





As per the instructions of Mr. 5. M. Lodd, Special Agent M. L. Scott of this Office contacted United States Attorney Swight M. Oreen in reference to former Assistant United States Attorney Henry L. Bulaban, and Mr. Oreen advised him that he did not have any personal information in regard to Henry L. Bulaban. He suggested that Agent Scott interview Assistant United States Attorney Edward A. Fisher, and possibly Assistant United States Attorney Barry Connaughton, as he understood that they might have some information in reference to Mr. Bulaban.

To was ascertained at the effice of the United States Attorney that Henry L. Balaban was applicated an Assistant United States Attorney, at Chicago, on December 22, 1928, and that he resigned on March 15, 1932. The date of the resignation of Mr. Balaban would, of source, reflect that he was not an Assistant United States Attorncy at Chicago at the time of the Kansas City Massacre.

Assistant United States Attorney Edward A. Fisher advised Agent Scott that while he did not have any definite information reflecting on Er. Bulaban, he did not fully trust him, and that he believed he would not be above engaging in sharp practices.

At the suggestion of Mr. Fisher Agent Scott interviewed Miss Mary Bailey, Assistant United States Attorney, who indisated along the same lines as Mr. Fisher. She also stated that Mr. Balaban had represented a large number of defendants in narcotic cases in the past, but that recently did not appear to be handling so many of these.

Assistant United States Attorney Harry Connaughton advised agent Scott that he did not have any definite information reflecting on Mr. Balaban, but indicated along the same lines as Mr. Pisher.

At the Chicago Ber Association Agent Scott ascertained from Miss Harriet Carlson, who is one of the secretaries to Clarence P. Denning, Executive Secretary of the Chicago Bar Association, that Mr. Balaban was admitted to the practice of law on February 15, 1924, and that he was a member of the Chicago Bar Association in good standing. She also advised that the records reflected that five complaints had been received as to Mr. Balaban, but all were dismissed as unwarranted. Miss Carlson, of course, saked that this information be treated as strictly confidential.

It was not deemed advisable to interview any other persons concerning Mr. Balaban.

Mr. Fulton Oursier has asked me to write to you to submit certain information which has come to our attention in sommestion with the capture of Charles Arth-Pretty Boy Floyd by members of your department under Mr. Melvin Purvis.

Submitted, herewith, is the information:

In the October 19th Line-Up of True Betective Mysteries, we published a photograph and description of Floyd. Two weeks after this issue of the magazine went on sale, Mr. Robert Robinson, 74-year-old farmer of R. D. 41, East Liverpoel, Whie, First was the photograph in a copy of our magazine.

On Gotober 22nd, 1654, at about noon, a young man came to the Robinson farmhouse. We maked for and received a sandwish and some matches. He went away, returned and was given directions to get to Youngstown, Ohio, where he said his home was. When he had finally left, Mr. Robinson, suspicious of his visitor's appearance and manners, realized that this was Floyd, whose photograph-he-had seen in our magazine.

Mr. Robinson did not know exactly what so do. He decided to go at once to Constable Elyde D. Birch, his next door neighbor. He was starting out when he saw Birch driving toward the Robinson home. He hailed Birch, who has been a constable for more than a score of years, and explained what had happened. He described Floyd

Together, the censtable and Farmer drove to West Point, Ohio, where they knew Department of Justice men were stationed at the time. They stopped before a crowd of men and asked if any Department of Justice men were present. Iwo men stepped forward. The Department of Justice men, upon receiving the information from Constable Birch, rapidly organized. Floyd was shot down on the Conkle farm.

We had a one hundred dollar reward posted on Floyd. Our interest, Fof wourse, lies strictly in connection with the informant who supplied the original information. Mr. Robinson submitted a formal claim for our neward. He answered, satisfactorily, a number of questions. His formal claim was as witnessed statem.

He obtained official confirmation of his claim from Constable Birch. On the strength of these facts we fall antirely lumbified in paying our reward of \$100. We did.

It has been our practice, in the past, to give creat and mention to informants in all cases where we feel that such mention will in no say jeopardize them and where we have their full consent. In this connection, I would add that we have the consent of Mr. Robinson and Constable Birch. We are anxious, of course, to oredit them with the part they played, but wish this to be in accordance with your feelings in the matter as well. It is our experience that such handling of captures acts as a decided incentive to other readers in following the Line-Up regularly.

Incidentally, it desire to me that in the reports on the Floyd heath which may have been turned into your office, there may be contained excerpts concerning the actic of Mr. Robinson and Constable Birch, who turned in the driginal information. I do not know whether such excerpts as may be in your reports would be available for pulication in connection with our story. If they are, I should appreciate having your permission to use them.

In closing, may I assure you that Mr. Robinson is writing to us did not mention any of the Department of Justice agents by name. E believe this is in deference to a policy of anonymity desired by your office. If I am wrong in this and you wish the names or individual actions of any of your men specifically acknowledged in our account, please do not hesitate to advise to and we will be glad to try to find room for anything which you feel should be contained in the story.

In response to the request contained in your letter of December 11, 1934, please be advised that it appears, from the official reports submitted in connection with the location and killing of Charles Arthur "Fretty Boy" Floyd while resisting arrest by Special Agents of the Division of Investigation, with the cooperation of members of the Police Department, East Liverpool, Ohio, on October 22, 1934, near Clarkson, Chie, that a squad of Special Agents of the Division of Investigation, while patrolling the territory morth of East Liverpool, Ohio, around 1 P.M. en October 22, 1934, interviewed Robert Robison, a farmer, R. F. D. #1, East Liverpool, Chio, whose farm is located a few miles west of Calcutta, Ohio. Robison, when shown the photograph of Floyd, immediately identified it as the likeness of a man who had been furnished food at his farmhouse at about 12:30 P.M. on the same day, Dotober 22, 1934. He stated that the photograph was a perfect likeness of the man who had eaten at his house, and described him as wearing a mavy blue suit, without a hat, and further advised that after he had finished eating he had requested to be driven to Youngstown, Ohio. Robison stated that he declined to drive this individual to Youngstown and thereupon the man departed on foot.

The information obtained from Robison was immediately communicated to the Special Agent in charge of the investigation, at the Traveller's Hotel at East Liverpool, Ohio, and thereupon several additional squads of Agents were sent into the vicinity of Robison's farm and together with a squad of members of the Police Department of East Liverpool, Ohio, they patrolled that vicinity until they located Floyd at approximately 4:10 P.M. on the farm of Mrs. Ellen Conkle, two miles south of Clarkson, Ohio. Floyd was dressed as described earlier in the day to Robison and, failing to halt at the command of the Special Agent in charge of the squad, Floyd was billed while resisting arrest.

