

Mr. T. C. Butchison of the Motor Vehicle Bureau of the State Highway Department, South Carolina, furnished the following information from the records in said department:




Ho driver's license has been issued this year to date to Struever. However, there was a license issued September 20, 1930, which expired June 30, 1933, to a Harold W. Struever, 517 We E.- St. Louis Street, Nachville, Ill., the number of same being \$57904.

Mr. Butchison contacted with Mr. Malt, Anditor, Hotel Columbia, for the purpose of ascertaining if Structure was registered at the hotel at the time the lisence plates were issued. He was advised by Mr. Halt that the hotel records for the year 1933 to not reflect that Harold W. Structure was a guest at the hotel, and that there was no record of a forwarding address at the hotel for anyone bearing the name of Structure. He further advised Mr. Hutchisom that the clerks do not remember anyone by said name being registered at the hotel at any time.

Chief of Police W. H. Revilueon was interviewed, and he advised that he conducted a personal investigation to determine if anyone by the name of Harold W. Struever was known in Columbia. He advised that he checked all his sources of information in a discreet manner and found that he was unknown in said city. He further advised that all hotels were checked and he was unknown at said placed. He further advised that the telephone and city directories do not contain the name of Harold W. Struever.







Harry Morgan and Abe/Steinberg apparently are bootleggers, Morgan's residence being at Caledonia, Mo. Premises at 5245 Cates Ave., St.Louis, Mo., now being occupied by G. G. Ward and family, who know nothing cancerning Subject Harvey Bailey. Ring of Wiknie Williams still held at Forest Park Hotel. Mo further information received at Jefferson Hotel in reference to Subject Galates. Mary M. Brown is wife of A. B. Brown, who has occupied apartment 502 at the Marmaduke Apartments, St.Louis, Mo., since 5-2-32.

Special Egent F. W. Allen of the St.Louis Bureau Office on July 14, 1955 interviewed Lee Turner, who is now confined at the County Jeil, Danville, Illinois, on a charge of violation of the Metional Motor Vehicle Theft Act. Turner stated to Agent Allen that he did not know Frank Hash or any of the members of his gang who were implicated in the recent massacre at Kansas City, Missouri; that he, Turner, was confined at the Leavenworth Penitenitary at the game time that Mash was so confined, but that he never came in contact with Mash and that he has never done

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any flying for Rash or any member of his gang. Turner further stated that on each day during June, 1925 he was at his radio shop at 1621 South Michigan Ave., Chicago, Illinois and that the employee at that place can verify his statement. He also stated that he has never been married.

# AT BY, LOUIS, MISSOURI,

This Agent, in company with Detective Sergeants Cliffe and M Guire, called at the Estmaduke Apartments, 2710 South Grand Aver Stelouis Missouri, and ascertained from Mr. Carl Amscharitz, Jr., manager of that apartment, that apartment \$600 was rented to Mr. A. B. Brown on May 2, 1958; that the wife of A. B. Brown is Kary M. Brown, who is somewhat younger than her husband; that the Browns are the parents of a daughter 14 years of age and a baby about four months of age; that Mr. Brown gave his former residence before coming to the Marmaduke Apartments as the Jefferson Hotel, St. Louis. Missouri, and his occupation as that of a retired business man. Mr. Ametherits further stated that Mr. Brown and family have never had any company since they have resided at the Marmaduke Apartments, except that on June 27, 1935 a man and woman visited them and remained over night. A photograph of subject Gelatas was exhibited to Mr. Amecherits, and his elerk, Miss Fuller, who stated that they could not state that Calatas was the party who visited the Browns on that date. They further stated that the Browns have etelephor in their apartment which is not listed in the telephone directory but the miber of which is Laclede 1961; that they have no record of telephone calls 🌮 this number. They further stated that Mr. Brown is very regular in his Dits pays his rent of \$85,00 per month promptly and most regularly goes to themarbut the first thing each morning, after which he usually plays golf: the they have heard Brown speak of being wall acquainted with Tom Chrisey, wh operates a book shop across the street from the Jefferson Hotel.

Detective Sergeants Cliffe and McGuire advised Agent that the ring of Winnie Williams which was left by her with the manager of the Frest Park Hotel as security for an unpaid hotel bill, is still in possession of the manager of said hotel, and that arrangements have been made with said manager by them to be notified by the manager abould Winnie Williams and for said ring.

These officers accompanied by Agent also interviewed the manger, Mr. Shilling, and house detective Mr. Garner, of the Jefferson Hotel, and were advised that Subject Galatas is unknown at that hotel. A recent photograph of Galatas was exhibited to these gentlemen for purposes of identification, but they were unable to state that Galatas had been stopping at that hotel.

Agent, in company with Detective Sergeants Cliffe and seCuire, called at 5845 Cates Ave., St.Louis, Missouri, and ascertained that these promises at present are occupied by G. C. Ward and family; that Mr. Ward is an automobile mechanic and stated that he has occupied these premises only since February, 1933, and has no information as to who occupied same prior that time but that Harry H. Minkey, 5845 Cates Ave., looks after the premises and will be

able to state if Subject Bailey occupied maid premises during 1951,

Harry H. Minkey, on being interviewed, stated that he has rewided at 5245 Cates ive., for eight years and for the past three or four
years has looked after the premises at \$345 Cates Avenue; that he does not
remember anyone by the name of Bailey having occupied the premises at 5245
Cates Avenue. Upon being shown the photograph of Subject Bailey, it was
escertained that about two years ago a party did live at said premises
who resembled the photograph of Subject Bailey, but that he only remained
there for a short time and did not become acquainted with any of the
merighbors in the community and has not been seen at that place since his
departure.

In an effort to ascertain the identity of Harry Morgan and Abe Steinberg, as requested in reference letter from the Kansas City Office dated July 31, 1933, Agent interviewed F. L. Benby, vice-president, and L. J. Quinn, cashier, Security Hational Savings and Trust Company, 5th and Olive Sts., 1889 St. Louis, Missouri. These gentlemen advised that on July 28, 1935 Abe Steinberg, who has had a small account with their bank since September, 1952, deposited a check drawn on the Commerce Trust Company Bank, Kansas City, Missourl in the amount of \$750.00, and signed by Mrs. F. B. Emlloy; that they acsepted same as a deposit for the reason that Abe Steinberg then had on deposit at their bank more than \$800,00; that said check bore the endorsement of Earry Morgan, who is unknown to them, under which name Steinberg elso endorsed said shock; that said bhock was returned unpaid, and that Mr. Steinberg, Who had previously given his address as 504 Victoria Bldg., called at their bank in response to their request and agreed that the amount of said check be deducted from his balance and while at said bank laft his address as being 1021 Central. Mational Bank Buildings

Mesers. Denby and Quinn stated that they are not well acquainted with Abe Steinberg, and do not know for certain in what business he is engaged, but judging from the party who brought Steinberg to their bank and introduced him during September, 1932, they would judge that Steinberg is engaged in the liquor business; that Harry Morgan is unknown to them and that he has never had an account at their bank.

Agent called at 1021 Central Entional Bank Building, St. Louis, Missouri, and ascertained that this room is occupied by L. Bilverstein, who is a cigar salesman. Mr. Silverstein stated that Abe Steinberg does not occupy that room number and that to his knowledge Steinberg does not have a place of business; that he does not know what Steinberg is doing at present, but that Steinberg formerly was a salesman of fancy rugs and bathrobes; that Steinberg occasionally receives mail addressed to that room number and calls there for his mail at indefinite intervals.

Inquiry was made at the office of the Prohibition Administrator,

Customs Building, St.Louis, Missouri, and Agent Knapp, who was in charge, searched the records of the Prohibition Unit, but failed to find any record of the Steinberg having been arrested for violation of the Prohibition Laws, but did find a record of Earry Morgan, residence Caledonia, Washington County, Missouri, who was arrested October 13, 1952 and charged with manufacture and possession of articles and materials designed for the manufacture of intomicating liquor; that he was later indicted by the United States Grand Fury and on April 26, 1935 he pleaded guilty to possession of liquor and was fined \$100,000, which he paid, the records showing that the manufacturing and possessing property charge was stricken with leave to reinstate.

Agent was advised at the Identification Bureau of the St. Louis Police Department by Tom Powers that William E. Engler, St. Louis Police \$16270, who was arrested at St. Louis, Missouri in connection with the robbery of the Argo State Bank, Summit, Illinois, on March El, 1955, had been identified by Baryl T. Clear, porter of said bank, and on July 19, 1955 was turned over by the St. Louis Police Department to the Chicago, Illinois Police Department to return him to that city on said date. Disposition sheet as to Englar is submitted herewith to the Bureau.

### UNDEVELOPED LEAD:

THE ST. LOUIS OFFICE: Efforts to locate Subject Calatas are being continued by the St. Louis Bureau Office. This office will also keep in touch with Detective Sergeants Cliffe and McGuire concerning the ring of Winnie Williams left as security for an unpaid hotel bill at the Forest Park Hotel and should she call for said ring or send money with which to pay said bill, this office will be immediately notified.

Miller. Army Serial #2352477, at the information desk, World War Section, Adjutant General's office, which reflect the enlistment of subject Miller on June 28, 1916, at Bismarck, North Dakota. He was assigned as a private to Asse Company D, First Infantry, North Dakota Betional Guard; was mustered into Federal Service July 1, 1916; transferred to Supply Company same regiment September 5, 1916; was appointed 1st Sergeant September 7, 1916, and was mustered out of Federal service with his company on February 14, 1917. He agean reported for duty July 15, 1917, and was appointed stable Sergeant In the same organization, which regiment became the 164th Infantry; left the United States for foreign service April 17, 1918; was appointed color Sergeent August 1, 1918, and transferred same date to Headquarters Company nue i 2 1933

2-Kansas City 1-St. Paul 2-Wash. Field

3-Bureau

165rd Infantry; returned to United States February 11, 1919; transferred to 5rd Company, 9th Battalien, 155rd Depot Brigade, February 16, 1918; henorably discharged February 27, 1919, at Camp Dodge, Iowa, character being recorded as excellent.

There is nothing in the record to show that subject Hiller was awarded any decoration or cited for bravery, or that he was wounded ar gaseed, nor does it appear that he participated in any battles overseas.

On October 2, 1918, his commanding officer, Colonel Frank White, Infantry Division, R.R. and C. officer, recommended subject Miller for a commission as an officer, stating that, "I have known Sergeant Miller during the past year, and for a considerable part of that time he has been under my command. I have had opportunities to observe him and know him to be a young man of most excellent character and reliability. He is forceful and emergetic, and I believe has the material in him for the making of an excellent officer. I am glad to recommend Sergeant Miller, and believe that he will make good".

The files also contain an affidavit of R. D. Treadway, \_. Clerk of Circuit Court, Beadle County, South Dakota, dated January 26, 1923, which sets forth that Vernon C. Miller has been arrested, arraigned and is standing trial on a charge of having embezzled several thousand dollars of public funds and money which same into his possession while acting as Sheriff of Beadle County; that it is anticipated that the defense of Miller will be that he is mentally deranged and therefore incompetent due to having been wounded and gassed while in the military service of the United States, and that he will claim to have received a sertificate of discharge showing he was gassed and wounded, and has been awarded a foreign decoration for bravery. The affidavit is accompanied by a request made by J. C. McCloy, States Attorney for Beadle County, South Dakota, for a certified copy of the complete military record of subject Miller in order to refute the evidence to be introduced on behalf of Miller, as set out above. There are also several letters in the file received from Senator Horbeck of South Dakota, requesting the same information as that requested by Mr. McCloy.

The files also reflect the address of subject Miller's wife, Mrs. Mildsed M. Today Mr. John MasTarland, Detective attached to the Identification Division of the Birmingham Police Department, advised that just recently an acquaintance of his, whose mans he said he would not divulge, informed him that a short time ago one Sam Hunt, who the informant advised is also known as "Golf Bag" Bunt, was in Birmingham to attend a funeral of one of his relatives; that at that time Bunt advised MacParland's informant that he was associated with a kidnaping gang in Chicago, Bunt also saying that one of his pale had just been killed while being returned to the Leavenworth Punitentiary. The informant, according to MacParland, sleined that Bunt was very much concerned about this killing and in supposed to have spent \$26.00 on telephone calls to Chicago in talking over the matter with his confederates.

MaeFarland advised also that his informant had said that Bunt is a Birmingham boy and that his parents reside near the Baptist Hospital in the Nest End section of Birmingham; further that Bunt at the time of his wist, he having since returned to Chicago, was driving a Cadillac Sedan, and he advised the informant that he was low un money, although he was supposed to have \$600.00 in much at the present time. The informant also claims that Bunt telegraphed to Unicago for some money and \$3,000.00 was telegraphed to him in care of the Nestern Union in Birmingham, where Bunt had trouble in being identified, whereupon Bunt telephoned to Chicago from the Nestern Union office requesting that he be identified, which was done all within a very few minutes. The informant also claimed that Bunt refused to a check from the Western Union company for this three thousand dollars, with the result that officials of that company had to go to a bank to get three thousand dollars in dash with which to pay Runt.

MacTarland said that he understood that it was within the past several weeks that Runt was in this city, and he said that he did not know from what telephone Bunt had made his telephone calls, but that it was some pay station in Birmingham, and that if further information in this connection was desired he would endeavor to secure it from his informate.

