Crininal record of Frank Harm

On September 13, 1913, Frank Hesh, \$4458, was received at the State Penitentiary, McAlester, Oklahoma, from Elowa County to serve a life sentence, srine - murder. On March 25, 1918, this sentence was commuted to 10 years and en July 10, 1918, he was granted a full pardom.

Bash was arrested by the Sheriff's Office at Cordell, Oklahoma, October 18, 1919, charge - investigation, bank robbery. On December 18, 1919, he was convicted at Cordell, Oklahoma, for burglary by explosives of the Corn State Bank at Corn, Oklahoma, on October 17, 1919, and was sentenced to serve 25 years in the Oklahoma State Penitentiary. On October 15, 1922, Mash made application for elemency in the form of a sixty day furlough, alleging business reasons. On December 29, 1922 the Governor of Oklahoma signed an order commuting the 25 year sentence to 5 years, and on the following day, December 30, 1922, Mash was discharged from the Oklahoma State Penitentiary.

Hash as \$20769, was received at the United States Pomitentiary, Leavenworth, Kansas, March 3, 1924, erime - assemble of sail custodien, of sentence - 25 years. He escaped from this institution on the evening of October 19, 1930.

Wash was arrested at Bot Springs, Arkansas, on June 16, 1933, and was shot and killed by gangsters at the Union Station in Kansas City, Missouri, on June 17, 1933.

Lest night near Platte City, Missouri, at a tourist camp, two or more men and one woman or more, who were suspected as being identical with Clyde Champion Barrow, Marvin Ivan Barrow and the women who travel with them, one possibly being Bonnie Parker, took two cabins for the night. Various officers were advised, through a confidential informant and the Sheriff of Kenses City, Missouri, with numerous other officers formed a posses which surrounded the cabins in an effort to capture the parties housed therein. A gun battle ensued and the individuals, believed at that time to be the Barrows, escaped. It is reported that one or more of the persons in the party were severely wounded. Special Agent in Charge Gus T. Jones and Special Agents Dwight Brantley and L. G. Turrou are now in the process of making complete investigation near Platte City at the place where the incident occurred. A detailed account will be later forthcoming showing the & results of the investigation made.

There was found in the cabin from which the parties left a .45 calibre Colt Automatic, Model 911, U. S. Army, U. S. Government property, Serial #575279. This pistol is being analyzed by a ballistician at Kansas City. Any other weapons that may be found on the premises are also to be analyzed.

It has now been determined from a display of photographs that the men who occupied the cabins are Clyde Champion Barrow and Marvin Ivan Barrow, notorious outlaws and killers.

A broadcast has on this date been had over radio stations K.M.B.C. and W.D.A.F., Kansas City, Micsouri, notifying the public of the above occurrence. It is believed the wounded party may seek medical aid and that some physician may be kidnapped for that purpose. All doctors receiving mysterious calls of any kind have been requested to immediately communicate with the nearest Police. Sheriff or United States Bureau of Investigation office. Further reference is made to letter from July 15, 1933, concerning newspaper clippings indicating that Pretty Boy O Floyd was reported to have recently been seen at New Providence, Tennessee.

Special Agent R. E. Peterson of this office on July 15, 1933, contacted Lr. C. Frank Reed, Selesman for the Kerr Glass Company Lemphis, Tennessee, in that city and at that time Lir. Reed stated that on June 29, 1933, when at the Austin Filling Station at New Providence, Tennessee, he noticed three Liarmon Sedans that were being serviced by the attendant; that he recognized one of the men in this group as being Charles Floyd and spoke to him, having known Floyd in Oklahoma. Reed claims that he asked Floyd what he had in the cars and the latter claimed that he had some moving picture machines and then took Reed over to one of the cars when Reed noticed that it was equipped with four water cooled machine guns. Reed further noticed, according to what he says. Floyd was accompanied by several men who apparently were his body guards, all of whom were very well dressed.

Er. Reed claims to have formerly resided in Oklahoma. and that he knows Floyd very well, and further that he knows Floyd's mother and half-brother, elthough until on this particular occasion he had not seen Floyd for about a year. Reed, also, claims that Floyd was armed with two pistols, although he had no machine guns in the particular automobile which he was driving. This automobile, he claims, was painted a dark blue color, as well as the two other cars, but he did not notice license plates that any of them bore. He further claims that Floyd was directing the servicing of the automobiles; that he asked him if he wanted a bottle of beer, that Floyd refused the beer but did take a bottle of grape pop - the proprietor of the filling station waiting on the two of them at that time.

Floyd at this time in answer to query of Reed, according to the latter, said that he had nothing to do between that particular point and Atlanta.

Special Agent R. E. Peterson also reported that at the time he interviewed Reed that the latter had been drinking.

Agent Peterson also contacted Er. J. W. Slaughter, Sales Lanager for the Kerr Glass Company, under whose supervision Reed is employed, and Slaughter claims that Reed is very reliable and that the latter had also told him of having seen Floyd at New Providence, Tennessee.

Special Agents J. L. LicCaffrey and J. M. Towler in New Providence, Tennessee, as is stated in the letter of reference, had contacted O. C. barnell of the Austin Filling Station who stated that he had not recalled any such party as having been at that station on July 6, 1933, and when subsequently contacted again by Special Agent J. L. LicCaffrey advised that he did not recall having serviced three Marmon sedens on June 29, 1933, as has been stated by Reed. Darnell advised that he does not recall servicing any such automobiles either prior or since that date, further that he was the only one on duty at his service station on that date and ever since the station was opened the first part of June, 1933.

Agents Liccaffrey and Towler also interviewed Lir. W. C. Austin, who owns a general store adjacent to the Austin Filling Station, and he also said that he had seen no such party at New Providence, Tenn. Agents also interviewed Lir. C. W. Riggins of the Gulf Filling Station, Lir. C. O. Presten of the Standard Oil Filling Station, and Lir. Richard Hoffman, who operates an independent station at New Providence, Tennessee, and which stations include all of those in New Providence) all of whom stated they had seen no such party in that vicinity.

These Agents, also, reported that Mr. M. H. Watt, with whom C. Frank Reed, the originator of this story, lived at Clarksville, Tennessee, at the time that Reed claimed to have seen Floyd at New Providence, stated that at the time Reed was at his home in Clarksville he was more or less under the influence of liquor at all times.

They all refer to him as being a regular fellow a right guy a guy that will hold still, a fellow who will stand for an open verdict, A very nice reputetion for a city official, but he has really earned it homestly and is fully entitled to it and enjoys it. Here is may Leo McLaughlin as the records of the daily press of Hot Springs will disclose was the City Attorney about twelve years ago when the Chief of Police was shot and killed by a cheap tin horn gambler who /was a metive son of Bot Springs, Arkansas but who had not resided there in years but who had returned and had been ordered out of town by the Wief of Police Oscar Sullivan, but who refused to leave upon the advice of the City Attorney who acted as his counsel and advised him not leave, that Sullivan was not running the town. McLemphlin and Culliven were very unfriendly due to conflict of authority, it was said that each wanted it all and would not split, this may not be just right because on the other hand Sullivan was said to be a hard boiled baby who would not allow things to go the way the City Attorney would have liked them to go, that he was playing up to the church element and blocking gambling and threatening raids and no money was to be made in the town while Sullivan was Chief of Police and McLaughlin City Attorney because they could not get together. Things went along until one evening Sullivan was shot and killed by the gambler he had ordered to leave town who fired the shots from an automobile in which was seated at the time as a witness the City Attorney who was also the friend and attorney of the gumbler and the enemy of the Chief of Police and who became the chief defense witness. Word went out in the underworld to save the gambler, witness were dug up to backup the story that was told by the Gambler and the City Attorney, that Bullivan was the aggressor that he was picking on a weakling, that he was the town bully and all sorts of talk went around to discredit the dead man who could not speak in defense of his name it was even said he was trying to extort money from the gambler and that McLaughlin -had advised him not to pay and that was may the Chief was antagonistic to the City Attorney, well at any rate the City Attorney certainly did not dignify his official position in this instance and he has earned for himself honestly the reputation of being heart and soul in accord with the workings of the criminal underworld which also includes his good man Fridgy who he appointed as Calef of Police from a Bath House Attendent.