Of course, the Division of Investigation had been previously advised of the presence of Floyd in the vicinity of East Liverpool, Ohio and, acting upon this information, equads of Special Agents were cruising about the country making numerous inquiries relative to the presence of Floyd, and in that way contacted Robert Robison, who furnished information as related above.



I advised Mr. Nathan that Mr. Brantley will not be present as he collapsed at the office and is now under the care of his physician.



recently at Topeka, Kenses, has informed me that during a conversation with Major Wint/Smith, head of the Kansas State
Highway Patrol, Mr. Smith told him that he had a grievance
against me, and feels that in a recent matter I failed to play
fairly with him. According to Agent Scott, Mr. Smith advised
that he requested me to take no action in connection with a
party reported to be residing at Muskogee, Oklahoma, that mould
make this place "hot", but that I immediately did take action
which resulted in a reid being made by the Muskogee, Oklahoma,
police at the place in question. Agent Scott was not fully advised of the circumstance in connection with the incident, but
I will set them out below in detail, in order that the Division
may be fully informed. I might state that Major Smith has not
indicated to me his ill feeling, and that I was not advised until
the report made to me by Agent Scott on December 8, 1934.

On Sunday, October 14, 1934, Major Smith called me at my residence and advised that he had some information which he believed to be good, and requested that I meet him at the Kansas City Division Office. I proceeded to the office and Major Smith met me there, at which time he was accompanied by Jim Bracewell, who is a special officer connected with a pipe line company in Oklahoma. These gentlemen advised me that they had definite information that Floyd was then in Kansas City. They stated that one Brown, who was amployed by the Kansas State Highway Patrol as Special Officer, was in Kansas City, in company with one June Brashear, and a woman named Kilene Baldwin, a beauty parlor operator at Sapulpa, Oklahoma. They further advised that on the preceding evening Brown and Brashear had been at a night club known as Dante's Inferno at Kansas City, and that they had seen Floyd, at which time.

he was accompanied by an Oklahoma outlaw named Dewey Mutchinson, who comes from the vicinity of Sulsa, Oklahoma. They Stated that at that time Brushear made arrangements to meet Mutchinson on the following day and that the meeting was supposed to take place at a known address in Kanets City. Their information was further to the effect that Floyd and Mutchinson had greently been at Muskoges, Oklahoma, and that inquiries at the point of contact there, which was given as the residence of an individual named Metcalf, had resulted in advice that "the boys" had left Muskoges a few days previously, intending to proceed to Arkansas and then to Kansas City.

When questioned by me as to the reliability of his information, Major Smith advised me that he had entire confidence in Brown, and would as soon take his word for anything as any of his other employees, or as the word of any agent of the Division. During the conversation, Major Smith stated that he desired that no activity. be taken by this Division at Euskoges, Oklahoma, incanuch as he feels that it would make the spot there "bot" and that such action would be most undesirable. He mentioned that there had been a raid staged recently by Agents of the Oklahoma City Office at a point meer Tules, Oklahous, in an effort to locate one Chapman, wanted as a bank robber, and that this raid had been premeturely street. I advised Major Smith that we would not do anything which would spoil his contacts at Muskoges. Arrangements were made in order that the persons working for Major Smith should proceed according to their schedule and, in the event it was determined that Floyd was actually in Kansas City at the designated spot, we would cooperate with his men in an effort to take him into custody.

I subsequently communicated by telephone with Special Agent in Charge Brantley at the Oklahoma Sity Office, and outlined the information which had been given me by Mr. Smith. My purpose in doing so was to determine the probability of the information being correct. Mr. Brantley informed me that he, from his knowledge of the persons involved, was of the opinion that it was probably not good information. He advised that Brown was known to the Oklahoma City Office and that he had been staying at the Mayo Hotel in Tulsa for some time, all his expenses being paid by Major Smith's organization. He also Edvised that it was not thought probable that either June Brashear or Dewey Butchinson would be in direct contact with Floyd, although they were of the type who would make such contacts if possible. At the time I talked first to Mr. Brantley, I suggested that Agent F. S. Smith, who was then working in and around Muskogee, Oklahoma, might have information concerning the individual called Metcalf. After Mr. Brantley hed made such inquiries, he phoned this office and furnished the above information, together with information to the effect that he had contacted Chief of Police Ben Bolt and Chief of Detectives John Wooley

at Muskogee, but that these individuals had no information concerning Metealf. My resollection is that furing the first telephone conversation with Mr. Breatley I suggested that it would not be desirable to take any open setion at Muskogee at that time, and that he coincided with that viewpoint. It would consequently seem unlikely that, if a raid was staged by the Muskogee police, as Majer faith now intimetes, such raid was at the fastance of snyone connected with this Division.

In secondance with the arrangements effected with Major Smith, Special Agents Anderson and Trainor, of this office, accompanied by a highway patrolman named Anderson, trailed Brown and his companion at the time they proceeded to make the supposed contact with Floyd. It was agreed that they should post themselves at such a point that they could receive a signal from Brown, indicating that Floyd was or was not at the house in question. These persons later reported that they saw Brown and his companion, but that et no time did they go to the designated house. Brown, however, reported to Major Smith that he had gone to the house, but had found that "the beys" had gone. This was galled to Major Smith's attention, but he seemed to still have reliance in Brown. From further inquiries which were made, however, it was definitely determined that there was sheelutely no basis of truth in Brown's information, it being determined that the residence in question was occupied by a reputable soman, with apparently so possible connection with Floyd or his associates.

At the time of this securrence, this office was saily receiving reports ecocerning the alleged whereabouts of Floyd, and, in view of the fact that this inquiry and proved valueless, it was not incorporated in a report. A copy of this letter is being forwarded to the Oklahoma dity Office with the request that this office be informed concerningly knowledge of a raid alleged to have been made by the Huskoges policin connection with Metcalf. I am informed that Major Smith is presently an route to Washington for the Attorney General's crime conference. It is my wish to personally contact him upon his return to Topeka, in order that any misapprehensions may be streightened out. I should appreciate the advice of the Division in this connection.


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



MEMORANDUM FOR MR. TALIL.

This memorandum is submitted for the purpose of recording long distance 'phone calls which I made to Special Agent in Charge Nathan at Hansas City, Missouri, and Special Agent in Charge Brantley at Oklahoma City, Oklahoma, on December 27, 1934 and December 28, 1934, respectively.

