EVELTN PHECHETTS, using the alias, MRS. IRVINGED CLEAR, rented Apartment 105 at \$258 Gereral Avenue, Minneepolia, Minnesota on March 5, 1956, and resided therein presumably with JOHN DILLINGE for approximately two weeks, 1950 Ford Coupe, motor \$2,980,001, which was stolen by members of the DILLINGER mob upon their departure from Little Bohemia Longe was abandoned by them to St. Paul, Minnesota, on 4/25/54, at which time they stole a 1933 Ford Coach, motor \$18-548,480, bearing 1934 Minnesota license B455-209, the bay being property of BOY To FRÂNCIS. Activities of agents at St. Paul Division office to locate DILLINGER and members of his mob set out herein.

Report of Special Agent D. L. Nicholson dated St. Paul, Minnesota, May 10, 1934,

DETAILS:

The title of this report is being changed to include the alias of MRS, IRWIN GLEON, which name was used by EVELIN FRECHETTE, when she rented apartment number 106, at 3252 Gerard Avenue, Minneapolis, Minnesota, an March 5, 1934, at which place she supposedly resided with JOHN DILLINGER for approximately two weeks. This is a joint report of the various agents attached to the St. Faul Division office and deals with investigation relative to locating JOHN DILLINGER and the other Subjects of this case, following their escape from Little Bohemia Lodge on April 28, 1954.

Re: St.Paul File No.25-2434

The following is a sequence of events as facy construct in the Barly mornal ing of invil 25,1934.

At 12:30 A.M. Igent Hardy valled from the visinity of Bercer Visconsin and a woman had left the lodge in a 1928, or 1929, Packard Sedan bearing 1934 Visconsin license Sill. This information was immediately relayed to all sheriffs and police officers in Eastern Visconsin and Northern Winnesota. At 1:30 A.M., Agent Hardy again called from the vicinity of Mercer Visconsin, advising that a 1934 Ford Coupe bearing 1934 license 166529, with one or two men who had a machine gun in their possession, had left the vicinity of the lodge. This information was also relayed to sheriffs and police of its are in Wisconsin and Minnesota to watch all roads for the two parse.

At 1:50 A.M., the sheriff of intigo, Wisconsin, salled the St. Paul Division office advising that the 1934 Ford Coupe bearing Wisconsin license 166529 had a just passed through intigo, Wisconsin, headed south. The sheriff advised that he had called all police Wepartments and sheriffs offices in the immediate vicinity of Antigo, Wisconsin, and as far south as Milwaukee, Wisconsin. This information was immediately relayed to Agent Billings at the Chicago Division Office with the request that he notify all sheriffs and police officers in Morthern Wisconsin and to have all roads covered for this automobile.

At 3:00 A.M., Agent Hardy again called advising that at least two meak with a machine gun had departed from the ladge in a 1930 Ford Coupe, bearing 1934 Wisconsin license 92652 and that the individuals in the ear were wearing suede jackets over bullet proof vests. The information relating to this car was also relayed to the sheriffs and police departments. In contacting the sheriffs and police departments above referred to, they were requested in all instances to cover all roads, particularly, all bridges from Wisconsin to Minnesota. The St.Paul and Minnesotis Police Departments were also notified of the above automobiles. This information was broadcast over the police radio systems to all squad cars.

At 5:40 A.M. Agent Billings called from the CHICAGO DIVISION OFFICE advising that the Milwaukee Police Department had informed him that 1934 Wisconsin license #3111, which had been reported as on a Packard Sedan, had been issued for a Ford, to an owner in Milwaukee, Wisconsin.

On April 23,1934, at 10:15 P.M., Mr.B.P.Cowley from the Division of led the St.Paul Division Office and advised that Inspector Borer and called a him from Rhinelander, Wisconsin, and advised him that he, Inspector Borer and received information that an individual by the first name of FAT, lags name unknown, left the Little Bohamia Summer Resert Friday evening with a girl friend and was supposed to return Saturday, but did not, PAT is seribed as being: 30 years of age; 5.6° tall; 150 pounds; light complexioned paument stomach; poor teeth; and light hair. Mr.Cowley advised that Inspector Rorer was of the opinion that possibly the PAT referred to above was PAT REHLLY, and requested that an effort be made to assertain whether or not PAT visited the Little Bohamia Lodge and whether or not the description of PAT REHLLY fits that of the PAT referred to in this memorandum.

On the evening of April 25,1934, Mr.M.C.Wickem of the Central Freight Lines, Minneapolis, Minnesota, called the St.Paul Division Office and advised that on the early morning of April 25,1934, W.L.CARMARAS, one of the drivers from Marshfield, Wisconsin, when Is aving Marshfield, gave an individual a ride on the truck from Marshfield, Visconsin, to St.Paul, Minnesota; that this individual, according to CARMARAN, was rather unkempt and we seemed to be depressed during the trip, MR.WICKAM advised that Mr.CARMARAN resides at Marshfield, Visconsin, and drives to Minneapolis, every other day; that, since he had read in the papers of the shooting and escape of the DILLINGER mob, from Little Bohemia Lodge, he thought bossibly the implication was brought to St.Paul by CARNARAM might be sonnected with DILLINGER.

