



DETAILS: AT ST. LOUIS, MISSOURI

This is a joint report of Special Agents E. E. Diemer and J. O.

The title of this case is being changed to include the alias of Dillinger recently ascertained to be Frank Sullivan.

Ralph Page, Assistant Field Manager, St. Louis-Lambert Airport, Robinson, Missouri, was interviewed and requested to distribute copies of I. O. No. 1217 of John Billinger to various pilots, stewardesses, and other employees at the St. Louis-Lambert Airport who might some in contact with passengers. The picture of John Hamilton and description of Evelyn Frechette were also given to Mr. Page. Mr. Page advised that when Billinger was recently brought from Tueson, Arizona through St. Louis to Grown Point, Indiana, he had an epportunity to personally observe him for a period of approximately one-half hour, and is quite sure that he would be able to identify him again if he should appear at that airport,

Mr. Page further stated that at the present time only three air lines, namely, the Trans-Continental Western Air Express, the American Airways, and the Boeing Lines, are operating commercially from St. Louis-Lambert Field; that the Trans-Continental and American stop at St. Louis-Lambert Field on their trans-continental runs, and that the Boeing Lines operate south of St. Louis.

Mr. Page readily agreed to distribute the aforementioned identification orders of Subject John Dillinger to employees of the field, and elso to display the picture of John Hamilton and description of Evelyn Frechette in prominent places. Mr. Page was furnished the telephone number of the St. Louis Division Office, and advised that should any information of value be obtained he would immediately communicate same to this office.

Passenger lists at the St. Louis-Lambert Field for March Sl.

April 1. and April 2, 1934, were examined, without obtaining any information of value. In this connection it might be noted that information was only available of passengers departing from St. Louis, there being no record kept of incoming passengers.

With reference to information obtained that one Welton Spark, now confined in the U. S. Penitentiary at Leavenworth, Kansas, who is reported to be the husband of Evelyn Frechette, had been corresponding with one Jack Bourland, of 4200 Page Blvd., St. Louis, Missouri, it was determined that said address is listed under the name of William B. and Elizabeth Moore; further, that Moore's occupation is stipulated as driver.

C. J. Malloy, Superintendent of the Fordyce Post Office Station 4032 Easton Avenue, was interviewed and advised that said address has covered by carrier Julius Wright.

Julius Wright was interviewed and stated that the residence is nest and was the sonsiderable mail was residence as a series of the sonsiderable mail was residenced at same, but that he had no definite recollection of delivering mail for a Jack Bourland, Wright further stated that he recalled delivering mail for Seigel, Cunningham, Conway and Moore.

At the request of agents, Wright made inquiries under pretext at \$200 Page Blvd., and was informed that Jack Bourland had left said address, had gone to Mississippi, and was now thought to be in Texas, exact address unknown.

Captain Moffatt and Lieuts Dowd, Tenth Police District, St. Louis, were interviewed and both advised that to their knowledge the individuals residing at 4200 Page Blvd, were not known to the police.

The information with reference to possible contact of Subject Dillinger with said address was furnished Captain Moffatt, who advised that surveillance would be maintained by the police officers of his district for any further information of value.

Officer Fred Kauflin, in whose district 4200 Page is located, obtained information by making discreet inquiries of Mrs. Moore and one Ogra, a
chamberhaid at this address, to the effect that Jack Bourland and his wife resided at 4200 Page for a period of about four menths ending in Movember, 1955;
that Jack Bourland is a professional "marrying man" at Walkathon contests; that
he had very little money; that at the time he left St. Louis it was believed
that he was following another Walkathon; that on or about Valentine Day, February 14, 1934, Mrs. Moore received a valentine from Mrs. Jack Bourland, jostmarked from some place in Mississippi; that the Bourlands left clothing and
other personal effects with Mrs. Moore upon their departure, and that it is
possible that they intend contacting Mrs. Moore, probably through the mails, in
order that the clothing might be forwarded.

Officer Kauflin was unable to obtain a very accurate description of Jack Bourland, other than the fact that he was rather a young man, between the ages of 20 and 30 years.

In connection with Jack Bourland, investigation was conducted at the Bureau of Records and Bureau of Identification, St. Louis Police Department, where it was ascertained there was no record of a Jack Bourland. In connection with the automobile reported purchased by Billinger in January of 1934, investigation disclosed that same was purchased in St. Jouis-Missouri from the Hudson-Frampton Moter Company, 4525 Delmar Elva. John W. Davis, Sales Manager of the eforementioned company, was interviewed and displayed his records for examination, which disclosed that on January 80, 1934 Subject Billinger, under the name of Frank Bulliven, Green Bay, Visconsin, purchased a Hudson Club Bedan, 123 inch wheel base, Actory No. 852007, motor No. 30071. Said records further disclosed that said car was a bison brown, which Mr. Bavis advised was an opalescent lacquer over an aluminum paint base; further, that said car was equipped with six wire wheels, two fender wells, 16x650 Goodyear tires, exle flex, and was equipped with safety glass all around. Said record further disclosed that a 1932 Terreplane two-passenger dark blue standard coupe, factory No. 360-803, motor No. 16532, was traded in on said Hudson Sedan for the

The records of the Hudson-Frampton Motor Company further disclosed that as indicia of ownership, Wisconsin title No. 129-2966, was displayed by Dillinger, and indicated said car had been originally purchased by Alfred Threil Johnston, Mashotah, Wisconsin, assigned from Johnston to the Bramer Sales Corporation, Milwaukee, Wisconsin, and from said corporation to Evelyn Frechetts, Neophi, Wisconsin. The aforementioned Terreplane coupe has been recently re-sold by the Eudson-Frampton Motor Company.

In this connection, attention is directed to letter of the Chicago Office dated March 15, 1954, wherein it is stated that the aforementioned 1958. "Essex Coupe" traded in by Subject Dillinger in St. Louis was owned by Miss Evelyn Frechette and was originally given to her by one Frank Kirtly.

Ar. Davis then advised that the morning of January 19, 1934 a call was received from one Louis Aikman, an employee of the Milton Oil Company at 28nd and Olive Streets, St. Louis, who stated that a couple driving a Terreplane coups bearing Wisconsin tags were coming to the Sales Rooms of the Hudson-Frampton Company for the purpose of purchasing a new car; further, that the said couple had been in Aikman's service station on several different occasions, and were thought to be residing in the Lincoln Hotel, located in the 2200 block of Olive Street. Davis stated that pursuant to such information the salesman then on duty in the show room was advised to keep a lookout for a Terreplane coups bearing Wisconsin tags, and that shortly thereafter the couple did appear and request to be shown new Hudson cars. Mr. Davis then advised that one J. C. Jones, salesmen, took the couple to the Automobile Show then being conducted in the Mart Building in St. Louis, and after some time it was finally agreed that the aforementioned Hudson Club Sedan, selling for \$1229.00, would be purchased. Mr. Davis then stated the salesman and the couple returned to the Hudson-Frampton Show Rooms and were offered the sum of \$275.00 allowance on their Terreplane coupe, which was accepted without questioning and an order signed, it being expressly agreed at that particular time that the aforementioned Hudson Club Sedan then on display at the Automobile Show be delivered immediately. Mr. Davis stated that the balance of the purchase price, namely, \$954.00, was paid in cash, and that

Dillinger, alies Sullivan, drew from his pocket a stack of old \$20.00 bills, bound with a bank stack wrapper, removed seme and counted off the equivalent of \$950.00. Davis further advised that Dillinger placed the aforementioned stack wrapper in his overcoat pocket.

