Dear Sir:

Kindly refer to letter from this office dated October 2, 1933, with reference to an address on the part of Eugene C. Reppert, Director of Police, Kanses City, Missouri, during which he charged the Federal Government with being criminally negligent in the Union Station Massacre case.

You will probably be interested to know that I recently discussed Mr. Reppert's speech with Sheriff Thomas Bash and with Mr. Merls Gill, Ballistician. Both of these gentlemen have stated that they have heard various comments regarding Mr. Reppert's talk with the result that they have reached an opinion that the speech reacted very unfavorably towards Mr. Reppert. They have stated that various persons have informed them that the general reaction was favorable to this Division and that there was a resentment against Reppert for having made such statements.

Sheriff Bash and Mr. Gill have also informed me that they have recently been making addresses to luncheon clubs themselves, and that on each occasion they have taken the opportunity of speaking in commendable terms regarding the Division of Investigation. They state, however, that they have not made any direct comments regarding Reppert's speech in their addresses because they have not felt that his talk should be dignified by any reply.

DETAILS:

t Kansas City, Missourie

Murder charges were dismissed against Mrs. Frances Mash prior to September 1, 1933, and she was liberated on a \$2500.00 bond, same having been reduced by action of the court at Kansas City.

Herbert Allen Farmer and Mrs. Esther Farmer remained in the County Jail at Kansas City, Missouri, in default of bond, and also under charges of murder, until September 25, 1933, when the murder charges were dismissed and they were released on bond in the instant matter.

Control of the Contro This matter was presented to the United States Grand Jury at Kansas City, Missouri, having to do with the Federal angle; manely, Endeavoring to deliver a Federal prisoner from the custody of Agents of the Attorney General of the United States, and on that date, September 1 1935, an indictment was returned charging conspiracy to cause the release of a Federal prisoner, naming as defendants the following Subjects; Vernon C. Hiller, Harvey J. Bailey, Richard Tallman Galatas, Herbert Allen Farmer, Esther Farmer, Frank B. Mulloy, Wilber Underhill, Robert G. Brady, Mrs. Trances Rash, Louis Stacel and Mrs. Louise Conner.

Capiases were issued and non est returns were made by the United States Marshal on said capieses for Subjects Underhill, Bailey. Miller, Brady, Gelates and Mrs. Conners. Mrs. Rash remained on bond which she had formerly furnished. Subject Stacci furnished bond on October 5. 1935; Subjects Herbert Allen Farmer and Esther Farmer furnished bonds on September 25, 1955, and Frank B. Mulloy was arrested and furnished bond on September 5, 1935.

Subject Brady, according to information received at the Kansas City office, was captured by the Sheriff at Tucumcari, New Mexico. on October 6, 1933, and on October 7, 1933, certified papers were forwarded by the United States Attorney at Ennsas City, Missouri, to the United States Attorney at Albuquerque, Hew Mexico, calling for the return of Subject Brady to Kansas City, Missouri, the bond having been fixed at \$10,000.00, returnable forthwith at this place.

Subject Harvey J. Bailey was apprehended on Federal process
near Paradise, Texas, in connection with prosecution growing out of the rideraping of Charles F. Urschel at Oklahoma City. Details of his incarceration, subsequent escape and capture and removal to Oklahoma City will be found in the file of the Charles F. Urschel Kidnaping case, wherein Oklahoma City Is the office of origin. Certified papers were forwarded by the United States Attorney at Kansas City, Missouri, for Bailey, to the United States Attorney, first at Delias, Texas, and later at Oklahoma City, Oklahoma, while Bailey was being held in custody at those places, but there is no indication that the capias has been served at either of these points. Bailey was convicted at Oklahoma City, Oklahoma, in Federal Court on charges of Kidnaping, and on October 7, 1933, he was sentenced to serve life imprisonment on that charge, He is now in the United States Penitentiary (Annex), Leavenworth, Kansas, serving his life sentence.

Investigation is being carried forward to locate and cause the apprehension of Subjects Miller, Galatas, Underhill and Mrs. Conner.



I am in receipt of your communication of October 2, 1933, with which you enclosed an article appearing in the Kansas City Journal Post for October 2, 1933, reporting allegations of Er. Bugone G. Boppert, Director of Police of the Kansas City, Missouri Police Department.

Of course, the statements of Mr. Reppert are so obviously untrue that it would seem to be a question of his deliberately lying about the facts or being abyenilly ignorant of the same. In either event the effect is the same. It is needless for me to comment upon the delicacy of the situation at Kenses City, for I am certain you can appreciate it as well as I.

Palice Department is far from an organisation meriting the confidence in its integrity and efficiency which should go with a police department in a city the size of Kansas City. This would explain in a large measure the reason why Kansas City, Missouri has such an adisus reputation. I believe it is particularly desirable that our effice at Kansas City exercise the utmost discretion in the handling of any matters in Kansas. City, and that we have as infrequent a contact as possible with the Kansas City Police Department as long as the present Director of Police remains in charge of that Department. You will consequently be guided accordingly and should any assistance of a local character be needed, I would suggest that you contact Sheriff Bash, who I am informed is a reliable and honest police official and who I am certain will be willing to render any assistance which you might desire locally.

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PLAZA KILLING BLAME ON U.S.

Reppert Asserts Massacre Due to Negligence.

Eugene C. Reppert, director of police, Monday charged the federal government with criminal negligence in its method of delivering Frank Nash, convict killed with four officers in the Union station massacre of June 17, to Kansas City.

Reppert's charges was made at the Uptown Business and Improvement association luncheon. Chief of Detectives Thomas J. Higgins also spoke at the luncheon.

The federal government is criminally negligent in the station magnacre." Reppert said. "When Nash was due to be received here, a federal agent called police head-quarters and asked for assistance. That agent did not say that the prisoner was Frank Nash and we had no way of knowing. As a result the police were not properly equipped and had we have been informed that it was a man as dangerous as Nash the police department would have been sufficiently equipped to meet the assault of the killers."

Reppert outlined the events of that fatal June morning. He criticized the federal government for its method of taking a prisoner as dangerous as Nash on a public street. He also criticized the federal agents for "bunching up" and not scattering out when they jed Nash through the station lobby and across the street.

"If the government had informed

"If the government had informed us that the prisoner was a man as dangerous as Frank Nash, as certain as I stand before you the Kansas City police department would have placed a different ending to that awful slaughter. We certainly would have taken machine guns along."

Reppert ridiculed statements that the federal government "solved" that station massacra.

"The man who should get credit for that sits right in your midst," he told his audience. "He is my friend here, Tom Higgins. He put his finger on both of the ring-leaders."

Reppert also said that it was Chief Riggins who arrested Harvey Balley there two years ago on a golf course. Reppert had not finished with his criticism of the federal government in regard to the Union station massacre. "I am also amused at the statistics concerning the solution of the McEiroy kidnaping." Respectively. The police department countertainty have gotten along by the self. The man who solved that crims is also Chief Higging.

Reppert prefaced his indictment of the federal government by a statement that "Chief Higgins and I aren't here to answer charges results the police denominate the

I aren't here to answer charges against the police department.

He stated that since the police department had been under home rule the personnel of the men was reduced 100 without impairing the efficiency of the department and a saving of \$323,000 had been effected.

"In addition crime has been reduced 40 per cent and only one bank has been robbed in the last eight een months. The crime situation is certainly worse in other cities than here."

Dear Sir:

Reference is made to my letter of September 38, 1935 and to Division letter dated October 5, 1933 relating to the visit of Mrs. (Ceorge J. Hatfield, the wife of the former District Attorney at San Francisco) Celifornia, at the Weldorf Astoria Hotel, New York City, as the guest of BenjaminySiegel.

Interview had with Assistant Manager J. M. Ferrell, Waldorf Astoria Hotel, by Special Agent S. K. McKee, resulted in learning that on or about September 23, 1933 Benjamin Siegel approached Mr. Farrell and made reservations consisting of a three room suite for some guests whom he expected to visit him for several days. At the time the reservations were made Siegel stated that his guests would be three women accompanied by several children and that one of the women was Mrs. George J. Hatfield, the wife of the District Attorney at San Francisco. According to Mr. Farrell, Siegel did not state how he happened to be acquainted with the Hatfields or why Mrs. Hatfield was coming to the hotel as his guest. He requested Mr. Farrell at the same time to transfer all charges incurred by the party to his (Siegel's) account.

