonio, Texas about one week. While they were here I sold Williams and Keith two colt super-automatic pistols and two 380 caliber automatic pistols. These pistols I ordered by express from Wolf and Klar, Ft. Worth, Texas.

I never heard any more from these people until in the latter part of September, 1933, I believe it was, when I had a letter from Jimmie Williams written from St. Paul, Minnesota, ordering two super-automatics, .38 caliber, two caliber 580 automatic pistols, and three .22 rifles. In this letter Williams also wanted to know if I could get him some Thompson sub-machine guns.

I ordered the two super-automatics and the two 380 caliber automatics from Wolf and Klar. Through Harry Cushman who travels for a gas mask concern and who should be well known to the Fire Department here I learned that I could get some machine guns from John Stockmeyer, an insurance man who resides on Porfiric-Diaz Street, El Paso, Texas. I communicated with Stockmeyer, I do not recall whether by letter or by telegram, and he advised me that he could furnish me with some machine guns. I drove to El Paso in my car accompanied by a man named Nelcey. This is the same man who was arrested in the Aurora Apartment house with Keith. On this trip I secured two Thompson machine guns and returned to San Antonic. This was in the month of October, 1933. I later that same month made another trip to El Paso and obtained three additional Thompson machine guns from Stockmeyer. All of these guns were shipped to Jimmie Williams at 1632 South Preston

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Street, St. Paul, Minnesota. I do not recall whether I shipped the pistols at a different time than I shipped the machine guns. Williams also had sent me about \$400 in the letter he wrote me and I believe that approximately \$300 of this was in cashier's checks on some Chicago bank, the name of which I do not recall. I believe the balance of the money was a Postoffice money order. The machine guns were shipped with C. O. D. charges of approximately \$900. I later received a letter from Jimmie Williams acknowledging receipt of this shipment in which letter he spoke of the weather being cold in Minnesota and stated that he would probably be down in this country soon.

Sometime after the middle of November, 1933 this same Jimmie Williams who is described as follows arrived here:

Age 26 or 27, Height about 5° 5°, Weight about 135, Complexion light, Hair light brown combed straight back, Small blond mustache, Blue eyes.

He was accompanied by Keith and the following individuals:

TOM MCGANNON DESCRIBED: AGE ABOUT 32 OR 33, HEIGHT 5° 8° OF 9°, SLIGHTLY POCKMARKED OR ROUGH FACE, LIGHT COMPLEXION, LIGHT BROWN HAIR, ACCOMPANIED BY A WOMAN: AGE ABOUT 35, HEAVY SET, LIGHT YELLOW HAIR BOBEED, ROUGH COMPLEXION, ABOUT FIVE FOOT SEVEN INCHES TALL AND WHO HAD A LITTLE GIRL ABOUT FIVE YEARS OLD WITH BLOND HAIR.

WAYNE HUTTNER DESCRIBED: AGE 33 TO 34, HEIGHT 5° 10°, DARK BROWN HAIR ALMOST BLACK, WEIGHT ABOUT 150 POUNDS, DARK COMPLEXION, HAIR COMBED STRAIGHT BACK, SMALL DARK MUSTACHE, WALKED WITH DROOP-ING SHOULDERS, TALKED WITH A DRAWL. ACCOMPANIED BY A WOMAN: AGE ABOUT 20, HEIGHT 5° 5°, WEIGHT ABOUT 115 POUNDS, DARK COMPLEXION, BLACK HAIR, THINK EYES BLACK, APPEARED TO BE PART INDIAN OR ITALIAN.

TOMATE CARROLL WHO IS THE MAN CHARGED WITH KILLING CITY DETECTIVE PERROW.
WILLIAMS WAS ACCOMPANIED BY THE SAME YOUNG WOMAN WHO WAS WITH HIM IN JUNE BUT I DID NOT SEE THE ELDERLY WOMAN AT THIS TIME.

At this time the party had the following automobiles:

Jimmie Williams, what appeared to be the same terraplane sedan he had in June.
Wayne Huttner, a terraplane sedan, 1933 model, dark blue color, with an Illinois license.
Tom McGennon, Buick coach, 1933 model, black color, trunk on rear, Minnesota license.

Keith, an Auburn sedan, 1933 model, Minnesota license.

This party of people remained in San Antonio almost a month during which time I sold either Jimmie Williams or Keith two more 380 caliber automatic pistols. Williams, Huttner, McGannon, and the women left San Antonio on Saturday night, prior to the shooting of Detective Perrow on Monday, December 12, I believe it was. I know they left because they came by my store and told me goodbye. Carroll and Keith remained in San Antonio.

Tommie Carroll had at one time asked me if he could borrow a pair of old pants to wear hunting. On the evening that Detective Perrow was shot, and before I knew of the shooting and at about 5:30 P. M. Carroll came to my place and borrowed a pair of trousers and left my place walking. I have never seen him since. Later that same evening about 6:30 P. M. Keith phoned me to meet him on Broadway near Brackenridge Park. I met him and Nelcey. They were in the Auburn car of Keith's. Keith asked me about the shooting and I told him that from a conversation I had had with a girl who had phoned me from Keene's drug store Carroll might have been involved as this girl had asked me not to say anything about her going with Carroll or knowing him in case anyone asked me. Keith said he was going to the Aurora Apartments, get his clothes, and leave town. The next time I saw Keith was in the San Antonic Police Department after his arrest.

I do not know where Tommie Carroll, known in San Antonio as Tommie McLarkin, Wayne Huttner, Jimmie Williems, Tommie McGannon, or the women resided while they were in San Antonio. I knew that Keith resided at the Aurora Apartments, as he had asked me about a place and I had mentioned this apartment house to him.

I do not know whether I have any record of the shipment of guns to Jimmie Williams at St. Paul or not, and I hereby willingly give my permission to Gus T. Jones, Special Agent in Charge, Division of Investigation, or anyone he may designate, permission to look through all my records and my store at 111 South Flores Street, San Antonio, Texas for any information or record in connection with this shipment or any other sales of pistols or machine guns that may be in my establishment.

I recall that Jimmie Williams in conversation with me once said if I was ever in San Francisco and he was there I could get in touch with him through Foghorn Murphy, who is well known in that place.

I have willingly told the entire truth concerning my transaction with the people mentioned herein. It is the full truth and all of the truth.

I have not been able to find the record of a .38 caliber super-automatic pistol shipped to me on September 18, 1933 by Wolf and Klar, Ft. Worth, Texas, but if one was shipped on that date it was one of the guns that I shipped to Jimmie

Williams at 1632 South Preston Street, St. Paul, Minnesota.

Supplementary statement made to Gus T. Jones, Special Agent in Charge, Division of Investigation, U. S. Department of Justice, San Antonio, Texas, to be made a part of the statement made on this date. This statement is made under the same conditions as my previous statement and after the same explanation of my constitutional rights.

Concerning the following letter found in my files in my place of business at 111 South Flores Street, and which letter I voluntarily turned over to Mr. Jones:

September 25, 1933.

"Dear Pal

"Could not write sooner the address here is

Mr. Joseph Bennett 3242 Sixteenth Ave. So. Minneapolis, Minn.

"Enclose my personal letter in another envelope addressed to 'Jimmie'.

"Hope to hear some good news from you soon. Don't get me any more outfits like the last one. It was 'one way' like I thought it was. I'm sure you understand what I mean. But don't let it worry you.

As ever your pal,

Jimmie."

I received the above letter from Jimmie Williams. It was posted in Minneapolis, Minnesota, and since having it called to my attention I now know that I was mistaken in the address of Jimmie Williams which I said in my previous statement was 1632 South Preston Street, St. Paul, Minnesota. I now am sure that the address mentioned in the above letter is the place I shipped all the guns described in my former statement. I do not know what made me mention the South Preston Street address. I can not recall that I ever communicated with anyone at that address.

The outfit Jimmie refers to in the letter was a machine gun I sold him in September, 1933. I recall now that Jimmie and his wife returned to San Antonio about the tenth of September, 1933 and remained about three days. There was no one else with them. At that time he also bought one .38 Colt super-automatic and a .25 caliber automatic pistol. This machine gun I obtained from Izzey Shappu, Corpus Christi, Texas. My brother-in-law, Louis Schwartzman, who travels for me, had told Izzey that if he could get a machine gun I would buy it. I believe that Izzey got the gun from a deputy sheriff. He called me up and I went down to Corpus and got the gun and I believe I paid him \$150.00 for the gun. I brought it to San Antonio and Jimmie was leaving that night and I delivered the

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gun to him. He paid me \$300.00 for it. This transaction was about the middle of September, 1933. At that time I was making no record of transactions of this kind and I have no record to refer to to refresh my memory.

Jimmie shipped this gun back to me to be repaired as it would not operate "full auto" and that is what he meant by his statement in the above letter that it was "one way." I repaired this gun and showed it to him when he came to San Antonio in November, 1933. At that time he said he would give me an address to ship the gun to him but he never did. The machine gun I am now referring to is the gun found in my place of business this morning. It has no serial number on it now although I am sure it did have when I delivered it to Jimmie in September, 1933. This gun I am now voluntarily turning over to Gus T. Jones for the purpose of tracing its identity.

Concerning the Colt .45 automatic, with the number filed off and secret number 173697, this gun was obtained by me from Wolf & Klar sometime in November 1933. I believe I sold this gun to Keith or at least it was to one of the bunch that was here in November. It was traded back to me for a .38 super automatic. At the time I obtained the gun the serial number was intact but when I got it back it had been removed. This is the gun found in my desk drawer and was not with my regular stock of guns. I am turning this gun over to Gus T. Jones in order that it can be traced to verify whether or not I obtained it in the manner I have here stated.

Concerning the .45 caliber colt automatic, serial number 161971 (secret) this gun was dismantled by me in the shape it was found and I was building it into a machine gun; the hand grip found with it was to have been affixed to the gun and the gun was to have been made to fire "full auto." This job was ordered done by Wayne Huttner while the gang was here in November, 1933. The job was not finished when Huttner left and I was to deliver it to Keith but did not on account of his arrest. This gun was not sold by me and I do not know where they obtained it.

Concerning the nickle-plated .45 caliber Army automatic, serial number 77149, I am positive that this gun was left with me for repairs several months ago by some party I do not know. I held this gun for some time and placed it in my show window but realizing that it was a Government gun I took it from the window and placed it in my safe where it was found today. I have turned this gun over to Gus T. Jones in order that it can be returned to the military authorities from whom it must have been stolen. I know that none of these guns, bearing the stamp "United States Property" are for sale.

I can not think of anything additional to say at this time except that the United States Army Springfield Rifle found in my place, serial #646706, was left there by a man named Stanfield for repairs several months ago. Stanfield did

not leave any address and I do not know him.

This statement is the truth and is made to Gus T. Jones, San Antonio, Texas, on April 29, 1934.



Agent Conner also was advised that this information had been telegraphically furnished the Chicago Office on 4/28/34 in response to a wire from that office.

Yearsley and this agent consulted both the telephone and city directories and ascertained that the only O'Connell who lives in a 6400 block on any street in St. Louis is Jeremiah O'Connell, who formerly worked for the City of St. Louis in Forest Park at the city stables but who has not been so employed since 1931; that the residence of Jeremiah O'Connell is 6458 Wise Ave. where he resides with his wife, Mary, and sons, John and Jeremiah, Jr., who is generally known in that community as Bus, also his unmarried daughter, Mary, who is employed as an office girl by the Laclede Gas Company, lives with him; that his oldest daughter, Julia, is married to Robert Brady and lives directly across Childers St. from her father at #1201 and that Robert Brady is a toll collector on the Free Bridge at St. Louis.

On April 12, 1934 Special Agent in Charge D. M. Ladd conferred with Chief of Police McCarthy and Chief of Detectives Carroll of St. Louis and confidentially advised them of the information received from the Cincinneti Division Office, who assigned a number of plain clothes police officers to assist agents of the Division in mainteining a surveillance at 6458 Wise ave., at the Free Bridge, Eads Bridge, McKinley Bridge and Chain of Rocks Bridge. The home of Jeremiah O'Connell at 6453 Wise ave. was kept under surveillance from 9:00 A. M., April 12, 1934 until 3:00 P. M., April 15, 1934. A surveillance was maintained at the Free Bridge by Division agents and police officers from 9:00 A. M., April 12, 1934 until 8:00 A. M., April 18, 1934. At the Eads Bridge from 9:00 A. M., April 12, 1934 until midnight of the same day. At the McKinley Bridge from 9:00 A. M., April 12, 1934 until midnight of the same day and at the Chain or Rocks Bridge from 9:00 A. M., April 12, 1934 until midnight of the same day. The last three bridges mentioned were the most unlikely bridges which might be used in coming to Ct. Louis but uniformed officers at these three bridges were given the license numbers of the automobiles likely to be used by Mary Kinder and Mrs. Fierpont and these officers in

connection with the toll collectors were furnished with pertinent information concerning this metter with instructions to notify the St. Louis Division Office should they observe either an Auburn sedan or a Ford V-8 sedan bearing the above mentioned license numbers.

Special agent Glenn A. Paulson contacted the officials of the St. Louis Lambert Airport and ascertained that the only plane arriving in St. Louis from Columbus, Chio and Indianapolis, Ind. arrived at 6:17 P. M. daily; that two planes arrived in St. Louis from Chicago, Ill. daily at 11:16 A. M. and 8:20 P. M. These planes were covered by Agent Paulson on April 13, 14 and 15, 1934 and contact established with the airport officials, who were furnished with copies of all identification orders in this matter and instructions to immediately call this office should they receive any information concerning subjects.

Copies of identification orders on subjects Dillinger and Hamilton were furnished to all Pullman and railroad conductors working out of St. Louis, No. and Springfield, Illinois.

