SYNOPSIS OF FACTS:

Chevrolet seen in Los Angeles, Calif. sold to Milton Garrison, Novinger, Mo., who is now attending school. Bailey and four other men seen in Gery, Ind. 6-27-35 in Ford V8 Coach by residents of Green City, Missouri. John Bovard unknown St. Louis, Mo.

### DETAILS:

On July 7, 1933 the undersigned, eccompanied by Capt. Lewis Means, State Highway Patrol, proceeded to Novinger, Mo. and interviewed Mr. Jesse M. Truitt, one of the partners of Truitt Bros., automobile (Chevrolet) dealers, that city. It is pointed out that Novinger is located in Adeir County, Mo., about 6 miles from the Sullivan County line. Mr. Truitt permitted Capt. Means and the undersigned to examine his sales book which reflects that on Jan. 30, 1931 Truitt Bros. received at their garage from the St. Louis Assembly Plant of the Chevrolet Motor Co., Chevrolet Coach, 1931 model, motor #2,293,951, certain #3-AE-22710; that this car was shipped from St. Louis on January 28, 1951. The record further reflects that on February 14, 1931 Truitt Bros. sold the above ter Milton Garrison of Middletown, Mo. Mr. Truitt advised that Garrison is a school teacher; that he is not a native of Novinger and that to his knowledge neither Garrison nor the car are at Novinger or vicinity at the present time. He stated that Garrison taught school at Novinger in 1925 or 1926; that he is about 56 years of age and has a sister, Dr. Udebell Garrison, who resides at Kirksville, Mo. that Gerrison marries a girl, name unknown, from Green City, Mo., which is about fifteen miles from Novinear; that at the time Garrison bought the above car form

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him he, Garrison, had no connections in Novinger; that Garrison doubtless gave him the above business out of friendship. Mr. Truitt stated that he had no idea as to Garrison's present whereabouts; further, that Garrison bore an excellent reputation while in Novinger and was well thought of.

After the above statement, Mr. Truitt was shown photographs of subjects Bailey, Brady, Underhill, Clark, Davis and Floyd and stated that at no time has he ever done business with the above men; further, that he he is not acquainted with any of the above men except subject Bailey whom he knows by reputation only and that he cannot remember ever heving seen this man.

It is pointed out that before contecting Mr. Truitt, Capt. Means and the undersigned ascertained from Trooper C. Mcris Parker, Highway Patrol, stationed at Kirksville, Mo., that Mr. Truitt bears a good reputation for truth and honesty; further, that he, Parker, was satisfied that Truitt is not friendly to the criminal element which infert Sullivan County and the vicinity around Novinger.

Following the above interview with Mr. Truitt, the undersigned and Capt. Means left Novinger for Linneus, Mo. In order to get to Linneus from Novinger it is necessary to drive across Sullivan County, which is located in the territory covered by the Kensas City Bureau Office. While enroute to Linneus a stop was made at Green City, Mo. where Capt. Means and the undersigned contacted

He further stated that Garrison also told him on the above occasion that he was located over near Kansas City, Mo., however, he was unable to recall the name of the town. He stated that a day or so ago Mr. J. R. Chapman, Manager of the local telephone company, told him that age about 24, had recently made a trip via auto from Green City, Mo. to Detroit, Mich., and return with Green City; that upon her return to Green City from the above trip reported to him, Chapman, that while enroute to Detroit one day and she were riding was passed on three different occasions by a Che let Coach or Seden bearing Illinois last week, the car in which plates on the outskir's and in the 'sy of Gary, Indiana; that the car contained five men; that one of the gen was identified by her husband as being Harvey Bailey; that the men looked the party over sarefully and finally after passing them the third time, pulled away saw no more of them. anë '

Upon receipt of the above information, Capt. Means and Agent home. Mr. Chapman stated interviewed Mr. Chapman at that he knows Harvey Bailey; that Bailey is the son of Mrs. Amanda Bailey, who lives about five miles northwest of Green City; further, that Harvey Bailey's brother, BotyBailey, who had not been in the vicinity of Green City for several years, dropped into that town shortly after the Leavenworth, Kansas break in 1931; further, that the picture which he saw in the Kansas City papers of Frank Nash following the Plaza Massacre an June 17th last, was identical with the man known to him as Bot Bailey. He stated that Bot Beiley was bald and wore a wig as did Frank Nash. Chapman then related the story told to him by having recently seen Harvey Bailey.

Following the shows interview Capt. Means and the undersigned at the telephone exchange at Green City, Mo. stated that on the night of Monday, June 26, 1935, she left interviewed of that city for Detroit, Green City in an automobile owned by and his wife and Mich.; that besides herself, and wife, made up the party; that some time during the early

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afternoon of Tuesday, June 27, 1933, while thus enroute to Detroit and while on the outskirts of Gary, Indians, five men drove up alongside of car and carefully looked the party over but said nothing; that the five men were in a car which she took to be a Chevrolet Coach or Sedan, however, she is not positive as to the make thereof. She stated that three men were in the rear seat and two men were riding in the front seat; that a men whom later said was Harvey Bailey was riding in the front seat at the right of the driver; that she never saw Bailey before and did not recognize him.

