Dear Sir:

Kindly refer to Division letter dated February 17, 1934, requesting that there be submitted to the Division at once a list of all wire taps which had been installed in this territory by this office since January 1, 1933.

In the case entitled Vernon C. Miller(deceased)et al. Conspiracy to Deliver Federal Prisoner, a tap was placed upon the telephone of F. F. Mulloy, 14 East 56th Street Torrace, Fansar City, Missouri, Telephone No. Harrison 0852; this tap having been placed on June 22, 1933, and extended up until July 21, 1933. Assistant Director Harold Nathan was at the Kannas City Division office at the time this tap was placed, and he authorized the same after he had telephonically conversed with the Division on or about June 22, 1933, it being believed that he spoke to the Director relative to this authorization.

A tap was placed on the telephone of Herbert A. Farmer, telephone number 1541-"-2, Joplin, Missouri, on June 24, 1933, and a similar tap was placed on the phone at that time of Frank Vaughn, telephone number 4271, Joplin, Missouri, both of these taps expiring on July 7, 1933. These taps were placed pursuant to suthority of Assistant Director Harold Nathan, who was at the Kansas City Division office on this case at that time, and it is telieved that he received authorization from the Director in a telephonic conversation with him on or before the first day of the tap.

A tap was also placed on the telephone of Carl Tosso, 128 Grand Avenue, Kansas City, Missouri, telephone number Grand 9030, this tap having been placed on September 30, 1935, and expired on October 17, 1933. Special Agent in Charge E. E. Conroy received telephonic authorization to place this tap on the morning of September 30, 1935, through telephonic conversation with Mr. V. W. Hughes of the Division.

The Division is respectfully advised that there appears to have been no letter of authorization ever received from the Division relative to these telephone taps.

In the case captioned Unknown Subjects, Ray E. Skidmore, Victim; Clarence E. King, Victim - Extortion, the following telephone observation and taps were had:

The Division is respectfully advised that there existed a misunderstanding relative to the Division's desires on records of telephone tups at the beginning of the above, in view of the fact that from January 17th to January 22nd, the telephone company was gratutiously making observations of calls received over the telephone numbers mentioned and was supplying the information to Agents of this Division office without any charge therefor. I was not of the pinion at the time that in those cases where a telephone company was voluntarily and gratutiously furnishing the information it was necessary to receive prior authorization from the Division; accordingly, the althorization of the above phones was not received until January 22, 1933, when I conferred by telephone with Mr. H. H. Clegg of the Division. The observation of the Demoush Planing Mill. telephone number 63, was placed on January 20, 1934; was removed on January 22, 1934, as it was not thought important, and it was necessary to have another telephone number substituted for this, however, the observation of telephone number 63 was renewed on January 23. 1934, upon telephonic withorization from Mr. Clegg of the Division on that date, and was continued until February 15, 1934. The Division is respectfully referred to my letter dated January 27, 1934, particularly page two, for confirmation of my telephonic conversation with Mr. Cleag relative to the above described telephone observations. letter of authorization relative to these telephone taps has been received.

In the case entitled Unknown Subjects, Edward George Bremer, Victin, Kidnaping, a tap was placed on February 12, 1934, on the office and residence telephones of Vernon Lynch, Des Moines, Iowa, telephone numbers 3-3271, 3-3272 and 5-0425. These taps are still in existence at the writing of this letter and were placed at the request of Special Agent in Charge Werner Hanni on February 12, 1934, as he advised that prior authority had been received from the Division to place them. Information relative to the placing of these taps is set out in my letter to the Division dated February 19, 1934; it will be noted in that letter that I have only mentioned telephone number 3-3271 for Mr. Lynch's office phone, however, he has two consecutive numbers for his office, 3-3271 and 3-3272, and the tap, of course is maintained on both office phones as well as his residence phone. We letter of authorization has been received from the Division by this office concerning the above mentioned tap.

Reference is made to Mr. Larson's letter dated February 1934, particularly to the third paragraph on page one, wherein it is noted that Esthryn Kelly states that she and her husband have known LaRue (Edward Doll, Identification Order #1214), for a number of years; that he had visited them in Texas on several eccasions; that she and Kelly spent a good deal of the time with him in and around Chicago and St. Paul; that between two and three years ago George Kelly left her in Texas and proceeded to Chicago, estensibly for the purpose of engaging in some gambling enterprises; that he was gone for a considerable time when she received a communication from him instructing her to proceed to Kansas City, Missouri, and upon her arrival in Kansas City she was met at the station by Kelly and LaRue, and all three proceeded to the Phillips Hotel, which is mear the Muchlebach Hotel, where she and George Kelly registered as R. G. Shannon and wife, and she recalls that LaRue registered as L. R. Lang, or Fern. Eathryn Kelly further described how George Kelly and LaRue kidneped a Mr. Woolverton, a wealthy manufacturer of South Bend, Indiana. (A letter from the Chicago Office, dated February 10th, sets forth that this kidnaping took place during February, 1932.)

Corroborative of the above information, attention is inwited to the Kansas City letter dated September 13, 1933, addressed to the Chicago Office, in the Kanmo Case, wherein it is noted that investigation conducted at Eanses City disclosed that an individual using the name "L. I. Lang", registered at the State Hotel, Lanses City, between the dates Mey 13, to 17, 1933. During the time of his stay at this hotel, he telephoned the local number, Harrison 6995, which developed to be a house of prostitution operated by Mrs. Mamie Hightower, alies Memie Goss. The Kansas City letter points out that Mrs. Hightower is an unreliable character, but she, however, after several interviews, finally identified the telephone call as being for one of the prostitutes at her house named Maxime Miller, whose true name is Mabel Mueller; that she has never seen the party who called Maxine, but that she understood that Maxine met this individual some time on or about April 15, 1933, when he was stopping at the Muchlebach Hotel, under some unknown alies; that Maxine later met him and spent the night with him at the State Hotel, at which time he refused to give her any money; that thereafter Mexine proceeded to

Chicago some time during July, 1933, and resided for a short time at the home of Josephine Myhart, 804 North Degrborn, telephone number Delsware 3789, Chicago, Illinois, but that Maxine has since departed from this address.

The Kanses City letter further reflects an interview with 1629 Central Avenue, Eanses City, Missouri, which is the same building occupied by Mrs. Hightower.

Bert Haycock of the telephone company, a former policeman, Kansas City, Missouri, Police Department, states that is a very reliable informant from whom he had obtained valuable information during his period of employment on the Kansas City, Missouri Police Department.

stated that she has known Maxine Miller for some time; that Marine is a close friend of William Weisman (one of the suspects in the Kanso case, who is closely associated with the criminal underworld of St. Paul, Minnesota); that Maxine inthat she is well acquainted with Louis formed her, Stacci, and that she formerly stayed at the O-P Inn in Chicago. further explained, during the interview with her, that the reasons for Maxine's hurried departure from Mansas City, was that she had "rolled" a man at the Phillips Hotel in Kansas City for the sum of \$150 and that the wictim of her dishonesty was a very close friend of John Lexia, a noted gangater politician of Kanses City. also furnished information which indicated that the man from whom Mexine stole the money is the same man with whom she had been in telephone communication while he was registered at the State Hotel. This is indicated by the fact that Mrs. Hightower, above referred to, mentioned that the men with whom Maxine associated had won \$400 at a gambling establishment operated by Freddie Stross, at Kansas City, and that Mad also further stated made reference to the same fact. that Marine is a very dangerous and treacherous woman, and that her entire game is that of "rolling" the men with whom she associates, but that she is well entrenched in the underworld gang in Chicago, with which Stacci is associated. Her home is in Dobuque, Iowa.

further stated that Maxine Miller told her that shortly after the murders committed at the Union Railway Station, at Kansas City William Weisman informed her before he left Kansas City that John Lasie and his gang had a part in the

actual shooting. Identified a photograph of Weisman which was exhibited to her, and stated she personally saw Weisman, together with three or four other men, in the apartment of Mrs. Hightower on the day which she recalls to have been June 16, 1933 (the day before the Kanses City shotting), but could not identify other photographs exhibited to her as being likenesses of other men in company with Weisman, and stated that she did not notice them as closely as she did Weisman. She stated, however, that Mrs. Hightower handles liquor and that the men in company with Weisman were purchasing liquor from her on the occasion when she sew them.

The Kansas City letter also contains this paragraph:

The situation in Kansas City is somewhat delicate politically, due to police connections with the John Laxis fection, and, therefore, very discreet action is being taken with reference to identification of the man at the Phillips Hotel who was presumably robbed by Maxine Miller.

The Kenses City letter also lists a number of long distance telephone calls made from the apartment of Mrs. Rightower which should be given careful consideration.

With reference to the letter from the Kansas City Office dated February 7, 1934, outlining the investigation to be made in connection with the Kansas City Massacre case, under section one, it is noted that attention is being given to the "Curly" angle. Briefly, en individual identified as "Curly" was seen to leave Chicago the day before the Kansas City shooting, according to information obtained by the Chicago Office from a confidential informant maxed

Three days after the Kansas City shooting, Dr. Farr, accompanied Eheriff Ton Bash to the Kansas City Office, and related how an underworld character, whom he had known during the past fifteen years solely by the name of "Curly" had approached him in Cas Welch's place on 15th Street, between Troost and Forest Avenues, and asked him if he wanted to make some ready cash, and upon being told that he was agreeable to the proposition "Curly" stated some gangster in the city had been wounded. Dr. Farr agreed to meet "Curly" later in Cas Welch's place, but in the meantime reported the matter to Sheriff Bash and in turn to the Kansas City Office, where it was arranged that Dr. Farr should meet "Curly" and render the medical

aid desired and then to immediately advise Sheriff Bash where he went and to whom he had rendered aid.

Dr. Farr met "Curly" in accordance with the appointment had with him and was advised that the plans had been changed; that the wounded man was being taken to Seminole, Oklahoma, the following morning (Jandary 21, 1933), where a negro doctor would take care of him temporarily, and that they would return him to Kensas City the following morning or Tuesday, in the event serious complications set in. "Curly" advised Dr. Farr that he could be reached over telephone Victor 6550, where he should simply ask for "Curly". This appears to be the Schuyler Hotel.

