I telephoned Mr. Suydam and advised him that I wanted to let him know about the situation out in Ohio, that if any calls came in about it, I would be very restrictive about giving any praise to the local officers, that the situation has developed into a nasty mess, that they won't surrender the prisoner to us, and that the only statement we can make that "The Federal Agents are in Wellsville investigating the situation with a view to apprehending Floyd who was shot in a gun battle with local authorities there today. Richetti is in custody of the local authorities in Wellsville, who have up to the present time declined to turn him over to the Federal authorities." Mr. Suydam inquired if the Federal people were involved in the gun battle and I told him "No".

I further advised Mr. Suydam that he could state that Floyd was in the woods near Wellsville and he was badly wounded.

MEMORANDUM FOR THE DIRECTOR

I called Mr. Harvey and advised of the call which Special Agent in Charge Waters had received from Chief of Police at Kittaning, Pennsylvania, to the effect that Floyd had been seen there about a half hour ago in a Ford coupe with Illinois plates, heading toward Indiana, Pennsylvania. Instructing that inasmuch as all available agents of Pittsburgh Office ^{are} now being utilized, he (Mr. Harvey), send some men toward Indiana, Pennsylvania. He was advised that Mr. Waters is giving the information relative to Floyd to the State Highway Patrol, and Mr. Harvey should ascertain the highway number where they are located and start his men down that way. Mr. Harvey advised that he would immediately attend to this matter.

MEMORANDUM FOR MR. TAMM.

Adam Richetti

Mr. Purvis telephoned in from Wellsville and advised that the situation there was rotten, that the Chief of Police has refused to turn Richetti over to us, that they are going to prosecute him there on a charge of assault with a deadly weapon, attempt to kill with firearms, that he would be able to get out in thirteen months if convicted of this charge, and if he breaks his parole in another state Ohio will not return him. Mr. Purvis stated that the Sheriff was the man who met Mr. Purvis at the airport, and told Mr. Purvis that the Chief would probably be put out because the Sheriff had called Mr. Purvis, that when Mr. Purvis got to the office the Chief was surrounded by a garrulous bunch of women and about everybody in the town was down to the police station. Mr. Purvis further advised that after talking with me he had gotten the Chief of Police to one side and advised him that Richetti would sign the waiver if he, the Chief, would go down and tell Richetti that he would release, whereupon the Chief stated that he would not do that. Mr. Purvis then told the Chief what we had on Richetti, and the Chief then called in the Mayor, the Prosecutor and the Assistant Prosecutor, who all sided with the Chief. Mr. Purvis stated that they were all a bunch of hardheaded men, that he had been warned of it by the Sheriff, and Mr. Purvis suggested that I call the Attorney General and have him call Governor White of Ohio and request the Governor to call the Mayor of the town. I stated that the situation was certainly outrageous. I inquired as to who appointed the Chief and Mr. Purvis replied that probably the Mayor did that. I stated that I had in mind calling the Mayor or Chief of Police direct and make a formal request for Richetti, that we were handicapped by the fact that we do not have an indictment on him. Mr. Purvis interposed with the statement that the Chief had asked him if we had an indictment for him and that Mr. Purvis had told him that there was one being returned in Kansas City tomorrow. I advised Mr. Purvis that I did not want the Attorney General to call the governor because we do not have the necessary legal processes at the present time, that I thought Mr. Purvis had better announce his identity, that this might have some effect in drawing the attention away from the Chief. I instructed Mr. Purvis to get the Mayor on the phone so that I could talk with him and make a formal demand for Richetti and then if he declined we would have it on record.

MEMORANDUM FOR THE FILE

At 3:30 P.M., I contacted Mr. Larson in Detroit and instructed him to proceed with whatever men he had available to Steubenville, Ohio, where Adam Richetti was in custody and "Pretty Boy" Floyd was reported to have been wounded. Mr. Larson stated that he would proceed by plane immediately, taking with him Agents McCallum, Kisler and Soucey. He further advised that Agents Collins, and Hauptman were in Southern Ohio and that he would attempt to reach them and have them proceed to Steubenville, Ohio also.

Agents DiLillo, Rose and Ames proceeded immediately to Steubenville and Wellsville from the Pittsburgh Office.

Special Agent in Charge Purvis, accompanied by Agents McKee, Hollis and Connors proceeded, by plane from Cincinnati to Wellsville.

The Chief of Police at Wellsville is J. H. Fultz; the telephone number of the Wellsville Police Station is 342.

I contacted Mr. Reinecke at Indianapolis and instructed him to have two agents proceed by chartered plane to Yorkville, Ohio immediately, there to contact Mr. Purvis. Mr. Reinecke subsequently advised that Agents Thornton and Reynolds were proceeding by chartered plane to Wheeling immediately; that they would proceed by automobile to Yorkville and Wellsville and contact Mr. Purvis.

I contacted Mr. Connelley by telephone at Louisville at about 7:00 P.M., and explained this emergency matter to him. He stated that Agent Shivers, Johnson and Hall would proceed by chartered plane immediately to Yorkville, Ohio.

I contacted Special Agent Trainor at Kansas City and told him to have Mr. Cowley call the Director immediately upon Cowley's arrival in Kansas City.

Mr. Purvis abandoned his alias of Marshall late on the night of October 21st. He can be reached at the Travellers Hotel in East Liverpool, Ohio.

MEMORANDUM FOR MR. TAMM

Mr. Cowley telephoned from East Liverpool, Ohio. He had just returned from Wellsville, and the authorities there requested two hours to consider the matter presented by him, which would be four o'clock when they should reach a decision. Mr. Cowley stated that these people were very distant, and not courteous at all. Mr. Cowley suggested that at the end of two hours we get in touch with Mr. Freed and with Mr. Milligan, who by this time should have an indictment.

I told Mr. Cowley that I had talked to Mr. Freed, informing him of the situation, and he stated he would be glad either to go to Wellsville himself or to send several of his Assistants. I asked Mr. Cowley to call Mr. Wideman, in Mr. Freed's office in Cleveland, telling him that he is calling for the Director, and we desired him to get word to Mr. Freed that we want some legal assistance at once, and would like for Mr. Freed to arrange to send some one from his office immediately to Wellsville, or wherever Mr. Cowley wants to meet them. I suggested to Mr. Cowley that he not mention the two-hour delay, but impress upon the United States Attorney that he or his representatives should proceed immediately.

I suggested to Mr. Cowley also that he call United States Attorney Milligan at Kansas City before he calls Cleveland, advising him of the situation and what I have suggested doing, namely, that the necessary legal steps immediately be taken to remove Richetti on our two warrants; that if Mr. Milligan agrees with this, he should then call Mr. Wideman in Mr. Freed's office.

I further stated that I had already issued a statement to the press to the effect that the actions of the authorities at Wellsville are materially thwarting the successful consummation of the Kansas City massacre case. I told Mr. Cowley that if he receives inquiries, he might make a similar statement.

I explained to Mr. Cowley that Mr. Freed will be in Court trying a case, but had left word for me to call Mr. Wideman, who would deliver the message to him, and if necessary, he would have the Court recessed for a day or two so that he might personally proceed to Wellsville.

Mr. Cowley stated that he was calling from Mr. Purvis' room in East Liverpool, this town being three miles from Wellsville. I asked if some one will be left there to receive calls. Mr. Cowley stated that there was no one there when he returned. I explained that Mr. Purvis had advised me of a good tip he received, and I authorized him to go out on it. However, I stated that I felt an Agent should remain there as soon as such arrangements could be made. I asked Mr. Cowley to call me after he talked to Mr. Freed and Mr. Milligan.

MEMORANDUM FOR MR. TAMM

Special Agent in Charge Connelley telephoned at 10:00 P.M. on October 21, 1934, and asked to speak with you. MEMORANDUM FOR MR. TABB

I talked to Mr. Purvis and Mr. Cowley regarding the situation at Welleville, Ohio, this evening. Mr. Purvis stated that they were having the coroner's inquest in the next room in order to clear things up. He stated that they will not turn Richetti over. Mr. Cowley was requested to return in an hour and they would turn him over. Mr. Cowley went back within an hour but requested him to come back in the morning. I asked Mr. Purvis if the two United States Attorneys had arrived yet and he stated that they had not. I stated that their names were Videman and McNamee and were both District Attorneys from Cleveland.

I talked to Mr. Cowley and he stated that they were told that they could have Richetti about an hour. At the end of that time, the "thin-headed" Mayor returned and said that he had been unable to locate the County Attorney and felt that he owed him the respect of consulting him before he did it. The Mayor stated that he could not locate the County Attorney tonight and for Mr. Cowley to return in the morning. Mr. Cowley told him that we had already made our plans and were disgusted about the thing.

I instructed Mr. Cowley to get all of the machinery moving to get this fellow turned over as soon as the two District Attorneys arrived.

I stated that I gave out a statement tonight as did the Attorney General, commending the Chief of Police at East Liverpool by name and the Sheriff of the county that helped Mr. Purvis yesterday, and denouncing very strongly, the Mayor, Prosecuting Attorney, and Chief of Police of Welleville, charging them with thwarting the successful consummation of the Kansas City Massacre.

I told Mr. Cowley that the press wanted to know about this quart of blood that was found in the car caused by his being shot by the Chief of Police of Welleville. I stated that I doubt whether he shot Floyd. Mr. Cowley stated that if he did, they could not find it. I instructed Mr. Cowley that if the press came to him to let the press know that this Welleville crowd is blocking one of the most important investigations of the country. The thing is, they were the heroes yesterday and we are today.

I stated to Mr. Cowley that I wanted to get all of our men out of there promptly. There are too many of them and I don't want them hanging around the place. This is to be done tonight and Mr. Cowley is to remain there with a few men to clean up the odds and ends and to take Richetti back. Mr. Purvis is also to leave tonight and the curtain pulled down on the publicity there.

On October 11, 1934, Deputy Sheriff William Owens of Cresco, Iowa, and A. C. Eaight, a Special Agent of the Bureau of Investigation, State of Iowa Department of Justice, while investigating the activities of three individuals who were staying on the farm of Elmer Bosteter at McIntire, Iowa, were fired upon and the strangers escaped in a 1934 model V-8 Ford Sedan. It was learned that the names of the men are Lee Bosteter, Eddie "Doc" Bernnett, thought to be Charles Arthur "Pretty Boy" Floyd, and Francis Gould.

Mr. Haight advised that one of the men who fired at him and Deputy Sheriff Owens had a Browning Automatic Rifle. Agents of this office, while conducting an investigation where the gun battle took place, found several .351 caliber Western shells. These shells are being forwarded to the Division Laboratory, under separate cover, for examination as it is thought that possibly similar shells, fired from this rifle, may have been forwarded to the Laboratory previously.