At this point in the interview Capt. Means exhibited to photographs of subjects Bailey, Brady, Underhill, Clark, Davis and Floyd as appear on I. O. #1189-94, inclusive. In exhibiting these photographs to the Captain arranged them so as to hide the name of each subject and have the picture only appear. After looking at the above photographs, as atted she was "reasonably certain" that the man whose photograph appears on I. O. #1189 is the man whom she saw on the front seat of the above ear. Could not identify the other four occupants of the car as any of the other subjects. She remembers Bailey because of identification of him.

stated that the above incident took only a few seconds; that the car in which the five men were riding slowly pulled around car and went on its way; that a few minutes later the car in which Bailey was riding again pulled up alongside car: that the men continued to stare at \_\_\_\_\_party, but not a word was said; this incident occurred in the city limits of Gary, Ind. and was a few minutes after the <u>first incident;</u> that the Bailey car again pulled away and went ahead car to a stop light located on one of the streets of Gary; car followed and coested up alongside the car in which the five men were riding and them stopped for the light; that exclaimed while his car was stopped alongside the Bailey car, "From Green Eity"; that the man identified by her as Bailey morely modded and said mothing; that as soon as the stop light gave the "Go" signal Bailey exeleimed "Lets go", whereupon the driver pulled out and stated she saw no more of the Bailey car.

stated at no time during the above incidents did the men in Beiley's car say anything to her party; that at no time did she see any arms or ammunition; further, that the men appeared well dressed and erderly.

stated that she was able to get a side view only of the men in the car; that the side view of Bailey on the L. O. strongly resembled

She further stated that the car in which the five men were riding had Illinois license plates but that she did not take their mumber.

At this point Agent desires to state that while interviewing Mr. J. R. Chapman as to Milton Garrison, Chapman stated he is acquainted with him; that Garrison's wife's maiden name was Lelia Posey of Green City; that she, Garrison and Mrs. Garrison's aunt, Mrs. Schuster, recently went to California; that Lelia Garrison's mother is a sister of Mrs. Schuster and is also a sister of John Dady's wife; that John Cedy's son married a sister-in-law of Harvey Bailey.

upon being interviewed by the undersigned and Capt. Means at her home at Green City stated that about noon on Tuesday, June 27th last, while her husband, her naphew, and herself were enroute to Detroit, via auto, they came upon the outskirts of Gary, Ind.; that while on the outskirts and just a few minutes before entering the city a Ford coach bearing Illinois license plates and containing five men drove up alongside her car on the highway; that three men sat on the rear seat and two men occupied the front seat; that the men looked over the occupants of car and drove on; that after the car had passed her car she exclaimed to her husband "Did you see that guy in the front seat?"; that her husband said that he had noted the men referred to and that she and her husband agreed that the man was Harvey Bailey; that the man was riding on the front seat next to the driver; that she had not seen Harvey Bailey for at least fifteen years prior to the above incident but that she recognized him because she years ago used to go to Beiley's mother's house near Green City and visite and that she would often see Harvey there.

An examination of the St. Louis, Mo. city and telephone directories failed to reflect a listing of anyone by the name of John Bovard and further the records of the St. Louis Metropolitan Police Dept., both identification and record rooms, failed to reflect a record of a John Bovard or other similar name located on Olive St. in St. Louis.

The St. Louis city and telephone directories do reflect the name of one O. K. Bovard, managing editor of the St. Louis Post-Mispatch newspaper, 12th & Dlive St. Louis, and upon investigation at said newspaper office it was ascertained that Mr. Bovard was out of the city and would not return until Monday, July 20, 1935.

Open communicating with Mrs. D. K. Reference is made to report of Special Agent W.T. Treiner, dated 7-3-33, at Kansas City, Missouri, particularly to page 30 of said report, on which is set out sertain investigation to be conducted by the St. Paul Bureau Office.

This letter is for the purpose of informing the Kansas City, and other offices, the results of inquiries made by the St.Paul Office, to date. When investigation has been completed to the extent that a report can be submitted covering all known angles, the mescasary investigative report will be submitted. This letter is intended only to summarize the results of investigation to date.

3. 3. 4. Y. ...

With reference to the telephone, Emerson 2426, which telephone is in the mame of James Phiclaren, 204 Vernon Avenue, please be advised that the records of the local telephone company disclose that no long distance telephone calls were made from that phone during the time same was occupied by the individuals in question. In that connection, a search of the house resulted in finding a slip of paper, on which was written the telephone number, Emerson 2121. This telephone is at the Hollyhocks Boadhouse, a motorious gambling joint, operated by JACK PFIIFFER, who is runored to be a "Lieutenant" of LECKHAN, localer of the St. Faul underworld.