Bow the underworld at Kansas City and Hot Springs and St. Jouis are very well connected, Hot Springs of course has leads in to all towns for the simple reason it is considered now as it was thirty years ago before the clean up at that time, that it was the home of the criminal he could live there in peace of aind, wold of harrassment and exposure and could all himself safe from molestation by the city officials providing however he went to the right people and received the each.

Please do not show this to any one, but make use of the information contained in this letter and I am satisfied you will uncover the plot that sent your officers to their doom, they wanted to cut off the connection leading from the underworld up and into the Department of Justice, the speaking tube had to be cut off and capped for once and all time and they done it, just think it over. If they had taken the prisoner to jail and then later removed him not so much would have been thought of it, but the way it was done throwed a leaver that sent a shock of fear into the heart of every original and law violator in Not Springs, every one felt that the United States Government was going to step in and investigate conditions because it was a Government Reservation and that all vices would be exposed and the first step had already been started.

been missing except Whitey McNamee, who is still at Colorado Springs, but who is not engaged in any business. There was also a dealer named Inmann at the Broadmoor Club.

Chief of Police Harper informs that the Assistant District Attorney believes he saw Dick Galatas at the Club the night they raided the club.

Photographs of Verne Miller and Dick Calatas, as well as the photographs of all suspects in this case, covered by Identification Orders, were exhibited to a number of persons at Colorado Springs, all of whom stated they do not believe any such persons were around the gambling house while it was in business. Joe Hamm is said to have returned to Kansas City, Missouri, and Inmann is supposed to be still at Colorado Springs. The whereabouts of Nolan Wilson, alias Tex Wilson, is not known, although it is believed that he will be in Central City, Colorado, early in August when the Pioneer Celebration is pulled off there.

The Chief informs that he is keeping a careful lookout for the men wanted and should any of them be located he will endeavor to effect their apprehension.

The Chief also stated that Louis Lewis, a gambler from Kansas City, Oklahoma and Omaha, and one Logan Vanzandt, a gentleman golfer from Tulsa, Oklahoma, who was hooked up with Lewis, were also at Colorado Springs during the tournament, but that neither of them could be the man Galatas.

On July 17, 1933, telephone communication was received from Special Agent in Charge R. B. Vetterli of the Eansas City Bureau Office, to the effect that Dick Calatas was believed to be at Reno, Nevada. Agent informed him that Agent wine of this office was then at Reno and arrangements were made to issue instructions to Agent Wine direct from Kensas City and furnish a photograph of Calatas.

On July 18, 1953, a communication was received from Agent Wine to the effect that he checked the post office, the telegraph companies, the leading hotels, and conferred with the Chief of Police and Sheriff at Reno, Nevada, in an effort to locate Dick Galatas; that Frank Golden, Manager of the Golden Hotel, Reno, related that the photograph of Galatas strongly resembled a man who was in the Bank Bar, a gambling establishment, about a week ago, and that he was talking with an i Italian known as Marioch, who conducts a "chicken shack" on South Virginia Street, Reno, about a mile south of the city limits; that Under Sheriff William Richardson informed that the photograph of Galatas resembled a man whom he had seen several weeks ago in the Commercial Bar at Reno, Nevada. Agent Tine made arrangements with the authorities at Reno to endeavor to locate Marioch and through informants to locate Galatas.

On July 20, 1933, Agent Wine telephoned the Salt Lake City Bureau Office from Reno, Nevada, to the effect that the photograph of Galatas had been

identified at Reno as a man who was believed to be now in Reno, and Agent Wine, through the police and sheriff and underworld informants, is endeavoring to effect the location of Galatas.

The Kenses City Bureau Office was telegraphically advised of this latest development on July 20, 1933.

In connection with thesigned statement which I voluntarily furnished to Dwight Brantley and L. G. Turrou, Special Agents of the United States Bureau of Investigation, on July 9, 1933, I desire at this time to make certain corrections, seid corrections are being made by me freely and voluntarily to Special Agents Dwight Brantley and L. G. Turrou:

Shortly prior to my arrest, I requested my grand-father, Harvey Bean, who lives with me at Joplin, Missouri, to tell anyone, when he would be questioned, that my husband and I were not at our home on the night of June 16, 1935, during the time when Colatas, Mrs. Nash and her child were at my house. I told him to say that my husband and I were at the home of my mother-in-law, Mrs. Rannie Farmer at Webb City, Missouri. I did this because I did not want to have my husband involved, as I learned from the newspapers that there was a warrant out for his arrest in connection with the Kansas City Union Station shooting on June 17, 1933.

I further desire to state at this time, that when Mrs. Frances Hesh talked over the telephone to someone at Kansas City from my house on the night of June 16, 1933. I, previously thereto, asked my husband's permission for Mrs. Nesh to use the telephone, and, although he did not talk over the telephone himself, he was present at the time in the same room. I insist that the telephone call was put in from my home to Kansas City by Mrs. Nesh, in spite of her assertion, and I deny Mrs. Nosh's allegation that this telephone call was put in by ms.

With reference to the telephone cells which were made to my house from Kansas City at 9:45 p.m. April 12, 1:33 and 11:14 p.m. on April 16, 1933, these calls beving emanated from the home of Verne Miller, I desire to state in this connection at this time that I was wrong when I stated in my previous state and dated July 9, 1935, that the said calls were received by someone else who had some to my house with a woman and remained there for two days without my knowledge while I was at Kansas City. The true fact is that on that day I went to town at Joplin to get some groc ries, and when I r turned home, I found Mr. and Mrs. Fred Smith, whom I knew as a "blokie," and whom I met while at Chicago, and later on at Hot Springs, but whose present wherebouts, I do not know. Smith, upon entering the house, told me that he had received the afore entioned telephone calls in Kras a City, and asked me whith r I had any objections to it, and I said "No." I have never seen Mr. and Mrs. Smith since. I have no knowledge

as to who answer d the telephone at my house on April 16, 1935. I have no recollection at this time that such cell was made to my house.

I have read the foregoing, and the above is true to the best of my knowledge and belief.

Turrou and Dwight Brantley in Kansas City, Missouri, on July 11, 1935, consisting of eight and one-half pages typewritten. This statement is made freely and voluntarily to the above named persons, whom I know to be Special Agents of the United States Bureau of Investigation, with the knowledge that what I say can be used against me.

When in Hot Springs, Arkansas, on the afternoon of June 16, 1933, after Dick Galatas had contacted me at the tourist camp where I was stopping, and when he told me of the arrest of my husband, he said to me that my husband was to be taken to Joplin, Missouri - that is to say - that he had learned in some manner that he was to be taken by the officers to Joplin. Dick Galatas told me that he "had the town of Hot Springs," and that through his influence, he would endeavor to see the officers who had my husband, and possibly could get him released. As Galatas told me about my husband being taken to Joplin, I thought when Galatas told me that he was taking me to Joplin that I would see my husband there.

At the tourist camp where Galatas first saw me, and at his home where he took me, he appeared to be infuriated and terribly upset, remarking that "they have taken your husband," and he seemed to be very angry because my husband had been taken in his town. This attitude of Galatas was displayed and expressed by him after we arrived at the home of Herbert and Esther Farmer near Joplin.