I communicated with Er. Nathan at 10:30 A. H., for the purpose of ascertaining exactly what was desired by the United States Attorney at Kansas City, Missouri in the nature of documentary evidence to be prepared by the Department and transmitted to Kansas City, Lissouri for the purpose of introducing in evidence in the case against Richard Tallman Galatas, and others. Mr. Nathan indicated that the United States Attorney desired an affidevit or statement reflecting that Special Agents of the Division of Investigation had the authority to arrest and detain Frank Nash, an Escaped Federal Prisoner. I, therefore, conferred with ir. George P. Jones, Special Assistant to the Attorney General, Room 2425, et various times on December 27th, 28th, and 29th, and assisted in the preparation of a memorandum relative to the duthority of Special Agents of the Division to make arrests and to transport scaped Federal Prisoners back to the penitentiary from which they had escaped. This memorandum, together with certified photostatic copies of the service records of Special Agent in Charge R. H. Colvin and Special Agents F. S. Smith and F. J. Lackey, and certified photostatic copy of a memorandum dated key 22, 1933, prepared by the Director for the Attorney General, on which memorandum is noted the approval by the Attorney General, dated June 2, 1933, of the plan proposed in taking Nash into custody, were transmitted by air mail, special delivery to the Kensas City Office under date of December 29, 1934.

I ascertained at the City Post Office that mail planes left Washington, D. C. at 3:50 P. M. and 9:50 P. M. and arrived at Kansas City, Missouri the following day at 12:25 A. M. and 6:19 A. M., respectively. In accordance with this schedule, the documents should arrive in Hansas City, Missouri by Sunday morning, December 30, 1934, at 9:00 o'clock A. M. at the latest.



In accordance with the request contained in your air mail, special delivery letters dated December 21, 1934, the question concerning the authority of Special Agents of the then United States Buresu of Investigation, to transport on June 16, 1933 Frank Hash, an escaped Federal prisoner, from Hot Springs, Arkaness to the Buited States Pemitentiary, from which he had previously ecesped, at Leavenworth, Kansas was presented to the Department. The Criminal Division of the Department has propered a memorandum supporting the contention of prosecution that Special Agents of the Division of Investigation had the authority to apprehend and transport Frank Bash from the point of his apprehension to Kensas City, Missouri, where an attempt was made to deliver him from the custody of duly authorized representatives of the Attorney Seneral of the United States. Copies of this memorandum dated December 29, 1934, prepared in the Original Division are enclosed herewith. There are also melesed berweith certified contes of the service records of Special Agent in Charge Ralph H. Golvin, Special Agents Frank S. Suith and Francis S. The contemplated action with respect to the plan for apprehending Each was presented to the Atterney Seneral in a memorandum signed by the Birector of the then Bureau of Investigation under date of May 26, 1933. The proposed action was approved by the Atterney General on June 2, 1933 as reflected by the metation appearing in the lower left hand corner of the original memorandum. A certified photostatic copy of the original memorandum is enclosed herewith to be introduced in evidence in the event the United States Attorney at Easses City, Missouri doese it mesossary.

Based upon the authority granted by the Attorney General, a letter was addressed to the Special Agent in Charge at Oklahoma City, Oklahoma under date of June 5, 1933 making reference to his personal and confidential letter of May 22, 1933 and advising him that the Attorney General had approved the proposed action to be taken with respect to the apprehension of Mash, and instructing the Special Agent in Charge to "proceed with your negatiations to bring about the location and apprehension of this fugitive" (Frank Bask).

On the evening of December 28, 1934 Mr. Nowly of the Division communicated by telephone with Special Agent in Charge Dwight Brantley of the Oklahoma City Office, instructing that the original letter of the Division dated June 5, 1933 be turned over to Mr. Ralph M. ### MEMORANDUM POR MR. PARRISE.

In re: United States w. Frank Eash; authority of United States Agents of the Bureau of Investigation to make arrests of escaped prisoners.

Pursuant to your request, I have made some research respecting the authority of the Agents of the United States Bureau of Investigation (now Division of Investigation) of the Department of Justice to pursue and apprehend prisoners who have escaped from Federal penal institutions, and I have the honor to submit the following observations.

# Authority of the Attorney General respecting Federal prisoners.

The Attorney General is the head of the Department of Justice, Title 18, U.S.C., Section 291.

Under the Act of March 3, 1891, (26 Stats. at Large 839) the prisons of the United States and the sustody of prisoners under sentence were placed under the supervision and regulations of the Attorney General.

The Attorney General is the hand of the President in taking care

Under the Act of Pay 14, 1930, (46 That. et Large 825) a Bureau of Prisons was established:

"to be in charge of a director, who shall be \* \* \* appointed by and serve directly under the Attorney General."

This Act further provides that:

"all of the authority, powers, and duties conferred by less or regulation upon the Superintendent of Prisons or any of his subordinates are hereby transferred to the Bureau of Frisons."

The Let further provides that:

"The control an' management of any institutions established hereunder \* \* \* shall be vested in the Attorney General."

And, further, provides that:

"In connection with such maintenance and operation the Attorney General is authorized to establish and conduct industries, farms, and other activities; to classify the immates; and provide for their proper tre-tment, ears, rehabilitation, and reformation."

The Act further provided that:

\*all persons convicted of an offense against the United States shall be committed, \* \* \* to the custody of the Attorney General of the United States or his authorised representative.

The Act also provides that:

\*All transportation of prisoners shall be by such agent or agents of the Department of Justice as the Attorney General or his authorised representative shall from time to time mominate.

It would appear from these statutes that the supervision and "care" of Federal prisoners is reposed in the Attorney General It, necessarily, follows that being charged with the care or prisoners he would be authorized to follow and apprehend escaped prisoners.

Title 5, D.S.C.A., Section 316 provides that the Attorney General

The Bolicitor General, or any officer of the Department of Justice, \* \* \* to any State of district in the United States to attend to the interests of the United States in any suit pending in any of the courts of the United States, or in the courts of any State, or to attend to any other interest of the United States.

It seems clear that the apprehension of an escaped convict would

be a matter in which the United States is "interested", and that
the Attorney General, having the responsibility for the care, sustody
and control of Federal prisoners, and as the head of the Department
of Justice, would have authority to assign agents of the United States,
connected with the Bureau of Investigation, to the job of apprehending and re-incarcerating an escaped Federal prisoner.

In the case under consideration, Frank Hash was convicted of the crime of assaulting a certain United States Mails Custodian, on March 1, 1924, and sentenced to imprisonment in the United States Penitentiary at Leavenworth, Kansas, for a term of twenty-five years. On the 19th day of October, 1930, the said Frank Hash escaped from said Penitentiary and until the 16th day of Jume, 1933, remained at large as a fagitive and an escaped prisoner.







