

MEMORANDUM FOR THE DIRECTOR

I talked with Mr. Vetterli about the Kansas City murder case after lunch. Mr. Vetterli stated that Andersen is coming into Kansas City, having finished his lead in Hot Springs. I told Mr. Vetterli that Andersen could then go back to New York after reporting. Brennan is to return to Kansas City with report on the contact he is to make at Winona, Missouri, with Mrs. Nash. After that he will return. Vetterli mentioned that Fitzsimons, owing to family matters, was anxious to get back to his home office, and I told him that we would probably be able to release Fitzsimons in a couple of days.

Wanted to know if it would be all right for him to advise the newspapers today that Miller was wanted in connection with the murder. I told him that so far as Reppert was concerned he could do as he pleased; that, of course, we could not dictate to Reppert about publicity or otherwise in the matter; however, I pointed out that Reppert was a gentleman who was very desirous that our Identification Order on Miller be held up, which desire I ignored while at Kansas City. I also instructed Vetterli to see Reppert and to tell him that while we had no desire to in any manner interfere with the running of the Kansas City Police Department, the discharge of Detective Thurman just subsequent to his cooperation with agents of this Bureau on this case might seem to be a coincidence or, on the other hand, it might seem to be a decidedly unfriendly action with regard to this Bureau. I told Mr. Vetterli that I would keep in daily touch with him.

The lead at Tulsa is still pending. Special Agent in Charge Jones and Special Agent Brantley are there, and contact is expected to be made by informant with possible subjects tomorrow, July 6.

This travelling representative had visited the Little Rock Agency of the Cadillac Motor Company on Monday June 26, 1933, at which time he was told of a model 570 Cadillac sedan which had been at the Little Rock Agency during the previous week. This sedan was equipped with bullet-proof glass and had special steel plates throughout its body. In addition, the glass in the rear windows could be rolled down and a steel plate rolled up, which plate had several holes for use in firing through with machine guns. As a matter of fact, there were machine guns in the ear at the time that it visited the Little Rock Agency garage. No further information was available at Memphis, Tennessee

Reference is made to telephone call of Special Agent Fitsesizmons of the Kansas City Bureau Office on June 28,1933, regarding V.RION CMILLER, requesting information regarding the whereabouts of VERIS, MILLER'S relatives.

MRS. MORERT S. TOUNG, 1875 Portland Avenue, is a sister of YERGE MILLER. She has been seriously ill for some time, and on June 24,1935, ETHEL MILLER a rived in St. Paul for the purpose of visiting her sister, MRS. ROBERT S. TOUNG. VERNE MILLER'S mother, MRS. CHARLES MILLER, who resides with ETHEL MILLER at 3700 Broadway, Kansas City, Missouri, is also visiting MRS. ROBERT S. TOUNG. The information regarding the health of MRS. HUBERT S. TOUNG was obtained from neighbor shopkeepers and neighbors and it seems that there can be no question that MRS. ROBERT S. TOUNG has been ill, and is still let mo question that MRS. ROBERT S. TOUNG has been ill, and is still her mother were visiting MRS. TOUNG. There has been no one seem, in the meighborhood, resembling VERME MILLER. No sutomobiles have appeared before the house bearing out of State licenses.

Special Agent G.D.Hall of this office interviewed MR.REERT S. YOUNG at his place of employment at the Armour Packing Company, South St.Paul, Minnesota, where he has a responsible position, MR. YOUNG advised that the last time he saw MR. VERE MILLER was two years ago, when VERE was stopping some place in St.Paul, and played gold with MR. YOUNG on two occasions, once at the Highland Course and once at the Estler Course, both courses being used quite frequently by MOLDEN and other members of their gang, as the files of the office reflect. MR. YOUNG, however, does not know any of the parties involved in the EKATING, HOLDEN, KASH, BAILEY gangs. MR. YOUNG was involved in the EKATING, HOLDEN, KASH, BAILEY gangs. MR. YOUNG was involved that drestic measures will be taken by the United States to effect the location of MILLER, MR. YOUNG advised that he would be

very happy to cooperate with Bureau Agents to effect the Location of MILLE. YOUNG is envious that he be not embarrassed in his position and in the neighborhood in which he lives. MR. YOUNG advised that, as far as he knows, MILLER'S wife, PEGGY MILLER, who was last known to reside at \$17 West 7th Street, Sioux City, Iswa, has not divorced VERIE MILLER, as about three months ago, she wrote a letter to Mr. and Mrs. Young requesting advice as to whether VERIE MILLER had taken steps to obtain a divorce.

Please be advised, that as far as is known by the St.Paul Office, MILL'R is not wanted. He is reputedly a bank robber and a boodlem in general, but as far as is known, there is not outstanding a marrent for his arrest, or request to have him ploked up by any State Authorities. With reference to the affair in which he is believed to have shot a Minner clis Policeman, please be advised that St. Paul File No. 25-29, entitled VARNON C.MILIKR, FURTHIYE. MATIONAL PROHIBITION ACT, States that this matter was "squared away". On July 1,1935, Agent Hall was informed by Chief of Police William Mechan. Minnepolis, Minnesota, that MILLE was not the person who shot the officer, and MILIAR is not mented by that department. Efforts are being made to determine if the BURNS AGENCY of Minneap lis, Minnesota, have any information that MILLER is wanted. As soon as this information is obtained, the Kansas City Office and the Bureau will be promptly notified. There is no record that he is wanted by the State Bureau of Apprehension, or the St.Paul or Minneapolis Police Departments.

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



On 6-22-33, U. S. Attorney S. M. Brewster at Topeka, Kansas, receive a telegrem from the Attorney General at Mashington, B. C., edvising that Governor Alflandon of Kansas had advised the Attorney General that he had information of Value concerning the criminals at large in the State of Kansas and adjoining States and desired to exchange information with the Governorm someorning these criminals. The belogrem from the Attorney General advised Mr. Brewster to contact Governor Landon and obtain the information, after which the information was to be submitted to the Attorney General in Setall.

At Topeka, Kansas, Special Agent B. R. Allen conferred with Mr. Browster, the advised that he had someted Governor Landon, by telephone, and that Governor Landon had referred him to Judge A. B. Foulks, Parele Attorney in the Executive Offices, Topeka, Kansas, to whom Governor Landon had turned ever all information in his possession.

At the office of Mr. Brewster, Agent Allen conferred with Mr. Brewster, Judge Foulks and Dan B. Coule, and was adviced by Judge Foulks that Milt Oct. A. former Sheriff of Crewford County, Kansas, now employed as a special investigator in the office of the Attorney General, State of Kansas, has been endeavering to obtain information relative to the prison break at Lansing, Kansas, on 5-30-33. Judge youlks advised that Gould had submitted several reports to him and allowed agent Allen to read these reports.

One report advised that George Ford, alies W. J. Johnston, resided at Eldersde, Kansas, operates a hangout where numerous criminals congregate and that through the ecoperation of an ex-convict, the stays at George Ford's place, It was learned that Johnston sent a telegram, shortly before the Lansing break, in Sellie Dunn Rimes in Oklahom, the wire reading, as follows:

"Rellie Dunn Rimes alies Rédie Jenkins fishing fine will out hay May thirtieth will buy wir silk come to be delivered Picher Okiahoma." Signed - V. Je Johnston

This telegram is interpreted by said ex-convict to men that everything is set for a break on 5-30-33 and that six men would participate after which they would proceed to Picher, Oklahoma. Gould advised in a communication to Judge Foulks that Sheriff Richter of Marion County is the person to whom the above information came and from the ex-convict. Gould further advised that he had made investigated tion at Picher, Oklahoma, with Joe Anderson, special investigator for the Governor of Oklahoma, and had learned that Wilbur Underhill had been in Picher, Oklahoma, several times, the last time being Friday, 6-9-356

Another report from Gould stated that George Ford had delivered two new submehine guns to "Pretty Boy" Floyd at Eldorado, Espess. The guns having been purchased by Ford in Chicago, Illinois. Likewise, another report stated that the ex-convict, who is turning this information over to Sheriff Richter, had visited Underhill at Morwood, Missouri, on Friday, 6-16-35, at which time the ex-convict is reported to have talked to Underhill for about thirty minutes. This report likewise reflects that Wilbur Underhill has two sisters residing at Joplin, Missouri, manaly, Mrs. Brains, 2406 Empire Street, and Mrs. Lunis, 1501 McKinley Avenue, both of whom were visited by the ex-convict, who reports that both sisters are in constant scamming tion with Underhill, by telephone.

Another report likewise states that Conn and Brady, who escaped from Lansing on 8-30-55, were seen boarding a west bound freight train on the Friedo line at Cherokee, Kansas, on 6-16-55. This report likewise stated that Brady might possibly be located at Amerille, Texas, insensed as he has a girl there by the name of Philpott, who is well known in Amerille, Texas.

Another report discloses that Hervey Balley was reported to have been in a cabin approximately eighteen miles southwest of Neosho, Missouri, where he is reported to have been recovering from a wound received on 5-30-35 at the time of the lansing break.

Judge Foulks stated that it was possible that Lymn Ford, who is now serving a term in Lansing Penitentiary, is a relative of the George Ford mentioned above. Judge Foulks also advised that Milt Sould sould be located for interview through the Sheriff's office at Mismi, Chlahoma. Judge Foulks likewise was of the epinion that Sheriff Righter at Eldoredo, Marion County, Kansas, would possibly have more complete information than anyone regarding the criminals who might be located at George Ford's places.

Both Mr. Browster and Mr. Could recall having had dealings with Milt Gould on previous occasions when Gould was Sheriff of Crewford County, and both stated that Gould is inclined to hrag a good deal about past operations and inclined to skip ever details in making investigations. Mr. Could advised that Joe Anderson is well known throughout Otlahoum and that the Otlahoum City office would know his location.







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sar with fender wells; which car was heavily loaded with machine guns, rifles, and ammunition; that Sherill furnished Ingraham with information to the effect that the entire party was travelling to Mashville, Tennessee, and that he Sherill, could be reached in eare General Delivery under the name of Boy Roberts, and through Nigger Molan, who is alleged to be operating a cheap hotel in the city of Mashville; that from Mashville, Tennessee, they were going to Memphis, Tennessee, and could be located through one Lafe or Lacey Mathan, a gambler and book-maker in that city, and from which point they were going to Harlan, Kentucky, and hire a shack in order to hide out. The Director furnished the Birmingham Office with a description of Bailey and requested that immediate investigation be conducted in order to verify the information furnished by informant Ingraham, further stating that photographs of all of the suspects would be forwarded to the writer at Mashville, Tennessee.

AT WASHVILLE, TENNESSEE:

Accompanied by Special Agents Schenken and Hanson the writer immediately proceeded to Nashville, Tennessee, and conferred with Mr. F.A. Wortan, Superintendent of the Mails, who immediately checked the names of ell Subjects and their aliases with the general delivery clark and with particular reference to the name ROY ROBERTS, and reported that no mail had been received for these individuals, nor was there any forwarding address left by Roy Sherill, alias Roy Roberts, or the other persons implicated. A list of the Subjects was prepared by Special Agent Schenken and was placed in the hands of the clerk on duty at the general delivery window through Hiss Clara Foley, Secretary to the Superintendent of the Mail, at which time sards were prepared and inserted in the general delivery boxes calling attention to the fact that if any mail was received for any such persons they were to immediately advise agent McCaffrey concerning this information. Special agent McCaffrey was assigned to cover the general delivery window for the remainder of the day of the 27th, and which window was also covered on the following day, June 28. Close contact is still being kept by this Agent and the Superintendent of Mail in order that information concerning any mail received by Subjects might be immediately transmitted to the Birmingham Office,

Immediately following the interview with Mr. Mortan and the stationing of Agent McCaffrey at the general delivery window Agent conferred with Chief of Detective Elkin Lewis of the Mashville Police Department and outlined to Mr. Lewis the information in our possession. Mr. Lewis stated that Nigger Welen was unknown to him but that he would immediately assign two detectives to according if such a person existed at Mashville and that he would have a report temeerning this the following morning. Mr. Lewis, also, expressed doubt as to whether the Subjects would appear at Mashville in such a conspicuous car and further felt that if they did appear at Mashville his department would be so informed.

Information thus far obtained was telephonically communicated to the Director, in compliance with his request, and immediately thereafter Chief Inspector William T. Griffin of the Memphis Police Department was telephonically communicated with and given the substance of the information at hand and requested to secure all information concerning one Lafe or Lacey

Nathan, a book-maker and gambler, alleged to be residing in Memphis,

Special Agent McCaffrey was assigned to attend the roll call of the Nashville Police Department at 8 P.M. on June 27, 1933, at which time Chief of Detective Lewis instructed all detectives en duty to ascertain information concerning Nigger Nolan, also giving them a description of the car alleged to be in the possession of Bailey and others. Williamson and ing this information, Mr. Lewis assigned Detectives W. H. Williamson and L. K. Head of the Nashville Police Department to endeavor to locate Nolan.