With reference to Emerson El21, an effort is being made to tap the telephone, as a review of the EEATING-HOLDEN-NASH files disclose that HAILEY, and other hoodlums of that gang, invariably called that telephone number when in St.Paul, and numerous long distance calls were made from that number in the past. A record of the toll calls from Emerson El21 will be obtained and an attempt made to tap the line, this being believed the best source of information of that type in St.Paul.

The fact that FRAME MASH was at 304 Vernon Avenue was originally established by the finding of fingerprints on an Engesser beer bottle, found on the premises, after some had been deserted. Investigation performed by this office, has established MASH'S presence there independent of the above information. His alleged wife was, also, at that address with her young daughter, according to identification made by a neighbor. Inquiry as to the place where the Engesser heer was purchased has proven practically fatile. The two shops, at which beer could have been purchased in the neighborhood, have been contacted and/one of the employees have any recollection of the beer having been purchased. In that connection, only six bottles of the largesser beer are known to have been at the Vernon Avenue Address, and it is entirely possible that some may have been brought there by a Visitor and purchased at some distant point.

The McLaren family, landlerds, of 204 Vernon Avenue, have been interviewed. Mr.J.p.McLaren is positive, as is his son, James, that photograph of MARYAPHILLIPS, with aliases, Kansas City, Missouri Police Department Register #80599 is a very good resemblance of the woman at that address. Others, to whom the photograph has been exhibited, are equally positive that MARY PHILLIPS was not the person. All of the photographs, relating to this matter, more displayed to the Melaren family, but they were unable to make efy further identification. A neighbor is of the epinion that the photograph of MARY PHILLIPS bears a close resemblance to the woman at the address, arrespt that her hair was blond, with a slight reddish tings. They state the profile view of MARY PHILLIPS is the best likeness. This particular neighbor also stated that the photograph of ALVIN KARPIS, Tala, Oklahoma Police Department Register #8008, bears a slose resemblance to one of the men at the house. This meighbor, also, stated that the photograph of FRANK MASH, in some way, resembled the person who was there for a day or two with a woman, whom she describes as MASH'S wife. Other persons interviewed picked the photograph of ALVIN KARPISEs bearing a strong rescablance to one of the son at the Vermon Avenue address, but will not make a positive identification. In that connection, the efficials of the Farmington, Minnesote, bank, which was robbed an May 16,1955, state that the photograph of ALVIH KAHPIS closely meambles one of the bendits and also state that the mobber more a glove on his left hand. In that connection, attention is invited to the fact that KAN'IS has a sear elow the knuckle of the left index finger. They, also, identify HILLIAH NEAYER and describe, in some measure, FRANK NASH as being the third individual in the robbery, although the description is vague and uncertain.

MR.MKWMAN, Attorney at Law, who was interviewed three times by J.STANLEY SMITH, the assumed mane of the occupant of 204 Vermon Avenue, also selected KAMPIS' picture, but makes the same type of identifications that is, he is not positive.

The St.Paul Office has covered the telephone number at Brainers Minnewsta, SOFLE, which is the telephone number of the father of VEHME MILLER'S momen, VIVIANAMATHIS. At the present time, it appears that this may prove to be a very valuable source of information.

Agent Hell is arranging, among confidential informants and other reliable sources in St.Paul, Minneapolis, and vicinity, to have this office notified in the event any of the wanted non appear in this territory. 



There were two of them in that appalling event cost the lives of four officers and a government vict the morning of June 17.

A Brother of Solly Weissman the Driver.

The machine gunner was Verne C. Miller, a former iff of North Dakota, later a Chicago gunman, ted in several cities for other crimes.

His partner was William Weissman, brother of y Weissman, notorious Kansas City gangstered here a few years ago.

A Nationwide Search for Them.

The two men are the objects of a nation-wide ch by the Kansas City police department and the ted States bureau of investigation.

Pictures and complete descriptions of the men e been circularized over the nation. Their capture expected at an early date.

Miller Wounded by Grooms.

Miller has a flesh wound in his left arm, inflicted W. J. Grooms when Grooms fired his revolver just ore Miller opened fire with the machine gun.

Miller lived here at 6612 Edgevale road from il 10 to June 19, two days following the killing. and Weissman left Kansas City that night.

Verne Miller the Murderer.

Miller fired the murderous burst from the machine gun h killed W. J. Grooms and Frank Hermanson, city deves; William J. Caffrey, bureau of investigation agent; Reed, chief of police at McAlester, Ok., and Frank Nash, convict. The killing of Nash was accidental.

Weissman was armed with two .45 caliber automatic pistols. s not known whether he did any shooting when Miller and fire.

Trapped by Telephone Calls. 4

The police here and the bureau of investigation found the of the two killers when they checked telephone calls from Springs and Joplin to Kansas City the day before the mg. Men were sent to Hot Springs and to St. Louis for Purpose. Records of calls are filed in the St. Louis office to Southwestern Bell Telephone Company.