No information was obtained by the maintenance of the surveillance mentioned above and on Sunday evening at 8:00 P. M. further surveillance was discontinued at all points except the Free Bridge, which surveillance was continued until Londay morning, April 16, 1934.

It was decided by Special Agent in Charge D. M. Ladd at the conclusion of the surveillance at 6458 wise Ave., St. Louis, that an investigation be made in order to determine the character and reputation of Jeremiah C'Connell and family.

Interview was had with W. H. Hense who operates a grocery store at 6402 Wise Ave., who stated he has known Jeremiah O'Connell and wife for more than twenty years; that Wr. O'Connell formerly worked for the City of St. Louis at the stables in Forest Park but has not been so employed since 1931; that he is advanced in years and has not been employed since that time; that his family consists of the following:

Mr. W. H. Bissick, druggist, corner of Clayton and Term Ave. being interviewed stated he has known the C'Connell family at 6458 Wise Ave. for at least eighteen years and knows that their reputation is A-1 in every respect. Ar. Bissick gave the same information concerning the individual members of said family as that given by Er. Hense.

Ed Driscol, druggist, corner of Clayton and McCausland, being interviewed advised that he has known the C'Connell family, who reside at 6458 dise ave., for at least twenty years and during all this time has never known any member of said family to be under suspicion of any wrongdoing; that the entire family are regular church attendants and each member of the family has always been industrious.

Mr. G. E. Layman and malter moon who operate a hardware store at 6400 wise ave. advised they have been acquainted with the C'Connell family who reside at 6453 wise ave. for at least twenty years; that Mr. O'Connell owns only the property in which he lives; that he has always been a hard working man and that his children, consisting of two boys and two girls, have assisted in every way possible in keeping the family together; that the entire family bear an excellent reputation and they are sure that no member of the C'Connell family has ever been suspected of any prongdoing.

At the direction of Special Agent in Charge D. M. Ladd,
Jeremiah O'Connell, Sr. was openly interviewed by this agent and Special
Agent w. S. Aich. He stated he has lived at his present address during
his entire married life; that he is now 67 years of age and for a great
number of years prior to 1931 was employed by the Sity of St. Louis as
caretaker and stable man in Forest Fark; that he does not know any other
O'Connell family in St. Louis and that all his relatives reside in the
East; that to his personal knowledge no key has been left with himself
or either of his sons to any other apartment or building in St. Louis.
Mr. O'Connell was not given any idea as to the purpose of the interview.

Referring to your letter dated April 25, I am submitting the following list of the cuns which were seized near Rhinelander, Wisconsin, in the Dillinger case:

1 .38 Special Smith and Wesson Pistol No. 576426.

1 .38 Colt Superautomatic, Secret No. 14130.

1 .38 Calibre Smith and Wesson Double Action Pistol on a .44 frame, No. 40399.

1 .45 Fistol, Smith and Wesson, on which numbers have been removed.

1 Thompson submachine gun on which numbers have been removed.

The following information has been obtained concerning these guis:

The .38 Special Smith and Messon Pistol, No. 576426, and the .38 Smith and Lesson, double action pistol, on a .44 frame, #40399, have been definitely established as belonging to the Police Department at Tarsaw, Indiana. This information has been obtained by wiring the Smith and Tesson Company, who furnished us with information showing that the gun, #576426 had been shipped by them direct to Chief Pettinger at Warsaw, and that the gun #40399 had been shipped by that company to Mauzy Sporting Goods Store, which concern in turn sold the gun to Chief Pettinger.

The .38 Colt Superautomatic, secret No. 14130 Was shipped by the Colt Arms Company at Hartford, Connecticut, on information obtained from them, to the Wolf and Flar Company, dealers in arms at Fort Worth, Texas. Accordingly, a wire was sent to the Dallas Office, in

order to chech this information. It was determined by the Dallas Office that the Holf and Elar Company shipped this gun to a man named Lebman in San Antonio, Texas. This last-named person is a dealer in harness and saddle equipment and also handles guns. A proper lead was set out for the San Antonio Office, in order to determine the accuracy of this i formation. Subsequently, the San Antonio Office has furnished the information, telephonically, which is set out in the attached memorandum, showing that this gun was sold by Lebman to a person who may be connected with the Dillinger Gang.

The Thompson submachine gun on which numbers had been removed, has been forwarded to the Division, as requested by teletype message. The Thompson submachine gun which was taken at Rhinelander by the St. Paul Office, has also been forwarded to the Division.

Wires were sent to the Winchester and Remington Arms
Companies to ascertain the sale of the Winchester and Remington guns set
out in the above list, and replies from these companies showed that neither
company has kept records of its sales of these guns, thus making it
impossible to make a thorough check of these guns.

No disposition has been made of the .48 Smith and Wesson pistol, on which the numbers had been removed.

MAL'ORANDUM:

Special Agent in Charge Ous T. Jones, San Astonio, Texas, advised by long distance telephone at 9:45 this morning, with reference to tracing of super-sutomatic /14130, that a Jew by the name of Lebran, in the harness and saddler business at San Antonio, also handles guns, although he has at license to handle guns. He has about 100 guns in his possession. Lebran admitted to hir. Gus Jones that he, Lebran, shipped this gun to Joseph Bennett, at 3242 leth Ave., South, Minneapolis. Jones has already advised the St. Paul Office of this.

In June of last year, a man known as Jimmy Williams and described as age 26 or 27, height 5 feet 5 inches, weight 135 pounds, light complected, light brown hair, small blonde mustache, came to San Antonio accompanied by a man by the name of Keith, who at that time went by the name of Fisher, and who was with Tommy Carpoll at the time Carroll killed a City Detective in Sen Antonio. Carroll got away, but Keith was taken back to St. Penl and is in the penitentiary now, serving eight years on a Post Office Robbery Charge. The St. Inul Office as a file on Keith, as E. L. Reith, alias Fisher, and Tomay Carroll is mentioned in this file. At that time these two men came to San Antonio, stayed about a week, and bought from Lebman two Thompson guns and ... two super-entomatics. Jimmy Williams came back in September of last year at which time he bought two more super-entomatics, two 580's and ordered all the machine guns he could get. In June he went out to El Paso and got three Thompson guns and went back later and got three more. Lebman says that in October Jimmy Williams left word for him to ship the Thompson guns to the address given above in Linneapolis.

In Rovemb er, five of the boys showed up in San Antonio - Tommy Carroll, Keith, Jimmy Villiams, a men giving the name of Tommy McGamnon, and mayne Ruttner. Ruttner has been identified as Homer Van Meter. These boys had women with them at the time. Jimmy Villiams' wife, who was called Helen, is described as age 25 years, height about 5 feet 1 inch, weight about 105 er 110, blonde hair (apparently natural), fair complexion. Wayne's wife was about 10° or 20 years old, very attractive patitatype, about 5 feet 1 or 2 inches tall, does not weigh much over 105 or 110 pounds, dark eyes, dark hair, clive complexion, appears as though the might be part Indian, was called Haris.

In June when Jimmy Williams and Keith came down, they had a woman with them and a little boy about five years old, who they called Ronnie. At that time there was a woman with them, a matronly looking old woman about 55 years old, with grey hair. She never got out of the car. Lebman was shown

a picture of Mother Barker, but couldn't identify it. Jimmy's wife was back with them when they came back in the fall, but the ald woman never came back.

Lebran keeps no records whatever; consequently hasn't the numbers of any of the guns.

Mr. Jones advised that he ham't been able to find out where Jimmy Williams stayed while in San Antonio. Keith was at the Aurora Apartments, but was there alone. At the time the police attempted to arrest Carroll, they didn't know that these other men were there and this was just learned in the last few days. Lebman has been filed on for having in his possession a Covernment gun. He buys his gun from a firm by the name of Wolf & Klar, at Fort Worth, Texas. This is the vorst outfit in the south and is the biggest arms dealer in the entire south. They deal mostly in secondhand firearms.

Tormy McGermon is described as about about 52 or 33; height about 5 feet 5 or 9 inches; face rough, has expearence of pock marked but should not be confused as plain pock marks, light complexion, brown hair, had women with him around 33 to 35 years of age, heavy build, light yellow hair, rough complexion, about 5 feet 5 inches tall, had a little blonde haired girl about 5 years old.

Special Agent in Charge Jones desired that he be furnished, immediately, with photographs of the women taken at Rhinelander, Wiscomsin; also wishes a picture of bat Reilly and the mashers of the gans taken at Rhinelander.

I have been thinking over the Dillinger case and have come to the conclusion that perhaps Dillinger and a great many other outlaws are traveling about the country in alcohol trucks or other trucks fitted up to meet their convenience. I know that police and shere iffs are lax in the inspection of such trucks as the alcohol traffic is still a very lucrative business and I believe a great many county officials are not doing their duty in this respect. At any rate you can see the possibilities of such travel when there is practically no inspection of any of the trucks. As a matter of fact any of the trucks could be fitted up to be a regular travelling fortress and this mode of travel would account for the ease in which Dillinger seems to slip around the country.



MELIORANDUM FOR MR. COWLEY.

On May 1, 1934 I interviewed Mr. T. F. Kinder, who was referred to me by Mrs. Skillman. Mr. Kinder had no specific address, but stated that he traveled all over the United States as well as Canada, Mexico and Alaska. He stated that no one was more familiar with the country, especially the Twin Cities, Chicago and Denver, Colorado than he. It appeared that Mr. Kinder was drawing compensation from the Veterans' Administration and he stated that he could be reached through this Department at any time.

At the outset of the interview Mr. Kinder advised me that he had been a close friend of Mr. V. W. Hughes, deceased; that he was also acquainted with Mr. Harold Nathan, as well as United States Attorney Carr at Denver, Colorado. Mr. Kinder had very little to say, but appeared to be merely paying his respects to the Division. However, after continued questioning, he finally stated that he was now interested in effecting the apprehension of John Dillinger, which he was positive he could do. When asked how he would effect such, he stated that he had a method all of his own and would give no specific information. He did state that he would proceed to the State of Indiana and possibly from there to Chicago, Illinois and Twin Cities. Mr. Kinder stated that if the Division would pay his expenses, he would personally arrest Dillinger in a short time.

I advised Mr. Kinder that if he could furnish information as to Dillinger's whereabouts and such information resulted in his location, the Division would not only pay his expenses, but would pay him for the time he had expended.

Mr. Kinder then departed apparently satisfied and stated he would proceed to Chicago and if he obtained any information would contact Special Agent in Charge Purvis.



Mr. Purvis telephoned this afternoon. He stated that F. GM Layton, of Wisconsin Rapids, Wisconsin, had just telephoned him, and advised that there is a green Hudson sedan with Indiana license plates on it in a parking lot in Wisconsin Rapids, having been there for several days. Layton had checked the license plates and ascertained they were issued to the Universal Institute at Fort Wayne, Indiana, for a Chrysler instead of a Hudson. He advised Mr. Purvis that the gas station attendant had just received a call, instructing him to deliver this car to a point near Rudolph, which is just above Wisconsin Rapids, and instructed that it be delivered after dark tonight. There is a grip in the rear of the car, bearing the initials "L.J.K." Mr. Purvis stated he had tried to get in touch with Mr. Rorer, but he is in Iron Mountain, Mich. I agreed with Mr. Purvis' suggestion that he have several Agents cover this matter tonight. Wisconsin Rapids is approximately 250 miles from Chicago, but only about 80 or 90 miles from the point where Agents Suran, Medalla, Rhodes, and Melvin are located. Mr. Purvis said Agent Suran advised him that Mr. Rorer had gone to a hospital in Iron Mountain to see the men who were wounded, and he, Mr. Suran, was unable to get in touch with him. I instructed Mr. Purvis to again try to locate Mr. Rorer and instruct him to handle this detail, but that if he wasn't successful again, to instruct Mr. Suran to proceed to Wisconsin Rapids with these Agents and get the Sheriff to accompany them.

After searching our files for a record of Mr. Layton, referred to above, I telephoned Mr. Purvis and advised him that Layton is an applicant; that under date of February 19, 1934, he wrote me a long letter, copy of which was sent to Mr. Rorer at St. Paul, directing him to interview Layton because he apparently had some information which might be of value in the Bremer case; that according to his application, Layton has been in the investigative business since 1921; that he was arrested for obtaining money under false pretenses, but upon trial was found not guilty. I read the letter to Mr. Purvis, in which Layton claims to have information concerning the Linebergh, Hamm and Bremer cases.

During telephonic conversation this afternoon Mr. Clegg advised that Mr. Rorer was at Ironwood, Michigan, interviewing the wounded men in the hospital there; that there were only four Agents left in that territory besides Mr. Rorer, and that Mr. Rorer had planned to release two of them to Chicago tonight. I told him I had ordered these Agents to take care of the lead at Wisconsin Rapids.

Toledo, Ohio; George Stevenson, single, age 36; Joseph Stevenson, single; Jack Stevenson, single; that when his older brother Howard was born at Sault Ste. Marie, Michigan, Howard was given to the grandmother, Mrs. Elander Kimble, who is 82 years of age, to raise; that all of the relatives of Hamilton and Mrs. Kimble reside at Sault Ste. Marie and in that immediate vicinity; that about 11 or 12 years ago the Hamilton family moved to Detroit, Michigan, where they resided for a period of time, at which place he, Orville Hamilton, was born and where his mother died a very short time after his birth; that his father John Hamilton then gave him, Orville, also to his grandmother to raise, and that two or three years after his mother's death his father, John Hamilton, died and that they were both buried in the same grave in a cemetery in Detroit, Michigan. Orville Hamilton also informed that he had an uncle Claude Hamilton who lives somewhere in Cleveland and whom he had seen only once in two or three years, and knows nothing about him.

When questioned for further information as to relatives of the Hamiltons and Kimbles Orville Hamilton was unable to give any information. He is only about ten years of age and informed that his grandmother and uncles did not discuss their relatives any around him.

