





MEMORANDUM FOR MR. LADD

Re: DISHELBERGET OF COUNTERINTELLIGENCE CORPS. G-2

It has been apparent to the writer for several months Miss Gandy__ that certain powerful interests within or near the War Department have undertaken an active program aimed at the dismemberment of the Counterintelligence Corps of G-2. It is now the writer's belief that this opinion is justified because of certain information which has come to my attention and which is set out below.

Recently at a G-2 social function the writer had a long discussion with Colonel Kibler who is Officer in Charge of the Counterintelligence Corps. This discussion was of a very frank nature since the writer has become very friendly personally with Colonel Kibler. The Colonel stated quite frankly that the reason Counterintelligence Corps had been wrecked was that Harry Hopkins and the Secret Service had ordered it to be so wrecked. Colonel Kibler stated that through some unknown means Harry Hopking learned that the Counterintelligence Corps was investigating Joseph Lash, former Young Communist leader who is now in the Army and that in this investigation they had run upon Mrs. Roosevelt who had come to Chicago apparently for the purpose of meeting Lash. Colonel Kibler stated that he did not know exactly how Hopkins found out about this but believed it was through some indiscretion of Colonel Furbershaw who is the Director of Intelligence, Sixth Service Command, stationed in chicago.

Colonel John Bissell has recently been in Washington on leave and the writer spent an evening with him at his home. During the course of the evening Colonel Bissell exhibited a deep bitterness about the way he had been treated in the Army and after a period of time advised the writer of the reason why he had been so treated. He stated that he had learned that he had been recommended for a promotion to Brigadier General on several occasions and on each occasion this recommendation had been stopped in the office of Lieutenant General McNarney, Deputy Chief of Staff.

Recently while Bissell was in Washington he made some calls at the Mar Department and learned that he had been blackballed by the White House. He also learned that because of his record it was quite possible that at the present time, if he had not been blackballed, he would be a Major General. He also had a long discussion with Colonel Forney who succeeded Bissell as Chief, Counterintelligence Group, G-2. Forney advised Bissell that the reason he had been blackballed and the reason that he would never advance any further in the Army and would probably never be sent out of the country with troops was because he had been connected with the Joe Lash-Eleanor Roosevelt investigation in Chicago.

Forney stated to Bissell that the facts of this investigation had been disclosed to the White House through some unknown means and that shortly after Bissell left, a call was received by General Strong and Colonel Forney to proceed to the White House with the complete records of this matter at approximately 10:00 p.m. at night. When they reached the White House they were received by the President, General Watson and Harry Honkins and were ordered to produce the entire records in this case. Colonel Forney stated to Colonel Bissell that this was extremely embarrassing in as much as the material contained a recording of the entire proceedings between Lash and Mrs. Roosevelt which had been obtained through a microphone which had been planted in the hotel room. This recording indicated quite clearly that Mrs. Roosevelt and Lash engaged in sexual intercourse during their stay in the hotel room. Forney advised Bissell that after this record was played Mrs. Roosevelt was called into the conference and was confronted with the information and this resulted in a terrific fight between the President and Mrs. Roosevelt. At approximately 5:00 a.m. the next morning the President called for General Arnold, Chief of the Army Air Corps, and upon his arrival at the conference ordered him to have Lash outside the United States and on his way to a combat post within ten hours.

After the conference was over it was learned that the President had ordered that anybody who knew anything about this case should be immediately releaved of his duties and sent to the South Pacific for action against the Japs until they were killed. Forney advised Bissell that everyone who is known to have any knowledge at all of this matter is on the permanent black list at the White House. Bissell stated that the only thing that kept these men from being sent to the South Pacific was that it was learned that there were too many of them to be treated in this manner. Colonel Bissell stated that the only reason that more was not done to him was that General Watson apparently came to his defense and assured the President that Bissell would not talk about this matter indiscriminately.

MEMORANDUM FOR THE DIRECTOR:

Mr. Ladd and I have checked on the Joe Lash file.

With reference to the Mrs. Roosevelt incident, we of course never investigated this. It was investigated by CIC prior to 1943. We do have a photostat of the G-2 file.

IN MA BARCAN GILES. There were no recordings, between Mrs. Roosevelt and Lash. Obviously, they did have a microphone because there were recordings of conversations between Lash and Mrs. Trudie w. Fratt which also reflected what transpired in the hotel room.