Davis further advised that the order was authorized by Mr. Transper, ton, and Dillinger was then informed that it would be impossible to deliver the car at that time, to which he entered a protest. Davis then stated that he persuaded Dillinger to remain in St. Louis for severaldays for the purpose of "looking the town over" and recommended that he go to the Boosevelt Motel, Located on Delmar Blvd. This was accepted by Dillinger, and pursuant to a request of the Sales Manager Dillinger then placed his Terreplane coupe in the Hudson-Frampton Garage and he was taken to the Hotel Roosevelt by Jones in one of the company's demonstrators.

Davis further advised that at the end of the Automobile Show the night of January 20, 1934, the aforementioned Hulson Club Sedan was taken from the Show Rdom floor, serviced, and delivered to Subject Dillinger the morning of January 21, 1934.

With reference to license tags, Mr. Davis advised that he had attempted to have Dillinger register said car in the State of Missouri, Which Dillinger refused to do, and requested that 1933 Wisconsin tags No. 27001, originally on the aforementioned Terreplane coupe, be transferred to the Mudson Club Sedan, which was done.

Davis further advised that no statement was made by Dillinger in conversation in his presence indicating information of value, with the possible exception of the statement made by Dillinger that he and Evelyn Frechette, who was posing as Ers. Frank Sullivan, had to be in Phoenix, Arisons by Jamery 25, 1934.

Mr. Davis further advised that at no time was Sullivan recognized as John Dillinger, but did state that he became suspicious of the Subject and feared that the money used in payment of the Hudson Club Sedan might be part of the Lindbergh kidnaping reason money.

T. C. Jones, salesman of the Hudson-Frampton Motor Company, advised that Subject Dillinger, as Frank Sullivan, and Mrs. Frank Sullivan; who answers the description of Evelyn Frechette, appeared at the sales room about ten or eleven o'clock in the morning of January 19, 1934, and that Mrs. Sullivan was carrying a small buil pup; that Dillinger, who spoke very little, apparently had his mind made up as to the type of car that he wanted, and as the only sar of such type was at the Antomobile Show, he escorted them there. Upon arrival at the Antomobile Show the attendant prevented the entrance of the dog, and accordingly Dillinger went up with Jones to inspect the cars. At this time Dillinger wanted a Hudson, black in color, with long wheel base, but finally Mrs. Jones persuaded him to accept the bison brown show car then on the floor, which Dillinger agreed to do if he could arrange immediate delivery. After viewing

the car Dillinger returned to the lobby of the Mart Building and took sare of the bull pup while his wife looked over the car. Spon Mrs. Sullivan's return to the lobby Dillinger reported that the dog had broken away from him, and that the officers had assisted him in recovering 100.

Prampton Sales Room, and the deal was closed with Mr. Davis, as previously ment, tioned, after which Mr. Jones advised he addisted in removing the Luggage from the Terreplane coupe and placing it is his own Terreplane Sedan, and it was sufficient in volume to take up the entire space in the rear of the car, so that the three parties had to ride in the front seat going to the Roosevelt Hotely has Sullivan, alias Frechette, remarked that a lady had to have considerable baggage when traveling, and Jones observed that several of the pieces of luggage were extremely heavy, one of which consisted of a large sipper bag.

Jones further advised that Sullivan appeared to be extremely tired upon first entering the sales room, and gave the general impression of having traveled all during his contact with him, and after the deal was closed remarked that they had not as yet had breakfast.

The only other information of value obtained was that at the time Dillinger, alias Sullivan, obtained delivery on said Hudson Glub Sedan, he was observed to be carrying a gun in a shoulder holster, which gun was of such size that when he was seated in the driver's seat of the sedan same protruded under his coat, which might indicate that Dillinger was carrying a sub-machine gun in a specially constructed holster under his soat.

The photograph of John Hamilton was displayed to various employees of the Hudson-Frampton Motor Company who came in contact with Sullivans; however, all advised that no party answering the description of Hamilton was seen in company with the fictitious Sullivans. In this connection, all persons interviewed advised that contact was only made with Dillinger, alias Sullivan, and Evelyn Frechette, alias Mrs. Frank Sullivan. In this connection it might also be noted that the description furnished of Evelyn Frechette fitted the description of Mrs. Frank Sullivan, who decompanied Billinger at this time. Mr. Davis further advised that the aforementioned Hudson Sedan purchased from his company had been recovered by local authorities when Dillinger was apprehended at Phoenix, Aris.

Investigation conducted at the Rogsevelt Hotel, 4901 Delmar Blvd., St. Louis, disclosed that Dillinger and Evelyn Prechette, as Mr. and Mrs. Frank Sullivan, registered at 2:40 P. M., January 19, 1934, and were assigned Room, 703. Records at the hotel further disclosed that at the time of such registration Dillinger was carrying three bags; further, that their address was stipulated to be Green Bay, Wisconsin. Said records further disclosed that Dillinger and Frechette checked out the morning of January 21, 1934.

The records further disclosed only one telephone call, a local call made to Central 5680, which was determined to be the Missouri Rotel.

The Manager and other employees at the Roosevelt Hotel interviewed stated that Dillinger, while a guest, wore smoked glasses, was clean shaven, and engaged in very little conversation. It was further determined that Brelys Prochette was still carrying the aforementioned bull pup.

The photograph of John Hamilton was displayed to the Manager and other employees, who advised that no party answering Hamilton's description had appeared at said hotel while Dillinger was a guest. No further information of value sould be obtained. The results of the investigation with reference to the call made by Dillinger to Central S620 will be set out later in this report.

Louis Aikmen, 4029 Lincoln Avenue, St. Louis, Hissouri, Mas interviewed and advised that he had, as mentioned previously, called the Hadson-Frampton Motor Company, stating that a couple driving a 1932 Terreplane coupe bearing Wisconsin tags, were interested in purchasing a Hudson car, dikman stated that to his recollection said car first appeared at his service station on January 18, 1934, apparently entering said station from the west; that at this particular time the car was driven by a man whom Aikman later identified as Dillinger, and that said visit consisted of merely the purchase of seven or eight gallons of gasoline. Likman further stated that the morning of January 19. 1934 said car again appeared at his station, apparently being driven into same from the wast; that on the occasion of this visit the car was occupied by Dillinger, and a woman whose description fits that of Evelyn Frechetter that at said time the sar was also loaded with baggage. Alkman advised that on the occasion of this visit Dillinger stated that he did not desire to purchase any gas, but wished to be directed to a Hulson dealer, and that pursuant to such request he directed Dillinger to the Hudson Frampton Motor Company.

Manager, Davis, with reference to said car appearing frequently at his station and with reference to the occupants thereof being guests of the Lincoln Hotel, were figments of his imagination, and made only for the purpose of coloring his information in order that he might collect a commission on the probable sale of a Hudson par. Aikman further advised that he had not seen the aforementioned par nor the occupants thereof minse their visit of January 19th, and could furnish no other information of value.

With reference to the statement that Dillinger was possibly a guestat the Lincoln Hotel, investigation was conducted at said hotel, located at 2226
Olive Street, where an examination of register sheets failed to disclose the registration under the name of Mr. and Mrs. Frank Sullivan or any of Dillinger's
other known aliases. Information was obtained, however, that the majority of
cars of hotel guests were parked in the garage of J. A. McFall and Son, 2116
Olive Street, St. Louis, at which place an inquiry was made for the purpose of
determining if Dillinger's Terreplane coupe had been stored in said garage, without obtaining any information of value.