Detective MesFarland, at Agent's request, checked his records and found that Sem Hunt was errested by the Rirmingham Police Department on July 10, 1919 by Detective DeGroat, charge grand largeny, his fingerprints being taken on July 12, 1919. His description at that time was as follows:

As Sem Hunt, #0-26065, arrested P.D., Chicago, Ill., 11-9-30, charge general principles; disposition not given.

As Sam Hunt, Chicago, Ill., 6-11-50, bond forfeiture, turned over to Sheriff.

Detective MacFarland also furnished Agent with a copy of the photograph in the Birmingham Police Department files, £1999, which photograph, of course, was taken in 1919. There also was obtained from the

fingerprint eard of Bunt, tracing of his signature, and a copy of this photograph and tracing is being forwarded to the Kenses City effice, as well as to the Chicago office with its copy of this letter.

Reference to the Mirmingham City Directory indicates that one Samuel N. Hunt resides at 614 St. Charles Street, which address Detective MncFarland states is in the vicinity of the Saptist Hospital in the Sect End section of Birmingham.

The above information is being furnished to the Kanses City Office in the event that it might be of interest in connection with the above mentioned case, and a copy of it is being transmitted to the Chicago office in the event that information might be wanted at that office as to Bunt in connection with other kidnaping cases.

With reference to your letter of June 25, 1935, senseming an interview had by Special Agent M. D. Traub with Vertner M. Oulledge and his information on Pretty Boy Floyd, investigation has been conducted at Port Arthur, Texas, and it was ascertained that Culledge, alies Harry Morris, Port Arthur P.B. Ho. 414, arrested Feb. 10, 1924 for aggrevated assault and fined \$100.00 and costs, is a wall known character at Port Arthur. He is a machinist by eccupation but is engaged mainly in bootlegging. He was arrested two years ago for violation of the Mational Probibition Act, and on March 1, 1935, Deputy United States Marshal Abernathy at Beaumont, Texas, made his last return "not found". This case was dismissed on Merch 25, 1935, by Federal Judge Bryant in United States District Court. There are no pending charges scainet Oulledge at Beaumont or Port Arthur at the present time.

Chief of Police Behor at Port Arthur, Texas, states he is well acquainted with Oulledge, who is a mative of Selma, Arbaneas, 🧸 and comes from a good family; that he has a wife now residing in one of the Carolinas, and is an unusually emert man; that he probably would be a first class man for kidnappers to contact and believes he is acquainted with gaugeters in the kidnepping racket. Chief Baker believes that Gulledge might possibly know "Pretty Boy" Fleyd's lady friend if Floyd has one at Port Arthur, for the reason that he knows all the underworld characters and associated with them while he lived at Port Arthur. He has not been in the vicinity for about two years. There seems to be little question about his knowing members of the underworld and especially local hoodlune around Port Arthur; however, it is extremely doubtful if he could be of any material assistance to the Covernment since he probably is not "big time" enough to be associated with the present day hidmoppers.

Reference is made to the letter from Special Agent in Charge R. E. Vetterli, Kansas City Office, dated July 19, 1935, with inclosures.

In connection with the above agent contacted C.A. Meson, 420 Equity Building, Muskoges, Oklahoma. Mr. Meson stated that J. F. Ford, a negro, told him of a trip that he made last September to Park Hills vicinity to fix a broken car and what he saw while there, at what appears to be a camp of a gang of sutlaws and bootleggers.

J. F. Ford, 320 South 2nd Street, Muskogee, Oklahoma, was interviewed. He stated that in September 1932 he had a garage shop at Muskogee and that a man named Stone, whose first name and address are not known to Ford, come to him and said that he had loaned his car to a woman to go to 🟬 Fort Gibson, Oklahoma; that the car was broken down and the woman daught a 🗒 ride back to Myskogee and he wanted Ford to take this genen in his dar to where the car had been broken down, fix the car so she could drive it back a to Muskogee. Ford stated that he and this white woman left Muskogee in his car and drove to Fort Gibson, past the Park Hill Highway, left the highway and drove into the Cookson's Hill vicinity, about 25 to 80 miles from Muskoges, where the car was broken. Ford stated that the samp is do a ravine of a creek or river; that he saw about 80 to 25 mm, all hard-looking and equipped with rifles, pistols and lots of emminition; that they 🔆 had several barrels of whiskey and plenty of home brew beer; that they all bunched around him when he was working on the car; that after he fixed the car, the women paid him \$16.00 in cash and they gave him one gallon and of whiskey and one dozen bottles of beer. Ford further stated that he was scared and wanted to get away
from that camp as soon as possible. He did not hear mentioned any names
and did not learn the name of the woman who went with him to the camp but
it is the opinion of Ford that it is the camp or hang-out place for outlews,
bootleggers and murderers. Ford stated that he does not know Charles
(Pretty Boy) Floyd personally and did not hear his name mentioned while
he was there.

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With reference to the information furnished by Bly to Mr. Merle Gill, ballistic expert. Kenses City. Missouri, agent interviewed S. M. Hilli goss. Undersheriff, Muskogee, who stated that he does not know any of the men mentioned in the memorandum personally but if they are located in the vicinity of Stilwell and Sallisaw there is no use to interview any of them because they will not give any information, especially to a stranger, and it serves to put them on guard and send word to Charlie Floyd that a government agent was inquiring for him; that it would do more herm to inquire from those persons mentioned than the benefit of any information they might give.

Mr. Hilligose further stated that within a radius of 15 to 20 miles in the vicinity of Cookson Hills and the Illinois River there are hide-outs for all kinds of outlaws and no stranger can go in there and get any information.

Agent interviewed John Wolsey, Chief of Detectives, Muskoges, Oklahoma. He stated that he does not know any of the mem named in the memorandum personally, but he is well acquainted with the situation in the vicinity of Stilwell and Sallisaw, Oklahoma; that with very few exceptions all the people that live in that vicinity are friendly to the outlaws and especially to Charlie Floyd; that as a rough estimate one out of every hundred persons who live in that vicinity will give any information. Mr. Wolsey stated that it will do more harm than good to see any of those people, furthermore that there are very few people who come iff contact, with Charlie Floyd and can give any information of value.

For the reasons set out above agent did not interview the persons mentioned on the memorandum at this time until the matter could be discussed with Special Agent in Charge Colvin for his epinion.

MEMORANIUM FOR THE DIRECTOR.

Agent in Charge Purvis called from Chicago this morning relative to the telegram from Frank Jacobsch, received yesterday, and stated that he had talked to ar. Loesch yesterday afternoon, who had placed him in touch with a man by the name of W. Comfort Mawkins, who, in turn, claims to have an informant who is a member of the Frank Mash gang and is in the counsel of this gang at the present time. Mr. Furvis stated that this informant's name was not made known to him, but Hawkins stated he believed he could induce the informant later to contact Purvis. Purvis stated that he received no information which could be used as evidence but he did receive a great deal of background information which he felt would prove of considerable value in the further investigation of the Kansas City shooting. He stated that if he could obtain the bullets found at the scene of the shooting and have them compared by a ballistics expert at Chicago he might be able to definitely identify the machine gun used at Kansas City. This informant claimed that the machine gun is one which has been used on two prior occasions in Chicago and that the police at Chicago have bullets which were fired by that gun on those occasions, and thus it could be identified. He claims that the gun is buried now but that just as soon as it comes to light again this informent will know of that fact and probably communicate the information through channels to Purvis. It appears that the informant is desirous of a retainer of some kind and Furvis will explain the whole matter in a letter which he will write the Bureau today. He stated that Mr. Loesch did not know anything about the informent. He only knows the man Hawkins and has a great deal of confidence in him.

Relative to Doc Stacy, Mr. Purvis stated that Turrou and Brentley had come on to Chicago with a warrant for Stacy's arrest, as a result of which Stacy had been picked up, but to date he had had absolutely nothing to say. A memorandum relative to Stacy is attached hereto.

### MEMORANDIM FOR THE DIRECTOR

Reference is made to the attached Associated Press newspaper clipping, dated at Chicago, August 8, 1933, appearing 🔨 in The Washington Post on August 9, 1933, referring to Louis Stacci, aliasetacy.

Stacy is the operator of the O. P. Inn at Maywood, Illinois, a suburb of Chicago, and is well known to have been associated with a number of underworld characters.

During the search for Frank Nash, Stacy's place was raided upon information that Nash could be located there. The aforementioned raid was based upon information obtained by Special Agent R. D. Brown of the Detroit Office, which I believe was obtained from a brother of Fontaine.

A review of the obstruction of justice file indicates that Stacy was taken to the Chicago Office of the Division on July 22, 1933, by Special Agents Madala and Keating and Illinois State Police officers, and questioned concerning a telephone call made to the O. P. Inn on June 16, 1933 and a telephone call made from the O. P. Inc to Fritz Mulloy at Kansas City, Missouri. on June 16, 1933. He, at the time of the interview, however, pleaded ignorance to both calls.

It appears that a long distance telephone call was made from the telephone of Mrs. E. B. Connor at Hot Springs, Arkansas, to the O. P. Inn at Maywood, Illinois, at 2:50 P.M. on June 16, 1933, and that a telephone call was made from the O. P. Inn to Fritz Mulloy of the Horseshoe Inn at Kansas City, Missouri, on June 16, 1933. Stacy at the time of the interview denied acquaintance with Mrs. E. B Connor, Fritz Mulloy, Verne C. Miller Frank Nash, or other members of this mob. 62-24615- 43.

It appears, however, that Stacy is not telling the truth about his connections with these gangsters and it will be noted that Mrs. Frank Nash was at one time employed as a cook at the O. P. Inn and he admits being acquainted with her.

The file does not reflect that any prosecutive action has been taken against Stacy in connection with the obstruction of justice case at Kansas City. It does appear, however, that Stacy is a member of this gang and it is entirely possible that he received information from Mrs. E. B. Connor from Hot Springs, Arkansas, concerning Nash's arrest, and that he relayed same to Fritz Mulloy at Kansas City, who admittedly is an acquaintance of Verne C. Miller.

#### MEMORABIUM FOR MR. WILLIAM STABLEY. THE ASSISTANT TO THE ATTORNEY GENERAL

In the early morning of August 12, Special Agents of the Division of Investigation of the United States Department of Justice closed in upon a house in a remote section of Texas, about seven miles south of the town of Paradise, coming upon the occupants before they had awakened and captured Marvey Bailey, motorious gunnan wanted as an escape from the Lansing, Kansas, State Penitentiary, and for the murder of Special Agent Caffrey, of this Division, and three police officers at Kansas City on June 17, together with five other individuals who occupied this shack, manely R. C. Shanson, apparently the owner of the premises, Shannon's son, 22 years of age, his son's wife, one Brown, and one other woman. Bailey had beside him in the house a machine gun and two sutomatic pistols. He was captured before he had an opportunity to use any of these arms. On his person was discovered \$1,100.00, \$700.00 of which was promptly identified as the money used in the payment of rensom for Charles Wrschel. All persons in the house were placed under arrest and immediately carried to Dallas. Harvey Bailey being placed in safe confinement.

Towng Shannon admitted to the Agents that he and his father had acted as guards over Charles ? Forschel when held after being kidnaped. He identified George Kelly and one George Bates as the actual kidnapers who brought "rachel to this house. Young Shannon stated that his understanding was that his father, R. G. Shannon, was to get \$10,000.00 for his part in the kidnaping.

Harvey Bailey admitted his identity as Bailey but has admitted nothing with regard to the kidnaping of Charles F. Erschel

Er. Brachel has positively identified the premises as the place where he was held in confinement. This rendesvous was discovered after many days of prinstaking search by aeroplans, machine and gthen manag, A.M. and plans were laid to close in on it in the early morning. on the morning of June 19, 1935 at 7:15 A.W., eccompanied by Special Agent F. J. Lackey and Mr. Otto Reed, Chief of Police, McAlester, Oklahoma, we arrived at Kansas City enroute to the Federal Panitantiary at Leavenworth with an escaped federal prisoner, Frank Hash. We were met at the Union Station by Special Agent in Charge R. E. Vetterli and Special Agent Caffrey and two police officers, who were there to assist us in removing Hash from the Union Station to Leavenworth Prison. . iccompanied by Agent Caffrey. Mr. Vetterli and the Kansas City police officers, we left the train, passing through the station to Mr. Caffrey's automobile, which was parked opposite the Union Station and which was to be used in transporting Frank Hesh to the Leavenvorth Prison. Then we reached the automobile, Rash was seated on the front seat. The writer, Mr. Reed and Agent Leckey sat on the back seat. Special Agent Caffrey was standing at the left front door of the car preparatory to entering same when gangaters with mechine guns, in an attempt to liberate Frank Eash, opened fire on those eccompanying Bash, instantly killing Agent Ceffrey, the prisoner Frenk Mash, Chief of Police Reed, the two Eshess City police officers and shooting agent Lackey through the back three times and slightly wounding Special Agent in Charge Vetterli.

Special Agent Coffrey, as well as the others killed, was given as opportunity to defend himself. Agent Coffrey was assessinated while in active discharge of his duty.