On the evening of April 25,1934, Mr. Young, an attorney with offices at 528 Metropolitan Building, telephone Garfield 6787, sailed the St. Paul 2 Division Office and advised that a momen client of his, who resides at 556 Otto Avenue, had informed him that the oscupents of the house at 968 Otto Avenue, appear to be hoodlums; that there are usually several strange terms in front of the house and people come and go all hours of the night. Trong had no further information in connection with this house.

On the evening of April 23,1931, O.V. It is this agent's impression that previous investigations has been made at this barber thop.

The following memorandum was submitted by Special Agent Volta anderson on April 25, 1934:

On April 25, 1934, after various reports had been received at the St. Paul Division office that several of the members who pscaped from Mirake Wisconsin, had reached St. Paul and Minneapolis, Minnesota, and owing to the fact that there were reports that at least the member of the mob had been severely injured, this agent and Agent J. M. Klees, accompanied by Inspector CHARLES TIERREY and his squad, proceeded to the vicinity of RESE Fairmount Aveque, St. Paul, the residence of DR. NELS G. MORTENSEN, for the purpose of ascertaining whether any members of this mob had again contacted this doctor for the purpose of having medical treatment performed. After looking over the premises and noting medical treatment performed. After looking over the premises and noting mething suspicion, Agent interviewed DR. MORTENSEN, who appeared to be very upset. DR. MORTENSEN advised that should any member of the DILLINGER gang attempt to contact his sith a request that he give them medical treatment, he will immediately call the St. Paul office, which telephone number was left with him.

The following memorandum is submitted by Special Level Michelsons

At 12:15 a.m. April 37, 1954 Special Agent 5. Melvin salled the St. Paul Division office from Menitowish, Sissonsia, advising that about one hour previous, an individual who was thought to be a member of the DILLINGER gang and she was also thought to have been hiding out in the cabin of an old trapper for the past two days, had stolen a Plymouth Sedan bearing Wisconsin license 3751 at Les on Flembern. Agent Melvin further advised that the sheriffs and the police departments in the immediate vicinity had been notified of the theft of this car and requested to block the highways in that vicinity.

Immediately upon receipt of this information, agent communicated with Agent Hollis at the Chicago Division office and informed him of these facts and requested that he notify the shariffs and the police departments in the territory covered by the Chicago office.

The sheriffs and the police departments in the following towns were communicated with and advised of the theft of the car bearing Wisconsin license 3751 and requested to block the roads in an effort to apprehend the individual who had stolen this cart

On a call to the effect that Ford Coupe Bearing 1934 Viecessin license plates 98-652 had been recovered, agent, in company with Special Levil L. L. Zimmerman, conducted inquiry at South St. Paul, Minneacta, A.

JOSEPH J. HEINEN and HORMAN DIETER, Deputy Sheriffs of Bakota County, and FRED ModRILE, police officer, Eastings, Minacaota, were interviewed, they advising that they were accompanied this morning also by LARRY DUMS, Deputy Sheriff of Dakota County, and were watching the spiral bridge at Hastings, Minnesota, on Highway No. S. About 10:45 a.m. a Ford Coupe, 1929 or 1950 model, with the above license plates, which number had been broadcast, started to cross this bridge to the north and they immediately took up pursuit. However, a truck got on the bridge between this ser and the officers' ear and this car got about one and a half mile away from them before they got off the bridge. Edwever, they caught up with this care Bt. Paul Park and one of the officers took a shot at the tires of the car and the shot sould be heard to strike the ear. The men in this car immediately shot back at the officers' ear. ... This ear turned off Highway No. 5 at Newport, Minnesota, at the railroad station and then went up shat is known as the Cemetery Road. The officers trailed this car, shooting at it at every opportunity, but the opportunities were rare because of the rolling land and the numerous curves. The officers estimated that they followed the car practically fifty miles before they finally lost it.

One bullet from the bandits' ear went through the windshield of HEIREN'S entomobile and he estimates that about twenty shots were fired at the officers' ear.

The car was lost track of about two miles north of Hastings. The car was later found abandoned about five miles south of St. Paul, near where the South Roberts Street Road and the Willy or Middle Road intersect. These officers stated that the car had a bullet hole through the seat and had considerable blood in it, evidencing that someone of the occupants had been hit. The officers explained that near the point where the car was found, another car was taken, that being the ear belonging to ROY FRANCIS; a Form Y-8 1933 Dalume Coach, marcon body with red wheels. This car bore 1934 Minnesota license B 455-209, motor No. 18,348,420.

One R. H. FORSYTH, residing at the Summit Apartments, South St.