Dear Sir:

On December 30, 1934, Special Agent Louis D. Wine of this effice telephoned to this office from Las Vegns, Heveda, to the effect that one H. Killingsworth and one impaire Elliott Eccolon were stopping at the Apache Hotel, Las Vegns, Mevada; that Killingsworth was in possession of Chevrolet Sedan, 1934 model, Arkaneas 1934 license 63-301; that he was considered suspicious because he was known to be in possession of a large amount of silver coin, which was wrapped in paper wrappers and that he was engaged in exchanging the silver for currency; it was also stated that he was sesociating with two other men.

Agent immediately telegraphed the Little Hock Division office, requesting that it determine the name, address and reputation of the person to whom Arkansas License 83-301 had been issued. Telegraphic information was received from the Little Rock office to the effect that the cer was registered to Harold Killingsworth of Cabot, Arkansas, and that the license covered Chevrolet Sedan, Motor No. 94672; that the Postmaster at Cabot advised that he did not know any person or family of the name of Killingsworth, and that the Sheriff stated that he knew no individual or family of that name.

On December 22, confidential informant reported that E. Killingsworth checked out of the Apache Hotel, Las Vegas, Mevade, on the morning of December 21, 1934, but that he, before going, cashed in at the bank \$400.00 in silver in ten and twenty-five cent pieces, all of which was wramped in out of town wrampers; that additional silver was eashed at different places in and about Las Vegas, and it was estimated that approximately \$600.00 in silver was exchanged for currency; that when Killingsworth departed, he was accompanied by Maxime Filiott McCollom, Clyde Chucritet and H.G. Christensen; that they left in Killingsworth automobile and departed in the direction of Reno, Hevada; that one of these men was dark complexioned and appeared to be a Filipine or an Usage Indian. Confidential informant expressed the epinion that these people were "hot" and had probably been involved in a bank robbery.

It not appearing that the automobile had been stelen, elthough it apparently had been transported in interstate commerce, and it not appearing that the man representing himself to be Killingsworth was not Killingsworth, the comer, and no information being available indicating that any of these persons were marted for violation of any rederal Statute, agent immediately telegraphed the Chief of Police at Rano, Hevada, and made known to him the activities of these persons at las Vegas, and that they were believed to be amount to him. It was made elear to the Chief of Police that these persons were not wanted, as far as was known, for any rederal violation, but that the information was being submitted to him for any action he wished to take on his sum responsibility.



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



Mr. Purns stated that inemauch as the two operatives. subpoensed did perform investigative wor'l for the police, they will, naturally, have to testify concerning their investigation when placed on the witness stand and he does not want the Division to misunderstand their connection in any way with this case or to think that the Burns agency or any of its operatives are working against the Division in this matter.

Mr. Purns requested that I convey the above information to you and assure you for him that the interests of that Agency are in no way contrary to those of the Division.

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

For some time the U.S. Attorney at Reno, Nevada, has been considering the alleged relations of William J.Oraham with Lester M. Gillis and associates of the latter, for the purpose of determining whether or not charges of harboring a fugitive or fugitives, could be instituted against William J. Graham.

My study of the report of Agent R.C. Surfan, Chicago, Illinois, dated 10-6-34, entitled "Vernon Co Miller--Conspiracy to Deliver Federal Prisoner," leads me to believe that possibly a harboring charge could be developed against William J. Graham, because of his relations with and help given to Richard Tallman Galatas if Richard Tallman Galatas was a Federal Fugitive at the time of their contact and at the time help was given Galatas by Graham.

Till the Division give consideration to this and advise me if
I may proceed with an investigation 12 parase of determining if
evidence can be developed sufficient to justify the institution of prosecution of Villiam J. Graham for herboring or aiding Richard Tallman Galaxas.

The reason why I am not instituting any investigation until I hear from you, is because the report of Agent R.C. Surran, above referred to,

makes clear that information contained therein shall be considered as strictly confidential. However, in view of the fact that the subjects in that case are now on trial and that the trial will probably terminate in the very near future, it may be that such an investigation may now proceed.

If you authorize such an investigation, I believe it advisable to have Mr. and Mrs. Richard Tallman Galatas again interviewed more thoroughly, with the object in view of learning fully what conversation took place between William J. Graham and Richard Tallman Galatas on the occasion of their meeting when Galatas sold Graham the Chevrolet Coupe and if at that tire or any time prior thereto, Galatas made known to Graham that he, Galatas, was being sought as a Federal Fugitive and was in need of funds or other kind of assistance.





This is to sevice that on the afternoon of Jamuary 5, 1935, Special Agent S. K. McKee interviewed Viview Mathis at the Jackson County Jail, Kansas Dity, Misselri, at which time she informed that during the latter part of Movember, 1984, while at liberty under bond in the KARMO ecce, she made a trip to Chicago, Illinois, at the request of Louis "Doc @Stucey, and that while in thisego she made somtests with several persons, the identities of whom she declined to disclose at the time of interview, from whom she learned that Verne Miller had been wounded in the legs during his escape from the Sherone Apartment Hotel in the Fall of 1938; that he had gone to the hotel where he had been living and was there killed by "friends" and his body taken to Detroit, Michigan, where it was later found. This woman informed that she had learned the identity of the individual the "fingered" Miller and also the identities of the persons who killed him and book his body to petroit. She stated further that Miller had been killed as the result of orders received from New York City. She intimated that the person who sent out this order was Louis Buckhalter and she stated at the time that Buckhalter, Miller and associates had connections in New York City, Chicago, Illinois, Kansas City, Missouri, and St. Paul, Minnesota. She informed that Miller had left the East on instructions from Buckhalter during the month of August, 1953, and that the reason for her coming to Chicago, Illinois, in August, 1935, was because of instructions from Buckhalter. She stated that Backhalter gaye her \$1,200 in cash at the time of her departure from New York.

it being thought that the triends" who had killed Miller might be mambers of the Barker-Karpis bang, this somen was questioned in that connection and somitted that the killers were members of that geng, but would not furnish their identities. The did state, however, that Harry Sawyer was the individual who had "fingered" Killer. She advised that if it was the last thing she did, she intended to see the assassins of Miller killed; that she was confident the Covernment would kill them if information could be obtained concerning their whereabouts; that she intended to turn them in as she wanted to see them deed and did not want to take a chance on going to the electric chair by killing them herself.

This woman also said that Lillian Holden, wife of Thomas Holden, Leavenworth perisentiary prisoner, had double-crossed her and that as soon as she was able to come to Chicago she intended to take her for a ride and give her the worst beating she had ever seen. Vivian would not elaborate on this matter. She did remark, in connection with the Holden woman, that she believed numbers of the Barker Karpis gang are intimate with her.

Vivian Mathie requested Agent McKee not to relay this information to Mashington, D. C., because of the data she had supplied
eoneerning a "leak" in Washington. The data supplied by her as to the
alleged "leak" has been communicated to you under personal and confidential cover. Agent McKee, of course, told this woman that this matter
would be treated in the strictest of confidence.

