

REST WOMAN AID OF OUTLAW WHO SHOT WAY OUT

U.S.Agents Quiz Another, Left Behind by Miller.

One woman led federal detectives to the Chicago hiding place of Verne Miller, dangerous outlaw of Oklahoma and South Dakota, but he shot his way to freedom Wednesday night, and yesterday the detectives were hunting another woman who drove Miller away from the federal trap.

The desperado in wanted as a leader in the massacre of a federal agent, three policemen, and a prisoner in a rallway station in Kansas City, Mo., last June. He also is sought as a member of the band that kidnaped Charles F. Urschel, Oklahoma City oil millionaire, for a ransom of \$200,000. George "Machine Gun" Kelly, Harvey Bailey, and others are serving terms in Leavenworth prison for this Miller also is wanted as a suspect in the robbery of the Federal Reserve bank mail at Jackson boulevard and LaSalle street and the subsequent . murder of Policeman Miles Cunningham on last Sept. 22.

Sweetheart Watched Here.

Miller had a sweetheart in New York, Miss Vivian Matthews, formerly of Brainerd, Minn. When Miss Matthews came to Chicago she was put under surveillance. She registered at the Sherone apartment hotel, 4423 Sheridan road, under the name of Mrs. C. Hayes. She was frequently visited by a woman friend, Bobbie Moore, said to be the widow of a New York ganguter named Jake Harris and otherwise known as Mrs. Williams.

Wednesday night the federal men, who sid not sak the assistance of the Chicago police, saw Bobbie Moore enter the hotel carrying a package that apparently contained a man's suit. They decided then that Miller was in the room occupied by Miss Matthews and they made ready to capture him.

They had machine gune trained on the window of the room and were in readiness to shoot him if he attempted to escape that way. They had guards posted all around the building, it was reported yesterday, and then Miller walked from the room. A federal agent is said to have followed him as he walked down the statre, a machine gun aimed at Miller's back.

Both Flee on Foot.

Miller reached the street and was aware that he was followed, according to reports yesterday, whereupon he turned and fired. Then he ran to the intomobile in which Bobbie Moore was based at the wheel. She marted the in and got away to a good start.

When the san into a blind street she and Miller jumped out and fied on roce.

The federal agents who fired at the escaping automobile were unable to say whether the woman and Miller separated or ran together. The automobile was left behind and it was found to have been licensed in the name of Mrs. J. A. Williams,
Mrs. Hilda Polacheck, manager of

Mrs. Hilds Polscheck, manager of the hotel, said Mrs. Williams, or Miss Moore, as she was known there, had lived in the fluiding for a year. She described her as being about 34 years old, small and pretty. According to Mrs. Polscheck, she has two children in a boarding school on the north side.

No Help Asked from Police.

Capt. James Fleming of the Town Hall district, in which the escape of Miller occurred, said the city police had not been asked to help capture the desperado. He did not know of the expected appearance of Miller at the botel. Testerday the federal detectives did not ask him to arrest Mrs. Williams or give him any information concerning her. Chief of Detectives Echoemaker said the same.

The conclusion of the police was that the federal men will take up the chase for Mrs. Williams themselves, ready to charge her with aiding a federal fugitive to escape. The police said they had no information from the government on what Miss Matthews had said. Miss Matthews was in the custody of D. O. Smith, who is in temporary charge of the federal bureau of investigation here, and he spent the day questioning her.



Fur Sammons Captured in Indiana Town

(Picture on Back Page.)
James [Fur] bammons, public enemy and gang machine gunner who has been a will-o-the-wisp to Illinois law for the last nine years, is in the Lake county jail at Crown Point, Ind. Efforts to bring him back to Chicago for trial on an old charge of robbery will be made today.

Sammons was arrested yesterday at Cedar Lake, Ind., for intextention. He was carrying a pistol and had \$8,200 in his pockets. To the Indiana authorities he declared that he was William Linduska, 43 years old, of Vandalia, Mich. But a suspicion that he was a Chicago hoodlum caused the sheriff of Lake county to send his finger prints here and the identification was made.

Gilbert Bends Jaff Guards.

Learning of Sammons' imprisonment, Capt. Daniel Gilbert, chief investigator for the state's attorney, last night ordered three squads armed with machine guns to proceed at once to Crown Point and guard the jail, to make sure that no raid is made to release the prisoner.

It was disclosed that Sammons has been living comfortably in the Lydore hotel in Hammond. He had a young woman companion, who was arrested with him. He has been sought since he forfeited bonds of \$20,000 by falling to appear two months ago for trial in the Cook County Criminal court on a charge of participating in the \$85,000 pay roll robbery at the International Harvester company plant in 1926.

Has Long Criminal Record.

Bammons, who is a little past 50 years old, has a criminal record that dates back to 1899. In 1903 he committed murder during a robbery and was sentenced in 1904 to be hanged. His sentence was commuted in June of that year to life imprisonment at Joliet. In 1923 the life term was commuted by Gov. Small to 50 years and Sammons became eligible to parole. He was paroled in June, 1924.

The pext few years were busy ones for Sammons. He was indicted for the Harvester payroll robbery. He was indicted for another robbery in Baltimore, Md. On April 12, 1927, he was sent to Lesvenworth federal penisentiary for a whisky theft and served 12 months.

U.S. AND FOUR-STATES FIGHT FOR SAMMONS

Outlaw Wanted for Wide Range of Crimes.

Four states and the United States government were fighting last night for the privilege of trying James [Fur] Sammons, Chicago public enemy, for an assortment of crimes ranging from attempted bribery to murder. The Indiana authorities, who arrested Sammons for intoxication at Cedar Lake on Monday, refused temporarily to accede to any of the claims for his custody.

There was no doubt in Sammons' mind as to where he wished to be tried. He greeted with a smile Chicago detectives sent to the Lake county jail at Crown Point to get him and announced he would willingly return here to stand trial on an attempted murder charge.

Chicago Is Turned Down.

But Prosecutor Robert Estill of Lake county refused to permit the Chicago detectives to take Sammons back with them. It was pointed out that Sammons has always had things pretty much his own way in the Chicago courts. Illinois has commuted a death sentence and paroled him from prison on several occasions.

A strong claim for Sammons was but in by State's Attorney Herbert R. O'Conor of Baltimore. Sammons is wanted there for participation in a \$47,000 pay roll robbery in 1926. Willie Niemoth, another Chicago sangster who was Sammons' accomplice in the robbery, is now serving the third year of a ten year sentence in the Maryland penitentiary.

Indiana itself may keep Sammons and prosecute him. The charges placed against him since he was arrested in a roadhouse waving a revolver include assault with intention kill, carrying a revolver without a permit, carrying concealed weapons, public drunkenness, and statutory charges based upon his acquaintanceship with Mary Mitchell, a 23 year old blonds

who was arrested with him.

Bonds on these various charges aggregated \$37,000. A telephone call late yesterday indicated that Sammons has powerful friends backing him. The caller asked the court clerk in Crown Point if a \$35,000 certified check would be accepted as ball. The clerk told the caller to appear in person, that the mot done so at a late hour.

Wanted in Woodn."

The fourth state interesses to Cambinous is Wisconsin. A wire from the Sheriff at Shawano said that Sammons was wanted there for murder and bank pobbers.

Government agents also appeared at the Crown Point jail. They examined the \$3,200 in currency found upon him in an effort to determine it any of it was counterfeit. They also announced that Mann act charges might be placed against the ganguter.