This information was given to George Burton by Colonel Kibler and Colonel Jack Bissell. It is recorded in a blue memorandum dated December 31, 1943.

The blue memorandum and a photostat of the G-2 file are maintained by liss Jandy but have never been in the Files Section.

It is not believed that anyone in the Bureau has knowledge of this except Burton, Mr. Ladd, E. A. Tamm, me, and the stenographer whose initials are FIL and whose identity we are now trying to establish.

It is therefore believed thoroughly safe for Mr. Tracy to tell Senator Watkins the FBI never investigated the Rocsevelt-Lash incident. There is nothing from official sources on this in the FBI files.

Both Mr. Ladd and I do recall there have been newspaper articles linking Lash to Ers. Roosevelt.

In 1949, Frank Waldrop of the Times Herald told me they were on the trail of certain recordings that allegedly would show an illicit relationship between Lash and Mrs. Roosevelt. At that time I made a thorough check of all our files and there was nothing in the main files. The pink memorandum has never been circulated in the Bureau and is not known to anyone outside of Viss Lurz in my office, Mr. Tolson, Miss Gandy, and you. Mr. Ladd was informed of my check this morning although he vaguely recalls when I was checking on this a year ago.

Marion Canty, who is Drew Pearson's secretary, left the Eureau in October, 1944. However, she would have no knowledge of this as she had been in the maskington Field Office from 1937 to 1744 when she resigned.

The photostat of the G-2 file and the blue memorandum dated December 31, 1943, are attached.

Mr. Tracy will be advised along the lines of our discussion this morning. He will also tell katkins that Anderson's wife works in Ident but does not have access to the main files. I think, as a tactic, Tracy should get across to Watkins and Watkins should carry the point to Anderson that he had checked at the FBI and FBI files do not contain any such information. It is obvious that Anderson probably has learned of the file from G-2 sources and from the rumors which have been circulated in Washington.

It now seems that the Poles would have to have a big slice o Eastern Germany if the Russians insist on the Western Ukraine and Byelo Russia—as they do. That can only be worked out by shifting millions of people and would be the one beginning of a general carving up of Germany. It may be necessary, but unless it is undertaken with complete ruthlessness, it will fail. I think it would mean bringing Germany under Russian orbit. Not immediately but inevitably. A peace with the status que over anti-powers would need a strong Germany. So the anti-Russian SIKORSKI is really working against himself.

The Csecks under Benes have decided to work completely with Russia. You probably saw that Russia granted their third(?) Ruthenia. They proposed a federation of nations, also completely under Russian protection to which the Poles and the exiled Yugoslavians are unalterably opposed. HODZA, who came here for his health is arranging the Slovaks against Benes. He is working with the Yugoslavs here who are fighting the Partisans. You saw that Benes is expected here.

This document set forth the aims, purposes and policies of the World Youth Council and included plans for its organization. This officer copied a letter on the dresser to Subject from Mrs. ROOSEVELT, Exhibit III. A copy was also made of a letter from Mrs. PRATT to Subject and contained in her notebook (Exhibit IV). This PRATT had written to Subject in the past month.

This officer also inspected the pocket of the note-book which contained about a dozen letters from Subject to Mrs. PRATT. These letters discussed Subject's life in the barracks, his school work, and made numerous references to organizations in which he appeared interested. References were also made throughout these letters to Mrs. ROOSEVELT and remarks that she had made concerning progressive movements.

Subject and Mrs. PRATT returned to the room at 2 o'clock in the afternoon, where they remained until 7 o'clock in the evening. During this time they engaged in conversation. At 6:50 Mrs. PRATT placed a long distance telephone call to Mrs. ROOSEVELT at the White House, Washington, D.C.

At 7 o'clock in the evening they left the Urbana Lincoln Hotel and did not return until 9:30. At this time they placed a call to Mr. GEORGE WENZEL, c/o Mrs. WILSON, Completed. Soon after making this call Subject and Mrs. PRATT retired.

Subject and Mrs. PRATT awakened at 6:10 on the morning of March 14, 1945, dressed, and checked out of the Urbana Lincoln Hotel.

Subject and Mrs. PRATT appeared to be greatly endeared to each other and engaged in sexual intercourse a number of times during the course of their stay at the Urbana Lincoln Hotel.
