Face Nelson, whose true name is Gillis, has been in this section of
the country. This letter, however, is simply a confirmation of
telephone call to Inspector Clegg at St. Paul.

The state of the state of the state of From various informants we have learned positively that when "Baby Face" Nelson escaped while en route to Joliet Penitentiary, he hid out for a week or two in the home of his mother-in-law, or some other relative, either in the attie or barn, in Chicago, and possibly this escape was accomplished by the Touly gang and other gangsters in Chicago. Shortly thereafter, Gillis, alias Relson, was taken out of town from Chicago by two carloads of gangsters, and was put on a train for Reno, Nevada, and informant the knows him personally, and whose name I will furnish you later, states that after Nelson had been in Rene for some time, Jim Griffin, who runs a joint at San Francisco. California, (155 Columbus Ave.), and has been mentioned in the Frisch kidnaping case, and who is a close personal friend of William Graham and J. C. McKay, who have been preminently mentioned in the Bremer and Frisch kidnaping cases, was telephoned from Reno, and told that "Baby. Face Relson was being sent to them to take care of for a while and

Griffin in turn was telephoned by informant from Sausalito, California, and Griffin told him that Graham and McKay at Reno wanted "Baby Face" Nelson taken care of a few days, and that he was "hot". Informant remonstrated, but stated that he had no alternative, and Griffin teld him he would only have to take care of him for a day or two. In reality he stayed around for several months during 1932 at Sausalite, and there struck up a very close acquaintenship with one John P. Chase, who was introduced by "Baby Face" Melson, or Gillie, to informants.

After leaving Sausalite "Baby Face" Helson, alias Gillis, stopped for some time at Calneva, which is located at Lake Tahoe, California. Calneva is a gambling joint owned by Graham and McKay. Both John P. Chase and "Baby Face" Nelson, alias Gillis, were parties in an automobile transaction in San Francisco, California, in March, 1954. John P. Chase has since left Sausalito, leaving about the same time the automobile transaction took place, and was no doubt back with "Baby Face" Helson, alias Gillis, and Dillinger, at the time the recent shooting took place in the Middle West. John P. Chase has certain relatives in this locality

He is described as fellows:

Weight: 170 - 180
Build: Medium
Eyes: Hazel
Hair: Black; combed straight back.

Complexion: Good athletic build - medium complexion.

We have not been able as yet to find a photograph of John P. Chase, who apparently has no criminal record. However, we have located a paramour of his, who works in a concession stand in the Ferry Building, at San Francisco, which ferry goes from San Francisco to Sausalito, although she lives at Sausalito. Possibly a photograph can be secured of Chase later. Chase is very fond of green, and when he left Sausalite had on a sort of greenish hue suit and green hat. Chase is a young man who is in for the thrill of things, and would no doubt be very likely to take part in any shooting.

Our informant stated that Nelson, alias Gillis, although I believe his correct name is Gillis, spoke of Roger Touly, Touly, Touly, Touly, Three Fingered White, alias "Wooley" White, and other gangsters. Informant also stated that Nelson's wife is named Helen, and he also some times goes under the name of Burnett. He stated that while Gillis was under his protection at Sausalito, California, he wrote very frequently to a leading gangster in Chicago, who is well known to the Police, and who, he understands, furnished the entire group with machine guns and other weapons, and at whose place this group always meets. He states that you can

count positively on Gillis, clies Helson, getting in touch with this man at Chicago. His name is Tony Capuseo or Capesio, both last names, phonetic spelling. However, informant does not know how the last name is spelled, but stated that it sounds as it has been spelled phonetically.

This information was immediately telephoned to Inspector Clear at St. Peul, and appropriate arrangements will be made, if these individual show up is this vicinity, to effect thely apprehension

This hospital is simply at rendezvous for the worst gangsters in the country, and in checking wo the telephone salls, I have found any number of telephone calls from J. C. McKay and William Graham at Reno, cohorts of his, to "Toby" William at telephone number 15, Vallejo, California, which is the telephone number of the so-called hospital. This shows the various connections with Greham and McKay and Toby Williams with gangoters all over the comtry.

Chief of Police Stanford, who has been Chief of Police & for approximately 35 years, is conversant with this situation, and is The state of the s affording full cooperation.