TETAILS: Agent discussed this matter with U. S. Attorney Em. L. Vandeventer, Kansas City, Missouri, on 8-5-35, with reference to prosecution of the various Subjects and he advised that it is his intention to seek an indictment against Frank B. Mulloy and Louis Stacci, in addition to Subjects Herbert Farmer, Esther Farmer, Galatas and Miller. He believes that other indictments which may be secured in the case should not be sought at this time. With reference to Mrs. Hash, Mr. Vandeventer suggested that since her testimony is necessary to the conviction of various other defendants it would be advisable to omit her name from the indictments at present. However, he will confer with her attorney, John G. Madden, and arrange that she appear before the Grand Jury after waiving immunitye As will be noted hereafter in this report a certain agreement has been made by the U. S. Attorney's office with the attorney of Mrs. Eash whereby she is to furnish testimony, presumably all that she has, as a witness in this case and if the U. S. Attorney is antisfied that she has made a truthful statement, enything which she may say in addition to that which has been given by her in statements appearing in previous reports will not be used against here

Mr. Vandeventer authorized the filing of complaint against
Louis Stacci, 8-5-33, charging him as conspirator in the instant matter to cause
the escape of federal prisoner Frank Hash. Agent appeared before U. S.
Commissioner George B. Beerdsley, on 8-5-33, at Kansas City and filed suck
complaint. A non est return was immediately made on the warrant and certified
copies were forwarded to the U. S. Attorney. Chicago, Illinois, by the U. S.
Attorney. Kansas City. The results of the arrest and questioning of Stacci
in Chicago will be briefly stated hereafter in this report and a detailed
report concerning that activity will be forthcoming from the Chicago office.
The names of Frank B. Mulloy and Louis Stacci are being added as Subjects in
this case.

Pursuant to conferences with the U. S. Attorney and other activities in this case about 7-31-33 and thereafter, the following memorandum has been rendered by Special Agents Dwight Brantley and L. G. Turrou:

In a letter to the Director from the Kansas City Office, dated July Slat, it is observed that on July Sl, 1932, murder charges were filed in Kansas City, kissouri, against Herbert and Mether Farmer and Frances Luce Each, the widow of Frank Nach.

On August 1, 1935, Special Agent in Charge Vetterli and Special Agents Trainor Turrou and Brantley were served with subposences to appear before a Hotary Public on August 3rd for the purpose of taking depositions in this case, which is a provision of the Missouri Statute in ariminal as well as civil cases. Agent in Charge Vetterli immediately conferred with United States Attorney Vandeventer, and the latter expressed the opinion that should depositions be taken that the defense counsel would obtain any and all evidence in this case against Frs. Rash and possibly the Farmers. Thereafter, conference was had with Michael O'Hern, Assistant Prosecutor of Jackson County.

United States Attorney Vandeventer expressed the epinion that the evidence against krs. Nash would not be sufficient to convict, and inasmuch as she had already furnished bail on the Federal charge pending against her he believed that should she decide to disclose all information in her possession in connection with this matter, that the best interests of the Government would be served if the murder charges against her were withdrawn or dismissed.

In a conference between John G. Wadden, attorney for kre. Hash, a representative of the United States Attorney's office, and Special Agents Turrou and Brantley, and at the suggestion of Lr. Vandeventer, it was agreed that the matter be taken up again with the Procedutor's Office. Eichael O'Hern, Assistant Prosecutor, stated that anything agreeable to the Government in the case would be acceptable to his office, and on August End, upon motion of the Assistant Prosecutor, the charge of murder against Ers. Hash was dismissed. The Parmers remain in the Jackson County Jail on the murder charges filed against them.

Mrs. Nach was released from jail, after having furnished bail in the Pederal charge against her. She is to remain in Kansas City, Missouri, and evailable to her attorney at all times.

Pursuent to an understanding between the office of the United States Attorney at Kansas City and Ar. hadden, disclosures made by Mrs. Rest subsequent to August 1, 1983, even should the same be incriminating against her, are not to be used in evidence in a future prosecution that might be brought against her. Ar. hadden, attorney for Ars. Nash, agreed that Agents of this office could interview Mrs. Nash at any time. She was interviewed on August 2, 1983, at which time she stated:

That sometime prior to her seeting with Frank Mash, and while she

was employed at the O P Inn at Chicago, she saw Vernon Killer. alias Mason, alias Moore, as a guest at that place. That he frequently came in to get meals after having played golf on a course nearby. That he appeared to be well known to Doc Stacey, who managed or owned the O P Inn. After her meeting with Hesh she said she saw Nash and Miller together frequently, and it was her impression that they had been acquainted for sometime. She and Mash and Vernon Miller's wife, known as Vi, were out eabareting together on occasions around Chicago. After the meeting with the wife of Killer she said she saw them frequently. Mash would take her to a roadhouse on Highways 12 and 19, about 50 miles North of Chicago, known as Louis's Place, the telephone number of which is Cary 65. She stated that after she had known Miller and his wife for sometime she and Vi, on one occasion, made a trip from Chicago to St. Paul in Hash's car; upon arrival at St. Paul Mrs. Rash said she went to Aurora and that Wi went to Brainard, Kinnesota, the home of her parents. After the completion of this visit she said that she joined Vi at Brainard and the two of them went to St. Paul and were joined by Frank Nesh. While in St. Paul she said they went to a saloon, or joint of some kind, operated by the husband of Gladys Sawyere

She stated that she, Vi and Frank returned to Chicago from St. Paul in the automobile together, and while enroute had an automobile accident in which Frank's arm was injured. After this accident she said that she or Vi called Doc Stacey, who immediately got a doctor whose name is Brust to render medical aid to Frank. She stated that at this time she and Frank were living in an apartment in Berwyn, near Cicero on Slst Street Court, under the name of "Mills". She said that Vernon and Vi at that time were living at the Graymere Hotel in Chicago under the name of Miller, Moore or Mason.

She said that sometime after the accident, when Frank's arm did not get along so well, Vernon Miller suggested that Frank go to New York to enter a hospital for treatment, and that Frank apparently did not want to go but Vernon, who was of a domineering disposition, induced him to do so, and that she, Frank and Verne left by train for New York and upon arrival at New York all of them registered at the Picadilly Hotel. She fixed this date as sometime prior to Thanksgiving as after Frank had entered the hospital he was discharged about a day or two before Thanksgiving.

She said that after Frank was out of the hospital he and she went to live at the Naraganset Hotel, at 94th and Broadway, under the name of George W. Miller. She and Frank remained in New York until after New Year's, and a day or two after the first of the year Verne and Vi came to New York and stopped at the Picadilly Hotel. While in New York in early January of 1933 she said that she and Frank were introduced to some of the friends of Verne and Vi, and among them was a woman named Betty, whose husband apparently was very wealthy as they lived in a very elegant apartment near a perk. She also said she met a woman friend of Vern and Vi by the name of "Sonny" but does not know her last name or her husband's name, but that the husband was very bald. She said that this "Betty" appeared to be a very good friend of VI, but she does not know the last name, but she does know that Betty was quite accomplished and spoke of having travelled in Europe. She said she met two men friends of Verne by the name of Sammy; (that is, both of them were named Sammy) and another woman friend by the name of "Pigeon."

She stated that after remaining in New York for some time she and Frank returned to Chicago and lived with Verne and Vi in an apartment on South Boulevard, in Oak Park, Illinois, and that Lillian Holden, wife of Tom Holden, now in the United States Penitentiary, lived with them. She said they remained there for several weeks. (This apartment, no doubt, is the same one referred to in the report of Special Agent J. J. Keating of the Chicago Office 7-51-1925 on Page 57, the address of which apartment is 419 South Boulevard, Oak Park).

She said that she and Frank were frequently at Louis's Place, located out of Chicago, and she believes that on one occasion she saw James (Fur) Sammons there, and that he was known as Jimmie. She said that in March of 1933 she and Frank went to Hot Springs, Arkansas, and that when they left Verne and Vi were away from the spartment in Oak Park, but she does not know where they were as frequently they would make trips and be gone for a period of a few days. At this point Mrs. Hash related that while in Hot Springs in March or April she met Albert and Esther Farmer for the first time. This meeting, of course, is reflected in statements hitherto made by Mrs. Nash.

She also stated that while in Hot Springs about this time she saw Vernon Miller there.

She also stated that during the summer of 1952 she and Frank visited Vernon and Vi at Lake Geneva, Wisconsin, and that Vernon and Vi had a very nice cottage at the Lake.

Mrs. Nash was questioned concerning friends, associates and acquaint ances of Frank Nash and Vernon Killer.

She stated that while in St. Paul on one occasion she was at a saloon or club of some kind, the name and address of which she does not know, and that she met a woman known only as "mother",

who had two sons whose names were Freddy and "Doc".

Mrs. Hash was shown a photograph of Fred Barker and she immediately identified it as the Freddy mentioned above. Ho photograph of "Doc" Barker, brother of Fred Barker was available, but there is no doubt but that the "Doc" in question is "Doc" Barker and that the woman in question, known as "Mother" is Kate Barker, who travels constantly with her sons, and with them very likely is Alvin Karpis. Both Fred Barker and Alvin Karpis are wanted for murder at West Plains, Missouri. Mrs. Hash said that later she saw Fred Barker and his mother around Louis's Place, near Chicago; that on one occasion while at Louis's Place there was enother woman known as Helen with Krs. Barker, and that she assisted these two women in obtaining apartments at the Home Apartment Building in Cak Park, where they both lived for some time. This, she believes, was in the late winter or early Spring of 1988. She said, however, that these women, she believes, vacated the epartments in the Rome Apartment Building and moved to a more desirable apartment building in the same locality. She does not know under what names they lived, but she is of the opinion that one of them used the name of Yerguson.

It is observed from the Kansas City File in the case of Holding and Keating and Nash, Escaped Federal Prisoners, that in Kansas City Mrs. Barker, who was living with her sons and Alvin Karpis, used the name of Kate Bunter. She is of the opinion that the Barkers, with their mother, are still living in Cak Park, Illinois.

Mrs. Nesh stated that while in St. Paul, Minnesota on or about June 10, 1933, with Frank Nash, she and Frank spent the night at a residence of some friends of Frank, but the address she does not remember, but that this friend who had this house was Fred Barker and that "Doe" Barker was with him and the woman's name was Paula. She was shown photographs of Dorothy Courtney, alias Winnie Williams, the woman of Bernard Phillips, and she stated emphatically it was not the woman with Fred Barker. She said that there was a young sollegiate appearing fellow at this house when she and Frank were there, but she could not positively identify a photograph of Alvin Earpis as said individual.

She stated that at Louis's Place, near Chicago, on one occasion she met a man by the name of Dougherty who lives on a farm on the Fox River, near McHenry, Illinois, and that she and Frank went there and spent about a week in a cabin. She said that Dougherty and his wife appeared to be in destitute circumstances and that she doesn't know whether he was an intimate friend of Frank or whether he was endorsed as a safe individual for Frank to associate with by some one in Louis's place. She stated that on one occasion she and Frank and Verne and Vi went to the home of Rocco (Rockie) Stacey, a brother of Louis Stacey, in Kelrose Park, Illinois, and spent several days.

She stated that after she left Joplin, Missouri, en June 18, 1935, for Wenona, Illinois, she went through Chicago, and upon arrival there she called the residence of Louis Stacey and talked to his wife, Helen, and got a brother of Louis Stacey, whose name is Johnney, to drive her from Chicago to Wemona.

These circumstances are related to show that Louis Stacey is and has been intimately acquainted with Frank Mash and Vernon Miller, his statements to the contrary notwithstanding.

She said that she went several times with Frank Nash to a Road House or club by the name of Rivermore, located at 22nd and First Avenue, Riverside (probably a suburb of Chicago), and which is operated by a man by the name of Charlie Luebeker, and that Vernon and Vi and Lillian Holden accompanied them to this point, and that all were well known there.

Mrs. Nash said that when Dick Galates came to the Tourist Camp for her in the afternoon of June 16, 1935, following the pickup of Frank Nash, and when he took her away, he stopped enroute to his home hear the reilroad station and went in either to the jail or the Folice Station, saying that he was going to see a Judge who had much influence in Hot Springs; that after going in the Police Station or jail Galatas came out and contacted a man who appeared to have an office in the back of a barber shop. and who supposedly was the Judge in question. That Galatas brought this man out to the car and she overheard the conversation between them, and that she heard Galatas tell this man that one of his "good boys" had been picked up, and that the man appearing to be the judge said he would see what he could do about it. Thereafter Calatas took her to his home and very shortly he took her to an apartment where she made some telephone calls - one to the O P Inn at Melrose Park, Illinois, and the other to the residence of Esther Farmer at Jorline She said that Galates told her that Frank Mash had told him, Galatas, that if anything should ever happen to him that "Doc" Stacey at the O P Inn should be called. Mrs. Hash said that Frank Mash had told her the same thing. She said that when Galatas told her to call Doc Stacey that he gave her the number Cary 65, at which Frank Hash told him that Stacey could be reached. She said that she then told Galatas that the place to get in touch with Stacey was at the O P Inn, whereupon she called it. She said that before leaving Hot Springs that afternoon for Joplin that Galatas told her he had obtained information from some source, she thinks from the Police Department, that Frank Rash was to be taken to Joplin. Missouri. She said also that when she was discussing going to Joplin with Galatas he told her that probably Herbert Farmer would have connections there. She recited that Gelates told her that immediately after Frank Nash was picked up in Hot Springs a car left from the White Front in pursuit of the machine the officers were using, but that this car out distanced the

pursuing car. She did not indicate who was in the pursuing machine.