By reference to the Mashville telephone directory a listing was found for one Nick Molan residing at 1502 Jo Johnston Avenue. Nashville, whereupon Agents made a tour in that vicinity but obtained no information of value other than that the premises was a good-sized brick information.

Ine following morning, June 28, 1933, Chief of Detective Lewis reported that his men were unable to secure any information concerning one Nigger Nolan, and that he was satisfied that such a person was not residing at Nashville at the present time. His attention was called to the residing at Nashville at the present time. His attention was called to the telephone listing of Nick Nolan with the suggestion that this might be the person sought in connection with this investigation, whereupon Chief Lewis immediately assigned Detectives Jack Setters and Whit Scruggs to make an immediate investigation in the vicinity of 1502 Jo Johnston Avenue. These immediate investigation in the vicinity of 1502 Jo Johnston Avenue. These detectives reported back to Chief Lewis that Nick Nolan had died over a year ago and that prior to his death he had been sick for several years.

Identification Orders on Robert G. Brady, with aliases, James Clark, with aliases, Harvey J. Bailey, Wilber Underhill, and Ed Davis were received from the Director, together with a photograph and fingerprint record of Charles Floyd, alias Pretty Boy Floyd, together with a fingerprint card on Roy Sherill.

A check of the identification records of the Mashville Police Department revealed that Nigger Holan, Nick Molan, and Emma Nolan, the latter being a sister of Nick Molan, had no record with that department,

Special Agent McCaffrey telephonically communicated with Mr. J. E. Harris, Parole and Record Clerk, Tennessee State Penitent iary at Mashville, Tennessee, and a search of the records failed to reflect any information concerning Nigger Molan, or Nick Molan. A further check was made as to whether a Lafe or Lacey Mathen had a record at that institutions made as to whether a Lafe or Lacey Mathen had a record at that institutions. However, Mr. Harris furnished negative information concerning both persons.

Inquiries were also made at the Harcotis Bureau at Hashville through Mr. G. W. Cunningham, Agent in Charge, who advised that Higger Bolan was unknown to that Bureau.

Inquiries were made at the Mashville Agency of the Cadillac Motor Company which revealed that that agency had no information

concerning a strange Cadillac V-16 having been serviced in that vicinity during the past week.

Page Garage, and the Warner Garage, with negative results, other than that a V-16 Cadillac sedan, bearing New York license 17 7978 had been in the Page Garage on the night of June 21, the car having been brought to that garage from the Hermitage Hotel. A check of the records of the Hermitage Hotel covering registrations on June 21 and 22, 1933, disclosed that no one using the names of Subjects in this investigation had been registered there. The photographs appearing on the five Identification Orders in this case, as well as photograph of Pretty Boy Floyd and Roy Sherill, alias Roy Roberts, were exhibited to the clerk of the hotel but he failed to identify any of the Subjects as having stopped at the hotel during the past week. The photographs in question were, also, exhibited to the clerks at the following hotels with negative results; Andrew Jacksen; Noel; Maxwell House; Tulane; and Sam Davise

I list of the names and eliases of the Subjects was furnished the Identification Division of the Nashville Police Department with the request that appropriate Wanted Notices be posted immediately.

Special Agent McCaffrey while covering the general delivery window conferred with Mr. Arthur Sanders, employed at the information window, who stated that his father, Lee Sanders, residing at 948 Main Street, Nashville, was formerly employed for 44 years as a detective on the Nashville Police Department and stated that if interviewed by one of the Agents might be able to furnish information concerning Charles Floyd, alias Pretty Boy Floyd.

Mr. Lee Sanders was interviewed by the writer on the morning of June 28, 1933, this person being a man 71 years of age and has been retired from the Mashville detective force for a period of two years. He stated that a Mrs. Crim operates a tourist inn at 955 Main Street; that he has noticed that this Inn apparently is a hang out for a growd of gangsters residing at Mashville. He further stated that about a week prior to Agent's visit he had occasion to walk by the tourist inn and he saw a person in front of same that resembled Pretty Boy Floyd, having recalled seeing several photographs in the newspapers of Pretty Boy Floyd he cencluded that M. Beiley and others were possibly making this their hang out while at Mashville. Various Identification orders on these Subjects, as well as the photographs of Floyd and Sherill were exhibited to Mr. Sanders, who picked out the photograph of Robert G. Brady as that of Floyd.

Mr. Sanders further advised that he desired to register a complaint against the Civil Service Commission of the Nashville Police

Department for withholding his pension and, also, desired to register a complaint against United States Attorney McLane for accepting a bribe about five years ago in a case in which Mr. Sanders was interested. It was most apparent from the interview with Mr. Sanders, because of his age, that he is getting somewhat childish. He advised Agent that it is a common occurrence for him to wake up at night and see the profile of Pretty Boy Floyd staring at him. However, Special Agent McCaffrey has been instructed to make a discreet investigation relative to the tourist inn operated by Mrs. Grim and to furnish the Birmingham Office immediately with any information obtained relative thereto.

Arrangements have, also, been made through Mr. Senders should be again see any suspicious characters at the tourist inn to immediately notify his som employed at the Post Office who has been furnished with Special Agent McCaffrey's address in order that he may be communicated with day and night.

AT MRIPHIS, TENNESSEE

The writer, accompanied by Special Agent Schenken, proceeded to Memphis, Temessee, and received a memorandum prepared by Chief Inspector Wm. T. Griffin to the effect that Lafe or Lacey Nathan was unknown in that city, but that one Sami Nathan was known to several officers of the department and who was engaged in making a book; further that a Cadillac V-8 sedan had been at Memphis recently and that this sedan had bullet-proof glass and was seen at the Peabody garage. Inspector Griffin was not available for interview on the night of June 28.

Inquiry was made at the Peabody garage concerning the automobile mentioned above but were unable to secure any information concerning this car, the officials of the garage stating that such a car could not be recalled by them. The officials of the Peabody Garage did state, however, that a V-16 Cadillac sedan had been at the garage on June 21, 1933, bearing no license plates; that this car belonged to a man from Arkansas named Causey who made frequent visits to Memphis. No further information of value sould be obtained from this source.

On the following morning, June 29, 1933, Inspector Griffin assigned detectives sergeants Elmore and Mattem to accompany agents on further investigations to be made at Memphis. On proceeding to the local agency of the Cadillas Motor Company in that city Mr. Andrew Greener, salesman, and numerous other salesman and mechanics who gathered around during the interview, stated that on June 8, 1933, a 1933 V-12 Cadillac town sedan (two windows) equipped with six wire wheels drove into the garage; that this car had New York license tag 3K 8966, bearing engine number 1000032, which car is supposed to have been driven from Hot Springs, Arkansas, and at Duval Bluff, Arkansas, it had engine trouble; that it was occupied by two white men, one white woman,

and a negro chauffour, whose descriptions are as follows:

White man number one (later identified as Joseph Saya, alias Joseph Saya)

According to Mr. Greener and others, the car in question was equipped with glass about 12" thick and was steel plated throughout; that the rear window had a small U type hole in same which, if run entirely up, would accommodate the muzzle of a machine gun. According to Mr. Greener, this car contained a golf bag and a sanary. It was suggested that this golf bag might have contained a machine gun.

The white man number one was apparently the boss of the entire outfit. From information obtained it appears he is apparently in bad shape and when Mr. Greener visited him at his room at the Peabody Hotel he requested Mr. Greener not to smoke, indicating that he is possibly a tuberculosis victim.

The white man number two apparently did most of the driving, but was sometimes relieved by the negro; that the person set forth under the description number two was somewhat talkative, according to Mr. Greener, and was of the type that desired excitement.

and stood by it at all times, even when the mechanic took the car out of the garage on a test run. In other words, this car, according to the people in the Cadillac garage, was not allowed to be left alone for a moment. The negro was assigned even at night to stand by this car. The car in question was repaired and the four parties left about Moon, June 8, 1955.

Shortly after the departure of the above car a doctor arrived at the Memphis Cadillac Motor Company Agency in a Cadillac town sedan, V-8 model 353-5 standard, equipped with five wood wheels, from Hot Springs, Ark. Mr. Greener stated that he engaged the doctor in conversation and ascertained that he knew the occupants of the V-18 Cadillac car, which was in that garage that morning; stating that the white man number one was his patient and had been shot in the stomach. Mr. Greener further stated that he endeavored to sell the white man number one a new Cadillac; that the parties where short of money and were on their way back to New York to get more money; that the white man number one had approximately \$60 and, according to Mr. Greener, he wired from Memphis requesting someone to send him more money.

Thile at the Cadillac Agency in Memphis Mr. S. L. Quisenberry, service representative of that company, informed Special Agent Schenken that while at the Little Rock Agency of the Cadillac Motor Company on June 26, 1933, he was informed by one of the salesmen that during the previous week a 370 Cadillac sedan had been at that garage and that the sar was equipped with bullet-proof glass and plated with steel plates; that the windows were arranged so that the glass could be let down and steel plates rolled up, which plates had three or four holes in same which could be used to fire through with machine gune; that the car had several machine guns in it at the time it was at the Cadillac Agency at Little Rock. Mr. Quisenberry was unable to furnish any other data concerning this car and as a matter of fact did not personally see same. It was, also, ascertained at the Cadillas Agency at Memphis that a salesman, whose name is unknown at this time, reported that he had seen a 1930 or 1931 black V-16 Cadillac sedan driving through Memphis, Tennesses, during the previous week; that this car bore New York or California tags and was equipped with six red wire wheels and that there were five men riding in the cer. Photographs of all men previously named in this investigation were exhibited to Mr. Greener, as well as to all other selemen and mechanics in the garage, but they were unable to identify any of the photographs as people who had previously visited that Agency.

Mr. H. A. Clark, Assistant Manager of the Peabody Hotel, caused a check of his records to be made, with the result that it was found

that the white man number one and the woman involved registered at the Peabody Hotel at 3:42 A.M. June B, 1935, as Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Says of New York City and had checked out of the hotel at 1:38 P.M. on the same date. During their stay at this hotel two phone calls were made from their room as follows:

7-1666 - Southern Motor Company (Cadillac Agency) 8-1800 - Dirie Motor Club

Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Saya were assigned to room 1084, their registration card being \$17392. The cards bearing adjacent numbers were examined with a view to ascertaining the identity of the white man number two, but it was found that these registrations could not refer to this person. Registration card \$17390, however, relates to one I. King of Brooklyn, New York, who registered at 12:03 A.M. on June 8, 1933, and checked out at 11:28 A.M. on the same date. It is entirely probable that I. King is the one who accompanied Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Saya. While at the Peadody Hotel I. King made one telephone call to 8-4610, and which is listed in the mame of C.M. Briggs, 278 Cossitt, Mamphis, Termessee.

The registration cards were borrowed from the Peabody
Hotel and photostatic copies made thereof. One copy of same are being
furnished the New York Office of the Bureau and two capies are being furnished
to the Kansas City Office.

Accompanied by Detective Sergeants Elmore and Wattam, an investigation was made in the vicinity of 278 Cossitt Street, at which time Mrs. Rhods J. Brakehill advised that G. M. Briggs was her brother and died about two years ago. She was questioned at length but was unable to furnish any information as to I. King, or why this person should have made a telephone call to her home, which is a rooming house.

Inquiries were made at the Postal Telegraph Company and all records checked in an effort to ascertain whether a telegram had been forwarded by Saya requesting money, but no record of a telegram going out of the Postal office at Memphis could be identified at this office.

Inquiry at the Western Union met with a flat refusal to cooperate without the protection of a subpoens.

Based on the information received from Chief Inspector Griffin to the effect that Sam Mathan was not connected with the criminal element in the vicinity of Memphis and that he had recently inherited a sum of money and was now operating a handbook it was deemed advisable to interview him. Mr. Griffin called Mr. Nathan to his office on the basis of the information that Sam's middle name was Lacey and that he might be known to some people as Lafe or Lacey Mathan, although he is known generally at Memphis as "Mash" Nathan. This party stated that his middle name was not Lacey and

that he did not know anyone at Memphis by that name and that he has always been known as Mush Nathan, and after reviewing photographs of the Subjects involved in this case he did not know them by name or photograph, and that he has not been contacted by them at any time, and more particularly during the past ten days. This person appeared to be open and frank during the interview and gave no indication of concealing any information whatsoever.

Wanted Notices were placed with the Identification
Division of the Memphis Police Department pending receipt of the identification
orders.

