



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

Talk of Banditry.

The sheriff and Walter Griffith.
Clinton, Mo., real estate man, had
spent all day preceding the massacre as captives of Floyd and his
crim-eyed companion, Adam Ric-

chetti. They had been kinaped early the morning of June 16, 1933.

Speeding along the highways of western Missouri, Floyd talked grimly of his life of banditry and admitted he probably would pass out with his body full of bullets from the guns of law enforcement

officers.

The captives and their captors spent three hours that afternoon in a wood near Ottawa, Kas., waiting until darkness to keep a rendevous in Kansas City, although the sheriff and Griffith did not know this at the time.

It was near 10 o'clock when the four drove across the intercity viaduct from the west and under cover of darkness stopped the car near the biscuit company plant.

Talked With Friends.

Floyd ordered the two victims to remain in the car for a few moments while he talked to friends. It was plain he had a prearranged plan to meet these friends.

Sheriff Killingsworth said Floyd and Ricchetti took the two machine cuns and other weapons with them,

These micro-photos, according to Merle A. Gill, Kansas City ballistic expert, prove that bullets fired in the Union station plaza massacre and the John Lazia "spot murder" were deto-nated by the same firing pin, indicating that the same weapon, or at least the same firing pinthe pins are sometimes switched from one gun to another-figured in both crimes. The upper photo, which is an enlargement many times of the primer of a cartridge case recovered at the scene of the plaza massacre, discloses that there were flaws in the firing pin which detenated the cartridge. The center photograph is a similar enlargement of the primer of a cartridge case recovered at the scene of the Lazia slaying. It reveals that the firing pin that detonated the cartridge was the same as that which deto-

-Photos Copyright, 1934, by Merle A. Gill. nated the plaza massacre cartridge, as the same flaws show up in both photographs. The flaws in the firing pin caused the eggshaped bulges indicated by arrows in the photographs. bulges were caused by the backward force of the explosion of the cartridges which compressed pertions of the primers into the flaws in the firing pins. These bulges are not discernible to the naked eye in an examination of the cartridge cases. The lower photograph shows the complete base of the cartridge case recovered at the scene of the Lazia killing, the primer being the inner circle and the bulges caused by the flaws in the firing pin again being apparent, although, of course, not enlarged in the same degree as in the two upper photos. Both cartridges were fired from a Thompson submachine gun.

Lazia and his followers in the wholesale killing at the Union station has been supplied federal investigators by James LaCapra, Kansas City gangster. If LaCapra's statement is true, it would indicate the men who operated with the North side politician later turned on him and brought about his murder.

Gill, who has examined hundreds of guns of every description and thousands of bullets and cartridge cases, definitely links the two killings through ballistics evidence.

The conclusive evidence which connects the two machine gun slayings, in the opinion of Gill, involves two cartridge cases. One was picked up near the bodies of Nash and the four officers at the Union station and the other was found in a clump of bushes at the east side of the Park Central hotel, where Lazia's slayers stood the morning of July 10 last as they shot him down.

Show Similar Markings.

Microscopic comparison of the cartridge cases, both of which were from a Thompson sub-machine gun, showed similar markings, Gill said. The firing pin of the weapon used in the Union station killing had two lefects which left markings on the primer of the firing case.


The markings were so clear that Gill used them as a guide in examining many other cartridge cases brought to him in the hope that they would lead to the identification of the station killers. His search went unrewarded for months. Then came the "spot" murder of Lazia.

Show Same Markings.

Although the ambushers of Lazia apparently fled from the scene without being seen, they left one bit of evidence behind in the shape of a cartridge case ejected from their machine gun. Gill obtained the little brass cylinder and examined it as a matter of routine. He then went through his files of similar exhibits and finally reached one labeled "The Union Station Massacre."

walked down the street a short distance and stood talking to some men in another car, which he thought was a Chevrolet.

"Floyd had ordered us to remain in the car; had threatened that if we moved we would be mowed down by machine gun fire," said the sheriff.

"He told me that he was to be met in Kansas City and that he would release us there. But he told me we would be followed. He instructed me to drive to Lees Summit and eat dinner there.

"After a few minutes of talk with the men in the other car, it was driven alongside our car. Floyd and Ricchetti got in with the other men. They told us to drive on and to follow instructions or we would be sorry.

Drove to Lees Summit.

"So we drove across Kansas City to Lees Summit. We knew we were being followed all the way. We knew we were being watched while we ate lunch in McKisson's restaurant there. That is why I didn't try to notify police of Kansas City until later."

They statements of Merle A. Gill, Kansas City bellistician, which were published in the Kansas City Journal-Post on October 11, 1934, Dear Sirt relating to the Kansas City Massacre and Lasia Murder Cases, have been brought to my attention.

I believe that it is a very unwise policy to discuss evidence of this type in the newspapers, prior to the actual trial of the cases in which this evidence may be of fundamental importance. I have observed from this newspaper article that the ballistics evidence collected in the Kansas City Massacre and Lasia Cases has been photographed and the similarities appearing in the various bullets pointed out in the newspaper. This procedure, of course, places the defendants in these cases upon notice as to the mature and exact type of the evidence which may be introduced against them. I desire that you and the Special Agents of your office, hereefter, be very cautious and circumspect in your dealings with Mr. Gill and that under no circumstances should ballistics evidence in any Division cases be referred to him without prior specific Division authority.

MEMORANDUM FOR THE DEALESTO

Mr. R. B. Nathan called and stated that the Missouri State Highway Patrol is very anxious to get Richetti back to Kansas City from Ohio; that Major Means, their representative at Ohio was in to see Mr. Nathan today, with Colonel Castile. Mr. Nathan advised that the extradition hearing is set for Thursday and Means believes he (Richetti) will be extradited; however, he is not convinced of this fact. Mr. Nathan further stated that Means desires, for use in the extradition hearing, and any other hearing necessary, that the Division furnish them with test bullets and shells from Floyd's gun, on the theory that one of Floyd's guns was used in killing the two men in Boone county last summer. I advised that we would send Mr. Nathan test bullets for the use of Colonel Castile. He asked as to the possibility of having these bullets sent to Columbus, Ohio, for use in the extradition hearing; that they be sent to Means. I advised that at Colonel Castile's request, we would send the bullets to enyone he designates; therefore the bullets will be sent to Major L. M. Means, Neil House, Columbus, Ohio, tonight or tomorrow morning. Mr. Nethan advised that the local prosecutor states he is not endeavoring to have Richetti returned; that the prosecutor is considering tomorrow, endeavoring to secure extradition papers to have him brought to Jackson County on murder charges, in the event the Boone County officials are not successful in their efforts. He will take no action until after Thursday, so he can determine what action is taken in Columbus.

MEMORALIDUM FOR ER. TAME

Pursuant to your instructions I telephoned Mr. Reinecke at Indianapolis to advise him of the "wants" posted in the Identification Unit against Frank Lee Callan alias Franklin English, who according to the telegram of the Indianapolis Office dated November 1, 1934, was taken into custody by the Louisville, Kentucky, Police Department on October 31, 1934.

I advised Mr. Reinecke that Callan is wanted as an escape by the authorities at Amtsville, Texas, having escaped on June 4, 1934 from the State Penitentiary where he was serving a twenty-five year sentence on a murder charge. I told Mr. Reinecke of the wanted notice placed by the Police Department, North Little Rock, Arkansas, against Frank Lee Callan as a possible ident wanted for highway robbery and kidnaping, according to information received by the Division on August 9, 1934. Mr. Reinecke was also advised that this individual is listed on page two of the Fugitive Bulletin issued by the Division under date of September 1, 1954, which Bulletin contains a reproduction of the right index fingerprint of this individual.

Mr. Reinecke stated that he had sent a second telegram to the Division correcting the amount of money reported to have been found on Callan at the time of his arrest. He said that the amount is \$\Quad 4600.00\$ instead of \$\Quad 46,000.00\$, which amount included a number of new fifty dollar Federal Reserve notes drawn on the Federal Reserve Bank at Richmond, Virginia. He furnished me with the serial numbers of two groups which are in numerical sequence as follows:

E 00440377A to E 00440398A

Mr. Reinecke suggested that a check be made of these serial numbers to see whether they can be identified as part of any loot taken in any recent bank robbery and after consulting ton I requested Mr. Pennington of the Washington Field Office to make an appropriate check with the officials of the Federal Reserve Bank at Richmond, Virginia.