Howard Hamilton was also questioned under the same circumstances, and he appears as a delinquent boy of about twelve years of age. In response to questioning he was unable to furnish any additional information. He appears to be dense and sluggish and it was quite apparent that he had no information in his possession. He also informed when questioned as to the whereabouts of his father John Hamilton that his father was dead and that his father and mother were buried in a joint grave in Detroit, Michigan; that he as well as his brother Orville does not recall ever having seen his father. When questioned as to possible visitors at 1008 East Bancroft, both Hamilton boys informed that the family had no visitors in three or four years except on one occasion when the uncle, Claude Hamilton, stopped in to buy them a couple of sticks of candy, saying at that time that he was on his way to Cleveland, Ohio. Both of the boys informed that their family is on the city welfare and that none of the uncles have been employed for some little time now, and are presently relying on city help for their existence, including clothing. They also informed that they never hear their grandmother or uncles speak of their father or mother very much.

Bancroft Street, Toledo, Ohio, was interviewed and he informed that since the occasion of his last interview he has had several opportunities to question the two Hamilton boys concerning information of their family and father, but that they seemed to know nothing about him, and had informed that their father was dead and that they do not recall ever having seen him; that apparently the two boys returned home and told their grandmother of the conversation they had had with the storekeeper and the questions he had

propounded and a short time afterward the grandmother came over and wanted to know why he was questioning the two boys concerning John Hamilton.

Mrs. Y. J. Randle, 1015 Rast Bancroft Street, Toledo, Ohio, was interviewed and she informed that she has lived at this address for approximately 15 years; that some three or three and a half years ago the Kimble family including the Stevensons moved to 1008 East Bancroft Street where they have resided continuously since; that Mrs. Kimble's first husband was a man by the name of Stevenson, now deceased, who was killed in a railroad wreck years ago; that the remaining members resided at 1000 East Bancroft, including her sons by her first marriage, and her daughter, who is married to Clyde Varnes; that it has been rumored in the neighborhood that one of Mrs. Kimble's daughters married John Hamilton who was a cohort of Subject Dillinger, and this daughter was dead and is reported to have been buried somewhere in Detroit, Michigan; that since the instant matter arose due to the great amount of newspaper publicity she has watched the premises of 1008 East Bancroft from a standpoint of surjosity and that she has not observed any strangers visiting there nor have there been any strange automobiles observed near the premises, and that she is of the opinion that Subject John Hamilton is not in communication with the grandmother, Mrs. Elander Kimble.

Mrs. Henry Schultz, 1010 East Bancroft Street, was interviewed and she informed that Mrs. Kimble's correct name is Eleanor Kimble and that Mrs. Kimble with her sons and daughter and son-in-law moved to 10082 East Bancroft about three and one-half years ago, having moved to Toledo a very few weeks prior thereto from Detroit, Michigan, and that they have resided at that address continuously since; that from time to time she has visited with Mrs. Kimble and has talked to her concerning her sons; that however Mrs. Kimble has not mentioned any of her relatives but that she understands those she does have reside at Sault Ste. Marie, Michigan; that Mrs. Kimble has never referred to John Hamilton that she can recall, but knows that Mrs. Kimble has a daughter who is dead and that the two sons, Orville and Howard, are sons of that deceased daughter. Mrs. Schultz was unable to furnish any information concerning the Kimbles, Mrs. Kimble's residence in Detroit, Michigan, or the cemetery in which John Hamilton and his wife are reported to be buried in a joint grave; that she recalls that Mrs. Kimble attended a funeral of some relative during August of 1953 at Sault Ste. Marie; that she has observed no strangers or strange automobiles around the premises of 10082 East Bancroft, and she is of the opinion that Subjects of the instant file have not visited at that address.

Copies of the Identification Orders of Subjects John Dillinger, John Hamilton, Lester M. Gillis, Thomas Leonard Carroll, Albert W. Reilly and a group photograph of the Karpis gang were exhibited to both Mrs. Schultz and Mrs. Randle and they informed after a careful study that none of those individuals had been observed in that vicinity.

Surveillance of the premises 1008 East Bancroft Street at intervals for a period of several days failed to develop any unusual activities at that address. It was observed however that a model 1927 or 1928 blue Buick sedan bearing 1934 Ohio plates C-28018 was parked in the side lot of that address. This car appears to be in very poor condition and it is doubtful if an extended trip could be made therein. A shock of the Automobile Detail, Police Department, Toledo, Ohio, by telephone resulted in information that the above described car was licensed on April 7, 1934, by Clyde Varnes, 1008 East Bancroft, and bore motor number 1636290, serial number 1595713.

No undeveloped lead is being set out for the Chicago Office to conduct further inquiries at Sault Ste. Marie in an effort to develop further information concerning the relatives of Mrs. Eleanor Kimble and John Hamilton, the same being left to the discretion of that office.



I talked with Mr. Clegg at St. Paul and advised him that Mr. Larson had been communicated with and he advised that he did not believe Pat Cherrington was aware of the fact the t she was being kept under surveillance; that in view of this information, he was directed not to conduct the reid at Detroit tonight for the purpose of taking her and Opell Long into custody, and that neither should be raid the place at St. Paul from which Pat Cherrington left, but that it should be kept under close observation and the telephone wires tapped until further OOPY FILED notice.

Mr. Clegg sovised that Pat Riley's wife had just been located and was now in the St. Paul Office; that efforts were being made to have her indicted at the time the Grand Jury in St. Paul was recalled for the purpose of indicting the money changers in the Bremer Kidnaping case. He stated that the prostitute of PataRiley, who had previously been arrested by the Police Department, had testified before the Grand Jury, and an indictment would be returned against Pat Riley on a charge of violating the White Slave Treffic Act; that they had also succeeded in locating and apprehending Bennett to whom the guns were shipped by Lebman at San Antonio some time ago; that the coroner's inquest was scheduled for tomorrow; that it had been given no publicity and that he and Mr. Henni would attend the inquest and read the prepared statement; that Bessie Green rould undouttedly plead guilty; that the Judge today decreased the bond of Dr. May and the nurse from \$50,000 to \$20,000.

Mr. Clegg advised that he would notify Mr. Purvis in Chicago that the raid in Detroit and St. Paul had been cancelled.

Under date of April 27, 1934, the San Francisco Office advised by telephone and telegraph that Colt .38 calibre super automatic pistol, serial No. 13583, shipped by Colt factory to Baker, Hamilton & Pacific Company, San Francisco, January 13, 1932, had been recovered at St. Paul following a gum battle with John Dillinger on March 31st. This office was further advised that the Baker, Hamilton & Pacific Company records show that this pistol No. 13583 was sold on May 2, 1932 to the Western Arms Company, Los Angeles, California, located in the San Fernando Building at Los Angeles.

In letter from the San Francisco Office, dated April 28, 1934, it was stated that the Western Arms Company was a partnership consisting of C. F., Walter and Victor A. Daniels, brothers located at 208 San Fernando Building, 406 South Main Street, Los Angeles.

Pursuant to instructions in your telegram to the San Francisco
Office to trace the gun through to the ultimate purchaser, an investigation
was made at the San Fernando Building, but it was learned that the management
of the building has changed within the past year, and the present management
has no records to show the history of previous tenants. The manager could give
no information as to the Western Arms Company, but suggested that one George
E. Borbo, a printer who had room 220 in the San Fernando Building, had been at
that address for two or three years and could probably give some information.

George R. Borbo advised that the Western Arms Company was located in room 208 for about sixty days only, and that one C. F. Deniels was the manager. He did not know of any other person connected with the company, and stated that Daniels had an extension to be attached to pistols which would enable a person to shoot it as a shotgun or rifle, and that he believed he received these extensions from some company in Germany. He stated that Daniels was not in the building longer than sixty days, and that he quietly folded up and left, and no one knew what became of him. He stated that Daniels came to him and wanted him to do some printing for him, and he understood that he did a mail order business.

It was learned that Miss Florance Chamberlain, 3815 DeLongpre Lessangeles, telephone Morningside 7418, was manager of the building in 1932. She stated that C. F. Daniels was in room 208 about sixty days, and that when he left, he stated he was going to the country. Later he called up and informed Miss Chamberlain that all mail of his should be returned to the sender, and that he was going to Seattle. She stated many inquiries were made for the man after he left, but she never heard any more concerning him, and has no information as to the nature of the business he was doing.

Investigation has been made at 6720 Franklin Place, Hollywood, California, in an effort to locate and interview the officials of the Monarch Arms and Manufacturing Corporation, pursuant to instructions in your letter of April 26th. It was learned that 6720 Franklin Place is the address of the La Habra Apartments. From Mrs. E. E. Kohler it was learned that the Monarch Arms and Manufacturing Corporation was owned by one Benjamin Lipton who, with his wife, had an apartment at that address in 1932. Mrs. Kohler was unable to state what kind of business Mr. Lipton was engaged in, and stated that he left the La Habra Apartments in December, 1932, leaving no forwarding address, and she has not seen him nor his wife since that time.

Mrs. Kohler stated that Lipton's wife was formerly employed at the First National Studios under the name of Simone Mass, but inquiry at the First National failed to elicit any information concerning her.

The 1935 Los Angeles city directory gives Benjamin Lipton's address as 6720 Franklin Place, but his name appears in no subsequent directory, and the Register of Voters for Los Angeles County does not contain his name.

The Portland Division Office is requested to locate and interview C. F. Daniels.

No information has been obtained as to Walter or Victor A. Daniels who are alleged to be brothers of C. F. Daniels, and associated with him.

Agent in Charge Purvis telephoned from Chicago shortly after nine o'clock this morning. He stated that they have kept Pat Cherrington under surveillance, and that she left Chicago last night for Detroit, where she will join Opal Long. After discussing the matter, I instructed Mr. Purvis to direct Agent in Charge Larson at Detroit to take Pat Cherrington into custody for questioning and then send her to St. Paul, where she will be charged with marboring a fugitive. I directed also that the persons with her be taken into custody for questioning, and suggested that this matter be handled without publicity, if possible.

I later talked to Mr. Nathan at Chicago, and discussed with him the matter of the letter received by John Dillinger's father relative to Dillinger's being in Ironwood, Michigan. Mr. Nathan said he had instructed that this information be given to the Sheriff. I stated that I felt this would be all right, but also suggested that one of our Agents proceed there to ascertain just what the situation is, and if there is anything to it, to see that it is covered thoroughly.

Mr. Clegg telephoned this afternoon from St. Paul concerning the taking into custody of Pat Cherrington and Opal Long. He stated that he didn't believe we had anything against Opal Long that we could prove, although we have some fairly tangible evidence against Pat Cherrington. Mr. Clegg stated that this morning he sent an Agent to Union Station in Minneapolis to ascertainwhether an identification might be made of Pat Cherrington as having been on the train at Minneapolis, and found that this was in fact the case. They have made a positive identification of the house from which she came yesterday morning at seven o'clock. Mr. Clegg suggested, since Mr. Larson doesn't plan to take these women into custody until tonight about 10:30, that probably there should be a coordination, either through Chicago or Washington, so that neither the girls in Detroit nor the occupants of the house in St. Paul will be "tipped off." Mr. Clegg stated he had no knowledge as to who the occupants of this house are; that it is in an undesirable neighborhood, about one block from one of the main streets; that it is a frame building, two stories and an attic. He is sending Agents out to keep this house under surveillance on all sides.

I told Mr. Clegg that Mr. Purvis informed me this morning that both he and Mr. Nathan were of the opinion that Pat Cherrington knew she was being kept under surveillance, and therefore suggested that she be taken into custody by Mr. Larson. Mr. Clegg stated that Mr. Larson was not in favor of taking her into custody yet. Mr. Larson advised Mr. Clegg that she arrived in Detroit of RECORDED

Upon my inquiry, Mr. Clegg stated there is a phone in the house in St. Paul, they having learned this when they telephoned from the house for a taxicab. I instructed that this phone be tapped and that the house be kept under constant observation. I told Mr. Clegg that I would talk to Mr. Larson before deciding what action to take with reference to these two houses, in Detroit and St. Paul.

I telephoned Agent in Charge Larson at Detroit to inquire as to his reasons for not wishing to take Pat Cherrington into custody at the present time. He stated that Opal Long met Pat Cherrington at the station, and instead of following them back to the address on 75 Windemere Street, he returned to this address and waited until their return. He felt certain they had no suspicions that they were being kept under surveillance. Mr. Larson called attention to the fact that on two other occasions these women have left there and contacted the gang. On the 24th or 25th of Larch, he stated, Opal Long left there for Chicago, staying at the Commonwealth Hotel, and the following day flew to St. Paul, meeting the gang there. Mr. Larson thought there would be a possiblity of their contacting the gang again within the next few days. I explained to Mr. Larson that I had because I understood Pat Cherrington was authorized the arrest tonight cognizant of the fact that she was under surveillance, but that on the other hand, if she was not cognizant of this fact, I agreed with his, Mr. Larson's, views that the arrest should not be made at this time. Mr. Larson stated that last night when he received the call from Chicago he called the Agents who are covering the house on Windemere Street and told them that in the event Opal Long should leave at 1:30 or 2:00 a.m. they should not follow her. Mr. Larson went to the station himself. Opal Long did leave the house at approximately 2:10 am. it taking her about an hour and a half to go to the station. Mr. Larson saw her meet Pat Cherrington and drive away in the car. Lir. Larson drove away in the opposite direction, and felt there was no reason why they should suspect that they were being followed. He doesn't believe that the occupants of the house know that they are under surveillance. At the present time there are five people in this house, namely, Opal Long; Pat Cherrington; Mrs. Pierce, who is a daughter of Mrs. Clark; Mr. Striken; and a little girl. Mr. Striken's wife usually occupies the house, but is in the hospital now.