Justice, Swift and Sure.

The administration of justice in the federal court trial of the men and women charged with conspiracy in connection with the union station massacre has been of such a character as to strengthen faith in the law and to discourage crime. The trial proceeded with dispatch, the government's case against the accused was thorough and the verdict of guilty against all six defendants was the natural and expected outcome. A premonition of the result was the plea of guilty by one of the accused before the taking of testimony had begun.

At the outset, Judge Merrill E. Otis, presiding in the case, issued the statement that the trial must be ended within a week. It was ended within a little more than four days. The procedure was deliberate, but marked by dispatch. Night sessions were held, including New Year's eve. The entire conduct of the trial and the assembling of evidence in advance of it afforded a spectacle to hearten the law-abiding citizen and to reveal the possibility of both the swiftness and certainty of justice.

The result of the trial brings near to completion an accounting for all of those involved. directly and indirectly, in the terrible union station crime. Of the eight persons named on conspiracy charges, one has been released, one entered the plea of guilty, and six were convicted, and one other, Adam Richetti, is now in custody. Against three others there also are pending in federal court charges of perjury in connection with the grand jury's investigation of the massacre. But the two men believed to have been actual participants in the station killings, Charles (Pretty Boy) Floyd and Verne C. Miller, are dead, the former at the hands of the law, the latter probably at the hands of rival gangsters.

So justice has moved; so the penalties of crime are being exacted. It is a telling lesson for gangdom and for potential criminals, 62-28915-3408

62 2 MEMORANDUM FOR MR. MCMAHOH, SPECIAL ABSISTANT TO THE ATTORNEY GRAFFAL.

I beg to asknowledge receipt of your memorandum of Secember 15, 1934, requesting an expression from me as to the explanation submitted by Deputy Marshal A. T. McCowan, contained in his latter of Movember 26, 1934 to Mr. Stanley.

I have perused said letter earefully. Apparently, Deputy Marshal McGovan initiates his statement by explaining his attendance at a public meeting on November 1st, and the loss of sleep in connection therewith. He marrates the incidents relative to his trip, partly by airplane and partly by train, to Kansas City, at which place he arrived early Sunday morning, Nevember 4th. He then refers to various conferences he had with District Attorney Milligan, with the Assistant District Atterney and with the Court Bailiff, and states that he made certain arrangements in connection with the appearance of Adam Richetti at Kansas City, and that the spinion was expressed that he would not need to return the prisoner to Ohio once he was in Kansas City, and that he expected an amended court order; that he assigned two of his best deputies to take Richetti before the Grand Jury and when his testimony there was concluded the Judge decided to allow him to return to Ohio. He said this was after 6 P.M., that he and the deputies finally agreed to return Monday might and, accordingly, made train reservations, that he had had but little rest, for four days and three mights, that he laid down for a brief rest, telling his deputies he would meet them at train time, 9:15 P.M., and arranged that they should bring the prisoner and he would meet them there, that when he arrived at the station at 9:02 P.M he was informed the train had left at 9 P.M. and he had missed it through a misunderstanding of time by two minutes. He states he took the 9:15 P.M. train on another road, but could not catch up with the deputies and the prisoner.

The thing that strikes me in the perusal of the foregoing is the extraordinary amount of conference work performed by Mr. McGowan. I can really see no reason why this case should have

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called for this extended amount of conferring. His excess is that due to this large amount of conference activity be last considerable sleep and thus misunderstood or mistook the leaving time of the train, which conveyed the prisoner and his deputies, on the return trip. It would seem to me that obviously a Government officer holding his position should be able to secure accurate information concerning the leaving time of a train on which is a prisoner entrusted to his custody.

It is worthy of note that McGowan makes no reference to his being under the influence of intoxicants during the period in question. Your attention is invited to my memorandum to the Attorney General, dated Hovember 6th, relative to this condition. In said memorandum it will be noted that the Assistant Station Master, Union Station, Kansas City, Missouri, advised that McGowan, accompanied by E. E. Pisher, a Deputy Marshal employed part-time as a Court Mailiff at Kansas City, Missouri, appeared at the station with momen in a drunken condition.

United States Marshal, Mr. Keinath, showed me your letter of November 23, stating that you will be very glad to have a written statement from me explaining my actions in the removal of Richetti from Kansas City and his return. This I do herewith, hoping that you may give my case every favorable consideration possible.

#### STATEMENT

On Thursday night, November 1, I was up very late, due to a public meeting which I felt obliged to attend, and on Friday, November 2, was at the office at the usual time of 8:30 AM and about 10 AM Assistant District Attorney Weideman came to me with a writ of habeas corpus ad testificandum for one Adam Richetti, confined in the jail at Lisbon, Ohio, to be removed to Kansas City, Missouri for testimony before the Grand Jury. I left Cleveland with two deputies about noon, got the prisoner at 2 AM Saturday November 3, and brought him to Cleveland where I communicated with Washington, D. C. as to taking the prisoner by airplane to Kansas City.

We left Cleveland at 3:15 PM for Chicago and encountered sleet and rain and made trip from Chicago to Kansas City by train. Arrived in Kansas City at about 8:40 AM Sunday morning and was in conference with various officers until 1 PM Sunday — a period of  $2\frac{1}{2}$  days and 2 nights with less than 2 hours sleep, which was had on the train from Chicago to Kansas City.

Got a small amount of rest Sunday afternoon and had a conference in my hotel room with District Attorney Milligan until nearly midnight Sunday night, and with Asst. Dist. Attorney Blair and Court Bailiff until after 2 AM. Had very little sound rest Sunday night and was up and to the office of the District Attorney Monday morning early. Then to the County Jail, saw prisoner and back to the office of the District Attorney until 12:10 Monday noon. Left a deputy at the County Jail to answer any call for prisoner and went back to my room at the hotel and sent another deputy with instructions to be on hand should Richetti be

called before the Grand Jury, which the District Attorney advised me would be late in the afternoon, as they wanted him last.

I told the District Attorney and the Sheriff I would meet them at the Federal Building at 1:30 PM, the time they said they would be back. After getting lunch and returning to my room, I called them and asked if there were any new developments in the case and was advised there were none as yet, and told them that if I was not needed I would stay in my room and attend to some matters I felt should be attended to, and if I was wanted to please call me there - which they said was 0.K.

When I left Cleveland I had a court order to take Richetti to Kansas City for Grand Jury testimony and return him to Lisbon, Ohio. He was also remanded to my custody by U.S. Commissioner Nicola of Cleveland, Ohio, under \$100,000 bond for a hearing before the Commissioner on Friday, November 9.