Our informant stated that he is doubtful that Welson, alias Gillis, would come back into Reno now, owing to the fact that the town is whote, owing to the Frisch kidneping case, and It is his opinion that if Roy Frisch has been killed, and he believes he has, that "Baby Face" Helson, no doubt, did this job for Graham and McKey in return for various favors done him

This matter will be closely followed up in this district. I believ it should be borne in mind that no doubt John Chase was with Nelson and Dillinger, and others, when the shooting took place recently in Wisconsin. From the description, efforts should be made to identify him as being Subject in this case. Every effort will be made to secure photograph of Chase at an early date







#### SUPPLEMENTARY SUMMARY REPORT

on ipril 28, 1934 the FEDERAL GRAND JURY at St. Perl, Minheeotoly returned indictments charging conspiracy to harbor John Dillinger, fugitive from justice, against RESSIE CHEEN, EVELYN FRECHETIE, DR. C. ENMAY, MRS. MICHELLER, HOMER VAN METER, JOHN HAMILTON, and PAT/REILLY, PAT REILLY, JOHN HAMILTON, and HOMER VAN METER have not as yet been apprehended.

BESSIE CHEEN was arraigned in United States District Court at St. Peni. Minnesota, on May 5, 1934; entered plea of "Guilty", and in default at bond in the encount of \$25,000.00 was remanded to Remsey County Jail to small accounts.

DR. C. E. MAY was arraigned on April 29, 1934; entered a plea of "Mot Grilty", and in defemit of bond in the enough of \$50,000.00 was remanded to the Remsey County Jail to await trial. On May 1, 1934 this bond was reduced be \$20,000.00; however, DR. MAY was unable to make this bond.

MRS. AUGUSTA SALT was arraigned in United States District Dours at St.Paul, Minnesota, on April 29, 1934; antered a plea of "Not Cailty", and in defemit of bond in the amount of \$50,000.00 was remembed to the Remony County Jail to evait trial. On May 1, 1934 MRS. SALT'S bond was also reduced to \$20,000.00, which she was unable to make, he was a second of the secon

EVELYN FRECHETTE was arraigned in United States District Court on May 2, 1934; entered a plea of "Not Quilty", and in default of bond in the emount of \$60,000.00 was remanded to the Remsey County Jail to await trial, On May 3, 1934 her bond was reduced to \$35,000.00, which she was unable to make, and is still confined in the Remsey County Jail.

### WITNESSES TO PRESENT EVIDENCE AGAINST SUBJECT EVELYN FRECHETIS.

MR. JUHN TIEMNEY, Identification Division, St.Penl Police Department. Safety Building, St.Penl, Minnesota, will testify that on March 51, 1934 he entered Apartment No. 303 at 93-95 South Lexington Avenue, St.Penl, immediately after the shooting and escape of the occupants, and obtained from this apartment a powder box on which he found a latent fingerprint, which he developed and delivered to the Chicago Division Office. This witness will identify this powder box and will present the latent fingerprint taken therefrom.

REDERICK R. O'ROURKE, Assistant to John Tierney, Bureau of Criminal Identification, St. Paul Police Department, Safety Building, Mt. Paul, Minnesota, will corroborate the testimony of John Tierney.

E. H. REINECKE, Special Igent, Division of Investigation, E. B. Department of Justice, 1900 Bankers' Building, Chicago, Illinois, will testify that following the arrest of EVELIN PRECHETIE at Chicago, Illinois, her fingers print impressions were taken by him at the Chicago Division Office and forwarded to the Division at Washington, D.C. This witness will also testify that the photograph of the latent fingerprint furnished the Chicago Division Office by John Tierney was also forwarded to the Division at Washington, D. C.

Department of Justice, Washington, D.C. This witness will testify to the reseipt at the Division in Washington, D.C. of the photograph of the latent fingerprint which had been obtained from John Tierney by the Chicago Division Office and forwarded to the Division; also to the receipt at the Division of the fingerprint impressions of EVELYN FRECHETTE which were taken by Special Agent Reinecke. This witness will introduce charts prepared at the Division of Investigation of the latent fingerprint and a comparison will be made with the actual fingerprint impression of EVELYN FRECHETTE, which will prove that the fingerprint impressions found on the powder box taken from Apartment No. 505 at 93-95 South Lexington Avenue, St.Peml, by John Tierney are the fingerprint impressions of EVELYN FRECHETTE.