A letter from the Oklahoma City Office, dated June 29, 1933, addressed to the Kansas City Office, reflects that a letter dated June 21, 1933, was received from the Sheriff's Office at Chickesha, Oklahoma, containing information concerning a Cadillac Sedan, driven by an indiwidual giving the mame of "Lindsay", of Emmas City, Eissouri, who was referred to as a racketeer. It does not appear that investigation was made of this matter, although the Sheriff in his letter indicated suspicious circumstances concerning this car and its occupants. The letter from the Oklahoma City Office, dated January 13, 1934, addressed to the Kansas City Office, reflects that investigation at Chickasha, Oklahone, discloses that a green Cadillac Sedan, bearing Missouri tag numbers 313-398, and its occupants, had been in the vicinity of Chickesha, Oklahoma, from June 15 to June 25, 1933, as nearly as can be established by witnesses interviewed. Deputy Sheriff Al Marlow at Chickasha, places the date as June 14, 1933, when he was called to a residence two miles south of Chickasha to investigate a drunken driving charge, it being alleged that the operator of the above described seden was driving the car in a reckless manner. The car was driven to the residence of a Mrs. Belle Downey, and when the Sheriff arrived, the sedam was parked in front of the house. The owner of the car gave his name as George Lindsey, Jr.

Ers. Downey was interviewed by Special Agent T. M. Birch, whom he describes as being a very flashy woman, very indiscreet in her conversation, and under the influence of intoxicating liquors at the time she was interviewed. Hrs. Downey stated that Lindsey had married the daughter of her husband by a previous marriage, and that she had no use for the Lindsey family because of their underworld connections, and that she would certainly like "to see the law get them." Hrs. Downey places the date as June 15, 1933y when Lindsey

and his associates arrived at Chickasha, and stated that they had been on a drinking party. She also described the sedan as containing a recess back of the rear seat wherein two machine-guns, and a various assortment of pistols and ammunition were kept; that the drinking party at her house lasted until the night of June 16th, when George Lindsey received a telegram from Kansas City, and upon receiving this telegram he made several long distance calls from the McFarland Hotel, in Chickasha to Kansas City. Immediately upon making these telephone calls, George Lindsey announced that he and his two associates were going to Fort Worth and Dallas, departing about 8:00 e'clock; that Lindsey and his associates returned to Chickasha the morning of June 18, 1933, between 12:00 and 2:00 e'clock; that they slept all day and night; that during their stay they requested a magro boy, who lives mear her, to go to Chickasha and obtain all the papers, and their conversation seemed to center around the Kansas City Massacre.

Mrs. Downey's statement is corroborated by a mechanic at Chickasha named Bob Bostwick, or Boston, in that he states that the Cadillac Sedan, driven by Lindsey, was equipped with puncture proof tires, shatter proof glass throughout, and made the statement to Special Agent Birch that "no damn machine-gun could ever have burt anybody in that car".

An unsuccessful check was made of the telephone calls emenating from the McFarland Hotel on the might of June 17th. The Oklahoma City letter simply sets this information forth for what it is worth. It appears from this letter that considerable additional investigation should be conducted at Chickasha, relative to the above facts.

Returning to the corroboration of the statement made by Kathryn Kelly to Special Agent in Charge Lerson, reference is made to a letter from the Chicago Office, dated Hovember 13, 1933, addressed to the Kansas City Office, reflecting an interview had with Maxine Miller. She was interviewed by Special Agent J. J. Keating, in apartment 407, 1430 Borth Dearborn Street, Chicago, Illinois, where she was found to be resigning, and she stated that during the month of April, 1933, she met a Mr. Martin, who was a guest at the Muchlebach Hotel; that she took this man to a gambling establishment, sperated by Freddie Stross, of Eensas City, Missouri; that he claemed up the dice game with loaded dice; that because she was a sporting woman she stayed with him that night at the Stats Hotel; that on this occasion

Mr. Martin gave her \$20.00; that she later set this men again in Eansas City, Missouri, and that she visited his at the Phillips Hotel where she ascertained that he was registered under the name of L. E. Lang; that she stayed with his all might, and that on this occasion he refused to pay her, stating that he only had \$45. She stated that due to the fact that this individual appeared to be a "wise guy", while he was out of the room she ordered a quantity of cosmetics and other toilet articles and charged them to his bill.

A photograph of George Sates, one of the subjects in the Urschel Kidnaping Case, was exhibited to her for the reason that up to this time it was believed that L. R. Long was identical with Bates, but she stated that the party known to her as Martin, or Long, Sas not Bates.

She selected the photograph of Edward Doll, alias Eddie LeRue, as being identical with the individual known to her as Hertin or Lang. She also identified the photograph of William Welman, who beat her up in Esnass City, Missouri, during July, 1933, and steted that this individual at that time was living with a gambler named "Red Nard", in a double room at the President Motel, and that he was working in a gambling house at 1104 and 1106 Baltimore Avenue, Esnass City, taking bets; that this gambling establishment is mear the President Hotel; that Veissan is a close friend of Sammy Sadlow, who operates this gambling house, and that Sadlow would give no infermation relative underworld connections. She further advised that Salaman Follows the races very closely and may be found in Florida during the winter time.

Maxime Miller agreed to supply the Chicago Division Office with any information which she might obtain relative to the possible whereabouts of Beisman.

She also divised that she is a mative of Induque, Isra, but disclaimed any improblege concerning the Essass City Messagre core.

The above information is submitted for your consideration in connection with the efforts now being made to locate LaBue, as the principal suspect in the Bremer Ridmaping Once.

Dear Sir:

Kindly refer to Division letter of January 2, 1934, containing corments to the effect that the Division was disturbed over the handling of the case involving the massacre of peace officers in Hansas City, Missouri.

Recently, while I was in Washington, D.C., Assistant Director H. H. Clegg instructed me to endeavor to eliminate certain difficulties, which appeared to have developed during my recent absence on special assignment.

Today, I have directed two communications to the Division regarding the massacre case, which have outlined the developments in the past, and the procedure to be followed in the future. It will be appreciated, if the Division would give those two letters most careful consideration.

Personally, I was pleased at the action of the Division in having Special Agent Harold E. Andersen assigned to the direct supervision of the massacre case. It will be recalled that I personally requested the Director to assign Agent Andersen to the Kansas City office at the time I was transferred here, in order that he might work on that case. I have found that during the past two weeks, agent Andersen has developed a procedure to be followed in the future, which is logical and will probably bring this case to a logical conclusion at the earliest possible date.

Mr. Clegg advised me, while in Washington, that apparently some dissension had arisen between Special Agents W. F. Trainor and A. E. Farland, who have both been working on the case, and who have developed more or less opposing theories. I have found that Agent Andersen eliminated this by instructing Agent Farland to follow out his own leads, and by specifically directing all of the investigation himself.

For the information of the Division, it may be noted that Agent Trainor is practically indispensable in connection with future investigation. He has a most intimate knowledge of the massacre files, which are most voluminous. He has worked long hours and has the interest of the Division at heart in connection with this case. I realize that he may not have a balanced judgment at times, and that his efforts in the past have occasionally been somewhat misdirected. With Agent Andersen directing the investigation, however, I feel certain that Agent Trainor's services will be extremely valuable.

It will further be noted that Agent Farland has recently requested transfer to the New York City, or Foston, office, in view of the illness of his mother. It is my understanding that such requests are usually granted by the Division. In this specific case, if the transfer is granted, there cannot possibly be any further friction between the two Agents in question.

There has been a definite plan of procedure laid down in connection with the investigation of the massacre case, and I do not anticipate any particular disturbance over the handling of the same in the future.

I told him to defer this interview until the Agent could be released from Tampa.



Reed, Acting Special Agent in Charge, Charlette Office, Agent proceeded to Raleigh, Borth Caroling, and 1964 A.T. interviewed Chief of Police C. B. Barbour and Captain Brace of Company Poole, Police Department, in reference to above captioned Agent ject.

They stated that an automobile accident had occurred out on the Wake Forest Road about 2:50 that morning severely injuring S. E. Briggs of Washington, D. C., who was riding alone in a Ford Coupe and the two occupants of the other car, a "straight eight" Chrysler, involved, had fled from Raleigh. North Carolina. In the Chrysler car was found a varied assortment of burglar tools and clothing. They further informed agent they had been informed that W. R. Proctor, called "Pick", and subject, were the occupants of the Chrysler car

Opon the return of Ted Saddler to Releigh, North Carolina, he was picked up by local police and interviewed by Agent together with Captain Poole and Chief Barbour. After prolonged questioning, Saddler finally admitted that he had taken one of the man, unknown to him, resembling subject, to Petersburg, Virginia, and left him in the slum district and brought W. R. Proctor to a suburban district in Rocky Mount, North Carolina. Saddler finally agreed to accompany Agent with the officers to Petersburg, Virginia, and Rocky Mount, North Carolina, and point out the homes where he had taken these

at the time of the accident; that Ted Saddler, a local resident had taken these men in his automobile to Petersburg, Virginia.

proceeded to Petersburg, Virginia, where, with the sid of local officers and state police, the home of B. M. Bowman, 28 Jackson Street., Ettrick, Virginia, was raided and one Melvin Archer picked up and placed in jail. Archer was immediately recognized and identified by the local police. Agent questioned Archer, who admitted he was one of the occupants of the wrecked Chrysler car and there was no doubt about it from his appearance, as Archer had a fractured jaw, some teeth missing, and a badly lacerated chin.

Agents Levin and Smith of the Washington Field Office assisted in the raid and they questioned Archer.

Agent proceeded with Detective Poole and informant to Rocky Mount, North Carolina, where a second raid was made in Inglewood, a suburban district of this city. This reid resulted in the arrest of W. R. Proctor, Eugene Gunter and three somen. Proctor readily admitted he was an occupant of the Chrysler car involved in the accident. At the house where Proctor and Gunter were arrested; there was found a complete burglarizing outfit including three [8]. fruit jars and two packages of dynamite caps, some of which had been attached to fuses for immediate use together with balls of scap, a pint of nitro-glycerine, acetyline torches, four gas tanks, two automatic rifles, several pistols, cigarettes and clothing. In the garage a new Chrysler car, Imperial 8-motor #C. D. 4576, with 1954 Pennsylvania license plates, was found by the writer with officers. There was also a Ford Coupe, 1928 model, motor 💤 756865, in the 🧽 rear of this house. A check of the motor numbers with L. S. Harris. State Motor Vehicle Theft Bureau, Raleigh, North Carolina, revealed that the Chrysler car had been reported as stolen on December 14, 1935 at Southern Pines, North Carolina. As before mentioned, there were found about 25 cartoons of eigerettes in the home raided. "Agent questioned Proctor and Cunter: at length concerning their theft in Interstate Transportation without results, however. Writer noted that the cigarette cartoons were stamped "Penders" so apparently they were stalen within the State.