Mr. Larson stated that a Mrs. Morton accompanied Opal Long to the station today, and on their return, evidently discussed Dillinger's location. In. Larson suggested that if the arrest were made tonight, he night be able

to track the Norton girl. Mr. Larson stated they had followed these people at intervals, believing that in this manner they would not become suspicious. I suggested the possibility, however, that a contact might be made during one of the times that they are not under surveillance. Mr. Larson is attempting to ascertain where these people are receiving mail, it being evident that Opal Long had received a message in some way as to the time of Pat Cherrington's arrival, it not having been delivered at the house.

I suggested to Mr. Larson that he maintain a closer surveillance of Opal Long and Pat Cherrington, even if they should become cognizant of the fact, since it is obvious that they will probably contact members of the Dillinger gang. He stated that he had talked with Inspector Collins of the Police Department, and is receiving excellent cooperation. Upon my inquiry, Mr. Larson suggested the advisability of also prolonging the raiding of the house in Minneapolis. I instructed Mr. Larson to postpone the raid on the house on Windenere Street, and to keep close surveillance on Opal Long and Pat Cherrington. I told him I would also instruct Mr. Clegg to postpone the raid on the house in Minneapolis, awaiting further developments.



The following longhand note was given to Inspector W. A. Rorer on the morning of April 23, 1934, by some unidentified person attitute Bohemia:

"Henry - You can go to Rhinelander and cell as planned.
Not one word to anyone about it. Tell them to line up
the highways. There will be more here tomorrow and
don't let anyone know where you are going or why. We
want to be protected by them as best as they can. Tell
them that."

Agent J. L. Madala exhibited the above note to Mrs. Manatka, and she identified same as the message she wrote on the morning of April 22, 1934. In this connection she advised that on Saturday afternoon, April 21, 1934, she and her husband, Emil, had a discussion about notifying the authorities of Billinger's appearance at Little Bohemia. They finally decided to direct a letter to Edward A. Fisher, Assistant United States Attorney, Chicago, with whom they were well acquainted, advising him of the above, and with the request that he relay this information to the proper authorities. She further stated that Buil wrote the letter, and that she left the lodge at 7:00 P.M. that night for the purpose of driving to Mercer, Misconsin to mail it. She advised that none of the gang attempted to stop her, and when she arrived at Manitowish, Wisconsin, which is only a few miles from Mercer, she picked up her brother Lloyd. LaPorte, at his home, and asked him to go with her. He accompanied her to Mercer where she deposited the aforementioned letter, and then Lloyd drove her, at her request, to her other brother's home, George LaPorte, at Manitowish, who was giving a birthday party for his son.

They arrived at George LaPorte's home at 8:00 P.M. and she immediately informed Henry Voss, who was there at the time, about Dillinger and his gang being at Little Bohemia. She stated that she was very much afraid, and was anxious to know what to do. According to Mrs. Wanatka, Henry Voss suggested that the police at Milwaukee, or the Federal authorities in Chicago, be immediately notified, as he thought that the sheriff's office here was incadeguately equipped to cope with that gang.

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In this connection they tentatively agreed to have Henry Voss drive to Rhinelander the next morning for the purpose of having him telephone some one in Chicago concerning Dillinger and his mob's appearance at Little Bohemia. This plan, of course, was pending the approval of Emilymantka.

Mrs. Wanatka went on to relate that on the following morning, April 22, 1934, she and Imil went over the situation, and it was agreed upon that the above plan be carried out. However, the next question was - how to get word to Henry Voss informing him to notify authorities as originally planned. Mrs. Wanatka stated that they dored not phone him at his home, for fear that their wires were tapped. They finally agreed to notify him by messenger, and in this connection Mrs. Wanatka wrote the above quoted letter and gave same together with a package of digarettes to Lloyd LaPorte, brother of Mrs. Wanatka, who was in the place at that time. All this transpired before the gang got up that morning, which she estimates to be around 7:50 A.M.

Mrs. Manatka continued that Lloyd delivered the message to Henry Voss without any difficulty; that she later heard that Mr. Voss had driven to Rhinelander, and there phoned Mr. Laubenheimer, in Chicago. She stated that she was very much afraid and nervous all that day, and towards late that afternoon she heard about the place that the mob was going to leave, immediately upon the arrival of Pat Reilly and Pat Cherrington from Minneapolis. She stated that the left the lodge at about 4:30 that afternoon, and proceeded to Voss's place, where she informed Mrs. Voss that the gang was leaving right after dinner that evening; that in view of Mrs. Voss being at Rhinelander waiting for the Federal authorities to arrive, she (Mrs. Voss) drove to Rhinelander to relay the above information to Mr. Voss.

The above mentioned longhand note written by Mrs. Wanatka and delivered to Henry Voss by Lloyd LaPorte, is being retained in the Chicago Division Office files.

Arent John L. Madala interviewed Lloyd LaPorte, Manitowish, Wisconsin on April 27, 1934, and furnished the following information. He stated that on Friday, April 20, 1934, he stopped at Little Bohenia at about two P.M. for a glass of beer; that he remained there for approximately 15 or 20 minutes, and then left; that as he was starting his car, he noticed a Ford V8 Sedan, bearing Minnesota license plates, stop at a point about ten feet to the right side of his car. LaPorte stated that he did not pay any particular attention to the car, as he thought it contained customers going to Little Bohemia, and as he was starting his car, the driver of the other car got out and asked, "Is this Emil's place?" LaPorte replied, "Yes", and drove away. As he was leaving, he noticed that there were three occupants in this car, including the driver, and further noticed that the first three numbers of the license plate were "216". Agent exhibited to Lloyd LaPorte numerous photographs of the Dillinger mob, and he positively identified the photo of Homer Van Meter as the likeness of the man with whom he talked. He was unable to identify the

other two occupants, giving the reason that he did not get a very good look at them. He stated, however, that one of the three was a woman.

LaForte continued that he did not visit Emil's place agein until early Sunday morning; that on Saturley night, April 21, 1934, at about 7:15 P.M. his sister, Mrs. Emil Manatha, drove to his house and asked him to accompany her to Mercer, misconsin to mail a letter; that as they were proceeding to Fercer, she told him that Billinger and his gang were at their place, and that she was sending a letter to some Federal official in Chicago, advising him to notify the proper authorities. LaPorte stated that upon their return they stopped at his brother's place, who was diving a birthday party for his son; that Mr. and Mrs. Yoss and other relatives were there when they arrived. He stated that Mrs. Wanatha immediately called Mr. Voss to one side and told him about Billinger's presence at Little Bohemia. LaPorte advised that he does not know the details of their conversation, but that after a while, he, Henry Voss, and Mrs. Manatha discussed the best possible method of notifying the euthorities; that in this connection, Henry Voss was afreid that Mrs. Wanatka's letter to Chicago would not be received in time, as the gang already had intimated to Emil that they were going to leave immediately upon the arrival of the other members of the gang (Pat Reilly and Pat Cherrington) from Minneapolis. LaPorte stated that Henry Voss suggested driving to Rhinelander that night for the purpose of calling Chicago or Milwaukee, but Mrs. Wanatka argued against that, as she wanted to confer with Emil first. They finally agreed to wait until morning; that is, until Mrs. Manatka talked with Emil, and it was arranged that Lloyd LaPorte should go to Little Bohemia early the next morning, get Emil's decision on the matter, and then relay the information to Henry Voss, who was to act in accordance with their plans.

LaPorte stated that on the following morning he asked his mother to accompany him to Little Bohemia in order to divert any suspicion which they might create because of their appearance there. He stated that they arrived at Boil's place at about 7:15 A.M., and that the man, who he identified as Homer Van Meter, was the only member of the gang seen about the premises; that while he, LaPorte, was in the kitchen, he observed through the window, Van Meter walk about the yard and look over LaPorte's car on the inside and outside. He further stated that neither Emil nor Mrs. Wanatka talked to him, as they were afraid that their actions might arouse somesuspicion. He stated that he remained there for about thirty minutes, when Mrs. Manatka deftly handed him a package of cigarettes, together with a note, and whispered to him that he should give the note to Henry Voss. LaPorte stated that he discreetly left the premises and drove to Voss's and turned the note over to him; that Voss read same and immediately asked his son, Lloyd Voss, and him, Lloyd LaPorte, to accompany him to Rhinelander; that when they arrived there, Henry Voss called Mr. Laubenheimer in Unicago, requesting him to notify the proper authorities of Dillinger and his mob's appearance at Little Bohemia. LaPorte

stated that he and Lloyd and Henry Voss remained at Rhinelander until the Agents arrived from Chicago and St. Paul in airplanes, and then proceeded with them to Little Bohemia.

Henry Voss, upon being interviewed by Agents M. C. Falkner and M. B. Rhodes, stated that he and his wife attended a birthday party about 9:00 P.M. April (29) 1934 at the home of his brother-in-law, George LaPorte; that Mrs. Amil Wanatka and Lloyd LaPorte were there also; that during the course of the party Mrs. Manatha told him the Dillinger gang was at their place and had been since Friday, April 20th, and that she had, on the evening of April 21st, mailed a letter to the Federal authorities, names not recalled, at Chicago giving information of the above fact; further, that hail had taken the license numbers of the men's cars and had given them to Mrs. Wanatka to give to him, Yoss. The above conversation took place in a bedroom at George LaPorte's home during the course of the party. George LePorte was not present but his brother Lloyd was. After learning the above, he, Voss, talked to George LaPorte. Voss could not recall that Ceorse LaTorte wanted to organize a posse. However, he, Voss, does remember that he told George that local citizens should do nothing in the matter until the arrival of the Federal officers inamuch as he had been reading in the paper that Agents of the Department of Justice were handling such cases and he thought that the local authorities should wait until they arrived on the scene and obtain the benefit of their experience in the matter.

Sometime around ten P.M., Sunday, April 22, 1934, Voss tried to get in touch with United States Marshal Laubenheimer, Chicago, by telephone and report the above news to him, but he was unsuccessful. He then was able to reach Mr. Laubenheimer's son, name not recalled, but who is in the real estate business in Chicago, on the telephone, and he reported the situation to him. Subsequent thereto he received a telephone call from Mr. Purvis at Chicago, advising that his Department was handling the Dillinger case and that he would be pleased to receive what information he had relative to Dillinger's presence in the vicinity; that he gave the information, related above, to Mr. Purvis. He was unable to state the approximate time that he talked to Mr. Purvis, but said it was shortly after he had reported the situation to Mr. Laubenheimer's son.

George LaForte, Manitowish, Misconsin, upon being interviewed by Agents Madala, Melvin and Rhodes, stated he is a brother-in-law of Emil Wanatka and Henry Voss of Manitowish; that sometime during Saturday morning, April 21, 1934, his sister, Mrs. Manatka, sent her son to his, LaPorte's Dlace with some clothes; that he, LaPorte, suspected from the above incident that something was wrong over at Emil's place, but thought nothing more of it in view of the fact that Emil and his sister do not get along well together and are constantly having family quarrels.

LaPorte stated that along about 9:00 P.M. Saturday, April 21, 1934, he gave a birthday party at his home for his son; that Mrs. Wanatka, his sister, Mrs. Henry Voss and her husband Henry, together with his brother Lloyd LaPorte were there; that Mrs. Manatka called Henry Voss and Lloyd Laforte into a belroom in his home during the course of the party and told them about Lillinger and his party being at their place; that Emil was not present at the above conference. George LaPorte was not present in the bedroom when Mrs. Manatka gave the above information, but subsequently learned of it from Henry Voss. In addition to the above, Mrs. Wanatka told Henry and Lloyd of the fact that she had just mailed a letter to the Federal authorities at Chicago reporting the above incident from Mercer. Misconsin.

George Leborte stated that when he learned of the above news from Henry Voss he favored the immediate organization of a possee of local citizens and proposed surrounding Amil's place at once and attacking the lodge from all sides. Henry Voss was against this procedure and said "wait until the Federal men get here". LaTorte stated that in view of the fact that Henry Voss has more influence in this community than he, he yielded to Henry's judgment and talked no more of organizing a posse.

George LaPorte denied that he had gone to Mercer, misconsin after receiving the above news to endeavor to organize a posse. He stated that Henry Voss was afraid if a local posse was organized at once and started shooting at the lodge, Emil and his help might be killed.

During the week of April 16, 1934, an individual called at this office representing himself to be Louis Piquett who had previously been Dillinger's lawyer at Crown Point, Indiana. He stated that he was now representing Evelyn Frechette. He asked permission to see his client, and at that particular time his client had not been brought from Chicago to St. Paul. I inquired as to the whereabouts of his client, and he did not know; whereupon I suggested that he find out before making his request as there was no action I could take under the circumstances. He later informed me that he conferred with the United States Marshal and he found that this woman had not yet been brought to St. Paul.

He also advised me that the Frechette woman had made statements to the press in Chicago to the effect that Dillinger had been with her at the time she was picked up in some "joint". I asked Mr. Piquett whether he had made that statement to the press himself, and he stated, "No. He had not, but that the Frechette woman had made the statements directly to correspondents and he thought that she did so in order to irritate Mr. Purvis." I told him that I was very glad to learn that this was not an indirect statement as, of course, am indirect statement of that sort made by Frechette would be considered as a matter of evidence, and Mr. Piquett blushingly made his departure, after which the daily papers carried the story of an interview with Piquett who claimed that he had been Dillinger's lawyer and had visited him in the Crown Point jail. He described Dillinger as something akin to a Sunday school boy, and one of the local papers ran a story quoting Piquett to this effect.

When Piquett was in my office, he was accompanied by the Calinvastor of the Jerome Hoffman, whom he desired to introduce to Frechette as 1991 4 1984 A Counsel.

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Mr. Piquett stated at that time that Dillinger was after all a lovable character who had been a Sunday school boy and who did not have a drop of murderous blood in his veins but that his one supreme joy and thrill was obtained while robbing a bank.

