Subjects Harry Pierpout, Russell Clark, Charles Makley and John Dillinger apprehended by Tucson, Arizona, Police Department on January 25, 1934.

Subjects accompanied by the following women: Mrs. Herry Pierpont, Berniese Thompson, May M. Miller and Ann Martin.

Subject Pierpont was in possession of a 1936/Buick Sedan, Motor Number 2866900, Serial Number 2707596, bearing 1936 Florida plates 2-692.

Subject Makley was apprehended in possession of a Studebaker Club Sedan, Motor Number C 24056, Serial Number 8048836, bearing Florida plates D 13-375. It is noted on this automobile that the last numeral in the motor number and the serial number (the 6) may have been added to the motor and serial numbers.

About 8 P.M. on January 25, 1934, Frank Sullivan and Ann Martin were apprehended in a Andson Club Sedan, Engine Number 30071, Serial Rumber 252007, bearing 1935 Visconsia plates 27-001.

It appears that the Studebaker Club Sedan entered the State of Arizona at Benson, Arizona, on January 21, 1934; that the Buick Sedan entered Arizona on the same date. The Budson Sedan bore no tag of the Arizona Highway Patrol showing entry into the State of Arizona.

Subject John Dillinger was booked under the elias of Frank Sullivan and the papers pertaining to the Hudson Club Sedan reveal that this car was purchased from the Hudson-Francton Motor Car Company, 4535 Delmar Blvd., St. Louis, Missouri.

Subject Dillinger had in his possession \$6875.44 and later \$500 in currency was found on his person. Subject Dillinger was taken to the Pima County Jail at Tucson, Arizone, and in a further search made of his person \$2000 was found in a money belt.

A search of the premises occupied by subject Dillinger and Ann Martin at 1504 E. 5th Street, Tucson, Arizona, revealed a money bag containing an amount of money not determined at the present time. Among the money found in the possession of subject Dillinger were Mational Bank Motes on the First Mational Bank of East Chicago, Indiana, bearing the serial numbers, in part, as follows: A000919 to A001107.

On January 26, 1954, the information concerning the five dollar notes found in the possession of subject Dillinger was communicated by telegraph to the Chicago Division Office by the writer on advice of Special Agent in Charge, J. R. P. Dunn, of Los Angeles.

Subject Pierpont had on his person a sum of \$94.81. Mrs. Pierpont having \$5116.20. Subject Clark had a sum of \$1264.70; subject Makley \$794.09.

Subjects Clark and Makley when further searched in the Pina County Jail had additional swas in the amount of \$6000 on their persons in money balts.

From information furnished by the Tucson Police Officers it is the understanding of Agent that the subjects were registered at the Congress Hotel in Tucson, Arizona, on Monday, January 22, 1934, at which time there was a fire in the Congress Hotel. Subjects paid local firemen \$12 each to rescue certain baggage which subjects had in their rooms in the Congress Hotel. These local firemen, after this occurrence and while reading a magazine article concerning the fugitive subjects, recognized subjects as the persons who had occupied rooms in the Congress Hotel. They reported this fact to local police and the Sheriff Department. A trace was made of the baggage taken from the Congress Hotel and it was determined that the baggage had been taken to 927 M. 2nd Avenue. Officers from the Tucson Police Department went to the above address on the afternoon of January 25, and there apprehended subject Clark after a struggle in which no shooting took place. Subject Makley was followed to the Grabe Electric Company on Congress Street and he was there apprehended. After the apprehension of these two subjects one of the local motorcycle officers recalled that he had reprimended a person in a Buick Sedan a few nights provious and went to an auto camp at the corner of 6th Avenue and 19th Street and the apprehended subject Pierpont who was preparing a hasty departure from Tucson. Subject Pierpont was brought to the Tucson Police . Department and while being formally questioned by Chief of Police C. A. Wollard, and other officers, drew guns from his person and attempted to shoot Chief of Police Wollard, but was unable to do so by intervention of other officers.

About 8 P.M. January 25, 1934, subject John Dillinger was apprehended in front of the premises at \$27 M. And Avenue, together with Ann Martin. Upon being searched at the Police Department an address was noted as 1304 M. 5th Street, and when these premises were searched, additional money, machine guns, assumition and baggage of the subjects was located.

Also subjects were identified from fingerprints and classifications on file in the office of Mark L. Bobbins, Superintendent of the Bureau of Identification, Tucson Police Department and there is no doubt that subjects are the fugitives wanted by the Indiana Penitentiary authorities and also wanted for bank robberies and murders in the vicinity of Chicago, Ill.

Chiof of Police Wollard has received various communications by telegraph and long distance telephone from police authorities in Ohio, Indiana, Visconsin and Illinois. It is stated that all four subjects, together with the women, are wanted for bank robberies and jail breaks.