# A POLICE STATEMENT TELLS HOW THE TRAIL OF THE PLAZA KILLERS WAS FOLLOWED.

Immediately after the massacre at the union station on June 17, the United States bureau of investigation and the police department began an intensive investigation. A check was made of all long distance telephone calls out of Hot Springs, Ark., where Frank Nash was apprehended, to Hansas City, and calls were also checked out of Hot Springs, Ark., to all cities and towns north of Hot Springs.

In view of the fact that officers knew that Joplin had been the headquarters for some of the members of Nash's gang, calls were also checked from Hot Springs to Joplin, and from Joplin to Kansas City. It was found that a call had been made from Hot Springs, Ark., by a Mrs. E. B. Connor to one Herb Farmer at Joplin, Mo., at 4:42 p. in. June 16. A check of the calls made from Farmer's residence in Joplin revealed the fact that he had made a call at 10:09 p. m. on the same date to Kansas City, calling Jackson 7073. Investigation revealed that this telephone was located in a residence owned by N. E. McFarland at 6612 Edgevale road. On further investigation it was found that this residence had been rented by Mr. McFarland on April 10 to one V. C. Moore,

A thorough check of V. C. Moore revealed the fact that he was, in reality, one Verne C. Miller, who was a close friend of Frank Nash. Late Friday evening, June 16, one William Weissman, alias Bill Weiss, called on Miller at 6612 Edgevale road, and Miller, after being apprised of Nash's arrest at Hot Springs, and that he was to be returned to Leavenworth, enlisted Weissman's aid in rescuing Nash. Another telephone call was made from the union station at 12:05 a. m. on June 17, ostensibly by Miller. This call was to Herb Farmer of Joplin, Mo., evidently confirming the fact that Nash was really on the way to Kansas City, and while at the station it is possible that Miller determined the arrival time of the train from Fort Smith, Ark.

The following morning at about 6 a, m. Miller and Weissman drove to the station and parked Miller's Chevrolet sedan in the south parking lot opposite the east door of the station, and when the government officers went across the street with Nash, and they saw them all in a group and without firearms in readiness to shoot, Miller and Weissman decided to take Nash at the station. Miller was armed with a machine gun and Weissman carried two 45 automatic pistols. Miller covered the group and stated they wanted Nash. Detective Grooms pulled his gun and started shooting, the first shot striking Miller in the left arm, causing a slight flesh wound. Then Miller opened up with the machine gun, with the results as are already known. Nash was shot accidentally in the burst of fire.

After the shooting both drove west to Broadway and south to 6612 Edgevale road. They left the city the following Monday, June 19.

The Signal for the Half of Shols.

"All right, let 'em have it." Miller shouted to Weissman.

At the same instant Miller opened fire with the machine gun.

What happened then shocked the nation into a realisation of the desperate situation as to gangsters and gunmen.

The four officers were killed and Nash with them. It was not the intention of Miller to kill Nash. Of that the police and the federal agents are certain. But when they realized that he killed and that their chance of rescuing him was gone, they took to flight.

In Hiding Here 21/2 Days.

They went to the Edgevale road house as soon as they determined that they were not followed. There Weissman helped Miller dress his flesh wound in the arm. They remained there under cover until Monday night. They left Kansas City that night, and a few days later the police and the agents were on their trail.

I desire to advise you that an last Saturday afternoon, July 8, 1933, Herbert A. Farmer, alias Harry J. Garner and other aliases, whose apprehension we have been endeavoring to bring about as one of the parties believed to have been commented with the gang which massacred the law enforcement officials in the Union Station, Hansas City, Missouri on June 17, 1933, was taken into custody at Joplin, Missouri. As you knew, an intensive hunt has been in progress since the date of this massacre for the apprehension of mine persons believed to have been connected with or to have knowledge of the same.

Farmer's bone was in Foplin, Missouri, and as indicated subsequently in this memorandum, he disappeared therefrom simultaneously with the massacre at Emmas City, Missouri. 

Miller was wanted as one of the gang that had quite recently murdered several officers at the Union Station, Eansas C ity, Missouri that the uncommon name, Verne C. Miller, aroused his, Brandberg's springity as he remembered having business relation with a person of that name in Louisville last March; that on his return to Louisville, Mr. Brandberg noticed an Associated Press photograph of one Werne C. Miller in the Louisville, Ky. Times July 7, 1953 together with a brief account to the effect that Miller was a fugitive and his apprehension was desired by the Kansas City, Mo. Police Department. According to Lieutenant Parsons, Mr. Brandberg seemed certain that the Verne C. Miller that he had transacted business with in Louisville, Ky. last spring is the same Verne C. Miller whose photograph appeared in the Louisville Times on July 7, 1933. Lt. Parsons suggested that an investigation be conducted and promised the full and complete ecoperation of the Louisville Police in an effort to locate and apprehend Miller or any other member of the Kansas City gang with whom he was associated.