The photographs of Dillinger and John Hamilton, likewise the description of Evelyn Frechette, were given to various employees of the Lincols Hotel, who all stated that no one answering said descriptions to their knowledge had been registered there.

Thile conducting investigation at the aforementioned Lincoln Hotal, it was noted that a 1953 Chevrolet seach, black body, bearing 1954 Mismesota tags, B-112-603, was parked in front of seel on several different occasions, be parked in front of the Lincoln Hotel on several different occasions.

With reference to the call made by Millinger on January 20, 1974, to Central S620, J. E. Westley, Manager of the Missouri Hotel, 1014 Locust Street, was interviewed and displayed for examination hatel registration records for the month of January, 1934. Examination of said records failed to disclose registration under the name of Mr. and Mrs. Frank Sullivan, under any of Dillinger's other known aliases, John Hamilton or any of his other known aliases.

For the information of other effices, the telephone number of the Lincoln Hotel in St. Leuis is Chestnut 5511.

Likewise, the record of calls made from the Missouri Botel for the period of January 14 to 21, 1934, was checked for the purpose of determining if a call had been made to Forest 4100, the number of the Hotel Roosevelt, without such record disclosing that such a call had been made.

Long distance telephone calls made from the Missouri Hotel from January 14 to 20, 1934, were checked by room number to the check-suts on the 19th and 20th, and known guests at the hotel eliminated, which resulted in indicating that no long distance calls had been made by parties checking out on the 19th or 20th.

Photographs of Billinger and John Hamilton, likewise the description of Evelyn Frechette, were displayed to Mr. Weatley and various other employees of the Missouri Hotel, who all stated that they had no recollection of parties and swering any of the descriptions being registered as guests in said hotel.

With further reference to Dillinger's sell to Central 3620, subsequent to the investigation conducted at the hotel by agents it was determined from Detective Sergeant Hunt of the St. Louis Police Department, who also made a brief investigation of Dillinger's stay in St. Louis in Jeauary, 1934, that while Dillinger was a guest at the Roosevelt Hotel he had on one night visited the Kit Kat Glub, which is lessted on the roof of the Missouri Hotel.

Having obtained information from Mr. Weatley that all cars of guests of the Hotel Missouri were parked in the Meletic Garage, 15th and Morgan, inevestigation was conducted at said garage for the purpose of determining if Dill-

inger had stored the eforementioned Terreplane compe, without obtaining and the formation of value. In this connection, while investigation was being conducted at both the MacFall and Meletic Garages, photographs of Dillinger and Hamilton, likewise description of Evelyn Frechette, were displayed to employees, with out obtaining any information of value.

Attention is directed to the report of Special Agent R. P. Burrus, Washington, B. C., dated March 17, 1934, wherein it is stated that the enlists ment records of the Mavy Department disclosed that Dillinger on chlisting in the U. B. Mavy July 23, 1925 stipulated his home address to be 916 Bain Ave., St. Louis, Missouri. Investigation through the office of the Post Office Inspectors at St. Louis determined that there is no such street in St. Louis, Missouri as Bain Avenue.

Lieut, Jerry O'Connell and Detective Sergeant Hunt of the St. Louis Police Department were interviewed for information obtained by them during their investigation of Dillinger's stay in St. Louis, without obtaining any further information of value.

With reference to information received from the Chicago Bivision Office relative to a telegram signed "Leo Mannheimer," addressed to "i. Mann-heimer, 5755 Kingsbury Ave., St. Louis, Missouri, that had been dispatched from the same address in Chicago, Illinois on February S, 1934 as that occupied by one Daisy Mielsen, investigation at said address disclosed that same was a six-family apartment in smeld style apertment building. It was observed that albert A. Mannheimer occupied an apartment on the third floor of said building, and that the occupants of other apartments were McPheeters, Mitchell, John W, Hoffman, and LeMar and Joseph, none of whom at this time can be identified an involved in the instant matter.

Interview was had with the colored janitor of said apartment under protext, who advised that Mannheimers had occupied same for a period of approximately ten years; that Mannheimer, his wife, and son Leo, occupy a four-room efficiency, and that Leo Mannheimer had until recently been amployed by unknown concerns in Chicago, Illinois; further, that Leo Mannheimer was believed to be presently employed as a window trimmer by an unknown company, and that his father, Albert A. Mannheimer, was employed as a sale sman for some nubber goods company. The janitor further advised that the Mannheimers were considered respectable tenants, and further volunteered the information that Leo Mannheimer had returned to St. Louis from Chicago, Illinois in order to assist his family in financial difficulties.

During the time of the interview with the aforementioned janitor, a man driving a 1928 Chevrolet coach, bearing Missouri 1934 license 389-024, was observed to park in front of said apartment, and was identified by the janitor as Albert A. Mannheimer. Mannheimer was observed to enter the apartment carrying a brief case and a large catalog such as those used by salesmen. Likewise, while conversing with the aforementioned janitor, a woman appeared from said apartment who was identified as Mrs. Mannheimer, and who was observed

The carrier further stated that there was little mail delivered to the Kannheimers at baid address, and further, that an A. Mannheimer also resided at 5730 Kingsbury Avenue, whenhe believed to be a relative of Albert L. beiner; further, that it was his recollection that there was recently a death in the Mannheimer family who resided at 5730 Kingsbury Avenue. In this connection it might be noted that the 1935 City Directory for St. Louis lists Albert A. Mannheimer, 5735 Kingsbury Avenue, as a Chemist, Leo Mannheimer is listed as an advertising artist. The directory further lists Regene Mannheiser, also residing at 5735 Kingsbury. Said directory further lists Abraham Mann-heimer, Secretary and Treasurer of the Specialty Manufacturing Company Sevelys A. Mennheimer, teacher, Millenphy School, and Edna Mannheimer as residing 5730 Kingabury Avenue. 34



Joseph S. Batt, 517 K. 11th Street, was interviewed under pretext and advised that he had been acquainted with Leo Mannheimer for the past six or seven years; that until approximately a year ago his association with Leo Mannheimer had been with several concerns in Chicago, Illinois, and that approximately one year ago he had come to St. Louis, Missouri to go into business for himself, and had brought Leo Mannheimer with him. Batt stated that to his aboveledge Leo Mannheimer came from a respectable family and that he was entrusted with all the details of his office.

The Joseph B. Batt Company occupies h two-room office at the ebose mentioned address, and appears to be an advertising concern. Further information with reference to this particular sompany will be obtained if deemed accessary.