On the morning of January 26, 1934, subjects were arraigned before Justice of the Peace C. V. Budlong on charges of being fugitives from justice. All were held for preliminary hearing set for Tuesday, January 30, 1934, at 10 A.M., and bond set at \$100,000 each for the men subjects. Mrs. Pierpont is being held as a material witness on a charge placed against subject Pierpont of attempted assault on Chief of Police Wollard.

At the time of writing this memorandum, the women companions of subjects have not been fingerprinted and no effort has been made to itentify them, but telegraphic communications received by Chief Wollard from the Indiana State Penitentiary at Michigan City, Indiana, indicated that one of the women may be Mary Kinder, who is also wanted in the vicinity of Chicago, Illinois, on bank robbery and murder charges.

At the preliminary hearing 2 Winchester 351 caliber rifles, mounted as machine guns, and 3 Thompson sub-maching guns were introduced as evidence, together with 5 bullet-proof wests taken from the baggage of the subjects. The total amount of money found in possession of all subjects has not been computed at the present time, but it is stated to amount to about \$25,000. This sum of money was also introduced as evidence before the Justice Court in order that it might not be used by subjects for attorney's fees and for bonds.

since the apprehension of the above subjects numerous calls have been received by the Sheriff's Office and the Police Department, in which it is stated that two more members of the Dillinger gang were yet in the vicinity of Tueson. Due to the excitement resulting from the apprehension of the above-numed subjects, no concentrated effort has been made to locate the two remaining subjects believed to be in this vicinity. It is thought that these two subjects might be John Hamilton and Hilton O. Crouch.

Agent has been assisting local officers in the identification of the subjects, in shecking the automobiles involved, and in attempting to trace the money found in possession of the subjects. Any further important information ascertained will be immediately communicated to the Los Angeles Office.

Mr. Dunn requested to be advised whether Endres should interview Dillinger and these men if he had not already done so. I told Mr. Dunn that if they had not already been interviewed, Endres, who is in Tucson, should endeavor to interview them and obtain any information possible.

#### MEMORANDUM FOR THE ATTORNEY GENERAL

1934, advising of the apprehension of John Dillinger and his associates at Tucson, Arizona, on January 25, 1934, please he advised that I am now in receipt of information from the Los Angeles Office, of the Division, relative to the details surrounding the apprehension of these individuals.

It appears from the records of the Arisons Rightsy Patrol that the Studebaker Club Sedsm, bearing Florida license plates, D-13-373, and the Buick Sedsm, bearing Florida license plates, 2-692, which were found in the possession of these eriminals had entered the State of Arisons on Jamuary 21, 1934. The entry of the Eudson Club Sedsm, bearing Fisconsin plates 27001, into the State of Arisons, was not recorded by the Righmany Patrol.

These criminals registered at the Congress Hotel in Tucson, on January 22, 1934 on which day there occurred a fire at the hotel and the subjects each paid local firemon \$12.08 to rescue certain beggage which they had abendoned in their rooms. These firemen later observed photographs in a magazine, which they identified as resembling the fugitives, and reported this fact to the local police and the Sheriff. The beggage taken from the Congress Hotel was traced to 927 North 2nd Ivenue where, on the afternoon of January 25th, subject Bussell Clark was arrested after a struggle in which no shooting took place. Subject Charles Hakley was observed on the streets of Tucson and trailed to the Grabe Hiestric Company, where he was apprehended.

After the apprehension of these two individuals, ene of the local motorcycle efficers recalled that he had reprinended a person in a Buick Seden a few mights previous, who was stopping at an auto camp at the commer of 6th Avenue and 19th Street. Officers immediately went to this location where they apprehended subject Harry Pierpont, who was preparing to make a heaty departure from Tucson. When brought into the Tucson police station few questioning by Chief of Police C. A. Vollard, Pierpont unexpectedly drew guns but was overpowered before bringing them into action.

Forth 2nd Avenue, subject John Dillinger was arrested at about \$400 P.M., when he arrived with one Ann Martin. Spon being searched at the police station, there was found on his person the address of 1304 - East 5th Street, which was immediately searched and machine guns, assumition and baggage belonging to the fugitives were located.

Subject Dillinger had in his possession at the time of arrest \$7,175.44, and in a later search of his person at the Pime County Jail, an additional sum of \$2,000.00 was found hidden in a soney belt. Included in this currency were national bank notes, on the First Bational Bank of East Chicago, Indiana, bearing consecutive serials, numbers A-000919 to A-001107, which have been identified as part of the loot taken from that bank at the time of its rebberge.

Subject Pierpont had in his possession the sun of \$99.51, but Mrs. Pierpont surrendered \$7,116.20.

Subjects Clark and Makley had sums of \$1,264.70 and \$794.09, respectively, and a later search of the last two-named at the Pina County Sail disclosed additional sums amounting to \$6,000.00 hidden in money belts.