Mrs. Mash again related the trip from Hot Springs to Joplin by plane, which in substance is the same as contained in her previous statements.

She said that in a telephonic conversation between Galatas and his wife that evening information was received that Eash was to be taken from Fort Smith, Arkansas, to Kansas City by train. She said that as she recalls the language used was that "the patient or party was taken sick and they have taken him by train from Fort Smith to Kansas City". She says she recalls this distinctly because when it was mentioned that Frank Nash might be sick she became alarmed and Galatas assured her that Mash was all right and this was just the method of delivering the measage relative to the change in mode of travel by the officers with Mash. She said that after receipt of this call Werne Miller was contacted by telephone in Kansas City, Missouri, from the Farmer residence. She was emphatic in the statement that the call was made by Mrs. Eather Farmer at the suggestion of Dick Galatas. She said that at this time Miller was informed that the officers were taking Nash to Kansas City from Fort Smith by train. Mrs. Mash said that she did not know at this time where Miller lived in Kansas City, but that Mrs. Esther Farmer had told her in either Hot Springs in April 1955, or when she arrived at her home the afternoon of June 16th, that Miller and Vi were living in Kansas City, Missouri.

Mrs. Hash stated that she learned during the morning of June 17th from the Farmers for the first time that the man she had married was Frank Mash.

She stated that Esther Farmer told her during the afternoon of June 17th, after the news flashes had been received by radio, of the shooting at the Union Station in Eansas City, that Verne Miller had called her, Esther Farmer, by telephone, and that Esther Farmer told her that Verne asked her where Ers. Nash is and said that she should be told to go home immediately.

Mrg. Nash stated that all the acquaintances and intimates of Frank Nash and Verne Miller she met appeared to have respect and admiration for Vernon Miller, and that she gained the impression he was looked upon as a boss or leader and that he had a great influence over Frank Nash. She also said that on occasions, to her own knowledge, Vernon Miller had supplied Frank Eash with money.

For whatever purpose it may serve, Mrs. Mash said that Vern

Miller had a large brown pet bull dog and that the name of this dog is "Teddy".

Mrs. Mash also said that to her swn knowledge Louis Stacey and Vernon Miller played golf together many times, and that Louis Stacey is a member of the Maywood Golf Club in Chicago.

With reference to the memorandum of agents Brantley and Turrou, mentioned heretofore, it will be noted that Mrs. Mash discussed a woman named Betty, who is probably identical with Mrs. Betty Buckholts, a resident of New York City and a close friend of Vivian Mathis. Subject Miller's paramour. The New York City office will kindly note also the names of other woman, who have connections with Betty Buckholts named "Sonny" and "Pigeon", and the names of two men whose names are each "Sonny."

It is noted in the statement recently made by Mrs. Mash that Barker brothers, Fred and "Doc" whose real name is presumed to be Arthur R. Barker, have connections in Chicago, Illinois, and are probably still there. As an aid to the Chicago office photographs of Fred Barker and Arthur R. Barker are enclosed herein. Arthur R. Barker's photograph was taken in 1920 by the Joplin, Missouri, Police Department when he was 19 years of age and, therefore, same is probably not an exact likeness at this time.

Investigation requested of the Kansas City office at Hot Bprings and Little Rock, Arkansas, through the report of Agent Tracy, mentioned above, is to be conducted by the Oklahoma City office and one additional copy of that report was forwarded, with enclosures, from the Kansas City office to the Oklahoma City office on 8-9-33.

Arrangements have been made with U. S. Attorney Wm. L. Vandeventer of Kanzas City to call a special session of the Grand Jury on S-30-33. At that time indictments will be sought against the parties mentioned heretofore. The preliminary hearing of Eather Farmer and Herbert Farmer which was schedules, after one continuance, to occur on S-14-33, has been postponed by the U. S. Commissioner to S-1-33. It is, therefore, seen that the indictments will be secured before the date of preliminary hearing which will obviate the necessity for divulging evidence in this case at the hearing.

The following is a brief resume of activity by Special Agents Dwight Brantley and L. G. Turrou with reference to the arrest and questioning of Subject Stacci:

Pursuent to instructions of Special Agent in Charge R. E. Vetterli of the Kansas City office, following a telephonic conversation between him and the Director, Agents Turrou and Brantley proceeded to Chicago for the purpose of questioning Louis Stacci and other members of the Stacci family in connection with statements made concerning them by Mrs. Frances Mash.

On 8-7-35 Louis Stacci was questioned at great length in the Chicago-Bureau office. The same day Mike Stacci, Rocco Stacci, Mrs. Helen Stacci (wife of Louis Stacci), Elmer Stacci (step-son of Louis Stacci), Jimmie Burns (formerly waiter at the O. P. Inn) and Mrs. Rocco Stacci were questioned. All of these people denied knowing any of the parties connected with this case with the exception of Frances Mash. The aforesaid interviews were conducted by

Agents Turrou, Keating, Medala and Brantleye

A fugitive complaint was issued in Chicago, upon authority of the U. S. Attorney, for Doc Stacci following which he was taken into custody by the Marshal and his bond fixed at \$50,000,000 which he had not furnished on 8-8-33, and hearing has been set before the U. S. Commissioner of Chicago for 8-22-33.

Doc Stacci denied making any telephone calls in connection with this matter at any time. Full particulars concerning the aforesaid interviews will be incorporated in a report in this case to be rendered by the Chicago office.

In this connection, upon the return of Agents Brantley and Turrou to Kansas City Mrs. Frances Mash was reinterviewed at which time she reiterated the fact that Louis Stacci, Frank Mash and Verne Miller were together on many occasions and were more than friends. She stated that upon her arrival in Chicago from Joplin, Missouri, on 6-19-55, she proceeded to the home of Louis Stacci where she had remained for several hours; that Mrs. Stacci had accompanied her to Wenona in her automobile, driven by Johnnie Stacci, the brother of Louis Stacci; that about a week later she made a trip to Chicago and had seen Louis Stacci and in a conversation with him she reminded him of the \$1,500.00 which he omed Frank Mash, at which time Stacci told her that all he owed Frank Mash was \$50.00 and that he had no money to pay here. Mrs. Mash ridiculed the assertions made by Stacci that he was unequainted with Vernon Miller or Frank Mash, and stated that they have all been pals for some times

On page 63 of the report of Special Agent Trainor, dated 7-15-33, discussion was had of the purchase of an Essex Terraplane by one \*A. Carter\* believed to be either identical with Vernon C. Miller or a close connection of his.

On 8-5-33, Agents Brantley and Turrou made investigation at the Barnes-Collard Motor Company, Leavenworth, Kansas, where it was learned that on 10-29-32 a party giving the name A. Carter, address - Mational Military Hors, Leavenworth, Kansas, appeared with a 1932 Model Chevrolet Coupe, Motor #3085590, Illinois 1932 license tags #1-02891, and traded it for a 1932 Chevrolet Sedan, Motor #330213. (The latter mentioned car is the one traded to the Hudson-Brace Motor Company for the Essex Terraplane as mentioned on page 63 of the Kansas City report, 7-15-33.) The party paid the difference in the trade of \$300.00 in cash in \$100.00 bills. This party had a large roll of money when he appeared there. When the Chevrolet was traded at the Barnes-

Collard Motor Company that company desired title papers and, therefore, a Mansas 1932 license for the car was purchased and A. Carter paid for the license which was bought by the Bernes-Collard Motor Company, the license number being 7-6850, Kansas, 1932. (This tag remained in possession of the Bernes-Collard Company.) No one was with A. Carter at the time of this transaction. He came in later with a man resembling a photograph of Frank B. Mulloy.

A. Carter gave a bill of sale to the Barnes-Collard Motor Company written on stationery of Stewart's Garage, 231 Lincoln Way Best, South Bend, Indiana, which purports to show that on 4-15-32 Chevrolet Coupe, Motor \$5085590, Serial \$21 BA 0111591, was sold to A. Carter, Hotel Florence, Pullman, Illinois, for \$450,000. The bill of sale being signed by Thomas Quinn.

The above document was examined by Agents Brantley and Turrou and the party from whom they received this information was C. Le Bible, salesman of the Barnes-Collard Motor Company, who handled the transaction with A. Carter. Mr. Bible was shown a photograph of Vernon C. Miller, but was not positive in his identification of that party as A. Carter.

Sam Elliott, used car manager, Barnes-Collard Motor Company, also was present at the time of the transaction and he was shown a photograph of Miller and positively identified it as a likeness of A. Carter.

In the Chevrolet Coupe which was traded by Carter was found a pair of coveralls in which Mr. Elliott found a keyring containing some keys and a metal tag on which was stamped Cloud County Bank. It was ascertained that this bank is located in Concordia, Kansas. These keys were later given to Carter when he returned to have the car serviced. He has not been in to this garage since the early part of 1933.

The office of the Hational Military Home, Leavenworthe Kansas, was closed when Agents Brantley and Turrou arrived there and, therefore, no inquiry has yet been made to determine whether or not a person named A. Carter, identical with the one mentioned herein, was an immate there.

A tracing of the signature "A. Carter" from the bill of sale given to the Barnes-Collard Motor Company for the Chevrolet Coupe was made and same appears upon comparison with the known signature of Vernon C. Miller under his alias as V. C. Mason to be the identical handwriting. A tracing of this aignature of A. Carter is being herewith enclosed for the Chicago office. It is believed desirable to conduct investigation at South Bend, Indiana, in order that it may be established whether or not there is another individual probably known there who used the alias A. Carter and would be a close connection of Millers

Reference is made to the report of Special Agent J. J. Keating wherein an undeveloped lead is set out to interview Mrs. V. T. Moreman at Kaness City. This woman was located at 724 Minnesota Avenue, Kaness City. Kaness, telephone Fairfax 5041, where she operates a small lingeric establishment in the same building with her brother-in-law, A. Winkler, an optometerist. She is the woman referred to in the letter from the Birmingham office to the Kaness City office, dated 7-17-35, as mentioned by Robert Perry of the U. Se Secret Service. She was interviewed by Agents Brantley and Turrou, and wanted to know immediately if Mr. Perry had furnished information concerning here. She was answered in the negative.

Mrs. Moreman advised that she and W. T. Moreman have been married eight years. He is in the amisement business and has been in Chicago some time. He formerly resided at the Del Prado Hotel at Chicago. He met Mrs. E. B. Conner, known as Lou, at Daytona Beach, Florida last winter. He fell in love with her as Mrs. Moreman learned some time ago, after which she proceeded to Chicago to look into the matter. Mrs. Moreman stopped at the Sherman Hotel in Chicago. She learned that Moreman and Mrs. Conner were residing together in Chicago while she was there, but she did not know the address. While Mrs. Moreman was in Chicago, Moreman came to Kansas City, Kansas, to get his effects as he and Mrs. Moreman had separated and decided to get a divorce. While in Kensas City, Kansas, (she ascertained) that Moreman saw the name of Mrs. Conner in a newspaper in connection with the instant case and he immediately returned to Chicago. At that time he sought to reconcile himself with Mrs. Moreman.

Mrs. Moremen also stated that she returned to Kansas City on 7-16-35 and the Monday prior thereto she ascertained that Mrs. Conner left Chicago and went to Benton, Arkansas, as she found a telegram in the possession of her husband, Moreman, from Mrs. Conner sent from Benton, Arkansas, informing him of her arrival there. She stated that Mrs. Conner has a farm near Benton; that Mrs. Conner goes with a young brother of Eddie Conner, her deceased husband.

Mrs. Moreman stated that she does not know where her husband, W. T. Moreman, is now residing, but that he is in Chicago and she sends his mail to the Lake Cigar Store, 221 North Michigan Blvd., Chicago. She received a letter from him on 8-3-33 in which he wrote he was leaving on the previous evening, 8-2-33, for Detroit, Michigan, and upon his arrival there he would furnish his address. Mrs. Moreman promised that she would keep in touch with the Kansas City office and would furnish the address of her husband when she secures it.

The Chicago office should not e the connection at the Lake Cigar Store, Chicago, Illinois, from which place a forwarding address will probably be available for W. T. Moreman.

Reference is made to page 55 of the report of agent Trainor, dated 7-28-35, wherein mention is made of one Mrs. Dial of Thayer, Missouri, then known to be in Kansas City. Through surveillance of the Post Office General Delivery window Mrs. Dial was located and it was found that she was residing at the Holland House, a middle class hotel at Kansas City, with a man named Gerald Diale Mrs. Dial and her husband were held by the police in technical custody for a brief period during which time thorough investigation was made by Agents Brantley and Turrou and it was determined that no connection on their part to the instant matter existed, therefore, they were released. The details of their questioning being immaterial in this case they are omitted.