Results of the investigation made at Memphis were communicated, telephonically, to the Director and instructions were received to transmit the information concerning the armored car seen at the Little Rock Agency to SAC Vetterli at Kansas City and to arrange to have SAC Ladd meet the writer at Henderson, Kentucky, in order that Dr. H. C. Ingraham could be interviewed. SAC Ladd reported that Ingraham was no longer at Henderson, Kentucky, but could probably be located at Cincinnati, Ohio, and instructions were received from the Director through Mr. Ladd that the writer should proceed to Cincinnati in order to conduct this interview.

AT CINCINNATI, CHIO.

Open arrival at Cincinnati the writer received a copy of the report rendered by D. M. Ladd on June 29, 1933, at St. Louis, reflecting an interview held with H. C. Ingraham at Henderson, Kentucky, and received information to the effect that Dr. Ingraham had called the St. Louis Office by telephone on June 29, 1933, at 12:34 P.M. from a pay station located in the Gibson Hotel at Cincinnati, Chio, and was to call Mr. Ladd on June 30 and give him his address while in Cincinnati, However, Mr. Ingraham failed to sarry out this promise, whereupon the records at the Gibson Hotel were checked but no information was obtained indicating that he was then residing at the Gibson Hotel.

Mr. Theodore Folger, in charge of the general delivery window Post Office Cincinnati, was conferred with but no information was received that Mr. Ingraham was receiving mail through that source.

Upon reviewing the report of SAC Ladd mentioned above the Kansas City Office was requested to verify the following information in order that Ingraham, when located, sould be more thoroughly interviewed regarding this case:

Date Sherill was received at the Leavenworth penitentiary, and whether Ingraham was assigned to the hospital at the Penitentiary.

Whether Sherrill was ever made a chauffour for the

head doctor during his term of incarceration there.

Whether Harvey J. Bailey was ever incaragrated in the federal penitentiary at Leavenmorths.

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Whother Slim Braley, alias Barnes, was ever incarcerated in the Kansas State Penitentiary, Lansing, Kansas.

Information was received, telephonically, from Assistant Director Harold Nathan under date of June 80, 1933, to the effect that:

Movember 13, 1918; that they had been unable to trace any rebord of Ingraham as being confined in that institution other than that he might have been there as Edgar Jay alias Paul Gregg slias Fred Smith, who was the only person sent to the Leavenworth Penitentiary at that time; that Edger Jay was received from Santa Pe New Mexico on May 3, 1919, and sentenced two years; that he was discharged November 15, 1920.

Further, that the records reflected that Sherill was designated as chauffeur for the head doctor at the Leavenworth penitentiary.

That Harvey Bailey, according to the records, was never an immate of the penitentiary.

That Slim Braley was confined to the State Penitentiary under the name of Barnes, being sentenced on May 18, 1925; charge, forgery, 6rd degree and received from Cowley, County, Kansas, on May 20, 1925. He was paroled February 18, 1928, and discharged May 27, 1930, and is now serving a 30 year sentence at the Oklahoma State Penitentiary at McAlister, Oklahoma.

Mr. Mathen, also, requested that the Eansas City Office be advised of the name of the salesman who saw the automobile mentioned in the body of this report, at the Cadillac Agency Garage at Little Rock.

A telegram was dispatched to the Eansas City Office stating that S. L. Emisenberry, service representative of the Cadillas Company at Memphis. Termessee, had left for Dallas, Texas, care Cadillac Agency in that sity, and that no one at the Cadillac Agency in Memphis was able to furnish the information.

The St. Louis Office receiving no information as to the present whereabouts of Ingraham, the writer communicated, telephonically, with all leading downtown hotels at Cincinnati and finally located H. C. Ingraham at room 809 Havlin Hotel.

Mr. Ingraham was interviewed at the Cincinnati Bureau Office on July 1 and at the request of the writer dictated a statement relative to first meeting Sherill, his later contact with Sherrill during the month of October, 1932, his meeting with Harvey Bailey, Slim Brady, alias Barnes, and his recent contact with the Subjects of this case at Henderson, Kentucky, on June 24, 1933. His statement is as follows:

Cincinnati, Ohio July 1, 1933

I first met Roy Sherill in the Federal Prison, Leavenworth, Kansas in 1919, where he was brought in on scutches to serve a sentence. He was placed under my care in the prison hospital. After his wounds were healed he was given an assignment as chauffour for the prison physician. I left the Federal Penitentiary in the month of Movember, 1919. I never saw Sherill prior to the time he was brought into the Federal Penitentiary.

The next time I saw Sherill was at the Chicago Stadium in Chicago, Illinois in October, 1932. He came to the Chicago Stadium to see a girl named Lucille Roberts, who is now working at the "Days of 149% at the Century of Progress at Chicago.

I have known Harvey Bailey for about ten years, having met him from time to time in Kansas City, Missouri and Kansas City, Maneas. One of Bailey's associates at that time was Estil Butler. I saw Bailey, prior to June 24, 1933, about four or five years ago at Kansas City.

I also knew Braley alias S. L. Barnes. I knew him in Oklahoma when I was with the 101 Ranch at Ponca City. I last saw this person in 1928 at Ponca City, at which time he was Manager of a taxi office in that city.

Sherrill wrote me in October, 1932, asking me to get him a job at the place where I was employed. He was at a small town in Indiana, near Terre Haute, where his uncle lives. I answered the letter received from Sherrill and told him that there was no opening at that time, and that I was going East. I went to New York and Boston, Mass. Lucille Roberts, undoubtedly, knows the address of Sherill's relatives residing near Terre Haute, Ind.

From that time I never saw any of the individuals mentioned above until on June 24, 1933, at Henderson, Kentucky, while stopping at the Kingdon Hotel.

I was walking along Green Street at about 2:30 in the

afternoon, when the car drove by with five men in it. The car was practically a new 16-cylinder Cadillac, four-door. I am sure there was a spare tire on each side in the front. The car was black. There was a lot of chromium on it, and it had wire wheels. It had a plain Cadillac radiator cap.

The car was passing by me in the same direction, on the same side of the street, when Sherrill recognized me. They were going south on U.S. Highway #41, in the direction of Nashville, Tennessee. I was alone when Sherill recognized me. Sherrill was sitting in the front seat with Bailey, who was driving. I recognized one of the three occupants in the back of the car as Braley alias Barnes.

what I was doing there. I recognized Sherrille

Everybody got out of the car except Bailey, who stayed at the wheel. I did not see either the number or color of the license plates. The first thing Sherrill said to me was that they were in a "jam". He said, "What are you doing here?", and I asked him, "What are you doing here?". He said, "We are in a jam. We had to bump off a bunch of people in Kansas City." I asked him if he was mixed up in that Mash affair, and he said, "Nothing else but". At that time Sherrill was alone, the other persons remaining in the car. Bailey spoke up and told Sherrill he was talking too much, and Sherrill said, "I know this fellow, and know he is allright". He made some remark that he would not have any leg if it had not been for me.

Then they all piled out of the car except Bailey. Bailey never left the seat. I noticed that Bailey's right leg stayed in one position all the time. From a medical standpoint it may have been impaired or helpless. I noticed that he drove with his hand instead of with the foot accelerator.

was full of guns and ammunition. They were all on the floor in the back. There were a couple of machine guns and a few sawed off shot guns lying on the floor of the car. They were covered when the occupants of the car got out. All the men had guns on them. There was also in the front of this car, a sawed off shot gun, between Bailey and Sherrill which was not covered, but which gun was placed in the back of the car when they all got out of the car except Bailey.

Bailey did not have any hat on. He had sport shoes and flannel trousers, white shirt and no tie.

Sherrill had a straw hat on. He had no coat on, but had a light pull-on, V-shaped neck, sweater. They were all clean.

Braley alias Barnes had light trousers with suspenders and no coat. He had a Bangkok hat on. Their coats were all off when I first saw them.

I was wrong when I stated all the occupants had their coats off. I now recall that Bailey had a coat on, and had a double holster under it. He pulled back his coat and displayed to me this double holster. There were several 45's in the car; also boxes of cartridges.

Beiley stated they were going down to a filling station to get some Diamond gas. He fold the other fellows to stay with me while he went to get the gas. He had already asked somebody the location of the Diamond Gas Station, which was only a block and a half from where we were, and he went to the gas station, leaving the remaining four people with me.

This place where we were standing was in the residential section about one and one-half blocks from the main thoroughfare. I had been talking to the occupants of the car about four or five minutes before Bailey left to get the gasoline.

probably twelve feet away from the other three fellows, and told me he was in a terrible mess. He said that they had intended to kill Nash only, for double-crossing Bill Creekmore, whom I knew. He said that Mash had double-crossed Creekmore as well as everybody else, and had beat it to Hot Springs, where Beiley and Sherrill and the rest of the boys had gone to get him. They were in Hot Springs when Mash was apprehended and they beat the train into Kansas City.

Orsekmore's place is near Jay, Oklahoma, across the State line from Japlin, Missouri. He used to keep up crooks between jobs and acted as a fence for them. He went to Leavenworth in 1919 for a prime which I do not know.

that it was impossible to get Nash without getting them. He said the five of them were in on it.

there were two cars used in the klling at Kansas City, but he did not tell me the makes of the cars. He said the cars used in Kansas City had been picked up in Kansas City. Sherrill stated that the car now in their possession was not one of the cars used during the killing.

I asked him if it was necessary to mow all these fellows down, and he said that it was done now and that they were all in

the same spot, and that it is capital punishment in Missouri, and that it would not help their cause any, whether they killed one or one hundred. He said it would be safer to travel in one car, because it would be stronger, and that they were going to stick together until the finish.

I noticed that the Cadillac was a very beautiful car. It was a regular stock job. The glass on the car was all down. The car looked comparatively clean.

They told me that they were spending their nights in tourists camps, and not registering in any hotels. They had a trunk on the back of the car. There were no grips in the sar.

Sherrill said some of their associates were afraid that he would do some talking about an escape out of Leavenworth two or three years ago. He mentioned someone from Oklahoma who was in it, but mentioned no name. All this conversation took place with Sherrill, while the other three remained about two or twelve feet away.

He asked me how I was fixed for money, and said that they had plenty of money. I told him I was allright and did not need it. He told me how to get in touch with him. I advised him that I was about through there, at which time I was working on a Route Guide, for Highway #41, listing tourists samps, hotels, service stations, etc.

I told him I might go on down toward Nashville, Tenna He said, "I will tell you how to get in touch with me", and he told me where they were going, and said they were headed for Harlan, Kentucky.

He told me there were two different ways that I could get in touch with him in Nashville - one was to drop him a line addressed to Roy Roberts, General Delivery, Nashville, Tenn., and the other was to see a man named Molan - I think he called him Nig or Nigger Nolan - who is a well known fence at Nashville. He is a book-maker at Mashville.

to Memphis, and that I sould get in touch with him in the same manner at Memphis, either through the Post Office, or a book-maker named Lafe Matham. One of the strangers had relatives around Harlan, Kentucky, and they were going there to make their headquarters in the hills.

Braley alias Barnes finally came over and asked me the same question as Sherrill did, about money, and I told him the same thing I told Sherrill, that I did not need it. Braley said that if I came to Nashville, he would like to see me. I told him that Sherrill had told me how to get in touch with him.

Braley alias Barnes only made a few remarks about Oklahoma, wanting to know if I had been down in Oklahoma lately. That had nothing to do with the same. Pawhuska is his home town. I do not know Mig or Nigger Holan. I do know many reputable people in Mashville.

at Memphis, but I have heard of him. I know his brother-in-law, who is a very high-class Jew, whose name is Max Weis. He used to be in the wholesale boot and shoe business there. I have never met Nathan.

The last time I was in Memphis, was January, 1935, at which time I was in charge of the circus at the Auditorium. It was a show which I put on in connection with the new Bry's Department store. I stayed at the Devoe Hotel. I have no relatives residing in Memphis.

About this time Bailey had come back. He was headed in the opposite direction and was gone about fifteen or twenty minutes to change the oil in the car and get filled up with gas. By this time we had all gotten together. Sherrill and Bailey introduced the other two men to me, but I cannot recall, at this time, their names. You could tell that one was a hill-billy. These two men, whose names I cannot recall, had no coats on. They had sailor hats on. One had a blue shirt and cheap, striped, light-colored trousers.

Bailey told me, We are in a pretty hot spot, but I would rather be in a spot, than back at that place. Anything is better than that.

He said he hoped to see me down in Mashville. I told him I thought maybe I would be down there in a few days. He said I could be a lot of service to them, and that they would be willing to pay me for anything I could do for them, to keep them under cover. I entered into no proposition with them. Bailey, at no time during the entire time, got out of the car.