Mr. Farrell advised further that after Krs. Hatfield had been at the hotel for several days, two sizeable C.O.D. items from ladies' shops were delivered to the hotel for Mrs. Hatfield and inasmuch as the inclusion of such items as the above with the other charges incurred at the hotel was not the usual thing, Mr. Farrell communicated with Siegel's apartment by telephone and left a message that he wished to talk to him.

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Mr. Farrell said that Siegel came to see him and when inquiry was made regarding the C.O.D. items in question, he replied that those items, as well as all other charges incurred by the party, should be placed on his account.

There will be found attached here to two photostat sets of the account records of Mrs. Paul Cribi and children, Mrs. Bailey Palkin and daughter, and Mrs. George J. Hatfield. Your attention is called to the fact that in addition to room and restaurant charges such items as valet, laundry, sundries, long distance telephones, and C.O.D. items were assumed by Siegel on behalf of the above party. Your attention is also invited to the fact that the majority of the charges incurred by the party appear on the account of Mrs. Hatfield.

A review of the toll telephone items appearing on the above accounts indicates the following:

9/26/33 Iribi called Greenwich 5782.

9/26/33 Balkin called Mayflower 8738, Pittaburgh, Pa.

9/26/33 Balkin called Great Barrington, Mass. #340.

Entfield put in a call to a party namedistein at Chicago,

Ill., Diversey 4500. This call was not completed but a report charge of 70% was made.

In connection with the call placed by Mrs. Hatfield to Chicago, Ill. it was thought possible that the person for whom the call was placed might be the Maxmillian Stein concerning whom inquiry was made at the Waldorf Astoria Hotel by this office during the beginning of this investigation in connection with the telephone calls placed to the hotel by parties at the Hotel Bismarck, Chicago, Ill. during April, 1935.

In this connection inquiry was made of Mr. W. F. McDermott, Credit Manager, Waldorf Astoria Hotel, and he advised that Maxmillian Stein checked out about three weeks ago leaving a forwarding address as the Original Pilaner Beer Importing Company, 11 West 42nd Street, New York City. Mr. McDermott also advised that Stein is in great difficulties at the present time because of his ownership of brewery properties in Berlin, Germany, which are useless to him in view of the policies of Adolf Hitler.

During the above conversation with Credit Manager McDermott, in which the name of Benjamin "Bugs" Siegel was necessarily involved, he told a story of having had a conversation with one Fred Kaplan, attorney for Owen "Owney" Madden, et al, to the effect that

Kaplan had been in California either at San Francisco or Los Angeles representing two New York gangsters who were involved in a shooting affeir and had traveled back to New York City by airplane along with "Bugs" Siegel. In this connection, an effort was made through the offices of the United Air Lines, 56 West 40th Street, New York City, to obtain records of either Kaplan or Siegel having left New York City by plane, but no such records could be uncovered. It was suggested by the Air Line Company that the appropriate place to secure such record would be either through their Los Angeles or San Francisco offices.

A complete list of all local telephone calls made by Mrs. George J. Hatfield during her stay at the hotel was secured and the listings on same were obtained from the New York Telephone Company. They are as follows:


It was not thought desirable to conduct interviews with any of the persons listed above in order to secure possible information concerning the connection between the Hatfield family and the Siegel family and same will not be done unless instructions to that effect are received from the Division.

At the time of the interviews with Messrs. J. M. Farrell and W. F. McDermott, both men were questioned regarding the possibility of having one of them interview Benjamin Siegel in a casual memmer in an effort to learn the purpose of Mrs. Hatfield's visit at the hotel or the connection between the Siegel family and the Hatfield family. Both men stated that such an interview, in their opinion, would be impossible, stating that all conversations which have taken place between them and Siegel in the past have been initiated by Siegel. They further advised that it would be awkward to question Siegel about anything other than hotel business. The possibility of having Mr.

McDermott secure possible information of value from Fred Kaplan was discussed with him but he said that the same situation existed as to Kaplan as existed regarding Siegel.

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From October 2 to 6, 1935, Marge Keating and Lillian Molden were registered at the Pickwick Hotel, 10th & McGee, Kansas City, Missouri, during which time their movements were followed very closely by this office in an effort to secure some information which might bring about the apprehension of Fugitives in this case, particularly Vernon Miller, with aliques.

During the period indicated above this office received most splendid cooperation from Mr. H. J. Steed, manager of the Pickwick Hotel. He allowed the Agents free access to a vacant room which was used for 24 hours of the day. The telephone in that room was also used on many occasions. In addition, Mr. Steed allowed the Agenta the use of one of the trusted bellboys in the Hotel, who aided the agents in the installation of a vactuphone set which gave the Agents aural surveillance of the Keating and Holden women during their entire stay at the Hotel.

After the women had checked out of the hotel I had Special Agent (A) B. R. Allen inquire of Mr. Steed what charges there were for the services which had been rendered by him. He stated that there were no charges whatsoever, and further, that he and the hotel would at any time be pleased to copperate with this office to their utmost. I might add that the cooperation received was of material aid to this office during the conduct of this important investigation.

I had Agent Allen make inquiry of Mr. Steed whether it might be appropriate for a letter to be addressed to him thanking him for his cooperation. At first he indicated that he did not desire such a letter, and later stated that one of an indefinite nature would be acceptable to him.

I am transmitting berewith a copy of a letter from Special Agent in Charge E. E. Conroy of the Eansas City Division office, deted October 13, 1933, wherein a request is made that the mame of the appropriate official of the Department at Washington, D. C., be furnished, who can produce memorandum or other documentary evidence to prove that Special Agents F. J. Lackey and F. S. Smith were acting as Agents of the Attorney General of the United States at the time they had in their sustedy and transported escaped Federal prisoner Frank Mash from Fort Smith, Arkansas, to Kansas City, Missouri, on June 16th and 17th, 1933.

I am also transmitting berewith a copy of the report of Special Agent W. F. Trainor, dated at Kansas City, Missouri, October 12, 1933, which is a sustary report of the investigation by the Division, relative to the emasacre at Kansas City on June 17, 1933, at which time Special Agent Raymond J. Caffrey of this Division, Chief of Police Otto Reed of McAlester, Oklahoma, and Police Officers Groups and Hermanson of Aansas City, Misrouri, and escaped Federal Prisoner Frank Hash were killed.

Frank Bash, the Federal prisoner, was received in the United States Penitentiary, Leavenworth, Kansas, on March 3, 1924, to serve twenty-five years, having been convicted at Oklahoma City, Oklahoma, in the Federal Court for assaulting a mail custodian. He escaped from the Leavenmorth Penitentiary on October 19, 1930, and had been apprehended at Not Springs, Arkansas, on June 16, 1933, by Special Agents Lackey and Smith of the Division. Authority had been granted the Division and Special Agents Lackey and Smith by the Attorney General to return and deliver escaped Federal prisoner Frank Nash to Leavenworth, Kansas. These two Special Agents were present at the time of the attempted delivery and resulting death of Frank Mash, which occurred at dangers City, Miscouri.