Mr. Reinecke stated that Agents have been questioning Callan but he refuses to give any information. I called Mr. Reinecke's attention to the report of Special Agent Suran dated at Chicago, Illinois, October 18, 1934 which reflects that an informant of the Chicago Office is acquainted with Callan and has stated that Callan is a contact for Lester Gillis. Mr. Reinecke stated that he would relay this information to the Agents at Louisville and have them question Callan thoroughly respecting Gillis.

I told Mr. Reinecke that the Division would not notify the State authorities at Huntsville, Texas, and North Little Rock, Arkansas, until the fingerprints of Callan had been received but that in the meantime he should communicate with Mr. Conroy at Little Rock in order to ascertain whether there is a Federal angle to the kidnaping case referred to in the "want" placed by the Police Department of North Little Rock, Arkansas.

In accordance with the telegraphic request of Mr. Reinecke I instructed Mr. Hince of the Identification Unit to furnish the Police Department of Louisville, Kentucky, with the criminal record of Callan as being possibly identical with the individual arrested by that Department on the evening of October 31, 1954.

MEMORANDUM FOR THE BIRLETON

Mr. Nathan called from Kansas City and advised that he had just talked with Mr. Milligan, the United States Attorney out there, and Mr. Milligan said he had a telephone conversation with the Prosecuting Attorney, Lafferty, in Ohio and also with Fultz, the Chief of Police at Wellsville, Ohio, who advised Mr. Milligan that they are ready and willing to turn Richetti over to the Government at any time the Government wants to take him; that Mr. Milligan is very anxious to get Richetti back in Kansas City, his principal interest apparently being to have him there while the present Grand Jury is in session in order to get some sort of a statement out of him for the Grand Jury; that the Grand Jury will expire on Saturday but he may be able to get an order of the court to keep it going beyond that time; that Prosecuting Attorney Lafferty says he speaks for the Sheriff at Lisbon and himself and they are willing to turn Richetti over to the Government. I asked Mr. Nathan if he was the man who was fighting the extradition proceedings before or was the Attorney General of the State fighting them. Mr. Nathan said as he understands it, Lafferty was fighting them for the Highway Patrol; that Richetti had an attorney employed for him by his relatives.

Mr. Nathan again stated that Milligan is very anxious to get Richetti back to Missouri and wanted to know if the Marshal from Cleveland should go down and take him or if the Division should go after him. I told him if the Marshal takes him there will be a great deal of red tape about removal proceedings, etc., but on the other hand there was no reason why the Division should spend money to bring him across the United States. I also told him that I thought it would embarrassing to the Division to refuse to take Richetti in view of the attitude of the United States, in which Mr. Nathan agreed. I told him I would take the matter up with you and see what you wanted done about it and would give him a call as soon as possible.

RECORDED & INDEX.

Mr. Nathan said the telephone call came to Bash and Milligan from Columbus but they talked to Milligan; that they advised they were ready to turn Richetti over to any representative of the Government presenting the proper papers. I told him that the catch was in presenting the proper papers. Mr. Nathan stated they had a warrant of indictment for Richetti, of which the United States Attorney at Cleveland, Ohio has certified photostatic copies; that Richetti was indicted on a motor theft charge during the present Grand Jury term, since his apprehension and

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certified photostatic copies of the indictment were sent to the Assistant United States Attorney at East Liverpool, while Mr. Cowley was there; that, if necessary, the Division could secure certified photostatic copies of the indictment and get a waiver of removal.

Mr. Nathan suggested that there is in Kansas City, in the event it is desired to leave from there to get Richetti, a plane belonging to Lezare which is being offered to the Division for gas and oil. I told Mr. Nathan I would let him know what you desired to do in the matter.

For some time past, rumors have been current in various parts of Oklahoma to the effect that one W. W. "Shine" Rush had been an associate of Charles Floyd and Adam Richetti. It is a known fact that Rush is a bank robber and has participated in the robbery of at least three banks in this state.

I have been endeavoring for some time to obtain the services of a confidential informant to furnish information as to the location of Rush in order that he could be apprehended. Several days ago, I found such an informant.

Oklahoma. Her nuscand was after this woman consented to furnish information, Rush was apprehended by an Agent of the Division and some State officers.

I am and have been convinced that Rush has not been associated with Floyd or Richetti. With his arrest, however, the robberies of three State banks have been cleared up. These robberies are as follows:

Comanche State Bank, Comanche, Oklahoma - April, 1933. Wayne State Bank, Wayne, Oklahoma - August 1, 1934. The State Bank of Garber, Oklahoma - August 29, 1934.

Identifications have been made in each one of these robberies. I had the witnesses come to this office and effect these identifications.

Sheriff at Enid, Oklahoma, on October 15, 1934, to be prosecuted in Garfield County for robbary of the Garber bank.

While I realize that we have no Federal prosecution against Rush, it was through our efforts that this number of bank robberies has been cleared up, and it was through information furnished by this woman that we effected the apprehension of Rush. These men were potential National bank robbers, and I feel that some good has been accomplished by eliminating them from circulation. I made no definite promise to pay anything, but I feel that we should pay her at least \$50.00, and I recommend that such be done. If the Division will authorize the payment of such a sum, please inform me whether I shall pay it to her and submit a blue slip, or whether a voucher should be signed by her. She prefers not to sign any woucher.

More detailed information concerning the apprehension of Rush will appear shortly in an investigative report in the case titled "Vernon C. Miller, et al".

The above mentioned empty fired shell calibre .45 LCP, manufactured by Remington, indicates from its appearance that it had been fired in a Thompson Sub-machine Gun.

The bullet part of the evidence consisted of one fired .45 calibre automatic pistol bullet of the metal case type, and it had been fired in a jum whose barral was rifled with six lands and grooves inclined to the right. This bullet was probably fired out of a Thompson Sub-machine Gun.

Those exhibits were checked through the Laboratory Files and no identification was rade. They are however being retained for future comparisons when necessary.

It should be noted that these exhibits were received in a condition wherein the bullet was inserted deeply into the shell case, and it was necessary to partially ruin the case in extracting the evidence bullet from it. It is requested that when future exhibits are sent in, the bullets and shells are kept separate from each other.

There seems to be little doubt that an unkind fate is dogging the footsteps of Police Chief John H. Fultz of Wellsville, O., whose sudden rise to fame as captor of Adam Richetti nd near captor of Pretty Boy Floyd last Satorday has been related in the public prints this week. The unfortunate extermination of Floyd, within the ensuing twenty-four hours, by Melvin Purvis and party, seems to have been a detail not altogether expected by the Wellsville chief, and the manner in which the facts in Purvis's exploit have cramped the style of Chief Pultz's interesting version of Saturday's encounter suggests that he is being hounded in the same malicious fate that kept the late Sil John Palstaff from appearing the hero he biless really was.

Thet us consider first the details of Chie do btless really was.

Pultz's exploit, as related in his own simple unassuming way, under his own by-line: shot Pretty Boy Floyd in the stomach. He is hadly wounded. ... Besides being wounded, he is disarmed. Those who were present, however, at the death of Floyd, after Purvis and party had finished with him, found that Floyd was not shot in the stomach; that he was struck by four bullets, three in the back and

one in an arm. And he carried two automatic pistols, fully loaded.