Prosecutor Estill said he was convinced that Sammons had played a major part in the crime wave that has swept Indiana recently following the escape of ten convicts from the Michesan City prison. The prosecutor hoped to identify the gangster for bank robbery.

The attempted bribery charge against the prisoner was based upon the testimony of Deputy Sheriff Jack Cook that Sammons tried to give Cook money when the deputy arrested him.

A Fugitive from Chicago.

Sammons has been a fugitive from Chicago since last September when he forfeited a \$20,000 bond by falling to appear in court for trial on charges of trying to kill three guards who were wounded during an \$85,000 pay roll robbery at the International Harvester company plant in 1926. Sammons already has been tried on the Harvester robbery charge. He was convicted but the Illinois Supreme court reversed the conviction.

It was revealed yesterday that the forfeited \$20,000 bond has not been collected by the state. Two men scheduled the property for the bond. Two was avenue, and Nicholas Alex, 2604 Wentworth avenue. Police Envoys He'd Secret Conference With Gangster in Cell; 'Agreement' Useless

James ("Fur") Sammons, gang killer whom some strange power cloaks with immunity from the law in Chicago, discovered yesterday that his immunity does not extend to Lake County, Indiana.

The killer, who is almost invariably turned loose to resume his thirty-four-year career of crime in Chicago, met Robert G. Estill, Lake County prosecutor. The determined prosecutor told him that this time he will not be returned to Chicago but will race instead one of the many law-enforcement agencies that promise to put Sammons behind the bars and keep him there.

WILLING TO BETURN.

Sammons was willing to come back to Chicago and the protection of the mysterious forces that set him free to prey on unprotected citizens. He was, in fact, enthusiastic over the idea.

His enthusiasm was manifes after Lieut. Andrew Barry o State's Attorney Courtney's state and Chief Deputy Bailiff James Z Gabriel of the Cook County Criminal Court rushed to the Lake County fail at Crown Point and conferred with him—in secret.

The efficient emerged from Sammons' cell after this unusual proceeding and announced that the gangster had "agreed" to return with them to Chicago.

But Estill, obviously mystified by the officers' interest in talking with Sammons in private, said:

"Ob, so!"

HOLDS YOUR SAMMONS AS BANK ROBBER

Refuses to Give Him Up to Illinois.

James [Fur] Sammons, who has enjoyed comparative immunity from Illinois justice, will taste the rigors of Indiana's courts, according to a decision yesterday by Prosecutor Robert G. Estill of Lake county. Ind. The Hoosier state will not release the gangster for trial in other states, the state's attorney announced.

Three states, in addition to Indiana, want the man who is known as a machine gun executioner for the Capone gang. Maryland and Wisconsin asked for him on charges of robbery and murder and Illinois put in a claim based on his complicity in the International Harvester robbery of

Will Balk Extradition.

"I think Sammons has played a part in the 33 bank robberies in Indiana in the last year," said Prosecutor Estill.

All pleas for extradition of Sammons to other states will be denied, the state's attorney declared, until the Indiana charges against him are fully investigated. Maryland will be given a preference for the custody of Sammons if Indiana decides not to prosecute him, Mr. Estill said. Sammons is wanted in Maryland on a robbery-charge.

"Witnesses will be brought to Crown Point to look at Sammons and if he is identified as a bank robber, he will certainly be held in this state for trial," said State's Attorney Eatill. "Chicago has not a chance of getting this man, at least not on the abowing it has made to date. It has had him up there for a long time and has never done much to him. It let him go on bond a few months ago after getting him from Kanasa City and it is possible that he would be set free again if sent back to Illinois for trial."

The state's attorney said that representatives of a number of insurance companies which have been hit by the epidemic of bank holdups in Indiana would view Sammons in the showups. Even if the ganguter is not linked with any of these robberies, he will be tried upon the seven charges placed against him when he was arrested on Monday night. These charges include assault with a deadly weapon, carrying concealed weapons, receiving stolen goods, and attempted bethers.

Will Try Gangster Under Habitual Criminal Act.

(Pictures on Back Page.) James [Fur] Bammons, Chicago murderer and rapist, will be prosecuted under Indiana's habitual criminal law, it was announced yesterday by Robert G. Estill, Lake county proce cutor. Conviction as a habitual criminal carries a penalty of life imprison

Authorities of Maryland, Illinois, Wisconsin, and the United States gov ernment had sought Sammons' cus tody and Indiana had planned to deliver him up, probably to Maryland, in the event that be could not be identified as a bank robber. Meanwhile s certified copy of the ex-Capone machine gunner's record arrived from Chicago yesterday and Prosecutor Estal determined upon the habitual crimidal prosecution.

Rapist, Murderer, and Bobber.

Sammons' record includes convictions and sentences to the penitentlary on three charges -rape, murder, and robbery. Two felony convictions, with sentences to a penitentiary, are required for prosecution under the Indiana habitual criminal law in conjunction with another offense, Prosecutor Estill explained. This law was upheld two weeks ago by the Indiana Bupreme court.

I shall file affidavits tomorrow charging Sammons with attempted bribery and with being a habitual criminal," said the Lake county prosecutor at Crown Point.

The attempted bribery charge is besed upon testimony of Deputy Sher-iff Jack Cook that Sammons tried to purchase his freedom when arrested for intoxication at Cedar Lake on Monday. Two women who helped Verne Miller, the sheriff who turned bad man, in his escape a week ago from a trap laid by federal agents in Chicago, were named yesterday in a federal indictment charging them with obstructing justice through harboring a fugitive.

The women, Bobble Moore and Vivian Gibson, are both in custody. They were indicted several days ago, but the indictment was suppressed and was not made public until yesterday. Judge James H. Wilkerson fixed their bonds at \$50,000 each.

Federal agents had known for some time that the Gibson woman, who also has used the name of Matthews and is the daughter of a farmer living near Brainerd, Minn, was a sweetheart of Miller. She came to Chicago recently and was traced to the Sherone apartment hotel, 422 Sheridan road. Agents of the United States department of justice found that Miller was staying there with her.

Bhoots His Way Out.

Agents surrounded the building on the night of Nov. 1, when Miller was known to be there, but Miller shot his way out of the trap and escaped in a car driven by the Moore woman. The Gibson woman was arrested in Miller's room in the hotel. The Moore woman surrendered Monday at the federal building.

She said that she had seen nothing of Miller since they both abandoned their car, torn by the bullets of the agents and police, a few blocks from the hotel. Melvin H. Purvis, chief of the department of justice agents in Chicago, expressed the hope that the Moore woman, at least, would get a long prison term.

"She helped Miller in several previous escapes from law enforcement officers, we are informed," he said.

Bhe is the widow of Jake Harris, a New York gangster who was killed two years ago, and has also used the name of Bobble Williams about Chicago. Miller has been named in underworld-gossip as the man who killed her husband.





A young woman, believed to be his sister-in-law, who drove the machine on the successful getaway, also had disappeared without trace Evidently she had been struck by one or more of the machine gun builets the lurking federal men sent whizzing after the speeding machine, since bloodstains were found on the driver's seat of the abandoned car.

Woman in Custody Defiant.

Another woman was seized at the hotel in Miller's apartment, but she remained stubbornly defiant today and no amount of questioning by Acting Chief D. O. Smith of the bureau of investigation of the department of instice could make her reveal an information. She at first was be lieved to be Miller's wife, but this was later denied.

Miller is a renegade sheriff, formerly of Huron, S. D. 