Bailey wanted to know how long it would be before I would be down to Eashville. I told him probably in a week or ten days. Bailey asked me if Roy had told me how to get in touch with them at Washville. I told him I would probably be there in a week or ten days. I told Sherrill had told me. Bailey then said they would make a good proposition, meaning that I could protect them, and that I could get around where they could not. I told them I would think it over, and talk to them when I came down.

After Beiley returned from the gas station, he remained about ten minutes. In all, I believe I spent about forty minutes with them. Bailey told us he had the crank case drained, and had it filled up with gasoline.

They left me, I would judge, about five or ten minutes after three e clock. They were going a little beyond Nashville, Tennessee, to a tourist camp located on Highway #41, on the other side of Nashvilles. They were going from Nashville, Tenn., to Harlan, Kentucky, to establish a headquarters, and then back and forth between Nashville and Memphis, Tenn.

One of the hill-billies said, "I have a light car in Nashville, Tenn. We are not going to take this thing up into the mountains." The lighter car, according to my understanding, was in Mashville.

Then they got back into the par, Sherrill got in the front seat, and the other three fellows got into the year seat. The sawed-off shot gun was still in the back seat.

Sherrill said he had been hanging out in Oklahoma, I would jusge, around Pawhuska, Ponca City, Tulsa, and Muskogee with Barnes. I think both the other boys had been with him in Oklahoma. I never attempted to get a look at the license plates or the color appearing on same. I turned around when they left and walked down the street, without turning my head.

Immediately after that, I debated the thing until Monday morning. Then I went to Evansville, Ind., and tried to call Mr. W. R. Mosh. Chief Post Office Inspector at St. Louis, whortly after nine wellock, on the 26th. I put the call in collect from either the McCurdy or Vendome Hotel. I was unable to get Mr. Mosh. I talked to the Acting Inspector In Charges I told him that I was anxious to get in touch with Mr. Mosh, in connection with this Nash case. He told me Mr. Mosh was out of the city, but that I could tell him anything I had to say. I said I would rather get in touch with somebody who was directly in charge.

The state of the s

He then teld me to call Mr. Ladd at Central 1850 at St. Louis. I did not do this, but at \$:30 that afternoon, I sent a day letter to Mr. Hoover at Washington, as a result of which I was interviewed by Mr. Maynor, at Henderson, My., the same night, about ten o'cleck.

There is a woman with a sarnival at Middletown, Thio, who will be there until tonight, whose name is Maude Mash, either married to Frank Nash or his brether. Her name now is Maude Montgomery. She is known in the show business as Maude Nash. She may or may not know something. I last saw Maude Nash about eighteen months ago in Chicago."

Copy of the above statement, at the request of the Director, was immediately furnished the Chicago Office of the Bureau in order that Lucille Roberts, a girl friend of Sherill's, now playing in the "Days

of '49" at the Century of Progress at Chicago, Illineis, might be interviewed immediately concerning any information she might have regarding Sherrill.

Copies of the above statement were also furnished the Kansas City Office under date of July 1 for their information in the premises in order that a further sheck might be made at Hot Springs and Little Rock, Arkansas, and with the thought that they might want to follow out the information concerning Bill Creekmore.

Ingraham stated that on June 30 he noticed an article appearing in the True Detective Magazine listing photographs of the individuals that escaped from Lansing, Kansas, on May 50, 1933, and that the only individual that he recognized from the group of photographs appearing in the magazine was that of Haivey 7. Bailey.

From a great number of Identification Orders displayed to Ingraham, which were carefully covered reflecting only the photographs of the individuals, Ingraham immediately picked therefrom the photographs of Sherrill and Bailey as being two of the occupants of the ear which he saw at Henderson, Kentucky, on June 24. He failed to identify the photograph of Brady, subject of identification order filso, as being that of Slim Braley alias Barnes. Ingraham admitted to the writer that he served in the federal penitentiary under the name of Edgar Jay alias Paul Gregg, alias Fred Smith, and that he was received at the Leavenworth institution on May 3, 1919, from Santa Fs, New Mexico, sentenced to serve a period of two years and discharged November 15, 1920, and which is at variance with the information which he furnished Spacial Agent Mayner.

It will, also, be noted that in the first paragraph of the statement dictated by Ingraham he states that Roy Sherrill, alias Roy Roberts, was received at the penitentiary while he was incarcerated there. However, the records reflect that Sherrill was received in the institution on November 13, 1918. When this was called to the attention of Dr. Ingraham he stated that due to the long period of time that has elapsed he was possibly mistaken as to this fact. It will, also, be noted that he now shanges his story to the effect that he met Harvey Bailey at Kansas City, Missouri, about ten years ago and that he was mistaken when he advised agent Maynor he first met him at the Leavenworth Penitentiary.

Assording to Ingraham's statement, during the year 1932 he was employed at the Chicago Stadium as Manager and at which time he became acquainted with Lucille Roberts, alleged to be a girl friend of Sherrill's.

With regard to Slim Braley, alias Barnes, Mr. Mgraham stated that he was well acquainted with this individual and that he could not possibly be mistaken as to his identity. He furnished in substance the information that was received from the Kansas City Office concerning Barnes' sentence to the Kansas State Penitentiary on the charge of forgery, and that

he was paroled during the year 1928 and at which time he saw him at Ponce City, and which is more fully set forth in his statement. However, as previously noted, Slim Braley alias Barnes, is now serving a 50 year sentence in the Oklahoma State penitentiary. He offers as an excuse for not furnishing the additional information, set forth is his atatement, to Special Agent Maynor the fact that Agent Maynor was accompanied by a Deputy Sheriff and that he did not feel at liberty to disclose all information in his possession.

Ingraham now states that he may be mistaken as to the name Lafe or Lacey Nathan, the person Bailey and others were to contact at Memphis, Tennessee, but he states that the person to be contacted is a brother-in-law of Max Weis. It will, also, be noted that he now changes his statement to the effect that Mig or Nigger Molan at Mashville, Tennessee, is a bookmaker and that he was apparently in error when he advised that Molan was the operator of a cheap hotel at Mashville. He was unable to give a satisfactory answer as to how he happened to be in possession of information that the contact at Memphis, concerning Mathan, was a brother-in-law of Max Weis. He stated, however, that Sherrill did not furnish him with this information.

It was ascertained during the course of the interview that Ingraham is well known, apparently, in both Nashville and Mamphis and it might be entirely probable that he has in the past contacted Sam Nathan. At this point it might be well to state that Ingraham is now out of work and is at present located at Cincinnati, Chio, and avoring to make a contact through the bill board with some carnival or circus. He was unable to furnish any further data concerning Sherrill's statement relative to the killing of Nash for double-crossing Bill Greekmore. However, the Mansas City Office might have further information concerning Greekmore at Jay Oklahoma.

the person to be contacted at Memphis being a brother-in-law of Max Weis was telephonically communicated by the writer to Special Agent R. E. Peterson, at which time Agent Peterson was requested to make discreet investigation as to the character and reputation of Max Weis, ascertaining the identity of his brother-in-law.

Memorandum has now been received from Agent Peterson stating in substance that Max Weis was formerly in the boot and shoe business and is now retired and apparently enjoys a good reputation in that city; that his brother-in-law is Sam Mathan, the person previously mentioned in the body of this report and was previously interviewed by the writer. Sam Mathan resides at 8976 Iroquuis Road and has his place of business in the rear of 14 M. Front Street, according to the city directory for Memphis.

It was further ascertained that Sam Nathan is very close to Detective Sgt. Em. Rainey of the Memphis Police Department and if Sam Nathan has any information concerning the Subjects of this case he would be more apt to furnish same to Rainey rather than to any other person.

The writer upon reseiving this information on July S. telephonically, communicated with Inspector Criffin and requested that Detective Sgt. Rainey be immediately assigned to this case in order shat he might interview Sam Nathan, the results of which will be telephonically communicated to the Birmingham Office.

Special Agent McCaffrey at Hashville was telephonically requested to ascertain whether a Nig or Nigger Holan is known to be a book maker in that city.

With reference to the last paragraph of the statement dictated by Ingraham at Cincinnati, Chio, the writer on July 1, accompanied by Special Agent Russell of the Cincinnati Office, interviewed Maude Montgomery, alies Maude Mash, who is now playing with the World's Shows of America at Middletown, Chio. She stated that she married one Archie Mash at Boston, Mass. in 1923; that Archie Mash was the only child, and that his parents resided in a small city outside of Boston; that she was well acquainted with his relatives and to her knowledge Frank Mash was no relative of her former husband; that she secured a divorce from Archie Mash during the year 1927 in Texas and lest heard from him in 1929, at which time he was at Portland, Maine; that her former husband, Archie Mash, was an acrobat, and to her knowledge was never connected with the criminal element.

The results of the interview with Ingraham were furnished telephonically, to the Director, who stated the information should be immediately furnished the Chicago and Kensas City Offices in order that further investigation at those points could be made, and that further inquiries should be conducted at Memphis, Tennessee.

UNDEVALOPED LEADS:

KANSAS CITY OFFICE is respectfully requested to sonsider the information furnished by H. G. Ingraham, with particular reference to the Cadillac cars alleged to have been seen at Hot Springs and Little Rock, Ark; also the information furnished soncerning Bill Greekmans.

CHICAGO OFFICE, as requested in the letter forwarded under date of Jaly 1, is requested to make a discreet investigation, interviewing Miss Lucille Roberts now playing in the "Days of '49" Century of Progress, Chicago, and it might also be desirable to secure some information concerning Ingraham while employed as Manager for the Chicago Stadium.


NEW YORK OFFICE is requested to ascertain name of the person to whom license plate SK 8966 was issued and to secure all available data relative to Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Saya. If Joseph Saya is located, it is desirable to ascertain the name of the white person accompanying him through

Dear Sir:

Reference is made to a letter dated July 3, 1933 from the St. Paul office to the Detroit office requesting certain information regarding Verne C. Omiller, alias Verne Miller. On this date I forwarded to the Bureau and also the Kansas City office a telegram stating that this person is not wanted at the present time in Michigan. In this connection I have just interviewed Captain I. H. Marmon of the Michigan State Police in person at the Detroit office and he advises me that he is satisfied that Miller participated in the robbery of the bank at Holland, Mich., about two years ago but due to the fact that the main witnesses in the case were so unreliable it has not been possible to take any action against Miller. The difficulty experienced by the authorities in this robbery was that the witnesses seemed to be mable to identify as a participant in the robbery anyone whose photograph was shown them.

Captain Marmon, while being interviewed about this matter, stated that he had a reliable confidential informant in Chicago, Ill., from whom he had obtained information about Miller but was not in a position to disclose the name of this informant. The informant in the past, according to Captain Marmon, has been a bank robber but is now up in years and has lost his nerve and has not been in on any robberies lately. Also, Captain Marmon stated that this man is wanted on a small charge - not by the Government - and that he has been holding this over his head to get information from him. This informant has served a term in prison and is acquainted with all the bank robbers of any consequence who operate out of Chicago, St. Paul, Kansan City and St. Louis. He has furnished valuable information to the Michigan State Police and Captain Marmon believes that this man is in a position to gain information on the activities and whereabouts of practically all the friends of Frank Nash who was recently shot at Kansas City. It would be useless to have this man contacted for information by any other officers.

Captain Hermon states that he has no assignments which till darry
him to Chicago in the near future but that he would be very glad to assist TION
in this case and if the Commissioner of the Michigan State Police would 933 A.M
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order him to Chicago and take care of the expense officially he would be very glad to go to that point and contact his informant, or if this Bureau feels that he could be of any assistance and would arrange with the Commissioner of the State Police at East Lansing for his trip he would likewise be very glad to cooperate to the fullest extent. Captain Marmon has also interviewed Harvey Bailey, subject of I. O. #1189, in the Kansas State Prison, as well as Wilber Underhill.

I did not indicate to Captain Marmon that this Bureau would be eager to have him go to Chicago but advised him that we would keep the matter in mind. This was done for the reason that the writer has no knowledge as to the extent of the investigation being made and it is believed that those in charge of the same would be in a better position to determine just what would be the opportune time for Captain Marmon to go to Chicago and contact his informant, if such assistance would be deemed necessary.

While on this same subject, I wish to invite the Bureau's attention to a report from the Salt Lake City office made by Special Agent A.R. Gere, dated June 26, 1933, setting forth an interview had with Arthur Phnson, alias Red Price, who is presently confined in the Colorado State Prison at Canon City. In this matter the Detroit office was requested to ascertain if a bank robbery had been committed in October, 1931 at Madison, Mich. There is no such post office as Madison, Mich., but there does seem to be a village known by that name and a letter was addressed to the sheriff of the county at Adrian, Mich., trying to verify the story as given by Johnson. A reply has been received that there is no bank at Madison and the sheriff's records show no robbery there in 1931. This reply is merely in the form of a notation on the bottom of my letter to the sheriff.