Everyone connected with this case expressed the opinion I would not need to return the prisoner to Ohio once he was in Kansas City, and of course I expected an amended court order to that effect, and knew that if I did get one that I still had to consider his appearance in Cleveland, Ohio on the 9th. So spent considerable time Monday afternoon in conferring with our Cleveland office to have things in such a shape that they could have the Ohio Northern District Dyer Act case dismissed by the Commissioner at Cleveland, if the Kansas City authorities held him, or if he waived.

Richetti was taken before the Grand Jury for about one hour by two of my best deputies assigned by me for this purpose, accompanied by Department of Justice Agents and deputy sheriffs, and when through, and the Judge decided to allow him to go back to Ohio, it was after 6 PM. The prisoner was taken under good escort to the County Jail and the deputies got in touch with me at the hotel and so advised, and we finally agreed upon starting back Monday might and accordingly made train reservations to do so.

I had but little rest for four days and three nights and laid down for a brief rest, telling the deputies I would meet them at the Station at train time, which I understood to be 9:15 PM, and as I knew they would be wellconvoyed to the Station, I arranged to meet them there.

When I got to the station at 9:02 PM I was informed that the train left at 9 PM and I had missed it through a misunderstanding of time by two minutes. I took the 9:15 PM train on another road, hoping to catch up at Chicago, but could not, and arrived in Cleveland, Ohio, 7 minutes later than they on another train.


This type of work is new to me - having taken office on July 2nd this year, and I can truthfully say I have devoted my very best efforts to my work and have at all times tried very diligently to do my duty in a manner that would be above question or reproach, and my missing the train was not due to any indifference on my part or to a disregard for the responsibility attached to my duties, and sincerely hope it will not be classed as an unforgivable error.

I take great pride in doing my work right and my work here in Cleveland, if investigated, I think, will be so rated, and I sincerely hope I shall be given the chance to prove myself worthy of any confidence placed in me in the future.

Trusting my long hours without rest and my inexperience together with misunderstanding of train time may be sufficient grounds for justifying your favorable consideration, I am



#### MEMORANDUM FOR THE DIRECTOR

I called Mr. Mathan at Kansas City concerning the talegram stating that Turrou will complete his work at Kansas City on the 4th or 5th and that he is a necessary witness in the Lindbergh case. I stated I had talked with Mr. Fay concerning this matter last night and that there had been no request as yet concerning Turrou's presence in the Lindbergh case. I stated that the agreement is that when our agents are needed, we will be advised; that until we received some direct request for his presence, there was no reason why he should not proceed direct to Jacksonville, where he is a necessary witness in a bank case.

In connection with the trial of the Kansas City Massacre Case, Mr. Nathan stated that the defense has just rested, just before the recess, and the Government is going to put on about three rebuttal witnesses and then rest; that by 3 o'clock this afternoon, all the testimony will in all probability be in; that no further agents will testify. He stated all of the agent would be ready to leave tonight.

I asked when the perjury indictments were to be tried. He stated that the one that was set before Judge Otis - on George Rayen was to have come up at this session but the Judge announced this morning from the bench that he found that there might be considerable merit in a motion to quash filed by the defense; that he had not had an opportunity to pass on the matter and would not have until sometime next week. The other two indictments will not be set until after the 28th of January. He stated that both he and the United States Attorney have the idea that the indictment on Rayen is likely to be thrown out, as being too remote from the inquiry that the Grand Jury was conducting.

On January 3, 1935; just prior to his departure for Chicago, Special Agent S. K. Mc Kee, who was in Kansas City during the triel of the above case, advised me that he had talked at some length with Vivien lathis on the afternoon of January 3rd. During this conversation, Agent Mc Kee informs me that Vivian Mathis told him that she had been present in a room at the Pickwick Hotel, Kenses City, Missouri, on the afternoon of Saturday, December 29, 1934. At that time there were present in this room two of the defendants in the conspiracy case, two lawyers representing them, two members of the Kansas City, Missouri, Police Department, and two individuals known as Fixers" in Kansas City. According to her statement to Agent Mc Kee, U. S. ttorney Maurice M. Milligan was also present and was drinking with these persons. The names of the individuals, other than Mr. Milligan and Vivian Mathis, were not disclosed. Agent Mc Kee also indicated to me that Vivian Mathis had told him other things, thich he felt were of some moment, and which he cid not care to disclose to me. I(dvised him to discuss the matter fully with Mr. Connelley, upon his return to Chicago and assume that he has done so.

With further reference to this matter, I am attaching hereto copies of a memorandum submitted to me by Special Agent N. O. Scott of this office containing information given to him by a cashier at the Pickwick Hotel, Mrs. Brown At the time this memorandum was submitted, it was carefully considered, but seemed to have nothing in it which would warrant any inquiries being made.

In view of the action of the jury in the Conspiracy case in finding all to defendants guilty, it occurs to me that the information furnished to Agent Mc-Kee by Vivian Methis is probably not correct. As near as I could determine from my conversation with Agent Mc Kee, the alleged meeting in the Pickwick occurred in the early afternoon on the date mentioned. I recall that during the after-COPIES DESTROCKER that day at about three o'clock, I was in the office of the United

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States Attorney, at which time, Special Agent in Cherge Vetterli and Special Agents Andersen and Trainor of this office were also present in conference with members of the force of the United States Attorney. Mr. Milligan was present at that time and did not appear to have been drinking. My recollection is that Mrs. Milligan and their son were in the outer office at the time we conferred in Mr. Milligan's private office, and my assumption was that they had accompanied him to his office.

While I can give no reason for Vivian Mathia furnishing Agent Mc Kee with incorrect information of this character, I am, as I have stated, not impressed with the fact that her statements concerning the United States Attorney are correct. I am forwarding this information in order that the Division may be completely advised concerning the matter.



Caffrey, Otto Reed, Frank Hermanson and W. J. Grooms. The prisoner, Frank Nash, was also slain by these assassins, who fired machine guns and other weapons at readon into the groupe Special Agent Lackey was seriously wounded by machine gun fire and Special Agent in Charge Vetterli was slightly wounded, barely accaping death. Special agent Frank Smith miraculousl espaped assessination and was not so mitel

Investigation devaloped that the assessing were Vernon G. Miller, close frien of Frank Heah; Charles Arthur Floyd, southwestern desperado and his running mat Adam Richetti. It was also developed by investigation that Richard Tellman Galatas, assisted by Mrs. Frances Heah, Mrs. Esther Farmer, Herbert Allen Farme Louis Steeci, Mrs. Elizabeth Galatas, Frank B. Mulloy, Vivian Mathias and Verno Miller, brought about the plans through a conspiracy in which they each perticipated, telephonically and otherwise, which ultimately resulted in the arrival at the Union Station at Kansas City, Missouri, of Vernon C. Miller, Charles Arthur Floyd and Adam Richetti, who performed the atrocious massacre of the officers.