Subsequently, Mr. Piquett called at the office and asked permission to introduce Mr. Hoffman to the Frechette woman.

Piquett, incidentally, as the above facts would indicate, is a blustering sort of individual; and during his moments of garrulousness he stated that a strange circumstance had arisen as he had a check for \$50.00 made payable by the Federal Government to Frechette. Mr. Hanni made notes as to the check and the number and purpose for which the check was drawn, and informed Mr. Piquett that it appeared that this girl might be a ward of the Government, whereupon the Government must first approve of the counsel selected for her; and Mr. Piquett again became embarrassed. Telephonic communication with Washington and with the Agent in Charge of the reservation from which the Frechette woman came disclosed that she is a Government ward but has the right to select her personal counsel. Piquett was subsequently permitted to see Frechette, with Attorney Hoffman.

On Friday, April 27, 1934, Special Agent R. L. Nalls telephoned from Darlington, Wisconsin, and advised that he was in the office of County Attorney H. J. Beardsley, who had a message. Mr. Beardsley stated that Louis Piquett was under indictment in that county for violation of the State's Securities Act in that he had sold securities without a permit and that Piquett is now out on \$500000 bond, and that if it would be of any convenience to this office, he could decide that Mr. Piquett's bond was not a good one. I thanked Mr. Beardsley but no action has been taken in this regard because it appears that this fellow Piquett, although probably of unscrupulous character, is probably not such a good lawyer, so it might be to the Government's advantage to have him continue to represent Frechette. I thought, however, that the Division would be pleased to receive this information.

In connection with the statement of Rubert Dillinger, the substance 医有坏 化邻苯磺基甲基 医克德氏试验 of such statement is that John and Evelyn came into Mooresville about Thursday night, April 5, and were at the home of the father, John W. Dillinger, although subsequent statements of the others indicate a possibility that John actually was concealed at some other point with some member of the family or friend whom they are endeavoring to conceal and that possibly he was only actually at the house a short time on Friday, when they fixed up the car to make the trip to Leipsic, Ohio and again on Sunday, April 8, when the entire family assembled for a general visit before John left. On Friday, Hubert together with John left the house shortly after dark and proceeded to Leipsic, Chio, where Hubert wei ted on the outside and John went in to confer with the Pierpont family, betwee 11:30 and 12:00 o'clock, midnight, April 6, 1934 at the Pierpont home, Leipsic, Ohio; thereafter, they returned from Leipsic, Ohio and while proceeding on highway 31 ran into the car of Joe Manning and wife some distance south of Noblesville, wrecking the farmer's car and also wrecking their car by driving through a wire fence to a distance of about 100 yards into an open field. Thereafter, they took the machine gun out of the car, John tore off what are believed to be Tennessee license tags from the Hudson Sedan and after proceeding down the road, hid in a straw shed until Hubert could "bum" a ride into town, to obtain transportation to Indianapolis. Hubert claims that he obtained his own car for this purpose, however, on this same night, about the time of the wreck, the car of Dr. J. L. Reck was stolen at Sheridan, Indiana, which car was later returned, about two days following the wreck. Dr. Reck, it is known, has been in telephonic communication as of February 9, 1934 with John Eagan, Attorney, Dayton, Ohio who represented Dillinger at the time of his arrest at Dayton, September 26, 1933. Dr. Reck maintains he has no connection with the Dillinger outfit; that Eagan was arranging some legal matters for him in connection with another party.

On Saturday, at about 11:00 o'clock Hubert Dillinger, together with his wife and Evelyn Frechette arranged for the delivery of the Ford Sedan which was purchased for \$722.00 at Indianapolis, Indiana, the car being delivered later to Evelyn Frechette and the wife of Hubert Dillinger and was taken to the vicinity of Mooresville, where it was concealed in the garage of Jesse Richardson, a distant relative of the Dillinger family, and a worthless character and bootlegger.

On Sunday, there was an aeroplane practicing over the Dillinger home, April 8, 1934, this being a National Guard outfit and this plane caused John some apprehension, as he believed that the place was being watched; also Audrey Hancock apparently detected the car of Agents Donegan and Geraghty, the were covering this house and reported the actions to the other members of the family and thereafter Hubert Dillinger and Fred Hancock proceeded to Mooresville, where they obtained the Ford V-8 Sedan and during the time they

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were obtaining this car, the Agents were observed in following them and they eluded them sufficiently to get the car back to the Dillinger home; thereafter Hubert Dillinger with Rorman Hancock proceeded out of the Dilling farm in their car and were followed by Agents Donegan and Caraghty. Morman Hancock hid his face and gave the impression that he did not want to be seen. This car apparently was followed out of the place by the new Ford Car in which Dillinger was on the floor of the car with a machine gun; Evelyne Frechette was driving the car, Mary Hancock was sitting in the front seat and Alberta Hancock was sitting in the back seat, where John was on the

Following this car out, was the car of Emitt and Audrey Hancock and following their car was the car of Fred Hancock, apparently deliberative arranged to confuse the situation as to who was leaving.

A more detailed description of the movements of Dillinger is covered in the statement of Mary Hancock, who was in the car with him.

Embert Dillinger is 20 years of age, 5' 5"; gray eyes, medium dark blonde hair, weight 125 lbs. Norman Hancock, the nephew referred to has auburn or red hair, weight 130 lbs., height 5' 6", age 24. Norman indicated that the party referred to as Anne, had a scar over the right eye and pock marks on herface. Later, he advised that this party was also known to them as "Billie". The party who was seen along the road standing by the new Ford Sedan, about 1500' up highway 267 from the Dillinger home, was indicated by Hubert Dillinger, as possibly being John.

Fred Hancock, whose statement, in substance verifies the statement of Hubert, as to John Dillinger's being at the father's home at Mooresville, indicates that he first saw him on Saturday, April ? and again saw him Sunday, April 8, when the family made the maneuver previously outlined whereby they got him out of the house. He also refers to the fact that the seroplane worried John some, which was flying over the house on Saturday.

Fred Hancock indicates he was born, Indianapolis, Indiana, June 27, 1908. He is 5, 9, 181 lbs., brown hair. He has a tattoo of a horse whip and horse shoe combined, together with a fleur-de-lis and stars on the right forearm. He has dark chestnut hair tinged with red; small ears, sharp chin and wave, in hair. Fred indicated that from the conversation apparently John has in mind to get Pierpont out of the Chio State Penitentiary.

Both Hubert Dillinger and Fred Hancock, in view of the fact of the entire family for the harboring of John Dillinger, stated that they would arrange to turn John Dillinger in, should be appear here again in som possible injury, should be appear here again in som opinion that they are under continuous surveillance.

This arrangement was made with both of these parties, without the knowledge of the other. Both Hubert Dillinger and Fred Hancock agree to immediately advise us should subject Dillinger appear here again, however the truthfulness of these individuals and their real intentions in cooperating.

In connection with interviews of the above indicated parties, which are attached, they are set out in detail as given and all of this case.

Norman Hancock was the most difficult of any of the three men interviewed to get the facts from. However, it is believed that he is the most sincere of the three and he has very definitely agreed to arrange for us to apprehend John, with the idea in mind of helping his mother and family in any possible prosecution of them, and also to prevent their possibly being hurt when John is apprehended. He believes the entire family is under constant surveillance, at all times and in subsequent conversation with him he indicated a willingness to continue working with us, with the above understanding in mind and in fact, on April 25, 1934, he was taken to Mooresville and allowed to enter the house from the rear and contact his grandfather who has no one to help him at the present time and the grandfather, at that time, indicated to him that he expected John at any minute; that they were Very much worried over the recent incident in Wisconsin and Norman has agreed to go out to the place and help his grandfather repaint a fence and will go out there on Sunday, April 29, 1934 and continue at the place for several days and immediately John arrives at this place, at any time, day or night, he will go into Mooresville and contact the Agents, advising them of the fact that John is at the house, as well as to signal when he leaves the house, by a pre-arranged gode that John is then in the house. This party, it is believed, is doing this solely for the protection of his mother and father and his two sisters. Previously he was not aware that they had ridden out in the car with John, exposing them to the dangers of being killed, should an effort have been made to take John at that time, it being remembered that he left in the car with Hubert apparently at the time effort was made to draw the attention of the Agents to the pursuit of this car while the others left the house.

It has later been indicated by Norman Hancock that he has talked with his sister, Mary Hancock and she has expressed a willingness to help turn John in should be appear here again, as she has also been advised of the seriousness of the situation as concerns the family and their harboring of John Dillinger, under the conditions previously indicated.

April 23, 1934, Ruth Kamuff, wife of Alfred Kamuff, 1726 E. Illinois Street appeared in the office of United States Attorney Val Holan, Indianapolis, Indiana, accompanied by Irma Kingsford, amployed by the Western Union Telegraph Company, and indicated that she had information which possibly would be of value in connection with the apprehension of John Dillinger. She advised that she has a girl friend employed in the J & C Restaurant, 16th and Illinois Streets, a Greek Restaurant, this girl friend being Mrs. Joe Thompson, a waitress, and that this girl advised her that approximately three weeks ago John Dillinger, who is known to the people in this restaurant, walked in, took off his hat and asked if they had a wash room. Instead of going to the wash room, he went to the kitchen and came and looked out the back door and then came back into the restaurant, and Anne Martin came in and these people also knew her. John seld, "There did you park the car?" to which Anne Martin said she parked it in some alley, but the people did not get the name. They had dinner and went out and walked North. In Just a few minutes Anne came back in and got some cigarettes and looked in the telephone booth, to see if enyone was calling up; they then went out and went North on the street.

Mrs. Kamiff advises that Mrs. Virginia Whiteman, who conducts the rooming house at 1726 N. Illinois Street advised her when she moved in there that John Vinson of the Dillinger gang lived next door. That he had been there a good bit during the past week; that she asked this woman if she was going to advise the police as to John Vinson's being there and she seid "No", that she had two children. She advised that the police had asked her to keep a lookout for Vinson, and agree to advise them, but she would not agree to do this; that the police had been observing the car, from time to time parked in front of 1750. Mrs. Kanuff advised that there had been a car parked in the alley on the previous Saturday night and that a man went out the back door, but she could not see him sufficiently to recognize him, although he appeared to be what her idea of John Hamilton would be; that there is a couple, about 19 years of age, living in this place, who have a baby. Kanuffs have been living at this place for two weeks now, as of Saturday, April 28, and it was stated by Mrs. Whiteman that it was rumored John, when in the city, had had dinner, three weeks ago Sunday at the Vinson home; that it was reported he was taking care of Mrs. Vinson by furnishing her money.

Vinson, since his arrest, September, 1935 at Haines City, Fla., when the State of Indiana declined to supply the necessary funds to extradite him, has beenliving at Haines City, with a Mrs. L. M. Lawther, and a woman apparently services to this place and

Illinois, the home of Helen Vinson, mother of John Vinson, if it could be arranged so that the Agent would not be seen going and coming from this point, and on the date of April 23, 1934 it was arranged to have a telephone installed at this address, Agent C. E. Weeks being stationed here to observe these quarters at all times, for any possible visits of suspicious persons. Incidentally no developments have occurred from telephone conversations received.



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April 20, 1934 S.A.C. Purvis telephoned and advised that John Dillinger and John Hamilton, together with Pat Cherrington had been at Sault Sainte Marie, Tuesday night visiting with the Sister of Hamilton; that they had left behind, Ford V-8, Tennessee license 127,032, motor 8,157,244 that Hamilton claimed a severe injury to his shoulder; that Dillinger's hair is light blonde; that Pat was complaining of her appendicitis operation; two cars apparently with them. This information had been obtained through time.

April 19, 1934 Special Agent in Charge Purvis telephoned and advised that he had received a call from Mr. Tolson indicating that someone had written to the Governor of Chio in which he was threatened, if he did not turn loose the parties of the Dillinger gang held; that he, Mr. Purvis would call Special Agent H. D. Harris at Columbus, in order that he might contact the Governor as to this.

as to resuming work with the Pennsylvania R.R., having been laid off from such employment for about two years. A wire was sent, 4-28-34 to the washington Field Office, advising them of the location of Harry Baugh, in order that some check of his activities may be had at Perryville, Maryland.

April 24, 1934, Special Agent in Charge Larson, Mincie, Indiana advised that he had conferred with Mr. Cowley of the Division, and Special Agent in Charge Purvis of Chicago, and it was decided that it would be well for him, Larson, to return to Detroit. In connection with the matter he was covering at Muncie, it was decided that it would be well for Agent W. F. Wood to continue at Muncie, to obtain additional information; that the informant would remain at Luncie until, at least, the night following. As of April 28, 1934, Agent Wood has not, as yet, been able to contact this informant, and possibly he has already returned to Detroit, that is, the idea being that when he returns to Detroit, he will try to associate himself in some manner with the Clark femily here at 531 Chendler Street.