This would seem to leave Chief Fulls's vergion of Saturday's affair 100 per cent wrong. which is altogether too wrong for credibility, -; even for a police chief. It leaves Chief Fultz in the position of not remembering exactly in the position of not remembering exacts, whom he shot or where he shot him, an un comfortable position, not dissimilar to that in which Sir John Palstaff was placed by his faithless friends in one celebrated exploit. Falstaff's humiliation occurred because his friends let him down—didn't co-operate in making his story good. Likewise, Chief Fultz seems to have been let down. He supposed that if and when Floyd was captured, he would be facing the bullets. Instead, Floyd tried to flee, and recoved the fire in the back.



have concerning John Hamilton. During the course of this interview Frye advised Agent Sullivan that while in the United States Penitentiary at Leavenworth, Kansas from 1950 to 1952, he was the clerk to the superintendent of the shoe factory and Bernard Phillips was the clerk to one of the captains of the guard. Frye stated that he became casually acquainted with Phillips while at Leavenworth; that in February 1934 he met Phillips on the street at about 22nd Street and Michigan Avenue Chicago, Illinois, and being in a hurry only speke to him a minute ar so. During the latter part of April or the first part of May, 1934, according to Frye, he again met Phillips on the street in the 4400 block of Hazel Street, Chicago, at which time Phillips was accompanied by a young woman who was introduced to him as Mary Saunders. Phillips and Frye talked for some time and eventually discussed the Dillinger . mob. Phillips advised Frye that he knew all of the mob and told Frye that Hamilton was not dead. Phillips advised Trye, according to the latter, that he had just been to St. Paul and had almost been captured further advising that he was "as hot as a Tirecracker." Frye stated to Agent Sullivan that after some further conversation Phillips and the Saunders woman went to the apartment house at 4425 Hazel Streets. It was Frye's impression that Phillips was staying at this apartment. Frye furnished the further information that some time during the month of June, 1934, while riding in an automobile, he passed Mary Saunders who was walking along Broadway about the 4000 block. Trye stopped and talked with her and they went to her apartment on the ground floor of the north wing of 4227 Broadway. This apartment contained a bedroom and living room. He stated the Saunders woman mentioned that she was from Minneapolis and appeared not to be well acquainted in Chicago. Frye stated that it was his opinion that Phillips was theeping her because she mentioned something about the "big boy" providing her with clothes.

Frye stated that he saw Mary Saunders once again and went to her apartment; that he, Frye, left for Washington, D. C. on July 25, 1934. He stated that about September 10, 1934 he desired to obtain some information in regard to a parele he was one from the state authorities at Chicago, Illinois on a charge of embezzlement and he wrote to Mary Saunders at the above Broadway address. He received an answer about September 28, 1934. Shortly thereafter he, returned to Chicago where he was arrested and he has not been in contact since his return with either Bernard Phillips or Mary Saunders.

Detective Wright of the Fillmore Station, and in his presence Fright checked the criminal presents located at the police station 40.5 and in his presence Fright checked the criminal presents located at the police station 40.5 and indian and Halsted Streets and found the record of an arrest of Ellen Sanders, 4227 Broadway. Frye did not know the charge upon which the woman was arrested, but believed that it was only for investigation. Ellen Sanders was described in the police department records much the same as the description of Mary Saunders given by Frye. Frye described Mary Saunders as follows:

Hair 5.5 or 4
Brown
Eyes Brown
Bould Medium

The writer interviewed Mrs. B. M. Joffe, 4231 Broadway, who is manager of the building located at the Broadway, which latter building is in the same group of other buildings also managed by Mrs. Joffe. Mrs. Joffe advised that she took over the management of the building on July 15, 1934 at which time two families were residing on the first floor at \$227 Broadway, one family being a C. Barraw Mrs. Joffe, have been tenants in the building for a year or more. Mr. Barrow, according to Mrs. Joffe, is presently employed by the General Electric Company. She advised that the other family residing on the first floor at 4227 Broadway on July 15, 1934 was a Donald Akers and family. This family was composed of husband and wife and four children. Mrs. Joffe stated that her records disclose that the Barrow family had resided at that address for more than a year and that she had recently evicted them because of their inability to pay rent. She stated that they had been on the relief rolls for several months.

Mrs. Joffe was shown a photograph of Bernard Phillips and she advised that she could not identify the same as being a likeness of any individual which she had observed on the premises. She further advised that her records did not disclose that anyone by the

name of Saunders or Sanders at any time residing in any of the buildings managed by her. She was also shown a photograph of Winnie Williams, as it was believed that there was a possibility that Winnie Williams might be identical with Mary Saunders. Mrs. Joffe was unable to identify the photograph of Winnie Williams as being the likeness of any individual known to her. Mrs. Joffe stated that the caretaker of the building, Mr. Wagoner, had been employed in the buildings for the past fifteen years and was well acquainted with all the tenants residing there.

Mr. Wagoner was also shown a photograph of Bernard Phillips and one of Winnie Williams and he stated that he could not identify either of them and stated positively that no one resembling Bernard Phillips had ever resided in the group of apartment buildings and that he knew no one by the name of Sanders or Saunders who had ever lived there. However, numerous individuals resided there who would answer the description of Mary Saunders.

Mrs. C. R. Hedrick, 4425 Hazel Street, Chicago, Illinois advised that she is the manager of the apartment house at that address and has acted in that capacity for the past three years. She stated that during the time she has managed these premises no one except Filipino families have resided there, with two or three exceptions. She stated that during the past year she has had two or three white families residing at this address and she was positive that no one answering the description of Bernard Phillips had lived there during the past three years. She further stated that no one by the name of Mary Saunders or Ellen Sanders had lived at 4425 Hazel Street. Mrs. Hedrick could not identify the photograph of Bernard Phillips or that of Winnie Williams.

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

Mr. Magee called to advise that Mrs. Galatas desires her baggage and also her car. I told him it was up to her to get them. He advised that the Division wrote to Kansas City asking them to take it up with the United States Attorney to ascertain whether the above articles could be told him that the Division would follow it up with the Kansas City office and see what that office has done on same. I told Mr. Magee not to take any steps to help Mrs. Galatas secure her belongings; that if they were sent for the persons securing them should have power of attorney and that he get a full receipt for anything that was taken.

Mr. Magee further advised that Mr. Smith called him on the 29th about a Hortense Green. He said he sent the Division by air mail a letter which would reach the Division this morning, concerning same; that he sent Agent Kindell out again on the matter last night as some woman down there said she knew a Hortense Green and said she would try to locate her; that Kindell would talk to her again as there may be something to it but Mr. Magee said he doubted it. I told him to try to locate her anyway.

Mr. Magee advised that Mr. Quinn called him on the Thomas Bobinson, Jr. case sometime ago concerning the informant in Mobile. He said that there is a possibility there but the informant is a very careless sort of person and has changed his dates on the time that he claims he saw Robinson; that he told Mr. Magee over the telephone he saw Robinson on the 25th but now says it was the 18th instead; that he claims his wife is a second cousin to Mrs. Stoll; that he saw Robinson about 100 miles north of Mobile at Collins about 8:30 P. M. with a man about seventy years old. I told Mr. Magee that there were indications from other sources that he was with an elderly man and to exhaust every possibility on the matter because there have been similar indications before. Mr. Magee said if it is true that Robinson was seen at 8:30 at night it would mean that he was working north because he was seen on the 18th, according to the informant, at Mobile in the morning, which would give him time to get to Collins about 8:30 at night, although at Collins they thought he was going south; that he could not be in two places on the same date but that they are covering all leads and think he is either in Mobile or New Orleans.

Mr. Carusi this morning raised the question as to the fact that the weekly report submitted by the Division last week did not include any reference to the Floyd-Richetti or Stoll cases. I told him it was my understanding that it has only been the closed cases to which we have referred in weekly reports.

It is his desire, however - and I believe it is desirable from our point of view also - that there should be included in the weekly report, a report of any results obtained during the course of the preceding week in connection with any of our cases which have been of significant or outstanding character. Certainly, in the Floyd-Richetti matter, there should have been a paragraph in our weekly report upon this matter, as well as upon the Stoll case, because there have been some developments during the past week in connection with legal proceedings incident thereto. Obviously, our weekly report is not being prepared with the proper care and attention that it should have, and it does not reflect properly the efforts and work of these cases. I am informed by Mr. Carusi that the weekly report is used as a basis for the Attorney General's report to the President, and consequently, we should have it as comprehensive as possible.

In connection with the cases which are of a confidential character and upon which we do not desire matters at this time to be disclosed, Mr. Carusi states that a separate page might be prepared, indicating that it is confidential and that the information is not to be disclosed.

Will you please give your personal attention to seeing that this weekly report is properly and adequately prepared.

In connection with our last weekly report, Mr. Carusi read to me a portion thereof, referring to an incident affecting a Mr. Lester Jones, which, to say the least, was phrased in a most melodramatic manner. While I think our reports should be prepared in an interesting manner, I think we should avoid any phraseology of a melodramatic character.