MEMORANDUM FOR MR. TAMM

Mr. Stanley telephoned to make further inquiry relative to "Pretty Boy" Floyd. I remarked that we were glad to be able to shoot Floyd ourselves because he killed one of our men. Mr. Stanley asked how many men Floyd had killed. I told him I did not exactly know, but I assumed it would be a minimum of possibly ten or twelve; that he has been a bank robber and a generally bad actor. Mr. Stanley inquired how long we had been hunting for Floyd. I told him that we had been searching for him since the Kansas City Massacre, which was in June, 1933.

Mr. Stanley inquired if there is anything the Attorney General could give out in connection with this case now. I told him that he has in his office a long memorandum relative to the Kansas City Massacre; however, I have here about forty copies of memorandums that I could send to him immediately, with photographs attached. He asked that I send them to him.

I further stated that I understand from the press that Floyd is dead, although I have not received confirmation from our Agents. I also stated that I have not heard whether any of our men were wounded because the battle had just ended when I was called from the farmhouse. I told him I expected details in a very few minutes. I explained that the scene of the battle was eight miles north of East Liverpool.

I stated that the local police at Wellsville absolutely refused to give us any cooperation, and I ordered about 24 men in by plane; that they were arriving all night and early this morning; that they came from as far West as Kansas City, from Detroit, Cleveland, Cincinnati, Pittsburgh and New York, as well as Chicago, Louisville, and Indianapolis. I further stated that this place is only about 40 miles from Pittsburgh, and I ordered the Agents in, starting yesterday afternoon; that this morning, when I found out that the local authorities at Wellsville would not give us any help and were not inclined to cooperate, we then sent our own men out to cover the countryside; and at one o'clock this afternoon we located a farmer who had fed Floyd an hour before, and identified him as being Floyd from a photograph which we showed him. We then at once sent men to that particular farm. Floyd had left the farm on foot. He was located in the woods, where the battle took place. I pointed out that Floyd was the leader of the Kansas City massacre, Richetti and Verne Miller assisting him.

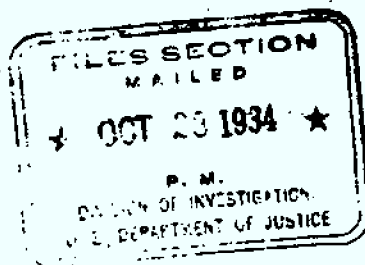

He stated that Assistant United States Attorney Widesman from Cleveland came in last night about 11:00 o'clock, and went into conference with the Mayor, Chief of Police, County Attorney and Sheriff. However, he was unable to have Richetti released last night, but a conference was set for today at 11:00 o'clock. Mr. Widesman feels he will be successful at this conference. Mr. Cowley said the local authorities apparently think we are "trying to pull a fast one" but they don't know what it is, and intend to hold Richetti until they can find out. Mr. Cowley stated that Floyd's wife is claiming the body. I told him to take no interest in this situation. He said that \$122.00 was found on the person of Floyd, which was left with the coroner.

I told Mr. Cowley I wanted to talk to him before the conference at Wellsville this morning. He said he had not intended to attend it, but I told him he should by all means. He said he would call me just before he leaves to go to the conference.

I inquired as to what charges the Wellsville authorities hope to bring against Richetti, and Mr. Cowley replied carrying concealed weapons and shooting an officer. I inquired if Richetti actually shot or if Floyd did the shooting. Mr. Cowley said it is claimed that both of them shot. Mr. Cowley did not know what the maximum penalty would be for these two offenses. I remarked that this would leave the situation on approximately a fifty-fifty basis. If we gained custody of Richetti now and took him back to Kansas City, possibly obtain a sentence of ten years on the motor vehicle theft charges, and assuming that we would

be unable to obtain convictions on the murder and obstruction charges; then we would be in an unfavorable position, and would no doubt be criticized by the Ohio authorities. This, of course, is the pessimistic viewpoint.

On the other hand, I stated that I feel we have a strong case; that I think we could convict for obstruction of justice and possibly for murder; that I furthermore feel it is quite undesirable to have to give up to the State authorities. Mr. Cowley said he had further discussed with the Assistant United States Attorney the matter of the law in this connection, and he is strongly convinced that if the State authorities don't want to turn over the prisoner, they cannot be compelled to do so. The local authorities have not given their final word, but they apparently are not going to release custody of Richetti. Mr. Cowley stated that he had not talked to Mr. Wideman within the last hour; however, he had just left the conference. I remarked that there has been some publicity here criticizing the Wellsville authorities, although I do not know how the Ohio papers have stood in this respect. I further stated that now, having done all we can do, the thing for us to do is to depart from the vicinity, making the statement that there is no use in wasting further time; that the local authorities would not surrender the prisoner to us, and that is all we can do. Mr. Cowley agreed with this. I asked him to call me after discussing the matter with Mr. Wideman.

I also asked Mr. Cowley what he had been able to accomplish in his effort to obtain possession of the machine gun. He said this matter has been discussed, but he feels confident they won't release the gun. Mr. Cowley again suggested that a subpoena duces tecum be issued on the Mayor and the Chief of Police. However, I asked if a subpoena duces tecum would take precedence over the State evidence, it appearing that the same law would apply in this instance that applies with reference to taking custody of the prisoner. However, we agreed that the attempt should be made.

Mr. Cowley advised that the local authorities had just issued a statement criticizing Mr. Purvis quite severely, as well as the Division in general. Mr. Cowley said he had not read the article, the papers having just appeared on the street. He was of the opinion that the local authorities denied that they refused to let us see Richetti alone. Mr. Cowley stated that the only time we had been allowed to talk to Richetti alone was before they knew who he was. I told Mr. Cowley to get the details of this story and give them to me when he calls me back so that I could issue a statement here if necessary. Mr. Cowley also suggested that he would issue a statement before he leaves the vicinity.

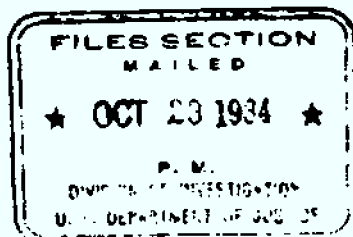
I telephoned Mr. Purvis at East Liverpool, Ohio, and inquired as to the progress of the search for Floyd. He stated Mr. Cowley had just gone to the station, and he had not heard from him. Mr. Purvis said that East Liverpool is about four miles from Wallsville. Mr. Cowley had been gone about 45 minutes, and Mr. Purvis said he was just getting ready to go out, having just received a good tip. I told him I had talked to the United States Attorney, who told me he would be glad to personally proceed to Wallsville, or at least send several of his men down, to handle the legal aspects of this matter.

Mr. Purvis said he had just received a call from one of his squads north of Liverpool, advising that Floyd was seen by a farmer and a Constable near Bell's Schoolhouse. I directed him to go out on this lead immediately, in spite of the fact that no one would be left at the phone.

I telephoned Mr. Purvis at the Burgess Funeral Home, in East Liverpool, Ohio. Mr. Purvis advised that Floyd died at 4:25 P.M., that they had just finished taking his final rest, that there is no question about his identity. As to the details of the flight, Mr. Purvis advised that he did not think Floyd fired any shots, that he had Floyd's bag, two forty-five caliber automatic pistols in his pocket and was going to exchange them later, that they spotted Floyd behind a corn crib on the side of the house, that he was getting into a car with two farmers who were going to take him to Youngstown, Ohio, (the farmers are going to be questioned tomorrow if they were aware of Floyd's identity), that as the car was backing away behind the corn crib he saw the agents. He made the farmer drive the car back behind the corn crib, the agents got out quickly, Agent McKee having a gun, Agent Thompson having the same and Agent Hall and Mr. Purvis having revolvers; the agents called upon Floyd to halt, and when he refused all fired at him. He ran out of sight over a ridge and when the agents on the ridge he was running down the incline on the other side, whereupon they fired at him again and he dropped. He was still struggling when he was picked up but he died before he reached East Liverpool.

I instructed Mr. Purvis to get as many of the men back to their headquarters as possible, to leave them out tonight.

I told Mr. Purvis that I had ordered Mr. Freed to come down from Cleveland to get custody of Richetti, that I wanted to do this as soon as possible, but that four or five agents should be left there to take Richetti away, but the rest were to leave to avoid the publicity, that the motion pictures would be certain to come there. I told Mr. Purvis that I thought he should come in to Washington tomorrow, that he did not want to face anything like he did before. I then told him that I thought he should go on into Chicago and lay low for a couple of days, the way of Cincinnati, in order to pick up his belongings. I advised him that he did not want to let the local authorities do too much talking, that he be certain everything was covered. Mr. Purvis advised that the Chief of Police at East Liverpool was Hugh A. McDermott, that Sheriff Long's first day. I advised Mr. Purvis that I had given out a scoring statement to the Chief of Police at Wellsville today. Mr. Purvis advised that the police and the Sheriff had been splendid in their cooperation, that is of Police at East Liverpool and Sheriff Long.

Mr. Cowley telephoned from East Liverpool, Ohio. He stated he had looked through the most recent editions of the papers issued in that vicinity, and the statement submitted by the local authorities - to which he referred a conversation earlier this afternoon - is not contained in any of the papers. He stated that the statement to which he referred was quite long, criticizing the Director and Mr. Purvis. It criticized Mr. Purvis for his attitude in trying to dominate and make demands, going under a false name, etc. I stated that of course he used a fictitious name in order to avoid publicity. The Director was criticized for making a statement to the effect that they had not cooperated. He stated that of course they had not cooperated. Mr. Cowley said he is trying to get in touch with a newspaper man in order to obtain a copy of the statement. I told him I would like for him to read it to me over the phone as soon as he can secure it. I stated I might want to make a statement, but I feel now that I probably will ignore it.

Mr. Cowley stated he had talked to the two Assistant United States Attorneys. They have been doing everything they possibly could, and are willing to do more. They say they would issue subpoenas for these men to appear before the Commissioner, which would only be a "bluff," and the chances are that if they were represented they wouldn't produce anyway. Mr. Cowley said he is inclined to the view that this latter step should not be taken. I agreed that this should not be done. I stated I would like to have a subpoena duces tecum issued for the machine gun, and then leave. Mr. Cowley said that the Assistant United States Attorneys are of the opinion that the machine gun is in the same status as the man; that it is a case of one sovereign demanding something of another sovereign, both of which are equal. Mr. Cowley stated Mr. Wideman is inclined to my view, namely, that we have done everything possible, and we should now withdraw from the vicinity. I suggested that we might be criticized for not going before the Commissioner. However, Mr. Cowley did not believe there would be any ground for that criticism. I told Mr. Cowley that I feel the matter of what we want to do on the legal side should be left to the Assistant United States Attorneys; in other words, we appeared with the warrants and wanted the prisoner. I asked Mr. Brand to send his representatives down to take care of the legal rights, and it is up to them to do that. When they think they have done all they can do, either as to policy or as to the extent of their rights, that is all we can expect. I stated that I am perfectly satisfied and am very much pleased with Mr. Freed's actions in the matter.