Informant advises that he knows John Vinson from having served time with him at Michigan City, Indiana, and also for reason that they were boys together around Indianapolis, Indiana, and he made a visit upon the mother of John Vinson, Helen Vinson, endeavoring to learn anything of what was going on here, also asking how he could get in touch with John Vinson and she advised him that if he gave her a letter, she would see that he got it. April 25, 1934, Mr. Cowley advised as to a reported condition in the Chicago papers of the previous night, to the effect that the Government had bungled the Dillinger case and had missed at least one-half dozen chances to capture or kill Dillinger. On the morning of April 26, 1934 I conferred with Mr. Al G. Feeney, who is known to ma, and he denied that he had made any such statement, and he also referred to the fact, which had also previously been noted by me that no such reference to any statements of his had been made in the Indianapolis papers. He advised that he knew of no instances wherein there had been a failure of cooperation as between the Government and State Police, although he did make reference to the fact that it was indicated that at times we apparently did not give the information to the local authorities in various matters, although accepting anything they had in the way of information, and I dissuaded his mind as to this, by advising him and calling attention to instances that we always called upon the local authorities or the State Police to assist us in such matters as conducting raids on places, calling his attention to the raids we made Sunday night,

April 8, 1934 in Indianapolis in cooperation with the Indianapolis Police, when we believed that Dillinger might be in some of the places raided at that time. The conclusion of the interview was very satisfactory, with Mr. Feeney, and it was believed that he would furnish us any assistance we would ask for, in fact he had previously arranged with Matt Leach, Chief of the Indiana State Police to furnish me with any men we might ask for, should we develop a situation where we needed them. This same arrangement had was previously made by me with Chief of Police, Michael J. Morrissey, Indianapolis, Indiana, who also extended to me the services of his Department and equipment, at any time we should call for such, this arrangement being made when I first arrived here and Agent J. S. Johnson, who had been here, prior to my arrival, had been in contact with both of these organizations in order that we might avail ourselves of their services when necessary.

April 26, 1934 Captain McMurtry, Indianapolis Police Department advised at 10:30 P.K., that the Associated Press had advised him that it had just been reported that Dillinger, Hamilton and Van Meter had been seen in South Bend and had headed Southwest out of South Bend on Highway 23, which goes towards Knox, Indiana and Bass Lake; that Hamilton was supposed to have a brother at 2209 Douglas Street, at Bass Lake, this latter, however, was apparently a confusion of the fact that the brother of Hamilton lives at 2209 S. Douglas St., South Bend, Indiana. This information was immediately telephoned to the Chicago Office.

This information was immediately telephoned to the Chicago office to Special Agent J. J. Waters, with the suggestion that this situation be suitably covered in the vicinity of Plymouth and that this information also be teletyped to the Division.

On the afternoon of April 28, in conversation with Mr. Cowley of the Division he advised that they had just received report from Chicago indicating that nothing had developed and suggested that I again call Mr. Nathan or Mr. Purvis of Chicago and advise them of the details of what this situation was. Telephonic communication was had with Mr. Nathan of the Division, at Chicago, Illinois and he was advised of the above information. He indicated that Mr. Waters had been checking this in the vicinity of Plymouth and that there was a roadhouse located in the vicinity of Plymouth, Indiana, in fact the only roadhouse so located there was vacant; that they hed examined same and apparently thereafter had also visited various other roadhouses in that vicinity without obtaining any results and it was suggested that possibly the representative of the Radio Commission, formerly located at Chicago, if still there, could use his direction finder, possibly locating these two stations and in this way eliminate them from further consideration, in view of the possibility that this might be only two amateur radio operators, operating in this manner, although it is realized occasionally bootlegging activities have used this means of communication.

On April 26, 1934 while Agents Smith and Sears were keeping the house of John W. Dillinger, father of subject Dillinger under surveillance it was noted that a Gardner Sedan, Michigan license V 4098 wontaining a single occupant, a man about 50 years of age, drove up the driveway to the rear door of the Dillinger home, honked his horn twice and immediately turned around and drove down the driveway. The car had entered the drive, coming in the direction of Mooresville and upon leaving the residence returned towards Mooresville. Agent Smith left immediately to contact Agents Barber and Whitten, who were keeping the home of Jesse Richardson under surveillance. While Agent Smith was gone, the car with Michigan license V 4098 drove passed the Dillinger homestead towards Plainfield, Indiana and when it passed the Dillinger homestead, this car slowed down and the occupant looked towards the house in an inquiring manner, Agents Smith and Sears, accompanied by Agents Barber and Whitten drove to Plainfield, Indiana and therelocated this car, parked in front of a Doctor's office, and across the street from the Public Library in Plainfield, Indiana. Agent Sears telephoned this information to Special Agent in Charge, E. J. Connelley, giving him the information as outlined above, who informed Agent to use our own judgment in ascertaining the connection between this car and the Dillinger family.

Agents Whitten and Barber stayed in the government-owned car, approximately 50° behind this car, bearing Michigan license V 4098. Agent Smith took a position opposite the corridor of the Doctor's office, while Agent Sears stationed himself at about 100° away, in the direction in which the car was pointing. Agent Sears noticed Agents Whitten and Barber leave the car and stop a man, who was about to enter the said automobile. This man, upon being questioned by the four Agents, gave the following information:

That, his name was S. W. Tench, address, Lawton, Michigan; that, he is a book salesman for the Beckley Cardy Company, 17 E. 23rd St., Chicago, Illinois. He informed Agents that his reason for driving up the drive of the Dillinger home was out of morbid curiosity, to see the home of the notorious outlaw, John Dillinger. He stated that while he was calling on Miss Stone, Librarian at Mooresville, Indians, she informed him that the home of John Dillinger was located just outside of town and suggested that he stop in and take a look at it. He stated that he then drove back to Mooresville, after looking at the home, to pick up his samples, which he? had left with Miss Stone, and that he then left Mooresville, Indiens, and proceeded to call on the librarian at Plainfield, Indiana. Agent Sears contacted Miss Jones at the library at Plainfield, Indiana, who stated that Mr. Tench, who was with the Agent at the time, had just left the library and that the purpose of his visit was an attempt to sell her a line of children's books. Agent contacted Miss Helen Stone, Librarian at Mooresville, Indiana over the telephone and asked her if she knew Mr. Tench, and she stated that she told Mr. Tench that John Dillinger's home was just outside of town and suggested that he drive by and take a look at it.

Mr. Tench was extremely nervous for a moment or two, while being interviewed, but calmed himself, and after Agents had verified his story stated that it was simply out of morbid curiosity that he had stopped and he realized that the Agents were doing their duty and that he was glad to see that the Department of Justice Agents were conducting this investigation in an efficient manner.

ipproximately at the same time that Mr. Tench drove up the driveway of the Dillinger home and honked his horn twice, it was observed that a party was coming across the fields from a creek, which is about one-half mile from the Dillinger homestead, to the south, and was proceeding towards the Dillinger home. He walked to the front of the house, and then down the highway, 267, to the East, towards Pleinfield. After walking about one-quarter mile, it was observed that a car was travelling from a southerly direction, along the old county road, which is about one-half mile from the Dillinger home and proceeded to turn on to 267 in a westerly direction. This car stopped and picked up this party, who was coming across the field. It was ascertained that the reason for the suspicious circumstances of these two parties was due to the fact that they were dynamiting fish in the creek to the south of the Dillinger home, which is, in itself, a penal offense and to the south of the Dillinger home, which is, in itself, a penal offense and

consequently were cautious of their movements. The proximity of their movements and the movements of Mr. Tench added further to the suspicions of Mr. Tench's car, Michigan license plates V 4098.

Hencock, the oldest sister of John Dillinger, as indicated heretofore in the body of this report, has agreed to advise us should John Dillinger appear here or if he should learn of the location of John Dillinger. Morman lives at the home of his mother and father, Andrey and Emitt Hancock at Maywood, Indiana and on Sunday, April 29, 1934 as per understanding with us, he went out to help his grandfather, John W. Dillinger at Mooresville, at which place, due to the making of a new road in front of the place, it has been necessary to rebuild the fence and Norman was to help on this and also to help the old man out on the farm inasmuch as he is not working at the present and also for the purpose of carrying out his indicated promise to us to try to get the location of John Dillinger,

The home of John W. Dillinger, as previously indicated, has been under twenty-four hour surveillance, and at the present time, we have arrangement whereby the agents conceal themselves in the barn of the farm across the road from the Senior Dillinger farm and from which point they have a good observation of the entire house and farm.

The understanding with Norman Hancock was that should John appear at the house at any time or get into the house in any way, Norman was to walk into town from the home and wipe his face with his handkerchief, which would say that John was then in the house; also, this would give the Agent who picked him up a chance to see just what the situation was at the house. Norman is still at the senior's farm.

On this date, April 30, 1934 at 2:10 P.M. Norman gave a signal from the front porch which was not thoroughly understood, inasmuch as he wiped his face several times and also signaled with his handkerchief in front of him, so as to avoid any one at the house seeing him, and immediately the Senior Dillinger came out and they walked up the road with the team and a drag to set some fence posts, about one quarter mile from the house.

When this information was received all men were immediately sent to that point and took posts as previously outlined to them, to prevent anyone from leaving the house and still not be seen from the house; also, arrangements were made with Chief of Police Morrissey to have several squade immediately proceed to that vicinity with cars to block all roads and myself and Agent Geraghty contacted the men at their posts and learned the details of all developments, since the call had been received. With the place covered in this manner and without the knowledge of the occupants of the house

we arove up along road 267 and picked up Norman and the Senior Dillinger and without disclosing our particular recognition of Norman, we questioned have separately and learned that what Norman had in mind was to attract anyons who knew him from our office, who might be in the vicinity, he not knowing of our spot for watching this place, in order to get to us at the earliest possible time the information he had without arousing the suspicions of the Senior Dillinger.

Norman advised that on this morning, a letter had been received, addressed to the Senior Dillinger from Ironwood, Michigan, which, in substance, said that John was hiding out at Ironwood, Michigan; that he was all right (or possibly the vicinity of Ironwood); that he would be there for sometime unless the Federals got too hot and signed "A Friend". Norman says that apparently the Semior Dillinger believed this was from some one in contact with John. Norman tried to get the letter to show to us, but could not, without taking a chance of the Senior Dillinger noting his interest in the same. Norman says that he will continue to observe any and all indications as to the location of John. It is believed that he is sincere and wished to get this information to us at the earliest possible time in order to prove his sincerity.

Immediately the situation was learned as indicated, all men were withdrawn from the vicinity, except our men who have the posts for observation and which latter was a check against Norman telling anything other than the truth. The Senior Dillinger and Norman had opportunity to observe only the two of us, Geraghty and myself. However, the papers later in the evening, having learned from someone that the roads had been blocked for a short time, published item to the effect that the home of and barms of John W. Dillinger had been raided and searched, which, of course, was not a fact and only conjecture on their part. The contact and set up in the vicinity was hendled through the country without going into Mooresville, and did not take much more than one half-hour when all activity was withdrawn.

The information as to Ironwood was immediately telephoned to the Chicago office upon return to the hotel here at Indianapolis; also information recently learned that possibly Pearl Elliott might be at 614 Cherry Street, Marion, Indiana.

The information was also telephoned to the Division to Mr. Moore and later to Mr. Pennington at the Washington Field Office, in order that the Division would be advised should any inquiry be made, based upon the story which appeared here, the newspapers not being familiar with our activity here.

INTERVIEW HAD IN THE FEDERAL BUILDING, INDIANAPOLIS, Indiana, April 11, 1934, with Embert Dillinger, R.R. #8, Box #394, Indianapolis, Indiana, in the presence of Agents T. J. Donegan and J. L. Gereghty:

Embert Dillinger was interviewed at this time by Special Agent in Charge, E. J. Connelley and indicated that he had been born at Indianapolis, Indiana, May 16, 1913; that he attended High School at Indianapolis; that he is the half-brother of John Dillinger, John Dillinger being the son of the first wife of John W. Dillinger. There are living at the home of John W. Dillinger, the father of subject Dillinger, two children by John W. Dillinger's second wife, Doris, age 15 and Frances, age 11. He advised that Andrey Hancock, is the oldest sister of subject Dillinger, being probably 45 years of age; that she is married to Emitt Hancock and they have the following children:

Morman Hancock, age \$1, Fred Hancock, married and living at 409 M. LaSalle Street, Indianapolis, Indiana; Mary Hancock, age 17, Alberta Hancock, age 13, and Thelma, Johnny and Emma Earl, younger children than the above. Emitt Hancock is employed by a bakery, driving a truck, the Hancock family living at Maywood, about five miles from Indianapolis, Indiana.

Hubert indicated that Morman Hancock had recently been arrested for failure to pay alimony for his wife and small daughter, the wife living in Mars Hill, which is in the immediate vicinity of where Hubert lives. He advised John was first sentenced to the Pendleton Reformatory and later changed to Michigan City Penitentiary and paroled. He violated his parole and was arrested at Dayton, Chio in September, 1935, but was not brought back to Indiana being taken to Lima, Chio. He advises that the automobile which Attorney John Eagan, Dayton, Chio obtained at the time of the arrest was turned over to him.

While John was still being held at Dayton, Ohie, this automobile was turned over to him; that he visited John in Lima, Chie, twice, approximately two weeks before he got out and a third, a few days before his escape. On his last visit to Lima to see John, they would not allow him to see him. He denies that he knew that any arrangements were being made to effect the escape of John from Lima, Ohio.

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Embert advises that the only suit he saw John wearing was a light gray suit, possibly summer weight, and a light hat; that he had his left leg bandaged; that he did not have a dector book at it while he was here at Indianapolis; that on Thursday might, April 5, he, driving the Hudson car of John, arrived, together with John at Leipsic, Ohio between 11:00 and 12:00 midnight and visited the home of Lens Plerpont; that he, Habert, did not go into the house, sitting out in front in the ear; that they had left from his father's home to go to this place. Hubert advises Evelyn and John came down to the grandfather's place on Thursday night a week ago; they were driving the Hudson car and "the family called her Anne. Apparently she was not shot in any way. I believe they had one grip; they stayed here until Sunday afternoon and then left. I left the house just before he did and I was the first one to leave. This was probably 5:00 P.M. on Saturday. I went with Anne to buy a car, however, Anne and my wife went down to the place when the car was delivered, in order that my wife could show her the way out of town. She left my wife out of the car on Kerr Street (this is the address where Hubert and his wife live in Mare Hilly. She took the car down to her father's place. They had the car in a private garage across from the ball park.