About ten o'clock on Friday evening, June 16, 1933, while I was at the home of the Farmers, a telephone call came from Hot Springs. Mrs. Farmer answered the telephone and immediately turned the receiver ever to Dick Galatas, who talked for a few minutes. I do not recall the substance of this conversation Galatas had. After he completed this telephonic conversation, Galatas told those present, including Herbert and Esther Farmer and me, there had been a change in transportation used in moving my husband, although I did not know where they were taking him - at least if Galatas learned it, he did not tell me. Shortly after the receipt of this call, Dick Galatas consulted a note book or a piece of paper he had in his hand, and almost immediately Esther Farmer placed a telephone call. I heard her call a number, but I do not recall the figures nor the city. I wish to state here, emphatically, that although I have been confronted by Mrs. Esther Farmer, at which time she said that I placed this particular telephone call, that I did not make it, and that it was made by Esther Farmer.

It did not take long for Esther to get the number. She talked for a short time and then told me the party to whom she was talking wanted to converse with me. I do not recall that Esther told me who was on the wire. When I took the receiver and began the conversation, the man talking called me Frances. I did not recognize the voice of this man. Our conversation was as I have related in my previous statement. After completing my talk with this man, I turned the telephone over to Dick Galatas. During this conversation, Galatas told the man on the wire that a change had been made in the mode of transportation used in moving my husband. I recall that I heard Dick Galatas tell this party that the train was to be used in moving my husband. I did not hear him say where they were taking my husband, nor did I hear him say where they had put him on the train.

Mr. Turrou and Mr. Brantley have questioned me concerning telephonic conversation from the place of business of Jake Orsen in Wenona, Illinois in June 11, 1933, to Kansas City, Missouri. I did not make this telephone all, and if my deceased husband made it, I do not know about it and he did not tell me anything concerning such a call. As is mentioned in my previous statement, both my deceased husband and I were in Wenona on that date, but I spent most of my time with Jake Orsen's wife and with his mother.

I want to say that I did not make any telephone calls from Hot Springs on June 16, 1933, and I have made only one call from that point, and that was at about the time of my marriage, when I called from Hot Springs, my cousin, Jake Orsen at Wenona, Illinois.

Dick Galatas did not tell me he had made any telephone calls during the afternoon of June 16, 1933. However, while I was at his home that afternoon, heard the telephone ring several times. When Galatas was taking me from the tourist camp in Not Springs to his residence in the same city, he stopped two or more times, but I do not recall the places at which he made such stops.

Mr. Turrou and Mr. Brantley have questioned me concerning a trip I made with my deceased husband, from Chicago to New York City. Sometime during April, 1932, as well as I recall, I was with my deceased husband in an automobile accident, near Chicago, at which time he sustained a fractured arm. He was not satisfied with the treatment rendered him in this injury by the Physicians in Chicago, and some time around Thanksgiving, shortly prior thereto, I believe, he told me he was going to New York to some hospital to have an operation. He took me with him to New York and we made the trip by train. I stopped at the Picadilly Rotel, located on West Forty-fifth Street, while my deceased husband was in a small hospital a few blocks from the hotel, but the name of which I do not recall. I believe that we spent approximately a month in New York City.

Mr. Turrou and Mr. Brantley have questioned me relative to the trip that I made to St. Paul with my deceased husband, at which time, we stopped at the home of some friends of his, and I have been asked whether, on this occasion I wore a blue knit dress. I did have such a dress and wore it, if I remember correctly, on the occasion of this visit to St. Paul.

I have read the foregoing statement, and it is true to the best of my knowledge and recollection.

Investigation is in progress at Hot Springs, Arkansas, and vicinity, where Special Agents Harold E. Anderson and R. B. Nathan are checking all possible leads which may develop from day to day. On July 17th, the following memorandum was submitted by those Agents:

*Hot Springs, Arkansas July 17, 1933.

Through the courtesty of Mr. H. W. Shepard, District Manager, South-Western Fell Telephone Company, Hot Springs, a list of toll calls from the telephones of Galatas, Mrs. Conner, White Front Cigar Store, Mayflower Grill, and Frank Clark was obtained and is attached hereto. Calls on the phone of Galatas were checked from February 20, 1933, and those of Mrs. Conner from the date of installation of the phone. The others were checked from May 20, 1935. It is noted that the toll tickets for calls subsequent to June 20, 1933, are not presently at Hot Springs, but can be obtained at Little Rock until about July 25, at which time they will be returned to Hot Springs.

The telephone in the residence occupied by Galatas at 107 Harrell Street is number 3842, and is in the name of Mrs. George W. Bates. Application for this service was made Dec. 2, 1931, and the phone was installed Dec. 4, 1931, a deposit of \$10.00 being made. The applicant, Mrs. Bates, stated that she was unemployed and was renting the property; could give no references; and needed the phone only in case of sickness. An employee of the telephone company recalls her as a short, stockily built woman with auburn hair.

She is reported to have usually paid the bill through a negro employee. A tracing of Mrs. Bates' signature on the application was made and is attached. It has not been determined as to whether she is identical with Mrs. Galatas.

The telephone of Mrs. E. B. Conner at 1101 Central Avenue is Mo. 2970, and was installed June 12, 1933, a deposit of \$25.00 having been made. In making application, she stated that her husband was deceased; that she was renting the property; that she would have about \$10.00 monthly in toll calls. She gave the following references as to her credit:

Eleanor Harris, (Ladies Shop) Dugan-Stuart Bldg., Hot Springs Dr. Foster Jarrell, Medical Arts Building, M. T. Relyea, Mgr., Maurice Baths.

The telephone was removed July 12, 1933, it having been reported to have been abandoned. No computation has been made by the telephone company as to any refund which may be due to Mrs. Conner, and no demand has been made for refund. The address and telephone number of the Kansas City office was furnished to Mr. Shepard, who promised to advise immediately should information as to the location of Mrs. Conner be obtained.

An inspection of the premises of Galatas at 107 Harrell Street was made by Agents, it being determined that no one was at home. It was noted that there was considerable mail accumulated in the box, from which the following information was noted:

A letter to Mrs. I. M. Galatas, posted at Long Beach, California, June 27, 1932, bears return address 524 E. State Street, Long Beach.

A post-card posted at Los Angeles, California, 6-22-35, addressed to Mrs. Galatas, has the salutation "Dear Betty," relates that the writer received the clothes, talks about school being soon over, etc. The writer calls Betty "Mama" in the body of the car, and it appears to be signed "Lena," the signature being somewhat illegible.

A letter from the American Tel. and Tel. Co., 195 Broadway, New York, to Mrs. Elizabeth Galatas, appears to contain check (possibly a dividend check for stock).

Two letters to Richard Galatas are from the C. I. T. Corp., Vallace Bldg. Little Rock, Arkansas.

A letter, apparently a statement, bears the return of "Suite 1102, Bell Building, Montgomery, Alabama."

An un-sealed communication from the Post Office at Hot Springs contains notice of the receipt of registered mail for Mr. Richard Galatas.

A letter posed at Omaha, Nebraska, no return address, is directed to Dr. A. L. Dyer, 407 LaSalle, Hot Springs, and forwarded to 107 Harrell.

A printed post-card directed to Galatas is from Bollinger, Secretary of Sahara Shrine Temple, Pine Bluff, Arkansas.

Communications apparently containing statements are from Schneck Drug Company, Hot Springs, and Gilliams Lending, Hot Springs, and there is a card announcing sale of Nunn-Bush Shoes from Harris and Frank, 637 S. Hill Street, Los Angeles, California. The mail box also contained a copy of the Elks Magazine.

In connection with the above, it was ascertained through inquiry at the office of the C. I. T. Corporation, 615 Wallace Bldg, Little Rock, that that company is financing a Ford Deluxe Coupe, V-8, 1932 Model, motor number 18-86091, for Galatas. The last payment was made May 10, 1935, and the account is accordingly two months past due. The recollection of employees of the finance company is that payments are made either by personal check or money order. The files of the finance company contain a report by a mercantile reporting agency, which shows that Galatas was formerly connected with the Southern Garage at Hot Springs and now operates a cigar store and gambling place. That he is reported to be a free spender, and is also reported to own business property valued at \$250,000.00 in Detroit and Los Angeles, specific locations being unknown. Agents were advised that a representative of the finance company, Charles Mc Neill, is now at Hot Springs making inquiries in this and other matters, and efforts will be made to determine from him what information he has as to the whereabouts of Galatas. The address of the Kansas City office was left with the C. I. T. people, who promised to immediately advise should they receive information as to his location.