In this connection I am writing to the Michigan State Police at East Lansing, Mich., to ascertain if they have worked on any bank robbery in a small town near Madison, Mich., and if so to furnish me with the details of same.







You will recall in our conversation this morning, I told you the Kansas City Police Department had given information to the press regarding Verne C. Miller and the location of the house where he stayed at Kansas City, and, accordingly all during last night, I received telephone calls approximately every half hour from the press for information, and I told them that we had no statement to make at this time. After conversing with you this morning, the newspaper reporters again came to this office, and I handed them a copy of a statement, which reads as follows:

*Numerous requests have been received from the press for information regarding the Union Station Massacre. I have no statement to make at this time and no statement will be made until this case has been properly concluded. It is of course obvious that any state ent emanating from this office at this time would only hamper our investigation. We have been working hard on this case, and believe sincerely that now is the time for Action rather than words will bring further concerted action. the desired results. At the proper time full particulars will be given to the press. You may be assured of our whole-hearted cooperation. For any further information at this time, I respectfully refer you to Mr. J. Edgar Hoover, Director of the United States Eureau of Investigation, Washington, D.C.

Dear Mr. Hoover:

I notice that you have issued instructions
to your men to attain efficiency in the use of sub-machine gun
and that each office will be furnished with one of these weapons.

I think this is a good move and I wish you would go further and
request the Attorney-General to make the same regulation for marshals
and deputy marshals. In view of the new legislation by the last
Congress, I feel that radical means are necessary to combat such dastardly crimes as occurred in Kansas City. Incidentally, I narrowly missed
being on the scene in Kansas City, as I was taking give men to Leavenworth at the time. I note that you are looking for two men in connection ments
with this erime and I hope Messrs. Brady and Bailey are apprehended
shortly. I don't remember my office getting these photos and prints
and would suggest that you send one to all marshals if you have not
already done so.

If you should see fit to interview the Attorney-I would like to make a suggestion through you to him as coming; from a United States Marshal in the field: Why not broaden the duties and powers of United States Marshals and deputies, so that they sould have more investigative power and also allow them to have a measure of police power that they do not now have. I believe some constructive reorganization can be done along this line and I, for one, as anxious to assist and cooperate with all Government Departments to the furtherance of law and order, with perticular emphasis on the responsibilities that will, undoubtedly, arise under the new legislation. I believe that such broadening of the Marshal's activity could be done through department regulations rather than new legislation. The public has clothed the United States Marshal with a great deal of power that he does not possess, as you and I know that his powers are very restricted, and I cannot see any reason why his office should not be reorganized so as to give more efficient service in crime prevention and detection. Let me have your reaction to this as I am very much interested.

MEMORANDUM FOR THE DIRECTOR.

Agent D. O. Smith called from Chicago and said that Agents Jenkins and Brennan had interviewed the widow of Frank Nash at Wemona, Illinois, but nothing was gained by the interview. She simply smiled and stood pat. She even denied that she was Frank Nash's widow, stating that she was married at one time when everybody was drunk but she had forgotten the details. This was a hundred to one shot which did not turn out. I told Smith to tell Brennan to go back to Kansas City and to have Jenkins keep a general line on the widow. Purvis' idea was to get out some kind of a process and call her in and attempt to break her down. I told him I did not think it would be advisable at the present time; that there was very little chance of breaking down a woman of this type who had consorted with criminals all her life. We may do it later after we try to break down some male criminals.

MEMORALTUM of Telephone Calls re FRANK NASH case

Mr. Nathan advised during telephone conversation yesterday that the City Manager, who had requested the telephone numbers in possession of the Agents working on this case, had agreed that his men would take no steps without first consulting the Bureau Agents. He further advised that it had been definitely ascertained that fingerprints on telephone apparatus and bottles in the house under surveillance, were those of Verne C. Miller, and that the Police there felt sure that Miller is the principal in the case.

Mr. Quinn telephoned today to state that he had located Ingraham in one of the hotels, in spite of the fact that he, Ingraham, had failed to notify Mr. Ladd of his address as agreed. Mr. Quinn advised that Ingraham's statement as given now varies considerably from his first statement given to Agent Maynor (to whom he states he did not give all the information, because he did not like the Agent); that Ingraham now admits he served in Leavenworth under the name of Edgar Day, alies Paul Blake, alias Fred Smith; that they brought Sherrill into Leavenworth in 1919 while he. Ingraham. was there; that he was mistaken when he advised Agent Maynor that he had met Bailey recently but that he did meet Bailey in Kansas City ten years ago. Mr. Quinn advises that a number of photographs were presented to Ingraham, with the names and descriptions of the individuals covered, and that Ingraham picked out Sherrill and Bailey, but was unable to identify Braley; that Ingraham advises he may be wrong as to the name of Macon; that his latest statement advises that Bailey was driving the car and that Bailey rulled back his coat and showed Ingraham two guns; that there was a sawed-off shot-gun between Bailey and Sherrill in the front seat of the car. Mr. Quinn advises that Mr. Ingraham states he read in a detective magazine a story of the break at Kansas City, which contained pictures of these individuals to whom he referred. Mr. Quinn believes that in this way Ingraham might have been able to identify these individuals which he did.

I suggested that Mr. Quinn forward a copy of this statement to the Kansas City office, and also to the Chicago office, in view of the fact that therein Ingraham refers to a girl at the Century of Progress with whom he is supposed to be quite friendly.

MEMORANDUM FOR THE DIRECTOR

Reference is made to I.O. No. 1194, entitled CHARLES ARTHUR OFLOYD, alias "Pretty Boy", who is wanted in connection with the murder at Kansas City.

The Bureau's criminal record of this individual contained a notation to the effect that he was sentenced November 24, 1930, to serve 12 years in the Ohio State Penitentiary for a bank robbery at Sylvania, Ohio, and escaped enroute to the penitentiary.

Before printing this Identification Order it was deemed advisable to verify this notation in order that same might be contained on the Identification Order. Accordingly, the writer contacted the Cincinnati Office and requested Mr. Klein to verify this information. Mr. Klein later telephoned and advised that he had contacted the Ohio State Penitentiary but that their records only contained a letter from the William J. Burns Detective Agency to the effect that Floyd had been sentenced to serve a term in said penitentiary but had escaped enroute. Consequently, the Detroit Office was communicated with by telephone and Mr. Donaldson was requested to verify the information that Floyd was sentenced on November 24, 1930, to serve a sentence of 12 years for a bank robbery at Sylvania, Ohio. Mr. Donaldson advised by telephone that the records of the Toledo, Ohio, Police Department had been checked and that Floyd was sentenced November 24, 1930, to serve from 12 to 15 years for a bank robbery at Sylvania, Ohio, and that he had escaped enroute to the penitentiary.

Accordingly, this record is being included on the Bureau's Identification Order, along with the other criminal offenses of this subject, omitting the word "Notation."

Later, Mr 30'Hare of the Associated Press called in person at this office and was furnished with copies of these six I.O.'s.

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

MEMORANIUM OF TELEPHONE CALL re FRANK NASH case

Mr. Gates advised by telephone that the representative of the Kansas City Post Journal had received a long telegram from his newspaper and had arrived at the conclusion therefrom that the Mansas City Police Department was endeavoring to get all the glory for determining the names of the individuals involved in the Kansas City shooting, in which an Agent of this Bureau was fatally rounded. I advised Mr. Gates that the Kansas City Police Department had received their information from the I.O.'s prepared by this Bureau upon individuals suspected of having some connection with the shooting, but had given out to the newspapers that informa-. tion as though they had ascertained that these persons had a part in the shooting. I advised Mr. Gates that the information contained in the newspaper article was identically that given to the Police Department by our Agents at Kanses City. I advised Mr. Gates that I had instructed my office at Kansas City not to give to the newspapers any information in this regard.

It was decided that the Bureau should prepare for Mr. Gates a statement regarding the I.O.'s issued by the Bureau in this connection, for release to the press. Subsequently, Mr. Gates telephoned and advised he had taken this matter up with the Attorney General and that the Attorney General was of the opinion that this statement should be prepared.



Finishlo at the Rising Sun Brevery, Elizabeth, H.J. on September 19, He stated that he was of the opinion that possibly they were identical and in the event this was true and the Bureau was seeking. information concerning his present whereabouts, the Pinkerton Detective Agency had on file certain data with respect to his activities, relatives, associates, etc. which might prove of some assistance. He volunteered to render this information in the event it was found that the Bureau as seeking this ma's apprehension.

In a review of the file, it is noted that reports of former special agent J. D. Class, with reference to investigation at Brainard, Minnesota, relative to the woman "Vivian," who has been living with Verns C. Miller, reflect facts indicating that it is probable that the parents of this woman Vivian are respectable and upright citizens.

MEMORANDUM FOR THE DIRECTOR.

I have just telephoned Vetterli at Kansas City with regard to the A. P. dispatch this morning referring to the taking into custody of James Sammons Yesterday afternoon a wire was received from Kansas City asking for the record of this man. It was given as per the attached. Vetterli states, in amplification of information received yesterday afternoon, that in connection with the telephone tap upon a certain house in Chicago information was received that a certain man there wanted two trousers from the cleaners immediately as he had to leave town. Deputies of the Sheriff's office covering Kansas City and two Agents of the Bureau immediately went to the house, the Deputies of the Sheriff's office entering and taking into custody James Sammons. Chicago and Joliet were communicated with and Chief of Detectives Shoemaker of Chicago stated that this man was wanted in Chicago for robbery and as one of the public enemies. Shoemaker also said he understood he was wanted in Baltimore for robbery. There is apparently no connection with the Union Station killing on the part of this individual. Vetterli stated that the A. P. dispatch was very much garbled; that he made no announcement in this case; that the newspapers told him that they had gotten their information as to the apprehension of Sammons from Chicago and he simply told them that Sammons had been taken into custody by the local Sheriff's office on suspicion and was being held.

On June 18, 1953, Agent Madala interviewed Mr. John Finnegan, ice and coal dealer living at 3328 South Cakley Boulevard, who advised that the occupants of 3334, which is two doors to the South, consisted of the McGuirl family and Mr. and Mrs. Thomas Moren, Moren, according to Finnegan, is married to the eldest McGuirl girl, first name unknown. He further advised that Margaret McGuirl is also married, but he was unable to tell Agent Madala the name of her husband (she is Mrs. Francis Keating). He further stated that Margaret McGuirl does a great deal of traveling, having recently returned from a trip to California. Mr. Finnegan said that he had not seen Margaret McQuirl for the past twenty days and thought that she was probably out of town. Bernard McGuirl, a young man, one of the sons, is supposed to be in the beer peddling business, having recently purchased a Ford truck for the purpose of delivering his product. Bernard is about twenty-three years old. The premises at 3334 South Oakley Avenue is owned by Mr. Verkuring, who lives in back of this address across the alley. Carrier Marchen promised to closely observe the activities at this residence.

The Chicago Bureau office sent a telegram to the Cincinnati office requesting information in regard to the owner of Kentucky, 1933, license plates No. 396020, and it was developed that these license plates were issued for a new Lincoln sedan to one Joseph H. Adams at the address Kentucky Hotel, Louisville, Kentucky. A letter from the Cincinnati Bureau office dated Jane 20, 1955, carbon copies of which were directed to the Bureau and to the Kansas City office, detailed considerable information concerning the reputation and past activities of idams.

Agent interviewed Lieutenant Arthur Katt, in charge of the Hoodlum Squad, Chicago Police Department, who said that he knew Adams, by sight as well as by reputation, and that he believed that he knew where Adams would be staying at the present time. He said that he would make an effort to locate where Adams was staying, with a view to determining whether Bernard Phillips might be frequenting that neighborhood or might be contacting Adams. Lieutement Katt is especially interested in the apprehension of Bernard Phillips, having recently apprehended Clive Bridges, who was not identified by the witnesses who were brought down from Minneapolis, Minnesota, in connection with the robbery of the North American branch of the Borthwestern Bank in March, 1932. However, Bridges was positively identified as the party who robbed the East Chicago Bank at East Chicago, Indiana, in April, 1933, and has since been convicted on that charge. Bernard Phillips has also been positively identified as a participant in that bank robbery, as well as having been identified by picture as a member of the gang that robbed the bank in Minneapolis in March, 1932. In addition, it will be noted that Robert Loftie and Bernard Phillips were identified by police photographs as the parties Who shot and killed Cashier W. E.XTemmell during a \$918.00 robbery of the La Crosse, Indiana, bank on Monday, June 26, 1935. Teamell was killed apparently by Loftis when he refused to open the wallt, which was, however, operated by a time lock. The newspaper article states that Miss Millian Youngren, Assistant Cashier, made the identification of Phillips and Loftis at the Gary Police Department.