From the Louisville Courier-Journal. Influenced by movie melodramas and sensational press stories, the public in general has formed a false picture of the really big gangeter type. The popular conception of the public enemy is a man of foreign name and appearance, most likely an Italian, with a loud, brutal, domineering personality, a fleshy teste for dress that runs to silk shirts in violent colors and diamond stickpins, and a general air of underworld blickness that would warn any person in his right senses of the danger of dealing with such an individual. In reality, the man of that type is much more likely to be the cheap racketeer, or at best the "front" for some more subtle and intelligent criminal.

As a case in point, take Harvey Balley, who is now safe in the hands of the Federal Government. He is anything but the flashy type of gangster. It has been said of him that he has much more the appearance of a bank president than of a bank robber, and his manner helps to carry out the illusion. His photographs show a face that betrays none of the familiar criminal characteristics. The head is well-shaped, the chin square and strong, the forehead wide. The eyes are set well apart, and have neither the Jack-lostre nor the shifty appearance that is so frequently seen in rogues' gallery photographs. Bailey is a tall man, wellbuilt, and his clothes are of sober cut and pattern. His name is straight Anglo-Sazon, and though little is known of his background and early history, he is thought to have been born on a farm in Sullivan County, Mo., where his mother still lives.

Such is the man who blazed a trail of crime across the Middle West, and escaped for years without punishment. He is charged with participation in four of the most notorious episodes in American erime history: The brutal Bt. Valentine's Day massacre which took place in Chicago in 1929, in which a group of men were lined up against a wall and murdered in cold blood; the Union Station massacre in Kansas City last June, which resulted in the death of five men; the \$2,000,000 robbery of the Lincoln Bank & Trust Co. at Lincoln, Nebr., the largest bank robbery in history; and the Urschel kidnaping case, which finally involved him with the forces of the new Federal kidnaping bureau and resulted in his arrest and conviction. Such is the man whom even an experienced criminologist probably would not pick as a criminal type and whom the ordinary layman would take for a solidly respectable citizen. 🚰





James [Fur] Sammons, rapist and murderer, will ask for a change of wenue, it was learned yesterday, when he is arraigned today before Judge William J. Murray in Crown Point, Ind. SAMMONS DENIED VENUE CHANGE; TO TRIAL MONDAY

"James [Fur] Bammons, Chicago murderer and rapiet, was refused a change of venue yesterday and his trial on a charge of attempted bribery was set for next Monday by Judge William J. Murray in the Criminal court of Lake county, Ind., at Crown Point.

The bribery charge grows out of Sammons' alleged offer of \$200 for his liberty, made to Deputy Sheriff John Cook when Cook arrested him Nov. 6 at Cedar Lake, Ind., on a charge of intoxication. The charge is a preliminary to Prosecutor Robert G. Estill's attempt to send Sammons to the Indiana penitentiary for life as a habitual criminal.

Sammons, a gang machine guaner, has served reformatory or prison sentences on charges of rape, murder, and robbery. He was once under sentence to hang for murder, but received a commutation. The Indiana Supreme court recently upheld a law under which a prisoner who has served two prison sentences may be imprisoned for life upon conviction of another offense.

Sammons' attorneys, William J. Mo-Aleer and Joseph H. Conroy, pleaded in vain for a change of venue on the grounds that newspaper accounts of their client's notoriety would prejudice a Judge and jury against him in Lake county.



Racketeering Gunman Fights Charge of \$200 Bribery; **Expect Complete Jury Today**

James ("Fur") Sammons, ruthless gunman and racketeer, went on trial yesterday before Judge William J. Murray in the Lake County, Ind., Criminal Court, on a charge that may send him to an Indiana penitentiary for life.

Specifically the charge is attempting to bribe Deputy Sheriff Jack Cook with \$200 of a \$3,200 "roll" when the officer arrested him as drunk and disorderly in the tavern of Victor Nadasan at Cedar Lake three weeks ago.

If convicted of the charge, and if the state can show two other cases where Sammone was convicted of other crimes and served prison terms, then under the Indiana law be will be deemed a habitual criminal and it will be mandatory upon the court to sentence bim for life. SEARCH SPECTATORS.

More than a score of deputy sheriffs were on guard in the court-room and Lake County Building throughout the day, and carefully searched all spectators, men and women alike, for weapons.

To Crown Point residents Sammone' appearance did not bear out his reputation.

"He looks like anything but a gangster," was the comment frequently heard as speciators viewed his small stature, his quiet, light greenish-blue suit and mulberry tie.

The day was spent in arguments between Prosecutor Robert G. Es-till and Attorneys William J. Mo-Aleer and James H. Conroy, counsel for Sammons, over selection of jurors from a special venire of thirty-five called for the case. Defense counsel stressed prejudice against Sammons because of newspaper publicity given his racketeering exploits.

BROTHERS SEPARATED.

Sammons was intensely interested in the proceedure, conferring frequently with his attorneys, showing his tortoise shell rimmed glasses far down on his nose. Two of his brothers, Frederick and William, were present, but while they discussed his case in the halls it was noted that in court they did not sit together, but on opposite sides of the room.

It is expected that a jury will be ompleted today and presentation of evidence will follow immediately. Prosecutor Estill will show, he says, four convictions and prison tes nellaments' record, and will inwhich he was contined.

'FUR' SAMMONS **GOES ON TRIAL** IN CROWN POINT

Jury Is Chosen to Hear Bribery Charge.

A jury was selected late yesterday in Judge William J. Murray's court in Crown Point to begin hearing evidence today against James [Fur] Sammons, Chicago gangster. Sammons is being tried on an attempted bribery charge and if found guilty will immediately be put on trial under the Indiana habitual criminal act. If convicted on the habitual criminal charge, he will be liable to a sentence of life imprisonment.

More than fifty of the veniremen, most of them farmers, who filed through the jury box, were excused for cause when they said they could not give Sammons a fair trial because of a feeling that he was guilty. Finally in the last hour of the day's session, twelve men were chosen who swore they would consider the evidence with impartiality.

Sammons Sits and Stares.

Sammons, garbed in the same powder blue suit in which he was arrested several weeks ago in a Cedar Lake roadhouse, maintained a stolidattitude. His gray hair was closely cropped, his eyes stared through horn rimmed glasses.

Only the fingers of the hands which many times handled a machine gun for the Capone gang tapped nervously on the arms of his chair. He stared grimly at the prospective jurors who expressed a preconceived opinion as to his guilt.

The attempted bribery charge will be based upon the evidence of Deputy Sheriff Jack Cook that Sammons offered him \$200 to avoid arrest in the roadhouse. The deputy sheriff had been summoned to the place the proprietor complained that Sam-

mons was intoxicated and threatening other guests with a pictol.

Testifies in Gangster's Trial in Indiana.

An Indiana deputy sheriff yesterday braved the scowls of James [Fur] Sammons and gave evidence concerning an attempted bribery by the gangster which may put Sammons in prison for life.

Deputy Sheriff John W. Cook of Lake county told the jury in Judge William J. Murray's court at Crown Point, where Sammons is on trial, that the convicted killer and rapist offered him \$200 on Nov. 6 if he would release him from custody. If Sammons is convicted of the attempted bribery charge he will be tried under the Indiana habitual criminal act, which provides a life sentence for criminals convicted of three felonies.

Shows \$3,200 Roll of Bills.