Immediately after apprehending him? those Agents and Officer Reed drove at a high rate of speed with the prisoner from Hot Springs, Arkensas, toward Ft. Smith, Arkansas, proceeding by way of Benton and Little Book, Arkansas. They were stopped by a group of officers at Benton, who reported that they had been telephonically advised that a man had been kidnaped. The Agents identified themselves and proceeded. They were stopped at Little Book, Arkansas, by officers, who informed them elso that they had been notified telephonically that a man had been kidnaped. Ifter identifying themselves the Agents, with the prisoner, accompanied by Mr. Reed were escorted to the city limits, and having inquired the road to Joplin, Missouri, which is the same highway out of Little Bock that leads to Pt. Smith, those Agents proceeded to Fort Smith, Arkansas. At Fort Smith, Arkansas, they communicated with Special Agent in Charge R. H. Colvin. Division of Investigation, U. S. Department of Justice, Cklahoma City, and were instructed by him that authority had been received through Mr. J. Edgar Hoover, Director of the Division of Investigation, U. S. were made between Bubject Galatas, at Hot Springs, and Subjects Herbert Alles Farmer and Esther Farmer, at Joplin, Missouri. Also telephone calls were made best tween the residence of Herbert Allen Farmer, at Jeplin, Missouri, and Vernon Co-Miller, at Kanses City, Missouri, It is also shown that Mrs. Frances Bash, at the instigation of Subject Galatas, telephoned Subject Stacci, at Chicago, Illinois from Hot Springs, Arkansas, immediately after the apprehension of Frank Hash, her kusband, and that Stacci, in turn, communicated with Frank B. Mulley, at Kansas City, Missouri, from Chicago, Illinois, in an endeavor to reach Vernon C. Miller. It is found upon investigation that Mulley received the telephone call from Stacei. and performed acts whereby Stacci and Miller were placed in communication with each other. Evidence has been secured to show that the long distance telephone calls in question referred specifically to the liberation of Each, who was in custody as a Federal prisoner, and it has been shown that the plan of operation to release Each culminated in the escassination of the various efficers, heretofore mentioned. It has been shown that Richard Tallman Galatas, together with Mrs. Frank Resh, proceeded from Hot Springs. Arkansas, to Joplin, Missouri, by airplane on the afternoon of June 16, 1953, for the purpose of arranging the liberation of Nash by Vernon C. Miller assisted by the various coherts of this groups On September 1, 1933, at Kansas City, Missouri, the United States Grand Jury real turned an indictment charging conspiracy to cause the escape of a Federal prisoner naming as defendants under indictment the following: Harvey J. Builey, Esther Farmer, Frank B. Mulloy, Mrs. Frances Mash, Wilber Underhill, Bobert G. Brady, Herbert Allen Farmer, Richard Tallman Galatas, Vernon C. Miller, Mrs. Louise Conner and Louis Staccie Capiases were issued pursuant to the indictment and the following parties have been arrested on said capiases: Rether Farmer, Frank B. Mulloy, Mrs. Frances Rash, Herbert Allen Farmer and Louis Stacci. A non-est return has been made on the capies for each of the following Subjects: J. Bailey, Wilber Underhill, Robert G. Bredy, Richard Tallman Galates, C. Miller and Mrs. Louise Conner. At this time Subject Bailey is serving a life sentence in the United States Penitentiary, at Leavenworth, Kansas, having been subsequently convicted on a charge of kidnaping. Wilber Underhill is still at large and efforts are being made to apprehend him. Robert G. Brady has been apprehended and seriously wounded by gunshot at Tucumcari, New Mexico, where he is now being held, and it is doubtful whether or not he will live. A certified copy of the indictment and capies has been forwarded by the United States Attorney at Kensas City to the United States Attorney at Albuquerque, Hew Mexico, for the arrest of Brady and removal to Kansas City, Missouri under Federal processe. Richard Tallman Galatas, Vernon C. Miller and Mrs. Louise Conner are Fugitives at large, and efforts are being made to apprehend them. Esther Farmer, Frank: B. Mulloy, Mrs. Frances Mash, Herbert Allen Farmer and Louis Stacol have furnished bonds and are at liberty awaiting trial in the instant matter. Date of trial in this matter has not been set, and it has been indicated by the United States Attorney et Kanses City, Missouri, that trial will not be had in the Fall Term of Court commencing during October 1935, at Kansas City, Missouri.

Mr. Morrison will also produce prison records, which he will identify, showing that October 19, 1950, Frank Nash escaped from the residence of Mr. Morrison on the United States Penitentiary Reservation, Leavenworth, Kansas, where he was acting as a Trusty in custody as a Federal prisoner. He will testify to the circumstances of the escape of Nash, who was employed in his personal custody at the residence of Mr. Morrison, at the time of his escape.

SPECIAL AGENTS F. J. LACKEY and FRANK SMITH, Division of Investigation, U. S. Department of Justice, (to be reached through the Kansas City office of this Division):

Till testify that they made investigation to locate and cause the apprehension of escaped Federal prisoner Frank Mash at Hot Springs, Arkansas and that on June 16, 1935, at Hot Springs, together with Mr. Otto Reed, Chief of Police, McAlester, Oklahoma (now deceased) they apprehended Mash at the White Front Pool Hall and transported him immediately by auto from Hot Springs, by way of Benton and Little Rock, Arkansas, to Fort Smith, Arkansas. They will testify that at Benton, Arkansas, and Little Rock, Arkansas, they were stopped by police, who informed them that they had been telephonically notified that a man had been kidnaped at Hot Springs and was being transported by his captors in the direction in which the Agents and the prisoner were traveling. They will testify that they identified themselves both at Little Rock and Benton, Arkansas, and were allowed to proceed, and that at Little Rock they inquired as to the road leading to Joplin, Missouri, purposely misleading the officers into the belief that they were proceeding to Joplin, intending to take the Highway to Fort Smith, Arkansas, which they dide

Agent Lackey will testify to verbal instructions received by him from Special Agent in Charge R. H. It will be noted that immediate inquiry is being made of the Director, Division of Investigation, U. S. Department of Justice, Washington, D. C., in order to secure the name of the appropriate official in the Department of Justice who can produce records which will reflect orders transmitted to the Director of the Division of Investigation from the office of the Attorney General of the United States, which were relayed over long distance telephone to R. H. Colvin, Special Agent in Charge, Division of Investigation, Oklehoma City, Oklehoma, for Agents Lackey and Smith to transport the prisoner from Fort Smith, Arkansas, in the manner which was done. 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Mr. Vetterli will testify that about 7:20 A.M., a few seconds after the group of officers had escorted Mash to the ear he heard a command from an unknown voice nearby saying, "Put 'em up". Mr. Vetterli will testify that he saw a man about 15 feet diagonally in front and to the right (southwest of him with a machine gun trained on himself, Hermanson and Brooms, and crouched somewhat behind the radiator of another ear. Also he will testify that about the same instant that the command was given another voice said. "Let 'em have it", and machine gun fire at the officers began. Mr. Vetterliches tentatively identified a photograph of Robert G. Brady as a likeness of the man whom he saw with the machine gun as here mentioned.

DR. P. H. OWENS, Coroner of Jackson County, Kissouri, Kenses City, Missouri

Will testify that from his official investigation there were killed as a result of gunahot wounds, resulting from the attack on the officers about 7:80 A.M. June 17, 1935, at the Union Station, Kansas City, Missouri, the following individuals: Special Igent Enymond J. Caffrey, Chief of Police Otto Roed, Police Officers Hermanson and Grooms, and Federal prisoner Frank Kash. He will produce records from the office of the Common at Kansas City, Missouri, to show his official determination of the cause of death of the various deceased individuals here mentioned.

Special igent Lackey, heretofore mentioned, will testify that he received gunshot wounds in the back as he was sitting in the rear seat of the car of igent Caffrey during the attack by the assassins on the group of officers.

Special Agent in Charge R. B. Vetterli, heretofore mentioned, will testify that he received a slight flesh wound in his arm from a bullet fired from a machine gun of the assassin, whom he saw as heretofore mentioned, and that during the firing which wounded him Police Officers Grooms and Hermanson, who were close by his side, each fell mortally wounded.

Will testify that he made an immediate examination of leader slugs or bullets which were found by the Coroner in the bodies of the deceased, heretofore mentioned, and that he also picked up at the scene of the shooting, immediately after it happened, exploded shell cases. His

analysis of the cartridge cases and the lead slugs showed the followings

Special agent Raymond J. Caffrey was shot through the head with a bullet analyzed as a ball bearing, probably fired from a riot gum.

Ms. Reed, Mr. Grooms and prisoner Mash were killed with Thompson sub-machine gun bullets. Mr. Hermanson was killed with a buck shot, probably fired from a riot gum. Agent Lackey was wounded by a bullet from a Thompson sub-machine gum.

Bullet holes in the automobile of Agent Ceffrey indicated, according to Mr. Gill's examination, that gunfire had some from the and the rear. Mr. Gill will produce the original bullets taken from the bodies of the various deceased, which he has in custody, and will identify same. He will also produce and identify his records of the examinations of the various ballistic exhibits here mentioneds.

Details of the occurrence at the Union Station, Kansas City, Missouri, at and before the time of the shooting are set out in statements by Mr. Samuel R. Link and Mrs. Margaret Turner, which will be mentioned bereinafter.