Paul, stated that he stopped in a brick filling station on South Robert

Street Road, near Mendota; that while he was there, some man came in hurriedly
and asked the shortest way to Minneapolis; that he (FORSYTH) started to tell

This investigation was conducted by Special Agents R. T. Monais and A. J. Einmarman on April 25, 1934:

The following investigation was predicated upon a sail from the Beputy Sheriff at South St. Paul, whereupon Special Agents R. T. Woonen conf. A. J. Zimmerman interviewed MR. BOY FRANCIS, whose 1956 Ford Coach had been stolen, containing Minnesota license plates No. 455-200, on or about noon, April 25, 1954, at the intersection of the ent-off road and middle road by three men, driving either a Ford Coupe or a Convertible Coupe; light blue is solor, and about a 1951 model, bearing a Visconsin license. He could not give this mumber.

As he approached this intersection he had to practically stop upon meeting the 1951 Coupe. As it passed a man came from the far with a gim in his hand and said: "I am sorry but we will have to have your car". At this point he forced MR. FRANCIS to walk to the rear and some few feet across the road. We took MRS. FRANCIS and the child to the front of the car. Two men then got into the car, onwof which was the man who handled the gum in the first instance. They then required MR. FRANCIS, his wife, and child, to get into the back seat, and drowe for a couple of blocks, when a third man joined them, and he was placed in the back seat, this man coming from the 1951 Ford Coupe, as they drove it for two or three blocks and them abandoned its.

MR. FRANCIS and wife were told to keep their heads down and not look up, and they drove across country for about two miles to Boy's Filling Std ion, located at South Bobert Road, which is about two miles South of Mendota. From there they drove for about two more miles and then MR. FRANCIS, his wife and child, were unloaded and returned home about 1:00 P.M.

MR. FRANCIS remembered that they put in a sack of something into the car. He did not know whether it contained machine gums or not, but he sall it did resemble them. He also stated that all three of the men were very quiet and that only one of them, which was the first, displayed a gum. The first man was about 85 years of age; about 5 feet, 6 inches tall; and weighed about 160 younds. All needed shaves, and all wore caps and light clothing. He also stated that all three of them walked 35 or 50 feet in making the transfer from one sar to the other, but outside of these facts he sould not identify engone in particular.

This police officer has often been heard to tell various parties that they were fooligh to identify and hoodlums because it would always make their future unserts.



S. W. LANCASTER further stated that on two or three occasions during the nighttime, he took short walks around the rear and sides of this particular apartment and always noticed that no light could be seen thereing that after the persons using this apartment removed, he found that the shades in this apartment had been wired down in order to prevent any light from showing, the wire being in the possession of LANCASTER at the time of this interview; that he noticed a person on one occasion in the hallway, of this apartment house, and upon approaching him for conversation, this person that apartment house to visit some friends, LANCASTER that he had just come to this apartment house to visit some friends, LANCASTER stating that he remarked to the person that he had seen him around on several occasions previous. LANCASTER believed that this was the reason the occupants of the apartment moved, they becoming suspicious that he was watching them. However, LANCASTER was unable to identify any of the suspects in the HREMER kidnaping or any of the DILLINGER crowd as the person with whom the above conversation took place.

LANCASTER further advised that a painter she was working in the building at the time the instant apartment was rented, had viewed the woman who rented this apartment, and that this printer gould how be located for interview at 1852 Bryant Avenue Minneapolis.

Agents located C. RAHL MYER, a painter and paper hanger, at 1838. Bryant Avanue, to whom the photographs of the suspects in the BREMER face and those of the DILLIMGER mob were exhibited. MYER, immediately, without any hesitation, identified the picture of EVELYH PRECHETTS as the somen who had rented Apartment 106 at \$258 Girard Avenue, Minneapolis, on March 5th, MYER explaining that he was positive of this identification because of the fact that this somen impressed him at the time as being a Spanish girl, about whom he had spoken to his partner, SAH TALIMAN

SAM TALLMAN was interviewed by agents at SPOR Girard Avenue.

TALLMAN stating that he was unable to identify any party as occupying Am rement 106, claiming that he at no time saw any of the persons in this aparts.

C. RAFL MYER was unable to identify any other photographs other than that of EVELYN FRECHETTE,

Agents interviewed the persons occupying the apartment opposite Apartment 106, 3252 Girard Avenue, at which time the man and the woman occupying this apartment stated that they at no time saw any of the persons who occupied Apartment 106 during the above stated time, namely March 5 to March 15, 1934, the lady stating, however, that she has a brother named MILTON ZIMMERMAN who works at the Stillman Grocery at 51st and Hennepin Avenue; that she had heard her brother make remarks to the effect that he had sold a large order of groceries to a suspicious man and woman who were driving a large Packard ear; that he considered them suspicious because the man buying the groceries had an elderly moman in his company who watched out of the grocery store window during the entire time the groceries were being purchased.