Investigation revealed that the rental agent for 5733 Hingsbury Avenue up to about three weeks ago was Ers. Wendell 6. Scott, wife of Brest Scott, who is a nephew of Dr. Soper, owner of that building. It was determined that Mrs. Scott formerly resided at 5727 Kingsbury, and that no credit files covering the tenants in the apartment were kept by her. As she was interested in collecting some back rent from the Mannheimers, in so doing she conducted a discreet investigation for agents and furnished the following information, supplementing information that she could recall offhand:

ALC: N 1-1 Albert A. Mannheimer rented the apartment at 5733 Kingsbury when the building was constructed about eight years ago, and has been a tenant ever since. Albert A. Mannhelmer at one time gave checks on the Hemilton State Bank, St. Louis, in payment of his rent. Approximately seven years ago he was head chemist in the City Asphalt Plant in St. Louis, and later engaged in business with his uncle, Abraham Mannheimer, which business was that of shoe findings and decorations. This business went into bankruptcy approximately two years ago, and Albert A. Mannheimer realized nothing, and since that time he has been engaged in various selling occupations, and at present is selling automobile accessories and using an old Thevrolet car which is the property of his son, Leo Mannheimer. Mrs. Scott also furnished the information that Leo Mannheimer was at one time employed by the Temous-Bar Company, Department Store, St. Louis, in the Advertising Department; that at present he is employed by Joseph Batt, a local St. Louis advertising man. Hrs. Scott advised that she believed Mrs. Silverberg, who was formerly a tenent at 5733 Kingsbury, and now resides at the Ranelegh-Wilmer Apartment, 445 DeBeliviere Avenue, and Richard Toage, who now resides in the 2000 block of Kensington Avenue, would be trustworthy parties in case additional inquiries are found to be necessary.

Mrs, Scott further informed agent that the Mansheimers have been somewhat financially embarrassed for the past two years, and that Mrs. Mannaheimer assisted by working at the Sunnyside Shop, located somewhere in the neighborhood. It was also ascertained from Mrs. Scott that approximately a month ago a relative of Mannheimers, who lived across the street from 5735. Kingsbury, believed to be a mrs. Grainick, sister of Mrs. Mannheimer, died.

Barr Department Store, advised that Leo Mannheimer was a sopy writer under his supervision for about one and one-half years up to about two or two and one-half years up to about two or two and one-half years up to about two or two and one-half years ago. He further advised that Leo Mannheimer came to the Famous. Barr Company from an advertising agency operated by Joseph Batt; that Theoph Batt during the time Leo Mannheimer worked for Famous-Barr also worked for the same concern; that when Batt became connected with the Hartmann Furniture Company of Chicago, Illinois as an advertising man, he took Leo Mannheimer to Chicago with him.

Fr. Hornbein was also under the impression that when Iso Manheimer first went to Chicago about two and one-helf years ago he became connected with the Wheelan Studio, located in the Fair Department Store at Chicago, and subsequently went with Joseph Batt at the Hartmann Furniture Company, and later, believed to be in the Fall of 1933, returned to St. Louis.

Mr. Hornbein described Leo Eannheimer as being an ambitious ead industrious worker, and as far as he knew, entirely trustworthy.

It is not deemed advisable at this time to openly approach either Albert A. or Leo Mannheimer, until further information is received from the Chicago Division Office with reference to the circumstances surrounding the sending of the aforementioned telegram on February 5, 1984.

AT CHAMPAIGN, ILLINOIS.

While in Champeign on other matters, the following information with reference to a possible contact point of Billinger's was obtained from Sergi. R. H. Smith, of the Illinois State Highway Patrol, located at Champaigns.

Sergt, Smith stated that he had learned that subsequent to Billinger's escape from Lima, Ohio that he had visited the home of one August Carleson, who resided on a rural route at Rankin, Illinois. He further advised that on March 5, 1934, the Monday following Billinger's escape from the Crown Point Jail, that he, together with other officers of the Illinois State Highway Patrol, had reided the aforementioned home of August Carleson, at Which time Dillinger was not found to be present. Sergt, Smith stated; however, that it was learned that Dillinger had spent approximately one week at the Carleson home after his escape from Lima, Ohio, and had in fact taken the Carlesons to the World's Fair in Chicago, Illinois during the Summer of 1933.

Sergt. Smith further stated it was noted during the time the raid was conducted that in a small hallway of the Carleson home there were stacked everal guns, being both sawed-off shotguns and high-powered rifles; further,

that it was learned through inquiries that Dillinger, while staying at Rankin, Illinois, was observed to be driving a Fackard tar, which, efter its disappearance of several Mays, was noted to return to Bankin with what appeared to be several built heles in the body of same.

Sengt. Smith further stated that it was gossip among residents of Rankin that Carleson's wife was appearing in town wearing expensive clothes and what appeared to be an expensive fur soat.

From the above information it appears that the home of August Garleson would be a likely contact for Billinger, as it is located in close proximity to Chicago Illinois.





The Albany number 3-3648 was at one time the listing of L. J. Newton, at Kenwood Road, Albany, but was disconnected May 22, 1933, and inactive until November 84, 1933. Because of the difference in address, it is evident that L. J. Newton has no connection with this matter.

The listing for Albany number 3-3645 at \$5 Columbia at treet was in the name of Marjorle B. Wilson, with an extra listing for May Jennison. He investigation was made by agent at \$3 Columbia Street, other than to drive past the premises, from which it appeared that \$3 Columbia Street is a rooming or apartment house near the business section of the city. The telephone company's records contain no data relative to the Jennison woman. However, the application for the phone on behalf of the Filson woman gives at reference L. R. Macker, an official of the telephone company.

The information was received from prior to November 24, 1935, the Wilson woman, according to the telephone company's records, was located at 12 Chestnut Street Albany, and peid half of the telephone bill for number 3-7992 listed in the name of B. A. Malette, 12 Chestnut Street, Albany, According to the telephone company's records, no long distance telephone calls were charged to 3-7992 from September to Movember, 1933, any previous toll tickets having been destroyed. It is noted that the activity in long distance calls at the telephone shared by the Wilson woman apparently began with the advent of the Sennison woman into the picture, and it might therefore be inferred that the Jennison woman was responsible for the calls.

Esplanada 5-7572, the other number about which inquiry was made, is supposedly a New York City number; there is no such number at Albany, and Esplanada is known to be New York City exchange.

At the Albany, N. Y. Post Office, Superintendent of Batle J. J. H. Mochan advised that there is no forwarding address on file for Marjorie B. Wilson or May Jennison. Carrier John McLean, who covers 93 Columbia Street, was out and not available for interview, but from information leter secured and set out in this memorandum, it appears that it will not be necessary to interview him at this time.

Western Union Telegraph Company, Albany, reflected that, without home information of a definite character, it would be a practical imposses ibility to ascertain the Tasts relative to possible telegrams bent, to or from 95 Columbia Streets. It was estimated by each of these begentlemen that his sampany handles in excess of 5,000 messages per day, and from the manner in which records are filed it would take a number of hours to check even one days.

It was ascertained at the Bureau of Identification of the Albany, W. T. Police Department that there is no eriminal record on file for either of the woman named above, and nothing could be learned concerning them by routine inquiries at the Police Department.

The 1933-54 Albany City Directory reflects that one of the residents at 93 Columbia Street is Stephen J. Bonnelly, an Albany police traffic officer. The following other persons are also listed at that address: Charles Colburn, Jean DeAngele, Gordon DeMars, Frank J. Hart, Mrs. Frances Johnson, John Leonard, Barl Moyer, Alice Mullins, and Abram H. Van Deusen.

Inquiries of Chief of Police David Smurl resulted in the information that Donnelly is considered a reliable efficer. Chief Smurl instructed Bonnelly to give Agent all information in his possession. The purpose of Agent's inquiries was, of course, not disclosed.

Officer Stephem J. Donnelly advised upon interview that his wife acts as janitress at 93 Columbia Street, and he and his wife also live in an apartment at these premises. He knew very little about either the Wilson girl or the Jennison girl, and suggested that his wife be seen. Leter, Mrs. Donnelly was interviewed in the presence of her husband.