MRS. MARGARET TURNER, colored, Olathe, Kansas

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Will testify that early on the morning of June17, 1935, she with one Walter Berry, drove from Clathe, Kansas, in a car for the purpose of meeting a 5:50 A.M. train to arrive at the Union Railroad Station, Kansas City, Missourie That upon her arrival at Kansas City, about 2:50 A.Me. June 17, 1935, Berry, with her, parked the ear in the Plaze section in front of the Union Railroad Station, facing south, and she went in to the station to inquire as to when the train would be in from Mexico, Missouri, and was edvised that it would arrive at 7:50 A.M.; that she then returned to her automobile and talked to Berry. That during the conversation he remarked that he did not know whether he was able to park in the place in which he was then located, so they circled around the station Plaza and parked with their car facing north and looking directly at the front of the Union Station. That about the time that they got into this position, which was approximately 5 A.M., June 17, 1933, a Reo automobile (Sedan) was driven up and occupied their former parking place so that they were facing the Reo Seden directly, and were about 10 or 15 feet away from it. Mrs. Turner will testify that about S A.M. a black Chevrolet Sedan or Coach drove up mear the Reo and the parties exchanged recognition; that a woman got out of the Chevrolet and went to the depot. She will testify that she could recognize this woman if she saw her, and she stated she was of medium height, young, nicely dressed in a white dress that flared out at the bottom, a black coat, and a white turban hat. When this woman entered the depot, she will testify,

the remained about ten minutes, and during this time the Black Chetrolet Seden circled the Plaza about three times. She will state that when the woman came out of the railroad station that individual looked to her right and then to her left, and proceeded to the left, which is toward the Engla Upon reaching what Mrs. Turner described as a window that looked like a door in ... the Union Station, the woman reised her hand and at that time the Chevrolet car, which was parked in back of Mrs. Turner's car was honked by the driver three times and then the Chevrolet car proceeded over to the station platform and picked up that women and disappeared. She will testify that she did not see the woman after that, but that about 15 minutes after every hour during the remainder of the night, during which entire time Erro Turner remained at the same spot near the Union Station, the Chevrolet car returned to the Plaza and circled same, and that during that entire time the Bec Sedan remained parked in the same position as heretofore mentioned, and the occupants of the Chevrolet car exchanged recognition with the parties in the Rec Sedan each time that they appeared. Mrs. Turner will identify Subjects Bailey and Underhill as occupants of the Reo Sedan. She will 🥳 testify that Bailey got out of the Beo car and walked over to the depot on one or two occasions while she was parked in front of the Reo care

Mrs. Turner will also testify that about 9:50 A.Ms. June 19, 1933, she herself entered the Union Rallroad Station and about that time a shot entered the Union Station through the window, and she next knew there was a spray of bullets coming from the direction of the automobiles parked across the street south, or in front of the Union Railroad Station. She will testify that she immediately prostrated herself on the floor of the station and did not see the shooting.

BAMUEL LINK, 5321 Mersington, Kansas City, Missourif

eseding North toward the business district of Kansas City, Missouri, in his car and when he neared the Union Railroad Station he turned on to Pershing Road, proceeding West to Main Street, then turned to his left, which would again be West, and proceeded directly toward the street which is nearest the front entrance of the Union Railroad Station. That at a point at the East end of the Union Station Plaza he drew near to a green Reo Sedan, 1932 Model, bearing a foreign license plate which he did not recognize. That the Rec was proceeding West directly beside him at the point where traffic buttons are located in front of the railroad station. As the car drew alongside of Mr. Link he heard a voice say "Duck you (obscene profanity". He will testify that he looked up and saw a man coming out of the left rear door of the Reo Sedan and recognized him as Subject Harvey Bailey, with whom he had been previously acquainted. That when Bailey emerged from the rear seat of the car Mr. Link noticed he had a machine gun in his hand. Link

then drew his ear to the sure which would be directly in front of the Union Station at the Rast and. The Reo Sedan then proceeded five of all feet West in the direction of the two entrances of the Union Station and then came to a dead stop. Mr. Link recognized as the driver of the Rec. car Subject Wilber Underhill, whose photograph he has identified. Mr. Link parked his car at the curb and the Reo car had come to a stop he will testify approximately one minute elapsed when Mr. Link observed the officers with the prisoner walking from the entrance of the Union Station toward the parking zone in front of the station. At this time Link observed a man standing approximately half way between the two main entrances of the Union Station lift his hands high in the air as though to give a signal. At that moment the Rec car commenced moving West and at that moment Mr. Link observed a black Chevrolet Sedan coming from the West proceeding toward the East, in his direction. As the officers and the prisoner approached Agent Caffrey's car Mr. Link observed the Chevrolet Sedan, mentioned above. come to a stop approximately in front of the officers and the prisoner. which would be south of the car of igent Caffrey and practically in front of it. At this moment Mr. Link noticed a man emerge from the rear door of the Chevrolet Sedan carrying a large gun in his hand. The only other man Mr. Link saw in the Chevrolet car was the driver. Mr. Link then observed Bailey lift his gun to his shoulder and saw the man who had emerged from the Chevrolet Sedan also lift his gun. At that moment Link ducked down in his car and did not see any more of the firing, though he heard at that instant several shots. Then he heard the motor of a car running and straightened up for an instant and saw the Chevrolet car going in an Easterly direction. He also observed the Reo Sedan moving forward in a Westerly direction, and he observed the man who had stood between the two main entrances of the Union Station, and who had given the signal, run over and get into the Rec Sedan

Mr. Link has identified a photograph of Wernon C. Miller, Subject of this case, as one of the men whom he saw. His recognition as to the exact part played by Miller in the massacre is not clear in his mind because of the rapidity of action, but he believes that Miller was the one who gave the signal. After the apprehension of Miller it is planned to have him identified, if possible, by Mr. Link in his appropriate part.

MR. J. D. JAMESON, 5427 Cypress, Kanses City, Missouri:

will testify that he was, on June 17, 1935, engaged as a red cap at the Union Reilroad Station, Kansas City, Missouri, and that he went to work in that capacity sometime before ? A.M. that morning. That early on the morning of June 17, 1935, before the arrival of the train of the Missouri Pacific Railroad at ? A.M., a man whom he has identified from a photograph as Harvey J. Bailey, approached him at the Union Station and inquired about

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the time of arrival of Missouri Pagific train number 116 from Little Rock; Arkansas. He will state that Bailey told him at that time that some of his friends wanted to go fown to the station train platform in order to take an invalid from the train who would arrive, but Jameson will testify that he told him he would have to get permission from the Station Master, and that Bailey handed him a tip of 35¢ for the information given, which information was apparently of no value to Baileye

The long distance telephone calls which will be mentioned pereinafter show a plan of operations by Subjects Galates, Kre. Frances Rash, Kre. Conner, Kre. Farmer, Eerbert Allen Farmer, Louis Stacei, Frank B. & Mulloy and Vernon C. Miller, in their perpetration of the plot to liberate Federal prisoner Frank Rash, which culminated ultimately in the assassination of the officers and the prisoner. An outline of these telephone calls, with appropriate withesses to produce the records and identify them, supplemented by verbal testimony showing the substance and meaning of the various calls as they fit in the plan of operations of these assassins is as follows:

Will testify that Subject Richard Tallman Galates lived with his wife at 107 Harrell, Hot Springs, Arkansas, on June 16, 1935, and for several months prior thereto, and that it was known by him that there was no family named Bates living at that address, and no Mrs. George We Bates was known to him at Hot Springs.

LONG DISTANCE TELEPHONE OPERATOR MUMBER 102, Southwestern Bell Telephone Company, Hot Springs, Arkansas, (Name and address to be later secured):

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Will testify and identify original toll ticket showing that she handled this long distance telephone call.

MR. O. N. MARTIN, Police Department, Little Rock, Arkansas:

Will testify that telephone number 42162, Little Rock, Ark., was the telephone number of the Police Department at Little Rock, according to his knowledge, on June 16, 1933. Also that he was personally aware that there was no other long distance telephone call at approximately 2:24 P.M. received at the Police Department, Little Rock, from Hot Springs, Arkansas, and that he personally talked on the call listed above at about 2:24 P.M. He will testify that his conversation was had with Herbert A. Akers. a Police Detective at Hot Springs, Arkansas, and that Akers informed him that a man had been kidnaped at Hot Springs about noon of that day and described the man in terms identical with those of Federal Prisoner Frank Nash, and stated that the captors of the kidnaped individual were headed for Little Rock, Arkaneas. Mr. Martin will testify that during his conversation with Akers he informed Akers that the officers had already arrived at Little Rock and had identified themselves as Federal Agents, and that they had in custody a Federal prisoner whom they were transporting by car. He will testify he advised Akers that the Agents had inquired the Righway to Joplin, Missouri, and that police officers from the Little Rock Police Department had escorted the Agents and the prisoner on the Highway out of Little Rock toward Joplin. He will testify that the Highway leading from Little Rock to Joplin is the same as that leading to Fort Smith, Arkansas, for a distance of about 30 miles out of Little Rock.