With reference to the letter from the Bureau, dated 7-31-35, with enclosure which was a letter from one George Dixon, a prisoner at the U. S. Penitentiary, Leavenworth, Kansas, addressed to the Attorney General of the United States, offering assistance in the instant matter, agents Brantley and Turrou interviewed Dixon, on 8-5-33. Dixon is originally from Texas and has been in Louisiena and Oklahoma; prior to his imprisonment he operated a filling station on highway \$71 near Conway, Arkansas, about twenty-five miles from Little Bock, Arkansas, the name of which was Cottage City Camp, according to his statement. He said he was selling liquor at one time there and got to know many of the oriminals, among them "Pretty Boy" Floyd whom he saw as many as a dozen times, although he does not claim to be an intimate friend of Floyd.

Direct stated that he has read that the Government is looking for Floyd and that with his acquaintance in Arkansas, where he knows Floyd frequents, he can, within a very short time, either apprehend or cause the apprehension of Floyd. He stated that he is interested in the rewards outstanding for the apprehension of Floyd. He does not, he says, request the Government to advance him any money, but that he does believe the Government should shorten his stay at the penitentiary and permit him to go to Arkansas to render service by causing Floyd's apprehension. He would be willing, he said, to have an officer accompany him on this mission. He stated that unless his sentence is shortened he does not think he would give the matter further consideration.

Dimon was told by Agents Brantley and Turrou that his statement would be transmitted to the proper authorities. The Agents, who interviewed this prisoner, were not favorably impressed with his sincerity. Dimon has served a previous sentence in the State Penitentiary of Texas for robbery.

Reference is made to page 17, paragraph 5 of the report of Agent Trainor, dated 7-21-35. On 8-10-53, Subject Mulloy was interviewed at the Kansas Gity Bureau office by Agents Brantley and Turrou. He was specifically questioned as to whether or not he is acquainted with Louis (Doc) Stacci and still vehemently denied in quite loud tones that he has ever known Stacci or that he has ever seen him or been in communication with him, to his knowledge. He has a different version of the telephone call received on 6-16-35 at telephone Jackson 970

Eansas City, than that mentioned heretofore in the reference report. He said that he left the Kansas City office on the occasion of the former interview and upon meditating made some inquiries at the Tavern in an effort to learn particulars connected with this call. He now states that one "Lonnie", a colored porter at the Tavern, told him that about 4 Pake, the afternoon of 6-16-33 a call came to the Tavern from Chicago asking for Fritz Mulloy to get Mason and have him call a Melrose Park number which was furnished. Mulloy was not there when Lonnie called him and Lonnie called Mulloy's number, Mulloy was not there when Lonnie called him and Lonnie talked to Mrs. Mulloy. Lonnie gave Mrs. Mulloy the message for Millers known under the alias Masons.

Mulloy now states that Mrs. Mulloy called "Mason's" residence in Kansas City, but "Mason" was not there, but she did talk to "Mrs. Mason" and gave her the message. Thereafter Mulloy saw "Mason" and asked him if he got the Chicago call and "Mason" replied that he had.

Mulloy now states that prior to 6-16-33 other calls were received at the Tavern for "Mason" one of which he recalls was from Chicago, the caller asking for the telephone number of "Mason" and he furnished it. He now states that he does not recall the date nor does he recall who did the talking from Chicago on that occasion. It is very clear that Mulloy is seeking at this time to evade the effect of his former statement as clearly appears on page 17 of the report dated at Kansas City, 7-21-33. This is probably due to the fact that he is now aware of the arrest of Stacci in Chicago. The other individuals, mentioned by Mulloy, who may be in a position to clarify his present allegation will be interviewed and thoroughly questioned since Mrs. Mulloy would very probably be implicated if his statement, as now made, were true.

Subsequent to the above interview, a megro, named Lonnie Ross, mentioned by Mulloy, upon interview at the Kansas City office by Agents Turrou and Trainor, stated in affidavit form that no such telephone call as mentioned by Mulloy had come to the 85th Street Tavern where he was exclusively employed on 6-16-35. In support of his statement he furnished an affidavit which he swore to and same is quoted as follows:

STATE OF MISCURI )

JACKSON COUNTY )

Before me, a Notary Public, duly authorized by law to administer on the personally appeared this day the undersigned, Lounie Ross; who deposes and mays, as follows:

I reside at 2542 Woodland avenue, Ennes City, Missouri. I am engaged as a porter at the 85th Street Tavers which is now owned and operated by Walter Raine and Emil Mortis. I have been engaged in the capacity of porter at the above named establishment for the part three months. Before the time that I went to the 85th Street Tavers some three months ago I was employed by Frank B. Mulloy, otherwise known as Fritz Mulloy, and was under his employment, engaged as porter, at the Horse Shoe Club at 7701 State line Road, Kansas City, Missouri. I had been employed by Frank B. Mulloy for at least nine months continuously before I went to mark at the 85th Street Tavers as here mentioned.

My duties at the 85th Street Tavern included those of answering the telephone and writing on trade who called there for food and drink. My hours of employment each day at the 85th Street Tavern were from ten in the morning to nine in the evening. I was employed in that capacity at the 85th Street Tavern on June 17, 1933, and I definitely recall the date of June 17, 1933, by the fact that I read in the papers and heard through general reports by word of mouth on June 17, 1933, that several officers had been mardered in a massacre wherein machine guns were used in front of the Union Railroad Station, Kansas City, Missouri, on that date. I definitely recall that at least two weeks prior to the date of June 17, 1933, which I have fixed as above, there was a long distance telephone call made by sources unknown to me to the 85th Street Tavern.

In commetion with that talephone call I answered the telephone and the party talking on the other end of the line asked for Fritz Mulloy. I tald the party that Fritz Mulloy was not present. The party than tald me to get in touch with Fritz Mulloy and to tall Fritz Mulloy for him to get in touch with Mr. Killer and have Mr. Miller call a telephone number at Melrose Park. I did not know the name of the party calling nor did I know what telephone number Mr. Miller was to be instructed to be called. I do know, however, that the telephone call which I answered was a long distance call from Melrose Park. I do not know in what state Melrose Park is located, but the reason I know that it was a long distance call was that the telephone operator told me

it was long distance calling and asked whether or not tim telephone where I was located was Jackson 9702, which it was. I would say that the hour of day when this telephone call was received and answered by me was between 5:50 and 4:50 in the afternoon.

I will state further that immediately after receiving the call, mentioned above, I telephoned to the residence of Frank B. Mulloy at Kanmas City, Mimouri, and inquired for him, but was told by a woman, who said she was Mrs. Mulloy, who answered the telephone at Mulloy's residence, that he was not in. I, therefore, delivered to the party saying she was Mrs. Mulloy the message that Mr. Mulloy had been requested through me by a party calling long distance telephone to get in touch with Miller and to have Miller call Melrose Park. Mrs. Mulloy stated that she would get in touch with her husband, Frank B. Mulloy or Fritz as he is known, and would deliver the message to him. I definitely recall that the name Miller was used both by the party who called by long distance and conversed with me and by myself at the time that I conversed with Mrs. Mulloy by telephone. She did not ask me who was meant by Miller.

I further wish to state that I have seen in the newspaper at Ennans City.
Missouri, since June 17, 1935, a photograph bearing the name Vermon C. Miller and I now have shown to me a photograph of the same individual whom I identify as Vermon C. Miller. This individual appeared at the establishment known as the Horse Shoe Club at 77th and State Line Road, heretofore mentioned in this affidavit, on various occasions during the course of my employment; that as I have stated above, at all times to my knowledge while he appeared at the Horse Shoe Club he was called by his friends and associates by the name Miller as I have heard parties with him address him. At no time have I heard him addressed under any name other than Miller.

I am definitely certain and positive upon due reflection and consideration that on the day before June 17, 1935, or in other words the day before the shooting of the officers occurred at the Union Station Plans, Kansag City, Missouri, there was no long distance telephone call answered by me for Frank B. Malloy or Miller which came to the 65th Street Tavern where I was employed and I will state positively that the occurrence above mentioned wherein I telephoned Mrs. Mulloy pursuant to the long distance telephone call received and answered by me, did not occur on the day before the shooting occurred at the Union Station Plaza, Kansas City, Missouri.

In further connection with the denials made by Mulloy, as mentioned herein, interview was had by Special Agent L. G. Turrou with Captain Charles A. Beatty, Kansas City, Missouri, Police Department. He advised that about a year ago while he was in charge of the holdup equad he had a restaurant located at 51st and Main Streets, Kansas City, Missouri, kept under surveillance, this restaurant having been suspected of having been a rendezvous of Chicage hoodlums and bank robbers; that in the course of such surveillance he had on several occasions seen Fritz Mulloy and Louis (Doc) Stacci tog-there Captain Beatty stated that from his observation it appeared to him that Mulloy and Stacci were well acquainted with each othere

A newspaper photograph of Steeds was shown to Beatty and he readily identified same to be the person whom he frequently maw in the company of Mulloy.

I received Identification Order No. 1201, Richard Tallman Galatas with aliases as of August 1, 1933 in connection with the murder of Special Agent Raymond J. Caffrey et al on June 17. 1933 at Kansas City.

I have, within the last three or four days, made some discreet inquiries among my underworld contacts here. I find, of course, that Galatis is a native of this section, and is quite well known here. I am hopeful of securing his exact location within the next few days. Of course I don't know this but I believe it will happen.

If we could arrange a small reward, strictly conditioned on information leading to his apprehension, it might stimulate the activities somewhat. Of course you understand that this is merely a suggestion of mine, and I have not said a word about a reward to my informants.

Galatas has quite a few friends here and I doubt if it would be wise for us to communicate by telegraph or telephone about the matter. If I need to advise you by wire, I will say, "Order accepted as per advice of August seventh", and send it commercial rate to you personally. If I send you such a message I will have him or his "woman" located.

I am writing this personally in long hand because it must not leak. I have absolute confidence in my stenographers and yours, but I don't want to take any chances with it. If you write me about it, send in plain envelope stamped marked "Personal".

If I do, I will let you have it at once.

On July 20, 1955 Frank Walter Wesley was arrested at Bement, Ill., on larceny and burglary charges and was interviewed by Special Agent G. B. Morris in connection with a violation of the Intional Motor Vehicle Theft Act. William Goodman and Ernest Oglosby were also involved in this case. Goodman and shot and killed by State Officers at Bement on July 20, 1955, and Ernest Oglosby eccaped.

At the time of the interview with Wealey, he stated that Oglochy is well acquainted with Charles Arthur Floyd, and Oglochy teld Wealey that he saw Floyd and the Emprov brothers at Joplin, No., in the early part of June, 1985. Wealey is of the opinion that Oglochy is in a position to furnish someiderable information regarding the activities of Floyd, the Emprov brothers, and other hoodlane operating in Tunes, Oklohoms, and Emms.

Robert Burns, with clieses, who is being held in the City Jell at Springfield, Ill., in connection with a violation of the National Motor Tehicle Theft Act, was interviewed by Special Agent G. B. Morrie. at his request, and stated that in view of the fact that he is being held by the Federal Government for violation of the Mational Motor Tehicle Thost Act, he feels that he might help his case by furnishing information which may be of benefit to the Covernment. In this econcetion he stated : that he is acquainted with Harvey J. In Hoy, Wilbur Underhill, and a man named Batson, whom he claims to have met in the State Pricon at Lansing, Ranses. Robert Burns stated that he arrived in Ranses City, No., on 🔫 June 12, 1935, and remained there until June 26, 1925, when he came to St. Louis; that on the scraing of June 17, 1985 he was stending in front of the Plaza Hotel, which is near the Union Station in Manage City, Mo., and also the shooting that occurred in connection with the attempted delivery of Frank Hash; that immediately after the shooting he saw two cars driving away from the scene of the shooting, one going past the Plana Botel at a very high rate of speed, and the other going in the

epposite direction. He stated that while in Hancas City he can Bailey, Underhill, and Bateon; that he cannot remember whether it was before or after June 17, 1985; that he does not remember where he saw them in Expense City. From the reports of Agent Trainor dated July 28th and Agent Tracy dated August 5th, it is noted that 1931 Cadillac Town Sedan, V-12, Series \$370, Motor \$1000032, bearing 1933 Mer York lie-ense tags \$5-E-8966, figures in this investigation. It is also observed that this car is reported to be armor-plated. This car was in Hot Springs, Ark. in February, 1933, apparently in the possession of a group of New York City and Hewark, N. J. racketeers, among whom one claimed to be Louis Saffer. The car was also seen in Nemphis, Tenn. on or about June 8, 1933. It is believed that the Louis Saffer referred to above is identical with one Louis Buchalter mentioned in the report of Agent Tracy referred to, for the reason that not only were calls made to the Buchalter apartment in New York City, by the group in Hot Springs, Ark., but just a few days ago, Louis Buchalter and his wife checked into the Hotel Pierre, New York City, under the name Mr. and Mrs. Louis Saffer.

Reference is made to telegram deted August 17th to this office in connection with the matter in which Vernon G. Miller with cliesce, I.O. 1195, Fagitive, et al. is involved.

Inquiry at Hewark, M.J. has disclosed that the eddress 234 North Broad Street is an apartment house operated by que Mrs. Thomas. It is located in the cheap section of Hewark and the apartments and respect rented are furnished.