Richard Tellman Gelatas, with his accomplices, was indicted in Federal Court at Rensas City, Missouri, on 10-24-34, charged with conspiracy to violate a law of United States in this case. The indictment sharged conspiracy to violate Title Section 7351, U.S.C., namely to cause the escape of a Federal prisoner from the custody of the United States. Originally the indictment was three counts, charging two counts under Title 18, Section 7531, U.S.C., and one count chargin conspiracy to violate Title 18, Section 246, U.S.C., which refers to the release of persons duly arrested. However, two counts of this indictment were dismissed at the close of the trial and only one count, namely conspiracy to release a

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Federal prisoner was left. Galatas, with his accomplices, was tried in the U. S. District Court at Tansas City, Missouri, beginning on 19-31-34 and on 1-4-35 a verdict of guilty was returned by the jury. On 1-5-35 Galatas was sentenced by the Court at Kansas City to serve two years in the U. S. Penitentiary and to pay a fine of \$10,000.00, which was the maximum punishment under the one sount of the indictment submitted to the jury.

The offense of conspiracy in which Galatas participated in this instance resulted in the most serious and flagrant defiance of law and order which has occurred in recent history. His acts sulminated in the brutal murders of officers who were performing their duty in the return of a desperate criminal from liberty to his legal place of confinement. Investigation has shown that Galatas, a consort of undersorld characters, had been designated by the sorrupt political machine at Not Springs; Arteness, as the so-selled pretection man sho aided criminals in their flight from the law in Not Springs and that his acts in participating in this case resulted from that position. Galatas remained a fugitive from justice from the day that the massacre occurred on 6-17-33 until 9-22-34.

Galatas is about 44 years of age, an American citizen and a member of the white race. He is married and has a stepson, who has been in attendance at the University of Alabama prior to and including June, 1933. Galatas' occupation has been that of confidence man, gambler and consort of criminals. He possesses a suave and polished appearance. The recerds of the Bivision of Investigation of the U. S. Department of Justice at Eashington. D. G., reflect the only known briminal record of Galatas which is as follows:

Leekey and all other persons lawfully assisting them, notwithstending that the said Frank Mash was then properly committed by virtue of a commitment issued under the provisions of the laws of the United States of America, to the sustody of the Attorney General and his agents aforesaid, and that said defendents and each of them and other persons whose mames are to the grand jurors unknown and for that reason cannot be berein specifically mentioned, pursuant to said unlawful sonspiracy, combination, confederation and agreement and to effect the object and purpose of the same, did thereafter commit cortain evert acts, which said evert acts ere and were specifically set out in count 1, beginning on page 8 of this brief.

It is the theory and thought of the writer that in order for the government to sustain the indictment and each sount thereof in the above entitled cause, it is essential and necessary that each and all of the elements which go to make up the alleged charge of conspiracy in this case be fully proven. These elements consist of:

- (1) That defendants conspired to commit an offense against the United States, and
- (2) Subsequent to the conspiracy or agreement one or more of such defendants did an act to effect the object of the conspiracy.

It is suggested that the government's procedure in the trial of this case and the order in which the testimony will be introduced to support each count of the indictment, the names of the witnesses who will testify on behalf of the government and the order in which they will be placed upon the stand to give their testimony, be as follows:

They were again stopped at Little Rock, Arkaness by officers who informed them that they had received information of an alleged kidnapping in the same manner. They identified themselves and they were then escorted to the city limits by Little Book pulice and inquired the road to Jeplin. They proceeded to Port Smith, Arkansas. Agent Laskey ecommicated with his superior, Special Agent in Charge R. W. Colvin, Oklahoma City; Oklahoma by telephone and was instructed to transport the prisoner to Kansas City, Nissouri. They departed from Fort Smith, Arkansas at 8:30 P.E. June 16, 1933, bound for Kansas City, Missouri, and

arrived at Kansas City, Missouri at the Union Station on the worning of June 17, 1933 about 7:00 A.M. At the train they were joined by Special Agent in Charge R. E. Vetterli and also by Special Agent R. J. Caffrey and Police Officers W. J. Greens and Prank Hermanson of the Kansas City, Missouri Police Department. These officers met the train for the purpose of assisting in conducting the prisoner to the United States Penitentiary at Leavenworth, Kansas. This group of officers proceeded to place the prisoner, Hash, in the personal automobile of Agent Saffrey, in front of the Union Station, immediately upon arrival of the train, preparatory to taking him to Leavenworth. At the instant then the officers were surrounding the car of agent Caffrey, some of them having gotten into the str. and when the prisoner was safely placed in the car, three men, bearing machine guns and other firearms, surprised the group and magailesaly surdered Raymond de Caffrey, Otto Reed, Frenk Hermanson and W. J. Grooms. The prisoner, Frank Rash, was also slein by these assessins, who fired machine guns and other weapons at random into the group. Special Agent Lackey was seriously wounded by machine gun fire and Special Agent in Charge Vetterli was slightly wounded, berely escaping death. Special agent Frank Saith miraculously escaped assassination and mas not wounded.

Investigation developed that the aspassing were versus. C. Miller, a close reland of Frank Nach; Charles Arthur Floyd, southwestern desperado and his running mate, Adam Richetti. It was also developed by investigation that Richard Tallman Galatas, assisted by Mrs. Frances Wash, Mrs. Esther Farmer, Herbert Allen Farmer, Louis Stacci, Mrs. Elizabeth Galatas, Frank B. Mulloy, Vivian Mathias and Vernon C. Miller, brought about the plans through a conspiracy in which they each participated, telephonically and otherwise, which ultimately resulted in the arrival at the Union Station at Kansas City, Missouri, of Vernon C. Miller, Charles Arthur Floyd and Adam Richetti, who performed the atrocious messacre of the officers.

Frank B. Malloy, with his accomplices, was indicted in redered Court at Kansas City, Missiuri, on 10-24-34, charged with conspiracy to violate a law of the Enited States in this case. The indictment charged conspiracy to violate Title 18, Section 7531, W. S. C., hamaly to cause the escape of a Federal prisoner from the custody of the United States. Originally the indictment was three counts, charging two counts under Title 18, Section 7531, U.S.C., and one count charging conspiracy to violate Title 18, Section 246, U.S.C., which refers to the release of persons

duly strested. However, two counts of this indictment were dismissed at the close of the trial and only one count, namely conspirately to release a Federal prisoner was left. Mulloy, with his accomplices, was tried in the U. S. District Court at Kensas City, Missouri, beginning on 12-31-34 and on 1-4-35 a verdict of guilty was returned by the jury. On 1-5-35 Mulloy was sentenced by the Court at Kensas City to serve two years in the U. S. Penitentiary and to pay a fine of \$10,000.00, which was the maximum punishment under the one count of the indictment submitted to the jury.