Attention is called here to the fact that the telephone call was made at Hot Springs from the telephone of Subject Galatas but the conversation was had over Galatas' telephone by a police officer; namely, Herbert A. Akers, who was apparently cooperating with Galatas.

Also attention should be noted to the fact that ikers was advised at that time that the officers with the prisoner were headed for Joplin, Missouri. This is a significant fact due to the occurrence which took place immediately after the telephone call was made by ikers; namely, that Galatas proceeded by airplane with Mrs. Frances Nash, the wife of the prisoner who had been captured, to Joplin, Missouri. Further details regarding the airplane trip may be noted below under the testimony of John Stover, an airplane pilot. Also in this connection the testimony of Mrs. Nash as appears under long distance call number 2 is material.

She will testify that at the time she made the call she was advised by Subject Galatas that Eash had told him that if at anytime he were apprehended that louis Stacci should be notified. She will testify that she was unable to reach Stacci due to the fact that he was absent from the O.P. Inn at the time she made the call. She will testify further that subsequent to June 17th she met Stacci in Chicago, and Stacci told her that he was sorry that he had been absent when she called, but that after he learned of her call he got in touch with parties in Eansas City, Missouri pursuant to her plight in the arrest of her husband Frank Nash.

had been taken by officers. Her testimony will not go so far as to
incriminate herself in a plot to release Nash, but it goes sufficiently
far to show that there was conversation regarding the arrest of Nash; that
she and Calatas were proceeding to Joplin, and from other circumstances
in this case the prosecution will be able to develop, to the satisfaction
of the Jury, that the conversation was regarding the release of Nash.

She will also testify that Galatas became very much excited during the trip and while at Farmer's residence, and seemed to be worried that Mash had been apprehended. She will also testify that during the evening, sometime before 9:00 P.M., of June 16, 1955, Herbert Allen Farmer and Galatas departed from the Farmer residence and were gone about two hours, after which they returned.

the evening of June 16, 1935, he took Galates in his our to the down town section of Joplin and left him at a drug store (evidently the Midway Drug Store), and that around 10:00 Pole, he and Galates arrived back at the Farmer residence.

He will also testify that he later was in telephonic communication with Gelatas at Joplin, and that Gelatas instructed him to stay at the Conner Hotel the night of June 16, 1935, which he did, and that early on the morning of June 17, 1935, he returned by air with Gelatas to Hot Springs, Arkensas.

MR. THOMAS BASH, Sheriff, Kansas City, Missouri:

Will testify that the Horse Shoe Club is a readhouse which has been frequented, and to all intents and purposes the public would believe it was partially operated by Frank B. Mulloy. He will also testify that the Soth Street Tavern was a place of similar nature, and that it was a place frequented by Frank B. Mulloy and operated by Walt Rainey, an underworld character friend of Frank B. Mulloy.

SPECIAL AGENTS DWIGHT BRANTLEY and L. G. TURROU, Division of Investigation U. S. Department of Justice (to be reached through the Kaneas City office)

B. Mulloy to the effect that he had talked on this call with Subject Stacci, and that Stacci asked him for the telephone number of Vernon C. Miller, which he furnished to Stacci at that time. affidevit to Special Agents L. G. Turrou and W. F. Trainor, Division of Investigation, U. S. Department of Justice (to be reached through the 18 Kansas City Office) stating that he was positive that he did not an June 18, 1933, ensure any long distance telephone call from Chicago, Illinois, but that he recalled that about two weeks prior to June 18, 1933, he did answer such a call and transmitted a message to the residence of Frank B. Mulloy, at Kansas City, that someone in Chicago wanted him to put Vernon C. Miller in touch with the party in Chicago. This testimony will be offered in rebuttel in the event that Frank B. Mulloy endeavors to confuse the two telephone calls and to deny that he did answer the telephone call from Louis Stacei.

Agents Brantley and Turrou, heretofore mentioned, will also testify that originally Subject Mulloy admitted to them that he furnished to Subject Stacci, when he talked to him by telephone on June 16, 1933, the telephone number of Vernon C. Miller at Kansas City, Missouri, which was telephone number Jackson 7073, and that later on the day in question he pay Subject Miller and conversed with him regarding the sall, at which time Miller told him he had gotten in touch with Chicago.

In this connection it will be shown that Mulley was personally affiliated and connected with Subject Killer and deceased Federal Prisoner. Frank Resh, by the fact that Miller was sided by Mulley in making his departure from Kansas City, Missouri, shortly after the occurrence of June 17, 1985.

MR. THOMAS L. DALTON, 64th and Medison, Kenses City, Missouri, sagaged in operating the Waldo Transfer Company at Kanses City, Missouri:



Subjects Brady and Clark are now confined in the New Mexico State Penitentiary, Santa Pe, New Mexico for safekeeping.

Dear Sir:

Pursuant to telephonic instructions I made inquiry at Tucumcari, New Mexico, of Sheriff Ira Allen as to whether he notified the San Antonio Office of the Division of the fact that he had arrested Bob Brady and Jim Clark, and he advised that he had not done so. He said that he phoned to the Chief of Police at Amerillo, Texas, from whom he had received the information that Brady and enother man were traveling toward Tucumcari and he had presumed that Chief McDowell of Amerillo would notify the Division.

Sheriff Allen said that in the future he would notify the San Antonio Office of events happening in his county.

Chief McDowell of Amerillo said the reason he had not notified the Dallas Office, was that he thought Sheriff Allen would do so.

The Sheriff's Office at Tucumcari is typical of many such offices in the Southwest, in that adequate records are not maintained and no filing system is in use by which data furnished by the Division and others may be located. I saw several Identification Orders hanging on spindle files or lying loose in or on deaks, mixed with various other wanted notices.

The postmaster at Tucumcari located his Identification Orders and from them identified Clark and Brady.

I endeavored to impress on Chief McDowell of Amarillo the importance of keeping us advised of such developments and I feel that he will do so. He is very cooperative and kindly disposed.

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H. S. Bureau of Investigation

Department of Justice

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Brady and Clark were apprehended about one and a half miles East of Tucumcari on Highway 66. Brady, in attempting to escape, was shot by Sheriff Allen with a 20 guage shot gun using #2 shot. Brady was hit by eleven shots in the right side of the back over the liver and lungs. When I left Santa Fe, Brady was apparently on the road to recovery.

Agent Street and I endeavored to secure some information from Brady about the Kansas City Massacre and the Urschel Case, but he maintained that he knew nothing about either - other than what he had read in the papers.

Brady said that on June 16, 1933, the day before the Kansas City Crime, he with Ed Davis and Jim Clark robbed the Black Rock, Arkansas, Bank, and that night went to a point about fifty miles South of Springfield, Missouri and the following morning while at this place, which he would not designate, he heard on the radio about the Kansas City Affair.

Brady claimed that "ilbur Underhill was with Harvey Dealley at the time, nursing Bailey's wounded leg. He said Bailey and Underhill were near Oklahoma City, - which was as nearly as he would describe the place.

Brady admitted taking Earwey Bailey to the Shennon Form near Paradise on one occasion only, but denied ever going there to get him. He denied that he knew the purpose of Bailey being at the Shannon Farm. He admitted that Bailey loaned him \$200 of the Urschel ransom money but claims he repaid Eelley with the same money.

Brady says that the only discussion he ever heard about the Kansas City Case was to the effect it was done by an "Eastern Gang".

Clark says that the Black Rock job was pulled by Brady, Bailey, Davis, Underhill and himself and that the following norning they were all near Batesville, Arkansas. He denies ever hearing the Kansas City matter discussed by his associates. He denies knowing anything about the Urschel case and denies that he was ever at the Shannon Farm although he admits reading in the papers that Mrs. Shannon testified that he was there. He could offer no explanation as to why Mrs. Shannon would testify falsely in this respect.

H. S. Burem of Investigation

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Départment of Justice

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Agent Street and I are convinced that no manner of investigation will elicit any truthful information from either of these men. Both are sentenced to life and both are so hardened in crime that we believed it to be a loss of time to further question them.