On the night of Nov. 5, according to the evidence given to the jury, Sammons staggered into a Cedar Lake, Ind., tavern owned by Victor Madason. He flourished a huge roll of bills, which was later counted and found to contain \$3,200. After buying drinks for the house he became disorderly, fell against a stove and nearly set fire to the tavern, Madason testified.

Madason called the sheriff's office and Cook was sent out to arrest flammons. As the deputy sheriff took the stand Sammons glared at him.

Cook declared that when he entered the roadhouse Sammons was seated at a table. He waited his chance, the deputy sheriff said, and then wrested from Sammons a pistol which the latter had been waving. On the trip back to the jail Sammons offered him \$200, he said, to release him.

Charges Intimidation of Witness.

The day's hearing was enlivened by the charge by Deputy Prosecutor Floyd Vance that Madason, the first witness for the state, had been intimidated during the noon recess by Pat Sammons, a brother of the defendant. Madason, who was obviously frightened, was not questioned concerning what Pat Sammons had said

WORST OUTlaw, Once sheriff, Taken on ride

Renegade Beaten to Death; Bound Body Tosséd in Ditch on Outskirts of Detroit

Verne Miller, the nation's most bunted outlaw, was found murdered yesterday on the outskirts of Detroit—less than a month after he had shot his way out of a government agents' trap here.

Despite the raging Detroit gang war, in which three gang leaders have been slain since Sunday, authorities believe Miller was "bumped off" by his friends because he demanded that they protect him from the government's relentless search, BODY LEFT IN DITCH.

His body, nude, strapped and bound, and wrapped in two blankets, was found in a roadside ditch in the northern part of Detroit. He had eveldentally been damped from an automobile in typical gangland "ride" fashion.

But examination disclosed that he had not been shot. Instead, his wkuil had been crushed.

Authorities established that the body had been placed in the ditch yesterday morning, but said Miller had been dead twenty-four hours when the body was found.

WANTED FOR ROBBERIES.

Miller was wanted by the government there for the loop mail robbery of September 32, when the robbers that Policeman Miles Cunningham to death, and for the previous loop mail robbery of last December, when \$250,000 loot was obtained.

But more important, in the eyes of the government, was the charge that Miller fired the machine gun in the Kansas City massacre of last June, when four officers were killed with their prisoner, Frank Nash, in a vain attempt by Harvey Bailey's Oklahoma kidnapers to free their comrade, Nash. Miller also was wanted in the Urschel kidnaping and a score of other abduotions.

PRICE ON HEAD.

With a price of \$10,000 on his head, dead or alive, and a government order that he must be captured outstanding, Miller was the "hottest" or most dangerous criminal to shield in the country. Bix men already are under indictment for having aided him and almost at the same time his body was found two Chicago women, Bobby Moore and Vivian Gibsop, were being sentenced to a year and a day in prison for helping him in his escape here.

Hence, authorities assert, Miller's friends decided that the extest course was to kill him, since he would undoubtedly have killed them had they refused to ald him.

WOMEN AIDED MILLER ESCAPE

Bentencing of Bobby Moore and Vivian Gibson yesterday for aiding Verne Miller in his escape from a federal agents trap here November 1—and the almost simultaneous revelation that Miller had been murdered in Deiroit—recalled the outlaw's underworld record.

The two women pleaded guilty before Federal Judge Wilkerson and were sentenced to a year and a day in federal prison for having harbored and concealed Miller.

The Gibson woman, authorities said, was with Milier when federal agents surrounded him in the Sherone Apartment Hotel at 4423 Sheridan road. As the federal men opened fire with machine guns, Miller sped away in a car, returning the fire, with Miss Moore at the wheel:

Miller, a world war veteran, was a renegade sheriff from Huron S. D. Turning to crime, he joined forces with the Oklahoma bad men, Harvey Balley and George ("Machine Gun") Kelly, who are now serving life sentences for the kidnaping of Charles F. Urschel.

Seeking a clue to the reason for Miller's murder, police discovered that he recently went to Newark to hire himself out as a killer to the Longie gang. There he is said to have engaged with Al Silvers in several killings. Bilvers was killed two weeks ago at Somers, Conn. in much the same fashion that Miller met his death. Hence, police reasoned, Miller and Silvers might have been killed by friends of one pof their victims.

Possibility that Miller's death was a result of Detroit's new gang war, while discounted, was not everlooked. Among the victims of this war were Abe Axier and Eddie
Flotcher, leaders of the Detroit
Furple gang, who were known as Datroil's public anemies.

FUR SAMMONS Frightened at Indiana trial

Case May Go to Jury Today; He Faces Life Term if Convicted as Habitual Felon

By Sam Blair,

James ("Fur") Sammons will know today whether he is going to spend the remaining years of his life in Indiana's penitentiary at Michigan City.

And Sammons is scared. As he sat in the courtroom at Crown Point yesterday and listened to the unfolding of the state's evidence that he is a "habitual criminal" and, therefore, subject to life confinement under Indiaha law, his hands were in continuous, nervous motion and his toes kept tapping the floor beneath the counsel table. SPECTATORS SEARCHED.

But Sammons cannot rely on the appeal of his gentle front this time. And because the authorities of Crown Point suspect that he may rely upon another sort of surra-legal defense, every man and woman who entered the courtroom was frisked for guns by deputy sheriffs.

The state and defense closed their avidence last night and attorneys on both sides agreed to confine closing arguments to three hours this morning.


The evidence entered by the state was largely routine, being entirely concerned with getting into the record the fact that the prisoner has more than twice been sentenced for leionies and, therefore, is now eligible for a sentence to imprisonment for life.

DEATH SENTENCE RECALLED.

"Fur" gave little attention to the prosecution testimony, although once he did stiffen in his seat and his nervous trembling became accentuated. That was when Elijah Sandstrom, retired Chicago policeman, recalled from the witness stand that he was in court the afteernoon of June 17, 1904, when the death sentence was pronounced upon "one James Sammons."

Although "Fur" did not join in it, there was a laugh or two throughout the courtroom in the evidence brought forward by two defense winames. They were Alma Belfart, bermaid in the saloon of Countains, and Hatty Offsti.



Fail to Find Cines in Death of Verne Miller, Motorious Gangster,

DETROIT, November 30. without chies or theories, Detroit police and agents of the United States Department of Justice today sought the stayers of Verne Miller, notorious Midwestern desperado, whose battered body was found on the outskirts of the city late Wednesday.

The body of the man who had been sought as the machine gunner in the slaying of four officers and a prisoner at the Kansas City Union Station last June 17, was found in a roadside ditch, nude and trussed up with blankets. Identification was made by means of fingerprints.

Detectives sought a possible link between the slaying of Miller and the slayings early Sunday of Abe Axier and Eddie Fietcher, New York and Detroit police characters, whose bodies, bearing numerous builet wounds were found in an automobile near a North Side suburb. It was known by the police that a famous killer—possibly Miller—was brought to Detroit to slay Axler and Fietcher.

It was determined that Miller had been killed by beating in his skull and that his body had been transported by automobile to the outskirts of the city and there rolled into a ditch.

Scores of criminals had reason to seek Miller's death, lietectives said, but they were frankly kindtiting they did not know which lead to follow.





How the notorious gangster died remains a mystery. Detroit police are inclined to believe he fell a victim in a gang warfare that broke out here a few days ago, resulting in the deaths of three members of Detroit's Purple gang and the wounding of a fourth.

Red Hair, Like Miller's.