Agent, Detective Pools and two Emleigh Police officers accompanied Proctor in a police car from Rocky Mount, North Carolina, to Baleigh, Morth Carolina. During the trip, agent questioned Proctor concerning the theft of the two Chrysler cars. Proctor finally admitted that the cars were stolen in Southern Pines, North Carolina, and High Point, North Carolina, respectively. He denied he had driven either cars outside of the State of North Carolina, "Upon arrival in Releigh, agent obtained the motor #C. O. \$880 from the angine of the Chrysler Imperial eight 1955 model, which figured in the entemobile accident and checked said motor number with the State Motor Vehicle Theft Bureau, Baleigh, Morth Carolina, Mr. Harris of this Bureau, informed agent that this mar was reported stolen from L. A. Welsh, High Point, Morth Caroline, on September 31, 1933. At the time agent examined this car everything had been removed from car and impounded in the Sheriff's Office. However, agent was informed by Detective Bruce Pools, Police Department, Baleigh, North Carolina, that a varied collection of burglar tools and clothing comprised the loot found in this car.



and advised him to cooperate in every way with this Division of fine in connection with his efforts looking toward the capture of Floyd.

Captein Leahy was interviewed and said that he received information a short time ago that Floyd is going in and out of the building at 1819 Broadway. This is a large building owned and operated by the Manufacturers Trust Company, and the menager of the building is absolutely reliable. The building holds a number of liquor dealers and tenents with unenviable reputations. Captain Leaky said that in the building are Johnny Torrie, famed New York and Chicago gangster and liquor operator, Circ Terranova, the artichoke king and friend of Torrio, Pauly Amercia, bondsmen for "Dutch" Behultz. It is also observed from the telephone directory that Ryman Vogelstein, attorney for the alot machine interests, is also located in this building. Captain Leahy sold that the gang has beadquarters on the 12th and 22nd floors and that on the 22nd floor is the ecosern known as the Long Island Drug Company, which is a blind, and that on the other floor is located an Italian genealogist by the name of Margano. He said that photograph of Floyd, #3999, has been identified by the elevator operators as a person who ecces into the building once or twice a week and gets off at the E2nd floor, and that his most distinguished characteristic is the soft Southern drawl of his voice. Captain Leahy said that he received information from the manager of the building that Floyd came in around five o'clock Wednesday, February 21st, but the manager, was unable to get in touch with him; however, since that date he has had two men planted in the building in the office of the manager, and should the person who is supposed to be Floyd some in the building, they will be notified.

This information was immediately conveyed to the Agent in Charge and steps are being taken whereby this office will work in conjunction with the two detectives assigned to this building.

Agent communicated with Nr. J. E. Wykoff, Rochester Telephone Company, Lincoln Alliance Eark Euilding, Rochester, N. Y., and Nr. Wykoff stated that he would furmish said information but that it was to be understood that same was to be held in the strictest confidence as it might jeoperdize his interests if it were found that he was supplying said information without the use of a court order. The above are the only calls charged to said lines and, as Mr. Brantley had received all the numbers but the last one at the time of his visit, agent has not sent any memo. showing the call of 1-26-34. Agent, as directed by Mr. Brantley, will check said telephone records on a period of every two weeks unless instructions to the contrary are received from SAC Fay. Lee H. Cady has had no phone installed to date in his bone.

Agent made several attempts to interview Mr. Lee H. Cady, as instructed by SAC Brantley and said interview was accomplished recently.

Mr. Lee H. Cady stated that since last being interviewed by S.A.C. Brantley, he has received no communications from Dick Galatas, nor has he or his wife or her mother received any word from Dick's wife; that since the last interview, he and his wife have talked the matter over and have thought of every possible place where Dick might be and have always reached the same conclusion that he must be in Lexico or in some other warm climate, especially a place where there is horse-racing. Mr. Cady stated that both he and his wife based said decision upon the fact that in the cool fall days and early winter, Dick Galatas suffered from the cold in Detroit.

Mr. Cady also stated that on or about August 15, 1933, while living in Canisteo. N. Y., he received a package sent by himself at Springfield, Ill. to himself at Canisteo, N. Y., /not having mailed said package himself, he felt there was something irregular about it; that he opened the package up in the presence of the Postmaster in Canisteo, N. Y. and found therein a cashier's check in the amount of \$200.00 drawn on a Springfield, Ill. bank, name of bank unknown, and also a gift for Dick's mother, and a note indicating that said check was for her; that thereupon he mailed said check to Ers. Galatas in California but could not recall her address.

During this interview, Mr. Cady stated that one Clifford McKaig, a brother-in-law, lived in Bell River, Ont.; that Walter McFadden, brother-in-law, lived in Dresden, Ont.; that it was his understanding that Lew Connors drove Mrs. Galates and Mrs. McFedden to the train at the time they came to Canistee, N. Y., in 1933.

Mr. Cacy also stated that Dick Galates had two cousins, namely, Jules and Sidney Galates, who control the liquor business in Montgomery, Alabama, and operated stills in close proximity thereto, which stills are located in an isolated area, and, as he understands, have from time to time been used as a "hide-out" although he has no positive knowledge of same.

During the entire interview, Mr. Cady continuously expressed his willingness to cooperate in locating Dick Galetas. However, when asked any direct questions, he became very evasive and had convenient lapses of memory. However, he indicated that due to the Immigration laws, it was necessary for Mrs. McFadden to return to Canada and that it was his intention to drive her to Dresden, Ont., to Walter McFadden's home, during the latter part of February, at which time he would make inquiry of his wife's people in Canada to ascertain whether or not they have received any word from Dick's wife or from Dick; that he would also make discreet inquiry while in Detroit, where he intended to remain for approximately a week's time, and that, if interviewed at a later date, he would gladly furnish the writer with all the information which he possessed and, in conclusion, stated that he could think of no particular person with whom Dick or his wife might be communicating at the present time.

Mr. Cady indicated that he had advised his wife of the visit by agents of this Division, furnishing her with the reason for

said visit. However, the writer made no attempt to interview Mrs. Cady (sister of Mrs. Galatas) to date, due to the fact that specific instructions were given that she was not to be interviewed. However, the writer is of the belief that Mrs. Cady might be more willing to supply information which will tend to safeguard her sister, but she will not be interviewed unless specific instructions are received by the writer to interview her.

Postmaster Houston, Leroy, N. Y., stated that he had no additional information, but that he will continue to cover all mail to the Cady and Rabcock femilies, sending said reports daily to the New York office.



Reference is made to a telegram from the St. Paul office to this office, dated February 27, 1934, requesting that specimens of handwriting other than eignatures be obtained of Volney Davis, Arthur (Doc) Barker, and Harry Campbell.

Please be advised that search of the files in the Oklahoma State Penitentiary failed to show any handwriting of these individuals other than signatures.

The office of the Parole and Pardon Attorney, state of Oklahoms, has a record on Davis and Doe Barker. Pive letters written by Davis, when he was in the McAlester State Penitentiary, were found in this file, were borrowed, with the promise that they would be returned, and are transmitted herewith. These letters were receipted for and should be parefully preserved as it was definitely requested that they be returned when they have served their purpose.

The records of the Pardon and Parole Attorney do not disclose any specimens of handwriting of Arthur (Doc) Barker other than signature. I am transmitting herewith three perole reports purporting to bear his signature; one for February, 1933, rendered February 27, 1933 at Beosho, Missouri and witnessed by M. M. Roley, S. A. Keller and G. E. Barker, and in this parole report Doc Barker states that he was employed sixteen days during that month by S. A. Keller at Neosho, Missouri. Another for March, 1933, rendered at Neosho, Missouri, with the return address, Box 174 of that town, deted March 28. 1933. In which he stated that that would be his address indefinitely and that for eighteen days he worked for different parties as a common laborer at \$1.50 per day, and witnessed by Jack Ziller and Rannie Farmer. The third report is for January, 1934, rendered at Neosho, Kissouri, return address Post Office Eox 174 of that town. dated January 30, 1934, in which he states that he will be at this address indefinitely, and that he has worked twenty days for different

parties as a common laborer and has carned \$54.00. It is witnessed by Jack Ziller and Mrs. Rannie Fermer.

Application for Banishment Parole bearing two signatures of Doc Barker was obtained from the records of the Pardon Attorney's office and also an Application for Clemency, dated June 16, 1931, bearing two signatures of Doc Barker was obtained at the Pardon Attorney's office and are transmitted herewith.

There was found in the file of Dot Barker at the Pardon Attorney's office a letter dated February 14, 1934, written at Heceho, Missouri, and signed George E. Barker, address Post Office Box 174, Necaho, requesting that some parole report blanks for his son, Dot Barker, be forwarded. A similar letter, dated March 28, 1935, signed George E. Barker, Post Office box 174, was obtained. There is nothing to indicate that these letters are in the handwriting of Dot Barker and are not being transmitted herswith.

You will recall that the latent prints which have been identified as Frank Hash's on said beer bottle were submitted to the Division by the St. Paul Police Department, and under date of June 25, 1955, you sent me a Western Union telegram reading,

"Letent fingerprint submitted by St Paul Police is connection with kidnaping identified through single fingerprint file as right thumb print of Frank Hash"

On the etrength of this telegram, I am extra I did not notify the St. Paul Police Department. I am under the impression, however, that I received a telephone call from the Division on the same date, informing us of the same facts, and if I am not mistaken, I was instructed to advise the St. Paul Police Department of this fact and I find that two telephone calls were made between the St. Paul office and the Division on the Eard day of June, 1983. At any rate, I can cafely state that unless I had specific instructions from the Division to inform the St. Paul Police Department of the identification of the fingerprint in question, that they were not motified by me, but I am almost certain that telephonic instructions were to the effect to notify the St. Faul Police of the identification.



One B. B. Clark of 3665 East 9th otreet, Eansas City, Missouri, telephone Benton 3272, called at this office this morning advising that he believed he could possibly help in the location and apprehension of Charles A. (Pretty Boy) Floyd and others.

Clark stated that he was formerly a trackman of the Union Pacific Reilroad, but at the present time had been laid off; further stating that his wife, an Indian, had a sister, who married Rd manders, canders being a cousin of Ford Bradshaw. Clark further stated that Charles Cuttner's wife is the second cousin of Clark's wife.

Last week end Clark and his wife were visiting relatives in Oklahoma and vicinity and from Friday, February 16, 1934, to funday, February 18, 1934, Clark and his wife were at the home of Ed fanders which is located about five or mix miles northeast of McKey, Oklahoma, the point being between McKey and Marble City, Oklahoma, access to a map to Oklahoma was furnished Clark and he indicated that in going to the fanders home one would go north out of faliass, Oklahoma, on highway \$17 to a point shortly prior to the road which turns to the west for Box, Oklahoma. The fanders farm home being located on \$17 highway. Fanders gets his mail out of the rural route from Vian, Oklahoma.

Clark further stated that he was at this home on faturday night, February 17, 1934, when the officers were in that vicinity endeavoring to apprehend Ford Bradshaw. Likewise Clark stated that Bradshaw was nearby and waited until the officers had gone and then departed.