JOHN TIERNEY, supra. This witness will testify that on March S1, 1934 he entered Apartment No. 303 at 93-95 South Lexington Avenue, St.Penl., Minnesota, immediately after the shooting and escape of the occupants, and obtained from this apartment a beer bottle on which he found a latent finger-print, which he identified by records in the St.Paul Police Department as being a fingerprint of JOHN DILLINGER. This witness will identify this bottle and will present the latent fingerprint taken therefrom. He will further testify that a photograph of this latent fingerprint was furnished to Inspector H. R. Clegg at the St.Paul Division Office.

FREDERICK R. O'ROURKE, assistant to John Tierney, will corroborate the testimony of John Tierney.

H. H. CLEGG, Inspector, Division of Investigation, W. S. Department of Justice, 232 Post Office Building, St. Penl, Minnesota, will testify to the receipt by him of the photograph of the latent fingerprint furnished by John Tierney, and that this photograph was forwarded to the Division at Washington, D. C.

W. T. DEMPSEY, Fingerprint Expert of the Dayton, Chic, Police Department, Dayton, Chic, will testify that on September 22, 1935 he took fingerprint impressions of JOHN DILLINGER. This witness will produce the original prints of DILLINGER taken by him and introduce them in evidence.

AARON KOHN, Fingerprint Expert, Division of Investigation, E. A. Department of Justice, Washington, D. G. This witness will testify to the receipt at the Division in Washington, D.C., of the photograph of the latent fingerprint forwarded by Inspector H. H. Glegg and obtained from John Tierney. This witness will introduce charts prepared at the Division of Investigation of the latent fingerprints and a technical comparison will be made with the latent fingerprint found on the beer bottle at Apartment 503, 95-95 South.

Lexington Avenue, with the fingerprints of JOHN DILLINGER.

WALLACE SALT, 1835 Park Avenue, Minneapolis, Minneapta, will testify that during the period from March 51, 1934 to April 4, 1934 he was residing with his mother, MRS. AUGUSTA SALT, in an apartment located at 151 East 14th Street, Minneapolis, Minneapolis; that on March 51, 1934 a man and a woman entered his mother's apartment and remained therein until April 4, 1934; that the man at that time limped, and that he was treated in the apartment by DR. MAY, who is known to him. This witness will identify EVELYN PRECHETTE as being the woman who entered this apartment on March 51, 1934 and remained therein until April 4, 1934, and will identify the photograph of JCHN DILLINGER as being the man who accompanied this woman and who was treated by DR. MAY.

County Jail, St. Penl, Minnesota; that at this time EVELYN FRECHETTE admitted. to him that she accompanied JOHN DILLINGER to St. Paul, Minnesota, from Chicago, Illinois, and that she resided with him in an apartment located at 93-95 South Lexington Avenue, St. Paul, under the name of MR, and MBS. CARL T. HELLMAN; that on March 51, 1954 while she and DILLINGER were in bed, two officers came to the door whom she refused to edmit. Immediately thereafter she and JUHN DILLINGER dressed and proceeded to leave the spartment, DILLINGER taking a machine gun and firing it a number of times through the door; that she then went to the garage in the rear of the spartment, took out a Budson Beden and with DILLINGER in the back seat, drove to an apartment located in either Minneapolis or St. Paul, and there made arrangements with EDDIE CREEN to have DILLINGER treated for a wound which he had received in the shooting which had occurred at 93-95 South Lexington Avenue. This witness will further testify that EVELYN FRECHETIE stated to him that she had often felt that it was too bad that JOHN DILLINGER had transported Sheriff HOLLEY'S car from Indiana to Illinois, stating, "It is too bad that Grown Point was not in Illinois"; also stating that she knew that interstate transportation of a stolen sutomobile is a Federal offense known as the Dyer Act. This witness will further testify that EVELYN PRECHEFFE admitted that she bought papers every day while residing in the apartment with DILLINGER and read them herself; that she knew DILLINGER was a fugitive, and when questioned as to whether or not she knew he was a Federal fugitive, she stated: "Well, maybe I knew it and don't remember now".