Wilson rented Apartment D at 93 Columbia Street on November 23, 1933, The Wilson girl moved out the latter part of January, and her present whereabouts are unknown to Mrs. Donnelly, although she could probably be located through the Jennison girl. Since the Wilson girl moved out and the Vennishe girl has been living alone, she has not had a telephone. The Rounelly's have a telephone, number 4-8275, which she might have asked to use, but she has neither placed nor received any long distance calls from that phone.

Hrs. Donnelly recalled that The Jennison has eccasionally received letters, some bearing Oklahoma City postmarks, and others with Illinois postmarks. She was anable to recall any out-of-town friends the Jennison woman may have. She does not have many elethes, and her funds are apparently always low.

In accordance with Division instructions fural spect by teletype on April 1, 1934, airports at New York City Albany and Buffalo, N. Y., and at Hartforn, Conn. were severed until the Division advised that the surveillance should be discontinued. The results of this surveillance were negative.

It will be noted that in accordance with Division instructions, photographs of Subject Dillinger were furnished to all airport officials in order that identification might be made in the event he subsequently appeared at the airport.

J. to meet the United Air Lines plane, due to arrive from Chicago and Cleveland 11:30 D.M., which in fact did arrive at approximately 12:35 A.M. on April B. 1934. From the description furnished, no difficulty was experienced in identifying the woman suspected of being Evelyn Freschetti, who, upon questioning, identified herself to the satisfaction of the agents covering the Newark Airport as Mrs. Betty Karp Harx, wife of Chico Marx.



Reference is made to your telegram and letter of April 2, 1934, concerning JOHN DILLINGER, I. O. #1217; JOHN HAMILTON, I. O. \$1220; and EVELYN FRECHETTE, I. O. #1221.

Upon receipt of your wire, an agent from this office was immediately dispatched to the Charlotte Airport where all employees there were interviewed, and appropriate information concerning these fugitives left with A sufficient number of the Identification Orders on Dillinger and Hamilton were left at the airport.

Since the recent cancellation of the mail contracts, there are only two airports in the two Carolinas at the present time where commercial and/or transport planes land, namely, Charlotte, North Carolina, and Greensboro, North Carolina. An agent was not available when your wire was received for covering the airport at Greens-Therefore, I communicated telephonically with Sheriff Phipps and Chief of Police Mike Caffey, both at Greensboro, with whom I am well acquainted, and received their promises for full cooperation in this matter. These officers immediately notified the State Patrolmen and the rural The airport was covered and sufficient police in Greensboro. information was given to the employees there. A quantity of Identification Orders on Dillinger and Hamilton have been left at the Greensboro airport.

The State Highway Departments at Columbia: South Carolina, and Raleigh, North Carolina, were communicated

by long distance telephone, and through these offices the State Highway Patrolmen in both states were quickly notified, all over the two states, and all necessary information relayed to them.

The police, county officers, and patrolmen in Asheville, Wilmington, Raleigh, and Concord, North Carolina, were immediately notified appropriately; and all officers in Columbia, Charleston, Greenville, and Spartanburg, South Carolina, were given the same information. Identification Orders on Dillinger and Hamilton have been forwarded to all these points.

On the date your wire was received, Sheriff Hoover of Concord, North Carolina, came to Charlotte to attend Federal He advised Chief of Detectives Frank N. Littlejohn of Charlotte, who in turn informed me, that a restaurant proprietor and filling station attendants in Concord had seen a dark grey Cadillac Phaeton between six and seven o'clock that morning in Concord, and that the individuals in the car, two men and a woman, might be the fugitives mentioned in this letter. Two agents from this office were immediately dispatched to Concord where a thorough investigation was made concerning this report, and they learned that those who had made the report were unable to give any information of a definite nature, and that they had merely stated their suspicions which rapidly spread and caused the entire community to believe that Dillinger and his companions had been in that city. I am not inclined to place any importance in the report from Concord. However, the information received from Sheriff Hoover was transmitted to all the officers in the cities above named.

As to the distribution of the Identification Orders as outlined in your letter of April 2, 1934, I have to advise as follows: The bus companies in North and South Carolina are as listed below:

I called Mr. Clegg at St. Paul to ascertain why Green is not the prison at the present time. Mr. Clegg advised that the records of the State Reformatory indicated that he was serving a sentence of 40 - 5 years, while the records of the Minnesota State Prison indicate that he was serving an indeterminate sentence. Mr. Clegg advised that they had not as yet been able to determine the difference in these sentences but that he believed they amounted to the same thing and were identical. He states also that last night they were only able to reach the clerk of the State Reformatory, who advised of the transfer. They have not, as yet, been able to reach anybody at the Minnesote State Prison, but will continue their efforts to do so and will advise the Division immediately why he is not in prison at the present time; that is, whether he is out on parole or whether he escaped.

Mr. Clegg advised that he has not as yet interviewed all of the Agents relative to the facts in the case as some of the Agents are still out of the office. He stated that Agent Noonan is at the hospital and every time that Green regains consciousness he asks him more questions. The last report they received from the hospital is that he is still holding on and it looks like he is gaining a little strength.

Mr. Clegg advised that they are holding the man who sold the Hudson automobile in the St. Paul office, as well as the two negro women involved in the case and the brother of these women, and that they will be held there until they talk.

Mr. Clegg advised that the shooting took place right in front of the house of the negro women at 778 Rondo Street. He stated that Green has admitted that he is connected with the Dillinger outfit; that Green was asked how he got away and stated "I walked away and Dillinger rode away"; that he was asked where Dillinger was and stated "Dillinger was on the inside of the apartment using his tommy"; that he further stated "You got Dillinger's bullet proof vest but you aid not get mine" (Mr. Clegg advised that the St. Paul office secured Green's vest last night). Mr. Clegg was asked as to what part Green took in the escape. Mr. Clegg stated that by inference, Green having stated that he was on the outside, it was believed that Green was the soap salesman. He was asked whether Agent Coulter had identified him

and advised that Coulter has not identified him; that Coulter stated he believed the salesman was shorter than Green; that Coulter does not state that it was not the man but will state rather positively that he cannot identify him either by his photograph or by looking at him with his face all shot up. Mr. Clegg states, however, that the man, Green, by inference, admits that he was the salesman.

Mr. Clegg advised that Green's wife will not talk; that she denies that she was out talking to the negroes yesterday; that she says that Green is a salesman and she did not know what his game is; that she admits she is not married to him; that she stated the only time she and Green went out on Saturday was when they went to the grocery store around Noon; that they stayed in the apartment all day. Mr. Clegg stated that they will continue to try to secure information from her.

MEMORANDUM FOR THE DIRECTOR.

Mr. Connelley telephoned from Cincinnati and advised that he had received information from Mr. Rorer that Dillinger was driving a Wudson Deluxe Sedan Motor #38884; that this car was wrecked at Noblesville, Indiana this morning with two men in it. Noblesville is about thirty miles north of Indianapolis. occupying this car ran into another car and also wrecked it. One of the two men in the car started walking on the highway toward Indianapolis and the other cut over into the woods. Mr. Connelley stated that he had had Agent Johnson check the motor number of this car and it is the same car Dillinger had in Minnesots He stated that the indications are that one of the two men is Dillinger; that they have a number of places in Cincinnati and vicinity where Dillinger may likely try to make a contact; that Dillinger has a sweetheart at Dayton, Ohio, whom he intends to marry, and may try to contact her at Dayton. He stated that he has one man in Dayton.