The identification of the body as that of Miller was made by Charles Racy, detective in the Detroit bureau of identification. Racy said the head and face were mutilated beyond recognition, but that the man had red hair, like Miller's, and a red mushair, like Miller's, and a red mus-tache, and that his physical descrip-tion fitted that of Miller. All doubt of the identity was removed with the checking of the fingerprints. A stranger told residents of the vicinity of the presence of the body, and then left before the police ar-

Dr. D. W. Johnson, county medical examiner, said Miller had been dead examiner, said Miller had been dead about twenty-four hours, and that the body had been placed in the ditch early today. It had been wrapped in two blankets in a jackknife position, and then bound with Elölliesilids. Shot Way Out in Chicago.

"Miller was last seen alive by police and federal agents November 1, at the Sherone botel on Chicago's North Side. That day he abot his way out of a cordon of officers in a spectacular escape, after they had surrounded the hotel. Learning of Miller's presence, officers had placed a heavy guard around the hotel, and stationed an informer in the lobby. The informer was to drop a bunch of keys as Miller stepped from the elevator.

Between Real Law and Gang Law.
One of the amaring things about criminal gangs is the risk that the gang leaders take. It is not so much the risk in criminal action, for gangs work only when they have or believe they have a reasonably safe advantage over their victims. But the chances that marked leaders take with both statutory law and gang law are so great that few such leaders remain long in security. They are killed or imprisoned.

Verne C. Miller was one of the most clusive of criminals. For months he had been hunted in every state. But for police blundering, he would have been taken or killed recently in Chicago. He escaped that trap, but he fell into one set by his kind in another city, presumably Detroit.

An inherent danger of organized crime to members of the organization is illustrated again in this instance. Gangs are created for organized depredations for profit. As in business, competition ensues. Competition in gangdom is despotic. Those engaged in it, when rivalry becomes destructive of profits, have no compunctions. They kill their own even more readily than they slay other victims. Thus the gangster lives between statutory law and gang law, and he stands in about as much danger from the one as from the other. The more conspicuous his leadership, the greater the hazard he takes.

Machine Guns Guard Courthouse.

In the corridors outside were other guards and in front of the courthouse, with shotguns and machine guns ready, stood still more. Indiana, it was plain, was taking no chances with the arch criminal, long ago convicted of rape and murder in Illinois, and known as this state's foremost evadar of the penalties that jurtice is supposed to meta and

The case was given to the jury at a present Under Judge Murray as structions three verdicts were possible: acquittal, guilty of attempted bribery and not guilty of being a habitual criminal, or guilty on both charges.

It requires three convictions for solonies before a defendant can be declared a habitual law breaker in Indiana and as such subject to tife imprisonment. Documentary evidence was introduced to show the rape and murder guilty verdicts and sammons conviction as a would-be briber furnished the necessary third crime.

Gullty on Both Counts.

Five and a half hours after the jurymen retired they were ready with their verdict of guilty on both counts. The bribery conviction carried a sentence of five years in the penitentiary.

Before the jury was gllowed to enter the courtroom was cleared. Additional deputy sheriffs were summoned. In the corridors all spectators were searched for weapons before they were allowed to reënter and hear the conclusion of the trial, which has attracted large crowds.

Sammons, handcuffed, was led in. The verdict was read. Attorney John Conroy, representing the defendant, requested that sentence be withheld until Monday. He wished, he juid, to make a motion for a new trial, and he would be inconvenienced if he had to go to the penitentiary to see Sammons.

Objection by Prosecutor, wa

Prosecutor Robert Estill, who had referred to Sammons as the most dangerous criminal ever tried in Lake county, objected. The state, he said, had been put to great expense in placing extra guarde over the criminal and he asked that the sentence be immediate.

"At least let the handcults be taken off Mr. Sammons," requested Attorney Conroy.



Fingerprints on Empty Beer Bottle Lead to Verne Miller Identification

Jack Jenkins, K. C. K. Detective Chief, Picks Up Clew Ignored by Others Probing Station Massacre.

Picture on Picture Page 1."

A pile of empty beer and whisky bottles provided investigators with the first real bit of evidence connecting Verne C. Miller, killed Wednesday in Detroit, with the Union station massacre of June 17, and to Jack B. Jenkins, acting chief of detectives of Kansas City, Kassgoes the credit for discovering the evidence.

It was soon after the massacre, in which four officers and their prisoner, Frank Nash, escaped convict, were killed, that investigators discovered the hideout of the gang of killers in a pretty bungalow near Sixty-sixth street and Edgevale road. While they had that knowledge, none knew the identity of any of the men who made up th gang, since Miller was using the alias of Vernon White.

Jenkins, with a score of detectives and federal agents searched the cottage for some clew to help establish the identity of the killers. All but Jenkins passed up the pile of empty bottles in the basement of the house.

Finds Miller's Prints.

The Kansas City, Kas, detective thief packed up the bottles carefully and took them to his office and began to study them. Several dozen bottles were treated with an aluminum powder to bring out finger prints, but all of them revealed by this method had been left by women. Finally Jenkins found the brint of three fingers on a beer bottle. These were checked with copies in the Kansas City, Kas, files and Verne Miller's identity was established.

a starting point the government launched the most intensive manhunt in history. It ended Wednesday when Miller's nude body was
discovered in a ditch in Detroit.
The evidence found by Jenkins
on the empty beer bottle not only
started the government on its search
for Miller as the leader of the gang
of killers, but it also aided in establishing the identity of his accomblices in the Union station massaere. Until Jenkins turned up the
finger prints not a single member
if the gang was known.

Posen in Tells.

Federal agents worked swiftly to determine who had been Miller's associates with the result that a dozen have been arrested and charged with complicity in the killing and half a dozen more are accused.

This piece of detective work was not the only one in which Jenkins recently has figured prominently. It was he who last month made it possible to arrest four men, Phillip De-Carlo, Joseph Cherito, Floyd Albin and John Randazzo, in connection with an attempt, under threat of kidnaping, to extort money from Louis Gottlieb, tire dealer, at 502 Independence avenue.

Jenkins, using a process of bringing out finger prints on paper with silver nitrate and other chemicals, revealed the identity of one of the men who had left his palm print on an extortion letter. That job, incidentally cost Jenkins a new suit of clothes. Some of the acid was spilled on the suit while Jenkins was working.

Jenkins was appointed acting chief of the Kansas City, Kas, detectives last spring by William Stone, chief of police.

MRS. VIVIAN MATTHEWS REMEM-BERED BY JO ANN ALFORD.

The 9-Year-Old Girl Identifies From Picture the Woman Who Lived Here With Killer,

The retentive memory of Jo Ann. Alford, 9-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. William T. Alford, 6623 Edgevale road, neighbors of Verne C. Miller when the killer was here, yesterday removed all doubt as to the identity of the young woman known as his wife.

There had been some question as to whether the woman who lived here with Miller, who was known as Moore, was Mrs. Vivian Matthews, alias Vivian Gibson, who Wednesday was sent to federal prison for a year and a day at Chicago.

The picture of Mrs. Matthews which was published in The Star yesterday afternoon, was shown to Jo Ann by her mother.

"Do you know this woman?" Mrs. Alford asked.

"Why, yes, mother," Jo Ann replied. "That's the woman who lived across the street."

AN AID TO PEDERAL AGENTS.

Jo Ann was the playmate of Betty, the 10-year-old girl who lived with Miller and Mrs. Matthews. Her name is Betty Matthews and she is believed to be living with her grand-mother somewhere in Minnesota. The was through Jo Ann that the police and federal agents learned much concerning the living habits of the "Moores."