"On Sunday, April 8, at my father's place, there were myself, Hubert, Ame, John, Fred Hancock and his wife, Morman Hancock, Smitt Hancock, Andrey Hancock, Mary and Alberta Hancock. They did not have the younger children with them (referring to the Hancock family). When we drove out of the place, John and Anne were at the end, together with the two young girls, Mary and Alberta. I believe Mary and Alberta got out of the car at Maywood. I was not there. I left the house and did not see him after he left the house as I went over to Mary's (meaning Mary Kinder) and told them to meet him, advising that they should go down Holt Road to the Avanue, turn right as far as you can go, turn left as far as the pavement goes, turn right on that road and they would pick him up there. When I went to Mary Kinders there was at this place, Mr. and Mrs. Pierpont, Mary Kinder and Margaret Behrens and their mother, an elderly lady. I do not know Earl Mordern and the other Mordern boys. The party who was in the ear with me and who hid his face was Horman Hancock. I was taking him to Andreys in Maywood and this was when these fellows followed me. 37 200 feld

I took Horman out to Fred's to get his clothes; then I took him back to his house. I do not know that he connected up with John. I never saw Horman or John after this. I saw Morman yesterday. He same out to the station where I work. He came on the bus. He did not say what he was doing. I can not find him. I believe he said he had been in Chicage. He did not say why he was there. He said he rode the bus back from Chicage. He did not say anything about going up there with John. He told me before he was going to Detroit to get work. When he came back he said he had been to Chicage.

De did not say whether he had been to Detroit. He said he rode the bus back from Chicago.

"When we got to Leipsie, Chie, about 11:00 Pake, Friday might, we stayed there possibly fifteen minutes, then came back from Leipsic, Chie and between 5:00 or 4:00 A.M. we eracked into this car on the road. We were not hurt. It was dark. We both followed the road and got in the fields when cars passed. He had the machine gun wrapped in a blanket. It had the round thing like a film box on it. He took the machine gun with him when he left. I did not see any others besides this one gun. We did not walk all the way and when it got day light I got a ride and came on down and got my car and went out there and picked him up. We then went back to my father's place. Thursday is the day he come in but I did not see him until Friday mornings I did not know he was there until I went down home, as I understood he went to Chicago. I did not know where he was when he was picked up in Tucson. The first I knew was when a fellow came into the station with an extra. We have no relatives out around Tucson and Johns never said what he was doing out there at this time. When I visited him at Grown Point, he said that they went there to rest and that he had no idea they would be bothered. He never mentioned going back there to get his money which is there. I asked him if I could get one of the cars and he said, 'no', that the attorney had them. He never said anything about renting a plane. I went to Dayton, this in a plane to see him. McGinnis went with me. I believe he was associated with some detective organization. I heard this later. John sent me a telegram asking me to some to Dayton, Ohio and McGinnis just pushed himself in, to go along. McGinnis did not try to see John. We flew back from Dayton, on the same afternoon. I have never seen McGinnis since this time. John never said who he was. I told John he came over with me, but he did not say anythings and in the safe of the safe of

I have often wondered what she was. I don't think anyone knew he was here. I believe he wanted to rest a few days. Medid not leave the place, except on this trip to Leipsic, Ohio. He kept the Hudson on the farm. He got in Thursday might. The State Police were not around at any time, at least we did not see them. Mobody came around except one man who was parked on the road and walked up and just before we left, he walked up and talked to Dad and he did not see John. Someone said he was a Road Commissioner. She is married again; her maiden name was Hovias or something similar.

"I stayed at home on Sunday might on Kerr St., and my wife and I went to Dad's place, possibly 10:30 A.M. Sunday morning. It took us about 52 or 4 hours to get to Leipsie and we left for the return trip on Friday might, April 6, between 11:30 and 12:00 to some back.

"Father's place has six rooms. John did not go out of the house, except when he went with me to go to Leipsie, we leaving about 8:00 P.M. on Friday. He did not say anything about the whip and rope which was found in the ear. After the wreak on Saturday morning about 5:00 A.M., we walked about three miles this side of the wreck and John hid in the straw shed right close to the road where I found him when I same back. I got a ride in on a freight truck and a party on the truck asked me if I had seen the wreck, which was about three miles back. The party who was hit came over to the car and he talked with myself and John. Both of us went out into the field, When a ear came we would go over to the field. I caught the ride on a freight truck. Then I got back John only ragged me about precking the car. "John has a very slight limp in the left leg. John took the tags off the car after the wreck and I do not know what he did with them."

John had given me information as to how I could reach him and I was to take Mary there, and the above changed the plans, the Pierponts accompanying her and they said I would not have to go. I expected they would some back and get me. They said to leave the car and they would drop me off. The four of us were in the car of the Pierponts. I don't know where they, Anne and John were in the place when they started shooting and I said, 'I thought there was two fellows and a woman' and he said, 'No. ' He did not say where he had hidden while in Chicago. When I walked into my father's house on Sunday he poked his head out and said 'Stick 'em up' pointing his finger at me. He said 'You got your old clothes on' and he asked me to go out and change the wheels on his care. He went with me then and he took the wheels off and washed them and he painted them black and last he went over them again with another coat. He then painted the yellow stripe black, with Duce and he eaked if I wanted to drive over to Ohio. I just drove him over there to see Fred Pierpont. During the trip over he said 'I just got one chance out of a hundred; 'the gates were unlocked and that he locked up part of the guards and they called some of the others and he locked them up until he had them all locked up and I believe he said the

'Jigg' was standing behind him with a club; they got the guns and he went the garage and there were no keys and he could not find them; then he went to the other garage and asked which was the fastest ear and they pointed to the Sheriffs car and I believe he said one of the two drove and he and the 'Jigg'were in the back. I believe 'Bunk' drove. He said he left the 'Jigg' cut and game him all he had, \$50.00 or \$60.00 in Chicago, which was all he had, to give him; that he wished he had had more to give him; I asked him if he didn't think the 'Jigg' was a 4--- foel to go up there blewing off about John and he said 'You know how a migger is'.

When John got to Chicago he tried to locate Anne in a place run by a fellow malled John, and the fellow was leary of him and he said, 'Get in touch with her and tell her John is here' and this party went and called Anne. John said some detective followed him twice while he had the Sheriff's car, and he gave him the slip both times. He said he and Anne were up there. Nothing else was said on this trip to Leipsie, Ohio, except he complained of my driving. Yesterday when I saw Morman for a short time in the filling station, he said he had driven John up there to Chicago. He said Sunday, April 8 he was going to Detroit to work, or rather to look for work and John said 'When are you going' and he said the next day, and John said 'If you want to go with me tonight, I will take you as far as Chicage'.

"Later when Morman talked to me he said that he want to John and drove the car into South Chicago about midnight, they having left here about 7:45 P.M., and getting into South Chicago little after midnight. In the conversation as to this en Sunday, John said that Morman could go on to Detroit to look for work or come back home. Morman told me when they arrived in Chicago he went en in a cab and stayed at the hotel and the next day came back to Indianapolis in a bus. Horman, at this time, did not say anything about going with John and advised the reason he returned was he guessed he could not find any work and decided to come back.

"This afternoon Fred told me he had talked with Morman and that Morman had gone to a fortune teller yesterday and she told Morman he would run into a certain party who would drive him to Tucson where there was a lot of money hidden and he would get himself a let of money and set himself up in business and he would regain his health; that when he came back he would have a law suit with his wife and he would marry the girl he was living with, this being the girl living between Valley Mills, and Indianapolis, known as Gertrudee

"I did not see John take care of his leg, but I believe he had some medicine with him and I believe he carries bandages for his lege. He said on Sunday that he was going back to Chicago to bry and find "Red".

"Red" was not with them in St. Paul. At St. Paul he and Anne were upstairs and enother fellow was downstairs; the fellow downstairs was coming back to the room and ran into the detective downstairs. John said he had sprayed the door with machine gun bullets. He did not say how many shots he fired. He only had a machine gun with him. I saw the machine gun before he got in the car, but can not say whether he had another gun. There was no other man out there unless they came between the time I left and the time John left. John's car on Saturday night was parked in a garage by the picnic grounds on South Street. I don't think the man knew the car was there. John carried tags that were blue plates. I believe they were Tennessee. The title for the car was left in the Apartment in St. Paul, at least that is what John teld me. This was the title for the Rudson. I believe that Horman fixed it up with Fred not to let me know where John is.

"In connection with the trip to Leipsic, Ohio John slept practically all the way back and I drove and fell asleep, resulting in the wreak."

INTERVIEW HAD AT INDIANAPOLIS, INDIANA, April 18, 1954 with FRED HANGOGE, 409 M. LaSalle Street, Indianapolis, Indiana, in the presence of Agents Donogan and Geraghty. This interview Was had in the Federal Building, Indianapolis, Indiana on the evening of this date.

Fred Hancock, upon interview, edvices that Horman Hancock had visited with a friend, Charles Martin, living in a suburb of Tulsa, Oklahome, Eartin being employed by the Mid-Continent Refining Company; that Norman was out there about a month ago and was sick in bed for about four weeks; that he possibly has some lung trouble; that this party Martin is not asquainted with John Dillinger; that Morman recently refunded home; that John fernarly lived at home and was in fact practically reared by the mother of Fred Managak and he advised that the woman at the house with John was Billie and that Embert also called her Billie and he did not understand why he referred to her as Anne.

Fred Hancock continued by stating, "Sunday, schebody came to in order to see Granded, a fellow in a light suit. John sew this man and immediately grabbed his machine gun from the lounge whore he was lying with the gun under a blanket and ren upstairs with the gun. Somebody called Hubert and then Habert and I went to Mooresville in order to get the car somewhere. My two cisters, Mary, 18 and Alberta, 36, more in the our with John and Millio John being in the back seat covered up. He probably had the gin as he was suspicious. There was no other fellows there. I never sew John after he laft. I heard no conversation which Horman had with John. I do not know if Horman was in Chicago. I know he came back on a bus. He said he just came in ona base Bornen was back by the Station on Tuesday. The first I know John was here was on Saturday he was in the house and talked with me. I walked in and shook hands with him and asked how he was and I know Mother wented to talk with him and I walked out in the yeard. I got out there after \$100 Palls and there was myself, Andrey Hancock, my mether, Buitt Hancock, my father and John W. Dillinger, the father of John Dillinger. John was in the house as I left before bed time. He was reading the papers for two weeks back and he laughed. He did not mention how he get back to towns

Some fellow same in Aziving a Chevrelet, who had been in two weeks before and he said he had a good job at the Worlds Fair, before he get conght. The previous summer he come into the Station by himself and had a Terraplane Seden. I serviced his ear and he said he had COPIES DESTROYED

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He left the station about 9:20 P.M., and the next morning I heard where he had been caught in Dayton, Ohio. (This would be September 26, 1935). The next day two cars came in. This one car I had seen the day before and there was a woman in it, probably a foreigner or Indian. Later I saw pictures of Pierpont Hamilton, Clark and these were the parties who came back the next day; at the time they called at the station I asked Hubert who they were and he would not tell me. The fellow who was driving the Chevrolet car on this occasion looked like a gorilla. He was about 60, short, heavy set, dark face, not much hair, gray-blue eyes. He did not say enything too much. We put on new Goodrich Tires on the Chevrolet Coupe. This was the Chevrolet Coupe which Hubert is now driving. They went to Dayton, Chic. This was possibly the following day or the second day after John had been caught. Hubert and the girl went with them, and they parked outside of town and some of them went into see John. Hubert drove one ear and the other fellow got in one of the other . cars. I can not say for sure that Hubert drove a Chevrolet. He was back that evening to Indianapolis. The next I saw John Dillinger was a week before Christmas he came in in a Terraplane Coupe, There was a man with him, but I do not know who he was. I did not see this other party. They came up to the house at about 11:30 P.M., while Hubert was living with me. He wished us all a Merry Christmas and I believe he had some Christmas presents for some of the kids. He stayed only about five minutes and he then went on. The next time I saw him was last Saturday. (This would be April 7, 1954).

"This was about 2:30 in the afternoon. He was lying on the couch with a blanket over him and when he got up and went to another part of the house he took the gun with him, which was under the blanket. He changed clothes and at this time there was an aeroplane flying over the house; they were flying low and up and down. I left before they went to bed. He did not say anything about St. Paul. He was limping but did not say anything. You could notice this limp. Billie had a dark dress on and she said this was the only dress she salvaged out of the Tucson, Arizona incident. Her face was kind of rough. I believe; there is some kind of a scar on her face, that is, on Billie's face. I saw her here about March 18, 1934. Mary told me last night that she asked them where they were going and they said 'If I don't tell you, you wont have to tell the dicks'. I believe that John has faith in me, but I don't know where he went and he did not tell me.

just finished dinner, because I was too late for it. I heard practically nothing of the discussion. I was there possibly two hours until the time they went down to the house. I was only in the house a few minutes and went out in the yard and was flying a kite. John had on a blue suit. There were also present, John W. Dillinger, myself, Fred Hancock, Norman Hancock, Hubert Dillinger and his wife, Mary and Alberta Hancock, John Dillinger and Billie and also Audrey and Emitt, my mother and father. When they left, Billie was driving and they headed towards Mooresville, Indiana. I was the last party out of the place in the evening. About 4:00 or 5:00 P.M. they asked us to

go down and get the care. I went to Mooresville to get the car with Hubert. I left Hubert out on a side street and I drove down in the Chevrolet to a dide street where I was told to wait and a new Ford V-8 passed me and I trailed it and went out to the County Line Road and turned around on the road.