Clark states that Pretty Boy Floyd frequently comes to that vicinity, further stating that Charles Cuttner, above named, frequently accordates and travels with Floyd. The Cuttner home is in the same vicinity as the funders home.

Clark advised that on February 13, 1932, he had been mentenced to the United States Penitentiary at Leevenworth, Kanmas, from the United States District Court at Kanmas City, Missouri, in connection with having made whiskey and that he served five months and twenty days in that penitentiary and was released. He states that he had been mixed up with some Italians in Kanmas City making whiskey and the Federal rentance resulted.

Clark further stated that the fact that he had served time in the peritentiary for this charge was known to the relatives of his wife in the vicinity of reliesw. Oklahoms, and hence they would trust him. He advised that Ed Canders had been endeavoring to get him to come to his farm in order to engage in farming and accordingly he, Clark, believed he would go to the remers' farm, together with his wife, and could effect the location and apprehension of Ford Bradehaw and Protty Boy Floyd. He remarked that in the event he had opportunity to make an attempt to effect these apprehensions he desired to work by himself with his wife as he know that the theriff at faliusw. Oklahoms, whose name is not known to him, protected Floyd and would not cause Floyd's apprehension.

As this office is not in possession of information resulting from the recent drive by "tate offices and agents from your office in Cookson Bills in Oklahome to apprehend Floyd and others, the above information is being passed along to you for your consideration. In the event the information you have at hand might give rise to the possible advisability of using Clark near Calisas as an informant, please, inform me. Further contact with Clark will await a reply from your office to this letter.

Agent Escertained through Chief of Police Sharpe of Duncan, Oklahoma that one F. E. Barden, reporter for the Duncan Banner, wrote this article. Barden was called to the Police Station and there interviewed by Chief Sharpe and this Agent, as a result of which, he admitted that he had no real evidence to substantiate his article; that he sariously regretted having published same; that should he at any time, receive any information as to La Davis' whereabouts, he would immediately either notify Chief of Police Sharpe or the Oklahoma City Division office. In Barden explained that he had only been in Duncan a very short time, and that he heard these rumors and believed that they were true, and based his article upon same; that he realizes now the unsoundness of his information. A clipping of this article is being forwarded to the Division with their copies of this report.

The Oklahoma City Division office file contains a memorandum submitted by Special Agent T. M. Birch January 22, 1934, to the effect that Percy. Tence and George Nichols, uncles of Eva Mae Nichols who was in the house with Wilbur Underhill when he was recently apprehented at Shawnee, Oklahoma, had a Browning machine rifle in their possession, and the memorandum points out that possibly there was some connection between Underhill and the Nichols boys.

Ed Davis, Stephens county phantors bandit, is taking the last great rap deathslowly and with no chance for escape. Use Duncan Banner learned late yesterday on excellent authority.

Davis is in the grip of a foe he esamot fight. His machine gun, his automatic platols, and the other implements of his calling, banditry, are of no avail. It isn't a task of shooting his way out—not any more.

A disease of long standing has made guth inroads upon his health that he cannot hope to live more than a few months longer. A the most.

Ironically, Davis is dying in a tiny shack not far from the place where his first known murder, the slaying of J. R. Hill. Mariow, occurred, ending his life of grimp where it officially started.

He faces death in darkness. He can't see the bandit pals, who, true to the code of the underworld, are nursing him in his last ill-

The disease has already cost him the gight of one eye and the other is dimmed. He can't have expert medical aid. With

out those eyes he cannot resort to a bank sobbery to obtain the money necessary to get attention that would ease the last few weeks of his life.

Petty crime is also "out." His face is too easy to recognize. Officers everywhere have it indelibly stamped upon their minds.

Davis is probably the most easy to identify of all the bandits who have occupied the arine spoilight during the past decade.

: His squint eyes, set close together, his long nose and cruel mouth set him aside from other men. To see him is to recognize him, afficers say.

If he pulls a "job," he must be ready to get away quickly. He must have pals who will whisk him swiftly from the scene of his grime.

Those pals aren't the type to work with a months ago and tak alipping bandit. They'll take care of him, if 'remained at large. they can, but they won't help him pull a job. Brady is again out. The risk is too great for them.

In the case of Day

Reither will they share loot they obtain themselves. The law of the underworld won't permit it. A bandit must be "in" on a job if he is to share in the illicit profits.

Davis couldn't live with even the best of medical attention. He is paying the har way for his life of banditry and carousal.

A slow, sertain death, inevitable, is at the end of that long drams which reached it anti-climax when he killed a Marlow office and was sent to the "big house" at McAleste for life—and reached its climax, when, after escaping from the Oklahoma pen, he "wer up" in Kansas and then participated in the Memorial Day break from Lansing last year

In that hardy crew were such men as Wilbur Underhill, who died at McAlester of bullet wounds received from officers at Shawnee, Bob Brady and others.

The fact Brady is now at large, after breaking from the same prison, is ironibrady was recaptured in New Mexico severy months ago and taken back to prison. Davis remained at large. Now, Davis is dying an Brady is again out.

In the case of Davis, disease is accomplisting an end sought fruitlessly by officers for almost a year.

The facts in this case have been investigated by the Division and the results of the investigation have been properted to the appropriate United States Atterney, who rendered the opinion that the case was not a proper one for presention in the Federal Courts. Ser. J. W. Ellis, who at the present time is residing at 5013 Purkway, Fairfield, Birmingham, Alabama, where he is temporarily living with his einter, Mrs. P. Molielley, his home being at 10 Highland Place, Pueblo, Colorado, called at the Birmingham Office.

Obstruction for the var Department, but has been on furlough for the pest one and enc-half years. In August, 1932 he went to Not Springs, Arkansas, where he stopped at the Virginia Hotel, and about a month and a helf later he met a man known to him as L. W. Brownia. Shortly after becoming acquainted with Arcania, the latter suggested that they go into the restaurant business, and when Ellis stated that he only had \$75.00, Brownia said that he could get enough espital, and that Ellis would not have to worry about that part of it. Thereafter they opened the Daytons Dining Room located at 732 Central Avanua, in Not Springs. This building was rented from one of them it was. He stated that while he himself had no experience in the restaurant business, Brownia was an experienced man and the business flourished for several months thereafter.

During the time this business was in speration Ellis stated that he noted that frequently various women salled on Brownie and also a musber of men; that they held frequent conferences, and that he often saw Brownie thereafter in passession of sonsiderable amounts of money. He also said that Brownie redeived a good many long distance telephone salle, most of them coming from Chicago. He also stated that while he did not know it at the time, that Frank Reah frequently ate at this restaurant, and that Calatae also was a frequent customer there.

Ellis claims that on the day that Nach was apprehended, he was within twenty or thirt; passes of the White Front Cigar Store, and that at that time he heard it discussed that Mach has been kidneyed, inging that

he did not know Mash at that time, but that some by-stander had described the man who had been allegedly kidneped, eaying that from the description he recognized this man as the person that he had frequently seen in the restaurant, and that he returned to that place and told Brownie about it, the latter becoming greatly excited. About a month after that time, Brownie left the restaurant without saying where he was going, and Ellis elaims that he has heard nothing else about him, with the result that the restaurant failed. Ellis stated that Brownie was supposed to have lived with a kirs. Murray on Chapal Street at Bot Springs, and that this woman knows Brownie very well, incomes as the latter has spent the greater part of his life in Hot Springs. Ellis claims to know nothing else about Brownie's past history.

A man named Joe Debuen alias Joe Cunico alias Joe Philips was employed by Brownie for a while at the Daytons Pining Room, being employed in the especity of a cook, staying there for only about a month, when he went to work at the Mountain Valley Hotel on the south side of Hot Byrings. Ellis says that he believes that Debugs was placed at this hotel by Brownie for the purpose of getting a line on a rich Irishman who owns the botel property, and who was to be a vistim in a kidnaping case. He claims that bedoze asked him to go in on the kidnaping of this man. These plans, according to Ellis, were in the process of formation at the time that Each was taken into exetody, with the result that they dropped these plans.

Ellis claims that his resear for esting to this office to furnish this information is that while he was at Hot Springs he become acqueinted with Dr. Davis from Espfolk, Ta., and the latter's wife, baving not then easually when they were at Hot Springs, and having become acquainted since he himself had worked at langley Field and was able to talk about Virginie with Dr. Devis and his wife. Milis also mentioned that his chief duty in connection with the operation of the restaurant was to solicit busimess, inviting enstoners to cat in the cafe, with the result that Dr. Davis and his wife came there on several escapions and he made the Dostor and his wife acquainted with Brownie. Ellis claims that he told Dr. Davis to be on the elect for confidence men, but Brownie apparently made the Doctor and his wife acquainted with accord confidence men, who thereafter flooded the Doctor out of nime thousand dollars. This flooring, secording to Ellis, took place at Little Rock, but he says he is not acquainted with any of the details, insemuch as he never see Doster Devis after this affair took place and knows of it only through nonspaper stories. $oldsymbol{...}$ He said that insamuch $oldsymbol{sa}_{...}$ he himself perhaps is responsible for Dr. Davis being flaced out of this money, he feels that if the new has any information that may be of assistance in apprehending Galatas, that he would like to furnish it to the proper authorities.

Debece and Brownie, according to Ellis, are very alse, and he believes that they might be togother at this time. Brownie, according to Ellis, is very well acquainted with Goldtes as well as all other sonfidence men and erooks who have headquarters at Hot Springs. Debece at the present time is located at Terrell, Terms, where he is employed by the Palace Cafe. Ellis said that he has written to Debace an several occasions with a view to learning the present whereabouts of Brownie, but that Pebace within the past month or two had written him stating that he had not seen Brownie for a few months, when the latter stopped in the Cafe with several people and when they were driving a car bearing a Corpus Christi licence tag.

Ellis brought to the Birmingham Office, portions of this letter from Doboce, which are attached hereto and which were received by Ellis in an envelope postmarked Terrell, Terms, Jennery 16, the portion of this letter attached hereto being as follows:

"Ellis I wish you would do me this fevor. Inclosed you will find some letters addressed to some friends of mine and I wish you would mail them for me out of your town, and if I should get an answer, please forward them back to me here. I'll appreciate very mach.

"Some day you and me are going to open up a small cafe consciore, we aren't whipped yet. The cafe business over us a living and we will get it.

"With best luck and wishes of the seemen to put,

Ellis said that he received with this latter several letters that were already addressed to other persons, and which he mailed in Birmingham in accordance with Debaca's request. He stated that he did not recall to whom these letters were going. He stated that aimse receiving this letter he received a similar request from Debaca. He further stated that should be

receive any more such requests he will bring the letters to the Mirminghem office where they can be seen before he mails them. He also said that Debace has received no mail at his address in response to these letters.