Accordingly, agents conducted investigation at the Stillman of Grocery Store, Sist and Hennepin Avenue, Minneapolis, at which time MILTON ZIMMERMAN stated that he could not recall the exact date that he had cold a large order of groceries to a man whom he considered as being suspicious, but believed this purchase to have been made on or about the 10th or the 12th of March, 1934; that he sold approximately \$10.00 worth of groceries to this party, who had in his company a woman between the ages of 50 and 50 years, whose hair had been bleached, and she had an unusually noticeable amount of make-up on her face; that the woman stood at the window of the grocery store during the time he was gathering together the groceries

purchased; that a large Packard car was parted outside the property start, in which car remained emother young man in the front seat; that affect the groceries had been bought, he (ZIMMERMAN) carried them to this Photons automobile and placed them in the rear of the car and like two man riding the front seat. Photographs of the suspects in the BREMER case and of the BILLINGER mob were exhibited to MILTON ELECTRICAL, at which time Electrical identified the photograph of ALVIN EARPIS as the person to whom he had wold the above groceries.

Accordingly, these photographs were shown to the following employees of the Stillman Grocery Store, all of whom identified KARPIS as having purchased groceries in this grocery store previously, asmely, EMAPH HARRY PROPERTY STILLMAN, BILL LANGLEY, and DAH ZISKIE. It may be noted that this processy store is located two and a half blocks from the apartment bosse at SEE Girard Avenue. The above persons interviewed were unable to identify any other of the photographs exhibited.

Reference is made to newspaper articles appearing in the local newspapers on May S, 1934, to the effect that one RAMUEL CORES of Minnesspolis was held up on the night of May S, 1984, and that his car was stolen from him by a party who identified himself as JOHN HAMILTON.

Light contact of JOHN BILLINGER.

Agents proceeded to the Hennepin Hotel, Minneapolis, Minnesota, and interviewed SAMUKL GOREN. MR. GOREN stated that on the night of May 4, 1954, he had parked his 1954 Plymouth Coach in front of the St. Charles Cafe; that about 7:50 p.m., as he was about to enter the par, a man walled up to the car, opened the door, and stepped into the car, placing a small automatic revolver inside, and ordered him to drive on. He further adminished him to drive carefully and not be get into any accidents.

GOREN stated that the man pulled a cap down ever his eyes and told him not to look at him.

GOREN drove the car west on Highway 52 in the city of Minneapolis and when he had reached a point on the highway, he was ordered to drive to the side of the road. During the ride from Minneapolis to this point, the man told him that he was JOHN HAMILTON, DILLINGER'S right-hand man, and told him that nothing sould happen to him if he obeyed instructions. Just before reaching his destination, this man took the revolver and fired it twice in back of SAMUEL GOREN, with the remark. You see I know how to use this gum.

After the car had been parked beside the road, GORM was taken into the field where he was bound up with some white rope. The thief told GORM that he would see to it that a taxical was sent out to him and that he would be taken back to the sity.

Igents displayed photographs of JOHN HAMILTON to SAMUEL CORES but he was unable to effect on identification, stating that the men will stole his car was about 50 years of age, 5 feet 8 inches in height, 160 pounds, dark hair, and had a medium voice. He got late the car with them and they private him a drink of liquor and were very friendly with him. After going around the grounds, they came to the side of the Post Headquarters where we certain formation attracted their attention and they maked Frivate PALM whis it was. He said it was guard mount and they had the sar stopped and three of the men got out, leaving Private PALM in the ear with the driver. Two of the men who got out of the car walked toward the officers who were satching the formation, and Lieutenant W. L. FAYLE, a reserve officer, was engaged in conversation by one of these men.

Lieutenant FAYLE described the men who approached him, one men as being about 50 years of age with gray hair, wearing a very light gray suff and a light fedora hat, was rather short, and of medium build. The men who directly engaged Lieutenant FAYLE in conversation he described as a main between 40 and 45 years of age, about 6 feet tall, heavily built, and he judged he weighed about 200 to 210 pounds, was dressed very conservatively in a dark cost and suit and dark gray hat. They made several inquiries as to the formation, also as to what type of guns were being used, as to whether they were shot guns or rifles. When the smaller man of the two, who was standing in back of Lieutenant FAYLE and the man he was talking to, called to this party, he called him "Captain".

GROVNER informed Clerks that he reported the matter to the sheriff's office and evidently nothing clime of it. It is not known whether there is any connection between these individuals and the Billinger gang, though they are descrete criminals.

The records of the Division reflect that Versen Taylor, as Louis Mitchell, \$3977, was arrested by the Police Department of Joplin, Missouri, February 6, 1932, on a charge of investigation and was turned over to the police at Springfield, Ohio on February 13, 1932, where he was charged with the possession of liquor. He was convicted of this offense and sentenced to serve one to five years in the Ohio State Penitentiary, Columbus, Ohio, being reserved at that Institution on July 19, 1932. On April 30, 1934, the Meriff at Maryeville, Ohio advised the Division that Vernon Taylor was sented for the robbery of a beak at that place. He is also wanted by the Police Department at Springfield, Ohio for extendbile that?