Mrs. Thomas advised that apartment 110 is occupied Mr. and Mrs. Barry DuClause and that they moved into the apartment about one month ago. She said that the family consists of the father, mother, and a girl agod tan; that DuClause is supposed to be employed by some trucking firm in Paterson, N.J. However, she does not know this of her own knowledge, this being what he said; that DuClause does not work on a full time basis and is having a difficult time making both ( ends meet; that the trucking firm for which he works, the name of which she does not know, apparently does an out of town business as on some occasions DuClause is out of town three or four days and whenever be goes out of town he takes his wife and child to Jersey City, M.J. where the latter two stay with an aunt of Mrs. DuClause; that is, Mrs. DuClause has stated that she has an aunt in Jersey City with whom she stays on 🚟 occasions when her husband goes out of town. She said that they are very quiet persons and are in indigent elecumetances and have a hard time paying their rent, Duclause paying two ar three dollars whenever he can; furthermore, that the entire family has a starved appearance and buy very little food and then in meagre quantities. The stated that she felt quite certain the Duflauses were without money and was under the belief that agent was making an investigation to determine whether 🚟 they should have finencial assistance from the municipality. She walk that Hr. DuClause owns a car, which is an old remaheckle affair and ghas Indiana plates. The car was not parked outside the apartment at the time of the investigation. However, the license number will be

obtained. She said that although the ear goes it is prectically worthless. Mrs. Thomas mentioned something about the possibility of their being from Chicago, implying that they receive mail from there, although she would not examit herself on the point as to the places from which they receive mail. She also said that from what she was able to gather, the DuGlauses formerly lived in Jersey City.

She described Harry DuClause as being 35 years of age, 5'5-1/2", weight 140, dark eyes, dark hair, soft spoken, this face, stooped shoulders, emeriated appearance; Mrs. BuClause as being 30 years of age, medium height and build, dark hair, eyes and somplexion.

At the post office, Newark, N.J. it was learned that Carrier Cessidy covers this route. However, it will be impossible to see him until August 21st. While at the post office, two letters were located, addressed to the DuClauses. Each was postmarked LaSalle, 111., 9 P.F., August 16th and each apparently was addressed by the same person. Tracings were secured and are attached hereto.

This phase of the case is being further investigated. However, in the meentime, it is suggested that you advise this office as to the names of the persons in your district receiving mail from the Duclauses and whether a cover on the mail of the Duclauses is deemed advisable. The Duclauses have no visitors, eccording to Mrs. Thomas.

I have just received from Special Agent Butterworth at Hot Springs the following memorendum:

Mr. R. J. Deaby, postmaster at Hot Springe, Arkaness edviced Agent that Mr. William Seiz, Jr., 130 liberty St., Hot Springs, Ark. was the man who proposed Richard T. Galetas for Kumbership in the Hot Springs Masonic Lodge No. 62 and that Mr. Seiz may be able to furnish valuable information soncerning Galetas.

Mr. Demby stated that Mr. William Seiz informed Mr. Demby that A. J. Conner, Jimmie, was the brother of Eddie Conner, a racketeer, who was killed in New Jersey last year and that Mrs. Nash was the former wife of Eddie Conner. Mr. Demby said that A. J. Conner, known as Jimmie, was living in the house when Mash was apprehended and left Hot Springs, Ark. the same day that Mrs. Mash took the Air plane to Joplin, Mo.

Mr. Denby believes that A. J. Conner was the man who accompanied Mrs. Wash to Joplin, Mo. by Air plane, after Mash was taken into custody at Not Springs, Ark.

He said that Levis Bladsoe, substitute mail servier in the Hot Springs
Post Office delivered special delivery letters daily to Mrs. Mash at 1101 Central Avenue, Hot Springs, Ark. from the latter part of May to June 16, 1933 and that these letters were addressed to Mrs. Louise
Conner, 1101 Central Avenue, Hot Springs, Arkansas. Mr. Bladsoe delivered some of the letters to Mrs. Conner and some of them to A. J. Conner.
These letters all come from the same address, Del Prado Hotel, Hyde Park -Boulevard at 53rd St., Chicago, Ill. He said that on Angust 5, 1933 the Sentinel-Record, a newspaper published in Hot Springs, Ark. had the pictures of Krs. Herb Farmer and Krs. Frances Nash.

Mr. Blodnos on seeing these pictures reported to Mr. Denby that the picture of Mrs. Merb Farmer resembled the summa to whom Mr. Eledeos delivered the special delivery letters and that the picture of Mrs. Heah did not look like the special delivery letters.

Agent secured a copy of the Sentinel-Record for August 8, 1935 which is attached to this memorandum.

Mr. Dumby stated that when Mrs. Mash moved to 1101 Central Avenue, Not Springs, Ark. she left an order at the Post Office requesting that zone of her mail be given to any one without a written order from her and signed the order Mrs. Louise Cenner.

The above memorandum is quite mixed up, as according to my understanding Mrs. Hash never lived at 1101 Central Avenue, Not Springs, but this was the apartment occupied by Louise Conner and I think the letters delivered there were not for Mrs. Hash but were for Mrs. Conner.

The memorandum is further in error in that it states that A. J. Conner was believed to be the man who accompanied Mrs. Heath to Joplin by eirplane. He know, of course, that the man who accompanied her was Galatas.

The attention of the Chicago Office is called to the address Del Irado Hotel, Hyde Fark Boulevard at 53rd Street, Chicago, Illinois, indicating that someone there was corresponding with Mrs. Louise Conner. No doubt the Chicago Office will make appropriate investigation at that point if it has not already been done.

I think the memorandum is further in error in that it states that Mrs. Nash was the former wife of Eddie Conner. The truth is that Louise Conner is the former wife of Eddie Conner and that A. J. Conner is the brother of the slain Eddie Conner.

This information is submitted for such value as it may have.

Mrs. Frank Resh was recently questioned by agents of the Enaces City Office concerning friends, associates, and acquainteness of Frank Hash and Vernon Miller. The stated that while is St. Paul on one occasion she was at a salcon or blub of some kind, the same and address of which she does not know, and that she met a woman known only as prother, who had two soms, whose names are Freddy and Doe.

Mrs. Hash identified the photograph of Freddy Barker as the Freddy mentioned above. We photograph of Doc Barker, brother of Fred Barker, was available but there is no doubt but that the Loc in question is Doc Barker, and that the woman in question known as "mother" is Kate Barker, who trayels constantly with her two cons, and with them very likely is alvin Karpis and Harry Carlton, alies Larry O'Koefe,

Alvin Karpis, alias George Haller, Register \$6008, Eansas State Penitentiary, and Freddy Barker, Register \$9836, Kansas State Penitentiary, are both wanted for the marder of Sheriff Kelly at Fest Plains, Missouri, in December, 1931, Harry Carlton, Chiengo Police \$60-16239 is wanted at Kirkeville, Missouri, for the marder, first degree, of Police Officer John Rose on the morning of November 17, 1930. The aforementioned three men are known bank robbers and marderers and known associates of the Kenting, Holden, Eash, Railey, Phillips and Miller gang. During the Kenting and Holden investigation these three men were positively identified with the gang.

Mrs. Nash said that later she saw Fred Parker and his mother around Louis's Place, which is located at Cary, lilinois; that on one occasion while at Louis's Place there was another woman known as Helen with Mrs. Barker and that she assisted these two woman in obtaining apartments at the Home Apartment Pailding in oak Park, Illinois, where they both lived for some time, This, she believes, was in the late Winter or early Spring of 1923. She stated, however, that she believes these two women vacated the apartments in the Home Apartment Building and soved to a more desirable apartment building in the Same locality, she does not know under what names they lived but she is of the opinion that one of them used the same of Ferguson.



Dear Sir:-

Reference is made to the telephone call from Mr. Vincent Hughes of the Bureau yesterday afterno m, at which time he advised me that a telegram had been received from Mr. Frank J. Loesch, with the request that I call on him.

I called on Mr. Loesch at his office at 1540 Otis Building, 10 S. LaSalle Street, and he stated that he had noticed in the newspapers of the apprehension of Lewis (Doc)oStacey, in connection with the Kansas City shooting, and he felt that he had some very valuable information concerning the background and history of this individual.

He called in Mr. W. Comfort Hawkins, whose address is 323 N. Central Avenue, Chicago, and he informed me.Mr. Hawkins had previously worked for him on many occasions, and that Hawkins had on many occasions predicted the occurence of shootings or other gangster activities as far as five days ahead of the actual happening. He stated, further, that he had received very valuable information from Hawkins, and suggested that I talk with him.

He then introduced me to Mr. Hawkins, with whom I talked at some length. It appears that during the War, he was employed by George Creel of the Creel Commission on Public Information. This was a committee operating under the United States Government. Hawkins informed me that he was made Acting Director of Mexican and South American Affairs, in connection with this committee. He speaks Spanish fluently.

In 1919, until 1929, he worked for Lewis E. Schwartz, General Counsel on Producti m of the Paramount Publix Film Corporation. According to Mr. Hawkins, Schwartz is now in Hollywood, and can be reached there in the event it becomes necessary to do so.

The information in the possession of this individual appeared to be very detailed, and in view of this fact, he dictated same to a stenographer in Mr. Loesch's office. I am enclosing herewith a copy of this memorandum dictated by him, which gives somewhat of a history of DocoStacey, along with other matters. There were many items mentioned in this memorandum, which Mr. Hawkins stated would be completed later. I am endeavoring to have all of these matters shecked, wherever it is possible.

On the last page of this memorandum his statement with regard to the machine gun which was probably used in the Kansas City shooting, should be noted. He stated that this gun at the present time, is buried, but he knows the person in Chicago who has built a secret enclosure in the house where this gun will be stored when it is brought back. He has no information at the present time as to when the gun will be brought back, but as soon as he finds out, he will inform me.

I have communicated with the Kansas City Office, and have requested that the bullets used in the Kansas City shooting be forwarded to me for the purpose of identification by the Chicago Police Department Balllistics expert.

Mr. Hawkins stated he obtains all of his information from an informant of his, who is at the present time directly connected with the Syndicate (the Capone Syndicate). He stated that he had known this person for many years, and that his informant had been present at many shootings in Chicago, but had not taken part in them. He added that his informant, in giving this information to him, is motivated by a desire to aid, if possible, in stopping the many murders and like crimes in Chicago.

Hawkins indicated to me that he had a tentative plan whereby three wealthy citizens of Chicago would possibly furnish the finances for him and his informant to work fof a period of about three months, and that his plan was to gain information and turn it over to one of the attorneys for these individuals who furnish the money, who would be somewhat of a Chairman of the Committee, and who, in turn, would furnish me with any information in which he believe I might be interested, and to turn over to the State's attorney's office such information as they believed would be of interest to him. It is my opinion that we are the best judges of the type of information in which we would be interested, and that it would be far better for this individual to give his entire information to us, directly. I therefore informed him that if he secured any information, that I would be desirous of obtaining it, personally.

Hawkins and his informant have previously been employed, as stated above, by Mr. Loesch at\$10.00 per day, in addition to \$10.00 per week for room rent. Incident expenses incurred by these two individuals have been paid by Mr. Loesch. The above price does not include transportation and hotels, and subsistence in the event it is necessary for these persons to leave the city. Mr. Hawkins stated that he believed he could develop a great deal of information for this office, and would do so sincerely if the Government decided to request him to do so. He stated that he believed all of the work necessary for him to do, could be performed in Cook County, in which event no transportation expense would be involved.

Mr. Hawkins stated that he was not requesting the Government to give him a position, but that he felt that as a patriotic citizen, it was his duty to furnish all information which comes to his attention. He stated that he felt if he were working for reimbursement, he could spend more time on this. He added, however, that he would probably turn over all the information coming into his possession regardless of whether he is employed.

I talked to Mr. Lossch privately again, after I had talked with Hawkins, and Mr. Lossch stated that he had faith in Hawkins, in view of the fact that he had produced valuable information for him in the past, and believed it would be advisable to employ him. Of course, it is obvious that a great deal of the information received from an informant of this type could not be used, or could not be obtained in proof form. Mr. Lossch suggested, however, that it might be termed "background" information, which might be used by investigators to connect up various missing links in cases, as well as connecting the chain of evidence.

Of course, as you know, this man Hawkins has never given me any information previously, and I have never heard of him before. It might be desirable to try Hawkins and his informant out for a while to determine what results can be gained thereby, and I will appreciate your advising me as to your opinion in this regard.

# PAST RECORD OF LOUIS (DOC) STACEY

Stacey made his first appearance eround the old Chicago Red Light District when he was about seventeen or eighteen years of age. He started in as a P and has been known as one ever since. He worked for, and was identified with three very notorious houses in the old District, namely Dago Frank Lewis, Charlie Maybeum and Maurice Van Buren.

The old District was closed between 1913 and 1914 and Stacey went back to his home town, Melrose Park where he made his headquarters, but lived in Aurora most of the time. In Aurora he ected as P for the landledy for a H. of P. known as Edna. Her son who wise took the name of Elmer Stacey is now with "Doc" at the O. P. Inn. Elmer Stacey, who is like his father is a notorious P but has been in a great many deals with "Doc". He makes his hang-out at the O. P. Inn. Doc Stacey also has a brother by the name of "Slug" Stacey, quite a notorious character who works at the O. P. Inn. If the three Staceys were kept apart, properly questioned, considerable might be learned as their stories would very soon differe

### 1919.

When prohibition went into effect the first of July, 1919, Steep took \$500.00 that he had saved, bought liquor and started bootlegging in Aurora. He kept this up until 1921 increasing his business and making considerable money. During 1921 he returned to Melrose Park and formed a liquor syndicate with Roy, Delano and George Corazo (not the Union man). Their territory was part of Cook County and Kane County and they soon controlled the alki liquor and beer business in the above mentioned territory.