On the morning of January 26, 1934, these fugitives were arreigned before Justice of the Peace C. V. Budlong, on charges of fugitives from justice. They were held for preliminary hearing set for Tuesday, January 30, 1934, and bonds were fixed at \$100,000.00 each.

Chief of Police Wollard has received various communications by telegraph and long distance telephone from police suthorities in Indians, Ohio, Wisconsin and Illinois, indicating that the fugitives are wanted by them for crimes committed in their respective districts.

At the hearing before Justice of the Peace Budlong, two Winchester .351 caliber rifles, mounted as machine guns and three Thompson sub-mechine guns were introduced as evidence, together with five bullet proof vests taken from the baggage of the subjects, Attorney General

The total amount of money found in their possession, exceeding \$25,000,00, was also introduced as evidence in order that it might not be used by subjects for atterneys! fees, or for bonds.

Special Agents of the Division are at the present time checking the automobiles found in the pessession of these fugitives inasmuch as it appears that there has possibly been a violation of the Estimal Motor Vehicle Theft Act.

The Division entered this investigation shortly after the marder of Josse Serber, at Line, Ohio, when it was learned that an automobile found abandoned by these subjects at Hamilton, Ohio, had been stolen from its owner at Chicago, Illinois.

These subjects have been questioned by Special Agents of the Division for any information they might have concerning the Hamm or Brewer Kidneping cases, but no information of value was obtained which would implicate any of the members of this game.

a new note of gang menace in Indiana was sounded Saturday by Al Feeney, state director of safety,

Al Feeney, state director of safety, who expressed himself as "happy to the limit" over the apprehension of four members of the John Dillinger terror mob in Tucson, Aris.

"Let us not be overly cheered by the arrest of this one gang," Feeney said. "There are other gangs in this state who have been fanned to accret activity by the success of the Dillinger gang. If the Dillinger gang obtained \$2,000 in a job, the word was passed out that they got twice that amount. that amount.

Feeney Has "Lowdown."

"Spurred on by these tales of easy money, other lads just as tough and ruthless as Dillinger and his boys. are waiting the opportunity to begin

operations.

This department knows plenty about a number of these new fellows who are liable to start any time. We are not idle and Indiana is going to be a safe place to live if we possibly do anything about nabbing these fellows.

Feeney said he was going to Washington Sunday to confer with Senator Royal S. Copeland, of New York, on a law which he proposes in regard to crime extinction.

The law, he said, was used extensively in the Philippine islands in the administration of President Taft. The practically forgotten law, Feeney said, dealt extensively with persons who were guilty of associating with criminals, "tipping them off" to the action or investigation of police or informing them as to the location of sums of money easily obtainable.

Convictions Difficult. "The great trouble we experience in this state," Feeney said, "is ob-taining conviction of an arrested man on a specific charge. The law to which I refer and the one I am go-ing to take up in Washington makes it a twenty-year penitentiary of-fense for any person even as much as to associate with a known crim-inal. Through its use, crime could be nipped in the bud. Of course the law used in the Philippine islands called for the removal of the crimdone away with."

Feeney also said he would confer with J. Edgar Hoover, of the United States bureau of identification, concerning Indiana's road blockade system used in the search for the Dillinger terror gang. Hoover, he said, is much interested in the Hoosier



## Makley South Anniverself Less Conterned Over Self

Rich But Dishonest Son of Poor But Honest Parents Denies

B's a long time since 1906 and it's many miles from St. Marys, a little mill and farming town on the banks of the St. Mary's river, to the Pima county jall in Tucson where I found Charlie Makley last night, but despite his 44 years and his reputation for being the "hardest guy of the Dillinger mob," Makley is still much like the young blacksmith I know

me. I'm clear of that.

"How about the Shanley killing in Chicago?" I asked. "Were you in that jam?"

"You mean when that copper was killed? No, that was a one-man job. Hamilton bumped him off and was recognized when he did it. They have nothing of that rap on me."

"How about the Lima break out, Charlie, when Jess Sarber was shot?" "I didn't do that," said Makley, but added no other comment about the flamboyant jail break which released John Dillinger, but which cost Sheriff Sarber his life.

Hot for Leach

They would have been more facing us if they had crowded us a bit more back there in Indiana," said Makley, "it was that guy Matt Leach that we were hot for."

"He's the one that's coming after you Charlie. He's on his way now." "Well, he'll be glad to see us," said Makley with a wry smile, "but it will be one-sided, I don't want to see him."

We then dropped the past and drifted down to the present and the incidents that brought the Dillinger mob into the Pima county jail. "How did you come to pick Tucson for a stop over, Charlie. It's a darned poor place for a hideout."

"No, it was a good hideout. I had been here before, but this time the boys got the breaks. By the way, I hear that it was at the fire that we were tipped off, is that right?"