Elis further slaims that there were many other med and somen who were calling on Brownie, but that he is unable to describe them, other than to say that there was one women named Mildred Grout, with whom he has corresponded at Route fl, Box 688, Hemphis, Tennessee, there she is supposed to be staying at the present time with some man, whom she refers to as John. Ellis said that he has also written to this women at Consersal Delivery in Memphis, also at R.F.D./S4, Memphis. This women at Consersal Delivery in Memphis, also at R.F.D./S4, Memphis. This women, according to Ellis, is very close to Brownie. Ellis described this women as being thirty years ald, 5'8", 160, dark hair. The man with her when she calls John he described as being 6' tall, weighing 145, thirty years of age, alim build. He described L. S. Brownie as being forty years of age, 5' tall, weighing 150, medium build, having brown hair and brown eyes. Debace he described as being about thirty-five years of age, 5'7", 160; , dark early hair, with dark eyes.

Mr. Ellis further stated that he contemplates taking a trip to Not Springs, Arkensas, some time in the near future, and that it is his intention at that time to make inquiries among various persons with a view to assertaining the present whereabouts of Galatas. He stated that he would enjoy cooperating with this Division.

The writer was mable, from the conversation with Ellis, to attach any particular significance to the information that he was furnishing. The Birminghom files on this case reveal no information economing any of the persons that Ellis munticase, other than Galetas and Sack, of course.

It is not known if Ellis is so well acquainted with Est Springs as he claims, but he mentioned Mayor Lockwood and Dutch akers, and in general stated that the Police Department, as well as the City Officers were grouked and were controlled by a man named Jacobs, whom he described as a Joy from St. Louis, who is a gambler.

Copies of this letter are being sent to the Oklahom City and Palles: Offices for their information, in the event that the Earses City office desires to check any of this data. Mr. Allie has stated that he would not leave Birmingham until he had called at the Birmingham office prior thereto. If the Earses City Office desires that Ellie to interregated along any particular line, it will be appreciated if it will advise.

Elis was shown photographs of various subjects in this case and he identified the photograph of Galatas as that of the man that he had frequently seen in the Daytone Cofe, saying also that he had seen Galatas around town on numerous instances, but Ellis had no knowledge of

the Cadillac Loden or Ford Coscot that Gallas is supposed to have omed, according to reports in this file. He also said that he did not know where Galatas lived in Not Oprings, mentioning that it is very possible that he would be there at this time, in view of the numerous rooming houses that are located there and where he could be readily conscaled.

Afforts were also made to determine if Ellis was seeking a job as an informant, but he would make no definite statements in this respect, saying that he expects to secure work shortly with the mar hepartment.

There is transmitted herewith one photograph of the cartridge case showing the breach and pin impression of the bullet fired from Thompson sub-machine gun bearing serial No. 1655, also a similar photograph of the cartridge fired from Thompson sub-machine gun No. 2232. These photographs were furnished by Merle A. Gill, Forensic Ballistician here, who has made a comparison between the cartridges and bullets in question with the evidence bullets obtained in the Union Station Plaza case here. Mr. Gill has rendered a report under date of February 28, 1934, advising that a comparison of the above mentioned bullets indicates that there is no connection between those obtained from the guns at Baltimore, Maryland and those used in the Union Station Plaza massacre.

He further stated has acted as an informant to the Chief of Police in Quincy and that in the opinion of Mr. Adolph, Chief of Police Connery is the proper person to determine whether Floyd is actually calling at 522 N. 2nd St. Mr. Molph stated that Chief Connery is presently in New Orleans, La. and will return to Quincy on Feb. 20, 1934; that if an agent will call upon Chief Connery at that time this matter will be given proper attention. He stated that in the meantime he will not mention this investigation to anyone.

Asst. U. S. Attorney Marks Alexander, Springfield, Ill., a former resident of Quincy, Ill., advised Agent Norris that Chief of Police Connery is entirely reliable and considered highly efficient.

The following investigation was conducted by Special Agent R. L. Fagan, Charlotte, North Carolina:

Agent Fagan interviewed R. E. Boster, Station Agent, Gloson, North Carolina, who advised that one W. A. Hughes, representing himself to be a Special Agent of the Railway Express Company, Inc., at 8:05 A. M., on February 13, 1934, got off the south-bound Seaboard train at Gibson, and went into the railway express office and demanded a package, stating that the package was sent to D. D. Roughton; that this package bore the word "pistol", was a pine-wood box, two feet long, five inches wide and three inches thick; that Hughes stated his territory as a Special Agent is South Carolina, and that he is checking up on guns being shipped in that territory; that Hughes said this gun was used in a \$250,000.00 robbery out West.

Mr. Doster further advised Agent Pagen that Hughes signed a receipt for this package, signing *D. D. Roughton by W. A. Hughes*; that the package was sent from Richmond, Va., by Frank Roughton, on January 18, 1934; that a charge of thirty-seven cents was paid by Hughes for the package.

Mr. Doster said that Hughes presented some credentials that looked "phoney" to him; that these credentials stated that Hughes is a "Special Agent of the Railway Express Company."

Mr. Doster said that he became suspicious, and after Hughes had left and gone on in the south-bound train, he (Doster) called the station at McColl, South Carolina, and had the train conductor check up on Hughes; that the conductor notified him that Hughes was travelling on a Seaboard Air Line annual pass.

The following description of Hughes was given by Station Agent Doster to Agent Fagan of the Charlotte office:


Agent Fagan telked to Chief of Police Williams, who advised that he had heard nothing about the above until Mr. Fagan brought it to his attention.

The following investigation was conducted by Special Agent L. O. Carver of the Charlotte office.

Agent Carver interviewed Mr. A. Morrell, an Agent of the Railway Express Agency, Inc., Charlotte, North Carolina, who advised that W. A. Hughes is an Agent of the Agency at Columbia, South Carolina; that he rides on an annual pass of the Seabcard. Air Line, as well as other railways, and that it is his duty to confiscate pistols under proper circumstances. Mr. Worrell advised Agent Carver that he had written to Mr. Hughes at Columbia, South Carolina, and had been advised by telephone that Mr. Hughes did confiscate the pistol at Gibson, North Carolina, as shown, and that the pistol was an old one, and so far as he knew, had no gangland history, as alleged in the newspaper item.

Hughes, Reilway Express Agency, Inc., Columbia, South Carolina, who advised that the newspaper article above referred to reported events that were figments of some one's imagination. He stated that in his capacity as Special Agent of the Railway Express Agency, Inc., he has recently been trying to check on some thefts, particularly of guns, over the railway lines in North Carolina and South Carolina; that he had a gun shipped from Richmond, Virginia, to Gibson, North Carolina, and that he allowed the gun to remain in the express office at Gibson, North Carolina, for two weeks as a part of his plan to trap whoever was guilty of stealing this type of merchandise. He stated that on February 13, 1934, he was travelling on the south-bound train passing through Gibson, Morth Carolina, and got off that train for a few minutes and picked up the package involved in this case. He stated that he said nothing to the Railway Agent at Gibson, North Carolina, which might support the statements made in the newspaper article; that the only thing he had said with reference to the gun was that it "had a history", and that he had made no particular reference to the Kansas City Massacre or to any particular criminal event.



Agent Hansen was present at the time Underbill was captured, and observed upon numerous occasions the damage done to this house and can state that the respective repairs as listed are needed, but, of course, he has no idea as to whether the estimate made by Roark for each of these repairs is reasonable.

Mr. McKinnis, Sr. advised that the charge of \$125.00 for inside decoration is for filling up the holes with plaster and either recalcimining or repapering the entire inside of the house which would be necessary, he said, in view of the fact that every room has been damaged with bullet holes, and it would be necessary to refinish the entire room where any patches were made over holes.





In the file of the above case you will find claims from the Shawnes hunicipal Hospital for the payment of certain hospital bills and medical expenses in connection with the capture of Wilbur Underhill. I tried to arrange some way to pay these bills before I left there but it seems it will be difficult insignath as more of those for whom charges were made were Federal prisoners at the time.

I took up the mitter of the payment of the bills for Wilber Underhill with the State Board of Affairs, W.C.Bughes, Chairman, and who indicated that they would probably take favorable action. The matter had not been decided up to the time I left Oklahoma City. For your information I attach hereto copy of a letter which I have just received from S.K.Brown, Warden of McLlester Penitentiary, in which he advises that Governor Murray has stated he would O.K. the payment of the bills insofar as Wilber Underhill was exmeerned. There is also attached copy of a letter received from Miss Johnnie Leta Henry, Superintendent of the Shawnee Bunicipal Hospital, on the same subject. These communications are transmitted to you for your full information in the premises.

Most certainly every effort should be made to liquidate these debts. The Division is morally responsible as immediately following the battle with Underhill these wounded persons had to be taken core of and inamenth as the battle was the result of our own astivity and not at the instance of state efficers, I had to assume responsibility for the hospital bills. This matter was put up to me by the City Hanager of Shawness at the time and I had to state that they might look to the Government for the expense.







Reference is made to a letter from the New Orleans office, dated February 19, 1934, to the Kansas City office in this case, a copy of which was furnished the Oklahoma City office. The letter referred to an interview had by Special Agent L. A. Kindell of the New Orleans office at Shreveport, Louisiana on February 17, 1934, with W. B. Graham, a private detective with the Burns International Detective Agency, concerning Richard T. Celetas, subject of I. C. 1888.

Agent Chipman the is stationed at Little Rock, arkeness to copies at once with Graham, who epends much of his time at Little Rock, Arkeness and wicinity. Agent Chipman informed me that he had learned that Sphham tould be located at the Eard Hotel in Pt. Smith, Arkansas

Special Agent Smith was in the vicinity of Ft. tested Graham there on February 22, 1934. Graham stated to Agent Smith that about the time it was getting dark on the evening of February 17, 1934, he was standing on the street in Hot Springs, talking with a hi-jacker: and an ex-convict whose name he would not give, and that while standing on this . street, he chestved a short, stocky ama, time haven and roughly dressed, leaving a small car which he had just driven up and parted at the curb. He did not describe the sar; that as this short, stocky san left the car, the hijacker remerked, "There is your man, Galates"; that he, Grahem, shadowed the one who was pointed out to the Neukeaks Hotel, and that this man entered a ride extrance of the hotel, passed through the lobby and on into an elevator, but did not register; that he, Graham, remained on watch at the hotel and that approximately one-half hour later, placing the time at about 8:30 p. m., he observed this same man enter the lobby of this hotel from the elevator; that he had been shaved, his hair had been cut, and that he was meatly attired in a tuxedo, wearing a black overcoat with a velvet collar, and wearing a derby hat; that this man then went to the Kingsway Hotel where be

entered the bellroom and damed for some time, and upon empleting his dancing, he left the Kingsway Rotel in company with a bumb of Jews, and that time was not wearing a hat; that this mm, in company with these Jews, went to the Arlington Hotel where he remined for a longer period of time, and that he never new him leave the Arlington Hotel. Grahm told Agent Emith that he readily identified this individual as Galatas from his photograph.