MEMORANDUM FOR THE DIRECTOR

Mr. Nathan of the Kansas City Office called and stated that the Grand Jury had just returned indictments against the following: Galates, Fred Fermer, Esther Farmer, Mrs. Frank Nash, Fritz Halloy, (Frank B. Melloy), Louis Stacy), Elizabeth Galates and Mathis. The indictment does not name any of the three sctual killers in the case and does not name Richetti. It charges conspiracy to obstruct justice and conspiracy to effect the release of a Federal prisoner, as well as substantive offense under the escape statute, there being three counts in the indictment. The other people were not named in the indictment, the United States Attornex believing that by naming only those who are in custody, will give them an opportunity to plead guilty without plending guilty to the same facts later. It is indicated that the investigation is still being conducted as to Richetti, for the effect on the local situation; that probably he will be indicted tomorrow, in another indictment.

I remember the nature of the interview, of course, but my definite recollection is that I was not present at this interview, although I, of course, discussed it with Vetterli prior to making this interview and authorized it. It is possible that Gus Jones went with him for this interview, although I think that he made it alone. Of this I am not certain, but I am almost sure that I was not a party to the interview in question.

Nathan said that this information was not secured from the files at Aansas City. I told him to immediately call Vetterli and get the facts from him, and call me back. I doubt whether I will go to Kansas City and am keeping my reservation for Detroit.

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

Hoover and Purvis are working to track down every man implicated in the Kansas City Union Dopot massacre. Floyd was decited to have been a ringleader there, when the bold attempt was made to free a prisoner, Frank Mash, an Oklahoma bank robber. Five maincluding hash himself, fell before a blast of machine gun and pistol fire. Only one officer, a man in the back seat of the policar, mistaken by the raiders for tash, escaped the deadly fire as the crouched low beneath the line of bullets.

There's still another man at large, wanted by the Department of Justice—Thomas Robinson Junior, accused of the kidnaping of Lrs. Berry Stoll, Louisville, Kentucky society matron.

There will be no stopping until Hoover's men track the down.





I called Mr. Nathan back and told him that I had taken the matter up with you regarding the return of Richetti and that you stated that the Division is through with the matter; that if Milligan wants him returned, he should take steps to have the Marshal return him in the usual manner; that insofar as the Division is concerned it will not get mixed up in the matter any further; that it is up to Milligan to make appropriate terms with the Marshal to bring him back and that the Division will not assist the Marshal in getting him back.

I asked Mr. Nathan what the status of the test of Milligan was to get Richetti. Mr. Nathan stated that Milligan wired the United States Attorney at Cleveland asking him to take steps to have the Marshal take custody of Richetti; that he is also going to enter a habeas corpus and ad testificandum to see if he can't get michetti right away without waiting for the removal proceedings; that his plan is to direct one of these to the Marshal and have the Marshal bring Richetti down there for the Grand Jury and, of course, he would have to go back up to Cleveland before he could be brought back for regular removal proceedings; that Milligan is sold on the idea that he wants Richetti down there before the present Grand Jury expires; that he has no knowledge as to how the thing is coming out. Mr. Nathan said he would keep the Division advised of the progress made. Mr. Nathan wanted to know if the Marshal did get custody of Richetti in Cleveland whether someone should attempt to talk to him up there. I told him the Division would not touch him.

I advised Mr. Nathan that the Division received a telegram from Major Means at Columbus asking that the Division forward air mail special delivery test bullets of U. M. C. 18 stock nickel coated soft primers; that you wanted him to advise Colonel Casteel that the Division will not take any action on any requests which are made of the Division by Major Means because of his attitude in absolutely refusing to cooperate with the Division in the past; that the Division will, however, do anything that Colonel Casteel Casteel Casteel Casteel Air. secure the test bullets this morning; that the others that came out there were not of the same type shell as the ones they previously had and Colonel Casteel thought they should have the others; that he forgot to mention this matter to me this morning. I told Mr. Nathan that the Division has been told by its ballistic man here that the U. M. C. 13 refers to the 1918 production and was not made on a nickel coated type with a soft primer; that he might advise Colonel Casteel of this fact; that the information the Division has in the telegram is evidently erroneous and the Division cannot identify any such type of ammunition; that if he requests anything else he should forward it direct to the Division but that the Division wanted him to know that, because of Major Means' absolute refusal to cooperate with the Division in the past, it would take absolutely no action on anything that Means wanted.

Mr. Nathan called from Kansas City and advised that Colonel Casteel of the Highway Patrol just called him to say that they have put off the extradition hearing at Columbus, Ohio for twenty-four hours to permit them to get an affidavit from Richetti who was not present and planned for all the various officials, including Richetti's attorneys and the Highway Patrolmen to go to Lisbon and take the affidavit; that the prosecuting attorney of that county is against it and the Sheriff is now willing to turn him over to the Division.

I told Mr. Nathan that the Division did twent him, to let them go ahead and manage it themselves because they were not fair when the Division asked for him; that they would probably turn him over to the Missouri State Highway Patrol anyway. Mr. Nathan stated that Col. Casteel said their attorney is figiting the extradition as vigorously as possible; that Casteel wants the Division to take Richetti so he can be turned over to them; that the District Attorney is willing to turn him over to the Division.

I told Mr. Nathan that the Division should not take him because the thing has been messed up and it was not up to the Division to save the day after they have made all those rash statements about what they were going to do. Mr. Nathan said he told Casteel that he would not do anything until he talked to the Division about it. I told Mr. Nathan that the Division would have nothing to do with it.

MEMORANDUM FOR MR. TANK

With reference to your memorandum of Hovember 1, concerning your conversation with Mr. Bruce Bathan, Agent in Charge at Kansas City in connection with the Richetti case, as I have indicated, I do not desire to have this Division have any further connection with this matter. In the first place, I do not believe the Missouri State Highway Patrol acted in a proper manner. They proceeded to swear out a warrant and proceeded to Ohio, as I understand it, without any consultation with representatives of this Division at Kansas City and without any consultation with Sheriff Bash. Now that they have found that they cannot procure the return of Richetti to Missouri, they are turning to us to help them try to get him back, without having dealt with us in the beginning, and no doubt this is probably due to the influence of Majory leans, of the Missouri State Highway Patrol, who has been particularly obnoxious in his relations with this Division. Furthermore, I do not desire that our Division have any further dealings with Chief of Police Fultz of Wellsville, Ohio, or with any official of that town, who, I understand, may be inclined to turn Richetti over to us now, since they have found they are in a rather difficult situation. We made every effort to get Richetti through proper legal process when we really wanted him, and his custody would have been of material assistance to us in the Kansas City Massacre Cose. That situation has now changed, and Richetti could be of little assitance to us now in the investigation of that case. Whatever action the United States Attorney takes at Kansas City - that, of course, will be his own responsibility.

I think that Mr. Bruck Mathan should also be instructed to have a very frank talk with Colonel Casteel of the Missouri Highway Patrol, and advise Colonel Casteel that this Division does not desire to have any dealings with or any connection with Major Means of the Missouri State Highway Patrol, and that it would be particularly helpful to any future relations between the Missouri State Highway Patrol if definite instructions were issued by Colonel Casteel that Major Means not contact officers of this Division. He might state to Colonel Casteel that this Division views Major Means attitude and relation with us as particularly obnoxious and having found them to be so, we cannot deal with him, and that we do nation with the relations between the two organizations to be imperiled by having to response in contact with Major Means. The sooner Colonel Casteel understands this and consider the necessary arrangements, the better the relations will be between the two organizations.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 30.

HE American Legion's pro-bonus L vote has inner Administration leaders secretly worried.

Their concern has nothing to do with the veterans themselves. For, weirdly enough, while the ex-soldiers went on record for the bonus, their new national commander, Frank Beigrano, Jr., a San Francisco banker, is not for immediate payment.

But what is worrying Administration leaders is the effect of the Legion vote next Congress.

Few realize it, but a large number of Congressional candidates, on both Republican and Democratic tickets, are running on pledges to vote for the bonus.

Take for instance the case Harry B. Truman, Democratic Sen-atorial nominee in Missouri, a sure winner. Truman waged his primary fight largely on his promise to vote for the bonus, is making it a leading issue in his election campaign.

One high New Deal official has made a private check of the Congressional line-up, and believes that the bonusites will have a majority in both branches of the new Congress. SOCIALIZATION SETBACK

Madam Perkins and her social in surance advisers are more worrier than they like to admit by the judicial defeat of the Railroad Pensions act.