Special Agent J. D. Swenson together with Detective Thomas McSweeny, made an investigation on the night of June 17, 1933, and on succeeding dates in an endeavor to locate Winnie Williams. Mr. Dawson,

Agent Swenson and Detective McSweeny visited the Jeffrey Tavern at 83rd Street and South Chicago Avenue, and discovered through discreetly interviewing a bootblack in the washroom that Winnie Williams had left on April 30, 1933, or May 7, 1933, the bootblack being sure that it was on a Sunday. McSweeney also interviewed the owner of the Jeffrey Tavern and reported to Agent Swenson that he had obtained similar information. The Jeffrey Tavern is a beer garden and girls are changed at that location every month, Finnie Williams was allowed to go a week earlier than her month due to the fact that she did not report every evening for work as she should have done.

The present operator of the Marshall Hotel, one Leon Mayer, was interviewed by Agent Swenson, and he stated that he had obtained possession of the hotel on June 9, 1933, and that he had no one by the name of Mabel/Ringer or Winnie Williams living in his hotel. Mr. Mayer said that the hotel was in the hands of a trustee, Mr. A. W. Fulton, 33 North LaSelle Street, and that the former manager and operator was one Lester Eddy, address unknown,

Mr. J. F. Sheen, a member of the firm of A. W. Fulton, 2115, 31 North Lasalle Street, was interviewed. He said that Leon Mayer had taken possession of the Marshall Hotel on June 7th and that Lester Eddy was the former manager. No books were turned over by Mr. Eddy, Mr. Sheen said, and there was so way of determining who the gueste at the Marshall Hotel were prior to June 7th. He discovered, however, through a friend that Eddy was staying at the Hotel Media, Mt. Clements, Michigan, but would be back in Chicago by July 1st, at which time he could be reached at 38 South Dearborn Street.

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Agent Swenson made inquiry through C. F. Morris, Assistant Superintendent, Lincoln Park Postal Station, which covers 1232 North LaSalle Street, and asked that the carrier serving this route watch for mail addressed to Winnie Williams or Mabel Ringer. There was no forwarding address for either Mabel Ringer or Winnie Williams at the Lincoln Park Postal Station.

Special Agent J. B. McDonald, assisted by Detective Ed Gemschow, Detective Bureau, Chicago Police Department, was assigned by Acting Special Agent in Charge D. O. Smith to investigate the possibility that Vernon Miller, or some member of that gang, would be in contact with Marthacksore alies Williams alies Harris, who resided at the Sherone Apartments, 4423 Sheridan Road.

Agent McDonald interviewed Mr. Oscar Mchorann, might clerk at the Sherong Apertments. Mohorann said that Mrs. Moore was also known as Mrs. J. A. Harris and occupied apartment 414. She is employed as a hostess at the 225 Club which is located at 225 West Superior Street. She works as a hostess on the average of five nights a week and on these nights she leaves about 8:30 or 9:00 and will return about four or five o'clock in the morning. Mrs. Moore keeps company with one Lawrence Bidderman, whose mother formerly owned the Sherone Apartments and Bidderman seems to be the only person who is seen with Mrs. Moore. She has very few visitors and makes only a few telephone calls. To the knowledge of Mr. Mohorann, the receives no long distance telephone calls. The pictures of the various persons known to have been friends and confederates of Mash were shown to Mr. Mohorann, but he was unable to identify any of them. He stated that he had not noticed any cars bearing out of town licenses, particularly from the State of Missouri, around the apartment. In the telephone communication from Kansas City it was also indicated that a number of calls were made from the Southern Club at Hot Springs, Arkansas, to the telephone number CENTRAL 5990 in Chicago, This number was found to be an unlisted number which was sub-Illinois. scribed to by JosyHawes at 64 West Randolph Street, Chicago, Illinois. Further investigation by Special Agent W. C. Ryan disclosed that the address of Haves was Room 850, and that the door bore the name "National Glass and Mirror Company,

Agent Ryan interviewed Mr. William H. Rosengart and Iso A. Brunner, mail carriers, who alternate in the delivery of mail to Joe Hawes at the above address. These men stated that Hawes was known as a syndicate book maker and has been at that address for the past five years. He has few if any callers and does all the business over the telephone. It was reported that he conducted an unusually large booking business, writing bets that other bookmakers would not handle.

and discovered that although he, Schoemaker, had heard the name Jea, Hawes, he was not acquainted with this individual. Captain & Connor of the Second District was called by Chief Schoemaker, but he also was unable to give any information regarding Hawes.

At the suggestion of Chief Schoenaker, Agent called an Captain Larkin of the First District; located at Madison Street and the Chicago River. Captain Larkin stated that he did not know Joe Hawes, but that he had a man whom he trusted implicitly whom he thought would be acquainted with Hawes. In consequence, Captain Larkin called in Detective E. F. Devine, who stated that he had only known Hawes for the past six months, and outside of the fast that Hawes was a bookmaker he knows little about his activities. However, he stated that he did not believe that Hawss had been out of town for some time. He said that he would not describe Hawes as a very large bookmaker, although his book was undoubtedly larger than most of the neighborhood varities. From the best of Devine's information, Hawes does most of his business over the telephone. Devine was unable to mention any gang or known hoodlums with whom Hawes might be connected. He said that Hawes was supposed to be living at the Morrison Hotel at this time. The Morrison Hotel is one of the lergest hotels in the loop area in Chicago,

While interviewing Mr. Sol Ets Hokin, whose interview will be set forth later, it was discovered that Hawes operated a number of books at various places around Chicago, and that the Randolph Street address is apparently Hawes' headquarters. While Hawes is not one of the very large Chicago bookmakers, nevertheless he has a sizeable business. His only connection with out of town points, is probably in splitting bets either to those points or from those points, that is if a bookmaker took a bet of over \$100.00 on more than one horse, he might desire to split it to more than one bookmaker, and it is possible that Hawes has friends to whom he splits bets or for whom he splits bets. Hawes undoubtedly has a private wire leading to some section of the cauntry, but just what section is covered by Hawes' wire is anknown at this time.

In connection with the Plymouth soups which was found to have been in the possession of Mash at the time of his apprehension is Hot Springs, Arkansas, attention is directed to the report of Special Agent V. The Chicago Bureau office received a communication from the DeSoto Motor Corporation, Chicago district office, through Miss De McCabe, which showed that this automobile had been used by a representative of the DeSoto Motor Corporation, and that it had been sold on February 2, 1933, as a used car to the Lake Side Auto Sales Co. 6130 Cottage Grove Avenue, Chicago, Illinois, The telegram from the Oklahoma City office dated June 25, 1933, indicated that the Plymouth Sedan in the possession of Mash bore the motor number PC 45468, and the serial number PG 8301 BC.

Agent immediately called the Antomobile Protective and Information Bureau at Chicago, Illinois, and was informed by Mre Rigoll of that office that while the motor number disclosed that this car was probably a late 1932 or an early 1953 Plymouth, the serial number was incorrect, and that the serial number had undoubtedly been incorrectly copied. Mr. Rigoll promised to trace this car through from the factory.

The Stolen auto Division of the Chicago Police Department was contacted by telephone and it was reported from that source that there was no information in regard to a Plymouth coupe bearing this motor number. Hawkins said he did not remember any party storing a Plymouth coupe other than one person whom he knew as being a relative of prominent persons in Chicago. Hawking suggested that the night man might also have some information and stated that the name of this night man was Harold Lobinsinger, who came on duty at 8:00 P.M. and who had worked at the garage for a considerable time. Mr. Don Boring, Secretary and Treasurer, Lake Side Auto Sales Company, 6130 Cottage Grove Avenue was maxt interviewed. Mr. Boring produced his records which showed that on February 7, 1935, had sold a DeSoto Sedan bearing motor No. 5 C 19618, serial No. 5051428, to RARL L. MEHRE, 1345 E. 62nd Street, telephone Dorchester 4503, and that he had taken in trade a 1929 Essex automobile bearing engine mumber 1024364, and serial No. 957349. Aside from the trade in on this car the DeSoto had been purchased for cash, the total purchase price being \$625.00. Mr. Boring stated that it is his understanding that Mr. Mehre was employed by the Wayne Pump Company of Fort Wayne, Indiana, to travel and repair broken Wayne gasoline pumps. He said that Mehre had purchased he believed two Essex cars from a nearby dealer, and had been living in the community for four or five years at least. He said that Mehre came to the garage frequently for service and that he felt sure that Mehre was legitimate. Mr. Buring was then asked to exemine his records under the name of George W. Miller and discovered that on February 7, 1935, he had sold to George W. Miller, 5506 Lake Park Asemie, Plymouth coupe, black in color, of a standard business model, which bore motor number PC 45468, and serial number 1801324. The key number was 4335. This transaction was made by Mr. Don Boring, the records show, and a 1929 Buick, engine number 2342351, serial number 2227751 was traded in. \$260,00 was allowed on this Buick and \$344.00 was paid in cash. Mr. Boring said that the transaction occurred as follows:

This man then left the 1989 Buick at the garage and said he would be back in several hours. stating that in the meantime he would go to the city hall and procure his license plates. Although Mr. Boring did not remember the incident at first, he later recalled that about that time Mr. Barry, the salesman who sold the car to Mr. Mehre, was present, and stated that he was going to the city hall to procure license plates for another purchaser, and that he would obtain his license plates. Mehre it seems, had already filled out his application for both State and city licenses, and Miller, therefore, filled out his application for license plates for this Flymouth automobile, and turned the funds over to Barry. who proceeded to the mity hall and purchased the city license plates and the Illinois State license plates. 1935 is the first year that za State license plates have been distributed from the city of Chicago, previously all plates coming from Springfield, Illinois, and all identification cards are still mailed from Springfield; Illinois, but if not delivered, are sent to the office of the Secretary of State in Chicago. Boring stated that following this he had not seen this George Miller and that Miller had never returned for service on the car.

Mr. Hokin admitted that in addition to being manager of that garage he had for the last six or seven years operated a book in the city of Chicago. He said he was well acquainted with one Joa Hawes, whose telephone it will be noted at 64 West Randolph Street, Chicago, was called from the Southern Club at Hot Springs, Arkansas. Hokin said he is no longer in the book making business, having closed his shop recently, because it cost him too much to operate and he does not intend to open again until the Fall. Mr. Hokin said he would make inquiry among the employees in an endeavor to ascertain whether a George W. Miller was ever known as a person who stored a car at that garage, and as a person who had received an identification card there.

On a second call on Mr. Sol Ets Hokin this individual stated that he had been unable to obtain any information in regard to the identity of George W. Miller, although the fact that was in possession of the identification card would indicate that in some way he had received this card from that garage. Officers at the Hyde Park Police Station, Chicago, Illinois, were also interviewed in connection with the reputation of the Lake Park Garage at 5506 Lake Park Avenue and in regard to the reputation of Hokin. It was found that there was no indication that this garage was a hoodlum hangout or that Hokin had been involved in any trouble.

Through the Antomobile Protective and Information Bursan it was discovered that the Buick antomobile traded in on the Plymouth ear in question had been sold by the Buick Company to the Broadway Buick Company, 5701 Broadway, Chicago, Illinois, telephone Longbeach 7700. The Antomobile Protective and Information Bureau again notified the Chicago Bureau office that its representatives had discovered that

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this car had been sold on February 5, 1928 to Dr. Ward 5, alden, 1554 Howard Street, Evanston, Illinois. Dr. Alden had moved from Evanston about three years ago, so their investigation disclosed, as but through relatives at this point it had been discovered that in the Fall of 1930, Dr. Alden had traded this Buick to the Fox Motor Company, which is now out of business, for a Franklin automobile. Representatives of the Automobile Protective and Information Bureau had gone no further in their search for the purchaser of this car and it will be necessary for the Chicago Bureau office to locate the former officers of the Fox Motor Company and in this way ascertain where the records of this company are now kept, if indeed they can be found, and in that way locate the purchaser of this car.

In connection with the Masonic card in the possession of a Frank Mash at the time of his apprehension, which was forwarded to the Chicago Bureau office, the fellowing investigation was conducted by Agent. This card was issued by the Ancient Free and Accepted Masons of Illinois on October 17, 1932, to George W. Miller, Uptown Lodge No. 1127 A.F. & A.M. of Chicago, Illinois. This card showed that dues in the sum of \$10.00 had been paid to 12/31/33. The signature on this eard was that of Herman Siegel, the Secretary.