E. E. Conroy, agent in charge of the division of investigation here, said last night, before Jo Ann clinched the matter, that he was certain the woman was Mrs. Matthews. Mrs. Matthews and her companion, Bobby Moore, were sentenced to federal prison for a year and a day each in Chicago Wednesday for harboring the gangater.

Mr. Courcy also said the men of the department of justice were convinced that Miller was killed by other gangsters who desired him out of the way so the government agents would relax their intensive hunt. As long as he was alive, every known gangster in the country was subject to continuous questioning by federal agents.

GANGSTERS FEARED QUESTIONING.

Consequently, no gangster felt at ease at any time, never knowing at what moment some federal agent would pluck him by the aleeve and start asking embarrassing questions. Also, from the viewpoint of the gangsters, there was no telling when the agents would take it into their heads to butt in on all sort of crimit of activities, and as long as Miller was alive, that possibility was by no means remote. Hence gangland wanted Miller as hed as the government wanted him, and apparently gangland won the contest.

In Chicago yesterday the two women companions of Miller remained atubbornly loyal to him. They are in jail there waiting to be taken to prison for their part in his escape from agents in Chicago November 1.

Bobby Moore, the woman who drove the car in Miller's spectacular escape there, was the first one told of Miller's death.

PALES, BUT DOES NOT WEEP.

The woman's face paled and her ips trembled, but she did not weep.
"If he's gone," she said alowly, "then it's all over. There's nothing to say."

She went back to her cell which is just below that occupied by Vivian Matthews. Vivian was crying. Although the cells are not connected, Bobby had found a way to communicate the news to Vivian.

The agents have marveled at the loyalty the women have shown toward each other and for Miller. There was no hint of jealousy between the two.

Sammons Convicted as Habitual Criminal for Attempted \$200 Bribery.

CROWN POINT, Ind., December 1.—
For the second time in his varied career of crime James (Pur) Sammons, killer and Chicago public enemy, today faced the prospect of spending the rest of his days in prison.

his days in prison.

The sentence was the state of Indiana's Thanksgiving day "present" to him and, unlike the first time that Sammons went up for life 30 years ago in Illinois after escaping the gallows by a day for a murder, resulted from a comparatively minor charge—attempted bribery of an officer.

However, in convicting him of that the jury also found him guilty of being a habitual criminal, which carries a mandatory life sentence in Indiana. Just before sentence was passed last night by Judge William J. Murray in Circuit Court while deputy sheriffs armed with shotguns and machine guns guarded the corridors and outside of the court house, Sammons asked to be heard.

"If I'm sent up for life it will be because the witnesses have lied me to prison," he said.

Picked Up as Drunk.

After dodging Chicago officers who wanted him for forfeiture of bond last Summer in connection with a robbery case and evading extradition to Baltimore on a similar charge at least three times. Sammons fell into the arms of the law in Indiana for intoxication.

He was picked up several weeks ago at Cedar Lake by Deputy Sheriff John Cook and was not identified until he had been placed in a jail cell. But on the way to jail Cook said the fugitive attempted to bribe him with an offer of \$200 and it was upon that the State's case was built.

The jury required almost five and a half hours to reach a verdict, but said that only five preliminary ballots were taken before agreement was reached. After sentence was passed prosecutors said Sammons would be taken to the Michigan city prison as soon as possible.

The killer has previously succeeded an several occasions in evading extradition to Baltimore, where he was wanted for robbery and had twice forfeited bail in Chicago when charged with major crimes. On both occasions he escaped subsequent incarceration.

made several attempts to the session fixed.

His counsel immediately took steps to appeal the conviction.

Judgment was entered in the Lake County clerk's office 15 minutes after sentence was pronounced, immediately closing any appeal to the Lake County Court from the verdict. Court attaches here said any appeal must be made to a higher court.

Sammons will be taken to prison to begin serving his sentence as soon as it is convenient; it was announced at the sheriff's office. This may be done, it was said, within the next few days.

Plans for his transfer were closely guarded to frustrate any plans of Sammons' associates to liberate him by force.

Balked Justice Consistenty.

His record was such that the Chicago Tribune said editorially, more than a year ago:

"We cannot here mamine the legal procedure of which this individual has been subject and finally the beneficiary. or attempt to fix responsibility for results. But the general picture is one of inefiectuality in the process of justice somewhere along the line.

"A persistent malefactor, while subjected to inconvenience and expense, has been able on the whole to evade the more serious penalties and it is not surprising that his experience with the law, irksome as it stemed, no doubt to him, has not yet resulted in discouraging him in his chosen way of life."

The prosecutors had described him as the "worst possible type of criminal," while the detense attorneys said he had been innocent of crime since 1904 when he came within the day of hanging.

Arrested some 30 times since 1923, Sammons has spent 24 of his 50 years in prison. Sammons testified he was too intoxicated to know what he was doing in offering the bribe.

"This man," John Underwood, chief deputy prosecutor, told the jury, "has been convicted as a rapist, robber, murderer of a policeman and burglar. He has lived from crime since he was 15 years old—35 years ago."

Sammons was sentenced to five years imprisonment in 1900 for attacking an 11-year-old girl with four others. He was paroled February 26, 1903. Two months later he was arrested for the murder of a saloon keeper and was convicted and sentenced to hang.

In 1904, the day before execution of sentence. Gov. Richard Yates commuted his sentence to life imprisonment. In 1917 he escaped, but was recaptured a few months later and identified as a drug store robber. In 1923 Gov. Len Small commuted his sentence.

Suspect in Marder.

Preed on parole in 1924, Sammon's record became a series of arrests upon

record became a series of arrests upon yarious charges.

Among them were frequent arrests for carrying weapons, a suspect in the slaying of Assistant State's Attorney William McSwiggan in 1926, International Harvester Co. hold-up of which he was acquitted, although he forfeited bail of \$35,000 for appearance at trial, and indictment in connection with the Baltimore, Md., hold-up.

He was arrested three times as a fugitive from justice for Baltimore, but each time managed to wriggle free. In 1930 he was returned to Joliet to complete his 1904 sentence for murder after the Supreme Court rafed his parole had been illegal.

However, Sammon, was released in 1932 by Judge Edward Shurtleft of Woodstock on a habeas corpus writ. Detainers filed by Baltimore at Jollet went unheeded. He was arrested again last Summer, but forfeited his bond. His name was frequently associated with Al Capone.

The notorious "Fur" Sammons, always protected by some mysterious political influence against adequate punishment for his crimes in Illinos, must pass the rest of his life in the Indiana state penitentiary. Law-abiding Illinosans should be grateful for that to Prosecutor Robert G. Estill, Judge William J. Murray and a conscientious jury of Lake County, Indiana.

Sammons' conviction as a habitual criminal, subject to imprisonment for life, was made possible by convicting him, at the same trial, of attempting to bribe a deputy sheriff.

For a man who had been convicted as a murderer and a ravisher and was known to be a professional machine gunner, that is a very mild crime indeed. Some, more interested in legal hairsplitting than in the public welfare, may argue that it was employed as a mere "pretext" to send Sammons to prison, and that Sammons was a victim of "discrimination."

Do not let that worry you. All criminal law is "discrimnatory" to the extent that its provisions operate not against everybody, but only against those who commit crimes. It has one object and one only: TO SUPPRESS CRIME. To accomplish that end, every possible legal expedient properly may and certainly should be used.