Most worrisome aspect is the facthat many railroads already carried retirement insurance, and that rail lines are better organized for carrying out employment insurance than almost any other industry in the country.

Detectives Flaugher and Sweeney checked the home of Max Bockross, 245 Oak St., Cincinnati, Ohio, and learned that English on 10-11-54 in company with two women, whom he introduced as his wife and sister-in-law, engaged a furnished apartment at that address and at the time English represented himself to be an Agent for the Cadillac Motor Car Company. English was driving a Cadillac Coupe bearing Washington state license plates #241-142, and English stored his car in a private garage on the premises. This car was only used a few times by English, these being on occasions when he left the premises late in the evening; that English seldom traveled about in the day time and when he visited the tailor in downtown Cincinnati, Mr. Bockross drove him to the shop in his (Bockross') car. A photograph of Callan appears as bandit #4 in the Fugitive Catalogue of Wanted Criminals published by the William J. Burns International Detective Agency, Inc. The information as furnished in this Catalogue indicates that Callan is wanted by the Texas System Prison at Huntsville, Texas, for escape and also that Callan is wanted by the County at Wellington, Kansas, for bank robbary. Callan is described, as follows:

On the night of 11-1-34 Detective Flaugher advised the Cincinnati Office that Frank English had been arrested in Louisville, Ky., in possession of a Cadillac Coupe and there was also found in his possession about \$4,700.00 in currency and a revolver strapped to one of English's legs. English had a woman companion with him at the time he was picked up.

Reference is made to the report of Special Agent R. C. Suran, Chicago, Ill., dated 10-18-34 wherein it is stated on page 12 that English might possibly be a contact in Chicago for Lester Gillis.

In connection with Division letter dated 10-27-34, addressed to the Indianapolis Office and enclosing the criminal record of Hebe Nash, Division of Investigation #99369, a communication was addressed to the Middletown, Ohio, Police Department, which department advised that the disposition to their arrest of Nash on 3-30-32 was, as follows: "Drilled out of city April 1, 1932".

The following memorandum was submitted by Special Agent

H.D. Harris:

In connection with the apprehension of Adam Richetti and the death of Subject Floyd, Mr. H. F. Snyder of the Finkerton Detective Agency, Cincinnati, Ohio, advised that he was at Wellsville, Ohio, on Sunday, 10-21-34, in connection with an investigation made of a hold-up at the Peoples Bank, Tiltonsville, Ohio, which is a state bank. The hold-up occurred on 10-19-34 at approximately 11:30 A.M. Mr. Snyder advised that three men were involved in this hold-up, two of them entering the bank and the other remaining in the automobile cutside the bank, which carried Ohio license plates E 3-301; that the men entering this bank had a shot gun and that the automobile used by them was recovered on the following day approximately seven miles Northeast of Tiltonsvills on an old abandoned road by Sheriff Ray Long of Steubenville, Ohio. He advised further that the officials of the Peoples Bank had viewed Adam Richetti but had been unable to identify him, although their descriptions of the two robbers entering the bank corresponded with the descriptions of Richetti and Floyd; that the men entering the bank had heavy growths of beard and wore toboggen caps; further, that a blanket was recovered in the abandoned automobile and this blanket was very similar to a blanket which Richetti had in his possession when apprehended.

On the evening of 10-29-34 Special Agent Rose of the Pittsburgh Office telephoned the Cincinnati Office advising that Sergeant Vance of the Ohio State Highway Patrol had been in touch with Special Agent in Charge Waters and had advised that State Patrolman Steinhoff at Cambridge, Ohio, had some information concerning this matter.

State Patrolman Spencer Steinhoff was contacted by telephone and he advised that the automobile recovered by Sheriff Ray Long as above mentioned was a black 1934 Ford V-8 Sedan, motor #18-549954, which was stolen on 10-15-34 from Wilferd C. Garrett of Summerfield, Noble County. Ohio, and that the plates carried by this sar at the time of its recovery, Ohio E 3-301, had been taken from an abandoned Chevrolet near Summerfield. Patrolman Spencer Steinhoff advised that he was in receipt of information from Mr. Garrett, owner of this car, to the effect that he had seen a suspicious man in the vicinity of this ear prior to its theft and that this man is known to him and is known to have recently been using an automobile with Oklahoma license plates; that this man has a sister living not far from Tiltonsville, Ohio; further, that the Mayor of Summerfield, Ohio, and Messrs. J. R. Dotson and C. W. Rodecker, all of Summerfield, are familiar with this matter. Mr. Steinhoff advised that he did not secure the name of the suspect reported by these people and that he had made no further investigation of the matter inasmuch ashe considered it to be a Federal case.

UNDEVELOPED LEADS:

CINCINNATI OFFICE at Summerfield, Ohio. Will interview &r. Wilferd C. Garrett for further information concerning the suspect he has in mind as it may be possible that this individual has some connection with the instant case. It should be noted that there is no evidence of interstate transportation of this stolen car and further that the bank held up was not a national bank.

INDIANAPOLIS OFFICE at Louisville, Ky. Will interview Frank English held at that point by the police and thought to be identical with Frank Lee Callan in accordance with the report of Special Agent R. C. Suran, Chicago, 10-18-34.

Since dictation of this report an Associated Press article dated at Louisville, Ky., 11-1-34 relates that one Frank English alias Frank Lee Callan and a young woman were arrested at Louisville, Ky., 11-1-34 and that English will be arraigned before the U. 

He said that this man was well dressed in a brown suit, but that he seemed very ill at ease, and did not leave the impression of being a very high type man. This man told Murphy that he had just arrived in New York from California; that he had come via airplane through Kansas City and not through Chicago; that he had not seen the World Fair in Chicago; that he was planning to go abroad very soon. Murphy said that the men did not seem a willing conversationalist and that though he saw him about the ship after that, he did not say anything else to him, nor did he notice anyone else talking with him. He did not know the stateroom number of this man.

On this voyage Mr. Murphy was accompanied by his wife. She also saw this man and while she did not talk with him, she had ample opportunity to look him over thoroughly. After he and his wife had returned to their home in Charlottesville they were looking through "Time" magazine, issue of August 6, 1934, and noticed therein a picture of "Pretty Boy" Floyd. They both a great that there was a very striking resemblance of this picture to the man that they had seen on the "George Washington" a few days previous.

Inasmich as Murphy noticed no one with the man whom he believes to have been Floyd, and since Floyd prior to this report, has been killed it is not believed that further investigation of this lead is necessary. There is, therefore, no undeveloped lead being set out.

PRETTY BOY" FLOYD, like Dillinger, sneered at the law. He roamed through the Middle-West, leaving a trail of looted banks and bloodshed behind him. He was fond of leaving notes taunting the police for their inability to capture him.

But "Pretty Boy's" days, though he did not know it, were numbered. With Dillinger out of the way, the Department of Justice agents concentrated on the job of running down Floyd. They named him America's No. 1 public enemy. Agents in every city kept a close lookout for the Oklahoma killer.

As criminals have learned, the D. J's get what they are after. Though it may take weeks, or months, the Federal sicuths remain on the trail until the end.

Floyd is dead, a victim to the gunfire of Federal agents and local police, near East Liverpool, O. A police chief had encountered Floyd the day before, and had exchanged shots with him. Within a few hours, dozens of government agents concentrated in the town—30 miles from Pittsburgh. With every road

guarded and every exit of escape closed, they closed in on Pretty Boy." In a few hours, they found him.

The killing of notorious criminals like John Dillinger and Pretty Boy Floyd will selve as a warning to law-violators the nation over. A criminal can laugh at the law. He can defy the police to capture him. He can sometimes, stage dozens of robberies and get away with it."

But in the end the law always has the last laugh.



Øklahoma Indebted to Purvis

THE Americal public owes a debt of gratitude to Melvin Purvis, mild-mannered department of justice eyent who, Monday, added the extermination of Charles "Pretty Boy" "loyd to his already imposing list of accompliments in the interest of law enforcement. It was Purvis, you will recall, who led the group of officers who sent John Dillinger to his death in front of a Chicago theater last July. Prior to that, he had participated in the rounding up of numerous other public enemies.