"Yes, that's the dope," I snswered and told him of the revealing pictures in the detective story that William Benedict and Robert Freeman read at the fire department which showed them who it was that owned the baggage they had carried out of the fire.

"Well I'll be damned," said Charlie, "that sure was getting the breaks, wasn't it. But these boys worked smooth at that and in addition had some luck. Well, here 28 years ago when as a kid I watched him shoe my father's horses.

Older, it's true, but with no visible regrets regarding the path he chose to travel, that is, except one. "I am sorry for the Makley's," said Chartie, "for you know they were some pretty good people, They are not like the; they were honest at least, even it never rich.

honest, at least, even if never rich. But I picked my own way. I tried both ways or living and the other way didn't furnish the type of living I wanted. Look at my dad, he worked like the devil all his life and what did he get out of

"But I guess anything said shout me can't do much harm. It has been said. They have accused us of many things we had nothing to do with. For instance, this attachment today, which ties me up with a bank job in Michigan City, Indiana. On the day that bank was robbed I bought a car in Jackson ville, Florida, and the sheriff here has the bill of sale dated and attested to prove it. But what's the difference? I'm faced with so many raps that one more will make no difference only that is one thay got wrong."

Began As Blacksmith Makley who, in his youth, was raised in the buggy and wagon works of his father and uncle in St. Marys, was taught that trade and also learned general blacksmithing. He went to school in St. Marys, both the parochial and public schools. He was well known there for his participation in the ordinary contests of boyhood in a town so small that its boyish bas ball was something that everyone turned out to see. But St. Marys and a blacksmith shop offered little in the way of advancement and Makley, as he puts it "wented to live." He left the little town on the river bank and thena long road, but as he phrases it.
"I have lived as long in 60 minutes at times as my dad did in 40 years It's all what you make it and sometimes it is a close decision.

The governor said he had talked with Prosecutor E. M. Botkin and that the Allen county prosecutor, whose duty it will be to prosecute the sheriff's slayer, is willing that Dillinger be returned to Indiana,

The governor said Botkin offered the opinion that Dillinger and Harry Pierpont, Charles Makley, and Russell Clark, the trio captured with him, can be returned to Indiana without extradition proceed-ings as escaped convicts. Then the latter three can be extradited to Ohio.

Governor White said Botkin told him that Dillinger probably can be more successfully prosecuted at East Chicago where he is wanted for the killing of a policeman. Dill-inger was in jail at Lima when Sheriff Sarber was killed and had no part in the actual alaying.

Dear Sir:

I am returning to you this date, under separate cover by Registered Mail, the bullets that were transmitted to this office by you under date of December 8, 1933, said bullets having been used in the murder of Sheriff Jesse Sarber at Lima. Ohio. A thorough ballistic examination has been made of these bullets at the Northwestern Crime Detection Laboratory, under the direction of Colonel Goddard. They were compared with bullets from various guns in the possession of the Ballistics Department of the Chicago Police Department, but no resemblance was found between them in any particular manner. However, at the time these tests were made, the Chicago Police Department had in their possession the gun of Harry Copeland, which was a Colt .38 Super-Automatic Serial 14167, Copeland being at the present time incarcerated in the Indiana State Penitentiary in Michigan City, Michigan, having been one of the members of the original Dillinger gang. The result of bullets fired from Copeland's gun was that while there is some similarity, this similarity is not sufficient to render a decision, and the general report on this examination would be negative.

However, there are being forwarded to you in the same box, five bullets fired from the Colt .38 Super-Automatic, Serial #1314, taken from Harry OPierpont at the time of his arrest at Tucson, Arizona, by the Tucson, Arizona, Police Department. This gun is now in the possession of Captain E. A. Eyman of the Tucson, Arizona, Police. These bullets were fired in the presence of Special Agent T. F. Mullen, of this office, on the outskirts of Crown Point, Indiana, on February 10, and the same are being forwarded to you for a laboratory test to be made in comparison with the bullets used in the murder of Sheriff Sarber at Lima, Ohio.

Captain Eyman has further advised Agent Mullen that the remainder of the guns taken from the Dillinger mob arrested at Tucson are now in possession of the Chief of Police there, and that a request upon him for bullets to be fired from these various guns, for ballistics purposes, would be granted immediately.

Agent also learned that telephone calls had been made from Room 529 on January 12th, 15th, 15th, and 15th, the numbers called not being available, and that on January 18th long Distance Operator No. 77 at Chicago attempted to put through calls to Room 529 at 7:50, 8:00, and 9:00 P.M., finally leaving word for any occupant of that room to call her when they came in at 12:00 midnight, the party came in and the message was given to who went to one of the public telephone booths in the lobby, immediately returning to tell the clerk that the coin box was damaged and then going back to the other booth to make his call from Watkins 9-9218.