Mr. Connelley further advised that Dillinger was in Lexington, Kentucky, shortly after he escaped from the Crown Point, Indiana, jail and is likely to return there, if possible, for a Agents Russell and Hurley are there at the present time. Hamilton. Ohio is the place where Dillinger made his escape from officers shortly after he escaped from the County Jail at Lima. Ohio, and he has a number of underworld friends there.

At Indianapolis there is located the Kinder woman who is a known associate of Dillinger, and also Dillinger's attorney. At Morrisville, about twenty miles from Indianapolis, Dillinger's father and other relatives live. This should also be covered.

MEMORANDUM FOR THE DIRECTOR

Mr. Rorer called. The road map which was found in the apartment occupied by Dillinger has been identified as a rough draft of almap covering the territory between Des Moines and St. Paul. From the location of certain towns this has been definitely established. Mr. Rorer stated that if agreeable he would call the Kansas City office and ask that an adequate number of men be assigned to handle all leads arising from this matter in the vicinity of Des Moines and the other towns mentioned in the map. I authorized that this be done.

Mr. Rorer stated that Mr. Bremer was now in receipt of a letter asking that \$25,000.00 be prepared for delivery on April 7 at a St. Louis hotel. He is communicating with St. Louis to handle this angle.

Mr. Rorer states that further information has been obtained with reference to the Hudson automobile in which the Dillinger mob made their get-away. Sol Cleeman purchased the car and he has been located and questioned. He stated that he bought the car for his boss, Tom Filbin and he brought the salesman to Filbin and introduced him to Filbin and told the salesman that Filbin was his boss. Filbin, Mr. Rorer advises, runs the Tederal Trade Acceptance Corporation. The car was delivered by the salesman at the place of business of the salesman. Mr. Rorer stated they were going to find Filbin, bring him in and hold him until he talked.

Mr. Rorer stated that every effort was being made to avoid the use of police at St. Paul consistent with the Director's instructions, but that he frankly believed it could not be done for the reason that as many leads are coming in to the St. Paul Police Department as are coming into the St. Paul office of the Division as to the whereabouts of Dillinger. Rorer stated that the information received by the police is initially just as important as that which we receive and that unless an Agent joins them and works with them we will lose all advantage of this information. He thinks that a Special Agent should work with the police in running out these leads and there were thousands of leads coming in and all of them were being handled as rapidly as possible. I informed him that I would acquaint the Director with his observation in this connection.





Dear Sir:

The attached article from the Washington Post of today was noted this morning and I accordingly phoned Agent Schooles at Lynchburg. He stated that R. Z. Matthews, a filling station owner, R.F.D. #1. Roanoke, Virginia, saw a picture of Dillinger in the World News, Roanoke, Virginia, issue of March 29, 1934, and shortly after seeing this picture a man pulled into his filling station who he thought answered Dillinger's description. This man was 43 years of age, dark eyes, dark hair, fair complexion, with a dimple in his chin, had no mustache and no scars. There was a woman with him aged 25 with blue eyes and no other description given. The suspect was driving in a 1930 model Willys Knight sedan with Virginia license tags. The operator did not remember the number of these tags. A quart of oil was purchased and suspect asked how far it was to Lynchburg, Virginia. The car came from the direction of Roanoke and headed toward Lynchburg. In the back of the car was a bag which seemed to be about the size of a machine gun.. The Lynchburg police kept a look-out for this car on March 29, 1934 but saw nothing of it.

C. W. Coleman, a state police officer at Bedford, Virginia, had a circular issued by the State headquarters at Richmond to the effect that the State Superintendent of Police at Charleston, West Virginia issued a bulletin on March 26, 1934 to the effect that Dillinger was seen in a Cadillac sedan in West Virginia bearing Illinois license 193,452. The state officer did not know whether the car bore 1933 or 1934 license tags. The number of this car has been furnished all state police in Virginia.

Relative to R. Z. Matthews who stated that he identified Dillinger near Roanoke, Agent Schooles stated that he believes the informant's imagination ran away with him since he was taking a correspondence course in fingerprinting.

Mr. Rorer telephoned. In the apartment occupied by the individuals who got away today were found several interesting items:

- 1. A photograph of a boy about three and one-half years of age, on the back of which appears "John at the age of 32. Return to Audrey Hancock".
- 2. A photograph of a boy in a cherry tree on the back of which appears "Dillinger in a cherry tree. Return to Audrey".
- 3. A photograph taken in Indianapolis with a boy 14 years of age in a Sailor's uniform. The photograph bears a resemblance to Dillinger and the photograph was taken by a studio in Indianapolis.
- 4. A portion of a note or letter which was typewritter but torn, the legible portion of which is as follows:

"--- care whether I stay in or not. I am ready --- said I would do if matters are taken care of immediately. In the face of what is happening over there at Lima it is making it harder and harder for Harry here, and we should act quickly. I think if you will talk this over with the fellows they will realize that Harry has been fair all the way through and wants to continue to be and that they will be willing to help you to help him. It was on their advice and not Harry's that you turned those over. See what you can do because things are getting hotter for Harry every minute.

- 6. An American Airways ticket receipt from Chicago to Indianapolis #41820, dated March 19.
- 7. An Airways ticket envelope on the back of which is written "Greenview Hotel, 6234 South Green Street, Chicago."
- 8. A Northwestern Airways receipt #8856, undated, from Chicago to St. Paul.
- 9. A Western Union money order dated Chicago, March 19, 1934 "received from Grace B. Edwards, \$100.00, to Miss Ann Jackson, Detroit, Michigan."
- 10. A tablet on which appeared some ink writing of a chart or map showing a long route with mileage, turns and cross roads, with only two towns mentioned "Goldfield" and "Eagle Grove".
- 11. Quite a few bullets.

12. A Thompson sub-machine gun which was left in the Ford (not Plymouth) Coupe, the tire of which was shot off by Agent Nalls.

Mr. Rorer stated that Agent Brennan was not there and that Tierney, of the Police Department, was processing the automobile and guns for fingerprints; that there were three Agents with him observing him taking the prints from the guns in the apartment. Another Agent was with him when he took the prints from the Ford Coupe.

He stated that agents Coulter and Nalls went to the Police Department and asked for some men and they were told that there was only one men available and this one policeman went to the apartment with the two Agents.

I informed Mr. Rorer that this matter had obviously not been properly supervised as he should naturally have issued the necessary instructions and should have seen that they were carried out as to the number of men participating in the raid. He recognized this responsibility but stated there was no information as to the identity of the individuals who were occupying the apartment and there was no definite information that they were criminals.

Mr. Rorer stated he had telephoned Mr. Purvis, who was handling all leads in this matter at Chicago.

Mr. Purvis telephoned and stated that six press representatives were in his office and he had given them only the general information about the fact that individuals believed to be desperadoes were known to have left St.Paul today. Mr. Purvis is notifying the Chicago and Milwaukee Police Departments to be on the lookout for the automobile, Mr. Rorer having furnished the license number and description of the Hudson car in which the escape had been made.