Frank B. Milloy moved in this conspiracy as one of the lesser numbers and his not wes thet of placing is contact Louis Stace; who telephoned from Chicago, Illinois, an 6-16-35, and Vernon G. Miller, who was then in Kansas City, Missouri. The investigation shows that Mulloy was a close friend of Miller and Stacei and that he was used by those individuals as a centact man. It is also shown by the investigation that after the massecre, which occurred on the morning of 6-17-33, Mulloy acted as a friend and harborer of Vernon C. Miller and that he took care of the personal effects of Miller after Miller left Kansas City in flight from his murderous deeds. Mulloy has constantly refused to reveal the full information regarding these atrocious acts when requested to do so. He is of a weak character and has been most loyal to his friends in the underworld. It is shown by investigation that immediately after the massacre Mulloy went to the residence of Vernon Cr Miller, pursuant to Miller's request, and aided in so far as he could in seeking medical assistance for Miller and his fellow assessins.

Mulloy is an American citizen, a member of the white race and is married. He is 44 years of age and has made his residence at Kenses City, Missourie He has maintained quite a luxurious home and has presented an appearance of respectabilit in his femily life. He has an adopted daughter about ten years of age to whom he has given an excellent home and opportunities for education. He has followed the occupation of wholesale beer distributer since same has become legal and prior to that time was engaged in bootlegging activities with the Kanses City, Missouri, underworld anydicate. Mulloy's only ariminal becard as reflected by the finger-print records of the Mivisian of Threstigation. To S. Department of Justice, Weshington, D. C., is as follows:

Third, I have not as yet received may word concerning the alleged passing of a \$500-bribe at the Botal Pickrick, and I would like to have an immediate report from Kanmas City upon this matter.

Re: CHAPLES ARTHUR "PRETTY BOY" FLOYD, with aliases, Deceased, et al, Delivering Federal Prisoner, Obstruction to Justice.

This is to advise that on the afternoon of January 3, 1934, I interviewed Vivian Otathis at the Jackson County jail, Kansas City, Missouri, at which time, among other things, she informed that she had received information to the effect that there had been a leak from Washington, relative to the confidential statement which she had furnished in this matter, and also concerning the meeting which took place between her and myself at the Hotel Curtis, Minneapolis, Minnesota on December 25, 1934. I pressed her for the source of her information and she informed that sometime since Christmas, 1934, she had been in conversation with one Attorney Davenport of Sioux Falls, South Dakota, relative to her involvement in this matter. She advised that Davenport represented Mrs. Nerne Sankey at the time of her trial at Sioux Falls, South Dakota. She stated that Davenport communicated by longdistance telephone with some high official of the Department in Washington, D. C. and asked for data concerning the status of this case, particularly insofar as it concerned Vivian Mathis. According to the Mathis woman, Davenport was told to call back a short time later on. He did this, and was told that all of the defendants in this matter, with the exception of Louis OStacey had furnished signed statements. He was also told that Mrs. Mathis had met me in the lobby of the Hotel Curtis in Minne polis, Christmas day and that I had been covered by other agents at the time of this meeting. Mrs. Mathis did not know the identity of the person with whom Davenport talked, other than that he was a high official of the Department, and that Davenport was personally acquainted with him.

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I, of course, told Mrs. Mathis that I could not believe her story and again informed her that no one had knowledge as to her having made a statement, with the exception of Special Agents R. C. Suran, H. E. Andersen, former Inspector S. P. Cowley and myself.

It should be stated that Mrs. Mathis led me to believe that the long-distance telephone calls in question had been placed from Sioux Falls, South Dakota to Washington, D. C. She remarked that more than \$50.00 worth of calls were made. I believe the period in question to have been during the week-end of December 29 and 30, 1934, inasmuch as this woman told me that she left Kansas City during the afternoon of December 29, and returned at 10 P. M. December 30, 1934.

During this conversation, Mrs. Vivian Mathis also informed that during the early afternoon of December 29, 1934, she received a telephone call at her room at the Phillips Hotel, Kansas City, Missouri from Louis Stacey, during which he asked her to come to a room, the number of which she did not furnish, in the Hotel Pickwick, Kansas City, Missouri. Mrs. Mathis stated that the went to this room and observed that Stacey, Galatas, two of the defense attorneys, two Kansas City police officers, two persons whom she described as "fixers", in Kansas City, and the United States Attorney, Morris Milligan, were present. She said she felt quite out of place when she noticed that Mr. Milligan was in the room. She advised that she remained in this room only a few minutes, during which Galetas and Stacey told her that they had secured a lawyer to represent her and expected her to put up a fight, inasmuch as she would be "putting them in the middle" if she did not. She said she told Stacey and Galatas that she would talk to the lawyer, but that she did not know as yet, what she was going to do. She stated that all of the persons in this room appeared to have been drinking. Mrs, Mathis stated further that she did not know whether any fixing" had been arranged. She advised that she was furnishing this information for what it might be worth, and because the presence of Mr. Milligan in the room did not appear right.

You are advised that while in Kansas City, Missouri, I stopped at the Hotel Pickwick, and that I had previously advised Mrs. Mathis that I would be registered at that hotel. At about 12:30 P. M. December 29, 1934, I returned to the hotel from the Federal Building, and found a note in my room which was to the effect that I would receive a telephone call at 1 P. M.

I assumed this message was from Mrs. Mathis. I waited in my room until 1:30 P. M. but did not receive any telephone call. Sometime between 1:45 P. M. and 2 P. M. I met Special Agent R. C. Suran who knew of the message I had received, and he inquired if Vivian Mathis had communicated with me. When I told him that she had not, he remarked that he had just seen her enter the hotel lobby from an elevator, accompanied by a woman whom he assumed to be her sister, Mrs. Draves.

On the night of January 3, 1935, I advised Special Agent in Charge R. B. Nathan of my conversation with Vivian Mathis insofar as it related to United States Attorney Milligan. At that time he informed me of certain information which had come to his attention, which related to the alleged passing of a \$500 bribe on the afternoon of December 29, at the Hotel Pickwick. You will no doubt be advised of this matter by him.

I have discussed both of these matters with Assistant Director Harold Nathan, Special Agent in Charge E. J. Connelley and Special Agent in Charge D. M. Ladd, and have been advised by them to communicate this data to you under personal and confidential cover.

Both of these matters are being submitted for your information.