I told Mr. Cowley that the press will no doubt want to know what he intends to do, and he might state that we have done everything possible; that the request was made not only of the Chief for the custody of Richetti, but for the privilege of interviewing the man alone, which was declined; for evidence, particularly the machine gun, which was of particular value in connection with ballistics examinations for the Kansas City massacre, which was also declined.

I further suggested that he might state, as I have stated here, that this action on the part of the authorities at Wellsville is so unlike actions in other parts of the country where law enforcement officers are interested in aiding, rather than thwarting, the final successful consummation of the investigation of important cases.

Mr. Cowley stated that he and the Sheriff will probably leave by plane tonight for Kansas City. The other Agents are also leaving - one returning to Cincinnati, and three to Pittsburgh.

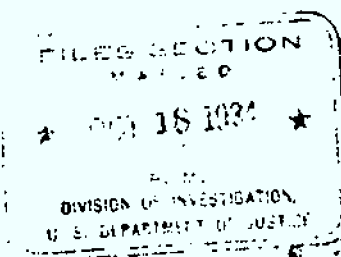

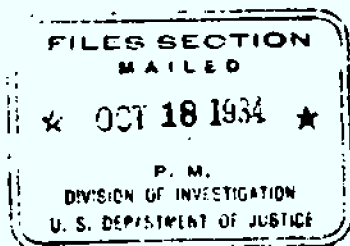

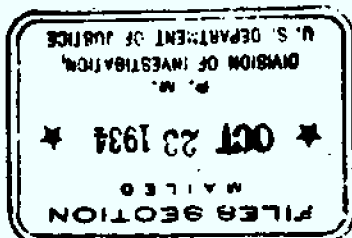

MEMORANDUM FOR MR. TAMM

Mr. Cowley telephoned from East Liverpool, Ohio. I asked him what has been done in that section toward checking up on anybody who may have helped Floyd. He said they haven't made any progress; that when these fugitives were first located they were camping in the woods, and Floyd has been several places since, but only for something to eat, and then proceeded on his way. I told him I wanted this thoroughly cleared up.

I also inquired about the guns that were in Floyd's possession. Mr. Cowley said that the Wellsville police have them. However, I explained that I had in mind the guns which were in Floyd's possession when he was killed, and Mr. Cowley said he assumed Mr. Purvis took them with him. I told him to get in touch with Mr. Purvis and see that those guns are forwarded to Washington because we want to compare them, and also want to keep them here. The Wellsville police have the guns which were taken from Richetti. I stated that we should obtain custody of them immediately, and instructed Mr. Cowley to see that they are turned over to us. I pointed out that the machine gun may be an important piece of evidence. Mr. Cowley said his idea was that it would probably be a better procedure to have the United States Attorney at Kansas City issue a subpoena duces tecum for the guns, and when he gets them, have the Grand Jury take action. I explained that I want those guns here for ballistics examination; that I am almost as much interested in that as in gaining custody of Richetti. Mr. Cowley said he would do everything possible in this connection; that there is one sub-machine gun and one .45 automatic revolver in the possession of the Wellsville police. I stated that is highly important, and if the Chief of Police won't surrender them, he should have the United States Attorney issue a writ to gain custody of them; that they are evidence needed in a Government case. Mr. Cowley asked if I thought it would be all right to have the subpoena issued from Kansas City. I stated the objection to that is that the guns would have to be shipped to Kansas City, which would delay their arrival in Washington that much; furthermore, I do not want that alleged police expert in Kansas City to interfere, and if the guns are sent to Kansas City, he probably will.

than the automatic. Mr. Cowley stated there is a possibility that the local authorities will keep Richetti; that the United States Attorney's office, represented by Mr. Widenman - a wide-awake young man - is doing everything possible; but if the local authorities file charges, Mr. Cowley thinks we will just have to wait. Mr. Cowley felt that we could not compel them to turn the prisoner over if they file charges, because they already have him in their custody. However, I advised Mr. Cowley that the Federal Court has precedence over a State charge. Mr. Cowley said that Mr. Widenman did not believe this to be a fact, but I told him Mr. Widenman is evidently not well acquainted with the law. Mr. Cowley asked if I recalled a similar situation which arose in Baltimore. I told him I recalled that, but in that case we weren't particularly pressing for custody, and as a matter of fact, the prisoner in this instance was wanted by the authorities in Chicago rather than by the Federal Government. Mr. Cowley thought that the Postal authorities had put up a fight for custody but lost out. I instructed Mr. Cowley to take this matter up with the United States Attorney, and I would have somebody at Washington make a check on the law in this connection.

I called Mr. Cowley's attention to the fact that the jail at Lisbon has been condemned by the Federal Government, and the Kellsville jail is not even rated, which would seem to indicate that it is even worse than the Lisbon jail. Mr. Cowley expressed the belief that Richetti could probably escape, although there has been no opportunity so far, since there have been no less than a hundred people standing around.

I asked Mr. Cowley to call me after the conference at 11:00 o'clock.

Mr. Cowley stated he had misinformed me this morning, and that the mother of Floyd claimed the body rather than the wife.

I again told Mr. Cowley to get the machine gun, even if the local authorities keep Richetti.

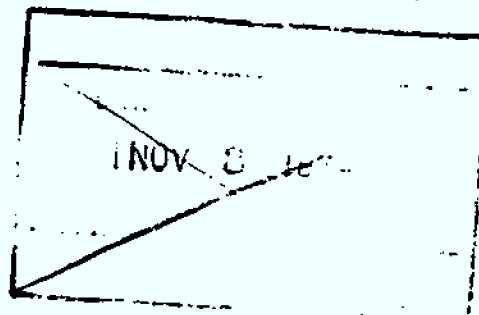

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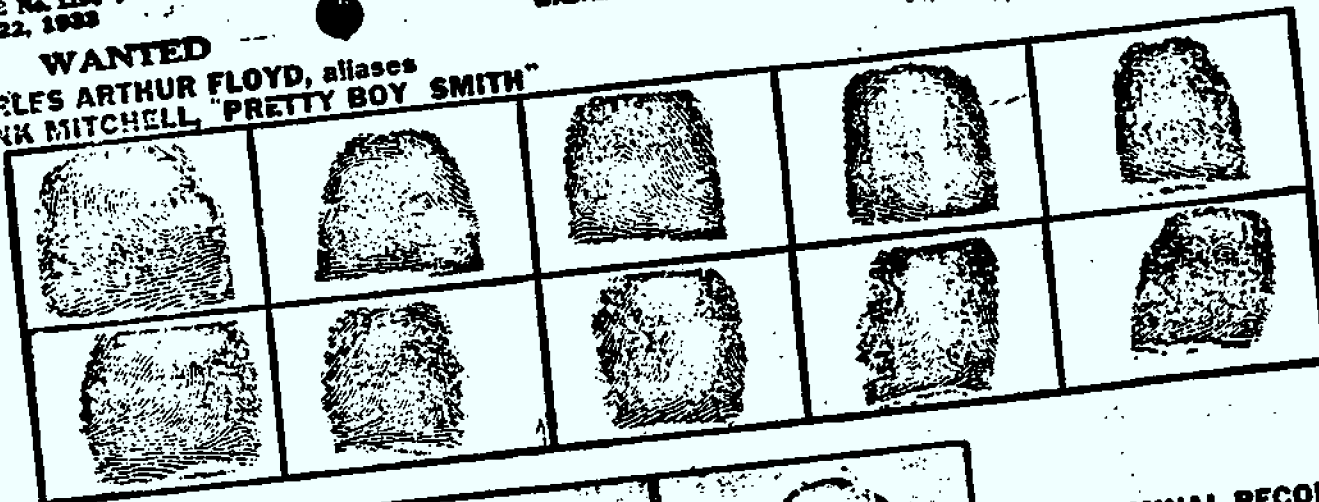

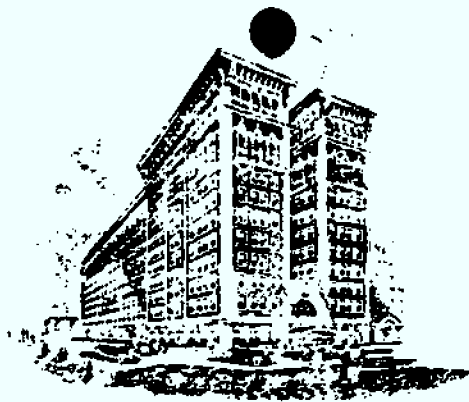

MEMORANDUM FOR THE DIRECTOR

Agent Hollis, East Liverpool, Ohio, telephoned and stated that he had just received a report from Mr. Purvis, at East Liverpool, to the effect that a farmer in that vicinity positively identified the photograph of Floyd as being the man who stopped at his place today about 1:00. After the farmer had given the man something to eat, he left on foot. Mr. Hollis stated that all agents had been concentrated in that section looking for Floyd; that Mr. Purvis had called the Youngstown, Ohio police department and they had sent out all available men to block the roads, and to search all the back roads, and the East Liverpool police are sending out some men to aid in the search also. Mr. Purvis advised Mr. Hollis that the farmer who positively identified Floyd did not state whether he was injured or otherwise.

Mr. Hollis stated that Mr. Vincent Crowley had returned to the police department at Wellsville, Ohio in accordance with the request of the Mayor there; that he and other agents were over at the police department about 12:00 o'clock, and were told to return in two hours and they would then give us a final decision as to whether or not they would release Richetti. He stated that Mr. Crowley had talked with the Director relative to this situation.

MEMORANDUM FOR THE DIRECTOR.

On October 23, 1934, Special Agent in Charge Dwight Brantley advised telephonically that Agent Hanson called him at 12:40 from Tulsa, informing he had learned on even date that one Dr. Thomas A. Shepard, residing at the Mincks Hotel, is friendly with George Stewart, a former member of the Tulsa Police Department, and that recently Stewart burned his hand, had it treated by Dr. Shepard, and in this way they had become friendly. Dr. Shepard told Stewart that he had treated certain outlaws and had become acquainted with Floyd two or three years ago when Floyd was living in Tulsa, and that he had treated Floyd's son. Agent Hanson interviewed Dr. Shepard who stated that after the massacre at Kansas City, Floyd sent for him and he (Dr. Shepard) went to Kansas City by plane and treated Floyd; that he was wounded in the hip and had quite a serious time. Dr. Shepard told Agent Hanson that Floyd was taken care of in Kansas City by some red-haired woman.