At the Arkansas National Bank, Hot Springs, it was ascertained through interview with F. N. Rix, President, and D. O. Sims, Vice-President and Cashier, that they have a checking account in the name of Richard Galatas, the address being given as Central Cigar Store. The account was opened in May, 1932, and has had a small average balance. The last check, in the amount of \$20.26, was paid June 16, 1935, and the balance to his credit is now \$156.02. The bank has no personal history of Galatas, advising that he was probably introduced by Frank Clark.

Mr. Sims also ascertained through inquiry of Mrs. Higgins, in the safe deposit department of the bank, that Galatas has a box in the name of G. T. Richards. Mrs. Higgins is positive that Richards is Galatas, and a comparison of the two signatures indicates that they are identical. The box is in the name of Mr. and Mrs. Richards, and was acquired Sept. 26, 1931. Originally they held one of the largest sized boxes, but now have a smaller box, rent being paid until September, 1935. The last visit to the box was made by "Mrs. Richards" at 12:42 P.M., June 16, 1935.

Mrs. Higgins also produced a record showing that safe deposit box No. 94 was acquired May 5, 1953, by A. J. Zonner and Lou Conner, giving the address of 176 Cedar Street. A. J. Conner was introduced as the brother-in-law of Mrs. Conner. The box was visited on June 14, 1955, and on July 12, 1933, by Mrs. Conner, the last visit being at 3:45 P.M., and the box being given up on that date. Mrs. Higgins describes Mrs. Conner as about 35, with blue eyes, blond-hennaed hair, attractive and a good dresser.

Mr. Sims was furnished the address of the Kansas City office and promised to advise upon the receipt of any information as to the location of Galatas, either through checks drawn by him or otherwise.

At the Arkansas Trust Company, Mr. N. J. Henderson, President, and Mr. D. Jackson, Assistant Cashier, were interviewed, and advised that Galatas had formerly had an account and a safe deposit box at their institution, but had closed the account and given up the box in March, 1932. The banks records contain no personal history of Galatas, but Mr. Jackson recalls that he probably came to Hot Springs from California, as he recalls that some bonds were forwarded to the bank from some city in California for Galatas. The account with this bank averaged about 2 or 5 hundred dollars.

It was ascertained that the premises at 176 Cedar Street consist of a bungalow, the rental of which is in the hands of Mrs. George Hutton, 178 Cedar Street. She was interviewed and advised that the Conners lived with her some years ago, but have not been there recently. She stated that she always liked Mrs. Conner, despite her connection with persons of questionable character. Mrs. Hutton stated that the Conners have spoken to her of a farm they own in the North-eastern part of Arkanass, or the southern part of Missouri, but she is unable to recall its location more definitely.

Mr. Hutton was subsequently interviewed, -it having been reported to Agents that he might have information of value. He stated that Mrs. Conner was at his place for about a week approximately 60 or 90 days ago, but didn't take the cottage. He advised that Mrs. Conner had a car,

which he thinks was a Chevrolet Sedan. Formerly the Conners had a Packard. He advises that it is his understanding that Mrs. Conner is an Arkansas girl, but he does not know where her home was. He also advised that a little girl who had been with the Conners when they lived at the address on Cedar Street was reported to be her sister's child. This girl is about 12 to 15 years of age, and is described as being short and redhaired. Mrs. Hutton recalls her name as Janice (phonetic), but neither knows her last name. Both advise that for a time the girl was placed in a convent in Little Book.

Mr. Rutton advised that he heard Conner speak of his farm, which he thinks is in Missouri, possibly near Sikeston. Conner spoke of a log house he was building on the place, and of the fine hunting. He advised, however, that Conner was syphilitic and suffered from paresis, and was hance possibly addicted to hallucinations. Mr. Button talked at some length, but disclosed nothing further of interest to this investigation.

It was ascertained that 1101 Central Avenue, Hot Springs, is a two-family dwelling, and that Moses Mendel occupies one flat, the other being vacant. Mr. Mendel advised that he formerly rented the flat to a Mrs. Harris, who, upon the death of her husband, sub-let the flat, furnished, to Mrs. Conner. He advised that Mrs. Harris is now in California, and that he knows nothing concerning Mrs. Conner. He understood that her brother-in-law lived with her, but knows nothing concerning him. After the arrest of Frank Hash at Hot Springs, he did not hear the Conners in the flat any more, and after a few days sent a negro who works for him into the flat to determine whether their effects had been removed. The report was that they had apparently moved. Some mail came, which he returned to the post office. He thinks that some of the mail was from a town in Missouri, and that one registered letter was received from Detroit. He is of the opinion that his employee, who was absent at the time of the interview, might have information of interest, and this negro will accordingly be interviewed.

Bill Seiz, Jr., was interviewed at his office, and furnished Agents with a recent photograph of Galatas, which he requested be returned to him when copies have been made. The persons interviewed advised that it is an excellent likeness of Galatas. Mr. Seiz expressed the opinion that Galatas might be found in the vicinity of Knobel, Arkansas, where Conner has been reported to have a farm, and where a filling station has been maintained by "the gang" for re-fueling cars running liquor to St. Louis. (It is noted that this place—has been previously referred to as Noble, Mo.) Mr. Seiz also advised that Galatas is a member of the Shrine, but stated that the Masonic Lodge at Bot Springs would have more personal history than the Shrine Temple, located at Pine Bluff. (The photo of Galatas is attached hereto, and should be returned to Mr. Seiz.)

Information having been received by agents that after the capture of Mash, his golf clubs were obtained from the Hot Springs Country Club by a large, Jewish looking individual, inquiry was made of J. V. Woodden, located in the pro's shop at the club. However, it was determined that the club's records are incomplete, and it was impossible to locate a record of Mash, under his known aliases, having played there.

Photographs of suspects were shown to Mr. Woodden and to the locker room attendant. Mr. Woodden advised that the photograph of Verne Miller is familiar, but he cannot place where he has seen him, though he believes it to have been in the recent past. He also thought the photo of Harvey Bailey somewhat familiar. Inquiry was also made at the Oaklawn Golf Club, a municipal course located in the vicinity of the Oaklawn Tourist Court, where Rash lived before his apprehension. Mr. H. W. Shrader, in the manager's office, examined his records, and he and several caddies examined the photographs, but could give no helpful information.

At the Cak Lawn Tourist Court, Mr. Robert Anvoots, Assistant Manager, was interviewed, and it was determined that Mash registered as George W. Miller and Wife, Lake Park, Illinois. Mr. Anvoots was unable to recognize any of the suspects in the case, or to give any helpful information.

Contact has been had with Informant B at his home. He advised that he is of the opinion that Galatas can clear up the whole case, and will talk when apprehended. He stated that Galatas' son undoubtedly knows his father's whereabouts, and will probably reveal them if properly approached. He stated that this boy has been at the University of Alabama for several years, and once brought a girl from Tuscalcosa, Alabama, to visit at Hot Springs. It is possible that the name of the girl can be learned, and the boy located through her if difficulty is encountered in finding him. Informant suggested that he or someone known to the boy as a friend of his father, could undoubtedly ascertain the desired information.