Stacey who controlled this syndicate continued the same until late in 1925 or early in 1926 at which time A; Capone had taken over the syndicate in Chicago. Capone soon found that this was a lucrative territory, sent his man out, and told Stacey that he was going to take over the territory but was willing to put Stacey in as aforementioned manager on a 10% out. Stacey was wise enough to give the territory up. This was the start of his downfall. His money soon went as he was a big spender. He did not take an interest in the business and the territory soon dwindled down to nothing. Early in 1928 Stacey was let out and Frank Rich was sent down to organise the territory.

Steep still received favors from the syndicate as he had stepped out gracefully and was always willing to do enything that he could for them. Shortly after this, Steep shot a man im Melrose Park and the same was squared under the Bob Crowe regime.

The syndicate then used Stacey on and off for small jobs. He was the man that engineered the first kidnepping case of Passarello, Chief of Police of Melrose Park. Passarello disappeared for two weeks and then came back stating that he had been on a fishing trip. The second time he was kidnapped he never came back and is now in a stone quarry.

During 1929 Doc Stacey threatened a Melrose Park banker by the name of Goss. Goss was connected with the Citizens Savings Bank of Melrose Park. He has a brother who at the present time is a banker in Elgin.

This bank had some trouble. They had a number of Italian Depositors and in some way the Italian Depositors were fleeced. Just what the trouble is, I don't know, but Stacey's threat was strong enough to make Goss leave Melrose Park.

#### 1930.

In 1930 Stacey opened a H of P known as the White House located in Cook County but near Elgin. He ran this place for about six months but had a very tough around of Italians there. A number of fights took place and a number of Elgin boys were badly beaten up. One Elgin boy in particular of a prominent family was so badly beaten up that his father went to Carburry, the State's Attorney and made a complaint. As the White House was located in Cook County, Carburry could do nothing, but sent the complaint to Swanson. This complaint was forwarded direct to Capone and Capone had the highway police close this joint. After this, Stacey tried to open another house, but Capone had it closed.

Stacey has been interested in the O. P. Inn
I think since about 1926, 1927 or 1928. He started with a partner
but now has it himself. This place has always been frequented by
and a hang out of some of the most notorious gangsters of this
part of the country. If wanted, I can furnish a list of twenty
to thirty big shots who have hung out there. They made a practice
of having messages left there, receiving telephone calls there
and a great many jobs have been planned at the O. P. Inn.
Charlie Cleaver, notorious mail robber was hid out there for some
time.

Note: (Chauncey Reid State's Attorney of Du Page County. You can depend upon him. I think if he wants to, he can help you a lot). Stacey was also used by the syndicate to burn several competitive H of P's in this District. I cen't just give you the location of these, but if necessary later on that can be pointed out. He also burnt several speakessies that were competitors.

"Dog" Stacey is the man who put the stick of dynamite in Pat Roche's car. Luckily Roche left the car in the garage that day to have some work done on it and the mechanic discovered the dynamite before any damage was done.

The next thing that Stacey was mixed up in was an automobile accident which happened about two A. M. July 4, 1932. That night, after a telephone call, "Doc" Stacey, Tony Bagno and Rocky DeGracia left the C. P. Inn about 1:45 in a big Cadillac with a machine gum. Stacey was driving. They were on the way to Elgin but near a place known as Owensville, they struck a small car and everturned. Stacey's nose was broken; Bagno's leg was broken, and DeGracia was badly hurt. The machine gum was planted in the filed about 20 feet from the road but one of the loaded drums was left in the car. Stacey left DeGracia and Bagno, started back towards Melrose Park, later sticking up a man in a car whom he forced to take him to Melrose Park. Later the highway police found DeGracia and Bagno. They then found the drum for the machine gum and a farmer boy who was there found the machine gum. I can give the names of these two also later on; the highway police. After considerable time the machine gum was returned (After the money was paid).

## KANSAS CITY MASSACRE

At 2:45 P. M., the afternoon before the Kansas City Messacre, Tony DeGracia (a fugitive from justice on a charge of murder in Melrose Park when he shot a man down one Sunday morning) and two other men, one named Curly left Chicago in a big Cadillac. They had one machine gum, two shot guns and supposedly revolvers. He kidnapping or shooting took place in or around Chicago during that twenty-four hours. Tony DeGracia is and has always been a great friend of Doc Stacey. He is a counsin of Stacey's. There is nothing to show that this machine gun was used in Kansas City. However, shortly after being returned same was buried and is still buried. I will know when this machine gun is brought out. Leter on I will be able to tell you who owns this machine gun and who gave orders to have it released here.

I am attaching hereto a copy of a report prepared by Special Agent W. F. Trainor, of the Kanass City effice of the Division, under date of August 14, constituting a resume of the facts concerning the implication of Harvey J. Bailey with the machine gun attack upon, and murder of, Special Agent R. J. Caffrey, of this Division, and three police officers at Kansas City on June 17, 1933. I directed that this report be prepared in order that the Department would be furnished with the evidence available to bring about the prosecution of Harvey J. Bailey, who was recently captured by Agents of this Division in morth Texas in connection with the Urschel kidnaping case, for these murders at Kansas City.

representative of the Department should be assigned to cooperate with the authorities of the State of Missouri. You can be assured, of course, that every facility of this Division will be at the service of such a representative and, of course, the service of the State of Missouri is connection with this presentation.

Bailey, as you know, is now held at Ballas, Texas, having been apprehended in a house south of Paradise, Texas, which had been used as the place of confinement of Charles F. Brachel, of Oklahoma City, who had been kidnaped. It will be necessary to extradite Bailey from the State of Texas to the State of Missouri and there may be serious difficulties encountered in connection with his transportation between these states. Also i think that the state authorities would welcome the assistants of representatives of this Department in the trial of Bailey on a charge of murder. In view of the fact that the Special Agent of this Division and the police efficers who were killed were engaged in transporting a Federal prisoner to the penitentiary at leaven worth it would seem that the Federal Government would be fully justified in assisting the state in every possible way in the presecution of Bailey and of such others of the members of the gang who committed this comardly deed, when apprehended.

The outline of syldence as mentioned herein will be further checked for more concrete facts. This report deals only with the evidence available against Harvey J. Missouri, on 8-15-35, At the present time no definite details as to the place of incorceration of Bailey in the Dallas territory are evaluable at Kansas City. It is expected they will be forthcoming soon in the form of a report from Dallass

From the various sources of information, including the six sections of the file of Francis L. Kenting, Fugitive, Escaped Federal Prisoner, I.O. 1189, et al, the following information concerning Bailey's personal history and connections has been secured.

Harvey J. Briley, the son of Amanda Beiley, was reared on a farm in the clay hills of Sullivan County, Missouri, near Green City; his mother and his sister, named Mrs. Lucretia E. Cum, still reside near Green City. His criminal activities clearly began as early as the year 1980, but he was able through good for tune to evade detection as a gangster, gunman and racketner until approximately the year 1950. He is believed to have been implicated in bank robberies prior to 1930 and to have been a member of a Chicago syndicate of bootleggers and racketeers prior to that time. On , 5-1-50 he arrived at Twin lokes, Wisconsin, under the alies T. Is Brennan, with his wife, Mattie (Martin) Bailey, and 17 year old son, and purchased) two farms of 160 acres each, adjoining each other, in Kenosha County, 2003 Wisconsin, and Lake County, Illinois. Frr Bailey, his brother, and Hadley P. Mortin and Fred M. Martin, brothers-ip-law, arrived at Twin Lakes, Visconsin, from Green City, Missouri, in April, 1951, and paid off the indebteduess on these forms. Shortly thereafter Bailey's children, Mildred B., Raiston Goodloe and William Wesley Bailey arrived from Green Citye . These relatives are now operating the farms near Twin Lakes, Visconsin, and the field of activity of Balley has continued as an outlawe Evidently the relatives paid for the farms from look collected by Bailey from his meny bank robberies. The known offenses in which Balley has figured as evallable to this office are, as follows: A COLUMN

In 1923 his photograph was identified as the driver of a car used in the probery of the Federal Reserve Bank at Denver, Colorado, known as the mint robbery which occurred in February, 1925. Details of this offense are not available here, but may be secured through the Pinkerton Mational Detective Agency at Chicago, Illinois. Bailey's photograph was identified as a participant in the robbery of the Lincoln Mational Bank, Lincoln, Webraska, which occurred 9-17-51 and at which time a sum of \$2,000,000.00 was stolen which property consisted in part of bonds, securities, etc. The details of this offense are likewise not now available at the Kansas City office.

Bailey is suspected in the holdup of the imerican Bailway Express Company at Toledo, Ohio, in which a police officer was killed, same having occurred on 9-22-50. This is mentioned in the case entitled Fred Burks, with aliases; Joseph C. Baker, with aliases; Harry Leo Davis, with aliases. Theft from Interstate Shipment, Mational Motor Vehicle Theft Act, wherein Detroit, Michigan, is the office of origin. The Kansas City file is not complete in reference to that offense, except as to the apprehension of Burke, who was arrested on 5-25-51 by the St. Joseph, Missouri, Police at the home of Barney Porter, near Green City, Missouri, to which place at the home of Barney Porter, near Green City, Missouri, to which place at the home of Barney Forter, near Green City, Missouri, to which place at the home of Barney Forter, near Green City, Missouri, to which place at Toledo, Ohio, Bailey's photograph was not identified, but because of his close friendship with Fred Burke it is believed that Bailey had a connection in the offense. Some of the stolen property was found at Burke's house after the offense was committed.

Bailey is suspected as a participant in the robbery of the Kraft State
Bank at Menomonie, Wisconsin, 10-21-51. In this connection it is known
that in 1931 Bailey and Frank Sebber lived together and rented rooms from
L. P. Larson at 4041 25rd Avenue South, Minneapolis. Webber, while
engaged in the robbery of the Kraft State Bank was shot and killed on
10-21-51.

On 6-17-32 the Citizens Mational Bank at Fort Scott, Tanens, was robbed of \$32,000.00 by approximately eight gumben, who participated. There is evidence, through a party named Connor at Fort Scott, Kaness, that Francis Reating and Thomas (Holder, who are mentioned hereafter in this reports were at Fort Scott on that days. Full details of that offense have never been investigated by this office and are unknown to the Kansas City office, but the evidence as to Keating's and Holden's presence at Fort Scott on that day were secured telephonically from Sheriff Harry Hyle from Fort Scott and same will be further checked. Bailey was identified as a participant in that bank pobbery which occurred at Fort Scott and was convicted and sentenced to serve 10 to 50 years in the Kansas State Penitentiary, Lansing, Kansas, for that offense in August, 1932, after his arrest at Kansas City, Missouri, with Francis L. Reating and Thomas Holden, who were apprehended as Escaped Federal Prisoners in July, 1938, 🔀 through the efforts of Agents of this Division, including Special Agent. Raymond J. Caffrey, deceased. On 7-7-32 Francis L. Keating and Thomas 🦠 Holden were arrested on the Old Mission Golf Course, Kansas City, Missouri, these parties had escaped from the U. S. Penitentiary, Leavenworth, Kansas, on 2-28-30, after having served a short part of a 25 year sentence for mail robbery. With K-ating and Holden at the time of their apprehension was found Subject Bailey engaged in playing golf with these parties. It was

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found through investigation that Bailey, Reating and Holden, together with others, who were never identified, had frequented the Old Mission Golf Course periodically for several weeks, always playing together in a closed group. William Witherspoon and Fred McCool, attendants at the Old Mission Golf Course, furnished this information and can testify as to same.

Charles Costello, Police Detective, Kansas City, Kansas; Captain Higgins, now Chief of Police Detectives, Kansas City, Missouri; Prime McDonough, Police Detective, Kansas Sity, Missouri, and Special Agent R, S. Mathan of the Division of Investigation, U. S. Department of Justice, Washington, D. C., can testify to the apprehension of Bailey, Kesting and Holden together, as above mentioned.

The deceased prisoner, Frank Hash, is believed to have been an intimate friend of Harvey Bailey. While this is a moral certainty the question will require considerable investigation to reveal concrete facts. From the foregoing will be seen the criminal activities of Bailey with the various gangsters. Hash, Keating and Holden were known friends. These latter three were convicted of similar offenses and served in the U. Sa Penitentiary at Leavenworth, Kansas, togethers. These three were known to be confederates while escaped from the U. S. Penitentiary, Leavenworth, Kansas, after 2-28-30. Mash escaped 10-19-30 and Kasting and Holden on 2-28-30. It can be established at this time that Bailey was a close friend of Holden, as evidenced by the fact that he played golf with him, Bailey, at Kansas City and was found in his company when arrested. Further it may be stated Bailey admitted close association with Keating and Holden to the officers who arrested him. Holden was found upon investigation to be a close associate of Vermon C. Millar, one of the principal subjects in this case.