Dr. Shepard further stated that following the newspaper accounts that Floyd was seen in Iowa two or three weeks ago, a brother of Floyd came to Tulsa and he talked with him about three hours, at which time he learned that it was not Floyd who was seen in Iowa. Although Dr. Shepard liked Floyd personally, he stated he would cooperate with the Division due to the fact that he felt Floyd had gone too far. He also expressed the opinion that Floyd would come to him for treatment in the event he was wounded and escaped from the Ohio territory, and promised cooperation with the Division. Dr. Shepard is about sixty years of age, has an office in the Ritz Building, telephone - 2-8314. Due to the fact that Dr. Shepard does not bear a good reputation, it was suggested that his telephone be tapped immediately due to the fact that he may not live up to his promise to cooperate.

unable to secure the present address of Julia Tul or Tyl. However, they advised they would continue in their efforts and if they received her present address they would immediately notify the Cincinnati Office.

Mr. H. S. Brown, clerk, Hanna Coal Company, Camp #1, and Mr. Turner Mills, clerk, the same coal company, were interviewed and advised they were sure that neither Richetti nor Floyd had been visiting in that vicinity. These parties further advised that Ralph Dematte, who is a half-brother of Richetti, had recently moved to this camp from Colgate, Oklahoma, where he had been working for the Canteen Coal Company. They stated that Dematte came here on 8-8-34 and was living in house #59, and was driving a car with Oklahoma license plates on it. They both stated that neither Richetti nor Floyd had been visiting Dematte. These parties stated that they would keep this matter in mind and immediately report any developments to Sheriff Long. The photograph of Richetti was exhibited to all persons interviewed but none of them knew him. However, they stated that he showed a family resemblance to Dave Richetti.

Sheriff Long stated that he would keep in close contact with the persons interviewed and immediately report any information to the Cincinnati Division Office. Sheriff Long further advised that he was keeping as close a watch as possible in the vicinity of Dillonvale, Ohio and that from the photograph of Richetti he believed he would recognize him because of the resemblance to other members of the family, whom he knows.

On the night of October 20, 1934, a telegram was received from Sheriff Long reading as follows:

"RECEIVED CALL THAT OKLAHOMA LICENSE NUMBER FOUR
NAUGHT TWO NINE SEVEN FIVE IN DILLONVALE OHIO
HAVE NOT HAD TIME TO CHECK ANY INFORMATION ON
THIS PLEASE WIRE ME"

A wire was immediately sent to the Oklahoma City Office requesting a check on this license plate and return wire indicated that it had been issued to Ralph Dematte of Lahigh, Oklahoma, a half-brother of Richetti.

Special Agents N. B. Klein and J. R. O'Hair, proceeded to Steubenville, Ohio on October 21, 1934 for the purpose of contacting Sheriff Long and making investigation to ascertain if Subjects Richetti or Floyd might have arrived at Dillonvale, Ohio in this automobile. Prior to their arrival in Steubenville, Ohio, Sheriff Long called the Cincinnati Office from Wellsville, Ohio advising that he had just identified a man in the custody of the Chief of Police there as Adam Richetti and that Richetti had then admitted his identity, and that he furthermore believed that Subject Floyd had been with Richetti in the vicinity of Wellsville, Ohio, although Richetti would not admit this, that the Chief of Police at Wellsville, Ohio had engaged in a gun fight

with Richetti and another individual and it is believed he had shot the other individual through the stomach and that a posse was being organized to search for this individual.

The above information was reported immediately to the Division, and to Special Agent in Charge, Purvis, of the Chicago Office who was then in Cincinnati, Ohio.

Reference is made to letter from the Kansas City Office, under date of September 17, 1934, indicating the possibility of one Moe Davis being a contact at Cleveland, Ohio for various underworld characters, and particularly for Phillip Lascuola and James Bove alias James Civella.

b7D I wish to advise that in connection with under-cover investigation concerning this matter at Cincinnati, Ohio, informant [redacted] on October 10, 1934 advised that he was informed by a friend at the Arrowhead Inn near Cincinnati that the "big boss" was expected to visit the Arrowhead Inn from Cleveland, and [redacted] thought that this might mean a visit was expected from Lascuola. He consequently was at the Arrowhead Inn on the night of October 10th, at which time the individual referred to as the "big boss" appeared, and [redacted] advised that he was not either Lascuola or Civella and he consequently had no further interest in this individual. He advised, however, that the name of this individual was Moe Davis and that he spent practically all of his time at the Arrowhead Inn with Sammy Schraeder, who recently returned from a visit to Cleveland and Detroit.

Letter from the Detroit Office under date of September 28, 1934 indicated that a photograph of Moe Davis was being requested from the Akron, Ohio Police Department. If this has been secured, it is suggested that a copy be furnished to the Cincinnati Office in order that it may be ascertained whether it was the same individual who visited the Arrowhead Inn.

MEMORANDUM FOR THE FILE.

VERNON C. MILLER (Deceased) with aliases; RICHARD TALLMAN GALATAS, with aliases, I.O. #1201; CHARLES ARTEUR (PRETTY BOY) FLOYD, with aliases, FUGITIVE, I.O. #1194, et al. Conspiracy to Deliver Federal Prisoner.

This Agent while in Roswell, N.M., recently, interviewed Sam McCue, Deputy Sheriff of Chaves County, N.M. Mr. McCue stated that he had learned through a confidential informant that subject Floyd had furnished money for the purchase of a hangout near Duran, N.M.; and that the property was purchased in the name of some friend of Floyd; but he did not know the name of the friend; that the place was bought in the early winter of 1933.

Mr. McCue stated that his informant told him that the place could be located by going three miles east of Duran, N.M., then turning south five or six miles, coming to a windmill, then three quarters of a mile to the southwest, coming to a log house on the edge of the timber, that being the house; that his informant was guessing at the distance but thought that to be about correct, stating that his informant was reliable and he believed this to be a good tip. Mr. McCue stated that he would be glad to inform the El Paso Division Office of any further information in the matter and co-operate in the capture of this individual.

This Agent and Agent Geraghty proceeded to Duran, N.M., by automobile, with a view of locating the hangout if possible and making the best possible map of the country and roads leading to the hangout in order that Agents would have no trouble locating the place in case a report that subject was seen or heard of in that part of the country.

Agents had some trouble locating the exact place as the country is rough and mountainous, covered with scrub cedar and pines, there being some three windmills near the location. Agents made notes of the roads, fences, gates, houses, and the lay of the country in order that a map might be made giving the lay of the land that it might be penetrated without disturbing the occupants if possible. The map and plat, which was drawn by Agent Geraghty, is believed by him and this Agent to give a complete diagram of the roads and the country which can be readily located by persons using the map.

The location is practically the same as that stated by McCue, it being three quarters of a mile to the southwest of the windmill and the distance only varies in a small way. The house sits on the edge of the timber, as stated, located in the head of a canyon that runs to the northeast. The windmill is just about six miles from Duran. The map referred to is being retained in the file on this case in the El Paso Office for future reference.

Agents drove past the house which is believed to be the hangout and which is visible for only a short distance from the road. There is also a log house which apparently was used as a dwelling at one time and is now probably a barn which possibly contains a still for making liquor. There is also a log garage, the east side of the clearing being open. The dwelling is made of native lumber and seems to be a three or four room house; several large pine trees are in the yard and a farm lays to the north which is not cultivated this year. There is a wire gate to the south and west of the house and a very sandy road that completely circles the place and farm, entering from the north road, following the farm fence, passing around the houses and corrals and leading down the canyon to the northeast to the above mentioned windmill about three quarters of a mile from the house. The hangout is well protected from the west, south and east by a small ridge covered with scrub cedar and pine, the only opening being to the north which is the farm, and automobiles or persons entering from that direction can be seen from the hangout for a long ways.

The individual now located on this place is a Mr. Mathews, initials not known. Mathews also owns a goat ranch which is located about one mile to the west and which he is supposed to have purchased last winter from a man by the name of Henry Wook. The goat ranch is completely surrounded by scrub cedar and pinon brush. Agents partly surrounded the place afoot, keeping out of sight, trying to ascertain the means by which this place could be entered without being seen. It was determined that there are only two roads entering the premises which are an old road leading from a windmill coming from the northeast about one mile, winding through the cedars, and a road coming from the southwest, possibly from Duran, N.M. The house is a large one, built of gray sheet iron, with small cupola on top. The stove pipe is on the east side of the house and extends several feet above the roof. There are a new wind mill and new sheet iron tank to the north and west of the house.

Agents passed the log house, which is supposed to be the hangout, from the north and west, circling the place to the east, and just when nearing the place a shot from a .22 calibre rifle was heard. At first no one could be seen; but later a woman was discovered standing behind a large pine tree. This Agent opened a gate on the road and drove around to the east of the buildings. The lady came out from cover and this Agent attempted to interview her. She was very inquisitive and rather hard boiled and wanted to know where we were bound and for whom we were looking. Agent advised her that we were off our road and wanted to go to a ranch down below. She wanted to know the name of the ranch to which we were bound.

It is the belief of Agents that the lady was attempting to protect a still that is being operated on the place and intended to refuse to let us enter the premises if we attempted to do so, which we did not do.

About one and one half miles below the supposed hangout, Agents came

upon a newly settled place which has a lumber house with wind mill and several new 'dobbies for building a new house. The individual on this property was interviewed by this Agent and stated his name is Henry Mock. Agent introduced himself as Mr. Jones, a Special Agent of the Interior Department, stating to Mr. Mock that the Department had had many complaints from that part of the country regarding settlers proving up on land without complying with the law through not living on the land the required length of time and not putting the required amount of improvements on the land. This seemed to have been a good pretext as Mr. Mock stated that there were several claims that had been proved up without any improvements being made and gave the names of several Mexicans who violated the law in that respect. He stated that he had just recently been called as a witness to Albuquerque by the Government in one of those cases and he would gladly assist Agent in any way possible.

Agent made inquiry as to the names of persons who resided up the canyon (the supposed hangout). Mr. Mock stated that the man's name was Matthews and he believed he was from Brownwood, Texas. Inquiry was also made as to the name of the owner of the goat ranch. He stated the ranch belonged to Matthews, stating that he sold the goat ranch to Matthews last winter and settled on the place on which he is now living; but did not state what he got for the goat ranch. Mr. Mock advised that he formerly was from Clayton, N.M., and seemed to know a number of people with whom Agent is acquainted. He stated that Tom Gillespie, the Sheriff of Union County, was a friend of his. Mr. Mock is a clean looking chap and might later be of value to the Government as an informant if properly approached.

After Agents' return to El Paso, a conference was had with Special Agent in Charge Colvin and it was decided to check up the record of Henry Mock at Clayton, N.M., through Sheriff Gillespie and ascertain his record as to honesty and integrity and if he is found reliable, he might, if thought advisable, be approached relative to subject coming to the hangout in which possibility he would be asked to notify the Division Office, as it is believed the place located is the place mentioned by Deputy Sheriff Sam McCue as the suspected hangout of subject Floyd when in New Mexico.

MEMORANDUM FOR THE DIRECTOR.