In conversation with Mr. William Brandenburg, former chief of police, he advised that he has been recently visited by M. L. Larimore, a police officer at Tulsa, Oklahoma, who advised that in a conversation with Herbert Akers, the latter proposed the organization of a private agency to represent the various bankers associations and to give protection to those bandits who contributed to the agency. Mr. Brandenburg stated that Larimore is well acquainted with S. A. C. Colvin at Oklahoma City, and that he is an entirely honest officer. He suggested that the Sheriff's office at Tulsa is not reliable. Mr. Brandenburg also advised that he has ascertained that a black Chevrolet sedan of Verne Miller's was kept at the Central Garage in Hot Springs,

and left Hot Springs about June 16 or 17. He stated that this garage is "hot."

It is noted that the indications are that Galatas has not been in touch with any of his friends at Hot Springs. The card of a dairy company observed on the premises showed no deliveries of milk since June 17th, and mail has been allowed to accumulate over an extended period.

Little Rock, Arkansas, Telephone Number 4-2162 has been found from the telephone directory to be that of the police department at Little Rock. The above call on June 16, 1933, at 2:54 p.m. - - - from the telephone of Galatas at Hot Springs, Arkansas, is very significant, being the first call which can be ascertained to have been made from his telephone after the arrest of Mash. His subsequent actions in chartering an airplane and telling Mrs. Mash that her husband was being taken to Joplin, Misscuri, indicates a probability that he secured information from the Little Rock Police as to the route the officers were taking with the prisoner, since Agents Smith and Lackey informed Little Rock Police that they were going to Joplin, Missouri. Complete details of this are being check to determine who at the Police Department, Little Rock, talked, and what was said.

Letters have been sent to the St. Louis and Los Angeles office, pursuant to undeveloped leads appearing from the data secured at Hot Springs, Arkansas, as above quoted. Telephonic communication was had with the Birmingham office relative to the location of Pat Gardelle Sturney, and under date of July 18, 1933, a letter was received from the Birmingham office stating that Sturney has been located, and that a surveillance is being maintained, in order to ascertain the whereabouts of Subject Galatas. It was also stated in the letter from the Birmingham office that Sturney is regarded at the University of Alabama, Tuscaloosa, Alabama, where he is a student, as a step-son, or ward, of Galatas. Further information relative to angles in the Birmingham vicinity are contained in the letter from that office mentioned hereis.

A letter has been directed to the Chicago office requesting that investigation be made at Telephone Hyde Park 9600[Del Prado Hotel], to which number it is noted, hims. E. B. Conner telephoned from Hot Springs on June 13, 1933. Apparently the party at the Chicago number is identical with the individual who wrote the letter mentioned in the Kansas City report dated July 15th, page 59.

For the information of all offices concerned the following is a report made by Merle A. Gill, Forensic Bellistician, Kansas City, Missouri, regarding the analysis by him of the shells and bullets found at the scene of the slayings and in the bodies and removed from the bodies of various deceased officers in this case:

"This letter-report pertains to the examinations of ballistic exhibits involved in the Plaza Slayings of June 17th; this report has been delayed in order that the results of certain gun examinations could be included.

The photographs you have illustrate evidence bullets and cartridge cases, found at the scene of the crime and removed from the bodies of the victims. The photographs are numbered and lettered as follows: Cartridge cases: 1 to 8. Bullets: A to 5. A set of these photographs has been furnished Chief of Detectives Higgins, and 7 Dr. Souder of your bureau of Standards.

Microscope examinations indicate that two Thompson Sub-Machine gums, a .45 Colt's Automatic Pistol, and another weapon using steel ball bearings, was used in the slayings. It is quite apparent that your agent, Caffrey, was killed with a Ball bearing, while lackey was shot with a Thompson gum. Reid, Grooms and Nash were shot with a Thompson gun, while it is apparent that Hermanson was shot with a buck-shot gun. My conclusions are based upon careful microscope examinations of the exhibits now in my keeping. Bullet holes in the two cars indicate that the gun-fire cam e from the front and rear.

Bullets and cartridge cases from Floyd's gun, and from the Nebraska
Bank robbery, and from the North Kansas City bank robbery, as well as
bullets from our Detective Carpenter shooting, all failed to be identified as being connected with the weapons used in the Plaza shootings.
Test bullets fired by me from the two .58 caliber Colt's revolvers
taken from "Fur" Sammons, failed to be identified as being connected
with any local shootings. Should you take any weapons connecting with
this case, it is absolutely important that test bullets be fired from
the weapons by me in order that I can identify positively the comparison slugs as well as the guns. Be sure that no one cleans the guns."

Referring to the letter from the St. Paul office dated July 7, 1933, Page 4, last paragraph, it is noted that a number of shells were picked up at the scene of a bank robbery at Farmington, Minnesota, which occurred during Key, 1933, and that photographs of various individuals, including Alvin Diarpis, had been identified as having participated in that bank robbery.

A letter has been written to the St. Paul office, requesting that original shells and bullets, if possible, be forwarded to the Kansas City office, in order that they may be analyzed by a ballistician.

Mention is made in the reference report from the Kansas City office dated July 15th, that Alvie Payton and Kenneth Conn, both escapes from the Kansas State Penitentiary, Lansing, Kansas, who were possible suspects in this case, engaged in a bank robbery at Altemont, Kansas, recently, at which time Conn was killed and Payton wounded.

The .45 Colt automatic Pistols, which were found in possession of the bank robbers in question, were examined by Mr. Gill, Ballistician, above mentioned, and he finds that the guns have no connection with the instant case.

Payton was interviewed by Agents of this office, and, while he was severely wounded, he was able to converse with them. He stated that he and Conn separated from Bailey and other suspects in this case shortly after their escape on May 30, 1933, at Laneing, and had not seen them since. There is at the present time no definite indication that Conn or Payton could have engaged in the slayings which occurred at Kansas City in this case.

Reference is made to letter from the Bureau dated July 17, 1933, with enclosure from Charles M. Mahr, Bluffton, Indiana, wherein Mahr advises that the slayers in this matter live in or come from Sullivan County, Missouri. It may be noted that Harvey Failey has resided at Green City, Missouri, which is in Sullivan County.

An undeveloped lead is being set out for the office covering Bluffton, Indiana, in order that Mr. Mahr, care of the Men's Year Shop, may be very discreetly interviewed for the basis of his information. - Appropriate attention is being given to possible developments in Sullivan County, around Green City, Missouri.

Mrs. H. Erle Smith, 6623 Edgevale Road, Kansas City, Missouri, telephoned this office recently stating that her laundress had observed persons leaving 6612 Edgevale Road on Wednesday morning, following the slayings of June 17th (June 21st). She stated that the laundress observed a woman and a man. The man appeared to have the use of only one arm.—It is possible that the man seen was Subject Vernon C. Miller, who lived at that address, as he was reported to be wounded in one arm, but this has not been verified. It may be stated here that the supposition has been advanced by Thomas J. Higgins of the Kansas City, Missouri, Police Department that officer Hermonson fired his pistol when the assassins in this case first appeared. It has been established through examination of the weapons at the Kansas City, Missouri, Police Department by Mr. Higgins that the pistol of Hermanson had been fired twice.

An interview will be later reported with the laundress mentioned by Mrs. Smith.

It was ascertained and reported telephonically by Special Agent in Charge Colvin of the Oklahoma City office that Galatas was reported on July 17th to be at Reno, Nevada. This information was secured, it was stated from a Deputy U. S. Marshal, who in turn had secured the same from a policemen by the name of Scott in Hot Springs, Arkansas. This policemen is the individual who reported the alleged kidnaping of the deceased Frank Rash at the time he was apprehended on June 16, and

for the time being Scott is not to be approached openly. However, the Salt Lake City office was immediately notified and investigation is now under way at Reno Mevada to locate Galatas.

A supply of copies of the more recent photograph of Galatas, which was secured at Hot Springs, Arkansas, was obtained, and each office of the Bureau was furnished with one copy on July 19th. Also, a photograph of Vivian Matthews, a paramour of Vernon C. Miller, was obtained from the wife of Frank B. Mulloy, 14 West 56th Terrace, Kansas City, Missouri. Copies of the photograph of Vivian Matthews has also been furnished to each office.