Greham stated to Agent Smith that his hi-jacker informer told him that Calains, when not in Chicago, was stopping at a camp home on lake Hamilton near Hot Springs, which is award by one Clark of Hot Springs, who is associated with a man by the name of Malaughlin, who is a brother of the Mayor of Hot Springs.

Mr. Graham told Agent Smith, in much detail, of the line-up and activities of the underworld in Hot Springs, and stated that the underworld received protection from the local offices, etc. Graham spoke very disparagingly of the Chief of Detectives, Dutch Abars of Hot Springs, but stated that the Chief of Police at Hot Springs was in every respect dependable and trustworthy, adding that Galatas has the elet machine concessions in Hot Springs, and would have a number of concessions at the coming recetrack meet there.

Agent Smith stated that at the time he interviewed Graham the latter was wearing two large automatic pistols, fastened in shoulder straps, and two large-calibre frontier pistols in holsters attached to his belt, and had in his room a shotgum and a high-powered rifle.

It is noted from the letter from the New Orleans effice to the Kanass City office, referred to, that Graham told Agent Kindell that Galatas was lecated at a lodge on Lake Catherine sear Het Springs, and it is further observed that the interview with Agent Kindell took place on February 17, 1934, and that Graham told Agent Smith that he made all of these observations in Hot Springs on the evening of February 17, 1934.



MEMORANDU

On June 17, 1933 at Kansas City, Missouri, there was perpetrated a massacre resulting in the death of Special Agent Raymond J. Caffray of this Division, Chief of Police Otto Reed of McAlester, Oklahoma, Officers William J. Grooms and Frank B. Mermanson of the Kansas City Police Department when a group of machine gunners attempted to free a motorious eriminal, Frank Mask. Mask was also killed.

There was assembled a large group of photographs of suspects and smong the suspects were the photographs of a number of convicts, who under the leadership of Sarvey Sailey and Bilbur Underbill, escaped from the State Penitentiary at Leasing, Kennes on Bay 30, 1933. Included in this group was one Ed Davis, who, according to the records of this Division, began his criminal activities in 1919 when as Ed Davis, #2188, he was received at the State Reformatory at Granits, Oblahoma, for the crime of burglary, sentenced to two years.

On January 23, 1923, as 2d Davis, \$12750, he was received at the State Penitentiny, McAlester, Oklahoma for the crime of robbery, to serve a sentence of ten years. On August 3, 1931, as 2d Davis, \$24253, he was received at the State Penitentiary at McAlester, Oklahoma for the erime of murder, to serve a sentence of life imprisonment. So escaped from this institution on May 26, 1932 and, as George Allen, was arrested by the Chariff at Bevada, Missouri on June 17, 1932, together with Jim Clark and Bob Samper as the perpetrators of a bank robbery at Fort Scott, Emans. For this offense, as 2d Davis, \$2987, he was partenced to the State Punitentiary at Lansing, Kansas, to serve a life sentence. He again escaped May 30, 1933, as above related.

Although Davis was not indicted in connection with the murders committed at Ienses City, Missouri, his apprehension has been sought by this Division for questioning in connection with that case.

Telegraphic information received from the Los Angeles Office of the Division reflects that this individual has been taken into custody there on robbery charges.

C. to the effect that Charles Arthur Floyd, alias Pretty Boy Floyd, I.O. #1194 had, at approximately 2:30 a.m. on February 18, 1934, been seen near Baleigh, N. C. and that the car in which he was traveling, namely a Chrysler Sedan bearing M.C. tage 109828 had figured in an accident and that Floyd and his companion had immediately thereafter contacted one Ted Saddler of Raleigh, N. C. who had driven these two individuals probably to Petersburg, Virginia. Information was also furnished that Baddler was driving a 1933 Plymouth Coach bearing N.C.

tags # PD 13782; further that in the wrecked Chrysler was found a set of 1933 Virginia license tags 186684. Special Agent in Charge Reed also advised that Pretty Boy Floyd was probably in the company of an individual known as W. R. Proctor alias Pick. He also furnished information to the effect that Ted Saddler had wired his wife at Baleigh, N. C. from Petersburg, Wa. in the early hours of February 18, 1934 the contents of the message not being known. It is, of course, understood that the informant of Chief of Police Barbour of Raleigh, N. C. claimed that the individual traveling with Proctor was Pretty Boy Floyd. This is the only indication that this individual was Pretty Boy Floyd.

In connection therewith, Special Agent M. D. Traub submitted a memorandum advising that he had contacted Charles Burnham, Auto Squad, Datective Bureau, Baltimore, Maryland Police Department and had placed the data with respect to the Plymouth Coach driven by Ted Saddler on the teletype to all police districts at Baltimore and had broadcast the information to all radio cars in Baltimore. Also, Agent Traub notified the Maryland State Police through Newton Pavese she advised Agent Traub that he would furnish all of this information to the Maryland State Police sub-stations.

Special Agent R. E. Smith and the writer proceeded to Petersburg. Virginia and there contacted Chief of Police W. W. Jefferson who had previously been informed by Special Agent in Charge Keith of the developments at Raleigh. Chief Jefferson had advised Special Agent in Charge Keith that he was aware of the developments, having received a long distance telephone call from Chief of Police Barbour at Raleigh, N. C. Upon interview Chief Jefferson advised that he had personally after receipt of the information from Chief Barbour, checked all of the hospitals in Petersburg and that his men had checked all of the hotels but without results as to the location of Pretty Boy Moyd. In addition. Chief Jefferson advised that he had accertained through one confidential source that Ted Saddler had sent a telegram to his wife at Raleigh. M.C. at 5:50 a.m. on February 18, 1934 from the Norfolk and Western Railway Depot at Petersburg, this telegram stating in substance that he, Seddler, was proceeding to Richmond, Virginia and would be back (meaning to 🐇 Raieigh, N.C.) early that same day. Chief Jefferson requested that no attempt be made to secure more detailed information as to this telegram and his wishes were complied with. This information was immediately

telephoned to Special Agent R. P. Burruss at the Hashington Field Diffice.

Agents then proceeded to Richmond, Va. and there contacted Lieutenant Nickolas of the Virginia State Police, explaining the situation to him. He advised that the hospitals and hotels in Richmond, Va. had been thoroughly checked for recent arrivals answering the description of Pretty Boy Floyd but that these attempts had been unsuccessful.

...

At the office of the Virginia State Police, Agents were edvised by Special Agent R. P. Burruss that Ted Saddler had been apprehended at Raleigh, N. C. and had consented to accompany efficers of the Raleigh Police Department and an Agent of this Division back to Petersburg for the purpose of pointing out the house to which he had delivered the individual he claimed to resemble Pretty Boy Floyd. Lieutenant Nickoles furnished a detail of men and at 9:40 pem. Special Agent D. M. Jordan attached to the Charlotte Division Office, arrived at the Petersburg Police headquarters in company with Ted Saddler and Chief of Detectives Poole of the Raleigh Police Department.

The writer accompanied Saddler, Agent Jordan, Captain Poole and Detective Beasley of the Petersburg Police Department on a tour of inspection. Saddler pointed out the home of one S. F. Bowman as being she place to which he had delivered the person resembling Pretty Boy Floyd. Mecessary precautions were taken and a search of the house was made. There an individual named Melvin Archer was taken into custody of the Petersburg Police. This is the individual Saddler delivered there earlier in the day. It was obvious at a glance that this individual was not Pretty Boy Floyd.

Archer was taken to Petersburg Police headquarters where he was questioned at length and in detail by Agent Smith and the writer in an attempt to obtain information with respect to the Chrysler Seden bearing N. C. tags 109828 in which he was riding and which figured in the accident at about 2:30 a.m. near Raleigh, N. C. on February 18, 1834. He repeatedly claimed that he had secured a ride with the driver of this car who was unknown to him at Fayetteville, N. C. and that he was unable to furnish the name of the driver. He further slaimed that it was the first time he had ever been in the Chrysler Seden and that he had no knowledge of an individual named W. R. Proctor alies Pick.

In the course of the conversation with Virginia State Policeman J. C. Aaron it was ascertained that 1933 Virginia license plates

#186684 which had been found in the Chrysler Seden at the sesse of the accident had in fact been issued to the Delta Oil Company, Petersburg, Virginia from which the tags had been stolen on January 18, 1934 at Petersburg, Virginia and that these tags were dead ones.

The writer is familiar with the case of the hi-jacking of the Bernwell Brothers' truck which occurred on January 19, 1938 at approximately 1 a.m. about four miles from Petersburg and it was thought that perhaps these two incidents, namely the stealing of the tags and the hi-jacking might have some bearing on each other. Archer was accordingly questioned with respect to the theft of these tags and also with respect to the hi-jacking but denied all knowledge thereof claiming again that he did not know what was in the Chrysler Sedan and was unable to furnish any information along that line. Archer was returned to Raleigh, N. C. by Officers of that Police Department at 3 a.m. on February 19, 1934. Captain Poole advised that Archer would be held in custody at Raleigh for running from the scene of an accident, for possession of burglar tools which had been found in the Chrysler Sedan and neveral other charges including the outcome of the injuries of the tourist driving the car which had been struck by the Chrysler Sedan.

At 11:50 p.m. on February 18, 1934 a resume of the above information was furnished the Eashington Field Office.







Brown of McAlester. in which it was stated that the Governor of Oklahoma has "O.K.'d the payment" of the bills insofar as Wilbur Underhill is concerned.

Kansas, today in connection with this matter. advised that he has definite information, received through the "grape vine", that Fred Barker, Kansas State Penitestiary No. 9836, and Olyde Nimerick, alies James Roodruff alias Eddie Woodruff, Kansas State Penitentiary No. 6742, Participated de actual elayers in the instant messors on June 17, 1933ist Kenses City; Missouri. He stated that he also has information that about sixty days ago both Nimerick and Barker were killed by being placed on the spot mear Centralia, Illinois. He does not know what disposition was unde of the bodies of thesemen or any other facts in connection with the manner of their slayings; however, he stated that he also has the information that they were killed by Danny Webster, a Detroit and Chicago gangster, and Bert White, also a gangster in Detroit, Chicago and other middle-western cities. He stated that he does not believe either of these individuals here a Police or Penitentiary record. Port Huron, Kichigan is said to be the home of White, and he also believes that both of these alleged assessins would be known to the Police in Detroit. A photograph of Nimerick taken during 1924 at the Kansas State Penitentiary and one of his more recent photographs taken 12-29-31 by the Des Moines Police Department are enclosed herewith. Also an enlarged photograph of Pred Barker, Kansas State Penitentiary No. 9636, is forwarded herewith.