Agent in Charge Vetterli could not positively identify Brady as being the wielder of the machine gun directed at him. He said there was a close resemblance but that he could not say positively and that he would like to see him full dressed and wearing a hat. Vetterli said he never saw Clark before to his recollection.

Clark was taken to the New Mexico Penitentiary at Santa Fe on October 11, 1933 by Sheriff Allen and deputies. Agent Street and I remained at Tucumcari as Brady was a prospective Federal Prisoner while Clark was not, and the doctor had not agreed that it would be safe to move Brady.

On October 11, 1933, United States Marshal Tondre of New Mexico, accompanied by two deputies and United States Attorney Barker arrived at Tucumcari with certified copies of indictment and warrant charging Brady and others with conspiracy to release Frank Nash. Fugitive complaint was filed at Tucumcari and the United States Commissioner held a hearing in Brady's room at the hospital at which time Brady plead not guilty and was held in default of \$25,000 bond. Brady had previously refused to sign a waiver of removal.

On the night of October 11, 1933, Dr. Thorpe advised that Brady was so improved that he could be moved with safety in an ambulance.

United States Karshal Tombre, through Agent Street, arranged for an ambulance, and at 5:10 AM, October 12, 1933, Brady was removed from the hospital at Tucumcari and at 11:15 AM on the same day he was placed in the New Mexico Penitentiary at Santa Fe, apparently having suffered no ill effects from the journey.

It appearing that some time would be required in which to move Brady to Konsas City, I wired the Division I was leaving for Dallas.

Sheriff Captures Two Desperate Characters

Bob Brady and Jim Clark, Desperadoes With Long Criminal Records and Reputed as Killers Caught Friday Evening in Out skirts of Tucumcari by Sheriff Allen and Three Deputies; Necessary to Give Brady Two Loads of Buckshot to Prevent His Escape; Escaped From Kansas Peniten tiary May 30, 1933.

Charged With Robbing Frederick, Okla., Bank Earlier in Day; \$3,500 Found in Car and on Two Men; Regular Arsenal of Firearms and Ammunition in the Car; Members of Famous Bailey Gang; Two Women Here Alleging They Are Brady's and Clark's Wives; Both Men Charged by Government With Being in Kansas City Union Station Massacre on June 17.

Sheriff Ira Allen, Deputies Charles Martines and Howard Shinn and find out, telling Jackson to search Mightwatchman Ed Jackson Friday him and the other officers search the evening, just after dark, in the outskirts of Tucumeari, captured two of the country's most desperate eriminals when they stopped and arrested Bob Brady and Jim Clark.

The capture was not without its dramatic and maybe fatal features, it being necessary to subdue Brady with two charges of buckshot from a sawedoff shot gun in the hands of Sheritt Allen, resulting in the criminal now being in Mercy General hospital with mine of the shot in his back and side and the physicians having their doubts as to his pulling thru.

Just three minutes was between the capture and criminals going thru here and escaping the officers. Sheriff Allen and his deputies were out in the county on duty, arriving in town just before dusk, when they were informed of a message from Amarillo to watch out for Brady and his part-

They had just parked their car this side of the lake east of the city when the car in which Brady and Clark were making 70 miles an hour topped the hill,

Just as the encoming car began applying the brakes the sheriff's force placed their sign—Sheriff—Stop—in the rear of the sheriff's car and it is doubtful if the criminals ever the sign.

As soon as the car stopped the fou officers covered the two men with th sawed off shot guns, rifles and at guns, ordering them to unload.

They stepped from their car, Brad getting out near Sheriff Allen and Nightwatchman Jackson, saying the sheriff:

"You have made a mistake; we ar not the men you are looking for; w are traveling men out of Amarillo.

The sherill informed him he would

The first thing Jackson found on Brady was a pocketbook builging with bills, informing the sheriff of his find. As Jackson reported his find Deputy Martinez shouled that the car was full of guns and ammunition; at this announcement Brady started to nun.

As he rounded the front end of the sheriff's car the sheriff and Officer Jackson cut loose at him, the sheriff with his shot gun and Jackson with his six gun and as he continued to sprint the contents of the other barrel of the shot gun and several shots from the six gun followed him.

Brady jumped into the bar pit on the north side of the road, disappearing in the dark. It was so dark the officers were unable to see him, but then sent several more shots in the direction in which he was fleeing.

Clark remained unperturbed while Brady was making his escape, and the sheriff and Deputy Shinn brot him to town, leaving Martinez and Jackson to search for Brady.

About 15 minutes after the sheriff left the scene the two officers began yelling, asking Brady where he was feeling sure he had been winged by the sheriff and Watchman Jackson.

Finally he answered, telling them to come and get him. Martinez, Jackson and Bill Allen, who had arrived on the scene in the meantime, went thru the fence, talking to Brady all the time, in order to locate him.

When Martines finally saw him he was about 100 yards from the highway and was lying on the ground, having pulled his coat off and made a pillow of th.

The deputy covered him, warning him that if he made a move he would blow his head off, when Brady told him he was unable to walk alone. The deputy yelled for Jackson and Allen to come and assist in carrying him back to the highway. Brady spoke up and said:

"I don't need any carrying; if you will help me up I can walk."

He was taken to the highway and brot to Mercy General hospital, where it was found Sheriff Allen's two shots had punctured his right side nine times, some of the wounds being seven inches deep and running from that down to three inches. One shot had passed thru his right arm and another had grazed the forearm, cutting to about half an inch.

He is now in the hospital under heavy guard, night and day, and it will probably be a day or more before it can be detrmined whether he


MEMORANDUM.

Kindly refer to Summary Report of Special Agent W. Y. Trainor, Kansas City, Kissouri, of 10-12-1933, copy of which is being transmitted berewith.

Your particular attention is directed to the statements of Margaret Turner, colored, and Samuel Link, set forth on pages 7, 8 and 9. Further attention is directed specifically to the fact that the assassins apparently used a Reo Sedan automobile, resultly green in color, and a black Chevrolet Sedan. Of course, it is possible that the witnesses may have been mistaken in the makes of the automobiles in question.

In addition, as you are possibly aware, the testimony of Link would be subject to severe attack on the part of the defense attorneys due to his apparent character. However, Kargaret Turner, from all indications, will make an excellent witness. Her story at all times has been straightforward.

It is a known fact that practically all gengaters and racketeers who have hed extensive criminal operations in the Middle West during the past few years, have had their automobiles hendled in one way or another by Joseph Bergl, of the Bergl Motor Sales Company, in Chicago, Illinois. I believe your office in the past has made searching inquiry into the records of Bergl. It has occurred to me that there is a strong possibility that the automobiles used by the assassins were handled by Bergl, either shortly before or after the Union Station Plaza masacre.

In view of the above it is requested that your office AVESTIGATIST make an immediate searching investigation into every available record kept by Bergl in an effort to determine some Rec or Chevrolet auto 3:035 mobile which may have been connected with this case. There should be a careful scrutiny of all Rece and Cherroleta, and a proper sub-

sequent development of leads.

It is realized that the requests being made herewith are of an indefinite nature and may cause a considerable amount of effort to be expended. However, your attention is directed to the fact that the proper development of some individual lead in connection with this inquiry has the possibility of unfolding complete details of the station massacre. In view of these circumstances any amount of work in connection therewith is justified.

A copy of this letter is being directed to the St. Paul office with the request that they make immediate searching appropriate inquiries/into the records of the Roberts Kotor Car Company, operated by E. L./Roberts, 408 University Ivanue, St. Paul, Minnesota, and the Republic Finance Company, St. Paul, Minnesota. Also Herb's Garage, operated by Berb Wilds, St. Paul, Minnesota., where it is understood that in the past gangsters and racketeers have disposed of automobiles subsequent to the use of such automobiles in the commission of major crimes. In this connection refer to the report of Sp cial Agent O. G. Ball, dated at St. Paul, Minnesota, V-27-1932, in this case.



Reference is made to your letter dated October 10, 1935, wherein you request that this office escertain the identity of the party, who on August 21, 1938 received a long distance telephone call from one A. Caplan, an alleged associate of George Kelly, the telephone number mentioned being Sheepshead 8-7160.