Heary Hopkins was arrested by the Police Department, Ienia, Ohio January 12, 1932, on suspicion of chicken theft. Hepkins was turned over to the Police Department of Springfield, Ohio on Jenuary 15, 1932, on a charge of Grand Larceny, which was changed to Policy Larceny, March 24, 1932. 



Agent Hardy feels that there is a possibility that this is the station call that was made by Warie. Marion Comforti to Ted Ancker alias Homer Van Neter.

The girl advised Agent Hardy that it sounded as if the place where she called was a pool room or cafe as she heard a great feel of noise in the place. She asked whoever answered the telephone to permit her to speak to Ted Ancker and shortly afterwards, he come to the telephone.



The letter addressed to Lr. Piquette was written on an Underwood typewriter which had been manufactured previous to 1929. It was written on a white unwatermarked paper having a linem finish, the size of the original sheet having been 8.00 by .0032 inches. The envelope is of plain white paper and measures 5.55 by 4.01 by .0050 inches. The note beginning "Red Hair" was written with an indelible lead pencil.

The scraps of torn paper have been wet and wadded up possibly by putting them in the mouth. The blue pieces when put together form a card from the Italian Restaurant, 526 Broadway, San Francisco, California, the 526 having been scratched out. Across the upper left hand corner was written the name beginning "Jim" and followed by a name which is quite indistinct but is probably "Griffin". The pieces of white paper are only fragmentary and represent a small proportion of the original paper. One piece contains a word ending in "afie" or "afee" followed by the words "Phelan Building". It is noted that there is a Phelan Building in San Francisco. On another piece is written the name "Frank F", in front of which is the number 22, the first 2 having been scratched out and a 3 placed in front of it. On still another piece there appears the address 155 or possibly 165 Colum Avenue which may be an abbreviation of Columbus Avenue in San Francisco. On other pieces there appear a Capital R or K followed by 207 and the word "River" or "Riner" followed by a capital R. The portions of the paper which would connect these fragments

TO THE PARTY OF TH Agent in Charge Purvis telephoned from Chicago this after Se stated that he received a telephone call this morning from a Ery Bicht [7] who is employed by a utility company in Fort Sayne, Indiana. This men had received an anonymous call recently to the effect that Dillinger, Van Meter and one other man had been to his place and stayed all night, that is, the place of the man who made the encrymous telephone call. So refused to give his name at the time, but it later was found out that the anonymous person of was Mr. Wicht's employer. Today he called again and stated that Dillinger and Van Heter appeared at his house again last might at approximately midnight to get something to eat. They stayed about an hour and a half. Hr. Butt [7] at whose house these gangsters are supposed to have appeared, knew Yan Heter before. He stated that they were very arrogent the first time they come to his place, but last night were apparently very tired. They were driving a bright red Ford A model delivery truck, similar to a small grecory delivery truck. Each had a "tossy" and a wast. According to their statement, they had apparently driven 700 miles since the morning before. Dillinger is apparently suffering from wounds. He has two wounds on the right inside thigh. Aubrey Rutt is very anxious that Agents be placed inside his house so that they will be there in the event Dillinger and Van Meter return. with Mr. Purvis had sent Agent Deversux to interview Mr. Wicht at Fert Wayne. I agreed with Mr. Parvist suggestion that some expert Agents be placed in ... the house. I also suggested that he advise Mr. Connelley confidentially about the delivery truck. Er. Purvis felt that at least four Agents should be placed in this house, but I suggested that he use only three. He will : handle this lead in that manner.

Mr. Purvis stated that at Richmond, Phio, Mr. Connelley found a place where an automobile had been purchased for \$325 by two men and one woman, where they had also rented a house. The san who rented the house to them does not identify Hamilton. He is checking for further details.




EDIORANDUM FOR MR. CONLAY



With reference to the photostatic copies of certain documents sent under date of May 7, in connection with John Oblilinger and associates, careful examination has been made of these documents to determine whether or not they contain anything applicable to cryptography.

The letter addressed to Miss Evelyn Frechette appears to be the work of an unbalanced mind. The significance of the list of numbers and names in the letter addressed to Harry Pierpont has not been determined, but if it has a secret meaning it is doubtful whether the latter could be obtained from the small amount of text available. The sheet of paper found in the car recovered from one of the Dillinger gang and containing letters in three columns does not seem to have any cryptographic significance and we can throw no light upon the nature or purpose of the symbols.

It is regretted that we are unable to throw any light upon the last mentioned document which would seem the one most worthy of attention.

Edward Green, a notorious beak robber with a lengthy eriminal record, was shot and killed by Division Agents on April 3, 1934, at St. Paul, Minnesota, when he attempted to escape after obtaining baggage from the residence of a magro woman at St. Paul, Minnesota who had previously obtained it from an apartment where Green had been living. Green admitted, prior to his death, herhoring John Billinger at St. Paul and participating in the robberies of the Security Mational Bank at Slowx Falls, South Dakota and the Pirst Mational Bank at Mason City, Iows on March 6 and March 13, 1934, respectively, with Dillinger, John Samilton, Momer Van Motor, Yeary Carroll and Lester H. Gillis, alias George Baby Face Balance Bessie Skinner was accompanying Green at the time he was shot and she has been indicted by a Federal Green Jury at St. Paul, Minnesota on charges of conspiracy to harbor the fugitive John Billinger.