Agent interviewed Mr.M. T. Brandberg, Auto Finance Co., 220 West Broadway, Louisville, at which time he made statements to the following effect:

His home originally is located in Kansas City, Missouri. For several years he has been in business financing automobiles. Of late years his place of business has been located in Louisville, Kentucky. On March 20, 1933 one Verns C. Miller, giving his address as Room 414 Kentucky Hotel, Louisville, sought and obtained a loan of \$100,00 on his Anbura Cabriolet, Motor \$34285, Serial \$5988. He made periodic payments on the loan until May 15, 1935 on which date the loan was paid in full. Willer gave his former address as the J-B Apartments, \$2450 Glemmary Street, Louisville. He claimed to be a salesman in the employ of the Henney Motor Co., Freeport, Illinois. The records also show that Miller was formerly employed by the Sayars-Scovill Co., Cincinnati, Ohio. He claimed to be 42 years of age, born in Bloomington, Ill. Prior to coming to Louisville, Miller certified that he had resided in Peorie, Ill. He gave the name of Dr. E. L. Miller, 454 East 52nd Street, Brooklyn, B.Y. as his brother and named Mrs. Barry Serley, \$1237 SouthWestern Blvd., Chicago, Ill., as his sister, Miller named Mosers. His mother died in Mashville, Tenn., last January and was interred at Chicago, Ill, Mrs. Dora Elller resided with her daughter, Mrs. Harry Serley, \$1237 South Western Blvd. Chicago just prior to death. His brother, Dr. Ernest Lloyd Miller, resides at 304 Bast 52nd street, Brooklyn, B. Y. His wife's parants reside at Santa Fe , Tenn. Milleris father-in-law is one A. L. Welker, Santa Fe. Miller claims that he has been in the employ of the Henney Motor Company, Fresport, Ill., since 1930. He came to Louisville, Ky. in January, 1930 from Peoria, Ill. Prior to his connections with the Henney Motor Company, Miller claims to have been in the employ of the Sayers and Scovill Co., Cincinnati, Ohio for 17 years. He contends that his present business is confined chiefly to selling specially manufactured bodies for Ambulance and Juneral purposes, For that reason, he has made close business connections with the Mational Casket Company and the Emited Casket Company, both of Louisville, Kentucky. Consequently, whenever called on to give references, Miller stated that he usually names Mesers. Frank Johnson and Earry Miller, Managers of the two above named casket companies. Miller admitted that he has frequently signed. his name as Werns C. Miller; that he is more frequently called Verns by close friends and associates; that quite recently he has been jocularly accused of being the Verne C. Miller named in connection with the murders which were committed by gangsters in Kaneas City, Mo., lastJune.

puring the close examination of Miller at Police Headquarters, Louisville, Miller expressed himself in a garrulous and friendly
manner. He was quickly recognized by Detective Jones as a man seen
frequently at the Kentucky Hotel. In some respects Miller's description
tallies with that of subject Miller. However, the facial resemblance is not
strong. It was the possensus of spinion among the several police detectives
and officers present that Vernon G. Miller is not the Verna G. Miller wanted
in connection with the Kansas City case. Furthermore, a careful examination
of Miller's fingerprints disclosed that the classification of same does not
correspond with those of subject Verne G. Miller, as recently obtained from
the authorities in South Dakota. Accordingly, Miller was released from
custody. As evidence of good faith, the same Miller voluntarily called at
Police Headquarters, Louisville, on July 10, 1955 for any further examination
that the Police sared to make.

Reference is made to your letter of June 26, 1935, transmitting a bill from the Chaney's Funeral Home, McAlester, Oklahoma, covering the funeral expenses of Chief of Police Otto Reed, of that place, who was killed at Kensas City da the morning of June 17, 1933.

In response to its request that the Department consider this bill with a view to its payment by the Government, the Bureau has been advised by the General Agent and Chief Clerk of the Department that that "effice knows of no Federal funds which could be used for this purpose. It is thought that the only possibility for relief would be by a special Act of Congress."

In view of this information, and in view of the fact that a request for Congressional relief could not be made until Congress convenes in January 1934, it is suggested that this bill be paid by the proper parties, and that a certified copy of the paid bill be furnished to the Bureau. The Bureau will then endeavor to procure Congressional relief, using the copy of the paid bill as a basis for its request.

The Bureau is returning herewith, the original and duplicate of this bill, and the third copy is being retained for its files.



Referring to your letter of July 5th, 1935 enclosing copy of letter from the Chicago Office date July 5, 1935. I wrote to you on the 6th covering interview Deputy Sheriff Harold Gesell and what the court records show. After writing the above I made still further investigation and learned the following:

From a confidential informant I learned that following the arrest of Wincil Urban, William Engler, Ed Wilhite, and John Lugar, the \$12,000. each bond for Urban was put up by one John Huber, a Court Bailiff, and a party named Miller, a Justice of the Peace from St. Louis, Mo. This bond was supposed to be good for one year.