When an individual declares war on society, as Sammons had done, then society should declare war on that individual and never let up until, in one way or another, he has been rendered permanently harmless.

Verne C. Miller, South Dakota desperado alain near Detroit Wednesday night, was named today as the murderer of Gus ("Big Mike") Winkler, ruling "big shot" of Chicago's underworld.

Miller's assessins were described as "four Chicago gangeters" bent on revenge for the Winkler killing by Chief of Detectives Fred Frahm of Detroit, who advanced the fiction-like but logical theory.



Vivian Gibson and Bobbie Moore two of the women in Verne Miller's life, received news of his death yesterday with conflicting emotions. One month ago they helped the little desperado escape a trap set by govern-ment agents at the Sherone hotel, 4423 Sheridan road. For this both were sentenced on Wednesday to serve a year and a day in federal prison. The body of Miller, who had been beaten to death, was found in a roadside ditch near Detroit on Tuesday and was identified Wednesday.

Both women are being held in the Bridewell. Bobbie Moore was notified first of Miller's death, Diminutive and red-haired, she came sullenly into the visitors' room at the Bridewell, wearing striped denim uniform and cotton stockings.

"Know about Verne, Bobble?" the caller asked. She shook her head.

"Vi" Gibson also has red hair, but is taller than Bobble. She did not cease weeping nor raise her face from her hands at first. Then in a fit of hysteria she raged at the caller and demanded to be left alone. At sound of her shricks Bobble Moore also gave way to tears.

Government agents arrested the Gibson woman in Miller's hotel room. Miss Moore braved machine gun fire and drove Miller out of the police trap. She surrendered a few days Neither gave any information as to Miller's whereabouts.

Informed by reporters of Miller's murder Bobby, who is said to have been his sweetheart, received the news with the traditional stoicism of gangdom.



Or did Miller's own pals put him to death for fear he might be captured and forced to "squeal" on them?

Detroit police weighed these two theories tonight as they sought vainly to solve the murder of the one-time Dakota sheriff. His nude and mutilated body was found on a suburban road last Wednesday. He had been stabbed repeatedly through the brain.

Chicago police believe he was slain because he intended to "squeal" about a mail robbery.





DEATH OF A GUNMAN.

The other day a famed leader of public opinion suggested that in order to make the war upon crime more effective, advertisements should be placed in the papers telling about the penalties for crime, its costs, and the fate of criminals.

Although the law did not catch up with Verne Miller, his ghastly death in Detroit was so typically the result of leading the life of a gumman that it might well be the subject for the first of such advertisements. No youth could contemplate the life and death of Verne Miller, and find such a career alluring.

Verne Miller once had been aligned with the forces of law and order, serving as a South Dakota sheriff. The records are not clear as to how or why he abandoned that cause and went traitorously to the enemy, the oriminal foes of society. It is probable that he began, like Harvey Bailey, by more or less innocuous bootlegging. One thing led to another, one desperate situation called for more desperate means of escape, and so Verne Miller became a gunman, He capped the climax of his crimes by the cowardly and bestlat participation in the Union station massacre at Kansas City last June, when four peace officers were slain in an ambuscade intended to rescue another criminal, who was himself killed in the attempt.

Then Verne Miller, who had previously been sutlawed, became the object of a relentless manhunt. Never did he know peace, never security. Once or twice the police nearly caught up with him; and although they failed, friends who had aided him were netted, and are in prison. Finally the find was made in a miserable ditch near Detroit of the body of Verne Miller, paked, beaten to death, trussed up in a planket, cast contemptuously aside. He came to his end at the hands of the men with whom he associated as a pal, comrade and friend. He was killed by his own Kind. His death was the fitting monument to his own foul and unspeakable life.

Let, then, that death be advertised. For it shows the truth of an old axiom, too often forgotten, that the wages of sin is death. The reporter who gazed upon that body said in his story that Verne Miller's courage had never been questioned. That was a careless remark to make about a man who had chosen to fire, with a machine gun and by surprise, upon a group of peace officers in a crowded big city. One may seriously question such courage.

And one may question still more the courage

The Coalgate bank was robbed of \$3,000 Wednesday by three machine-gunners who took five persons with them as shields to aid in their escape. The five were freed after a short ride, and the robbers' trail was lost in the timbered hills between Ada and Coalmate.

Underhill, who sarned the soubri-guet, "Tri-State-Terror," for his trail of crime in the Oklahoma-Kansas-Missouri lead and zinc district, was suspected as one of the bank robbers ecause of the car used by the Coalste machine-cumpant.

Linked in Urschel Case He is known to have hidden in this ere is known to have hingen in whis territory frequently since his Memorial day escape with ten other convicts from the Kansas prison, where he was serving a life sentence for the killing of a Wichita policeman.

Among others who escaped from the Kansas prison with Underhill, was Harvey Bailey, convicted as one of the kidnapers of Charles P. Urschel, Oklahoma City oil man, and sentenced to life in the federal penitentiary.



CLOSE CALL FOR UNDERHILL.

Barely Facapea Oklahoma Posse-One Man Held.

(By the Associated Press.)

SEMINOLE, OR., Dec. 14.—Wilbur Underhill, fugitive Kansas killer, alipped away into the Southeastern Oklahoma hills barely shead of a posse tonight, but the officers came home with one captive.

Declaring Underhill cluded capture "by seventy-five yards" when the searchers descended upon a house between here and Ada, Jake Sims, police chief of Seminole, said Bruce Brady, reputedly a brother of Bob Brady, who escaped with Underhill last Memorial day from the Kansas state prison, was being held at Ada.

Arrested with Brady, Chief Sims said, was Houston Nash, at whose father's home the arrests were made. Nash later was released.

Considerable secrecy was thrown around the capture by the possemen, Sheriff Bob Kaiser of Ada declaring earlier he knew nothing about the arrests. Sims, one of the leaders of the posse, confirmed them, however, and said over \$15 in nickels and dimes, believed taken in yesterday's robbery of the First National Bank at Coalgate, was seized by the possemen.

It was Bruce Brady, said Sims, who reputedly was "best man" at Underhill's recent wedding at Coalgate.

Underhill and two other machinegunners have been sought for yesterday's Coalgate bank robbery, and Chief Sims said Brady would be held for an inquiry into this and for investigation as to Underhill's wheretabouts.



Notorious Outlaw Crawls Away After Being Hurt: Wife Is Captured

By United Free SHAWNEE, Okla. — Wilbur Underhill, notorious killer and desperado, was captured here today, a few hours after he was wounded by a hail of machine gun slugs from guns of possemen.



The U. S. government relentless by pursued Wilbur Underhill primarily because two federal officers were among the victims of ruthless machine gunners at the Kanasa City massacre.

As world famous as the maxim that the Royal Northwest Mounted always gets his man, is the axiom that a criminal cannot kill a U.S. agent and get away with it.

Underhill could have gone din
murdering drug store clerks and
policemen indefinitely with out
arousing any interest from the federal government. But his mistake,
if he actually participated, was in
holding one of the machine guns
which mowed down officers of
Uncle Bam in an effort to reacue a
prisoner in their custody.

R. H. Colvin, U. S. agent in charge of the bureau of investigation at Oklahoma City, had laid a net over the entire southwest through which Underhill could not have escaped and could flounder at large only for an indefinite period.