The report of Special Agent S. W. Hardy, referred to above, shows that Holden, under the alias William McCormick, maintained phone Elkhurst 5660, St. Paul, Minnesota, at 616 Summit Avenue, Apartment 102, for a period from 9-1-30 to 8-7-51. During that time, as shown in the report of Agent Hardy, phone calls were made to Brainerd, Minnesota, phone 59-2-18, under dates of 8-11-31, 2-12-31, 2-22-31, 7-20-51, 8-5-51, 8-1-51. This telephone is known to be that of John Gibson, the father of Vivian Mathis, who is the paramour of Varnon C. Miller. Holden's phone also shows telephone calls to Kansas City, Missouri, phone number Westport 5698, on 4-20-51, W. Miller (evidently Vernon C. Miller) being the party called.

It is evident that Miller and Mash were close friends which would therefore indirectly link Mash and Balley, through Holden, together in the same group. Mrs. Frances Mash, a witness in the instant matter, will testify as seen from the report of Agent Trainor, dated 8-11-35, that Mash and Miller were very close friends and associated together. The report of Agent Trainor, dated in this matter 7-28-35, indicates that Miller handled the funds of Frank Mash and through Miller a telegraphic money order, in the amount of \$500,000, was sent on 5-15-35, to Mash at Hot Springs, Arkansas, as there noted.

The above facts are outlined to show by inference and sireumstances that Hash and Bailey were friends and members of the same underworld gang and that Bailey would have a motive in his participation in the instant massecree. It will be later shown that there are eye witnesses to Bailey's participation in the actual slaying of the officers to release Mash. On 5-30-33 Bailey led a daring prison delivery at the Kansas State Penitentiary, Lansing, Kansas, where he was confined, machine guns and pistols having been used by the escapes. At that time there escaped with Bailey - Subject Wilber Underhill, Subject Robert Brady, Jim Clark, Ed Davis and others. Those in addition to the prisoners mentioned here who escaped have either been killed or apprehended. Warden Kirk Prether of the Kansas State State Penitentiary was kidnapped by the escapes, who proceeded with him in a stolen as amount of the Spavinaw Hills in Oklahoms where Prather was released. Mothing further was heard of the location of Bailey, Brady and Underhill until 6-17-53.

Frank Mash was apprehended as an Escaped Federal Prisoner at Hot Springs, Arkensas, and brought to Kansas City, Missouri, where the officers arrived about 7 A.M., 6-17-55. This is outlined in detail in the reference report from the Kansas City office, Cated 7-29-53, wherein will also be found the evidence of conviction and escape from Federal custody of Frank Mash.

Incidentally it may be noted that Wilber Underhill and Robert Bridy have been identified by witnesses, shown in the reference report of Y-29-55, as having participated in the actual slayings in this case. This is mentioned due to their close association, as known, with Bailey. The latter would probably be present with them and their participation strengthens the evidence that Bailey also participated.

Semuel Link, 8321 Mersington, Kansas City, Missouri, furnished a statement identifying Belley as a participant in the actual slaying of the officers:

In substance, Mr. Link stated that about 7:15 a.m., June 17, 1935. he was proceeding north toward the business district of Kansas City, Missouri, and when he neared the Union Railroad Station, he turned on to Pershing Road, proceeding west to Main Street, then turned to his left; which would again be weet and direct towards the street; which is nearest to the front entrance of the Union Station. At a point at the east end of the Union Station Plaza, he drew mear to a green Rec Sedan, 1932 model, bearing a fereign license plate, which he did not recognize. The Rec was proceeding west directly beside him at the point where traffic buttons are located. As the car drew alongside of Mr. Link, he heard "t voice say: "Duck; you(obscend ); profenity), duck!" He looked up and saw a man coming out of the laft rear door of the Reo Seden and recognized him as Subject HARVEY BAIL-EY. Then Beiley emerged from the rear seat of the car Mr. Link noticed he had a machine gun in his hand. Link then drew his car to the curb, which would be directly in front of the Union Station at 🏁 the east end. The Rec Sedan then proceeded five or six feet west in the direction of the two entrances of the Union Station, and then came to a dead stop. Mr. Link recognized as the driver of the car. Wilber Underhill, one of the recent escapes from the State Penitertiery at Lansing, Kansas. After Mr. Link parked his car at the curb and the Reo car had come to a stop, approximately one minute? elapsed when Mr. Link observed the officers with the prisoner walking from the entrance of the Union Station toward the parking some. At this time. Link observed a man, standing approximately half way. between the two main entrances of the Union Station, lift his hands high in the air as though to give a signal. At that moment, the Reo car commenced going west, and at that moment Mr. Link observed. a black Chevrolet Sedan coming from the west toward the east in his direction.

As the officers and the man approached Agent Caffrey's car. Mr. Link observed the Chevrolet Sedan, mentioned above, come to a stop approximately in front of the officers and the prisoner. At this moment, Mr. Link noticed a man emerge from the rear door of the Chevrolet Sedan having a large gun in his hand. The only man Mr. Link saw in the Chevrolet car was the driver. Mr. Link then observed Beiley lift

his gun to his shoulder, and saw the man who had emberged from the Chevrolet Sedan lift his gun. At that moment Link ducked down in his car and did not see anymore of the firing, though he heard the several shots. Then he heard the motor of a car and straightened up for a moment and saw the Chevrolet going in an easterly direction. He also observed the Reo Sedan moving forward in a westerly direction, and observed the man who had stood between the two main entrances of the Union Stetion, and who had given the signal, run over to get in the Reo Sedan.

Mrs. Margeret Turner, Clathe, Kansas, also furnished a written statement, which indicates that Bailey participated in the actual slaying in this case:

Mrs. Turner stated that on the early morning of June 17th, she and one Walter Berry drove from Olathe, Kansas, in order that she might meet the 5:30 a.m. train, on which a relative was arriving.

Upon arrival at Kansas City at 2:30 a.m., Berry parked the car in the plaza section in front of the Union Station facing south, and she went in to inquire as to when the train would be in from Mexico, Missouri, and was advised that it would arrive at 7:30 a.m. She then returned to her automobile and talked to Berry. During the conversation, he remarked that he did not know whether he was able to park in the place in which he was then located, so they circled around the concourse and faced their car north, looking directly at the Union Station. About the time they got into this position, which was somewhere about 3 a.m., a Rec automobile drove up and occupied their former parking place so that they were facing them directly and were only 10 or 15 feet away.

Mrs. Turner stated also that about 3 a.m., a black Chevrolet Sedan drove up near the Rec and the parties exchanged recognition. A woman got out of the Chevrolet and went to the depot. Mrs. Turner could recognize this woman if she saw her, and stated that she was of medium height, young, nicely dressed in a white dress that flared out at the bottom, a black coat and white turban hat. When

this woman entered the depot, she remained about ten minutes, and during this time, the black Chevrolet Sedan circled the plane about three times. When the woman came out of the station, she looked to her right and then to her left and proceeded to the left, which is toward the east. Upon reaching what Mrs. Turner described as "a window that looks like a door" at the Union Station, the woman raised her hand, and(at that time the Chevrolet car was parked right in back of Mrs. Turner's car) the driver honked three times, proceeding over to the station pletform and picked up this woman and disappeared. The woman was not seen after that.

Mrs. Turner stated that about fifteen minutes after every hour while she remained at the station, the Chevrolet car returned to the plaza and circled same, and the two men in the Chevrolet exchanged short recognition with two men in the Rec.

Mrs. Turner stated that she got a very good look at two of the men in the Reo and identified them as Harvey Bailey and Wilber Underhill, heretofore mentioned. She stated that Bailey got out of the Reo car and walked over to the depot on one or two occasions.

Mrs. Turner stated that about 7:30 a.m., she entered the station, and that about that time a shot entered the Union Station through the window, and the next she knew, there was a spray of bullets coming from the direction of the automobiles parked across the street. She immediately lay down on the floor and did not see the shooting.

Charles Constitution

Mr. J. D. Jemeson, 3427 Cypress, Kansas City, Missouri, will testify that early on the morning of June 17th a man, whom he identifies from photographs as Marvey Bailey, accosted him while he, Jameson, was on duty at the Union Station as a Red Cap, and inquired about the time of arrival of Missouri Pacific Train 116 from Little Rock, Arkansas. He will state that this individual told him that some of his friends wanted to go down to the station platform in order to take an invalid who would arrive on this train, but Jameson told him he would have to get permission from the Station Master.

At the residence occupied by Vernon C. Miller at 6612 Edgevals Road, Kansas Citye Missouri, was found a slip of paper bearing the following addressed:

Mrs. B's address, 422 Morth B Street, Wellington, Kansas Fred Martin, Route 1, Richmond, Illinois Mrs. Brown, Twin Lakes, Wisconsin

This list of addresses was found by a boy named Wallace Eugene Williams, who resides at 6643 Edgevale Road, shortly after Miller moved out of the house at 6612 Edgevale Road, about 6-23-33. The parties whose names and addresses are shown here are unmistakeably relatives of Harvey J. Bailey. Bailey has used the alias Brown. His home is at Twin Lakes, Wisconsin, where his wife resides. Fred Martin is a brother-in-law of Harvey Bailey and receives his mail through the Post Office at Richmond, Illinois, One of the farms of Harvey Bailey is near Richmond, Illinois. This is mentioned heretofore in this report.

Merle A. Gill, Ballistician at Kansas City, Missouri, and an expert in that profession, examined the cartridge shells found at the scene of the slayings at the Union Station, Kansas City, Missouri, shortly after that occurred on 6-17-35. He also examined the leaden slugs which were taken from the bodies of the deceased officers and rendered the following reports

This letter-report pertains to the examinations of ballistic exhibits involved in the Plaza Slayings of June 17th; this report has been delayed in order that the results of certain gun examinations could be included.

The photographs you have illustrate evidence bullets and cartridge cases, found at the scene of the crime and removed from the bodies of the victims. The photographs are numbered and lettered as follows: Cartridge cases: I to 8. Bullets: A to R. A set of these photographs has been furnished Chief of Detectives Higgins, and Br. Souder of your bureau of Standards.

Miscroscope examinations indicate that two Thompson Sub-machine guns, a .45 Colt Automatic Pistol, and another weapon using steel ball bearings, was used in the slayings. It is quite apparent that your agent Caffrey was killed with a Ball bearing, while lackey was shot with a Thompson gun. Reid, Grooms and Mash were that with a Thompson gun, while it is apparent that Hermanson was shot with a buck-shot gun. My conclusions are based upon careful microscope examinations of the exhibits now in my keeping. Bullet holes in the two cars indicate that the gun-fire came from the front and rear.

Bullets and cartridge cases from Floyd's gun, and from the Mebraska. Bank rubbery, and from the North Kansas City bank rubbery, as well as bullets from our Detective Carpenter shooting, all failed to be identified as being connected with the weapons used in the plaza shootings. Test bullets fired by me from the two .58 caliber Colt revolvers taken from Fur Sammons, failed to be identified as being connected with any local shootings.

Should you take any weapons connecting with this case, it is absolutely important that test bullets be fired from the weapons by me in order that I can identify positively the comparison slugs as well as the guns. Be sure that no one cleans the guns.

It was discovered on August 10th by Mr. Gill, above mentioned, that a lead slug fired from a .38 caliber Colt revolver also entered the body of Chief of Police Otto Reed. This slug was compared with various other specimens in possession of Gill - especially those fired from the revolvers of "Fur" Sammons, but to date, no identification has been made.

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As to the parties slain and details of the positions of the of ficers with reference to the assassing, reference is made to the report from the Kensas City office, dated 7980-33, heretofore mentioned.

In connection with the above agent contested C. A. Mason, 620 Equity Building, Muskoges, Oklahonas Ers Meson stated that J. T. Ford, negro, told him of a trip that he made jast September to Park Hills vicinity to fix a broken car and what he saw while there, at what appears to be a eamp of a gang of outlaws and bootleggers.

J. F. Ford, 380 South 2nd Street, Muskogee, Oklahome, was inter viewed. He stated that in September 1932 he had a garage shop at Muskoges and that a man named Stone, whose first name and address are not known to Yord, came to him and said that he had loaned his car to a roman to go to Fort Gibson, Oklahoma; that the ear was broken down and the woman caught a ride back to Muskoges and he wanted Ford to take this moman in his east to where the car had been broken down fix the ear so she could drive, it back to Muskogee. Ford stated that he and this white woman left Muskogee in his car and drove to Fort Gibson, past the Park Hill Highway, left the highway. and drove into the Cookson's Hill vicinity, about 25 to 30 miles from Muskogoe, where the car was broken. Ford stated that the camp is on a ravine of a creek or river; that he saw about 80 to 25 men, all hard-looks ing and equipped with rifles, pistols and lots of memunition; that they had several barrels of whiskey and plenty of home brew beer; that they all bunched around him when he was working on the car; that after he fixed the car, the women paid him \$16.00 in cash and they gave him one gallon jug of whiskey and one dozen bottles of beer

Ford further stated that he was scared and wanted to get dway from that camp as soon abspossible. He did not hear mentioned any names and did not learn the name of the woman who want with him to the camp but it is the opinion of ford that it is the comp or hang-out place for outless, bootleggers and murderers. 