GEORGE STROTH, 105 South Lexington Avenue, St.Peml, Minnesote, will testify that on the morning of March 51, 1934 he was at home and heard the shooting which occurred in the spartment house next door, being 95-95 South Lexington Avenue. He will testify that he was in the back yard of his home when he heard the first shots, and ran around to the front of his home, but that MRS. COFFEY opened the window of her spartment at 93 South Lexington Avenue and motioned for him to go back. He will testify that immediately following the shooting he saw a woman dressed in black, which he believes to have been a fur coat, and was carrying a large black suitcase, run from the rear entrance of the apartment toward the alley. Behind the woman was a man whom he had/seen before, who was carrying two guns; that both of these people proceeded in a Westerly direction up the alley toward a garage several feet from where he then was, and the woman backed a car out of the garage, headed it West, and the man got in with her and they drove away.

Representatives of the following papers will be subpossed to produce copies of the St.Paul and Minneapolis papers from March 4, 1954 to April 15, 1954. These papers will show articles appearing therein concerning JUEN DILLINGER and his status as a Federal fugitive, and the representative of each paper will testify that the paper produced is a regular issue of the papers distributed by the paper concern which they represent. The names of the representatives of the various newspaper concerns have not been obtained, as the United States Attorney at St.Paul does not desire publicity along this line at this time. Names of the newspapers are as follows: Minneapolis Star, Minneapolis Tribune, Minneapolis Journal, St.Paul Pioneer Press, St.Paul Dispatch, and St.Paul Daily Hews.

This witness will produce records to show the marriage of WKLTON SPARK and MARY EVELYN FRECHETTE at Cook County Jail, Chicago, August 3, 1932.

Chicago, Illinois. This witness will testify that EVELYN PRECHETE is identical with the woman known to him as EVELYN SPARK, and that EVELYN SPARK approached him about five months age relative to instituting divorce proceedings against her husband, WELTON SPARK, an immate of the United States Penitentiary, Leavenworth, Kansas; that said divorce proceedings were instituted but had not been consumated, inassence as under the Illinois law the plaintiff must appear in open court; that EVELYN SPARK declined to appear in open court, and that no communication has been received from EVELYN SPARK for over two months.

MISS ELSIE WALLINS, Secretary to George R. Brodkins, Attorney at Law, 707 Stevens, Building, Chicago, Illinois, will identify EVELYN PHECHETTE as the woman known to her as EVELYN SPARK, who came to the office of George R, Brodkins for the purpose of instituting divorce proceedings against WELTON SPARK.

Eansas, will identify EVELYN FRECHETTE as his wife, from whom he has not been divorced.

CLERK OF THE SUPERIOR COURT, Cook County, Illinois, Clark and Randolph Streets, Chicago, Illinois, will present in evidence certified copies of the divorce proceedings of EVELYN SPARK, Plaintiff, and WELTON SPARK, Defendent.

EDWIN SAAGER, Mechanic, Main Street Garage, Grown Point, Indiana, will testify that on March 3, 1934 JOHN DILLINGER stole from the Main Street Garage, Ford V-8, four-door sedan, Motor # 256-447, which car was the property of Sheriff LIILIAN HOLLEY, Lake County, Indiana. This witness will further testify that this car was driven by ERNEST RUNK at the direction of JOHN DILLINGER, who had a machine gun pointed at MUNK, and that he and ERNEST HUNK were released by JOHN DILLINGER near Pootone, Illinois, when JOHN DILLINGER took the wheel of the car and drove it away.

In the summary report of Special Agent D. L. Nicholson, St. Pemi, Minnesota, dated April 19, 1934, it is set out that MRS. VEE CLANCY, in care of Young-Quinlan Company, 9th and Nicollet Avenue, Minneapolis, Minnesota, could testify that on March 27, 1934 EVELYN FRECHETTE had purchased a coat at this store, which coat was later found in Apartment No. 503 at 93-95 South Lexington Avenue by Special Agent in Charge Werner Hanni. When this case was

presented to the FEDERAL GRAND FURY at St. Paul, Minnesota, MRS. GLAMOY viewed EVELYN PRECHETTE in the Bansey Sounty Jail and edvised that EVELYN PRECHETTE was not the individual who purchased this coat, and subsequently identified the photograph of PATRICIA YOUNG, alias PATRICIA CHERRINGTON he being a likeness of the individual who had purchased this coat. This evidence, since it cannot be used against EVELYN PRECHETTE, will be set out against PATRICIA YOUNG in the event she is ever prosecuted.