Inquiry of Mr. I. L. Wright, Central National Bank, Des Moines, Ia. revealed that this \$12,000 had been placed in trust to secure Tony Scalise, bondsman, should Wincil Urban fail to appear. On June 27, 1933, Urban surrendered himself, and the bond forfeited and the money returned to the alleged owner. Mr. Wright informed me that while the transaction was in the name of John Huber, a party with him by the name of Miller, did all the talking, and seemed to be more or less familiar with legal procedure. These are the two persons who had originally placed the \$12,000 in trust. I learned further that two trust vouchers were made out to Huber, one for \$12,000 covering the principal, and the other for \$400 covering interest. Huber converted the \$12,000 into cashiers checks and cash. He secured the following checks:

Check #54885 in the sum of \$5,000, payable John Huber dated 6/30/33

The above totals \$11,800; the remaining \$200 was taken in cash. To date none of these checks have been cashed.

These subjects were represented by Charles Bowers and Louis Ansher, attorneys. I interviewed Ansher, who has offices in the S and L Bldg., and without giving him any information other than I wanted to know what was going on in my territory and also wanted to make his acquaintance, I had a talk with him about subjects. For your information, Ansher some years ago was connected with the local court house and was arrested for embezzelment, and I believe served a short sentence or was fined, as near as I could find out. Ansher admitted that these men were no "angels", and that their particular line was safe blowing; that Wm. Engler was the leader; that the bond for Urban was put up by two prominent men from St. Louis, Mo. whose names he did not like to disclose. The understanding was that it would not be for

more than a year, as it was expected that the appeal would be heard by that time, however, it will not be heard until September, and Ansher believes the decision of the lower court will be affirmed. He gave as the reason for Urban surrendering himself was because these St. Louis men were in need of their money, and it was understood the money would not be needed for more than a year. Ansher further stated that he was in St. Louis about two months ago endeavoring to collect further on his attorney fees; that he contacted John Joynt, their attorney, and he saw the men, and they stated that they were broke and were unable to pay him a thing.

From another source it was learned that John Lugar can be located through his brother, believed to be Charles Lugar, whose office is at 605 Bank of Commerce Bldg., St. Louis, Mo. and whose home is at 5647 Bowen St., St. Louis. Another party through whom Lugar can be located is Joe St. John, 7151 Kanchester Ave. St. Louis, telephone Hiland 0347. All these men make their home in St. Louis and should be well known to the police.

Upon receipt of your letter of the 5th inst. enclosing letter from Deputy Sheriff Harold Gesell, Des Moines, I contacted Gesell and also examined the records at the court house as to case #25815 involving William Engler, Edward Wilhite, Wincil Urban, and John Lugar, and found that they were indicted 12/22/31 for possession of burglary tools, and were convicted and sentenced on 5/26/32 to an indefinite term in the Iowa State Penitentiary, Ft. Madison, Ia. to a term of years of not to exceed 15 years. On the same date all the subjects made appeal bonds in the following manner. Urban released on \$12,000 property bond signed by Tony Scalise, but the gang placed on deposit \$12,000 in the Central National Bank, Des Moines, which was cash. Engler was released on \$9000 eash and \$3000 property bond; Lugar released on \$12,000 property bond signed by Tony Scalise and Dewey Berlovich and the same for Wilhite, however, on 5/9/32, Wilhite's property bond was changed and the gang deposited with the Clerk of the Court \$13,000 in Liberty bonds. On June 27, 1933, Urban surrendered himself and on the following day was taken to Ft. Madison, Ia. It was generally understood that he only intended remaining there a few weeks when they would have him out again.

The St. Louis, Mo. Police advises the local Sheriff that on 6/13/33 a fugitive warrant was issued for Wincil Urban, as a fugitive on a burglary (bank job) charge at Summit, Ill. Urban was arraigned in court at St. Louis and later secured his twlease on \$10,000 bond returnable on 6/27/33, but he failed to appear, nor did his attorney Thomas J. Rowe appear, and the Judge continued the bond until July 11, 1935. As shown above Urban surrendered himself in Des Moines on the date he was to have extradition hearing at St. Louis, Mo. for his return to Summit, Ill. The local officers are unable to figure this move, other than the gang needed the \$12,000. each on deposit here.

The St. Louis Police further advise that Urban wanted by Andrew Botz, Chief of Police, Summit, Ill; D. F. Lyons, Post Office Inspt. Chicago, Ill; Arthur Denney, County Attorney, Fairbury, Nebr, and Franklin Miller, Circuit Attorney, St. Louis, Mo. I understand he has been positively identified on the Fairbury, Nebr. bank job.

As to Vern Miller, none of the local authorities have any information on him. Park Findley, Iowa Bureau of Investigation, advises me that Millers picture has never been exhibited on the Ottumma Savings Bank robbery, on 9/9/50, however, I will have this done tomorrow and if possible get a process outstanding for him.

I am having the Sheriff's Office send you six pictures of John Lugar and they should be in the office tomorrow. The Police Department has a full length picture of Urban, Engler, Wilhite, and Lugar, but I understand that Park Findley secured this for you and is supposed to have sent it to you. If you do not have this full length picture I have one, and as I have to go to Fairbury, Hebr. I thought I would show it to Mr. Denney, the County Attorney there, and find out what I can there on Urban, and the others as to whether they were in on that bank job.