Please be edvised that a check revented that the subscriber of the above telephone number is Harman C. Rubin. The However, investigation disclosed that the name is fictitious and that the said telephone was installed in the apartment occupied by one J.L. Wolfe, 267 West End Avenue, Brocklyn, H.Y. The service of this telephone was discontinued on September 25, 1935.

Inquiry at 267 West End Avenue, Brooklyn, R.Y., revealed that J.L. Wolfe, his wife and two Minor children, together with a maid named Caroline Peterman, resided there for six weeks having recently arrived from Chicago. It was ascertained that on September 25, 1935 the Wolfe family moved to the Park Plaza Hotel located at 50 West 77th Street, New York City,

Investigation at the above named hotel disclosed Wrs. Wolfe, her two children and maid had registered on September 25, 1935, and at the time of registration indicated they came from Chicago. They were assigned to Apartment 902, which apartment they occupy at present.

\$2-4949 Letter - Chicago

It was learned that several Western Union telegraphic money orders were in the past three weeks received by Mrs. Wolfs from her husband in Chicago, the last one being in the sum of \$50, and dispetched on October 11, 1933 from the YC Western Union Telegraph office at Chicago, Ill.

An examination of the long distance telephone calls made by Mrs. Wolfe from the said hotel, shows that on October 5, 1935 she called Lakeview 4995, Chicago (charges reversed, and that on October 12, 1955 she placed another call to Humboldt 8450, Chicago, this possibly to her husband. She also received several calls from Chicago in the past two weeks. A number of the local telephone calls made by Mrs. Wolfe are now being checked by this office.

Photographs of the subjects involved in instant matter, were shown to a number of persons at the Brooklyn address and at the hotel where the Wolfe family now reside, none of whom, however, were able to state that any of the subjects were seen with the Wolfe family at any time.


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

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

Al Cumi, whe looked at his office, 1029 South Tabash Years, Chicago, Illinois. He stated that up until about two years ago he was an agent for Thompson Sub Machine Guns, selling in all approximately 150 of these guns to police departments and sheriff offices throughout the Middle West, Inspection of Mr. Dunlap's records disclosed that when he sold Thompson Sub Machine Guns no record was kept of the numbers of these guns. The invoices from the Auto Ordinance Corporation, SOE Proadway, New York City, for guns shipped to Al Vunlap also felled to list the gun numbers.

with reference to the Thompson Dub Machine Cum, in question, you advised that Al Dumlap, who is the owner of the Dotective Publishing Company, at Chicago, Illinois, purchased this particular gum from the Auto Ordinance Corporation of New York City on August 10, 1926. The gum was a 1921 model fall Thompson Sub Machine Cum. In checking over the geoords of Mr. Dumlap it was determined that on August 10, 1926, the Auto Ordinance Corporation of New York City, on order 75278, of the Detective Publishing Company, and on invoice 23237 of the Auto Ordinance Corporation, shipped to Al Dumlap two second hand Thompson Dub Machine Cums for the sum of [199.42, Mr. Dumlap states that he subsequently sold these two cums but does not know the purchasers.

He stated but he will make an accurate check of his repords and give the Chicago Division Office a list of all purchases of meeting that make during the Fell of 1926 so that the Chicago Division Office may circularize the peace officers who purchased these gums to determine if the gun recently found in the streem near Cennon Fells, Finn. had been stolen.



month ago, one John Hagan, who gave his address as Collins, kissouri, telephone number 15, called at this office and informed as that he could probably find Verne killer within 30 days. He desired employment for himself, Pat Roche, former county investigator at Chicago, Illinois, and an informant. At that time Hagan apparently attempted to impress me with his knowledge of underworld characters by a steady flow of language.

I personally was somewhat conversant with his ectivities; having known that he at one time was a close friend and associate of Harry Schwartzberg, a Fugitive wanted by the Kansas City office in a bankruptcy case for a long time past. Hagan had also informed me that he had rendered your office considerable aid in the factor and Hamm kidnaping cases.

I informed him at the time that I was new in the office and was not familiar with the procedure the Division was adopting in this case regarding the employment of persons. I asked him to call at a later date. In the meanwhile I made further inquiries of Hagan and verified my suspicions. I was also somewhat skeptical of Hagan, due to the fact that he apparently had recently been in Chicago. It occurred to me that he might have attempted to make arrangements there instead of Kansas City.

At a later date Hagan again called at the office and I informed him that the Division would in all probability not authorize his employment, but that it might be possible to have some suitable reward posted in the event he could bring about the apprehension of Vernon Miller. During this later conversation I drew out of him the fact that he had apparently previously made similar inquiries

Confirming telephonic conversation between the undersigned and Special Agent C. G. Schenken of the Okluhoma City office on October 9, 1933, please be advised that on that dute Dr. R. Lenz, telephoning from Parter Springs, Kansas, udvised Special Frent L. C. Spear that the American National Bank at Parter Springs had been robbed about 1:45 p.m. October 9, 1933. Dr. Lenz stated that there were five individuals among the hold-up party, one of whom had been positively identified from an Identification Order issued by this Bureau as Milbur Underhill. Dr. Lenz stated that these men obtained about \$3,000 from the bank and kidnaped two individuals, later releasing them north of Baxter Springs, Kansas, the hold-up men driving a 1933 dark Chevrolet sedan.

The following measure descriptions sere given of three of the remining four men the participated in the robbery: One is described as being about 6 feet in height; 165-170 pounds in weight; dark complexion; another is described as about 5 feet, 4 inches in height; 130 pounds in teight and light complexion; another, who remained in the car, is described as being short, rather heavy build, and had broad shoulders.

Fr. Lenz stated that the bandits were heavily armed and after leaving the robbery headed west out of town. Dr. Lenz remarked that Picher, Cklahoma, thought to be a hang-out for Filbur Underhill, is only eight miles from Eaxter Springs. He further stated that the Coffeyville, lansas, and Joplin, Missouri, police departments had been notified of this robbery.

Subsequent to Dr. Lenz's first telephone call, he called drin, the day stating that one of the witnesses to the robbery had examined the photograph of Kenneth Conn and believed that that was one of the individuals involved in the robbery. However, agent Spear advised Dr. Lenz that Kenneth Conn, who escaped from the State Penisonthary at Lansing, Lansas, on Kemorial ay in 1933, had been killed in a bank robbery at Altemont, kansas, and, hence, the identification of this individual was erroneous.

This information was furnished to you immediately, as I understand that your effice is presently sorking on a lead looking toward the apprehension of Underhill, and It may be possible that Dunderhill, after this bank robbery, is returning to his usual bounts.

I am transmitting herewith a copy of a memorandum, prepared by Special Agent M. C. Spear, concerning arrangements being made for the disposition of Robert G. Brady and James Clark, subjects of Identification Orders 1190 and 1192, respectively.

In addition to the information set out in the attached memorandum, you are advised that Special Agent R. C. Suran today contacted A. S. Foulks, Kansas State Parole Attorney at Topeka, Kansas, and Judge Foulks agreed that it would be satisfactory for Brady and Clark to be returned to the State Penitentiary at Lansing, Kansas, and that the Government would be permitted to obtain custody of either Clark or Brady any time it was desired to prosecute them in connection with the Union Station massacre which occurred here June 17, 1933. Judge Foulks further stated that he expected the Kansas State authorities to proceed to Santa Fe, New Mexico, about October 17th or 18th to return Brady and Clark. The return of these two individuals to the State Penitentiary at Lansing, Kansas, will be carefully followed and the Division will be kept advised.

A copy of this letter and attached memorandum are being transmitted to the San Antonio office for their information.

Late in the afternoon of October 14, 1935 Acting Special Agent in Charge Davis of San Antonio, Texas Office telephoned, advising the undereigned that Mr. Hughes of the Division at Washington had called him on the same date concerning the disposition of Robert Brady and Jim Clark recently apprehended at Tucumcari, New Kexico. Mr. Hughes instructed that the Kansas City Office should get in touch with the officers of the State Penitentiary at Lansing, Kansas and have them make arrangements to return Brady and Clark to that institution as escaped convicts with the underetanding that, if the Government later desired to prosecute Brady in connection with the Union Station massacre, he would then be turned over to the Government or the State of Missouri for such prosecution.

Davis advised that Etate authorities of Kansas, in seeking custody of Brady and Clark, should get in touch with Judge Barker, United States Attorney at Santa Fe, New Mexico; further stating that in the event Kansas authorities met any difficulty extraditing Brady and Clark, Judge Barker would go before the Covernor of New Mexico to facilitate extradition.