On July 21, 1933, Frank B. Mulloy was again interviewed at the Kansas City office by Special Agents Turrou and Brantley, and at that time made the following statement, in addition to the one mentioned in reference report, as reflected in a memorandum by those Agents.

"On July 21, 1933, Frank B. Mulloy, alies Fritz Mulloy, was interviewed at the Kanzas City Bureau office by Special Agents L. G. Turrou and Dwight Brantley. He was questioned concerning a telephone call received by him at Jackson 9702 during the evening of June 16, 1933. He stated that Jackson 9702 is the telephone number at 85th Tavern, located at 85th Street and Wornell Road, Kansas City, Missouri, which is an eating house, and in which he at one time had an interest. He said that his recollection of this call is that someone of the waiters out there answered the telephone and was informed that the party on the wire wanted to speak to him, Mulloy; that he answered the telephone and she person talking asked him the telephone number of Verne Mason; that he gave this number as Jackson 7973. Mulloy said that he is not certain whether the party calling gave any name, but he has a faint recollection that the person said he was "Doc."

Mulloy was asked how a person in Chicago would know his name and telephone number and he explained it by saying he supposes that Verne Mason furnished the party with the number.

Mulloy denied knowing of such a place as the O. P. Inn in Chicago or' enyone in any manner connected with it.

Milloy was questioned concerning a telephone call he received from Chicago on June 29, 1933, allegedly placed by one Bloom. He stated that he knows no individual by that name in Chicago. He was then asked if some person by the name of Welker or Warren might place such a call and explained that he does know Dri Warren, whose correct name is Walker, and that he met this individual while in Leavenworth Penitentiary. He stated that the call on June 29, 1933 related to a whiskey transaction.

Mulloy was asked whether, after he received the telephone call from Chicago on June 16, 1933, he in any manner communicated with Verme Mason for the purpose of informing him that someone had called at Jackson 9702, which is the 85th Tavern, to which he replied that he did not. He was asked if he has at any time mentioned in a conversation to Mason that the telephone call had been received inquiring for Mason's telephone number. Mulloy stated that the next time he saw Mason he informed him that someone called from Chicago to the 85th Tavern and asked for his telephone number and whether he got the call. Mulloy stated that Mason told him that he received the call from Chicago, but did not go into any details or explanation.

Communication was had with the Chicago office immediately upon receiving the above statement from Mulloy, and it was suggested "Doc". Statey of the O. P. Inn was probably the individual who made contact with Miller thru Mulloy on June 16th. It was requested that intense interrogation of that individual in Chicago be pursued.

We undeveloped leads are being set out in this report except the one for the Chicago office covering Bluffton, Indiana, in view of the fact that letters have been previously written and telephone communications had pursuant to development of leads appearing which will be continued as such developments appear necessary.

UNDEVELOPED LEADS.

THE CHICAGO OFFICE is requested to make very discreet inquiries of Charles M. Mahr, Care the Men's Wear Shop, Bluffton, Indiana, to determine all information, which he may be able to furnish in this matter as to the identity of the assassins. It is recommended that he be approached in a manner which will not disclose the nature of the inquiry, as he may not wish to have his name known in this connection.

ADDENDUM BY SPECIAL AGENTS L. C. TURROU AND DWIGHT BRANTIET.

On July 21, 1933, Mrs. Frances Mikulich Miller, the widow of Frank Nash, was interviewed at the County Jail, Kansas City, Missouri, by Special Agents L. G. Turrou and Dwight Brantley, at which time she orally stated that after Dick Galatas contacted her at the tourist camp at Eot Springs on the afternoon of June 16, 1933, and when she left the camp in company with him, he took her to some place which she is unable to describe, but says it was a residence of some kind, probably an apartment, where she made some telephone calls, one of these telephone calls she said she made to the C. P. Inn at Chicago, at which time she asked for Doc Stacy, but being unable to get Stacy she talked with the porter or headwaiter known as Jimmie; that she told Jimmie that Jelly (an alias of Frank Nash) had been picked up at Hot Springs, Arkansas. She stated further that she made a telephone call to Esther Farmer at Joplin, Missouri, from the same place at Hot Springs that she made the telephone call to the O. P. Inn at Chicago.

Mrs. Miller was asked why she would make a telephone call to the O. P. Inn. She explained that Dick Galatas asked her if she had any friends or knew of any of her husband's friends she could call and she informed him that her husband was known at the O. P. Inn and that she, therefore, called that place, as described. She was asked why she would make a telephone call to Esther Farmer at Joplin and in explanation stated that Galaas asked her about friends of hers and she said she knew the Farmers and it was at his request that she called the Farmers.

on July 18, 1933, Special Agents Brantley and Turrou called at the residence of Fritz Bulloy, 14 East 56th Street Terrace, Kansas City, Missouri, and there interviewed Mrs. Bulloy. No information of value was obtained from her as she reiterated practically verbatim the information which had already been furnished to Agents by Mulloy. It was obvious that Mrs. Bulloy was well coached on the subject and did not add anything to what had already been stated to Agents by Mulloy.

About the only thing of value that resulted in that interview with Mrs. Mulloy was the procurement of two negatives bearing a strikingly good likeness of Mrs. Verne C. Miller. These negatives were voluntarily turned over by Mrs. Mulloy to Agents and photographic developments have been made of same and copies sent to all interested offices. The sephotographs may be very helpful in the location and identification of Mrs. Miller through whom, undoubtedly, Miller may be apprehended. It may be stated that when Fritz Mulloy was interviewed by these Agents he emphatically denied possession of any photographs of Miller or his wife.

It is observed that the laundress of Mrs. Earl Smith, residing at 6625 Edgevale Road, Kansas City, Missouri, is alleged to have seen some parties loading an automobile, preparatory to leaving the house at 6612 Edgevale Road. on the morning of June 21, 1935. This laundress is a negro woman by the name of Louise Brown, who says she lives at 1115 Campbell Street, Kansas City, Missouri. She was interviewed at the home of Mrs. Smith on Wednesday morning, July 19, 1933. This woman is of low mentality and appears to be very excitable. She stated that she comes to Mrs. Smith's home each Wednesday morning to to the laundry; that she was on her way there between 7 and 8 A.M., the Wednesday following the shooting at the Union Station which would be June 21, 1933: that as abe entered the premises of Mrs. Smith she saw an automobile, headed out of the garage at 6612 Edgevale Road, which is across the street; that she is unable to recall the make of car, but it appeared to be large and that a man and a woman were loading the car and the woman appeared to be loading boxes, packages and bundles into the automobile; that the man was assisting very little and what assistance was rendered by him was with one hand as it appeared that he was injured in the other or at least he was not using it. She said that the persons loading these things in the car dropped a package and there was a crash which sounded like a bottle had broken; that she did not get a good enough look at either the man or woman to make any identification. She was shown photographs of Verne Miller and wife, but could not identify either. She said she did not see either a dog or a child about the care

Illustrative of the ignorance and apparent irresponsibility of this negro, she was shown two photographs of Mrs. Verne Miller and stated that they were of two different woman.

James Ward, a Kansas City gambler, residing at the Hotel President, an alleged friend of Vernon C. Miller, was interviewed at the Bureau office, July 21, 1935, by Special Agent in Charge Gus T. Jones and Special Agent Dwight Brantleye

Ward admits he is a gambler and that he plays a great deal of gold and is a member of the Milburn Golf Club; that some time during the early spring or late winter of 1933 he was playing golf at the OM Mission Golf Club in Kansas City and there met a man who gave his name as James White and played two or three games of golf with him on as many days; that he told White that he, Ward, was a member of the Milburn Golf Club; that White informed him that he had played at the Milburn course last year and liked it very much. Ward said that he thereafter invited White over to Milburn and played with him at that course several times; that White desired to become a member of the Milburn Club and filed an application for membership under the name of V. C. White.