Information received that Herry Pierpont, John Dillinger, Charles Makley, Homer Van Meter, and John Hamilton left Detroit yesterday; headed for New York City; all escaped convicts from Michigan City, Indiana penitentiary; also wanted bank rebbery and murder. See our recent five-page circulars giving all photos and descriptions. All heavily aimed. All wear bullet-proof vests. Have two or three women with them. May be using names Has two Essex Terraplane cars, one Louisiana license #220-780, and the other, a Michigan license number, unknown. One Essex, dark steel grey in color, and one black Essex Sedan. Agent also learned from Ligut, Michael McNamars, of the Main Office Division, who had been working on the case, that the steel grey Essex Terraplane with Louisiana plates had been located on January 9th in the Hudson Garage at Hoboken. New Jersey, where it had since been under constant surveillance by the Hoboken police; that it was brought to the garage on January 9th by a man and a woman who shecked it in under the name of the Dew Orleans, La. that the license plates were removed by the man, after which both persons changed their elothes in the basement of the garage.

stated that one James Murray of Chicago, Ill offered for sale at Chicago, Ill., United States Treasury Coupon Mond No. 35381-A. Fourth Liberty Loan Coupon Bonds Nos. B-016888402 and K-00790050; he has information to the effect that Murray pledged as security with the Fauerbach Brewing Company, Chicago, Ill., Fourth Liberty Loan Bond No. G-01688307, all of the above bonds being in denominations of \$1,000.00 each and all negotiable. He further stated these bonds belonged to customers of the St. Marys, Ohio, bank, and were on deposit there as guaranty for subscriptions for new stock. He also stated that the robbers obtained a Federal Reserve Bank stock certificate, number not known, belonging to that bank, face value \$2,850.00. He further stated he has information to the effect that Murray attempted to sell Mr. F. C. Huntington, 936 East Epler Ave., Indianapolis, Ind., a private detective employed by the International Surety Company, First Liberty Loan Registered Bonds Nos. 3154, 3155, 3156, and 3157, all the property of Miss Cora Smith, St. Marys, Ohio, all of which bonds were taken from the St. Marys Bank by the robbers. He further advised that Fourth Liberty Loan Bonds Nos. 560428 and 510062 belonging to W. C. Clover and J. E. Heap respectively, St. Marys, Ohio, and First Liberty Loan Bonds Nos. 36714, and 36715, belonging to Ed Gernett, St. Marys, Ohio, were among the bonds stolen by the robbers. I mentioned the friendship of Tobin with the President and the Attorney General and also advised him of the connection of Scott Stewart, attorney for the Touhy mob, with this matter. Mr. Purvis stated that he knows of a Mr. Mc horter in the Post Office Department and suggested that this may be the man referred to. He will make discreet inquiry in the matter immediately.

This effice was in receipt of a telegram from the Detroit Office on February 7, 1934, requesting the shipment record on a Chevrolet Sedan, motor number 3879192 on the same date your telegram was received requesting information concerning Jack Cooper Transportation Company, Inc., Fenses City, Riesburi, as to whether or not it was a reputable concern, and, if so, to escertain if they sold the Chevrolet Sedan mentioned in the telegram from the Detroit Office, and requesting further information concerning the purchaser thereof.

This is to confirm our telegram reporting furt the Jack Cooper Transportation Company enjoys a good reputation in Vanses City, Missouri. Also that the instant car was sold by this company to Mrs. A. H. Moore, 1709 Collum Street, Birmingham, Alabama, and that Mrs. Moore is a eister of Jack Cooper. This car was sold on September B, 1932, and was driven to Birmingham, Alabama, by S. J. Morgan, son of Mrs. Moore.

Investigation discloses that this car was sold by the Chevrolet factory at Leeds, Kaneas City, Missouri, to the Feld Chevrolet Company, Kaneas City, Kaneas, and that subsequently this company sold the instant car to Jack Cooper on September 5, 1952.

Mr. Cooper, who is also a dealer, states that he purchased the car for his sister from Birmingham, Alabama, and that on the same date that the car was bought from the Feld Chevrolet Company it was turned over immediately to C. J. Morgan, his nephew. The Bill of Sale to the car was sent to Mrs. Moore about a week after the above transaction took place. At the time the car left Kaneas City it bore Kaneas tags, which were obtained through the Feld Motor Company.

The Jack Cooper Transportation Company, Inc., engages in the business of transporting Chevrolet cars which are manufactured at the Chevrolet plant at Leeds, Kansas City, Missouri. Mr. Cooper advises that during the course of a day some hundred cars are sent to him by the Chevrolet plant for delivery in the surrounding States. No inquiries were made at the Chevrolet plant with regard to the reputation of Mr. Cooper inasmuch as he has a personal connection with the plant.

The Better Business Bureau, at Kansas City, Missouri, advises that they have nover been in receipt of any complaint indicating that the Cooper Transportation Company does not enjoy a good reputation.