"I saw you when you were at the School house. I saw the Ford on top of the
hill at the school house. This was the first mention made of your ear. My
idea was to see what was following me. Hubert drove by the house and turned

car, Billie was driving, Mary in the front seat, Alberta in the back seat and
John was in the back seat on the floor, but I did not see or ask where he was
and they said he was in the care.

gave him the rap, which started him on this. John was charged with accompanying him when he hit a grocer over the head and John plead guilty on this charge. John asked his father what to do and his father told him to tell the truth and when John plead guilty he was sentenced and given 10 to 21 years. He served ly years at Pendleton and then got in bad at the place. He still feels Singleton is the reason for his trouble, possibly that is the reason he came down here. STATEMENT OF NORMAN HOWARD HANCOCK, MADE IN THE LAW LIBRARY, FEDERAL MULLDING, INDIANA, IN the presence of Agents Sears and Weeks:

"On Sunday, April 8, 1934, I was here at Indianapolis, Indiana, and had been sleeping at the home of Ralph Moore, living on Centennial St., mear Tenth. I rode the bus out to my girl's house, Gertrude Altman, where my mother and two misters picked me up and took me out to Grandfather's house. we arriving there Sunday, April 8, 1954, about 10:50 A.M., and there was also at the place at that time, John Dillinger, and a woman with him, known as Milie. This was the first time I had seen John since December, 1955. The general conversation was about me, as to when I was down in Texas and Galehoma. I having stopped in Oklahoma with a fellow who formerly lived in Maywood, Charles Martin, who lives at 4615 S. 30th Ave., West, Talsa, Sklahoma, and I was there for four or five weeks, to the last of March, when I returned home. arriving April 1, 1934. I had also been to Houston and Calveston. I was in Galveston only one day to see the sights and then went to Houston and stopped with a great-cant, Mrs. Ous Timernen, 627 Courtland St., Houston, Toxado I was here possibly for a week, going over to Calveston for one day and then proceeded to Tales, Oklahoms, where I became ill of malaria fever and the fine I do not believe my mother and father ever see this relative, she being & relative on my father's side and I had obtained the address from an east here in Indianapolis before I started down there. Then John left grandfather's house on Sunday, April 8, 1954, I was not there. I had been gone some time, but probably not so very ling. Nothing was said as to their leaving as the auto was not there when I left. Hubert took me to Maywood, this being after we had dinner together. I left about 5:30 to 6:00 in the evening. I met my ex-wife up town and I figured the first thing Monday morning they would be out there looking for me at the place of my mother and that is the reason I left Sunday night. Judge Gockler teld me the next time I was in, he would send me over the road. I went to 52 Highway and met a fellow in a Plymouth Coups, who is a salesman and as I rode with him a couple of times before, I rode in with him to Chicago and he took me to the bus station, Twelfth and Wabash, where I bought a ticket intending to go to Detroit from the Union has Station. I do not know why I did not go. I believe I would have had to wait for the bus until sometime in the morning. I got on the bus and role to 65rd and Stoney Island Ave., and there is a drugstore on the corner and a bus station is next to it. I stopped at a hetel about four or five squares up from the placembers the elevated runs into town. I paid \$1.00 for my room. I had a buit

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case with me. I left there the next day at 6:25 P.M. on the bus to Indianapolis I turned in my ticket to Detroit and got \$1.35 difference and secured a ticket to Indianapolis. I got into Indianapolis at 7:83 P.M., on Monday night. I stayed with my boy friend, Ralph Moore. I had about \$14.00 when I started out. I stayed three or four nights with Ralph, possibly I stayed with him Tuesday night but I am not sure. Since then I have stayed at home most of the time. Part of the time I have been riding on the trucks to Chicago, I rode with Weimer Pearson, who works for Harold York. I went to Louisville on Thursday night on a bus, a Buick Sedan and got out at the Union Bus Station and stayed one night at the Y.M.C.A., under the name of Norman Hancock. I came back on the Indiana Traction; got in about 3:30 P.M. I then rode the truck into Chicago leaving here about 2:00 or 2:50 A.M., April 14, having met these parties the night before at 8:00 P.M. We got into Chicago around 10:00 A.M., where Pearson rented a room by the week on State Street, close to the loading dock. Borented this with Forrest Pepper, who is driving with him on a freight truck. We left there 8:15 P.M. Saturday on two trucks belonging to Tork, Pearson and I on one truck and Pepper on the other truck. We arrived at Cottage Grove, outside of Lafayette about 6:00 A.M. Sunday and got into Indianapolis at 9:00 or 9:30 A.M. when I went home. I had no idea of going to Tucson. The idea of Tucson I got from a fortune teller. She said I would catch a ride but I should not go in a dark blue Coups. This fortune teller lives on Blaine Ave. My sister has been going to her for readings, She told me that the Police would send me to prison but that I would not have to serve my terme المناه المحتصر بهوا المناهج فالأ

and we turned at the top of Harmon Hill and this fellow turned the other way and then came back and I went down to my mother's. This was en Sunday, April 8, 1954. Hubert then put his car in the garage of Dad and Mother and went up to West Indianapolis. Hubert then took me out in his Chevrolet to Fred's. This car went by when we were standing in front of my mother's place in Maywood and then went down to the corner and turned around and came back past the place. I saw John at grandfather's house on Sunday and I believe he would get in touch with us if he comes back in town. I am certain he would get in touch with my mother, Andrey, and also that he would get in touch with his father.

CONTINUED STATEMENT OF HORMAN HARCOCK, as of April 23, 1954 at 1:00 P.M., in the presence of Agents Johnson and Seare:

what happened, Sunday, April 8, 1934 at the home of my grandfather, John W. Dillinger, Mooresville, Indiana. When I left, my father; allubert and myself left in Hubert's Chevrolet Coupe and at that time I had not seen the new Ford V-8 Sedan. It was not at the house. We drove to Highway 67 and I got out of the car. I had an arrangement to meet John as he wished to go to Detroit the next day and John said that I could ride to Chicago with him and later? changed and said he might go to Detroit with me. I said, all right. I bonly been at my girl's house about one hour when Hubert honked his hore

I was going to leave and I went with Hubert in his car and he kept watching and he said There is some car that is following me. He said that he had seen the car somewhere before. Hubert said, 'I am going to find out' and he turned right and there was a gate there into the field. He pulled in and turned around and started back up the hill and whoever it was following we passed us in the automobile and he said 'Hy - - - they are following me' and then I ducked my head. I realize this was foolish, but do not know thy. We speeded up to 55 miles per hour on 67 and headed towards Indianapolis. We came to the grave-yard right at a standard filling station, where they have used cars and turned left and same to the first pavement, which is Lafayette Butlevard and started into Maywood near to my home and Hubert said Will my car go into your Dad's garage?' We went into the back and same out the front and talked to my brother, Fred.

The saw you go past and then you came back past and then my Dad pulled up and got out and my Mother and Dad were in front. I believe my two sisters were in the back, Mary and Alberta. I said, "Hubert, will you take me out for my clothes' and I went to my brother's place and got my suitcase and same back to Maywood and picked up Hubert, who took me back to West Indianapolis and I got a bus, finally reaching the Ben Davis High School road, where I walked several squares back to the square where I was to meet John. This was about 5:50 P.M. I met Evelyn driving John's car and he was in the back seat on an Anburn Sedan and I followed the Auburn Sedan, driving the Ford until about 6:50 to 7:00 P.M. There was a man and two women in this Auburn ear. I don't know whether I would recognize this woman again or note We drove North on 40 on the High School road to the Ben Davis High School and turned left and we drove I don't know just how far, as I did not know the roads. Between 6:30 and 7:30 the Auburn stopped and I talked with Billie until John came to the car and got in. The gun, at this time, was in the Ford. It was on the front of the car. I got in the back and Evelyn got in with me. He drove. We then went on 36 to #1 to Chicago Heights. We stopped one time at Danville, Illinois for gas. We stopped on 39 highway and John and Evelyn got in the front, Evelyn driving and John holding the machine gun and I got in the back. We drove for some time and then he said I could get a taxi at that corner and I got out at this place and took a taxi to the bus station. John gave me \$5,00 and said he was not going to Detroit. I believe he let me out at 111th Street and then they drove one I got a taxi and went to 12th and Wabash Sts. I bought a ticket to Detroit and the balance of my story is as I related to you on the previous days Stage was in the fact of the contract of extraction of

When I went to Louisville, I intended to get work but when I saw this party I believed was following me, I decided to get back. I believe a party followed me through on the bus. While in Louisville, I wrote a letter to my girl friend, in care of Ralph Moore, 1135 Centennial St., Indianapolis, Indiana. I wrote this letter at 11:00 A.M. Friday and left in the afternoon to return here. The first I knew of the reported robbery at Warsaw, Indiana was when I bought a Louisville paper just before I got on the Interurban.

"I got into Indianapolis at 5:15 P.M.

"I wish to correct my stary above, as I have not told the

truth

"On Sunday, April 8, 1934 I came up to the home of Macey Davis, with my Mother and Father and this was to be the meeting place, after I came back from my brother's place with Hubert. I went to Macey Davis' place with my Father and Mother and there were at this place, at that time, my two sisters Mary and Alberta, Macey Davis and his wife and children, John and Billies These other people were there in the Anburn car, who I understand Embert went after. Davis was at home, as his wife was sick. He was dressed in his uniform, he being employed by the Indianapolis Power and Light Company. We stayed here possibly ten minutes after I arrived. The Anburn Sedan pulled up and the Auburn left first, John being in the Auburn and I never saw the people in the Anburna I left in the Ford V-8 Sedan with Billie and fellowed the Anburn. We drove West on Lafayette, as far as the street goes, them left two squares and West about one mile and then went to Lindhurst and drove to a road which goes into the Municipal Airport, then driving back to the Sky Harbor dance grounds and turned around and went back out to the Ben Davis High Schooland drove north to Morris Street. I was following the Auburn on the direction of John. We then turned left at the High School and drove West and they them got winding around on roads I did not know and finally ended up on highway 56, the Rockville road. We dropped the Auburn on the State road and John came back and got into the Ford. The Ford car had 52 miles on it when I: took the wheel at the home of Macey Davis. The Indiana tags were on this car the last time I saw it."

INTERVIEW HAD WITH MARY HANCOCK, MAYWOOD, ENDINGA, April 25, 1934, in the Library, Federal Building, Indianapolis, Indiana, in the presence of Agents Johnson and Sears, who advises that she is 18 years of age:

"On Sunday morning, April 8, 1934 I, together with the members of my family, that is, my mother and father, Andrey and Emitt Hancock, and sister, Abberta, left home to proceed to the home of my grandfather, John W. Dillinger, Mooresville, Indiana and picked up my brother, Morman Hancock at the home of Gertrude Altman. The five of us in the car went to grandfather's place. We had previously gone to Sunday School at 10:30 A.M., and right after Sunday School left to go down there. I believe John was out in the yard when I first saw him. He had on a very light blue or gray suit. Billie was in the house in the living room. I knew her as she had been here one time before, at our home. I had heard my people talking of her and I had also seen her pictures in the paper and had heard people speak of her, that is since this happened; that is, I saw her picture in the paper after her arrest at Chicago and knew that she was the Billie who had been here. We were out in the yard for quite a while. John, when we first saw him, kissed us all eround, but he did not say when he was going to leave. There was, at grandfather's house, at this time, John, Evelyn, or Billie, Hubert, and his wife, Fred and his wife, Norman, myself, and Alberta; also, John W. Dillinger, my grandfather as well as his two daughters, Doris, age 16 and Frances, age 11. We all had dinner. We went out into the woods after dinner. John went down in the woods with them. This is up in back of the County Road. Fred and his wife, Berneta were not there for dinner. John took the baby when they met him as they came over into the woods. John had a new Ford V-8 in the yard, but I so not know who brought it there, but someone went to get the care He was making plans then to leave. I did not see the gun, as To was not in the room when he packed up. I don't know which automobile left first, but John wanted to know which way they went and I believe Andrey and Hubert had already gone. We had not watched them when they left and did not know which way they went. Billie was driving the car when they left. I was in the front seat with Billie. Alberta was in the back seat with John and John was down on the floore The bag was in the back on either the floor or the back seat. I did not see the Smitheman talk with John at any time. I don't know whether he knew John was there or not. When Billie drove out she turned to her left, which would take her to Mooresville and John said possibly she should go the other way and hap then turned to the right and went back to the County Line Roads

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We stopped just across the road which comes down here, and then, John said, "Meyer mind. I will get out and drive." John got out of the car and I get out of the front seat and got in the back on the right side. John got into the front seat and was driving. I did not see the machine gun at this time. When at the house I had manicured his nails and I accidently struck his leg and he said something about his sore leg, but he did not say anything more about it. With John driving we turged to the right on the County Road and we same out somewhere and his highway 57 and turned to the left and then drove to Mars Hill to Holt Road and turned to the left at a street about one-half block from the tracks, where we came to the home of Davis. We sat out in the car and talked for about one hour and we went into the house and waited for father and mother. We were there possibly one and one-half hours when Mother came. John left in about fifteen minutes. Mother and Father arrived before he left. John and Billie were in the house also. They did not say where they were going. Morman rode from Mooresville with Hubert and Norman same to the Davist place and he was with them when they left. Somebody was with them in another car. Hillie and Norman left in one car and John left in another care I don't know who was in the other car. Mother and I were crying. Nothing was said about coming back, in fact, nothing was said as to how or when we would see him again. John was last here sometime before Christmas. This was before he was arrested in Tucson. I had never seen the people in the second car in my life. I don't know what kind of car it was, but it was possibly black. John left in the rear car and Norman was driving Billie.

"When Father came up to the Davis' home, he had with him his aunt, Mrs. Lyda Fisher, 1342 Blaine Ave. She came up to see John. I did not pay any attention to the people in the second car, and do not know if they got out. This was at the home of Mary and Macey Davis, who are friends of our family.

"While at grandfather's house, I was in the bed room; I believe I first saw the parties we thought were watching the place from the living room and then walked into the bed room and saw these fellows again and then went into the living room and said, 'There is a car out there with a couple of fellows and it looks suspicious'. I don't know if John heard this, but I said this generally to all the family in the front room. It was not very long after this that we arranged to leave."