Herman Siegel was located at 708 Grace Street, Chicago. Illinois, Lakeview \$102, and was interviewed at his store at 756 Sheridan Road, telephone lakeview 5885. Mr. Siegel runs a atore dealing in women's drasses in a low priced range. Mr. Siegel stated after an examination of the card that it was not his signature which appeared on this card. In examination of Mr. Siegel's signature on numerous checks and other papers easily disclosed that Mr. Siegel was not the person who had signed his name to this card. In addition, it is apparent that the name George W. Miller had been written on this eard after the seal had been affixed and not before, as is the usual custom. This could be seen due to the fact that the words and dates had been made to conform to the curvatures made by the seal. The signature of the holder of the pard, George W. Miller, appeared to bear a marked similarity to that of the person who signed the name Herman Siegel to the card. Mr. Biegel said that he had been Secretary of the Uptown Lodge for five years until Jane 1, 1933, at which time his place had been taken by a Mr. Arnople. He stated that the lodge, as he could remember, had no member by the name of George W. Miller. He said that the blank books were printed in Bloomington and by the Masonic order and were forwarded in lots of twenty-five as ordered to the various lodges. The Secretary them has possession of these card and seal, which are kept locked in his desk at the meeting place of the lodge, which in this case is the Paul Revers Temple at Ashland and

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Wilson Avenues, Chicago, Illinois, Biegel said that Guring the five years of his incumbency no books had been stolen, no cards had been stolen and he had never noticed that his seal had been misplaced. He said, however, that numerous members lost their cards from time to time and that the cards are not collected at the end of the year, but are kept by the members or are discarded by them. Mr. Siegel said that until the first of January, 1932, the dues were \$15.00 a year, but following the first of January, 1932, the dues were reduced to \$10.00 a year. Mr. Siegel said, after examining photographs of Frank Mash, Verne Miller, Bernard Phillips and others, that he was unable to identify any of the pictures as being those of members of the lodge, or persons who had wisited the lodge while he was secretary.

The only explanation Mr. Siegel sould give was that in some way someone had obtained possession of an old eard and had, through the means of chemicals or in some other way, removed the name of the holder of the card and inserted the name George W. Miller. Mr. Siegel said he could not remember just what shade the present cards were, but his wife, who was present, said that Mr. Siegel's cards, she thought, were several shades darker than the one that Agent had. A careful examination of this card by the naked eye fails to show any erasures or any sign that an acid was used in removing the signature.

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Chicago, Illinois, telephone Lakeview 6624, and who is employed at 854.
West Randolph Street by the firm of Kramer Brothers, a produce business, was interviewed at the latter address at which time he stated that he knew no George W. Miller, who was a member of the lodge, and an examination of the pictures failed to bring an identification. Mr. Arnople said that both he and Mr. Siegel had been members of this lodge since its crigin, and that both he and Mr. Siegel were familiar with practically all the members. Mr. Arnople promised to make an examination of the lodge books and he later reported to Agent by telephone and he had failed to discover the name George W. Miller and that he could in no way account for the possession of this eard by Miller or any one edge.

In connection with the policy book of the International Union of Operating Engineers Local 649, Peoria, Illinois, Special Agent J. J. Keating conducted an investigation at Peoria, Illinois, and the results of his investigation, which disclosed that there was no member of this lodge by that name, will be set forth in a subsequent report to be prepared by that Agent.

In connection with the so-called registration certificate forwarded by the Kansas City office to the Chicago office, which bears the number 7505, the printed words "Registration Certificate" and in the middle the letters E and E, it will be noted that this is not an Illinois registration certificate, as was suggested by the letter from the Kansas City office, but its origin is unknown.

In connection with the telegram from the Kansas City office dated June 21, 1933, the Chicago Bureau office obtained and forwarded to the Kansas City Bureau office fifteen mounted copies of the photograph of Harry Carlton with aliases, Chicago police Ho. 0-16239. The letter forwarded to the Kansas City office with these pictures set forth the description of Carlton as contained in the Chicago Police records and other information of Value. This letter was lated June 21, 1933.

Special agents J. F. Brechenser and R. T. imis called and interviewed Postmaster J. C. Wilson at Richmond, Illinois, on June 21, 1935. Mr. Wilson had informed the Chicago Bureau office that a letter was addressed on June 9th to Fred Martin, who receives mail at Richmond, which letter bore the postmark of North Platte, Nebraska. By holding this letter to the light, Mr. Wilson had determined that there was an enclosure which was addressed to Mrs. Bailey, and he stated that he felt that the handwriting on the note directed to Mrs. Bailey bore a resemblance to the handwriting of suspect Harvey Bailey. Bailey is known to the people of that section as "Thomas ElbBrennas and is the owner of the farm which Fred Martin operates. According to Mr. Wilson's information, Bailey wife and his son Won are now living with Mr. Martin. Bailey is also supposed to have a daughter residing in Lansing, Michigan.

During the time Mr. Wilson has kept a watch on the mail of Martin he has noticed that he receives mail from Green City, Missouri, Corin, Missouri, and Entledge, Missouri.

Agents Brechenser and Amis drove by this farm, which is about six miles North of Richmond, Illinois, in Kenosha County, Wisconsin, between Fleming's corner and Hoffman's corner on an unlettered county highway. The farm house is located near the highway and Agents were able to observe the premises closely. They could only see a boy about fifteen years of age and a Ford car. Ho other cars appeared to be parked around this place.

The Agents also drove to Twin Lakes, which is known as a hoodlum hangout and which is located about one mile West of the Martin

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farm, but they observed nothing of interest at this point.

Mr. Wilson stated that he would endeavor to obtain some person as an informant who resides in the neighborhood of the Martin farm.

It would seem, therefore, that Bailey is in the neighborhood of Morth
Platte, Nebraska at this time, from the letter mentioned by Mr. Wilson.

In connection with various telephone communications from the Kansas City office regarding the identity of the wife of Frank Hash, Special Agent Charles Jenkins obtained information through George E. Knuti, 160 North LaSalle Street, Bernham Building, telephone State 5229, that Knuti was born in Aurora, Minnesota, and that his brother Hugo is now Postmaster at that place, In Pebruary, 1950, Mrs. Transes Luce, whose maiden name was Frances Mikulich, a former resident of Aurora, Minnesota, come to his office and advised him that she had married Mayne Luce, a Melrose Park policeman, on April 16, 1924, and that he had beaten her on a number of occasions and was using liquor excessively. She stated that she wanted a divorce. Attorney Kmiti prepared a bill which was filed on February 5, 1930 and a decree was granted on May 4, 1930. Prior to the divorce Mr. and Mrs. Luce resided at 1114 North 24th avenue, Melrose Park, Illinois. One of the witnesses at the divorce hearing was Anna Mikulich, a sister of Frances. Later, after this divorce, Wayne Inco texter married Anna Mikulich. Knuti said that he had not seen Frances Mikulich since the divoce had been obtained, but had heard that she was working as a cook at a roadhouse near River Grove, a suburb of Chicago. It the time of the divorce the shild of Wayne and Frances Luce was living with Frances' Vincent Mikulich, at Aurora, Minnesota, and is felt sure that the child is still with the grandparents.

The records of the Clerk of the Superior Court, Cook County, in case No. 513275, show, according to Agent Jenkins' investigation, that on February 5, 1930, Frances M. Ince filed a bill charging her husband Wayne Luce with excessive use of liquor, cruelty and non-support. The decree was granted by Judge Sabath on May 6, 1930, at which time the custody of the child mamed Danelia Lee Luce, a daughter, was awarded the mother. The child was three years of age on June 5, 1930,

Anna Mikulich, a bister of Frances, was a witness at the time of the divorce hearing and the resided at 303 North Grove Avenue, tak park, Illisois. She testified to the cruelty on the part of Wayns Ince, who is now her husband. Inother sister, Mary Black, 3303 West Adams Street, Chicago, Illinois, also testified against the defendant.

The marriage records of the County Clerk, Cook County, Illinois, show marriage license No. 1277172 was issued to Wayne Ince, 118 Wesley Avenue, Oak Park, Illinois, and Anna Cladys Mikulich, 303 North Grove, Avenue, Oak Park, Illinois, and that these parties were married on June 5, 1930 by Jesse J. Kolmoss, a minister, whose only address is Maywood, Illinois.

The description of Frances Ince, as procured by Agent Jenkins, is as follows. This description was furnished by George A. Enuti:

Agent Jenkins interviewed Wayne Luce and discovered that
Frances was employed as cook in August, 1932, at the O. P. Inn located en
North Avenue in Elmwood Park, just beyond the city limits of Chicago; that
in December, 1932, she was assistant hostess at the Cafe Alabam located on
Rush Street near Chicago, Avenue, Chicago, Illinois. She resided temporarily
at the Mission House, operated by Rocco and Mickele Grazzio or DeGrazzia.
(Agent's Note: These wen are supposed to be brothers of Tony DeGrazzia
previously referred to.) This roadhouse is located at 12th Street and
Mannheim Hoad. Frances was supposed to have been friendly with the wife
of Rocco DeGrazzio known as the King of the West Side Bootleggers, and has
been seen riding in an automobile with Mrs. DeGrazzio on a number of secasions, and with Mrs. Jacky McGurn, wife of Machine Gun Jack McGurn, who
is reported to reside in Oak Park, (Agent's Note: The residence of Mrs.
Jack McGurn is known to be in Oak Park, in that her true name is Mrs. Jouise

Agent Jenkins discovered that the remaining known relatives of Frances Lace are: Mrs. Mart Bayuk, a sister, Srd floor rear flat, at 5307 West Adams Street, entrance on Spaulding Avenue, thicago, Illinois, and a sister, the wife of Dr. Petrone, who resides in the vicinity of and a sister, the wife of Dr. Petrone, who resides in the vicinity of the wife of Dr. Petrone, who resides in the vicinity of and a sister, the wife of Dr. Petrone, who resides in the vicinity of the stern and Chicago Avenues, Chicago, Illinois, From information obtained, Frances does not associate closely with these relatives, although she frequently visits her aunt, Mrs. Jacob Orsen who lives in Wenona, Illinois, frequently visited Wenona in her own sutomobile and was en occasions accompanied by one "Frank", her sweetheart. The only information that agent Jenkins could procure regarding this Frank is that he had hoodlum connections in Chicago and was probably a dope paddler.

Agent Jenkins made an investigation at Wanons, Illinois, and discovered that on June 23, 1935, Frances Inco and her six year old daughter were seen in Wenona visiting Mrs. Orsen. She remained in seclusion until Tuesday, June 27th, when she made a trip by automobile from Wenona to Chicago accompanied by her cousin Jake. Jake operates a soft drink parlor in Wenona and has been obliged to subsist on a frugal income, but lately seems to have a good bit of money.

Although Wenona is a small town, Frances and the Orsen femily do not appear to associate with the other persons. Igent Jenkins has made a contact with the telephone operator, the Postmaster and neighbors in this town and is remaining in that place is order to presure full information concerning the activities of Frances Luce, who is now reported to be staying there.

Agent Jenkins procured a photograph of Frances Ince, which is supposed to be three years old, which picture was photostatically reproduced by the Chicago Bureau office. Copies of this picture were forwarded with the letter from the Chicago Bureau office dated June 29, 1933, addressed to the Kansas City office, copies of which were sent to the Bureau, Oklahoma City, St. Louis and St. Paul offices.

Chief of Detectives William Schoemeker informed Agent that he had received a telephone call from Mr. Elliett Wishrod, a maker of bullet proof vests, to the effect that a number of these vests had been sold recently in Kansas City, Missouri to a man with whom Wishrod was not very familiar.

In consequency, Agent called on Mr. Elliott Wisbrod, room 504, 716 West Madison street, Chicago, Illinois, telephone Haymarket 0641. Mr. Wisbrod displayed a Railway Express Agency, Inc., receipt Mo. 6533, dated 5/17/33, showing that encyleterson had picked up a bundle from him. To this receipt was attached an invoice from Wisbrod to Bells Movelty Company, 1011 North 5th Street, Kansas City, Kansas. This invoice showed that on June 15, 1933, three bullet proof vests, one size forty chest and thirty-eight waist, one size thirty-eight chest and thirty-six waist, and one size thirty-seven chest and thirty-four waist, each costing \$40.00, had been shipped. As noted, these vests cost \$40.00 each and since \$100.00 was received with the order, they were sent C.O.D. \$20.00.

This information was immediately communicated to the Kansas City office by A letter. The proprietor of Bells Novelty Company is supposed to be M.Bell. A circular describing these vests, put out by Mr. Wisbrod, was attached to the letter to the Kansas City office.

On June 24, 1933, the Chicago Bureau office received a communication by telephone from the Kansas City Bureau office, requesting that a check be made at the Bismarck Hotel, Chicago, Illineis, relative to one Vincent C. Moore, who had posed as an official of the Educators Finance Corporation of Oklahoma City, while in fact this individual was not employed by that company.