#### WITNESSES TO PRESENT EVIDENCE AGAINST DR. C. E. MAY:

MISS DOLORES SMART, 251 Oak Grove Street, Minnespolis, Minnespote will testify that she has been acquainted with DR. C. E. MAY from about August l. 1934, and resided at various places in Minneapolis, Minneacta, when DR. MAY visited her in her room; that on the night of March 51, 1954 she had a date with DR. MAY but that DR. MAY did not call for her until about 11:00 P.M., and that he told her after his arrival that he had made \$500,00 that might; that they then went to the home of MR. and MRS. EDDIE CHEEN at 5500 Framont Avenue South, Minneapolis, Minneapta, where DR. MAY entered the apartment and introduced her to MR. and MRS. CREEN; that DR. MAY and EDDIE REEN engaged in conversation and she overheard EDDIE GREEN tell DR. MAY not to let "Her know about it". This witness will further testify that a few days thereafter she attempted to communiicate with DR. MAY; called him at his home and office but was unable to locate. him at either place; that about April 12, 1934 DR. MAY come to see her at the Roberts Apartment, 231 Oak Grove Street, Minnespolis, Minnesota, and told her that he was hiding out and was not going to his home or his office, as he feared the officers would errest him because of his connection with MDDIE GHEEN. This witness will further testify that DR. MAY at no time indicated to her that he feared that gangsters would shoot him, and that he never stated in her presence that he feared any members of any gang.

WALLACE SALT, 1835 Park Avenue, Minneapolis, Minnesota, will testify that from March 31, 1934 to April 4, 1934 he was residing at this address with his mother, MRS. AUGUSTA SALT; that on March 31, 1934 a men and women came to his mother's apartment in a Hudson car with foreign license; that the man who entered the apartment at this time limped. This witness will identify EVELYN FRECHETTE as being the women who entered the spartment, and a photograph of JUHN DILLINGER as the man who entered the apartment. This witness will further testify that DR. MAY came to the apartment several times and entered the room where JUHN DILLINGER was kept; that DR. MAY remained in the room for various lengths of time.

sometimes remaining only a few minutes; that on these occasions when BR, MAY visited JUHN DILLINGER he carried a medical grip with him,

BORNIE SANDERS, 1525 La Salle Avenue, Minneapolis, Minnéapolis, will testify that she was formerly employed by DR. MAY as office girl until April 18, 1934; that during the time of her employment it was her practice to purchase a copy of the Chicago Herald and Examiner and the Minneapolis Tribune daily for DR. MAY.

ALBERT WHITEHALL, Legal Department, Herald and Examiner, Chicago, Illinois, will produce copies of this paper from March 5, 1934 to April 6, 1934 and will testify that these papers have been compared by him with the bound volumes in the Herald and Examiner office, and that the papers were distributed for public use by the Herald and Examiner.

T. J. DOID, Special Agent, Division of Investigation, U. S. Department of Justice, 232 Post Office Building, St.Peml, Minnesota, will testify that on April II, 1954 while he was at the Ancker Hospital with EDDIE CHEEN, EDDIE CHEEN, asked him if he knew DOC MAY, to which he replied in the affirmative, and CHEEN asked: "Where do you see him?" To which he replied: "At a spot", CHEEN then stated: "That is right". "He isn't in his effice, is he?" "Do you think I peid him too much for that job?" Dodd asked CHEEN how much he had paid and CHEEN replied: "\$90.00". This witness will further testify that following this conversation he attempted to locate DR. MAY, and after several unsuccessful efforts to ecrtact him at his office and home, finally located DR. MAY on April 17, 1954 at the apertment of MRS. AUGUSTA SALT, being Apartment 5, 131 East 14th Street, Minnespolis, Minnesota; that upon speaking to DR. MAY he was informed that officials of the Division of Investigation wished to talk to him in St.Peml, Minnesota; DR. MAY immediately turned to MRS. SALT and said: "They have got us".

C. F. HURLEY, Special Agent, Division of Investigation, U. S.
Department of Justice, 232 Post Office Building, St.Paul, Minnesota, will corroborate the statement of Agent Dodd relative to the location of DR. MAY and the statement made by him at the time he was informed that officials of the Division of Investigation wished to talk with him.