With respect to the proposed letters to Chief of Police Hugh J. McDermott of East Liverpool, Ohio, and Sheriff Ray Long of Steubenville, Ohio, thanking them for their cooperation in the Floyd matter, please be advised that Tracy communicated with Mr. Cowley and Mr. Purvis with the following results:

Mr. Cowley states that Sheriff Long was not cooperative insofar as he, Cowley, was concerned. He states that Long told Purvis he would help the Federal Government in securing custody of Richetti but that he joined with other officials at Wellsville, Ohio, in a statement to the press that the Chief at Wellsville had been cooperative and it was evident from his actions that he did not desire particularly to help the Division.

With regard to McDermott, Cowley states that Purvis and his men were out looking for Floyd and ran into police officers with McDermott who were on the same lead which came from another source and that McDermott did not furnish information from his informant to the Division. He states that McDermott, so far as he knows, did not do anything particular to merit commendation but only what any officer would do under the circumstances. Mr. Cowley stated he felt that the four officers who assisted in Floyd's apprehension and death as well as the informant might be given \$250 each for their help. I asked Mr. Cowley why he recommended against a letter of commendation and recommended compensation. He stated he thought it might help us in the law-enforcement field to pay them although we were not willing to write a letter commending them for their efforts.

Mr. Purvis states he does not know whether McDermott came at his solicitation or just happened to be on the scene in connection with another lead. He states that McDermott was very cooperative during the chase. Mr. Purvis indicated that he did not know whether it would be good policy to write a letter to either Long or McDermott. He stated he rather was inclined to agree with Mr. Cowley that we ought to pay the informant and the officers \$250 each.

I have talked with Mr. Tamm about a report submitted by Special Agent McKee dated October 26th, with respect to this matter. He pointed out, with regard to the informant [redacted] that the squad of Agents while patrolling the territory north of East Liverpool on October 22nd, interviewed [redacted] and that [redacted] immediately identified a photograph of Floyd as the likeness of a man who had been furnished food [redacted] at about 12:30 P. M., on the same date. Mr. Tamm was of the opinion that from this information [redacted] could not be termed an informant and would not be entitled to any reward.

In view of the foregoing, I recommend against any reward or letters of commendation in this case.

SYNOPSIS OF FACTS:

On 10-11-34, Deputy Sheriff William Owens, Cresco, Iowa, and State Agent Albert G. Haight, Des Moines, Iowa, while investigating two strangers at the Elmer Bosteter farm, McIntire, Iowa, one of whom was believed to be Charles Arthur Floyd, I.O. #1194, were fired upon, and three men escaped in a Ford V-8 sedan. One of the men who escaped was Lee Bosteter, and the other two were known as Eddie Bennett and Francis Gould. The persons who came in contact with Bennett, upon being shown several photographs of Floyd, advised the likeness of the latter bore no resemblance to Bennett.

P.

DETAILS:

The St. Paul Police Department notified the St. Paul Division Office that information had been received that Charles Arthur (Pretty Boy) Floyd, I.O. #1194, had fired on officers near McIntire, Iowa on 10-11-34, and escaped in company with two other men. This information was telephonically communicated by SAC D. M. Ladd to SAC Werner Hanni of the Omaha Division office, who dispatched Special Agents J. H. Kenney and J. L. Flood to Cresco, Iowa, where the aforementioned Agents were met by Special Agents J. H. Rice and C. O. Lawrence of the St. Paul Office. The following investigation was conducted by the above named Agents and Deputy Sheriff William Owens, Cresco, Iowa and Albert G. Haight, State Bureau of Investigation, State Capitol Building, Des Moines, Iowa.

Deputy Sheriff Owens, County Court House Building, Cresco, advised that on 9-28-34, he went to the farm of Fred Weber, 1 1/2 miles northwest of Bonair, Iowa, to serve eviction papers and while talking to Mr. Weber, he noticed a man peeking around a corner of the outside of the house, whose actions seemed suspicious. Mr. Weber married Mrs. Gladys Weber, who is a daughter of

Mr. and Mrs. Elmer Bosteter, who reside on a farm located $1\frac{1}{2}$ miles south of McIntire, Iowa. The Bosteters have a large family, all whom bear shady reputations. A son Clifford Bosteter, is now confined in the State Penitentiary at Stillwater, Minnesota. Another son, Lee Bosteter, 25 years of age, a daughter, Venola Bosteter, 15 years of age, and several small children of school age reside on the Bosteter farm. Mr. Owens advised that he made a number of inquiries in the neighborhood where the Bosteter and Weber farms are located, to learn the identity of the stranger he saw at Weber's and was advised by Simon Osenga, Lime Springs, Iowa, that he had heard it rumored this individual was Charles Arthur (Pretty Boy) Floyd; that upon receipt of this information, he communicated with Park Findley, in charge of the State Bureau of Investigation, State Capitol Building, Des Moines, Iowa, who sent State Agent Albert G. Haight to Cresco on 10-5-34. Mr. Owens advised that he and Mr. Haight kept the Bosteter and Weber farms under surveillance, and found that a 1934 Model Ford V-8 sedan, bearing Iowa 1934 license tags #41-875, was frequently parked in the rear of the Bosteter home. Mr. Owens checked these tags at the State Highway Department and found that same had been issued to Welda L. Holten, Britt, Iowa, for a Buick sedan. Messrs. Owens and Haight thought it advisable to interview the stranger and around 3:30 P.M. on 10-11-34, drove to the Bosteter farm and as they stopped their car in the rear of the house, the stranger, thought to be Floyd, whose name it was later learned is Eddie Bennett, ran out of the house, jumped into the Ford Sedan, and driving east, motioned to Lee Bosteter and one Francis Gould, who were working in the field a short distance from the house to get into the car. Messrs. Owens and Haight turned their car around and gave chase, running the occupants in the Ford Sedan to a point 2 miles east, leading into a blind road to a farm. The occupants in the Ford sedan stopped their car in a farmer's yard, then turned it around so they could make an exit, in the same direction they came in by. The officers stopped their car about 100 yards from the Ford Sedan, and the occupants of both cars left them, and a gun battle ensued. Mr. Owens had a .45 caliber automatic pistol, and Mr. Haight carried a rifle which holds five shots. The officers observed Lee Bosteter walk to a turn in the road, kneel down and fire 15 to 20 shots, in the direction of the officers. The officers ran for cover and the three individuals jumped into the Ford sedan, drove out of the blind road and fired at the officers as they passed them. Mr. Owens was rather certain one of the men had a machine gun, which was fired out of the automobile. Mr. Haight shares this opinion. The Ford Sedan was driven in the direction of the State line, possibly into the State of Minnesota. Mr. Haight notified the St. Paul Police Department to be on the lookout for a Ford V-8 sedan, bearing Iowa license plates #41-875. The officers were unharmed, and it is not believed the occupants in the Ford sedan were hit by any bullets. Messrs. Haight and Owens both expressed the opinion that the man known as Eddie Bennett is Floyd.

The spot where the gun battle took place was searched and six .351 caliber Western Shells were located. Mr. Haight retained three of them. The other three will be forwarded to the Division for examination by the Laboratory. Mr. Haight advised that these shells were used in an automatic rifle. The road on the location where the gun battle took place was examined for tire treads, but

but no tracks could be found because the road is bedded with a crust of light sand. Mr. Owens and Haight advised that they had decided to bring the Bosteters and Webers to the Sheriff's office for questioning, and possibly confine them in jail, on an investigation charge. However, after the members of these two families were questioned, they were allowed to return to their respective homes.

The officers accompanied by the Special Agents of the Division mentioned herein, drove to the Bosteter home. The room occupied by Lee Bosteter, with whom Francis Gould stayed, was searched for latent fingerprints, but none were found, and neither individual left any personal effects. It was learned that Eddie Bennett had also shared the room of Lee Bosteter and part of the time stayed at Webers home. Mr. and Mrs. Weber were also taken into custody for questioning and were driven to the Sheriff's office at Cresco.

Elmer Bosteter, advised that his sister, Pearl, married Henry Bennett, about 10 years ago, but he never learned where the ceremony was performed, however, when they visited him at his former place of residence, Osage, Iowa, about 7 years ago, he first met Henry Bennett, who claimed he and his wife were residing at Cherryville, Missouri. Mr. Bosteter claimed not to have any knowledge of the personal history of Henry Bennett or his relatives, employment etc. Eddie Bennett came to the farm of Bosteter about 4 years ago and announced that he was a brother to Henry Bennett. Bosteter advised that Eddie Bennett never spoke much of his personal history, but said that he had lived in Ottumwa, Iowa, with his mother; was a cigar salesman, and a brother of Henry Bennett. After the first visit of Eddie Bennett, he came on infrequent occasions, possibly once a year or less and visited at the Bosteter's home. Mr. Bosteter met Francis Gould through Eddie Bennett, when both of them visited at his farm about 2 years ago. He advised that Lee Bosteter went to Cherryville a few years ago, and upon returning home said he had visited Henry Bennett, and worked on the latter's farm. Gould according to Bosteter said he lived near Des Moines and his brother owned a drug store there. Bosteter in response to questions as to whether Gould, Eddie and Henry Bennett ever came together to visit him, replied in the affirmative, advising that on this visit, which was about 2 years ago, these persons only remained about 2 hours and then departed, and he said they were going to Minneapolis, Minnesota. Mr. Bosteter advised that on the recent visit Eddie Bennett and Gould came to his farm and were driving a Ford V-8 sedan; that neither one said the car was his, but from the actions and conversation of Eddie Bennett, who seemed to have control of the car, he presumed Bennett owned it. These men arrived on or about 8-15-34. Mr. Bosteter furnished the information that Bennett and Gould kept company with Thelma and Blanche Evans, who reside with their parents, Mr. and Mrs. Matt Evans at Osage, Iowa. Bosteter stated that Bennett and Gould kept their baggage in the Ford sedan; that this comprised of 3 leather suitcases, 2 small handbags, and they also kept in the car 2 raincoats and a suit of brown clothes. Bosteter advised that he was present when his son, Lee Bosteter, Eddie Bennett and Gould made a get-away in the Ford sedan, and he is at a loss to know why they did this. It was suggested by Deputy Sheriff Owens that as 300 chickens had been stolen in the same vicinity where Bosteter resides, a few days before the gun battle, that undoubtedly those persons thought the officers were going to arrest them for this theft, and for this reason fled. Bosteter denied knowledge of this theft.

Mrs. Minnie Bosteter, upon being interviewed, gave practically the same information as her husband, in reference to the Bennets and Gould. She advised that Blanche and Thelma Evans, stayed at her home for several days, commencing on 8-15-34, and she further advised that she had no idea where her son Lee had gone in the company of Eddie Bennett and Gould.

The next and last person of the Bosteter family to be interviewed was Venola. She advised that the Evans girls are her third cousins; that Eddie Bennett frequently drove Blanche Evans out in the Ford sedan in the evening and usually returned at a late hour. Miss Bosteter advised that she had but very little conversation with Eddie Bennett and Gould, and was unable to furnish any information useful in locating them. Miss Bosteter gave a photograph of Lee Bosteter to Agents, which is being retained in the Omaha File of this case.