I telephoned Mr. Rorer about the indication that Chief of Police at St. Paul stated that only one man was available to accompany the Special Agent when they made the raid today. Mr. Rorer stated that Special Agents Coulter and Nells called at the office of the Chief of Police and informed Mr. Dahill of the circumstances and also informed him that they did not know who occupied the premises. Chief of Police Dahill informed him that he could not of course trust everybody in the Police Department, but he would look around and see who he might find that could go with the agent. He walked back into the hallway and came back and reported that he had a good man to go with them.

The policeman and the two Special Agents then proceeded to the apartment where the event heretofore described occurred. Mr. Rorer stated that in effect this looked like there was but one man available to accompany the Special Agents on this particular detail. I inquired of Mr. Rorer as to whether the publicity appearing in the Chicago Newspapers was correct. that Special Agent Coulter was chased down the hall. He stated that Coulter was approached by the individual; Coulter inquired as to his purpose, and the answer came that he was a salesman. Coulter asked where his semples were and the salesman stated that they were in his car on the outside. He then started to go down the stairs toward the car; Coulter followed him and questioned him further. The man stopped on a landing and stated. "You asked for it, now I'll give it to you", and started shooting. Coulter ducked into a doorway. The man continued shooting at Coulter who at that time did not have his gun drawn, but he, while trying to draw his gun, ran down the hallway and into a doorway before he could draw his gun to return the fire. It was this which might in effect be described as a chase down the hallway, and this was observed by a boy, probably a newsboy, outside, who later gave the details to a newspaper man. Coulter was running until he could get his gun drawn, and then he started shooting himself.

Dillinger's prints were found on a Listerine Bottle taken from the apartment. Chief of Police Dahill says he wants to avoid publicity.

In accordance with your request to obtain the exact details of the shooting at St. Paul with particular reference to 10 1934 the article appearing in the Washington Herald stating that our wo agents remained on the outside of the premises while the police officer went inside, I obtained the following information from Mr.

Rorer by telephone this evening, after reading him the article in question is

Mr. Rorer stated that the above article was not correct in stating that Agents Coulter and Nalls had remained on the outside. that Nalls was requested to remain on the outside while Coulter and Cummings, the police officer, went inside and knocked on the apartment door. A woman came to the door, said she was not dressed and closed the door. Coulter went back down stairs, leaving the police officer at the door of the apartment, and telephoned Mr. Rorer at the office and stated the circumstances, whereupon Mr. Rorer told him to break down the door. Coulter told Rorer that he had only one police officer with him. Rorer sent two more agents over, but they did not arrive before the shooting took place. After talking with Rorer, Coulter went back up stairs, and at the top of the stairs he met a man who asked him where Mr. Johnson's apartment was. Coulter asked him who he was and the man stated he was a soep selesman, Coulter asked to see his samples and the man said they were in the car outside. He started down the steps and Coulter followed him, whereupon the man pulled a gun and started at Coulter, who ducked into an alcove, drew his gun and started shooting at the man_who escaped through a door leading into the apartment building. While the shooting between Coulter and the man was occurring, another individual on the inside of the apartment in question took a machine gun and started shooting through the door of the apartment and then he came out and started running down the hall with Officer Cummings firing at him. He escaped also through another entrance. It is believed that Coulter may have wounded the man he fired at because of several blood stains that were found, however it is thought the man wore a bullet proof west as several were found in the apartment.

While the above was occurring Agent Nalls who had remained in a car on the outside observed two woman come out of the building and drive away in a car, the license number of which was secured and which is being checked. He also saw a man get out of a Ford Coupe and enter the building, which was apparently the same individual who did the shooting at Coulter.

I read Mr. Rorer the article in the Herald and he stated that that story was not appearing the St. Paul papers, however the newspapers there were sore at him because of the fact that he would not give them

OFFICE DESTROYED THAT PROTECTION OF THE PROPERTY OF THE PROPERT

Mr. Rover further stated that there was nothing extremely suspicious at the outset when he had sent Coulter and Nalls over to look the place over. The apartment manager had reported to the Chief of Police that there were some suspicious characters occupying one of the apartments in her building but that there was no indication who the suspects might be. Agents Coulter and Nalls had proceeded to the apartment the night before and surveyed the place but had reported to Horer that there was nothing to it. Rover however told them to get some aid from the police and to go over and knock the place open.

The manager does not identify Dillinger's picture as that of any of the occupants, but she does identify the picture of Hamilton, who is one of Dillinger's close friends. Mr. Rorer stated that there is not much doubt that Dillinger was one of the two men, and that he has every man working on the case.

Agent in Charge Larson called from Detroit and advised that they were going to keep the two houses in Detroit in the Dillinger case under surveillance again; that this surveillance was discontinued when Ann Jackson left Detroit the other day; that in talking with Mr. Hanni he was advised that one of the women in St. Paul who escaped with Fillinger Saturday wore a hudson seal coat; that Ann Jackson wears a hudson seal coat and he is of the opinion that Ann Jackson was with Dillinger when he escaped; that Ann Jackson has a daughter 12 years of age at Detroit who is staying at one of the houses there and that he is of the opinion that Ann Jackson might possibly return to Detroit to either get her daughter or visit her, therefore he is again covering the houses there. He stated that he only had four Agents at Detroit and he would have to send two of them on the road to cover some cases at Detroit which required attention. He stated that one Agent is on the road at the present time. Mr. Clegg came back to his office during this conversation and instructed Mr. Larson to hold up the investigation of the other cases in his office and to concentrate on the Dillinger case. He was told not to send any Agents on the road and to use all of the Agents at his office on the Dillinger case in weeks

She refuses to explain anything about these registration cards. She had an invoice for an Essex Teraplane and the Hudson which was one of the cars used by the Dillinger crowd was purchased from the same people. There was a letter in her purse addressed to Edwin N. Bess.



Inspector Rorer advised that by checking bad should should be the fact, in the vicinity of Des Moines, Ious, it might be possible to thermine some hide-out of Dillinger and his confederates. On the

Referring to our telephonic conversation this day garding the chart found in subject's room in St. Peul. Concerning the shooting at St. Paul on Tuesday afternoon, Special Agent in Charge Werner Hanni advises that Mrs. Coffey, manager of the apartment house on Lexington Avenue where the shooting occurred Saturday, advised that persons shooting at Agent Coulter had two weeks ago rented an apartment at 2214 Marshall Avenue and that on Saturday, March 31, the day of the shooting this person had left this Marshall Avenue apartment with a brown leather bag thirty inches long, which appeared heavy. He had not returned there since and the apartment prior to March 31 contained a suitcase and other objects which were similar to those found in the Lexington Avenue apartment, which had been occupied by Dillinger. This information was obtained from Mrs. Coffey's janitor, who learned of it from the janitor at the Marshall Avenue address. After 11 P.M., Monday night, four Special Agents were assigned to the Marshall Avenue apartment building, on guard. Special Agent in Charge Hanni, Special Agent Coulter, Chief of Police Dahill, Detectives Tierney and Manion, of the St. Paul Police Department, went to the janitor's door the next morning, but he was not in. The location of the apartment, as #106, was determined Tuesday morning by the Special Agents and at&10 A.M. Tuesday morning, Special Agents Gross and Nalls were left in the apartment with machine-gums. Special Agent Coulter processed the place for fingerprints. Around 11:30 A.M. Tuesday, Lucy Wackson, came to the apartment at 2214 Marshall Avenue, and was greeted with a machine-gun pushed against her stomach. Her sister, another negro woman, Leona Goodman, waited in an automobile outside, and was also brought into the apartment by an Agent. The two negro women were then brought to the St. Paul Division Office, where statements were taken from them to the effect that Green, the man who was shot, using the name of Stephens, called with Mrs. Stephens at the home of the negress, Leona Goodman, at about 10 A.M. Tuesday and asked her to go to the Marshall Avenue address to get a suitcase, a coat, the laundry and some silver money and bring it to Leona Goodman's home on Rondo Street in St. Paul,

where Stephens would call for it later in the day. She was to get a dollar for this. She obtained the aid of her sister Lucy, with the results heretofore described.