For the information of the Birmingham Office it is noted that when an Agent from this office conducted his investigation at the Cooper Transportation Company he talked with C. J. Morgan, son of krs. Moore, who stated that he had just arrived at Kansas City from Birmingham, Alabams, and he appeared quite anxious to know the nature of the present investigation.

It further appeared to Agent that employees at the Gooper Transportation Company sere quite reticent about divulging any information concerning this car.

further advised that he had recently seen a 1932 model Studebaker convertible coupe, bearing 1934 Arizona plates AU-18-T, in front of 112 "B" St., the residence of Mrs. Eva M. Donald, a relative of the Hootens and Clarks.

On January 25, 1954 Agent proceeded to New Gross Plains, Indiana, where it was learned that Larry Hooten has an unclessor, Larry Hooten, residing at that point; that his father, John Hooten is deceased, and that his mother, Maggie Hooten, is a wider and it engaged in housework. As a result of numerous guarded inquiries it was learned that no strangers had been frequenting this section for the past six months. The country is exceedingly rough and hilly and could be regarded as an ideal hide-out for the Subjects.

In answer to an inquiry from the Motor Vehicle
Division, Department of State, Phoenix, Arizona, the Cincinnati Division
Office was advised that 1934 Arizona plates fu-187 had not been issued
but that 1935 Arizona plates of that number were issued to M. S. Bailey,
Catman, Arizona, for a 1928 Studebaker sabridlet, motor VB-7380, serial
number 70-0E-3189.

Om January 24, 1934, while covering the home of Leroy and Maomi Hooten, 108 Lawn Ave., Agent located this car while driving on a street in Hamilton. The machine was covered with mid and it was difficult to view the driver, and in attempting to follow this car the car was lost in the traffic. Agent assumed that possibly the owner of this car might be connected with Subjects.

On January 25, 1934, a telegram was received from the Los Angeles Division Office, advising that Subjects Clark and Makley were in custody of police at Tucson, Arizona. Another telegram on the same date from the Los Angeles Division Office advised that Subject Pierpont had also been taken in custody by the police at Tucson, Arizona.

Immediately upon receipt of this information, Special Agent J. S. Johnson, Special Agent H. B. Elein and this Agent proceeded to Hamilton, Chio and carefully covered the home of Leroy and Hacmi Hooten, 108 Lawn Ave., believing that Subject John Hamilton, who had not been apprehended, or possibly Joseph Fox, might be in hiding at the Hooten house or at some other place and being wisited by the Hootens. No information of value was obtained at that time, and the following night arrangements were made with Hamilton, Chio police and Butler County Sheriff's Office officers whereby Leroy and Hacmi Hootes were taken to the Hamilton Police Department, where they were questioned.

Leroy Hooten, after considerable persuasion, finally admitted that Harry Copeland and Subject Shouse had called at the home of his father and mother-in-law to visit his (Hooten's) wife sometime during the early part of October, 1933. He also later admitted that he knew Subjects occupied a camp located on the Miami River approximately ten miles south-west of Hamilton, but declined to state that his wife

has visited them, although he intimated that he knew that she knew they were occupying this same. Then questioned concerning his departure from Hamilton and presence in Phoenix, Arizona during the latter part of Movember and first part of December, 1935, Hooten stated that the trip was made in his Chevrolet automobile for the purpose of taking his wife's (Maomi Hooten's) prother Charles, age 18, to Arizona for his health. He denied making connections with the Bubjects in this case of Phoenix, stating that he remained there only four days. He was maple to explain his modes departure from Phoenix and the only information obtained from him was that he visited Henry Steig while in Phoenix, who was an old friend at Hamilton, Chio. He advised that Steig operates a department store in Phoenix. He also dealed knowing Subject John Hamilton or Joseph Fox, who are at liberty at the present time.

The only information obtainable from Mrs. Hooten
was her admission that Subject Copeland visited her home at 1052 South
End St., Hamilton, sometime during the month of October, and after that
residence had been raided by Hamilton police on October 9th, 1955.
She also admitted that Subject Shouse had called at her house soon after
that time; that she was formerly friendly with Subject Harry Copeland,
She denied knowing that Subjects occupied a camp on the Mismi River, of
having called at this camp while they were there. She is an exceedingly

formation of value could be obtained from her,

Previous to the interview with the Hootens, Dr. D. V. Schneider was interviewed, and after viewing the photograph of Subject Pierpont, advised that he recalled treating this individual for a wound in his heel which had the appearance of being a bullet wound, sometime during the early part of October, 1955. He stated that he did not know at that time Subject Pierpont's identity and further stated that Pierpont was accompanied by Mrs. Habmi Hooten; that Pierpont was in his office on one occasion only.