Evelys Prechette was arrested at Chicago, Illinois of April 9, 1934 by Special Agents of the Mivision of Investigation. It has been established that she was residing in the spartment with John Dillinger at St. Faul, Minnesota and assisted his in his escape on March 31st, after which she accompanied his to the spartment of Mrs. Augusta Salt. Evelys Frechette was accompanying Millinger when he was arrested at Tueson, Arisons on January 25, 1934, after which Dillinger was removed to the Crown Point, Indiana jail, from which he made his escape on March 3, 1934. Evelys Frechette has been indicted at St. Paul, Minnesota on charges of conspiracy to barbor the fugitive John Dillinger, and she will be brought to trial on May 15, 1934.

A Federal complaint was filed against Mrs. Issue Stave of Sault Sainte Marie, Michigan on April 21, 1934, charging her with harboring a fugitive from justice, after it had been established that she had harbored John Dillinger in her home on April 17, 1934. Dillinger appeared at Mrs. Stave's home on this occasion with John Hamilton, who is a brother of Mrs. Stave, and Patricia Cherrington, John Hamilton escaped from the Indiana State Prison, Michigan City, Indiana on September 26, 1933, where he was serving a sentence of 25 years for sute banditry and bank robbery.


Marie Marion Conforti, Mrs. Edward A. Grompton and Mrs. Melen Gillis were arrested at Little Bohemia Tavern, Epider Lake, Misconsin, on April 23, 1934, where they had been hiding with John Dillinger and other members of his gang, who it has been ascertained were John Emmilton, Moner Van Meter, Tomay Carroll, Lester Gillis alias George "Beby Face" Meleon, and Pat Beilly. Mrs. Gonforti and Mrs. Grompton were living with Moner Van Meter and Tomay Carroll as their wives. Mrs. Gillis is the wife of Lester Gillis, who shot and killed a Special Agent of the Division and seriously wounded a local officer during the raid on the Little Bohemis Tavern. Federal complaints have been filed against Mrs. Grompton, Marie Conforti and Mrs. Gillis, charging them with conspiring to harbor the fugitive John Dillinger.

There were recovered at the Little Bohemia Tavers, after Pillinger and his gang had escaped, two machine guns, several rifles and pistole, and part of these firearms were later traced through the factory to H. S. Lebean, San Antonie, Taxas, at the licensed gun dealer there. He was taken into sustedy and there were found in his business establishment more than 200 firearms of all descriptions, included among thick was a United States Government pistol, as a result of which a complaint was filed against him, sharping him with possession of stolem Government property. Lebean has admitted supplying the Dillinger gang with several machine guns, rifles and revolvers.

On May 3, 1934 information was received by the Division that John Dillinger was on board the S. S. "Duchess of York", a ship belonging to the Canadian Pacific Line, which was bound for Blasgow, Scotland. Arrangements were made through the Department of State with the officials of Scotland to have this boat dearched upon its arrival there. No trace of Billinger was found. However, one Trebilsch Lincoln, traveling under the name of Abbot Chae Engines found thereon and apprehended by the officials of Scotland Yard. Lincoln, who was a say during the World War, has caused the British government considerable trouble by his activities in fomenting a rebellion scong the British colonies in India and various other activities of a rebellious nature against the British government.

Vermon Taylor, Benry Bopkins and Thelms Mitchell were arrosted by Division Agents, State and local officials, at Richmond, Indiene on may 11, 1934, after information had been received that they had been identified as being members of the Dillinger game. " At the time of their arrest they had in their possession one Lugar automatic fitted with a .35 shot drum for use as a machine gum, a Winchester sewed off automatic whot gun and a 1903 Springfield rifle and examition. Taylor had in his possession \$600, the source of which he refused to reveal, and it is believed that this money was obtained in a bank robbery. They have been identified from their photographs as taking part in the robbery of a bank at South Vienna, Ohio, at which time the President of the bank was killed, and they will be removed to that point for prosecution by the State authorities on the aurder charge. They are also wented by the Sheriff at Marysville, Ohio for the recent robbery of a bank at that place.