Minneapolis, Arnnesota. This witness will testify that on April 17, 1934 she was in the apartment of MRS. AUGUSTA SALT, being Apartment No. 6, 151 East 14th Street, Minneapolis, Minnesota, at which place DR. MAY was performing an abortion upon her, and that she was in the apartment when Special Agents Hurley

and Bodd entered the apartment and immediately thereafter took DR. MAY, MEG. AUGUSTA BALT, MALTER SALT, and herself to the offices of the Division of Investigation, U. S. Department of Justice, St.Paul, Minnesota. This witness will further testify that on April 16, 1934 when she attempted to contact BR. MAY in his office she was informed by the office girl that DR. MAY was in Bochester, Minnesota, but that this girl later informed her that DR. MAY was in St.Paul, and then instructed her to go to Apartment 5, 131 East 14th Street, Minneapolis, at which place DR. MAY would be at approximately 5:00 P.M.

MR. CHONEWALD, Clerk, Ramsey County Court, St.Paul, Minnesota, will produce the files of that court relative to the State of Minnesota gainst MDIE CHEKN. These files will show that in 1922 when MDIE CHEKN was tried for the pay roll robbery of the Crane-Ordway Company at St.Paul, Minnesota, that DR. G. E. MAY appeared in his defense and testified that at the time the rebberg was committed he, DR. MAY, was treating CHEKN for tonsilitis in the LE Salle Hotel, Minnesota, Minnesota; that CREEN, however, was convicted and sentenced to the State Penitentiary at Stillwater, Minnesota,

### WITNESSES WHO WILL PRESENT EVIDENCE AGAINST MRS. AUGUSTA BALT.

WALLACE SALT, 1501 - 2nd Avenue South, Minnespolis, Minnesota, will testify that from March 51, 1934 to infil 4, 1934 he was residing with his mother, MRS. AUGUSTA SALT, at 1835 Park Avenue, Minnespolis, Minnesota; that on the morning of March 51, 1934 a woman whom he will identify as EVELYN FRECHETTE, and a man whom he will identify from photographs as JOHN DILLINGER, came to his mother's home and at this time JOHN DILLINGER was limping; that these individuals uals came to the apartment in a Hudson with foreign License; that his mother told him to close the garage door and put a lock on it; that these individuals remained in his mother's home until April 4, 1934, during which time JOHN DILLINGER, who was in the back room of the apartment, was visited on several occasions by DR. MAY. This witness will further testify that during the period that these individuals were in his mother's home EVELYN FRECHETTE and his mother. MRS. AUGUSTA SALT, did the cooking for DILLINGER and took the food into his room.

A. T. BACKDAHL, 127 East 14th Street, Minneapolis, Minnesota, will testify that he is the manager of the spartment house which includes No. 131 East 14th Street, Minneapolis, Minnesota. This witness will testify that on April 7, 1934 Apartment 6, 131 East 14th Street, was rented by a waman giving her name as MRS. GEORGE La DeLLE, at which time MRS. 



Rear of Little Bohemia Lodge taken from right rear side, showing distance and topography from rear of Lodge to lake shore.
















Rear of Little Bohemia Lodge (close-up) taken from left rear as you approach Lodge from main road.



#### DETAILS

This report is being an builted in compliance with request contained in a teletype message from Inspector H. H. Clegg. St. Paul, Minnesote, under date of May V. 1934, wherein it was meduested that the Chicago Office expedite a separate report with residence to the manner in which the information furnished by Emil Wanatka, indicating that Dillinger and associates were at the Little Bohemia Lodge, which he operates near Memitowish, Wisconsin, was referred to the Chicago Office.