Ward stated that after the appearance in the local newspapers of the photograph of Vernon C. Miller he recognized it as a photograph of the man White he had met as described.

Ward said that he became quite friendly with Miller after playing golf with him several times and had dinner with him on one occasion at the home of Fritz Mulloy at Kansas City; that present at this dinner were the wife and child of Miller, Fritz Mulloy, his wife and child, and himself. He stated that the invitation to this meal was extended to him by Miller. He also said that he had dinner once at Miller's home at 6612 Edgevale Road at which were present the Mulloys. Ward said he became very fond of Miller's child and that she called him uncle Jimmie. Ward stated that he knows nothing whatever about Miller's past or his business connections, save what he told him, vizes that he was in the finance business out of Chicago and Oklahome. He stated that Miller, when he first knew him, was driving a Buick Sedan and later used a Chevrolet Sedan, but he does not recall what license either of these cars had. He stated that he met no friends of Miller, except the Milloys, and does not know where he is or where he is from. He stated that the last time he saw Miller was Friday, June 16, 1933, which is the day before the shooting at the Union Station on which date he played golf with him at the Milburn Golf Clube

Mr. Fay stated he had received a tip that "Pretty Boy" Floyd had been in New York twice in last mosthy but did not know how true this was, but would work on it.

For Fay advised that yesterday at Headquarters he talked with John Lyons regarding the Lindbergh case; that the lines are laid and the Agents are going to work with them; that Agent Manning is going over their whole file on the matter thoroughly and discuss it with Johnnie Breman, and build up the file at the Max Torka office.

Hr. Fey advised that Mosher suggested that our men at Eansas City get in touch with his office at Kansas City, where they sould probably get some good information. I suggested that Hr. Fay telephone Hr. Vetterli and give him this information.





Reference is made to Bureau letter dated July 10, 1933, with which was forwarded a copy of a letter received at the Bureau from Mrs. Sadie E. Khea, 130 N. River Street, Commerce, Okla. I had Mrs. Rhea interviewed by Agent Hollis, who states:

Trom the very beginning of the interview it was apparent to this Agent that Mrs. Rhea is mentally unbalanced. It was exceedlingly difficult to obtain a coherent statement from her mlative to the matters which she reported to the Bureau in her letter. I questioned her specifically and at great length concerning her knowledge of wilbur^Underhill and Harve J. Bailey, in view of the fact that she made reference to the Seneca Bank robbery and the fact that Bailey is reported to have participated in that robbery. Mrs. Rhea is not at all acquainted with Bailey or Underhill. She stated that the reason she wrote to the Bureau was because she thought that MontyCotter, the son of James and Cora Cotter at Wyandotte, Oklahoma, greatly resembled Wilbur Underhill. She further stated that she was employed at the Cotter home as a domestic and shortly after the robbery of the bank at Seneca, Mo., she overheard a conversation between a Mr. Meisingham and Mr. and Mrs. Cotter. During this conversation the Seneca bank robbery was mentioned and Mrs. Rhea believes she heard Mrs. Cotter state to Meisingham that Mont Cotter, her son, was implicated in the Loppell.

"Mrs. Rhee confidentially edvised me that the reason she mentioned in her letter that she overheard Frankie Peacock, a daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Cotter state that she, Mrs. Rhea, was worth \$25.00, was that several years ago her father endeavored to have her join a communistic organization and when she refused, her father advised her that if she did not join a standing reward of \$25.00 would be placed on her until she would join. Mrs. Rhea had absolutely no information of value."

MEMORANDUM - Telephone Call.

Mr Acuff of the office of the Special Agents, Bureau of Prohibition telephoned. He advised that he had received a report from his men in Alabama which indicates that their informant has some information which might be of interest in connection with the murder of Special Agent Caffrey in Kansas City. He advised that he will send the correspondence in this matter to the Bureau, but thought we would want to contact this informant as soon as possible, and was, therefore, giving this information over the telephone. The name of this informant is Clarence May, 500 Edgewood Street, Post Office Box 306, Dothan, Alabama. He is supposed to have formerly been a liquor runner and racketeer out of Northern Florida and Southern Alabama, and later worked as special investigator for the Governor of Alabama. While engaged in the racketeering business he says he knew Floyd Bruce and Rey Bruce, who are now located in St. Louis, Missouri under assumed names. May says that in all probability Ray and Floyd Bruce have information on the killing of Agent Caffrey and that they will tell him about it if they are not involved themselves.

Mr. Acuff suggested that May be approached through Prohibition Agent James M. Shields at Montgomery, Alabama - 517 New Post Office Building.

Reference is made to telephonic conversation of July 22, 1933 between Mr. V. W. Hughes of the Bureau and the writer, in connection with the above case, and at which time Mr. Hughes advised that information had been received from the Prohibition Bureau as a result of correspondence with Prohibition Agent James M. Shields, Kontgomery, Alabama, that one Clarence Liay, 500 Edgewood Street, P. O. Box 306, Dothan, Alabama, a liquor runner, possibly had information indicating that Ray and Floyd Bruce. who also are liquor runners operating out of St. Louis, Missouri, might have been involved in the above mentioned case, or that they perhaps would have information concerning it.

Special Agent W. E. Miller went to Montgomery, Alabama on July 22, 1933, where he interviewed Mr. James M. Shields, Special Agent in Charge of the Montgomery office of the Prohibition Bureau, who at that time advised that he had known Clarence May of Dothan, Alabama, for several years, that May is a former bootlegger and racketeer, but in recent years has been an investigator for the State of Alabama, and while not holding office at the present time has assisted Mr. Shields in several cases in Dothan, Alabama and vicinity. Shields also said that he had found May to be reliable.

Mr. Shields said that the only information that he has in connection with this case is that on Tuesday, July 18, 1933, Mr. May came to his office, at which time the latter said that it was his opinion that Ray and Floyd Bruce, two bootleggers who operate out of St. Louis, Mo., perhaps had information in connection with the Kansas City case, and that if they themselves were not connected with it they undoubtedly had information concerning it and possibly would reveal this information.

Special Agent W. E. Miller then proceeded to Dothan, Alabama, where he interviewed Mr. Clarence May. May at that time informed Mr. Miller that he would be in Birmingham, Alabama on Monday, July 24, 1933, and that he would call at the Birmingham office to discuss the information that he had in his possession. At the time Mr. Miller interviewed May in Dothan, and at the time May was interviewed by the writer in Birmingham, May said that he, himself, shortly after the War, when he was discharged from the Army, entered into the bootlegging and gambling business, in which enterprises he was engaged for a few years, after which he was a Deputy Sheriff in Dothan, Alabama, his brother being the Sheriff. Subsequently he became a member of the former State Law Enforcement Bureau for the State of Alabama, and after that was an investigator for former Governor Bibb Graves, as well as for the former Attorney General.

May added that because of his former connections as a bootlegger and gambler, and also because of his position as an officer, he became acquainted with a large:number of bootleggers and gamblers operating in Alabama, amongst whom was Floyd Bruce. He mentioned particularly an instance when, at the request of the Governor, he was investigating Mr. Walter K. McAdory, Chief of the Alabama Law Enforcement Bureau, during which time he contacted Floyd Bruce for information concerning Keadory; that at that time, due to the assistance given him by Floyd Bruce, he in turn secured a favor for the latter through the assistance of the Governor, with the result that he, May, and Floyd Bruce have since that time been good friends. May mentioned that he has seen nothing of Floyd Bruce in recent years, but that it is his opinion that this friendship still exists between himself and Floyd Bruce, especially because of the fact that a gambler named Thornton, when passing through Dothan within the past year mentioned to May the fact that Bruce had told him that May on one occasion had befriended him. Thornton at that time, according to May, told him that Floyd Bruce was operating out of St. Louis, Mo.