Chief of Police J. C. Calhoun advised that he had learned from informants that Joseph Fox had been seen in Hamilton, Ohio during the early part of January, 1934; that he took no action as to this, due to the fact that he believed Fox had been apprehended. He was advised that Fox was still at liberty, and he stated that he would make further contacts with his informants in an effort to secure Fox's apprehension.

Filliam and George Erd, R. R. Po, who have a farm located approximately ten miles south-west of Hamilton on the Miami River, were interviewed and stated that a woman answering the description

of Mrs. Macai moter rented a camp belonging to them on betober a 1935, which camp is posted approximately a mile from his farm, on the missing to and saw from this camp and saw several men and several momenter and leave the camp, from a distance, but would be unable to identify any of the persons who stayed there; that they left the camp on October 10, 1955, after having paid a full month's rent. They were unable to furnish information as to the make of cars used by the persons residing at the camp or the license plates appearing thereon. They explained that the same is located in such a way that it is difficult to view it from their farm; that they had never had occasion to visit the persons who rented the camp.

William Erd stated that he was subposenced by State authorities to appear at the trial of Fred Pierpont, brother of Subject Pierpont at Wapakoneta, Chio during Movember, 1935, at which time he testified as to the rental of his camp, in the presence of strange men and women. He also stated that Mr. and Mrs. Larry Hooten had been subposenced to appear at this trial but that they had failed to appear.

While at Middletown, Chie on February 2, 1954;
Agent was advised by Chief of Police R. W. Scofield that a woman by the name of Ann Willis, who resides in the rooms located in the rear of Rastanos Grocery, 1601 Central Ave., was reported to him as being a close friend of Joseph Fox's mother, who resides at 808 Main St., Reading, Ohio; that he had learned through confidential informants that Joseph Fox might visit Ann Willis and he had therefore placed a close watch on this address and should Joseph Fox appear he will advise the Cincinnati Division Office. He also stated that he had been advised by informants that Joseph Fox, or a stranger answering Fox's description, had recently visited the Ideal Smokery located at \$1343 Central Ave; that this angle is also being covered by his office.

#### AT READING, OHIO

Chief of Police Nate Hilderbrandt was interviewed concerning his effort to apprehend Joseph Fox at the home of his parents at 808 Main St. He stated that he is certain that Joseph Fox has not visited this address and is reasonably certain that he has not been in Reading, Ohio, as he has made elaborate plans for his capture if he appears in that city.

Copies of this report are being furnished the Los Angeles Division Office for their information only. The report of reference from the Los Angeles Division Office, dated 2/8/34, fails to

sonserning the presence of Leroy and Hagmi Hooten in Phoenix, irizona had any connection with the apprehension of Subjects at Tueson, Aris, Facts developed by the Cincinnati Division Office indicate that the Hootens went to Phoenix, Arisona for the purpose of contacting the Subjects, in view of their slose relationship while Subjects were in hiding near Hamilton, Chio in October, 1933.




In connection with the murder of Sheriff Sarber at Lima. Ohio, with which members of the Dillinger gang are charged, you are advised that fatal bullets were submitted to the laboratory by the Detroit office and subsequently test bullets fired through the gun of HarrynPierpont were submitted by the Chicago office. It has not been possible to reach a positive conclusion on the comparison due to the fact different type test bullets were submitted than the fatal bullets and it does not appear the test bullets were properly discharged. Furthermore, no shells were submitted for comparison with fatal cartridge shells.

Mr. Larson was advised by telephone this morning of this information and in view of his statement that Pierpont was going to trial in Lima tomorrow morning, it was believed advisable to immediately transmit the original evidence to the Detroit office in spite of the fact Mr. Larson does not anticipate the prosecution is going to use any ballistics evidence. Larson was advised that should further comparison be later desired, the fatal bullets should be resubmitted together with the suspected gun itself in order that proper test shots can be made at the laboratory.

In her opinion he was a man of about 35 years of age and had a 2 inch scar on his left cheek and had a small moustache.

Mr. Quinane of the Identification Unit of the Division advised that the following was an accurate description of Dillinger according to his files:

#### Personal Attention

Mr. W. H. Purvis, Division of Investigation, U. S. Department of Justice, 1900 Bankers Building, Chicago, Illinois.

Dear Mr. Purvis:

I am somewhat concerned over the situation relative to the sources of your information in Chicago, particularly in connection with underworld activities. In taking with you last evening I gathered that you had practically no underworld informants or connections with which your office could contact in the event of an emergency arising. I recognize how difficult it is to procure competent and reliable underworld connections, but I do think it is imperative that every Agent in Charge have such connections within his district so as to make it possible for him to procure information from the underworld when necessary. I recognize that it may become necessary to expend some sums of money in order to make possible such connections, but I would consider the expenditure of these sums to be entirely warranted. Of course, I do not intend that we should employ underworld informants without being reasonably assured in advance that such informants have the fictual contacts.