Park Findley further advised me that he received a telephone call this afternoon from our Chicago Office, he did not get the name of the party with whom he talked, advising that they had intercepted a shipment containing a machine gun and several other guns that was being shipped by express by one J. B. Jarret, Steel Pier, Atlantic City, N. J. to K. M. Emmack, Route 2, Fairfield, Ia. When talking to Spears this aftermoon he said he had not heard from Chicago relative to the above. I offered my services to Mr. Findley, but he seemed to have plenty of men, 4 from his office, two local police, and the Sheriff and deputy at Fairfield. The shipment was leaving Chicago today and should be in Fairfield by Friday morning. His men have instructions to lay on this until the guns are called for. He promised to telephone you the result. Should you want me to join his forces and will wire or telephone me tomorrow morning, I can proceed to Fairfield. I will be at the Kirkwood Hotel until about 10:50 AM when I expect to leave for Ottumma and can be reached in care of Western Union and if I am delayed in my investigation I will probably be there that night at the Ottumwa Hotel.



The examination of Herbert Farmer is proceeding in due course. He has entered a sweeping denial of any connection with the massacre and has even denied making and receiving the telephone calls in question. A Federal warrant has also been issued for Ester Farmer, his wife, and she has been brought to Kansas City for examination there.





When you read the first clipping it makes you wender why men of years of law enforcement expierience will pull bencheaded tricks such as this has turned out to be and which any one of such blunders might cause to happen.

The absurdiness of the fight in Kansas City only goes to prove that the time has arrived when it must be decided which is the mest pewerful, Gangster rule er the Law. When criminals grew se certain of their power that they do not fear to pull; such a

jet as that, it is time to revise our enforcement agencies.

Mr. President this happening has aroused the country to the greatest pitch ever known and is the most opportune time in which the Gevernment should act to make it known who is running this Country.

In justice to the families of these men who paid with their lives, the Department of Justice rules should seal the mouths of all Officers from giving information that would put the lawless element in pessession of information that will give them such an advantage as was theirs in the fight described. Some will say that the Public is entitled to the information of such captures and other information pertaining to movements of Officers, but I say and believe that you will agree with me that the best interest of the Public was not preserved when the lives of four men were the renalty of giving advance information.

What would it have mattered to the Public if the infermatien had been published 24 hours latter when Mash could have been behing prisen bars and safe from such attempts to liberate?

Mr. Reesevelt, you have done a most wonderful job of saving this Country from ruin and you will never live to know the honor that will come to your name, your duties are so many that it is a mericle how you stand under the lead and still Smile, but take on this one more job and do the things neccessary to make impossible a repetition of this terrible affair.

Scal the mouths of the Officers until the job is completed and prevent escapes of such characters from Pefearal prisons by Government swning all land for mile from prisons with only two reads to approach heavily guarded, and heavy wire fences (at least) three between prisen walls and the outer highways. In attempted \_\_\_\_\_ breaks sound sirens so all guards are ready. You know what to do, please in the interest of Matienal Safety de all in your power to cerrect the present evils. Speed courts, do away with pardons and parels only incases of error. a see Thanks,

# OKESA ROBBER IS 'KIDNAPED' By Officers

Frank Nash Nabbed at Hot Springs and Hurried to Leavenworth

## **ESCAPED IN 1930**

Member of Spencer Gang Who Fled Federal Prison Is Taken By Surprise In Resort

FORT SMITH, Ark., June 16
LAP Three department of justice agents who were reported to have "kidnaped" a man at Hot springs, Ark., this morning, revealed here tonight on their way to Leavenworth, Kan., that the "kidnaping" victim was Frank Nash, Oklahoma desperado who has been at large since his escape from the federal penitentiary at Leavenworth in September, 1930.

Nash was serving a 25-year term for robbing a mail train in Osage county, Oklahoma, at the time of his escape.

The agents, who sped out of Hot Springs in their car after "abducting" a man known in the resort city only as "Doc," left their automobile at the police sattion here. It was learned they planned to take a train to Leavenworth with their motorious prisoner in an effort to prevent possible attempt at rescue.

aible attempt at rescue.

The agents admitted "kidnaping" Nash on the streets of Hot Springs after the fugitive had been trailed there, but refused to give any details of the capture. They said they feared trouble from Nash's confederates in making the arrest, and whisked him out of town immediately.

They were stopped by police at Little Rock, but refused to tell the prisoner's name, saying he was a gangster and was being taken to Jonlin Mo

Frank Nash, federal prisoner fugitive recaptured at Hot Springs Friday was a member of the Al Spencer gang of bank and train robbers who preyed upon northeastern Oklahoma a decade

Nash was captured at Sierra Blanca on the Mexican border, September 9, 1923, and was sentenced to 25 years for robbing a mail train at Okesa, Okla. He escaped from the federal prison at Leavenworth in October, 1930.

A little more than a year after

A little more than a year after Nash's break, seven prisoners made a bloody break for liberty, three convicts being slain, two of them members of Spencer's gang. They were Grover C. Durrill and George Curtis.