Special Agent J. R. McDonald called on Mr. C. E. McGarrity, Credit Manager of the Bismarck Hotel, and it was learned that on April 23, 1933, one V. Moore, together with S. Siegel and F. L. Ross registered at the Bismarck Hotel and occupied a suite consisting of rooms 1757-38-39. At the time of registration Moore gave his address as 201 West 85th Street, New York; Siegel as 48 East 95th Street, New York, and Boss as 201 West 85th Street, New York. These individuals checked out on April 25th, but on that same day V. Moore again registered, on this occasion as V. Moore and wife. At this time he occupied room 1838 and stayed at the hotel until April 29th. Mone of these individuals left any forwarding addresses at the time of their departures, and inquiry at the Post Office by Agent McDonald failed to disclose a forwarding address for any of these individuals.

In connection with the telephone calls made from this room, Agent McDonald has made arrangements, in an endeavor to check these telephone calls, through the Illinois Bell Telephone Company, since on April 24, 25, 28 and 29 long distance calls were supposed to have been made.

Moore filled out a credit card giving the name of the West End Finance Company, 806 Colcord, Oklahoma City, as the Mirm Which amployed him. A letter from that firm, however, to Mr. McCarrity, disclosed that V. Moore was not employed at that point. This letter, however, was on the stationery of the Mational Educators Finance Corporation, and Mr. J. R. Barton signed the letter.

Mr. H. E. Corcoren, day clerk at the hotel, was interviewed by Agent McDonald and he stated that Seigel had stayed at that hotel on a number of occasions previously and because of this fact he had informed Mr. McGarrity that Siegel was financially responsible, and in consequence a suite of rooms was rested to these persons. Mr. Corcoren was unable to recall having seen Ross or Moore with Siegel. Siegel's description was given as: Age 37 or 38 years, height 5' 72", weight 155 or 170 lbs., gomplexion medium, build medium, hair dark, Nationality Jewich.

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Photographs of Vincent C. Moore, Harry Carlton, Frank Mash, Harvey Bailey, Alvin Karpis, Fred Barker and Bernard Phillips were shown to Mr. McGarrity and to Mr. Corcoran, as well as to Mr. C. H. Wesling, night clerk and Mr. M. Kunst, Assistant Hanager, but none of these parties could identify any of the pictures as those of former guests at the Risemarck Hotel. Mr. Wesling, however, said upon examining the picture of Verne Miller, that he thought that he had seen that person around at the Bismarck Hotel at some time, but could furnish so further information.

On June 27, 1933, the Chicago Bureau office was notified by telephone by the Kansas City office to the effect, that a confidential informant had stated that Harvey Balley and Richard Brady, both of whom had escaped from the Kansas State Penitentiary at Lansing, Kansas, on May 30, 1933, were residing on the 4200 block on Drexel Boulevard in Chicago, Illinois,

Agent immediately went to the 4200 block on Drexel Boulevard. Drexel Boulevard is an especially wide street having two traffic lenes, one for North bound traffic and one for South bound traffic, with a park about sixty feet in width between the two traffic lanes. The 4200 mumbers begin at 42nd Place, while 42nd Street enters Drexel Boulevard from the west a short distance above. The two buildings on the west side of the street immediately between 42nd Street and 42nd Place bear numbers in the 4100 block. 42nd Street does not enter Drexel Bouleward from the East and the numbers continue in the 4100's to 42nd Place. On the west side of the street, however, between 42nd Street and 42nd Place, there is the Shirley Apartment Hotel at 4160 and the Hotel Bernard at 4170, which are the only two buildings that occupy this space. The Hotel Bernard is a very handsome four story hotel apartment building and is the type of residence in which former escaped Federal prisoners Keating and Molden would live. On the west side of the street between 42nd Place and 45rd Street, going from North to South, there are nine large stone front buildings, most of which take in roomers and several of which are typical rooming houses which seem to eater to a good class of roomers. On the corner of 43rd Street and Drexel Boulevard there is a grug store and a number of small shops with apartments and offices above. One of these offices is the Drexel Beverage Distributing Company. The Bast side of Drexel Boulevard between 42nd Place and 45rd Street is occupied on the North corner by a two entrance, four story, walk-up apartment building, which is rather large, but which appears to have reasonably priced furnished apartments. Immediately below this apartment building there are five large stone front buildings, most of which seem to cater to roomers, except for one place that has a dressmaker's plate in front. Below these five buildings there is a small Hotel, known as the Graceton Hotel, which is a bachelor hotel. Immediately to the South of this hotel

and on the corner of 43rd Street is the Lincoln Warehouse, Inc., & large

Due to the facilities provided by the park it is extremely easy to watch this entire block since the nights have been warm and numerous persons from the neighborhood sit out in the park, and some also seem to sleep out there. Although Agent observed this neighborhood for three nights until after midnight, he failed to observe any persons who created suspicion or failed to observe any place that might be harboring suspects Bailey and Brady.

Lieutement Arthur East, Detective Bursau, Chicago Police Department, was interviewed by Agent in connection with the 4200 block on Drexel Boulevard, and he stated that he had worked in that section for a number of years. He said that the general neighborhood around there was becoming a great hangout for gangsters. This neighborhood was at one time one of the finest residential sections in Chicago, with huge stone front houses and large residences predominating. However, the wealthy people for the most part are moving out and the large houses have been turned into rooming houses and into gambling clubs.

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From Agent's observation before and after interviewing
Lieutenant Kett, it was apparent that no gambling houses or houses of
prostitution were in operation in the 4200 block. In observing the
4200 numbers it was impossible for Agent to observe with any degree of a
cuteness the activities at the Botel Bernard, which was not covered
during this watch, but was left to the police. Lieutenant Katt, however,
said that he was not acquainfed with any gangster hangouts in that immediate vicinity except the Hotel Bernard, which was not so long ago
the residence of Murray Humphries, associate of three fingered Jack
White, and the supposed heir of Alphonse Capone to the Capone interests
in Chicago. Humphries is now under indictment on a charge of defrauding
the Government in filing his income tax returns, and has not yet been
apprahended,

Lieutenant Katt also said that Jockfusco, a well known Chicago beer baron and a member of the Capone outfit, operated the Drexel Beverage Distributing Company, which had offices at 45rd Street and Drexel Boulevard. Fusco was arrested June 26, 1935, at that address in a drive by Chicago officials on hoodlums, which might have exused Bailey and Brady to move if they were in that vicinity under the possible protection of either Humphries or Fusco.

Lieutenant Katt concurred with Agent in the belief that the 6th District police at 5253 Lake Park Avenue should be contacted and their assistance sought in connection with this angle of the case.

Agent interviewed Acting Lieutenant Henry T. Janson who in turn called in Acting Sergeant Edward Tyrrell, who works on a aquad with one John Conneely. Officer Tyrrell was in the Detective Bureau for mine years and has only been at the 6th District for about two months, being known as one of the able detectives on the Chicago police force. Conneely has been working this section for a number 2 of years. Officer Connecty stated that he was acquainted with the owner of the apartment on the west side of the street at 4201 to 4207, having recently arrested this man on a warrant growing out of some dispute over a legal transaction at another rooming house that this man owned. This man, however, was very friendly to Conneely and Conneely said that he thought he could procure all the necessary information from him as to whether Bailey and Brady might be in that gieinity. In addition. Conneely said that he was well acquainted with the engineer who worked at the Hotel Bernard. This engineer's wife also works as a clerk in the Hotel Bernard and in consequence has access to all the guest records. These officers were unable to say as to whether the present management of the Hotel Bernard would be friendly in this particular investigation or whether they might protect gangsters, and in consequence it was thought best for the investigation to be made through Detective Connecty,

The next day Agent Interviewed Sergeant J. J. O'Leary, who is assisting Captain John L. Hogan. Sergeant O'Leary is particularly familiar with conditions in that district. He was unable to offer any suggestions as to the possible hangouts in the 4200 block on Drexel Boulevard, but said that the men immediately under him, five in number were assigned especially to the detection of prostitutes in that area. Although there does not appear to be any prostitutes in that particular block, there are considerable prostitutes in the neighborhood. O'Leary said that through the five men working under him he might be able to obtain information through some of the known but friendly prostitutes in the district.

Mail carrier Stephen Hoaler was Interviewed through the courtesy of Assistant Superintendent Lynch at Station M in the 4200 block on Cottage Erove Avenue. Carrier Hosler has been carrying mail to the 4200 block on Drazel Boulevard for the last fifteen years and in consequence is very familiar with the residents. He stated that at

4200 Drexel Boulevard a person by the name of Stall operated a rooming house; at 4202 a party by the name of Gilso operated a rooming house. \$200 was occupied mostly by women, a good many registered murses living at that address. 4202, however, has mostly male roomers. Both of these houses seem to be perfectly legitimate. In the next house a man by the name of Beede lives, and in the house just south of him is a party by the name of Waughn. Although both of these houses had several roomers they did not especially sater to that trade. The next house was occupied by a party by the name of Crawford, and the carrier could not remember the occupant's name in the next house as he moved in only a few months ago, but did know that the house was occupied mostly by student roomers apparently from the University of Chicago. The next house is a red stone front residence, which is known as the Roanoke. This place the carrier said catered to a general class of roomers. The next house is also a rooming house and the occupante of that house have been there for many years. The next house is operated by sisters who formerly operated separate rooming houses. These sisters left the house on one. evening and both appeared to be about thirty-five years of age, about five feet eight or nine inches tall, and appeared similar enough to be twins. The next entrance on Drexel Boulevard is the entrance above the stores and parties by the name of Krantz and Bloom live in apartments at that address and the offices of the Drexel Beverage Distribute ing Company and another concern are also at that address. In connection with the more recent communications which show that the name "Bloom", has apparently been used regarding telephone calls which may have some significance in this case, a more thorough investigation will be made in connection with that party Blooms.

On the east side of the street the four story spartment is operated by a party named Cheffer. The rooming house next door is eperated by a paraco whose name Hosler did not remember. One Turner occupied the rooming house south of that and the third rooming house was occupied by one Dennis who has been there about two months. This Dennis recently suffered a stroke of paralysis and Agent saw him sitting on the front steps dressed in pyjamas and apparently in a wheel chair. He appeared to be a rather stout man whose height sould not easily be determined, with gray hair and a large florid face, Dennis is supposed to operate a trucking company which has trucks running between Gary, Indiana, and Indianapolis, Indiana, The sarrier did not know much about the connections of this Dennis and it will be noted that Humphries and Thite are supposed to be the leaders of the Teamsters and Truckers Union in Chicago, which dominates considerable of the trucking business. Mrs. Grossfeld operates a dressmaking establishment in the next house and the last of the rooming houses has been operated for a number of years by

a party whose name Hosler did not remember at the time. The Gracetan Hotel is a bachelor hotel, Mr. Hosler indicated. Mr. Hosler said that he remembers that the Roanoke had recently had a mumber of persons atopping there from Kentucky. The woman who operates the Roanoke is from Kentucky and it is believed that it is in this way that she obtains these roomers.

Carrier Hosler could not remember having delivered any mail which came from Kansas City or from Twin Lakes, Wisconsin and Richmond, Illinois. He promised to keep a close watch on the mail and to notify the Assistant Superintendent, who in turn will notify Agent. None of these persons have communicated with Agent indicating that they had any specific information regarding the possibility that Bailey is living in that block, but as indicated a further investigation will be made, especially in connection with the party named Block at 4258 Drexel Boulevard.

Considerable investigation has been done in this case by Special Agent W. C. Ryan and by Special Agent J. J. Keating, which has not been incorporated in this report, but which will be contained in later reports submitted by one of them. This investigation concerns information obtained in regard to various telephone calls from certain telephones and in regard to various informants that have been certain telephones and in regard to various informants that have been contacted. This investigation, which has been carried on concurrently with the investigation set forth in this report, will be submitted in an early report.

UNDEVELOPED LEADS:

THE KANSAS CITY OFFICE: The Chicago Bureau office is not setting forth undeveloped leads at this time for other Bureau offices due to the fact that it is not known at this time just what information may have been requested from these other offices. If information in this report requires development at other points, it is suggested that this report requires development at other points, it is suggested that the Kansas City office make a request that this investigation be made.

THE CHICAGO BURRAU OFFICE will make an investigation at 4258 Drewel Boulevard. Will check the addresses of the telephone numbers called by the O. P. Inn, specifically on June 16 and 17, 1935. This office will check the records of the air lines from Chicago, Illinois, This office will check the records of the air lines from Chicago, Illinois, to Kansas City, Missouri on the night of June 16, 1935. In addition, this office will keep in communication with its informants concerning the activities at the O. P. Inn, and will in general develop such information

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through the usual sources as will assist in the location of the suspects named in the report of reference.

At Twin Lakes, Wisconsin, and Richmond, Illinois, this office will make further investigation in order to establish contacts in the vicinity of those places for the purpose of obtaining what information can be found at those points as to the present location of suspect Harvey Bailey.