In the Marshall Avenue apartment were found automatic gum clips and a supply of ammunition, and the butt of a machine-gum, probably being the butt of the machine-gum which was abandoned in the Ford Saturday when an effort was made to shoot Agent Coulter and the police. Leona Goodman admits that she has worked in the past as a maid and laundress for individuals identified as Dot and Myrtle Taton, Harry and Gladys Sawyer, Bernard Phillips and Winnie Williams, Charlie and Paula Harmon and Louis Brooks, all mobsters and molls, although their last names were usually not remembered by her.

Special Agents Gross, Notesteen and Wood, with the negress Leona Goodman, returned to Leona's residence on Rondo Street. She was instructed to deliver the large handbag to Stephens if he called. Shortly before 6 P.M. Tuesday Stephens and Mrs. Stephens drove up to Leona's house. Stephens rushed up to the door. Leona gave him the handbag and slammed the door. Stephens motor was left running and as he passed a window, returning to the car. Special Agent in Charge Hanni, who was nearby on the outside of the building, together with Agent Hardy, stated that he, Hanni, heard a call "Halt" or "Stop". Stephens turned around, swinging his arms in what Gross and Notesteen considered a threatening or menacing gesture. Notesteen cried "Let him have it" and Gross did with a machine-gun. An Agent called an ambulance. Stephens, according to telephonic reports from the hospital, disclosed that he was in the attack on Coulter and the policeman Saturday on the outside, while Dillinger used the "tommy", a Colt, from within the apartment, also that the keys found on Stephens belonged to Dillinger, also that we got Dillinger's bullet-proof vest, but not Stephens'. This man Stephens is Glede alias Graham alias Ryan alias Rogue, shown in the press release previously sent by teletype, and with the woman heretofore called Mrs. Stephens they had resided under the name of Mr. and Mrs. T. J. Randall at 3300 Freemont Avenue, Minneapolis. Minnesota. In this apartment were found one bullet-proof vest, one loaded 50-round machine-gum, one Thompson sub-machine gum and one .45 automatic pistol and one high-powered rifle (nice people).

The witnesses to the shooting were Special Agents
Gross, Wood, Notesteen, Hanni and Hardy. Brennen and Hall were
nearby. The negress, Leona Goodman, and her brother, Moses
Gardner, although in the house at the time did not see the shooting,
nor did they see victim at the time he was shot.

The St. Paul Pioneer-Press this morning carries the headline "U. S. Agents Shoot Gumman who Eluded Them on Lexington Avenue Recently, Dillinger Clues Seen in Big Round-Up of Desperadoes Here". There is no unfavorable comment in this newspaper release, which quotes verbatim the release which was furnished them shortly after 12:30 last night. I understand that the victim Stephens, with many aliases, is not expected to live.

Mr. Clegg telephoned from St. Paul at six o'clock this morning, and gave the following information to Agent Peterson:

Mr. Clegg has spent the night interviewing a woman known as Bessie, a relative of the individual who was shot. Some very interesting and valuable information has been obtained, relative to the Dillinger gang. According to this woman, the Dillinger gang is now possibly in St. Paul. She referred to an individual by the name of ("Red," and identified a photograph of John Chamilton as being this individual. Tommy Carroll, also a member of this gang, is a wellknown local mobster. Homer/Van, Meter is also a member of this mob, as well as another individual by the name of Jimmy, who is little, light, and appears to be about twenty-four This woman stated that last Wednesday or Thursday while she and Green were at their apartment, John Dillinger, and the girl with a dark complexion, known to her as "Billy", but whom she identified by photograph as being the Frechetti girl, called at her home. As stated, she and Green were absent from the 3300 Freemont Avenue at the time. However, on the following day, Thursday she believes, Dillinger called with Evelyn Frechetti, and stayed in the apartment a few minutes, although she claims that she went to the kitchen at the time and did not engage in any of the conversation, since she dislikes There appears to be some friction between this woman and Dillinger, because in the mumblings of Green at the hospital he has indicated that John does not like Bessie The woman further stated that at the Lexington Avenue address, where the shooting occurred last Saturday, it appeared to her from information she had received, that those therewere John Dillinger and Evelyn Frechetti in the apartment, and definitely identified Homer Van Meter as the individual who drove up in a Ford coupe, and who came upstairs, representing himself as a soap salesman, and then opened fire on Special Agents and Police Officers. Shortly after this shooting scrape last Saturday, Evelyn Frechetti called at the apartment house of this Green woman, Bessie. She came in and asked for Green, making the remark that they had had trouble at their apartment, and that John was hurt, having been shot in the leg, although the wound was not a serious one. Green, the man who was shot last Monday, and the Frechetti woman immediately left the apartment, their destination being unknown to Bessie; according to her statement. Bessie further claims that later that night, Saturday, Homer Van Meter came to her apartment and stayed a few moments, then left. At that time he indicated that he was the individual who represented himself to be the soap salesman. Shedefinitely states that Eddie Green, who was shot, was not at the scene of the shooting, although it is to be remembered that Green in his mumblings at the hospital stated that he walked away, indicating that he was on the outside. She definitely denies knowing the present whereabouts of this mob. She furnished certain names of those who might be placed under observation, and investigation along this line is already under way.





MEMORANDUM FOR THE DIRECTOR

The postal authorities at Jacksonville, Florida, advised Special Agent (in Charge Alt) on March 27, 1934, that one Isabella Messmer mailed a registered package to Harry O Pierpont, care of County Jail, Lima, Ohio, on March 26, 1934, insured for \$5,000.

Special Agent in Charge Alt furnished the Detroit office this information by wire on the same day and Special Agent in Charge Larson communicated with Ernest M. Botkin, the Prosecuting Attorney at Lima, Ohio, who has advised that the package in question was received at Lima, Ohio, and in turn forwarded to the Ohio State Penitentiary at Columbus, Ohio, where Harry Pierpont is now incarcerated; further that inasmuch as the contents of the package was unknown, and because of the possibility that it might contain explosives of some sort, long term prisoners were designated to open the package, which was found to contain a tiny ten cent toy pistol, and that a note accompanied the package advising Pierpont that the pistol was sent for his assistance in a possible escape but that he should use every precaution in shooting same so as to not injure anyone too seriously.

Before information as to the contents of the package was received, a letter was received at the Post Office in Jacksonville, Florida, for Isabella Messmer, care of General Delivery. A Special Agent in Charge (Alt) with the assistance of the police at Jacksonville, Florida, arrested the woman on March 30, 1934 and she claimed that the package contained a toy, which she sent as a joke.

(You will recall that Harry Pierpont was convicted the other day and sentenced to be electrocuted for the murder of Sheriff Jesse Sarber, at Lima, Ohio, on October 12, 1933, at which time John Dillinger was liberated from the County Jail at Lima, Ohio."