Fred Weber advised that he had formerly resided at Stacyville, Iowa, and that about 4 years ago, Mrs. Pearl Bennett and Eddie Bennett came to visit him and she introduced Eddie Bennett as her husband's brother. Mr. Weber further advised that both Eddie Bennett and Gould have visited a number of times at the Bosteter home, and on the occasion of their most recent visit, Eddie slept at the Weber home most of the time. Mr. Weber, who appeared to be truthful in his statements, said that neither Eddie Bennett nor Gould mentioned much about their personal history, and there is nothing he could recall that would serve as a lead to trace them; that these men had mysterious actions and would often go away for two days at a time, and on returning never made an explanation of where they had been. Mr. Weber at the conclusion of the interview advised that it was his understanding that Henry Bennett lived at Charryville and Clifford Bosteter would no doubt be able to furnish the personal history of Eddie and Henry Bennett and Gould.

Mrs. Gladys Weber stated that while Eddie Bennett stayed at her home, he never received any mail and the only person to whom she could refer the Agents and officers, would be Etta Eastman, who could give some information as to the identity of the Bennetts and Gould. Etta Eastman is now confined in the Reformatory at Shakopee, Minnesota. Miss Eastman is a friend of Clifford Bosteter and she formerly resided near McIntire. Mrs. Weber mentioned that Eddie Bennett has a nickname of "Doc".

Thelma Evans, when interviewed at the home of her father, advised that she became acquainted with Eddie Bennett and Gould on or about 8-15-34, when they came to Osage with Lee Bosteter in a Ford sedan; that she observed two rifles, or possibly they were shotguns in the rear seat of the car, and she thought it peculiar they carried their suitcases in the car, as Eddie and Gould returned each night to McIntire, after she and her sister went riding with them. Miss Evans promised to notify this Division office if she ever hears from Eddie or Gould.

Blanche Evans was located at the Gardner Nursery at Osage, where she is employed. She advised that although she kept company with Eddie Bennett, and had gone out with him a number of times, he never spoke about the location of his home, his parents, or gave any other information that would be useful in tracing him. He promised to write to her when she last saw him, on the night of 10-10-34,

and if he does she will forward the letter to this office.

It is evident from the above investigation that Lee Bosteter, Eddie Bennett and Gould are in all probability following a career of crime and are no doubt wanted. Several different photographs of Charles Arthur Floyd, I.O. #1194, including a full-length photograph, were shown to all the persons interviewed, and all of them said the likeness in the photographs bore no resemblance to Eddie Bennett. The following descriptions were obtained from Mr. and Mrs. Bosteter and Mr. and Mrs. Weber:

Messrs. Owens and Haight advised that no charge had been filed against the three persons mentioned herein, with whom they had a gun battle, and as far as they know at the present time, a complaint will not be filed. However, they believe it desirable to have the three men located and questioned, and in particular Eddie Bennett, in order that his identity may be determined.

Special Agent O. C. Deway submitted the following memorandum, concerning an onvestigation made at Sioux City, Iowa, Wells, Minnesota and Homer, Nebraska:

"Sioux Falls, S.D.
October 13, 1934.

"Memo for Mr. Hanni:

"In accordance with your instructions, I contacted Chief of Detectives Wheelock, at Sioux City, Iowa and through him talked with Detective Henry Schuldt. Schuldt advised that on October 7th, he was visiting with his brother-in-law Henry Soost, a farmer, who resides six miles south and one mile west of Wells, Minnesota. During his talk with Soost, the latter mentioned about a bachelor farmer who lived about three-quarters of a mile away from the Soost

farm. This particular farmer has had some woman, who drives a big car, staying with him off and on for some time. The woman is reported to be a neat dresser, and wears what is reported to be valuable diamond rings on her fingers. For the last four or five weeks three men in a Ford V-8 have likewise been staying off and on at this farmer's house. The action of all parties concerned is very suspicious. The farmer when questioned about his visitors, states they are some persons who have come down to do a little hunting. It is believed that all parties come from St. Paul. Charlie Soost, a brother of Henry, is unreliable.

"Inasmuch as Wells, Minnesota is only about 80 or 90 miles from McIntyre, Ia. where Floyd is alleged to have been seen, I telephoned the above information to Mr. Ladd, in St. Paul, and he advised me that the parties who shot at the officers near McIntyre the other day, had been identified as being some young fellows from Cresco, Iowa, and none were Floyd or members of his gang. However, the farm at Wells, Minnesota may be a hideout for hoodlums from St. Paul.

"The Sioux City Police advised that information had come to them that the Town Marshal at Homer, Nebraska - Dick Hart - was alleged to have connections with Floyd. Hart for many years served as a Government Indian Officer in Oklahoma, and is alleged to have come in contact with Floyd then.

b7E "I went to Homer, Nebraska and under pretext of [REDACTED] I learned that he never knew Floyd, as he, Hart, left Oklahoma some twenty years ago, and has been employed for the greater part of the time by the Indian Service in North and South Dakota. Hart stated that he knew you, and after talking with him, I recall that I knew him by reputation - "Two-Gun Hart". I do not believe there is any truth in the rumor that Hart might conceal Floyd if in his vicinity.

The First National Bank at Hawarden, Iowa was held up and robbed on 10-15-34 of approximately \$2113.87. The three bank robbers who held up the bank used a Ford V-8 sedan, and one was armed with an automatic rifle. The descriptions of the bank robbers compares favorably with that of Eddie Bennett, Francis Gould and Lee Bosteter. The bank robbery case is being investigated by this office. Omaha file #91-7.

UNDEVELOPED LEADS:

THE ST. PAUL DIVISION OFFICE, at Stillwater, Minnesota, will interview Clifford Bosteter in the State Penitentiary at Stillwater, and question him thoroughly relative to the identity of Eddie Bennett and Francis Gould, also where Henry Bennett resides.

The St. Paul Office at Shakopee, Minnesota will interview Miss Etta Eastman, who is confined in the Girl's Reformatory, and she should be asked the same questions as are asked of Clifford Bosteter, which are set forth in the preceding paragraph.

THE OMAHA DIVISION OFFICE at Britt, Iowa, will interview Welda L. Holten, for the circumstances surrounding the theft of 1934 Iowa license tags No. 41-875.

The Omaha Office at Cresco, Iowa, will interview Deputy Sheriff William Owens, concerning whether Lee Bosteter has returned to his father's farm, and through the latter, the identity of Eddie Bennett and Francis Gould will be learned.

The St. Louis Division Office at Cherryville, Missouri, will interview the local law enforcement officials, postmaster and other sources, for the address of Mr. Henry Bennett and his wife, Mrs. Pearl Bennett, so the whereabouts of Eddie Bennett and Francis Gould may be known and an interview had with them, as it was reported Eddie Bennett is Charles Arthur (Pretty Boy) Floyd.

MEMORANDUM FOR THE DIRECTOR.

Mr. Cowley telephoned and stated that he had just arrived at the Tavern Hotel, East Liverpool, Ohio; that when I called him previously he was at the police department in conference and didn't want to leave. I advised him that when I called I was trying to locate one Richler, but that I had talked with one of the agents in the hotel room and had taken care of the matter.

He advised that they had gone to the police department about 11:00 o'clock and had remained there until about 1:00 o'clock before the Mayor, the Sheriff, the Chief of Police and the County Attorney arrived; that they had gone into a secret conference and invited the two Assistant United States Attorneys from Cleveland to join them, but had omitted him; that he did not insist on sitting in on this conference as his primary interest was getting Richetti anyway, and that he thought the best thing to do was to aggravate them as little as possible. He advised that they had not changed their attitude at all, but that the Assistant United States Attorney at Cleveland, a Mr. Weidenann, who was doing everything he could, and who seems to be a very capable and vigorous young fellow, was of the belief that we would get Richetti.

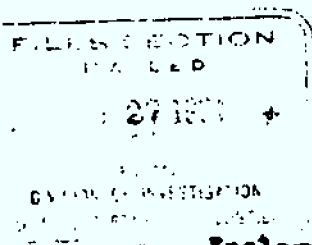

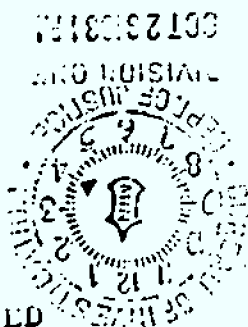

Confirming my telephone conversation with Mr. Tamm at the Division, Sunday, October 21, please be advised that Special Agents Risler, McCallum, Socey and myself departed via plane for Steubenville, Ohio, from Detroit, at 5:20 P.M. Sunday afternoon. It was determined upon arrival in that vicinity that there was no suitable airport at Steubenville and as the airport at East Liverpool was under construction and without any lights whatsoever, it was impossible to land there and finally a landing was made at Beaver Falls, Pennsylvania, which is approximately twenty-five miles from East Liverpool. The trip from Beaver Falls to East Liverpool was made via automobile. It was determined upon arrival there that the entire scene of action was in the vicinity of Wellsville and East Liverpool, hence it was not necessary to proceed to Steubenville. Special Agents Collins and Hopton, who were on a road trip in Southern Ohio, were contacted by telephone Sunday afternoon and they immediately proceeded via automobile to East Liverpool.

Special Agents Risler, Socey and myself departed from East Liverpool at about 11:00 O'clock Monday night, October 22, proceeding to Beaver Falls, Pennsylvania, from which point the airplane took off and we returned to Detroit at 1:45 A.M., October 23. Special Agents Hopton and Collins also departed from East Liverpool about midnight and proceeded into other portions of Ohio, via automobile. Special Agent McCallum, upon instructions of Inspector Cowley, remained in East Liverpool over night and departed east for Pittsburgh, returning to Detroit this A.M.

Gangdom is in panic, and well it may be. It is shaken and shattered, and for reasons that its own distorted mentality can comprehend. Its forces are being routed. Its big-shot members, with their grinning self-assurance and defiance, are being run down, caught, convicted, thrown into prison or, where resistance is offered, shot down like the miserable, cowardly curs that they are.

MEMORANDUM FOR MR. Tamm.

(Time - 9:45 a.m.)

Mr. Cowley telephoned from Pittsburgh and said that the airplane in which he was traveling could not land in East Liverpool. I told him I had just talked with Mr. Purvis, and that the police there would not surrender to us Richetti, and would not even let us question him last night, and told us to come back in the morning. I stated further that last night the Chief of Police stated he thought Floyd was hiding in some house on one of the highways, but could not go out to look for him at the time, and gave three hours to the press. I stated also that Mr. Purvis had 19 Agents, and they are checking all doctors, bridges, et cetera, and that while we had been told at first he had been very seriously wounded, indications now are that if he is wounded at all it is just a slight flesh wound, and not serious.