Davis further advised that at the present time Brady was not sufficiently recovered to be removed, but that he would recover and his removal could be effected within the next few days. Davis is being advised of Brady's condition by Judge Barker and will keep the Kansas City Office telephonically advised as to Brady's condition.

Davis further mentioned that the Federal indictment received by Judge Barker from United States Attorney at Kansas City, Missouri, charging Brady and others with obstruction of justice in the Union Station massacre June 17, 1933, had erroneously indicated the crime as being in April 1933. As the United States Commissioner in New Mexico is somewhat cranky, United States Attorney Barker filed a fugitive complaint against Brady, but has not filed the certified copy of indictment and warrant with United States Commissioner, retaining these certifications in his office.

Davis emphasized that the Kansas authorities in seeking custody of Brady and Clark should contact Judge Barker; further stating that Barker would not permit Brady and Clark to be released to any other authorities.

Davis stated that Rughes suggested that by releasing Brady and Clark to the Kansas State authorities, further investigation could be

Subsequent to the above mentioned telephone call the undersigned communicated by telephone with A. J. Graham, Deputy Warden at the State Penitentiary, Lansing, Kansas and advised him of the suggestion that Brady and Clark be returned to the State Penitentiary, which was agreeable to Graham. He stated that any agreement to permit Brady to be immediately released to the Federal Government for prosecution" would have to be authorized by Judge Foulkes, State Parole Attorney at Topoka, Kansas; however, Graham felt confident that such agreement would be satisfactory with Judge Foulkes.

Upon receipt of telegram from San Antonio Office, October 14, the undersigned again communicated with Graham, advising him that Brady and Clark were ready for removal at any time, and Graham stated that 📉 immediate steps would be taken the following week to obtain extradition papers and effect their removal. He advised that pursuant to the request of the undersigned, contract would be had with United States Attorney Barker at Santa Fe, New Mexico at the time the State representatives called for Brady and Clark.

Special Agent R. C. Suren is to personally confer with Judge ? Foulkes at Topeka, Kansas on October 15 concerning the agreement between the State of Kansas and the Pederal Government, permitting the latter to Sake Brady when desired for Federal or State prosecution in connection with the Union Station massagre at Kansab City.

The undersigned also communicated by telephone with William L. Vandeyenter. United States Attorney at Kansas City, Missouri, advising him of the above described plans, all of which were entirely agreeable. and acceptable to Vanderenter.



Beginning with Friday evening, there were persistent rumors from Missoula, Montana, that "Pretty Boy" Floyd had been reported to be in that city or vicinity. The police telephoned in regard to the matter but could give no beautiful. specific date. About 11:30 A. M., October 14, 1933, Mr. R. E. Toll of the Federal Reserve Bank at Helene, Montana, telephoned me that he had received telephones from the banks at Missoula, stating that they had been advised that Floyd might be in the vicinity and suggesting that soldiers from Fort Missoula be asked for to guard the various banks. Mr. Toll and I agreed that as there were but a few minutes until the closing time, this being Saturday, and the banks would not reopen until Monday, this precaution would be unnecessary as the soldiers could not reach the banks before closing time.

During the afternoon of the same day I telephoned the Sheriff's Office at Missoula, talking with Kenneth Powell, Under-Sheriff, who stated that he believed that there was nothing to the story; that in his opinion it originated from a play portraying some of these outlaw characters which had been running in a local movie house; that his office had made every endeavor to get some fact upon which to base a search but not one had been developed and he believed it

Reference is made to your letter dated September 2, 1933, in which you advised that Earl Doyle alias Harry Harris had been apprehended at Grand Haven, Michigan, in connection with a robbery of the Peoples State Bank there on August 18, 1933. In the eforementioned letter it was also noted that there were constant rumors to the effect that Doyle was connected with the Union Station shooting and that you request that test bullets be obtained at Grand Haven, Michigan, to be forwarded to the Eanses City Division office for comperisons

位置领域 強烈 Tor your information, several months ago informent of the Chicago Division office advised that Earl Doyle was a close associate of Vernon C. Miller. Investigation at Grand Haven, Ottava County, Michigan, disclosed that at 2:50 P.M. on August 18, 1935, five men entered the Feeples State Bank, held some up and depertod with approximately \$2,400.00 in cash and \$3,000.00 in Travelers checks. \$50,000.00 in each was left untouched in the safe due to the fact that one of the tollers set off the clara and placed the bank robberg in the position that they had to shoot their way out of town. Barl Doyle was captured, as in a tussel with one of the vigilantes he broke his log. At the time his leg was broken it was discovered that he had been shot, possibly in another bank robbery. He was confined to a hospital for approximately a month and same out too soon to participate in another robbery.

The bank robbers, six to number, all more bullet proof of wests. The bandit car, which was abendoned, was a stolen car out of thicago, Illinois, and contained the following: Approximately one bundred pounds of large tacks for road use, approximately twelve

bundred rounds of .45 amountion, sub-Thompson machine gun etock, fifteen boxes of high-powered dum dum bullets for rifles, fifteen boxes of regular rifle bullets and fifteen boxes of bullets for .58 specials. On the vest which Earl Doyle were the name Casper Gunthrie was written in indelible peneil. Two of the bank robbers have been positively identified as Ed and Ted Bents, who are friends of Kelly and Entes, subjects is the Urschel kidnaping case, and who are also well known to the Keating, Holden, Mush and Miller gang. The driver of the bandit car, from his description, is apparently Ernest Bobert Johnston, Seattle, Washington Police No. 14911. The true identity of the macking gunner has not been determined. He appeared to be of Polish extraction, about thirty years of age, five feet four inches tall, weight about 125 or 120; pounds.

I herewith submit the following test bullets which were obtained by Special Agest J. J. Keating at Grand Haven, Kichigan, so that you may have a forensic ballistician compare them with the bullets which killed the officers at Kansas City, Missouri, en the moraing of Jane 17, 1935:

- No. 1 A Mechine-gun bullet which was taken out of the wall of the McClellan Department Store at Grand Haven, Michigan, by Special Agent J. J. Keating of the Chicago Division office. The McClellan Department Store is directly across the street from the bank. Leveral machine gun bullets were fired through this building, the majority of which disappeared in passage. However, this particular bullet was found embedded in the wall.
- No. 2 A mechine gum bullet obtained from Cleude Vander
 Molen, 218 Elliott Street, Grand Haven, Michigan.
 This bullet passed through his sutambile and was
 embedded in the upholetery.
 - No. 3 Two fragments of a machine gun bullet obtained from Edward C. Irwin, Soute #2, Spring Lake, Michigan.

-No. 4 Fregments of a machine gun bullet obtained from Paul Vandenberg, 101 Clinton Street, Grand Haven, Kichigan. This particular bullet hit an iron post in the ministure golf course which is adjacent to the bank.

In connection with this case, Special Agent in Charge Merner Henni, who is at Sigux Falls, South Dakots, has just received information from a confidential source that VARRON C.MILLER is making New York his headquarters and is a friend of ARTY BEGLER, who was formerly a partner of CREY MADDEN; that they killed a man several years ago, after which BERLER went to Chicago, Illinois, where he met MILLER. BEGLER is, undoubtedly, known to New York Police. The informant further advised that, if MILLER were not with BERLER, or in contact with him, he sould be located with the "DUTCH" BCHULTZ outfit, or a gang of similar name, he not being positive of the spelling of CCHULTZ' last name.

The informent, who was recently released from the United States Penitentiary, at Leavenworth, Kansas, further advised that BERNARD PHILLIPS, I.O. 196, is alleged to have been killed in New York, approximately 2 years ago, after the arrest of BAILEY, HOLDEN, and KLATING, on the golf course at Kansas Cit, Missouri; that he was killed on account of the fact that it was believed he tipped off the officers as to the whereaboute of KKATING, HOLDAN, and BAILEY, and that BAILEY was actually the person who killed PHILLIPS, or had the job done. In this connection, it will be noted that BAILEY was in custody from July, 1932, until Memorial Day, May 30, 1933. 



I telephoned Street and Smith and learned that Maxson spoke of two men and not several men who had called at his home with reference to the inquiry he placed in the magnaine. I advised Street and Smith that they were free to inform Maxson that the parties who made the inquiry were agents from your office.