The Pivision of Investigation has also established that Dr. H. G. Mortensen treated Millinger and other members of his gang for bullet wounds at St. Paul, Minnesote on Harch 14, 1934. Br. Nortensen is an ex-Pest Commander of the Incrisen Legion, President of the American Legion Respital of Minnesota, President of the State Board of Realth of the State of Minnesota, and City Sealth Commission of the City of St. Faul, Minnesote. Be was a sandidate for the post of County Coroner about four years ago and was planning to again. agnounce his candidacy for Coroner within the next for weeks, 789 Although Dr. Bortonsen has not been arrested, he has been questions concerning this matter and admitted treating Millinger and high associate, John Bamilton, on March 14, 1934, the day following the robbery of the First Sational Bank at Mason City, Iowa, for gum shot wounds. There was recently found in a garage at Owen. Wisconsin, a Ford V8 automobile which apparently had been abandoned by some of the Dillinger gang at Owen, after the car had developed some sort of engine trouble. The car was left at the B. & O. Garage, and the charges on this car for storage, repairs and delivery into St. Paul have been paid and voucher will be subsequently submitted therefor. Found in the car was a copy of the Nashville, Tennessee Banner for April 10, 1934, a copy of the Nashville Evening Tennessean of the same date, a road map, and a bottle of pills. The newspapers, road map and bottle of pills are being enclosed in two cellophane envelopes as this might be the means of identifying some of the Dillinger gang, as having been present at Owen on that date.

The operator of the B.& O. Garage has furnished a description of the parties who left the car there for repair and the descriptions to some extent fit that of "Baby Face" Nelson and Pat Cherrington, but upon examination of photographs, this individual is of the opinion that the occupants of the car were PAT REILLY and PAT CHERRINGTON. It is not deemed necessary to obtain fingerprints of the various mechanics and garage owners and agents who have handled these papers, and it is suggested that the latent prints be compared with the prints of the following:







May 4. The typewritten note which reads "Dear Marie We're all fine, etc." was written on an L.C. Smith elite typewriter. In none of the cases at present under investigation in the territory in which the Dillinger gangsters are operating was an L.C. Smith elite size typewriter used and, therefore, no comparison of this typing with other cases has been made.

The stationery recovered was examined for physical characteristics which will enable a comparison with the stationery of other letters to be made. The watermark which appeared in both the envelope and paper "HYTONE" is that manufactured by the Western Tablet and Stationery Company, St. Joseph, Missouri. It is apparently used rather frequently in the Mid-West and is probably to be purchased from chain stores.

The handwriting on the road chart in the notebook "The Atlas" series No. 1000, was compared with the road charts "Des Moines, Minneapolis, and St. Paul by side roads", dated February 22, 1934, which was previously forwarded. It is the conclusion of the examiner that these handwritings are not similar, although the general appearance is similar because the same style of writing is employed. It is concluded that the handwriting on the road chart in the notebook "The Atlas" is not the same as that in the letter to the Chief of Police,

Huron, Michigan, dated March 17th, or the letter to Winchell from Milwaukee, or the letter to the Daily News at New York, the latter of which was signed J. Dillinger.

Many of the slips of paper with so-called poetry and other notations are in the same handwriting. This handwriting might be that of Dillinger so far as can be told from a comparison with his signature on a fingerprint card only. As soon as better specimens of his writing are submitted it may be possible to make a definite conclusion regarding all these specimens. It is probable that the road chart was written by this person and this person might be a woman. The comparison of the handwriting on these slips of paper with the previous road chart of February 22nd, and with the anonymous letters already referred to did not result in any identification.

The writing in the note addressed "Dearest Jean" and signed "Dick" is not similar to that on the road chart or the other writing and is different from the anonymous letters.

The blue covered loose-leaf notebook appears to be that of a woman and the notations appear to be those of a woman. It should be noted that the name Marie Costel, 2631 M Clair is written on the back of the top cover as though this were the name of the person who owned it. This notebook appears to be a complimentary favor. It bears on the cover the name of the Grand Lodge of Illinois, Loyal Orange Institution of U.S.A. and Ladies Loyal Orange Institution. Perhaps the owner of the notebook belongs to one of these organizations.

On the back of the blue covered loose-leaf notebook is the name R. Donnan, 159 N. State Street, Capital Building, Room 1433, Central 0638, Chicago. This is stamped on with a rubber stamp. The handwriting is believed to be different from the road charts or the anonymous letters but it is the same general style. It appears, therefore, that in all probability at least three individuals wrote the specimens considered, all of whom write with a style which is not greatly varied from one to the other of the specimens. It is probable that they came from the same general section of the country and are of approximately the same age. This writing style is that employed by Dillinger as far as can be told from his signatures.

A report on the fingerprints will be submitted separately.

Two pairs of holes are punched in the side of the short and it is possible that one of the pairs was punched in order to make the short fit in a notebook of a different size. One pair is 8.90 inches apart and the other pair 6.85 inches. As the note is handprinted no comparison can be made with the head of John Dillinger but from the contents of the note it is probable that he had nothing to 40 with 18.

The envelope measures 4.70 by 8.65 by .0068 inches and is made up of a rough finish white paper bearing no materiarite.

My name is LAWRENCE W. SALT and my residence is 1835 Park Avenue, Minnespolis, Minnesota. I make this statement freely and voluntarily, knowing that it is being made to a Federal officer.

"My mother's name is Mrs. Augusta Salt and she paid the rent on the flat which we occupied on the first floor of the building located at 1835 Park Avenue in Minneapolis.