A quiet, unassuming southerner, Purvis has the appearance of anything but the popular conception of what a relentless, aggressive, fighting, shooting human bloodhound should look like. But the record of his successes in bringing criminals to the bar of justice or to the speedier justice of a siab in the morgue, is ample proof of his efficiency in his chosen line. Educated to the law, Purvis is rapidly winning for himself the title of No. 1 federal operative in the drive against major criminals which the United States department of justice instituted shortly after the Lindbergh kidnaping.

Oklahoma has particular cause to feel grateful to Melvin Purvis. His latest accomplishment eliminates from the crime picture, and the nation's headlines the last of the notorious so-called "Oklahoma Outlaws." Since territorial days, Oklahoma has always managed to have a desperado or more of en a band of them, whose exploits have given the state publicity as wide-

spread as it has been undesirable. When one bandit or one gang has been rounded up, invariably there have been understudies or competitors in the line to take up the work of linking the name of Oklahoma with major crime.

At the moment, we cannot call the name of a single outlaw of any nctoriety, still at large, who might be branded at an Oklahoman. While Melvin Purvis 1: not a resident of this state, we feel he, nevertheless, might well be given the 1934 award as Oklahoma's Most Useful Citizen.—El Reno Dally Tribune.



There is being transmitted herewith a memorandum of Special Agent L. B. Reed at Little Rock, Arkansas, dated October 10th, 1934, which contains a digest of information secured from the TRUE DETECTIVE MYSTERIES magazine, issues of October, 1933, to April, 1934, concerning the life and escapades of CHARLES ARTHUR "PRETTY BOY" FLOYD.

The memorandum in question apparently portrays the life history of Floyd in a condensed, but comprehensive manner. Of course, it is realized that there may be inaccuracies contained therein, because of a desire of the writer of the stories in the Detective Magazine to secure color for his articles. Agent Reed, however, has exercised care to incorporate into his memorandum all names, dates and events in order that they might be available for re-check by Division Agents, should the Division consider same appropriate.

The Division may desire to have various field offices of the Division review the events set forth in the memorandum, unless same have already been covered, for the purpose of securing a proper background of Floyd's life. It has occurred to me that various Peace Officers throughout the United States, who have come in contact with Floyd, as set

6 mills Destroyled 11 aug 20 1964 forth in the memorandum, may have secured information regarding him, which if developed by Division Agents, might possibly lead to his whereabouts.

No doubt the Division and the office of origin on this case are in possession of much more complete information regarding Floyd than the Little Rock Office. Accordingly, this office has not attempted to prepare a summary report in connection with Floyd's activities and his contacts, to be used as a basis for further investigation. It is felt, however, that the enclosed memorandum may be of some value in that connection, when such a report is compiled.

Little Rock, Arkansas, October 10, 1934.

This memorandum is a digest of information contained in True Detective Lysteries magazine, issues of October, 1933, to April, 1934, inclusive, concerning the life and escapades of CHRLES ERTHE ("PRETTY BOY") FLOYD. No attempt is made to verify or substantiate the statements made by the author of the magazine articles. This dijest is submitted for what purpose it may serve in the field offices of the Division. (L. B. Reed, Special Agent.)

Floyd was born on a farm in the State of Georgia. His parents moved to a ferm near _kins, Oklahome, when he was a baby. His father, Walter F. Floyd, was industrious, and the latter's wife had been a church worker for thirty-five years. Pretty Boy has four sisters and two brothers, said to be respectable people. He attended public school at Sallisaw, Oklahoma, where he was known as "Chock".

The oil fields near Sallisaw brought in tough characters. That country had been the home of Delle Storr, Matt Mimes, and George Mimes, notorious outlaws. The Mimes brothers were in the limelight. Fretty Boy married Ruby Hardgraves, a Sallisaw fermer's daughter, when he was eighteen years old. He worked in the Kansas wheat fields for a short time, then in the Sallisaw oil fields, and in September, 1925, he headed for St. Louis, Missouri, and his career of crime.

Pretty Doy pleaded guilty in St. Louis to the Kroger pay roll robbery committed on September 11, 1925. On December 18, 1925, he entered the Missouri State Penitentiary as No. 29078, and was released March 7, 1929. That robbery was a bold daylight holdup, but crude. Floyd and Fred G. Hilderbrand were arrested in Sallisaw with the loot in their possession. Joe Hlavaty of St. Louis had driven the car during this stick-up.

On March 9, 1929, Floyd appeared in Mansas City, Missouri. Detectives learned of his presence and searched his room, where they found revolvers. They detained him and his companion, "Med" Lovett, convicted robber, for a few days. Through Lovett, Floyd met Mrs. ("Nother") ish, Mansas City patron of hoodlums, and her clan. He became enamored of Reulah Baird, a member of the Ash household. Though warned by officers to leave the city, he ramained to frequently see his new sweetheart. Beulah, noting Floyd's resy cheeks, called him "Fretty Boy" and the name stuck. During one

of these visits the police came, looking for murder suspects. The girls helped Floyd and the Ash brothers escape.

In the summer of 1929, Floyd received word his father had died, and he returned to Sallisaw. His father had been killed in a fight with a neighbor, Jim Mills. Floyd went gunning when Mills was acquitted, but Mills had left and never returned. Pretty Boy returned to Kansas City and met James Bradley, much his senior, and an experienced crook and fugitive, wanted for two bank robberies in Buckner, Missouri, of May 4, 1923. They went to Akron, Ohio, and were joined by Jack Atkins, bank robber from Toledo, Ohio, and Marie Maxwell. During the next few months, a series of robberies in central Ohio mystified the police. In March, 1930, Harlan F. Manes, Akron, Ohio, traffic officer, was killed in a running gum fight. Floyd, Bradley, Atkins, and Marie Maxwell were arrested. Bradley was convicted of the murder and electrocuted. Atkins was sentenced to life. The woman was not prosecuted. The authorities could not pin any part of that crime on Floyd. However, he was convicted at Toledo of robbing a bank at Sylvania, Ohio, and sentenced under the name of Charles Mitchell to serve fifteen years. On May 15, 1930, when being taken to prison by a Deputy Sheriff, Floyd dived out a train window and escaped.

Back in Toledo, Pretty Boy joined "Bill-the-Killer" Miller, the baby-faced The two went to Michigen and indulged in several robberies, and left with the police behind them. These included the assault and robbery of Marston Eichtsion, Pinconning, Michigan, and George Seeley, Bay City, Michigan. With their stake, Floyd and Miller went to Kenses City and Pretty Boy immediately went to the Ash home to see Feulah Ezird, where he presented Miller. They took beulah Baird and Rose Ash away with them and established the girls in an apartment. Nother Ash and har sons did not like that. Someone told the police Floyd and Hiller were in town. The officers started checking and the two couples left, showing up in Shawnee, Oklahoma. On March 9, 1931, Floyd and killer held up the bank at Marlsboro, Oklahoma, and escaped with \$5,000.00. I raid in Kansas City followed, and the officers missed them by ten minutes. Enother raid was made for them less then a block from Nother ash's home. Someone had squealed. Her two sons had left the home an hour before. Leter the ash brothers passed their mother's house in their automobile, but did not stop. A mysterious car with two occupants was following. That night, just outside of Kensas City, the ish boys were found dead, brutelly beaten and shot several times. Their car was a burning mass. A local apartment was raided, and it was found that Floyd and Miller had just left. Ers. Ash started working in her own way, and is said to have furnished the police many tips. She received an anonymous note reading, "Quit stooling or we'll give you what the boys got. We're watching end we know what you're doing all the time."

Ployd and Miller, accompanied by Beulah Baird and Rose Ash, went to the home of Charles Flege, Grant County, Kentucky. He and Miller had worked on the same railroad years before, but the farmer did not know his callers were robbers. Riding about the country with Flege, Floyd and Miller spotted the Mount Zion Deposit Bank. A day or so later, they held up the cashier and fled with over \$2,000.00. Floyd and his companion fled to Michigan and rented a cottage at Algonac. On a trip into Toledo, Chio, they saw a man following them. Later, that man was found brutally beaten. The Michigan and Chio officers learned of the cottage at Algonac. They raided it and

found it empty. The robbers were trailed through Hanging Rock and Bowling Green, Ohio. In Thitehouse, Ohio, Floyd and Miller robbed a bank of \$1,600.00 and escaped. A few days later, they appeared again in Bowling Green, with Beulah and Rose, where they were accosted by Chief of Police Calliher and Patrolman Castner. Miller was killed. Beulah was shot through the head. Castner went down, and later died. Floyd and Chief Calliher had emptied their gums at each other. Floyd ran, with Calliher after him. Rose was captured. Floyd escaped in the car he had waiting. Calliher's clothes contained six bullet holes.