Mr. Webb furnished Agent with two photographs, one of Jaunaita Buelah Baird, and the other of Boss Baird. These photographs are being forwarded to the Kansas City Office. Webb also furnished to igent the fingerprints of Rose Baird and Jaunaita Baird. These prints are being forwarded to the Identification Unit of the Division of Investigation, with the request that they be searched and classified and that the Kansas City Office be notified of the results. It is also requested from the Identification Unit that photostat copies of these prints be forwarded to the Kansas City Office.

In reference to the details of the bank robbery at Mt. Zion, Ky., Mr. Webb furnished the following information. He advised that Charles Arthur Floyd and "Killer" Bill Miller, accompanied by Jaunaita Buelah Baird and Rose Baird, stopped at the house of Charley Fledge. Fledge, a former railroad man, was an acquaintence of Miller. Floyd and Miller stopped at his house under the pretext of buying his farm, or a farm in that vicinity. Fledge's farm is located near Sherman. Ky., on a side road off of U. S. 25. After looking the farm over end talking seriously about the purchasing of it. Willer and Floyd informed Fledge that they would look at another farm or two in the wicinity before definitely making up their minds. Under this pretense they departed in the direction of Mount Zion, Kentucky. They returned later that day, telling Fledge that they had not definitely made up their minds, and after dinner, and under the cover of darkness, departed for Cincinneti, Chio. It was during this interim, and while Floyd and Miller were supposedly looking for a farm site to purchase, that they robbed the Mount Zion Deposit Bank, obtaining \$2,000.00. All four parties were identified as being participants in this robbery.

Sheriff Webb stated that the girls, Jaunalta Buelah Baird and Rose Baird, were returned to Williamstown, My. for a trial of robbery of the Mount Zion Deposit Bank; that they were sentenced to a three year term and were incarcerated in the State Penitentiary at Frankfort, My.; that on appeal the Court of Appeals reversed this case for lack of evidence; that the case was returned for trial at Williamstown, My., and the judge dismissed it, evidently for the reason that they had no more sufficient evidence than that for which the Court of Appeals reversed the case.

In this case the girls were defended by F. A. Harrison, Attorney, Williamstown, My. Agent did not doom it advisable to contact Mr. Harrison in reference to what he knows about this case.

Mr. Webb furnished the information that Mr. Fledge was a man of good reputation in the community, and that the only reason

that Miller and Floyd stopped here was so that they would have a place to stay for a few hours while posses would be watching the roads after they had robbed the bank.

Mr. Webb informed Agent that Mrs. J. A. Lee, wife of the City Jailer at Georgetown, My., had become very friendly with the Baird girls during their stay in this jail prior to their trial at Williamstown, My., and he was quite sure that she had an address of the Baird girls.

Agent contected Mrs. Edger Wright, daughter of Mrs. J. A. Lee, by telephone. She informed Agent that the last address they had was just after the girls' case was dismissed on its second trial. Mrs. Wright advised Agent, on Agent's request, that if her mother still had this letter that the same would be forwarded to the Cincinneti Office and that any other pertinent information that they could give would be forwarded by letter. If the Cincinnati Office receives any information concerning the Baird girls, or receives a copy of this letter, the same will be forwarded to the Kansan City Office.



OBSTRUCTION OF JUSTICE .

(Endeavor to Deliver Federal Prisoner Frank Heah)

Reference is made to Division wire of the first instant, instructing the writer to proceed to Los Angeles immediately and there interview Ed. Davis, I.O. 1193, who was in custody with respect to the "Kanmo" and other Division cases.

Accordingly, I arrived at Los Angeles, California, the morning of March 2, 1934, and interviewed Ed. Davis in the presence of Special Agent C. D. White of the Los Angeles Office. Upon arrival at Los Angeles, however, I ascertained that Special Agent in Charge Conroy of Kansas City, who was thoroughly familiar with Ed. Davis, and his reported activities, had gone over in detail all matters with Ed. Davis, in the presence of Special Agent White, and they are submitting a detailed report, and in order to avoid a repetition, I will simply give you the highlights of my conversation with him.

In the first place, Ed. Davis does not at all resemble the individual whom I saw at Kansas City. There is no question about this at all. I ascertained that Davis would probably warm up, and be more willing to talk if sympathy was indicated for his wife and son, for whom he has the utmost devotion, and his reaction under these circumstances was all that could be expected. He stated positively that he was not in the Kansas City shooting at all; that when he escaped from the Lansing Penitentiary at Lansing, Kansas, he, Wilbur Underhill, Bob Brady, Harvey Bailey and Jim Clark drove the Warden in a car which they had taken away from a guard near Lansing. He stated they immediately headed South, and that he, Ed. Davis, has never been back in Missouri at all; that he has been working through Oklahoma and Texas. At that time Harvey Bailey's knee, where he had been shot, was bothering him, and as

a result, they dropped Hervey Bailey and Wilbur Underhill at some unknown point in Oklahoma, and, furthermore, on the 16th of June, Bob Brady, Jim Clark and Ed Davis positively held up the Black Rock Bank at Black Rock. Arkansas. He stated that Harvey Bailey and Wilbur Underhill were not in on this holdup, but after they had held up the bank on the 16th of June, they were cut off from reaching their car, and spent the day in the swamps, finally located a farmer and took his car away from him and gave him \$20.00, and told him that this would reimburse him for securing his car when they were through with it; that then Ed.Davis, Bob Brady and Jim Clark drove into Oklahoma City, Okla, where they joined Wilbur Underhill and Harvey Bailey.

He stated that the letter that all parties had written in connection with their participation in the Black Rock Bank Job was written for the purpose of taking the "heat" off of these five individuals, owing to the fact they understood they were wanted in connection with the Kansas City massacre.

While Ed. Davis says that Harvey Bailey and Wilbur Underhill were not mixed up in this bank job, they also affixed their fingerprints and signature to the letter in question.

Ed. Davis also stated that he arrived in Oklahoma City either the 17th or 18th of June, and the same day he arrived there, he conversed with his wife, whom he met at a designated point, and that Ed. Davis, Jim Clark and Bob Brady continued to operate through Oklahoma, Texas and Arizona up until about the middle of September, at which time Ed. Davis states he decided he would break away from the tric and try to get a new start, and, accordingly, he and his wife, and his son, left for California.

Bavis frankly admits that he has been involved in several bank "stick-ups", and states that this was the job which they pulled. He stated that since leaving Lansing, Kansas, he had never been in the states of Missouri and Kansas, because he figured they were too close to Lansing Penitentiary, and that it was too "hot" for him there, and the other men felt the same way about it. He is absolutely positive that mone of the five individuals, who have been mentioned above, had anything to do with the Kansas City massacre, owing to the fact that three were involved in the bank robbery the day before, and were en route to Oklahoma City, where Harvey Bailey and Wilbur Underhill were awaiting their arrival. Accordingly, he stated that he can positively account for all five individuals on June 17th, and it was, of course, impossible for them to have been in Kansas City.

Devis tells me he was never in Chicago, Minnespolis or St. Paul. He appeared to be frank in his statements. He stated that all members of his group, with the possible exception of Harvey Bailey, could not understand why anyone would pull any such job as was pulled

in Kansas City without some remuneration. He stated that while he admitted they all had the reputation of being "bad men", that they really were not as bad as they were painted to be.

Davis stated that he gathered from certain remarks that Harvey Bailey had made, that perhaps the latter had some idea as to who might have pulled the job, but he never did discuss it with the other men.

Davis denies knowing Verne Miller or his purported wife; emphatically denies ever having met Kelly or his wife. While he admits knowing FredoBarker and Arthun Barker, he states he has not seen these two individuals for years, and does not know Volney Davis, Alvin Karvis or Harry Campbell. He states that as far as "Pretty Boy" Floyd is concerned, he no doubt knew him when he was a youngster, having been born and raised in Oklahoma, but has not seen him for years, and absolutely has not been on any jobs with him. He has no idea who might have pulled the Bremer kidnapping.

Davis also states that Harvey Bailey was absolutely innocent of the Urschel kidnapping, and frankly stated that he would not make this statement if he was not positive. He stated Harvey Bailey no doubt exchanged some money for some other Subject who had participated in the Urschel kidnapping; that he, Harvey Bailey, did not know it was the ransom money at the time, stating that Harvey Bailey was too wise and too shrewd to go down on the Shannon farm, which was "hot", with any of the ransom money on him.

The gist of his activities around California, and other details, will be submitted by Agent in Charge Conroy and Special Agent C. D. White of the Los Angeles Office.

Ed. Davis also stated that he had not seen Frank Nash for a long period of time; that he only spent one night in Hot Springs, Arkansas, and never stayed there for any period of time. He denies knowing the wife of Frank Nash or Dick Galatas.

I then talked to Loma Davis, the wife of Ed. Davis, and she stated that she is positive that Ed. Davis was not mixed up in the Kansas City massacre, because he frequently discussed with her various jobs that had been pulled, and had been contemplated, and at no time was the Kansas City massacre alluded to by Davis as a job in which he might have participated. In fact, Mrs. Davis states she has been with Harvey Bailey, Wilbur Underhill, her husband, Bob Brady and Jim Clark, after the shooting at Kansas City, and from their conversation, all but Harvey Bailey were at a loss to know why anyone would participate in such a job without deriving some benefit therefrom. She stated that at one time Harvey Bailey made the remark that he thought he knew who might have pulled the

job, but did not amplify his remarks any further. She also stated that she does not know Verne Miller or his purported wife, or Kelly and his wife. Does not know Frank Nash or his wife, or Herbert Farmer; that she has not been in any difficulty whatsoever during her life.

She stated that she is absolutely positive that either on the 17th or the 18th of June, 1933, which she places through the Black Rock Bank robbery, and she knowsit was the first or second day thereafter, Ed Davis came into Oklahoma City and she drove out on a street car and met him and conversed with him for some time, and that she later saw the other four Subjects. In order to prove her contention, Mrs. Davis states the car in which Harvey Bailey and the othersescaped from Lansing Penitentiary. was the same car that was driven out to the scene of the Black Rock Bank robbery, and while she has never seen any reports on the robbery of this car, she is positive that if the various law enforcement officers will check up on this, they will ascertain positively that the car in which they escaped from Lansing was the car that was driven by Bob Brady, Jim Clark and Ed. Davis to Black Rock, where they pulled this bank job, and when they were cut off from returning to the car, same was, of course, abandoned there, and she believes that the finding of this car there by law enforcement officers will positively "cinch" the placing of these men at Black Rock, Arkansas, on June 16, 1933.