Mr. Cowley stated he had warrants for the National Motor Vehicle Theft Act violation and conspiracy to obstruct justice (against both Richetti and Floyd), and the Sheriff had a warrant for murder against both of them. I told Mr. Cowley to proceed immediately to Wellsville and have Mr. Purvis meet him there; that the local authorities there are displeased with Mr. Purvis because he told some newspaper men last night that these local authorities would not cooperate with us. I stated I was hopeful that with these legal documents the Chief of Police will agree to let Richetti sign the waiver; that Richetti was willing to sign that waiver last night, and go anywhere we wanted to take him, provided the Chief of Police told him it was all right to do so. I stated that of course Richetti may change his mind. I stated in the event Richetti will not sign the waiver, and the Chief will not honor the documents in Mr. Cowley's possession, just upon showing them to him, we will have to bring in the United States Attorney, Mr. Freed. I stated in the event this will be necessary Mr. Cowley should so advise me, in order that I may contact Mr. Freed at once.

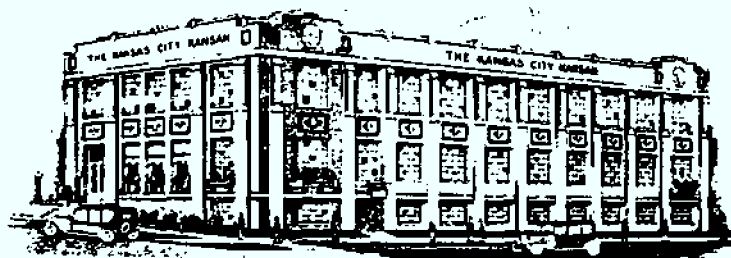

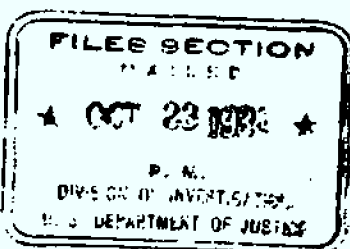

However, I advised him of this angle: That we have Richetti at Wallsville, and we are trying to have him released and turned over to us tonight; that I have ordered the United States Attorney to proceed to Wallsville from Cleveland to assist in the legal procedure. I stated that I had ordered the ambulance to go out for Floyd, and he was expected back in East Liverpool almost any time; that if he is dead, of course there will be nothing more tonight, and if he is alive we will keep custody of him, and if he should be able to be moved, we would take him out of East Liverpool. I told Mr. Suydam we would have some definite word from East Liverpool shortly.

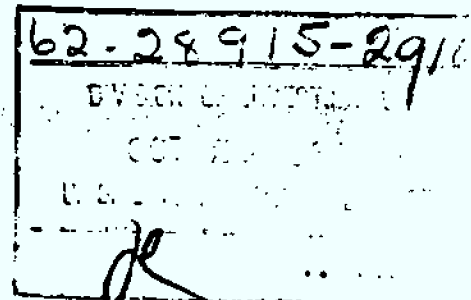

Time: 12:45 P.M.

I telephoned Mr. Stanley and asked him if he received my memorandum this morning relative to the situation at Wellsville, Ohio. He said he received the memorandum, and he saw the Attorney General making a notation upon my memorandum concerning this matter, which he assumed had been sent on to me.

I informed Mr. Stanley that I talked to United States Attorney Freed at Cleveland, and asked him if he would be willing to stand by - or have one of his Assistants stand by - to go to Wellsville if it becomes to go through all of the legal procedure for removal of Richetti. I stated that if we had even been allowed to talk to Richetti last night, I feel confident we would have been able to obtain a confession from him.

I further stated that I then got in touch with United States Attorney Milligan at Kansas City, and he is very anxious to have both Floyd and Richetti out there if he can get both of them; that I then ordered our representative to proceed to Wellsville from Kansas City with our two warrants, and Sheriff Bash proceeded with his warrant for murder. I stated that I am now expecting word as to the developments, but I do not believe the local authorities will agree to release Richetti to us. I stated that I knew of no way for this to be handled than for the Attorney General to talk to the Governor, if he saw fit, and even that might not prove satisfactory. Mr. Stanley said he would take this matter up with the Attorney General.

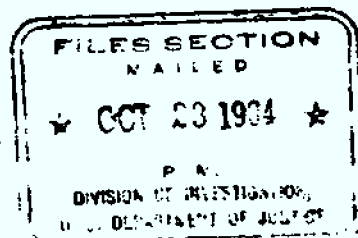
I told Mr. Stanley that Colonel Gates had just asked me if I thought there was any objection to indicating to the press that the authorities had declined to surrender Richetti or allow us to interrogate him, and that I told him I saw no objection to this. Mr. Stanley agreed with this.

MEMORANDUM FOR MR. TAMM

Mr. Cowley telephoned from East Liverpool, Ohio. He advised he had learned that the statement which was given out at Wellsville today was not given out in written form. He has been able to locate only one newspaper man - a representative of the Pittsburgh Plain Dealer. He gave Mr. Cowley the substance of the statement, which is as follows:

It quotes the Director's statement to the effect that the local authorities have failed to cooperate. The Chief then cited what he had done. He stated that he had the original information as to how Floyd was dressed, which information was given to us by him; that he has a record of fifteen years in duty, and has always cooperated with everybody, etc. I told Mr. Cowley that I have received no inquiries, but I think we should state - both here and at Wellsville - that the authorities at Wellsville, unlike the law enforcement officers in all other parts of the country with whom we have had dealings, have shown an utter lack of cooperation or sense of responsibility of the burdens of law enforcement; that in this case, not only did they refuse to surrender the prisoner to us - which was their privilege - but they refused to permit us to interrogate the prisoner alone. Furthermore, they refused to make available to us the guns in order that proper ballistic examination might be made, notwithstanding the fact that they had no ballistic laboratory in the police department at Wellsville; that their action has seriously thwarted and impeded the successful consummation of the investigation of the Kansas City massacre, which certainly was a more atrocious crime than the resisting of arrest upon the part of Richetti or Floyd last week when the Police Chief found them. Mr. Cowley stated he had given a statement along this line to the newspaper man with whom he talked. He said that most of the newspaper men have left.

He stated he is leaving immediately for Pittsburgh, and will be here tomorrow morning.

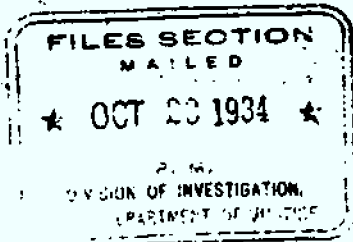
During telephonic conversation, Mr. Frank Waldrop of the Washington Herald inquired about the Floyd case. I explained that the local authorities at Wellsville, Ohio, refuse to cooperate with us, which action is thwarting the progress of the Kansas City massacre case; that they won't even allow us to talk to Richetti, and insist upon holding him in their custody, apparently for no good reason at all. I stated that the United States Attorney is proceeding to Wellsville from Cleveland to institute legal proceedings. I further stated that we had gotten in touch with the Mayor, the Prosecutor and the Chief of Police, all of whom refused our request for custody of Richetti, stating that they wanted to think the matter over. I also advised that I had had certified copies of warrants taken to Wellsville from Kansas City this morning, and the authorities had requested that they be given until four o'clock this afternoon to reach a decision as to whether they would honor the warrants. Mr. Waldrop thought this was a very ridiculous situation.

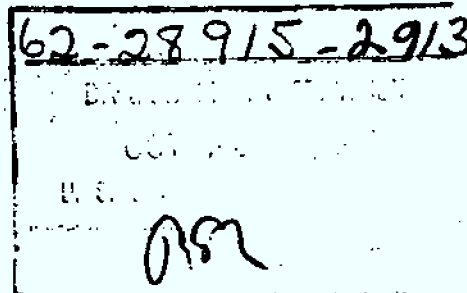

MEMORANDUM FOR MR. TAMM

Mr. Bledsoe, of the Associated Press, telephoned and stated he understood the Chief of Police at Wellsville is still refusing our request for custody of Richetti. I advised him that we presented the formal papers on the Chief of Police, the Mayor and the Prosecuting Attorney; that they again declined to surrender the prisoner, and said they wanted to think the matter over and asked our representative to return in about two hours; that we then ordered the United States Attorney at Cleveland to proceed immediately to Wellsville and to initiate the necessary legal machinery to obtain custody of Richetti. Mr. Bledsoe asked what time the United States Attorney is expected to arrive. I told him that I did not know how long it would take him to make the trip, but he told me he would go by the fastest means of transportation, and should arrive there some time this afternoon. I stated that we have a State charge for murder in Kansas City, Missouri, and two Federal charges, one for motor vehicle theft and one for obstructing justice the latter referring to the Kansas City massacre. I stated that of course we have more serious charges against Richetti than the authorities at Wellsville have.

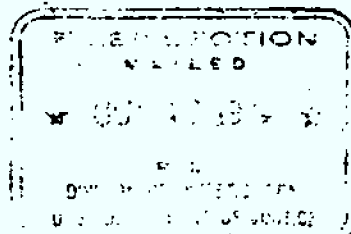

MEMORANDUM FOR MR. TAMM

Mr. Rex Collier, of the Evening Star, telephoned. He inquired as to what finally happened at Wellsville, Ohio. I explained that the Chief of Police was openly defiant, refusing to cooperate, and after exhausting every means in our power to try to get custody, we withdrew from the matter. I stated that under the law, I assume in such instances, where the local authorities have a man in custody, they have prior jurisdiction. Mr. Collier remarked that the Chief is complaining because Mr. Purvis came to him under an assumed name. I stated this was in order to avoid publicity, and the truth of the matter is that the Chief is upset because he did not participate in the capture of Floyd; that he had given out a story Sunday night to the effect that Floyd had been shot in the stomach, which later was found not to be true.

Mr. Collier stated that the morning paper indicates that Richetti is to be transferred to Lisbon, Ohio. I suggested that Mr. Collier talk to Mr. Sanford Bates. I remarked, however, that I understand the jail at Lisbon has been banned by the Federal authorities as being unsafe. Mr. Collier said he had tried to reach Mr. Bates to make inquiry concerning both the Lisbon and Wellsville jails. I stated that I do not want to be quoted, but I don't think the Wellsville jail is even rated.

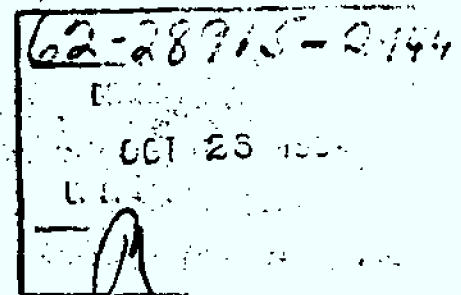
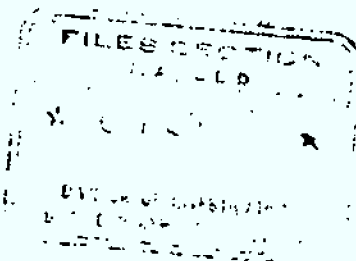
I stated that it is amazing to me that the citizens of Wellsville and the public opinion of Ohio will permit any such atrocious thwarting of investigations such as the Chief has indulged in. Mr. Collier remarked that it seems terrible that there was no way for us to take custody of Richetti legally. I explained that we had done everything possible.