On April 18, 1931, Floyd got in a taxi in Toledo and held a pistol against the driver, Robert Robinson. They drove into the country, where Floyd took the chauffeur's cash and car. The automobile was found abandoned near Monroe, Michigan. On April 19, 1931, Cletus Dushane, taxi driver, Monroe, Michigan, was the victim of the same circumstances and the same bandit. Floyd then faded out for a while.

In July, 1931, prohibition agents and police in Kansas City, Missouri, conducted a raid at 1039 Independence avenue for the sole purpose of seizing liquor and bootleggers. They found quantities of whiskey and a regular arsenal. When seven arrests had apparently completed the raid, Alents Curtis C. Burks and Glenn Havens found a man, apparently drunk, in a secret room. They took a .45 automatic from him. He drew another automatic and they again disarmed him, using flashlights in the dark. The stranger leaped for a bed and drew a third automatic from beneath a pillow. Shots rang out and Eurks fell, wounded. As the killer's face appeared in a streak of light, Agent Thompson shouted, "It's Floyd." The bandit ran through the door, knocking the agents down as he ran. Patrolman Clarence Reidy poured shots at Floyd, who returned the fire. Reidy fell, shot through the neck. Floyd ran into the hall, where a number of prohibition agents and police fired at him. He leaped at them, firing as he came. E. C. Anderson, another prohibition agent, stood at the top of the stairs. He and Floyd fired together. Anderson collapsed, shot in the abdomen. Floyd came out of the front door firing, where a crowd mingled. M. P. Wilson, spectator, received one of Fretty Boy's bullets above the heart. The killer landed in the midst of the crowd and disappeared in the darkness. Prohibition agent Burks died in the hospital the following day.

Floyd then had five murders charged against him: the two Ash brothers in Kansas City; Patrolman Castner at Bowling Green, Ohio; Prohibition Agent Curtis C. Burks and M. P. Wilson at Kansas City.

On September 29, 1931, Floyd and a companion (believed to be George Eirdwell) armed with a machine gun and revolvers, robbed the bank at Maud, Oklahoma, and escaped with \$5,200.00. Bank employees identified a photograph of Floyd. The next day, officers whitel for him to visit his brother-in-law in Sallisew, Oklahoma. Pretty Boy drove up in broad daylight. The officers opened fire and could see their bullets beat dust from Fretty Boy's clothes. The killer returned the fire, wheeled his machine around with one hand, and sped away.

Floyd, George Birdwell, and a third man held up the First Mational Bank, Faden, Oklahoma, January 14, 1932, and took \$2,500.00. They forced C. L. Southerland,

cashier, to ride on the running board of the car as they roared out of town. The cashier was released in Boley, Oklahoma, a near-by town. Twenty minutes later, the same trio robbed the Castle State Bank, Castle, Oklahoma, of \$2,000.00 and sped away, forcing bank employees and customers to ride the running boards as hostages.

On January 15, 1932, the governor of Oklahoma called a state-wide meeting of the Sheriffs to consolidate plans for catching Floyd. While the Sheriffs were in session, Pretty Boy staged an act of defiance. He drove into Wewoka, Oklahoma, and stopped at a hotel. He entered and rounded up the employees, including the proprietor, and told them he was Charley Floyd; sat on a table, talked to them, drank a bottle of whiskey, and displayed his bullet-proof vest, then drove away. A picked posse, formed at the governor's request, searched throughout Eastern Oklahoma. While the officers were searching, three men entered the State Bank, Dover, Oklahoma, and rotbed it in true Floyd style. The cashier, A. L. Fash, was ridden out of town as hostage. Thotographs of Floyd were identified.

On January 23, 1932, C. M. Reber appeared at the State Bureau of Identification of Oklahoma and said Floyd would surrender if he would not be returned to Ohio for killing Officer Castner. The governor of Oklahoma refused to bargain. In February, 1932, Beulah Baird and Rose Ash, the killers' girl friends from Kansas City, were acquitted in a second trial for their complicity in the robbery of the Hount Zion Deposit Bank, Elliston, Kentucky, which had been robbed by Floyd and "Bill-the-Killer" Liller. Reports came in that Floyd had left his hiding in the White Horse Mountains. Another bank was robbed at Konawa, Oklahoma.

son, and four other officers at Tulsa, Oklahoma, recognized Floyd and George Birdwell sitting in a sedan on a dark street. The officers drove up on an angle, their lights playing on the sedan. Four officers jumped at the pair with drawn guns. Birdwell opened fire. Floyd, who was in the back seat, ducked and came up shooting a machine gun. Detective Foor from the rear poured six shots against Floyd's back, but the bullet-proof vest stopped them. The machine gun barked and Officer Wilson dropped, seriously wounded. Floyd's bullets smashed all the glass in the police car and wrecked the steering wheel. A patrolman drew a machine gun from the police car and began firing, but Floyd and Birdwell drove away. Their car was found abandoned in Tulsa. Identifying numbers had been filed off. Pullet holes of previous battles had been covered with putty and paint. A re-charge tag on the battery led to a garage and then to a residence address, a bungalow at 513 Young Street, Tulsa. Twenty police officers raided it at dawn, the following morning. They threw gas grenades through the windows. Floyd and Birdwell slipped out the back door, dropped on their stomachs, wiggled down a ditch, then arose and started running. The police gave chase, shooting at the pair, and the fire was returned. While the officers were on the clase, a girl and a small boy walked from the bungalow and disappeared. That efternoon, Floyd's wife, Ruby, and her small son, Jackie, were picked up in the bus station. She denied she was Ruby Floyd and said she was Irs. Hamilton. L detective showed Floyd's picture to the little boy, who exclaimed, "There's daddy." Ruby then admitted her identity, but gave no information. Thile she was being questionel, Floyd and firdwell rode back through town, their tachine gun blazing. Folice cars

chased them. Floyd rode the black Pontiac Coupe over a railroad embankment into darkness and wrecked it. The officers found two machine guns, a rifle, and two automatic pistols in the coupe. Floyd and Birdwell had again escaped. The automobile bore fifty bullet holes.

On Harch 23, 1932, Floyd and Birdwell robbed the bank at Meeker, Oklahoma. The doors to the money cages were locked. Floyd scooped up \$500.00 in loose currency, and while climbing over a partition, he accidentally touched a burglar alarm. A posse quickly formed outside. The bandits marched four bank employees out in front of them and made them ride on the running boards of the car as they sped away.

Ruby Floyd was released by police in Tulsa and was kept under surveillance for a while.

Birdwell's father died in Eurlsboro, and the police there expected him to return out of fondness for his father. Floyd and Birdwell drove into Eurlsboro, parked their car in front of the undertaker's, and entered. The undertaker's assistant said that Birdwell gave his right name, whom he recognized, and Floyd was also recognized. Until pirdwell viewed his father's body in an adjoining room, Floyd stood watch with a machine gum in the front room. The undertaker appeared at the front door, recognized Floyd standing inside, and fled. As a crowd began to gather, front door, recognized Floyd standing inside, and fled. The crowd fell back. Floyd emerged, waving his anothine gum, and Biriwell followed. The crowd fell back. The robbers entered their car end left. Not a shot was fired.

The town marshal of Earlsboro was driving his car near town on April 1, 1952, when two men ahead of him stopped their sedan, halted the marshal, and forced him to ride with them out in the country. They beat and kicked him cruelly. One of the men said he didn't like "private detectives". The victim whispered that he was the town marshal. The men apologized, took the officer back into town, identified the town marshal. The men apologized, and pressed a roll of bills into his hand, "to pay the doctor".