Agent in Charge M. H. Purvis received a telephone call from United States Marshal H. C. B. Laubenheimer, Chicago, Illinois, at which time information was provided that he, Mr. Laubenheimer, had received a telephone call from Mr. Henry Yoss, of the Birchwood Tavern, Manitowish, Wisconsin, It was stated that Mr. Yoss had informed their Dillinger and six other men, together with three women were located at a certain point maar Memitowish, Wisconsin, the exact point of which was unknown to Marshal Laubenheimer. Dimediately upon receipt of the information from United States Marshal Laubenheimer, Special igent in Charge M. H. Purvis communicated by telephone with Mr. Yoss, who was reported by Mr. Laubenheimer to be reliable. It appears that several Federal Judges, United States Attorneys and other friends of Mr. Laubenheimer frequently spend vacations at the resort operated by Mr. Laubenheimer frequently spend vacations at the resort operated by Mr. Laubenheimer frequently spend vacations at the resort

Mr. Yoss informed Mr. Purvis that John Dillinger and six other men, together with three women were at that time located at a summer resort known as Little Bohemia Lodge, which is situated approximately two miles from the Birchwood Tavers, which is operated According to Mr. Voes, the Little Bohemia Lodge is by Mr. Yoss. operated by Emil Warmtka who is married to a sister of the wife of Eryoss. Mr. Yoss informed Mr. Purvis that members of the Dillinger gang had been located at the Little Bohemia Lodge since Friday hight pril 20. 1954; that all telephone calls received or made from the Little Bohemia Lodge were closely observed by members of the Dillinger gang, and that Wanatha could not leave his place of business. Mr. Vos further stated that he had arranged to call at the Little Bohamia Lodge and had purchased a package of eigerettes with the prior understanding that Emil Wanatka would conceal a note in the package of eigarettes. This note merely stated that Mr. Yoss should hurry, inasmuch as members of he billinger gang were planning to water on the morning of horill 25, 1934. Inspector Clegg and Inspector Royal together with three other Special Agents from the St. Paul Office also departed from St. Paul by airplane and arrived at the Rhinelander airport prior to the arrival of the Agents from the Chicago Office also

Inspector Clegg and Inspector Rorer discussed the mater with Mr. Yoss, who was at the Hhinelander airport, immediately upon their arrival. A photograph of Tommy Carroll had been shown to Mr. Yoss, and he appeared to be quite positive that he was one of the men who was staying at the Little Bohemia Lodge. Mr. Yoss further stated, at the time of the arrival of the Agents from the St. Paul and Chicago Offices, that it was understood that the members of the Dillinger gang were planning to leave Little Bohemia Lodge on the morning of April 25, 1954.





She advised that she did not notice anyone around the car at the time she first observed same.

advised that during the morning of May 1, 1954, he observed the car in question parked in front of Dothe's residence; that he did not notice anyone around the car and that later that day he walked up and looked in the car, at which time he observed two flashlights, and that after conversing with Mrs. Gothe, the day seed that she had the keys to the car, after removing two flashlights which he took to his residence, one to the fact that there were many small children in the neighborhood and he thought that they might get into the car and take some of the effects from same. Timms also stated that he observed several exploded .45 shells on the floor of the car, as well as some surgical dressings and bandages.

She further advised that her father was one Rocco Conforti; that she was born on April 14, 1913, and that her mother one Bleanor Krouse Conforti, is in the Oak Forest Sanitarium as the present time.

In connection with the information supplied in the taletype message, Special Agent F. C. Querrero conducted investigation on April 27, 1934, and submitted a memorandum relative thereto, copy of which appears below, setting forth the results of his investigation

Investigation conducted in the visinity of 1480 social solution of the street, disclosed that this neighborhood consists mainly of rooming beusea. Inquiries in the heighborhood failed to disclose anything companing Miss Confortia

W. W. Burke, Manager of the Scott Stores, 5955 W. Horth Avenue, which is one of the stores between Crawford

I M. Breiding Manager of the Scott Stores at 3839.
Fallerton avenue, which is also in the vicinity of Crawford and California, stated that Miss Confort; was never employed there. There are no other Scott Stores located between California and Crawford.

Investigation at 1740 Adams Street disclosed the rooming house if run by Mrs. Evva Klang. She stated that Miss Conforti lived at her rooming house from April 25, 1933, to June 6, 1933, and that Marie had been forced to leave because ahe brought strange man to her room and Mrs. Klang stremously objected to this. Mrs. Klang debied that she is holding a turnk and some packages belonging to Mies Confortid She stated however, that when the Conforti girl left her home, Mrs. Klang kept a cardboard box containing some clothes belonging to Miss. Conforti, for the reason that the latter was unable to pay her bill. However, a few days later, Miss Conforti returned and paid for her room, and obtained all her personal belongings. Mrs. Klang, when asked concerning the personal habits and associates and activities of Miss Conforti; stated that she kneer of nothing about it. Mrs. Klang stated that Miss Conforti was out of employment at the time, but that a young man used to call for him, and that this young man had a big dar, Mrs. Klang was unable to give any definite information concerning the identity of this young man. Mrs. Klang failed to give any information concerning the personal habits or antecedents of Miss Conforti