Last of the seven to be recaptured was Earl Thayer, 65, who was taken when he sought to trade a wife for food

Betrayal wiped out the Spencer gang and resulted in the death of the outlaw chieftain. One of his trusted lieutemants, Ike Ogg, turned state's evidence in the Okesa train robbery and five of the robbers, including Thayer and Nash, were sentenced to 25 years in prison.

Spencer was killed near Bartleeville.

The information given out by who ever gave this interview- signed-sealed and delivered the death warrants of the four Officers who were willed in a date.

# FRANK NASH AND FOUR OFFICERS SHOT TO DEATH

Gun Battle Staged at the Union Station Early This Morning

# ONE MAN WOUNDED

Officers Were Returning Nash, a Former Spencer Gang Member, to Prison

KANSAS CITY, June 17,-Underworld machine gunners shot and killed four officers and their prisoners, Frank Nash, Oklahoma train robber, in front of the Union Station here today.

One federal officer was seriously wounded.

Officials differed on whether the attack was an attempt to free Nash. who was being returned to the Leav enworth federal penitentiary from which he had escaped, or whether the main purpose of the gangeters was to kill the outlaw.

The killers, believed to number: four, fled in an automobile with their sub machine guns barking after the shooting.

F. J. Lackey, the wounded officer: told police he had been trailing Nash for three years.

"When we gathered at the car and, had got Nash into the front sext. he said, "two men stepped out from between cars parked south of the government armed car. I believe either with shotguns or rifles. I do not believe they had a machine gun.

\*One of them said 'let's let them have it, and before any of the officers could get their fire arms, the shooting began. There were shotguns and other weapons in the car, but we couldn't get at them."

(By the Associated Person KANSAS CITY, June 17 .- Four officers were slain by machine gun fire and another was wounded in front of the Union Station here today by gunmen who apparently sought to effect the release of Frank

Nash, Okiahoma mail train Tobbe being returned to Leavenworth federal prison.

Nash, one of the few-surviving members of the Al Spencer gang of train robbers, also died in the hall, of bullets.

The killers fled in one or more automobiles after pouring a murdcrous fire into a parked car which the officers and their prisoner were boarding just south of the east door of the station.

Arrived With Nash Early Today Frank Smith, investigator for the department of justice; Lackey and Reed arrived at the station shortly. after 7 a. m. with Nash, captured yesterday in Hot Springs, Ark. Nash escaped from the federal penitentiary at Leavenworth in 1980.

They were met by R. E. Vettaril. chief of the United States bureau of investigation for Kansas and western Missouri; Raymond J. Caffrey, an investigator for the bureau; Grooms and Hermanson. The seven escorted Nash, handcuffed, through the station to Caffrey's car, waiting outside and across the street near the parking lot. -

Three of the officers and Nach died on the spot, Caffrey died in a hospitai. Lackey was wounded Smith and Vetterli escaped.

The assailants fled west, but eluded police cars which rushed to the scene.





MEMORANDUM FOR THE DIRECTOR.

I have just talked to Vetterli over the 'phone. He said that no information of value has been secured from Herbert OFarmer. Esther Farmer has referred to the coming to the Farmer home in Joplin of Galatus and Mrs. Nash. She states that Mrs. Wash put in a call for one Verne at Kansas City. She states that when the report of the killing came in over the radio Mrs. Bash left for St. Louis by bus and Galatus left for Hot Springs. In the telephone conversation of Mrs. Nash with Kansas City Mrs. Nash is reported to have asked "what she could do". We further information has been received from Cincinnati relative to the location of Verne Willer there and Mr. Vetterli believes that he will not be located there.

Vetterli states that he is sending Turrou and Brennan back to Wenona to again interview Mrs. Nash. He says they are filing a complaint on her for possible use. He says that he will hold Brennan and Andersen there for the time being, to which I assented. I also suggested that he send two men back to Joplin to make a thorough search of the Farmer house there. This had not yet been done by our men.

With regard to my memorandum of July 10 and your inquiry as to the identity of Galatus, Dick Galatus, alias H. B. Gladdis, is a racketeer who has been located at Hot Springs, Arkansas, and who is reported to be the boss of a slot machine racket there in partnership with one Jim lark, a broken-down gambler, and Mclaughlin, Mayor of that city. Galatus is said to be the official representative of the gangster world in hot Springs. He is said to arrange for and afford protection to the gangsters who come there at various times. Galatus accompanied Mrs. Nash and her daughter from Hot Springs to Joplin on the night of June 16 by aeroplane, returning to Hot Springs the following day. With regard to your inquiry as to why the Farmer home was not searched at the time of the apprehension of Farmer. I have made inquiry at Kansas City and am informed there that it was deemed advisable at that time to concentrate on the procurement of all possible information from Farmer and his wife. It was thought there that Farmer and his wife being in custody there would be ample time for the search of their home during the period of their custody and that therefore every possible attention should be given to the prisoners rather than to the searching of their residence.