Ruby Floyd left Tulsa one night after buying an automobile and some new clothes and drove to the home of her father, hen Hardgraves, in the lower section of the county, near Bixby, Oklahoma. Tulsa officers put out leads and received a tip that Floyd would visit his wife and boy there. They armed themselves with machine guns and automatic rifles and took up their watch April 8, 1932. Early the following morning, a car drove in. Sheriff Erv Kelly stepped from behind a chicken house, machine gun in hand, and ordered the car occupants to get out. Shots blazed from the car and Kelly fell, his heart burst, his abdomen and legs riddled. Floyd and Birdwell made a clean get-away. Kelly's body was returned to his widow, two daughters, and three sons.

I little later on, Floyd and Birdwell held up and robbed the First State Bank at Stonewall, Oklahoma, but obtained only \$600.00. The same procedure was followed, two employees being forced shead as shields and made to ride on the side of the car as the robbers drove away in a large green sedan.

prout 4:00 A. H., June 7, 1932, Floyd and Birdwell appeared, in a green selan, at the farm of A. H. Bohols, twelve miles southeast of ide, Chishoms. In home

or so later, officers began to arrive, and stationed themselves at strategic points. A tip had been received. Two of the officers attempted to place their car in a road, not far from Echola' barn, to block an avenue of escape, but got stuck in the mud. Floyd and Firdwell opened fire from the barn, and then ran for the car. The green seinn was riddled when the bandits attempted to flee in it, and they ran back into the barn, which was surrounded. They re-entered the sedan under withering fire, and drove away on two flat tires. They escaped the blockade apparently unscathed.

Three days later, Floyd stopped E. W. Wood, superintendent of the Booker T. Washington school at Tulsa, Oblahoma, on a road near Warner, Oklahoma. The bandit took Wood's cer, transferred his weapons from the green sedan, made Wood ride with him a few miles, and let him out. Wood walked back to his wife and children. He identified the photograph of Floyd, and the green sedan proved to be the same one that had been at Echols' barn.

On June 29, 1932, Mother ash died at her home at Kansas City, Missouri. Officers had counted on further underworld tips from her, as she believed Floyd had killed her sons, William and Wallace.

H. W. Mave, former policeman, driving from Cklahoma City, Oklahoma, to his home at Blackwell, Oklahoma, on August 3, 1932, was stopped in the road. Pretty Boy and a companion got in the car with him and drove off. In a ravine in thick woods, they made Mave strip so he could not make an early report. The killers left him and took his car. Mave, dressed like adam, appeared on the highway, gesticulating wildly. Instead of picking him up, motorists stepped on the gas. Officers combed the vicinity fruitlessly.

Ployd, Birdwell, and a third man struck at Sallisaw, Oklahoma (Pretty Boy's home town), November 1, 1932. There were a dozen people in the bank. Floyd waved a machine gun while Birdwell scooped up \$2,530.00. Bob Riggs, cashier, was ridden out of town as a shield and released. No shots were fired. Spectators were positive in their identification of Aussie Elliott, twenty-one year old bank robber, as the third man. Aussie had been a professional baseball player in Oklahoma. On August 14, 1932, he escaped from the Oklahoma State Penitentiary.

On November 7, 1932, Ruby Floyd was stricken with appendicitis, and her father rushed her to a hospital at Tulsa, Oklahoma. On the same day, Pretty Boy, Pirdwell, and a third man robbed the American State Bank, Henryetta, Oklahoma. Floyd handed A. D. Diamond, tookkeeper, a sack, who complied with orders and packed \$11,252.00 in it. Two employees were forced to stand on the running board of the bandit car as it raced out of town.

The Tulsa police learned on Hovember 21, 1932, that Ruby Floyd was in the hospital, and that she would be discharged on Movember 23. They set a watch.

On the afternoon of November 23, 1932, a brown sedan drew up before the Farmers and Nechanics Bank in Boley, Oklahoma, very near Tulsa. A negro was at the wheel. He entered the bank and asked to have a check cashed, but was refused. The negro returned to the car and talked to two white men, who then entered the bank.

H. C. McCormick, bookkeeper, slipped into the wault. D. J. Turner, president of the bank, and town civic leader, publied the burglar alarm. Eirdwell killed Turner instantly. McCormick energed from the wault with a rifle in his hands. He took deliberate aim and shot Eirdwell through the head. Pretty Boy's chief lieutenant was dead. The vigilance committee arrived and started shooting through the window at the other bandit, who made the cashier, W. W. Riley, drag Turner's body, and advance as a shield. The negro, Charles Glass, in the sedan, tried to escape, but bullets riddled him. The strange bandit was shot many times and killed. He was not Floyd, but was identified as C. C. Patterson of Kiowa, Oklahoma. Prices on bank robbers in Oklahoma went up, and there was a total of \$6,000.00 reward over Pretty Boy's head.

On November 30, 1932, the Citizens State Bank at Tupelo, Mississippi, was robbed of \$50,000.00. Floyd was partially identified as being one of the bandits. On January 5, 1953, the First Mational Bank, Cleveland, Texas, was robbed of \$1,200.00. by three men. The Floyd technique was used, and some of the officers reported that Pretty Boy was the leader. On January 11, 1933, three men robbed the bank at Ash Grove, Missouri, and escaped with \$3,000.00. J. H. Perryman, cashier, is said to heve identified Floyd's picture as one of the robbers. On June 2, 1933, three Deputy Sheriffs in Newoka, Oklahoma, went to an automobile accident and found three men standing by the car. They asked the men to identify themselves. One of the men whipped out a machine gun from the car and told the Deputies to get out. They recognized him as Floyd, and they quickly departed. The officers returned with reenforcements and found two women; one was Ruby Floyd and the other was Marie, wife of Eleckie Smaller of Seminole, Oklahoma. Floyd and his companion had fled. Ruby said that the officers were not smart enough to catch Pretty Boy, so they errested his wold ladyw. Floyd's eight year old son, Jackie, was found in the Smalley home, which Fretty Boy had just left. Ruby and Marie were released on bond in connection with the abandoned car, which proved to have been stolen.

on June 14, 1933, near Mexico, Missouri, Sheriff Roger Wilson and Sergeant Ben Booth were patrolling the road for men who had just robbed the Farmers and Merchants Eank. They stopped a car to question the occupants. Wilson and Booth were shot and killed. The killers were not identified, but the next day Floyd appeared in Bolivar, Missouri. Sheriff Jack Killingsworth of Bolivar walked into a garage, where Joe Richetti, mechanic, was working on a car. By the car stood Adam Richetti, robber and candit, and Fretty Boy Floyd. The Sheriff, mechanic, and bystanders were lined up at the point of guns. Floyd abandoned his crippled car, commandeered one from the garage, transferred his guns and ammunition, and made the Sheriff ride out of town with him. Local officers then decided that Floyd and his companion had killed Sheriff Wilson and Sergeant Booth near Mexico, Missouri. Sheriff Killingsworth was taken for a wild ride. Floyd stopped Walter F. Griffith, a real estate salesman, near Clinton, Missouri, and commandeered his car, transferred his guns and ammunition, and drove on, Griffith and Killingsworth with him. In a hidden ravine miles away, where Floyd stopped to rest, Killingsworth and Floyd talked. Pretty Boy Floyd denied any part in the Mexico, Missouri, bank robbery, and denied killing or participating in the shooting of Sheriff Wilson or Sergeent Booth. Killingsworth and Griffith were released lete that night.

Floyd's name next flared before the public following the Karsas City Union Station massacre, June 17, 1983. The public has asked whether Floyd was one of the

millers, but Government officials have not published their reply to the question.

True Detective listeries magazine relates that on July 31, 1933, a report from Los Angeles, California, said that Floyd was behind a plot to kidnap a movie actress; that on August 1, he was reported in Neola, Iowa; that on August 5, stocks and bonds worth \$150,000.00 were recovered in Los Angeles and said to be part of the lost obtained by Floyd in Oklahoma bank robberies; that on August 14, 1933, officers saw Floyd in a restaurant in Coalgate, Oklahoma; on August 17, 1933, officers raided a cabin near Warsaw, Missouri, looking for Floyd and Vernon C. Miller. On August 20, Adam Richetti was reported in Missouri, and on August 28, a bank at Galena, Missouri, was robbed of \$1,600.00. Witnesses said Floyd and Richetti were the robbers.

Ruby Floyd was in an automobile wreck on October 17, 1933, near Charleston, Arkansas, and she was taken to a Fort Smith, Erkansas, hospital. She was questioned, but could not talk, due to a fractured jaw. She penciled a defiant reply.