She does not have any idea who might have participated in the Kansas City shooting.

Both Davis and his wife appeared willing to talk; to a certain extent his wife was fairly open in her conversation. Davis would deal in generalities, but we could not pin him down to any particular time at any particular place, with the exception of the Black Bock Bank robbery.

Other details in this matter will be covered in the complete report to be submitted by Special Agent in Charge Conroy and Special Agent White at Los Angeles, and, to reiterate, I desire to again state: that I saw no one in Kansas City who at all resembles the appearance of Ed.Davis.

Ballistic tests are being made of the various gums found in the possession of Ed. Davis, and they will be forwarded to the Kansas City Office.

Copy of this letter is going forward to the Offices at Oklahoma, Kansas City, Los Angeles, Chicago and St. Paul.



Reference is made to your letter of March 2, 1934, with reference to identifications of individuals mentioned in memorandum of Special Agent A. E. Farland, dated February 15, 1934, in connection with the case entitled Vernon C. Miller, deceased, et-al, Conspiracy to Deliver Federal Prisoner. It is noted that all individuals mentioned in the memorandum of Agent Farland have been identified through fingerprint records in the Division except the following:

George Brock Harold (Fat) Wright Jim Clark

Tom/Hill
Goldie Johnson
Homer Good

Agent Farland advises with reference to GOLDIE JOHNSON that he was informed by an officer, name not recalled, in the Tulsa, Oklahoma, Police Department, that this individual served several years ago in the State Penitentiary, Canon City, Colorado, the particulars of the sentence and the charge upon which convicted are not known. Further inquiry might develop details of this through the Tulsa, Oklahoma, Police Department and thereafter through the Colorado State Penitentiary.

GEORGE EROCK is thought to have a criminal record at St. Joseph, Missouri, and inquiry is to be made though the Police Department there. Agent Farland advised that he secured this information from police at Tulsa.

HOMER GOOD, a constable at Tulsa, Oklahoma, is thought by Agent Farland to be well known to George Carver, an Agent of the Alcoholic Beverage Upit of this Division at Tulsa, Oklahoma. Captain George Stewart of Tulsa, Oklahoma, Police Department, is also familiar with Homer Good. These individuals may know of any criminal record of Homer Good.

HAROLD (FAT) WRIGHT, employed by the World Publishing Company, Tulsa, Oklahoma, and brother of Glenn Leroy Wright, a notorious outlaw,

is said to be well known to Captain Stewart of the Tulsa, Oklahoma, Police Department, who may be aware of any criminal record of that individual.

JIM CLARK is former subject of Division I.O. #1192.

TOM HILL is the former subject of case entitled Tommie Hill, A. W. Karns, Madge Hill Karns, Perjury, which case originated in the Oklahoma City office. He was also a subject of a file involving theft from interstate shipment and according to the records of the Kansas City office in that case on May 6, 1924, Hill pleaded guilty at Fort Scott, Kansas, and was sentenced to serve four months in the Montgomery County Jail and was fined \$1,000.00. The indictment in that case, charging theft from interstate shipment, was returned in Federal Court at Fort Scott, Kansas, November 14, 1923. It does not appear from the Kansas City file that there were any fingerprints of Tom Hill taken at the time of his conviction in this district. Agent Farland was told today at the Kansas City. Missouri, Police Department that Hill served a sentence of one year and one day in the U. S. Penitentiary at Leavenworth, Kansas, for National Motor Vehicle Theft Act violation, having been sentenced at Nowata, Oklahoma, according to the belief of Police Sergeant Jeff Rayan here. Investigation will be made at Leavenworth to secure his fingerprint record if this be the fact. The Oklahoma City file number of the case involving Hill, having to do with Perjury, appears to be 74-31.

Reference is made to the case emtitled Alvin Karpis, with aliases, et al. Edward G. Brener, Vietim; Kidnaping, and to Division letter dated March E, 1934, addressed to your office, requesting information to identify six individuals mentioned in the memorandum of Special Agent L. R. Farland, dated February 15, 1934, in connection with the case entitled Vernon C. Miller, deceased, et al. Compiracy to Deliver Federal Prisoner.

Of the six individuals mentioned in Invision letter of March 2, 1834, four have been definitely identified, mamely; Jim Clark, #152706, Ton Hill, #171546, Goldie Johnson, #745686, and Harold (Fet) Bright, So., Bules, Oklahoms, #6168. It has not been possible to definitely identify George Brock or Homer Good, the other two individuals named in Agent Farland's memorandum. The fingerprints of the first four mamed individuals will be compared with the latent prints in this case and will be entered in the single fingerprint file.

The files of the Identification Unit reveal the fingerprints of one W. R. Brock, a copy of whose criminal record is attached herewith, and of two individuals named Homer Good, whose criminal records are as follows:

Subject as Homer Good, #10858, arrested SO, Talsa, Okla., Sept. 26, 1955, charge violation of National Prohibition Ast; deferred sentence.

Homer A. Good

Mr. Ray stated that he had not seen the person described by the starters; however, Clifford and Rogers were interviewed in Mr. Ray's office and advised agent that the individual, whom they had seen on several occasions during the past ten days, wore a dark blue overcoat, a light fedora hat, gray-green trousers, was about 5'10" in height, and weighed approximately 180 lbs. They also observed that he usually came into the building alone, and on each occasion went into the 😓 office of the Long Island Drug Company on the 22nd floor, but when he left the building he always had three or four men with him, who they believed were his bodyguards. Clifford stated that he had heard the individual in question talking with other persons as they were leaving the elevator, and believed that he had a southern accent; however Rogers, who stated that his home is in Terre Eaute, Indiana, said that this individual. had a western accent, and that on one occasion he asked the person in question where he was from, to which the latter replied California: that this individual subsequently told him that he had traveled all through the west and knew one "Bud Taylor", a pugilist of Terre Heute, Indians, show he, Rogers, had known for a number of years, also that he once had a girl friend tho lived in Knightsville or Knightstown, Indiana, and that her name was the same as that of the town where she resided. Rogers did not remember whether the name was Enightsville or Enightstown. but said that he subsequently looked the town up on the map and ascertainedthat there was such a town in Indiana.

The Cincinnati office was requested by letter to conduct investigation at Enightsville and Enightstown, Indiana, on March 1, 1934, in an effort to locate and interview the girl in question, to determine whether she could identify the photograph of Floyd.

Agent exhibited a photograph of Ployd to the elevator starters, both of whom stated that it bore a strong resemblance to the individual they had seen.

Mr. Ray advised Agent that the name "Long Island Drug Company" was a blind, and that the individuals occupying that office on the 22nd floor were liquor dealers, further that the firm "Steinthal PubliccAccountants" which is the only other firm located on the 32nd floor, is also a blind.

Detective Goldstein and Agent remained in Mr. Ray's office until about 6 P.M. on March 2, 1934, at which time Rogers advised Mr. Ray that the person in question had just entered the building alone and had gone to the 22nd floor.

Special Agent in Charge F. X. Fay and Captein Leaky were immediately notified and shortly thereafter appeared at 1819 Broadway, with Special Agents George Starr and W. F. Seery and several detectives from the New York Police Department.

Company, it was ascertained that there were only two individuals in the office at that time, nemely Abraham H. Steinberg, who gave his occupation as salesman for the Long Island Drug Company, and Marray R. Saul, who stated that he operates the Bonafide Laboratories, I41 West 20th Street, with one Lloyd Smith, also the Fort George Sales Company at the same address, menufacturing cosmetics. It was subsequently ascertained that Saul was the individual referred to by Rogers and Clifford, and it was observed that Saul's features somewhat resembled those of Floyd, however it was obvious that he was not identical with Floyd. Saul was questioned at length by Mr. Fay and Captain Leahy, and Captain Leahy subsequently verified Saul's statements regarding his identity by telephonically communicating with Saul's sister in law, whom Captain Leahy knew personally.

Saul, 2007 Ocean Avenue, Brooklyn, containing the following descriptive data: Born May 1, 1899; white; male; weight 180; height 5'9 1/2"; eyes brown; heir brown.

Abraham H. Steinberg, of the Long Island Drug Company, exhibited a letterhead of the Long Island Drug Company to the writer, indicating that the following are officers of that concern: H. Alkon, President; M. Alkon, Treasurer; B. H. Mindling, Secretary; also indicating that the Long Island Drug Company has an office at 9702 - 150th Street, Jemaica, Long Island, tele phone Jamaica 6-7590.

After Saul's identity had been established by Captain Leahy, as previously mentioned herein, it was decided not to take him into custody.

On March 5, 1934, the Cincinnett office was telegraphically advised to disregard the lead contained in the letter to that office dated March 1, 1934, requesting that investigation be conducted at Enightstown and Enightsville, Indiana.

Murphy, in cooperation with Kansas State Highway Police Officers, who are in Houston, Texas, working on this matter, advises Leona Defer, former paramour of Bob Brady, and her sister and brother-in-law George and Frances Brown, have moved from 901 Austin Street to 809 LaBranch Street, Houston, Texas.

A woman informant who is being paid by the Kansas State Highway Police Officers, has managed to gain the confidence of Leona Defer

It appears that this matter is very well lined up and may result in the apprehension of Jim



Detective Jack Reems of the Ft. Worth, Texas, Police Department, advised the writer that about a week ago his wife received a letter from Mon Coffer, her step-brother, who with his family live on a farm eleven miles set of Gotebo, Kiowa County, Oklahoma, in which letter he stated among other things, that he and his family were well and that they were getting along all right and would continue to do so walcon the officers visited the farm at a time when Charlie Floyd was there, said letter intenting that Floyd visited Coffer from time to time.

Detective Reams stated that he did not know Coffer at the time he married Mrs. Reams and had only met him once, which was about a year ago; that his wife's mother was left a widow whom his wife was a small shild and she married the father of Non Coffer, who died a year leter; that the family scattered and have not been in communication with one enother for a number of years; however, Coffer has written to Mrs. Reams on two or three occasions.

Mr. Reams further stated that Coffer married the doughter of one 5eth Fleyd who resides on a farm between Duncan and Medicine Park, Oklahoma, and is unable to state whether any relationship exists between 5eth Floyd and "Pretty Boy" Floyd; that Coffer has served a term in the State Penitentiary at McAlester, Oklahoma, and later was sentenced to serve a term in the Texas State Penitentiary from Wilberger County, Texas, on a forgery charge, he being released about six months ago.