"On or about Saturday, March 31, 1934, at about six or seven o'clock, I came to my home at 1835 Park Avenue for the purpose of getting suppor, and my mother at first acted as if she were mad and asked me why I had come back and told me to go on back down town. I did leave the house when my mother told me this. My mother asked me whether I had been drinking and I told her that I had not; and I had not been drinking on that occasion. This now seems to me to have been an excuse so she could get me out of the house. I me accustomed to sleeping, on most nights, in the back room of this flat at 1835 Park Avenue but I did not sleep in this back room that night.

"The next day, which was probably Sunday, I had Sunday dinner at my home, 1835 Park Avenue, and there was present at dinner my mother (Mrs. Augusta Salt); a dark-complexioned, black-haired woman whose photograph I have identified and which photograph is marked "Evelyn Frechette"; myself, and probablymy younger brother MALLACE. A short time before dinner, my sister, Mrs. Helge Asmodt, and her husband and, I believe, two other people, came into my mother's flat and I saw my mother talking to them and they departed afterwards.

"I remember that on one day while this dark-complexioned, black-haired woman was there, I asked my mother whether this woman was half Megro.

"On Monday or Tuesday following the above mentioned Sunday dinner, I came into the flat at 1835 Park Avenue, and there was a man there who was seated in the front room and I saw a profile view of him and he looks like the photograph which has been shown to me and which photograph is marked "John Dillinger". At the same time, the dark-haried woman, Evelyn Frechette, was in the same front room, and she was facing me and I could see her full face.

"Late in the evening on the Wednesday following the above mentioned Sunday dinner, I saked my mother who that men was whom I had seen in the front room with the dark-haired woman, Evelyn Frechette, and my mother stated, after hesitating, that it was John Dillinger. I saked her what she was going to see about it and whether she was going to report that he was there; and she said, "No. Don't bother me", and said something about being afraid to report it.

"I recall having seen in the bathroom what I believe to be .22 caliber cartridge shalls which I believe my younger brother had brought into the house after attending the Sportsman's show, He in fact told me that he got them there. This is the only summittion that I saw in the flat during the time that the darkhaired Frechette girl and Dillinger were in the flat, and I saw no guns or weapons of any type.

"I have on previous occasions seen Dr. C. E. May at my mother's flat at 1835 Park Avenue; and he has to my knowledge treated patients there and my mother has waited on these patients. All the patients that Dr. May had in my mother's flat previously were girls or women.

"I talked with my mother on one occasion about her helping in performing abortions and urged her to quit this type of work; and she stated that her sons were not working at the time and she needed money to help support the family.

The origin for investigation in this district regarding James Bogers, was a letter from Inspector V. A. Barer, St. Paul, dated Harch 8, 1934, in the Bremer case, which letter recited that it had been ascertained that a car, bearing California license Eq. 6-H-475, issued to James Bogers of 154 Eastwood Brive in Ban Francisco, for a 1936 Budson Sedem, was suspected by the Eheriff's Office of Hanneyin Downty, Minneapolis, of having been that involved in the barder of Theologe Eidder of Minneapolis.

The James Bogers who purchased a Plymouth ear in Valleje, California, in Jamuary, 1934, and later traded same in San Francisco a yeak later for a Hudson Sedan, is one and the same person as George "Baby Face" Welson, and the following Investigation conducted by this effice, and reported in letter from the San Francisco Office to Inspector Borer at St. Paul, dated March 26, 1934, in the Bremer case, therefore becomes pertinent, and is set out herein in detail:



MEMORANDUM

I telephoned Mr. Nathan at Chicago this evening. He has interviewed all of the Agents of the Chicago Office who were present at the Little Bohamia shooting with the exception of four who are out of town. Incidentally, these four were not actually present at the time of the shooting, but arrived later.

I told him that Agent Hall of the St. Paul Office will have to be in New York on the 18th of this month, and I particularly desired Mr. Nathan to arrive in St. Paul before Mr. Hall's departure for New York. I asked Mr. Nathan to give particular attention to the questioning of Mr. Hall, Mr. Borer and Mr. Hanni, and suggested that he interview the executives last. Mr. Nathan said he would use the same list of questions at St. Paul that he used for the Chicago Agents. He mailed the Chicago interviews to the Division today. I told him to ask the Agents specifically if they had talked to Mr. Cullen, and to indicate to Mr. Hanni that much of the information in his memorandum is identical with information in Mr. Cullen's possession. I suggested to Mr. Nathan that if Mr. Hanni states that he was not present at the time the shooting occurred, it might be well to indicate to him that his conclusions concerning the manner in which the situation was handled would not seem to be fair. I also asked Mr. Nathan to discuss carefully with Mr. Hanni the matter of cooperation with local law enforcement agencies.

Mr. Nathan stated he has ten applicants to interview tomorrow in Chicago. He will leave tomorrow night, arriving in St. Paul Saturday.