I have had in mind particularly the situation in your district concerning the Dillinger matter. It would appear from press reports that Dillinger is in Chicago and is in hiding with some of his friends. I think that we should be in such a position as to have some entree into underworld channels through confidential information in order to obtain, if possible, any information that might be procurable som-cerning Dillinger's whereabouts. This apparently you do not have, and it is for this reason that I am writing you this letter to urge that you give the matter very careful study immediately, with the idea in mind of developing certain channels of information into underworld sources. Of course, you must exercise judgment and discretion in these matters in order that any expenditures of money which may be authorized will not be in any sense wasted.





For the information of the Division and interested offices, the following is submitted:

While at Lima, Ohio, last week, I conferred with Prosecuting Attorney Ernest Botkin, who informed me that Subjects Pierpont, Russel Clark and Charles Makley who were apprehended at Tucson, Arizona, are now incarcerated in the County Jail at Lima awaiting prosecution concerning the murder of Sheriff Jesse Sarber on October 12, 1933, at which time John Dillinger was liberated from the County Jail. Mr. Botkin advised that under the Chio State laws separate trials must be had, hence Pierpont is scheduled to go to trial March 6, and the trials of Clark and Makley will follow immediately.

The Prosecuting Attorney informed me that Edward Shouse who also participated in the crime at Lima in October and who was apprehended some time ago in Indiana, is now incarcerated in the Indiana State Penitentiary, from which institution he with nine others escaped on September 29, 1933. He has furnished the Prosecuting Attorney with a full statement and has agreed to testify for the State.

Subject Harry Copeland, who also participated in the crime at Lima, and who was arrested in Chicago, is at the present time incarcerated in the Indiana State Penitentiary as a parole violator, and Mr. Botkin informs me that he will also undoubtedly be removed to Lima for trial following the disposition of the case against the three now held in that city.

John Hamilton is the only individual now at large who took Tion part in the murder of Jesse Sarber at Lima on October 12, during the escape of John Dillinger.

Two other individuals who escaped on September 29, 1933, from the Indiana State Penitentiary, who have to date not been apprehended but who did not participate in the murder at Lima, are Joseph Burns, Indiana State Penitentiary register number 8703, and Joseph Fox, Indiana State Penitentiary register number 13883.

John Dillinger of will be noted escaped March 5, 1934, from the County Wail et Crown Point, Indiana, where he was confined following his apprehension at Tucson, Arizona, awaiting trial for the murder of a policeman.

I also ascertained at Lima that every precaution is being taken to prevent the escape of the three convicts now being held there; in addition to about fifteen special deputy sheriffs guarding the jail twenty-four hours a day, the National Guard have a detail of twenty-four men under command of Brigadier General H. M. Bush, who remains constantly at Lima. Machine guns mounted on tripods have been set up in strategic points, one located on the third floor of the Norval Hotel, trained on the entrance to the County Jail. Also a wooden fense has been constructed to prevent anyone from entering the door leading to the cell block of the County Jail.

One peculiar circumstance in connection with this matter is the fact that the city Prosecutor, known in Ohio ab City Solicitor, has been employed as attorney for the three convicts.

Since the escape of Dillinger at Crown Point last Saturday, further steps have been taken by the Prosecuting Attorney and the Sheriff at Lima with regard to keeping the County Jail well guarded, as Dillinger it will be noted is obligated to Pimpont, Makley and Clark who took the initiative in causing his escape from the same county jail on October 12, 1933.



Dear Sir:

On March 6, 1934, Mr. R. R. Newby of the Division at Washington called Special Agent R. B. Nathan of the New York office and advised that Sheriff S. J. Ives of Lake Charles. Oklahoma, had informed the Division that he had arrested on that same day Dwight Rumbaugh, Oklahoma convict, and that Rumbaugh had in his possession an address of John Dillinger, which was 31 South Warren Street, Trenton, N. J., Vienna Restaurant. Special Agent E. Sandberg, who was at that time in Trenton, N. J., was requested by telephone to conduct immediate investigation.

Agent Sandberg reported that he enlisted the aid of Detective W. J. Mullen of the Treaton Police Department, and conducted appropriate investigation at the above mentioned address. It was ascertained that the Vienna Restaurant, 31 South Warren Street, Trenton, N./J., is owned and operated by Felix Dollinger. Mr. Dollinger was not present at the time of Agent Sandberg's visit, but his wife, Ethel Dollinger, advised that she and her husband had owned this place for approximately four or five years, and that there had been a party around there about a year ago by the name of Dwight, last name unknown. This party was described as being 45 years of age, tall, thin, dark complexion, with a peculiar looking nose. Detective W. J. Mullen advised that he was well acquainted with the Dollinger family and all of the people who live in the apartments above the restaurant, and that they were all reputable people.

It appears that the only connection the similarity of the names Dollinger and Dillinger NVISION