Gibson
Mr. Bledsoe, of the Associated Press, telephoned to inquire as to the developments in the Richetti case today. I told him that according to the last word I received, the local authorities at Wellsville were still refusing to release custody of Richetti, and that is about all we can do at the present time. Mr. Bledsoe remarked that he thought this was a very strange situation. I explained that these authorities are evidently publicity-seekers; that I don't believe there is anything insidious in their action.

Mr. Bledsoe stated he had received a story from Kansas City to the effect that a secret indictment was reported to have been returned by the Federal Grand Jury there today. I stated that as I understand the situation, if the State authorities in Ohio don't want to surrender the prisoner, we can't force them to do so. Mr. Bledsoe inquired if the Governor would have the power to release him, or hold him. I stated that I am not sufficiently informed along this line to say; that the matter may rest with the Courts in Ohio; that we have turned the matter over to the United States Attorney, and he will probably take what action he can take. Mr. Bledsoe remarked that this would probably handicap the successful outcome of the Kansas City massacre case. I stated that of course we have killed the principal one in this case.

Mr. Bledsoe inquired if this does not just about break up the gang that operated in the Middle West. I stated that these individuals comprised the most notorious gang of the Middle West, and they are practically wiped out now. I stated that of course the Karpis-Barker gang is still left but we have been on their trail for some time. However, the annihilation of Floyd practically eliminates the Ozark Hill gang.

I telephoned Mr. Purvis at his home in Chicago. He said he arrived last night about 8:30, and is not feeling so well this morning. I suggested that he remain away from the office, particularly because of the fact that many concerns are trying to find him in order to take motion pictures. I told him that I had refused all such requests. I also advised him that a number of feature writers are trying to locate him, and I had also refused requests made by these people. I stated that I felt we should allow twenty-four hours for the present publicity to die down. Mr. Purvis said he thought it would take longer than that; that a number of people have been calling him. I told him to remain at home for a couple of days. He asked if I wanted him to come to Washington, and I told him I see no reason for it; that I feel it would be more profitable for him to rest up for several days. I cautioned that when he does return to the office, he should reply to inquiries, that Floyd is dead, and he cannot discuss the case. I further cautioned him to allow no photographs of any kind to be taken.

I called Mr. Purvis' attention to the fact that he is extensively quoted here in the East, from East Liverpool, as to the conversation which he had with Floyd, in which he, Mr. Purvis, stated to the papers that Floyd made a statement that he was not in the Kansas City massacre. I stated that I wanted this straightened out, so that we might deny the allegation if it is not true, and particularly because the Attorney General had asked me about it. Mr. Purvis emphatically stated that he did not even talk to Floyd and he made no statement to the newspapers to this effect. I asked if any of our men talked to Floyd and made such a statement. Mr. Purvis replied that Agent McKee talked to Floyd, but he did not make a statement to anybody. Floyd stated to Mr. McKee: "I won't tell you nothing," using some very obscene oaths. I asked if Floyd admitted his identity, and Mr. Purvis replied that he did. I stated that of course we checked the fingerprints, and know it is Floyd.

I suggested to Mr. Purvis that he keep in touch with his office by phone. I asked who is acting in charge. He stated that Mr. Zimmer, Mr. Peterson and Mr. McCarthy are there. Mr. Zimmer is the No. 1 man, but he has been keeping in touch with Mr. Peterson. He remarked that Mr. Zimmer is in bad health.

Mr. Purvis inquired if Mr. Cowley had been able to gain custody of Richetti, and I explained that he had been unsuccessful.

Mr. Purvis asked if the Associated Press quoted him accurately. I told him that the Associated Press quoted him as indicated above. He said he had stated that this brings to a close the relentless search directed by Mr. Hoover, etc. I told him that statement was not carried here. He said it appears in the Chicago and Cincinnati papers. I told him to caution the office not to let his presence in Chicago become known. Mr. Purvis stated he will be at home, but if I should be unable to reach him I should call the office and instruct that he call me back.

MEMORANDUM FOR MR. TAMM

I have noted an exchange of memoranda regarding the identification of the machine gun found in the lagoon at Chicago, Illinois on July 24, 1934. While in the Chicago office the week of October 1, 1934, I had occasion to discuss this identification with Mr. Cowley and Mr. Suran and found that they both were under the impression that the Laboratory had made an error in its findings. Some time ago I had discussed this identification with Mr. Cowley over the telephone and on that occasion thought that I had fully explained the identification to him in a convincing manner. Mr. Cowley told me that the Laboratory could not be correct in its findings inasmuch as the gun had been in the possession of the Valparaiso, Indiana Police Department from the time it was originally purchased until the time it was loaned to the Sheriff at Crown Point, Indiana from whom it was stolen on March 3, 1934 by John Dillinger. Mr. Cowley stated that in support of his opinion, he and Mr. Suran had called in the salesman who had sold the machine gun and who was thought to be thoroughly familiar with machine guns, and that this salesman had shown Mr. Cowley and Mr. Suran that it was impossible to remove the barrel from the machine gun frame and, therefore, there could be no interchange of parts as indicated in the Laboratory report. From the beginning Mr. Cowley has been considering the barrel as distinguished from the bolt as the part that had been identified. I obtained one of the machine guns at the Chicago office and removed the bolt from the gun and explained to both Mr. Cowley and Mr. Suran the parts that had been identified as making the impression on the shells found after the Kansas City Massacre and the Lazia murder, and pointed out that the Laboratory report specifically stated that the rifling marks on the bullets could not be identified with the barrel of the gun.

In connection with Laboratory reports, I suggest that the field offices be required to discuss Laboratory reports in the next succeeding investigative report in a manner so that the supervisors of the investigation at the Seat of Government will then know that the report is fully understood by the Agents in the field. This suggestion is applicable to all investigations wherein a Laboratory report has been submitted. I feel that if the Laboratory is going to be called upon to make examinations of evidence submitted by the field, that it is incumbent upon the field to explain what benefit will be derived from the findings of the Laboratory.



She stated that Adam Richetti and "Pretty Boy" Floyd also visited Seminole and Earlsboro, Oklahoma, at which places they contacted Bradley Floyd, brother of "Pretty Boy" Floyd, and other relatives of the Floyd and Richetti families. While at Earlsboro, she stated that "Pretty Boy", who is known to support a number of families who lives out in the country from Earlsboro, could remain in hiding any length of time with any of these families.

Eva Richetti stated the last time she directly contacted her brother and "Pretty Boy" Floyd, was near Seminole, Oklahoma, about five months ago; that it was shortly after her brother purchased a Chevrolet Car at Seminole under the name of Adam Richards; that prior to that time Adam Richetti and "pretty boy" Floyd during June or July, 1933, came to her sister's home at Wewoka, Oklahoma, and about midnight the law attempted to arrest them and they easily got away. She stated that this sister's name is Marie and that she is married to W.A. "Blackie" Smalley; that after the officers failed to arrest Adam and "Pretty Boy", she stated they took her (Eva Richetti) into custody with Ruby Floyd and Marie Smalley, releasing them the next day. She further stated that Judge C.L. Hill of Wewoka, Oklahoma, is an attorney for Adam Richetti, and that probably when Adam and "Pretty Boy" go into Wewoka, Seminole or vicinity, Judge Hill is contacted.

According to Eva Richetti, her brother and "Pretty Boy" Floyd are known to be heavy drinkers, particularly her brother, who appears to be continually under the influence of liquor. She further stated she does not believe that her brother Adam Richetti or "Pretty Boy" Floyd are in possession of very much money because she has been expecting from day to day to hear from Adam Richetti about arranging to pay C.L. Hill, Attorney at Wewoka, Oklahoma, so that he might represent her in Federal Court at Sherman, Texas; that so far Adam Richetti has failed to send any money, and in order to engage Hill's services she stated that she is endeavoring to have her sister, Marie Smalley, who has very little money, to pay attorney, C.L. Hill. She advised the writer that whenever she contacted her brother or "Pretty Boy" Floyd, they were not in the company of any women; that she doubts very much if women are traveling with them inasmuch as at one time "Pretty Boy" Floyd remarked "No women for me, travel with women and you soon get caught."

Bud Wall, former Sheriff of Frederick, Oklahoma, was recently sentenced to serve two years in the U.S. Penitentiary, Leavenworth, Kansas, and is now corresponding with Eva Richetti from the penitentiary, addressing his letters to Mrs. Eva Wall, c/o County Jail, Sherman, Texas.

Jeiler Graham of the County Jail, Sherman, Texas, advised the writer that Bud Wall gave the penitentiary officials at Leavenworth, Kansas, the name of Mrs. Eva Wall as his wife in order that he might be able to communicate with Eva Richetti under this name.

Bud Well has been interviewed at Tyler, Texas, as will be noted in reference report of Special Agent D.L. McCormack, dated at Dallas, 10-6-34.

Since the writer's interview with Eva Richetti, a telegram from the Division, dated October 22, 1934, was received at the Dallas Division Office, advising that Floyd was fatally wounded near Clarkson, Ohio, by Division Agents; and subject Adam Richetti is in custody of local officials at Wellesville, Ohio.

MEMORANDUM FOR MR. TAMM

The Attorney General telephoned to inquire if there are any new developments in the Floyd-Richetti case. I told him I had talked with our representative at East Liverpool, Ohio; that the two Assistant United States Attorneys have arrived there, and the local authorities at Wallsville are still objecting to turning Richetti over to us. I stated there is to be a conference this morning at 11 o'clock their time, which is 12 o'clock our time, between the representatives of the United States Attorney's office and Mr. Cowley of this Division.

I stated I am particularly concerned about trying to gain possession of the machine gun which the Wallsville police took from Richetti when they arrested him on Sunday, because if we could examine the gun in our laboratory, we would be able to determine whether it has been used in any other massacres, etc. However, they have refused to allow us to question Richetti alone, and of course refused to turn over any evidence to us. I further stated that we would know after the conference this morning as to what action will be taken, after which I will advise him.

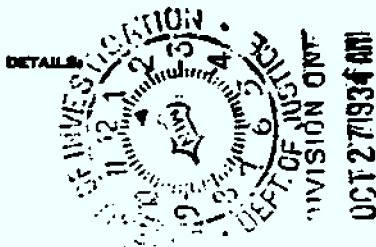

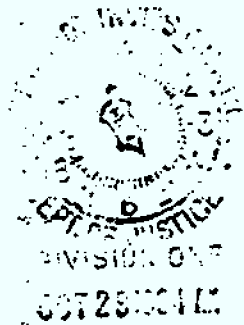