May said that in view of the fact that Floyd Bruce is operating out of St. Louis, Mo., as well as in view of the fact that Floyd and his brother Ray Bruce on one occasion had kidnapped a United States custom officer in Florida a few years ago, that it is his opinion that Bruce might be mixed up with the Kansas City affair, or that he possibly has secured information concerning that matter. May stated that he believed he could locate the Bruce brothers for questioning, but that it would mean that he, himself, would have to take a trip, possibly to St. Louis, No., in order to-locate these brothers and secure the desired information from them.

During the interview with May, the latter mentioned that there perhaps was no other person with the varied experience that he has had, not only as a bootlegger and gambler, but also as a law enforcement officer and investigator. He further mentioned that at the present time he is attending

the Jones Iaw School at Montgomery, Alabama, stating that while he did not intend to practice law it was his intention to have this legal training, so that in the event he applied for a position with the Department of Justice or State Tax Commission he could not be told that he lacked legal training. Mr. May also mentioned the fact that he is intimately acquainted with Senators Bankhead and Black of Alabama, also with former Governor Bibb Graves, and Attorney General of Alabama, Mr. McCall. He further mentioned that he has a sister living in St. Louis, Missouri.

May also stated that Floyd Bruce has a colored mistress, of whom Floyd is exceedingly enamored, and where this woman could be found. Floyd Bruce also could be found. May said that this colored girl is formerly of Kontgomery and that her name is either Willie May or Annie May. He did not know her last name.

Reference to Birmingham File 26-4011, entitled Clifford I. Clark, et al, N.M.V.T.A., in which case E. Floyd Bruce with aliases, and Ray Bruce with aliases, are also subjects, and in which case an active investigation is being conducted with a view to locating and apprehending them, prior investigation has indicated that Floyd Bruce's paramour is one Earlie MayyNix, colored, who on May 12, 1933 was operating a house of prostitution at Saginaw, Michigan. May at the time of the interview stated that he believed this woman was in St. Louis, Moat this time. In connection with Birmingham File 26-4011, a letter on this date is being directed to the Detroit Office to ascertain if Barlie May Nix is still at Saginaw, Michigan.

Mr. May further mentioned that he himself was instrumental in causing the various seed loan investigations to be conducted at Dothan, Alabama and vicinity in the past year, saying that it was as a result of his work that this matter was called to the attention of the Department of Agriculture.

He also mentioned that he is intimately acquainted with one Carl Chasstine Vickery, who is a subject of Birmingham File 31-2538, entitled Carl Chasstine Vickery, with alias, et al, W.S.T.A. He furnished the writer with some information in connection with this case which is being incorporated in the proper file.

In view of the information that has been furnished by Mr. May, and further in view of the fact that an active investigation is being conducted at this time with a view to locating and apprehending the Bruce brothers, it is not believed that any assistance that Mr. May could render

would be of aid in connection with the instant case. Mr. May, however, was assured that his offer of cooperation was greatly appreciated.



He receives the newspaper called "The Columbia Missourian" from Columbia, Missouri. He registered with Mr. and Mrs. H. L. Johnson whose eddress is 1012 Minth Street Southwest, Cedar Rapids, Iowa, and one B. L.; Johnson. Mrs. E. L. Johnson is supposed to be the sister of H. E Perryman. I find that on July 9, 1935, M. R. Perryman sent by express one box of fish addressed to himself in care of the United States Post Office at Columbia, Missouri. 





Pursuent to your request there is furnished herewith information concerning the conviction of Frenk Hash, his escape from the United States Penitentiery, Leavenworth, Konsas, and his subsequent arrest, followed by the occurrence which took place at the Union Station, Kansas City, Missouri, on June 17, 1935.

Frank Rash was received at the United States Penitentiary, Leavenworth, Kunsas, on March 3, 1924, to serve a sentence of twenty-five years, having been convicted at Oklahoma City, Oklahoma, in the Nestern District of Oklahoma, for assaulting a mail custodism. The date of his conviction is not definitely known to this office, but a certified copy of the commitment will be in the . hands of the Warden of the United States Penitentiary at Legvenuorth who will elso be a witness to his incarceration there and his subsequent escape. He escaped from the United States Penitentiary at Leavenworth on the evening of October 19, 1930. Nash was apprehended at Hot Springs, Arkansas, on the efternoon of June 16, 1933. While being escorted to the United States Penitentiary at Leavenworth, Kenses, in custody of Special Agents F. S. Smith and F. J. Lackey, acting officially under orders from the Attorney General of the United States, the officare were attacked and Nash was killed. Officially engaged in conducting Mash to the penitontiary at the time of the attack was also Special agent R. J. Coffrey, of this Bureau, and Chief of Police Otto : Reed of McAlester, Oklahoma. Mesors. Caffrey and Reed were also killed by the assassins, who attacked the group of officers at Kansas City, Missouri, on the morning of June 17, 1933.

Reference is made to Bureau letter dated July 17, 1935 to the Kaness City Office, enclosing criminal record of subject Herbert A. Farmer, with aliases.

At the Memphis, Tennessee Police Department it was ascertained by Special Agent R. E. Peterson that subject Farmer, when arrested as H. A. Patton, #3262, on September 11, 1919, was turned over to the Sheriff of Marshall County, Holly Springs, Mississippi.

In a communication from Mr. Fred M. Belk, District Attorney, Holly Springs, Miss., dated July 22, 1933, he advised that his records indicate that Harry Patton was indicated in August 1919 for the theft of an automobile, charge grand larceny; further that on April 13, 1920 at a special term of the Circuit Court at Holly Springs, Mississippi, Patton entered a plea of guilty to charge of petty larceny and was fined \$12500 and costs. 

With reference to letter from this office dated July 14, 1933, addressed to the Bureau, concerning Richard Tellman Celetas, the following additional information has been secured at Celetas 5 by Special Agent L. D. Socey of this office

Edward A. Attix, an ettorney, with offices in the Penobecom Building, Detroit, was discreetly contacted and during the course of conversation advised that he has not seen Galatas for the past four years, that prior to that time he had represented Galatas as counsel in the closing out of the Broadway-Strand Burlesque Show at Detroit. He stated that Galatas had financed this show and was forced to withdraw his interest therein when it was seen that it would not be a success. He prefessed to know very little about Galatas outside of having represented him in this venture and claimed that he would not know where to find him even if he desired to.

Lieut. John Hoffman, in charge of the Special Investigation Bureau of the Detroit Police Department, advised that he has been familier with the Broadway-Strand Burlesque Show for several years, during which time it enjoyed a very poor reputation and was finally closed as a public nuisance. He stated, however, that he does not recall the name of Galatas and also could not identify Galatas photograph as that of any one known to him. Lieut. Hoffman was also not familiar with George Welters, one of the persons on Galatas application for admittance to the Elks Lodge at Detroit during 1928. However, through information secured by him it was determined that

Welters is presently a Special Deputy Sheriff for Wayne County, Michigan, and is also engaged as day manager of the Checker Berbecus Club, which is said to be frequented by persons of questionable character generally. Lieut, Hoffman also arranged for Walters to be contacted, the latter of which states that he does not recall the name of Calatas as that of any one known to him.

Through Mr. Frank Conserve, president of the Detroit Motion Picture Projectionists at Detroit, it was learned that the Broadway-Strand had been operated from about 1927 or 1928 to last year by a man named Schutt; that this show, while estensibly a Burlesque Show, was in reality a house of assignation; that his company rather than to tolerate this, placed colored pickets in front of said show and ultimately caused it to close its doors. Mr. Conserve claimed, however, that he does not recall any one named Galatas as having been connected with this show.

Colates on his application to the Elks Club, listed as one of his previous residences the Pontchartrain Apartments (no street address or city given). In this connection it is stated that no apartment building by this name is listed in the Detroit City Directory and inquiry of real estate concerns at Detroit failed to sevelop any information concerning such a building.