Investigation at the Oak Forest Sanitarium disclosed that a woman named Elinor Frouse, the maigen name of Miss Conforti's mother entered the institution on September 18, 1982. With the assistance of Miss Elizabeth P. Hyde, Supervisor of the Women's Ward of the institution, an interview with Miss Erouse was made possible. Miss Erouse stated that she first married a man named Rocco Conforti, and that as a fesult of this union, they have a child whose name is Marie Marian Conforti. It will be stated that Miss Erouse (Mrs. Conforti) is an invalid and could hardly talk. She is in such an emaciated condition, that it was very a difficult to talk to her, She stated that she had not seen Marie for two years and that she could give no information concerning her activities and her associates. Mrs. Conforti stated that her last address before she entered the Sanitarium was 1444 Larrabee

Street, and that her nearest relative is Mrs. Costelle. 217 Mrs. Winchester. However, investigation at 1444 Larrabee Street failed to disclose any information concerning Elinor Kreuses. Paul Roder of 1444 Larrabee attied that he had lived at this address for 25 years, and that he had never known any party. by the name of Elimor Krouse on Marie Marian Conforti. Inquiries in the neighborhood failed to elicit any information depoterning Marie Marian Conforti or her mother, Elinor Krouses. Mrs. Conforti (Miss Krouse) stated that she has been divorced from her husband, Rosce Conforti and does not know of his whereabouts.

At 217 S. Winchester, the people living at this address stated that they have lived in the premises for a great number of years, and they had no information concerning Mrs. Costello, the supposed sister of Elinor Kroute. Investigation at the offices of the J. H. Behneider Real Estate Company disclosed no information concerning Mrs. Costello at 217 S. Winchester.

The teletype message makes reference to the fact that
Marie Marian Conforti was born on April 14, 1915. However her
mother was not sure as to the date of her birth. She stated,
however, that her daughter was born in Chicage, Illinois, and
to the best of her recollection, her daughter is about 15 or
16 years of age. It should be further stated that the physical
condition of Elinor Erouse is such that Turther questioning was
impossible. She is in a very delicate condition, and almost
unable to answer guestions.

On April 30, 1934, Mr. F. K. Butterfield of the Western Union Telegraph Company, Chicago, communicated by telephone with Special Agent J. J. Waters. He advised that a telegram was dispatched from Eau. Claire, Wisconsin, to one V. Cherrington, 1852 Belmont Avenue, Chicago, It will be noted that this address has been kept under surveillance by Agents of the Chicago office and is the home of a relative to Pat Cherrington. The telegram will be set forth later in this report. Agent Waters communicated by telephone with Special Agent D. L. Micholson of the St. Paul office and requested him to cause two special agents of the St, Paul office to conduct investigation at Eau Claire, Wisconsin, and to make inquiry at the office of the Western Union Company in order to develop possible leads Special Agents J. J. Metcalfe and H. H. Beinecke proceeded to Janesville, Visconsin, where they boarded the train at 4:50 P.M. Standard time. Said Agents kept Pat Cherrington under surveillance until the train arrived at Madison Street Station, Chicago, 8:05 P.M. Daylight savings time, that is 7:05 P.M. Standard time.

the April 30, 1934, Mr. Briterfield, of the Vestern Daice Telegraph Company, called the Chicago Office and advised that the following telegram had been received and was about to be delivered. Metcalfe proceeded to Janesville, Wisconsin, where they pourded the southbound train at 4:50 P.M. and after parefully scrutinizing the passengers who occupied the coaches, perior cars and pullman cars, it was learned by Agent Metcalfe from Pullman Conductor James M. Murtagh, 1853 that the only compartment or drawing room occupied on the train was drawing room A in our fl. which was called the Book Glen care. She appeared to be between 25 and 50 years of age, 5° 4° or 5" tall. She was very light complected and had on considerable powder, rouge and lipstick. Perhaps the only difference between her actual appearance and her picture which might be noted in the fact that her eyes appear to be considerably larger.