The Trap Is Set

He was practically the only suspect in the Kansas City massacre which had not been captured or killed and it was absolutely necessary to run Underhill to earth to wipe clean the bloody blot on the escutcheon of Uncle Sam.

Twice Underhill slipped through the fingers of buildog-like Colvin. Once, on a tip that he was at a town in southeastern Oklahoma. Colvin and a gang of U. S. agents sped there in an auto. They passed Underhill on the way, but he recognized them also, and speeded out of sight.

Again at Konawa, two weeks ago, when it seemed that Underhill's doom had been sealed, he jumped out the window of a surrounded house, leaped into his car and sped away.

But Saturday morning Colvin made certain of his prey. He himself held the machine gun which whipped bullet after bullet into the alim body of the sandy-haired killer.

Captured Balley
With the capture of Underhill,

Colvin had the second scalp at his belt of the 11 bandits who escaped from Lansing penitentiary on Memorial Day.

Harvey Bailey, another of the excaped, was asleep at the Shannon farm, where Charles P. Urschel; Oklahoma City millionaire oil man had been held captive nine days, when a party headed by Colvin poked guns in his side and ended his brief liberty.





WILBUR UNDERHIL FUGITIVE CONVICT HELD IN OKLAHO

Desperado Severely Wounded Fleeing Officers Shortly Before Capture.

BRIDE IS AMONG THREE OTHERS TAKEN IN RAID

Led Break From Kansas Prison and Was Wanted for Slaying of Frank Hesh.

SHAWNEE, Okla., December 30.-Dazed and bleeding, Wilbur Underhill, Southwestern desperado, was captured here abortly after 7 a.m. today.

A squad of officers, largely Oklahoma Oity police, found him in a small furniture store in the heart of the business district. He offered no resistance.

He had broken into the store in an effort to clude pursuers after being wounded dangerously a few hours before in escaping from a house surrounded by a posse.

The captured man was taken to Municipal Hospital, where physicians said he had only slight chance of recovery. He was suffering from wounds in the back, left arm, right leg and scalp.

Underhill was one of two leaders of the Memorial day break of 11 prisoners from the Kansas Penitentiary Lansing.

*Tri-State Terror" Abandons Hope for Life. With Body Riddled.

By the Associated Press.

SHAWNEE, Okla,, December 30.-The "Tri-State Terror," Wilbur Underhill-killer, bank robber, machine gunper and prison breaker-lay in a dying condition tonight, his body almost riddied by police bullets, and law enforcement agencies checked off another name on the dwindling list of Southwestern bad men still at large.

"I don't think I can live." he told his bride, a pretty brunette whom he married at Conigate, Okla., several Weeks ago.

Hospital physicians expressed the belief that the outlaw would not live, and officers voiced amazement that Underhill had been able to escape from a house where he was trapped and wounded in a gun fight early today.

Bleeding from more than half a dozen wounds and scantily clad. Under-bill ran from the house under a hail of lead and found refuge in a furniture

Quite Without Fight.

Pour hours later he was found hiding

in a bed in the rear of the store. He surrendered without a fight, although still armed with a pistol.

Underhill was a leader of the break of 11 convicts from the Kansas Penitentiary last Memorial day and is under indictment for the machine gun killing of four officers and Frank Nash, Pederal convict, at Kansas City last hune.

R. H. Colvin, Department of Justice agent from Oklahoma City, and a group of other officers trailed Understill to the house.

The bandit's wife were several large diamonds when taken to the hospital to see her husband. She was attrac-tively dressed.

Assuring his wife the officers "have nothing against you." Underhill told her where she could find his automobiles and valuable papers.

But the only "valuable papers" officers had located were \$5.300 in bonds of the Franklin Title & Trust Co. of Kentucky, found in the outlaw's clothing after he staggered from the raided lanuse.

Before his wife came to the hospital' the outlaw had boasted that he "would have"

The posse which raided the hideout included Frank Smith, another Okla-homa City Federal operative, who was a survivor in the Kansas City Union

When the officers shouted at him surrender, Underhill whirled, grabbed two automatic pistols off a small table and fired.

Police Fire Is General.

His first shot brought a rain of lead from the possemen's machine guns shotguns, rifles and revolvers. The officers ahot not only into the Underhill bed room but into an adjoining room which was dark. Roe and the Nichols woman were in the dark room.

"We saw Underhill starger when the volley opened," said Huri. "Then he jumped into another rotte. His wife fainted."

The firing lulled, then Underhill darted from the front door and ran across muddy ground into the darkness. He disappeared behind another house.

Shawnee, Okla., Dec. 30.-(AP)-The "tristate terror," Wilbur Underhill-killer, bank robber, machine gunner and prison breaker-lay in a dying condition tonight, his body almost riddled by police bullets, and law-enforcement agencies checked off another name on the dwindling list of Southwestern bad men still at large.





The notorious mates of the three attractive women were among the 11 convicts who made their way to freedom in the Memorial Day break from the Lansing, Kan., penitentiary, led by Harvey Bailey.

Arrested separately and under different circumstances, the three well-dressed women all were behind the same kind of bars today, booked for "investigation."

Mrs. Hazel Underhill, 35, dark and small, and mother of three children, was brought to the county fail here from Shawnee, where her notorious out-law husband was riddled with bullets last week in his capture there.

Mrs. Ruth—or Beulah—Clark, was arrested in the 700 block S. Shartel-av by detectives Clarence Hurt and Mickey Ryan, after Mrs. Leona Brady, 22, was arrested on a reckless driving charge and placed in jail in default of a \$6 fine.

A BTORY - WITHIN-A-STORY lies in the arrest and police trial of pretty Leona Brady.

She arrived in the city early this week to visit her mother, Mrs. Bessie Defer, in whose bome Mrs. Clark was arrested. She came here from Tucumcari, N. Mex., where three months ago her husband was seriously wounded in a gun battle with officers that ended with the capture and return to prison of Jim Clark.

Driving to on the El Reno high-

way, a police accur car crowded her to the curb and the two officers "looked her over." They did not recognize her as Bob Brady's wife, but were merely examining the car and occupant because of the foreign license tag.

Then, Wednesday Leona backed out of the driveway at her mother's home and amashed into the car of A. D. Saul, 3219 NW 15thst. Saul signed a reckless driving complaint against Mrs. Brady and she was taken to the police station.

It is a question whether or not Police Sgt. Lee Mullenix recognized Mrs. Leons Brady as the wife of the criminal, Bob Brady. He knew her about six years ago when she and Brady were bootlegging here.

At any rate, Bgt. Mullenix released her on her own bond with the promise she would appear in court the next day.

"They are holding me under investigation now, but I intended to serve out the six days, anyway," she laughed.



Wilbur Underhill, killer, bank robber, kidnaper and escaped convict, who shared "honors" with "Pretty Boy" Floyd, Verne Miller and John Dillinger, as the "hottest" men in the United States, met his Waterloo, Dec. 80, in Shawnee, Okla. Previous to his escape from Kansas State Penitentiary on May 30, when he led ten others to freedom, Underhill had killed two policemen and robbed sev-eral banks. Following his escape, he is thought to have been a participant in the Kansas City massacre in which four officers lost their lives. He robbed many banks in Oklahoms and Missouri since last May, and was probably deserving of the title of the Tri-State Terror."

Shawnee and Oklahoma City officers working under R. H. Colvin, Department of Justice agent, surrounded a Shawnee residence. Colvin saw Underhill and shouted to him to surernder. Instead, Underhill grabbed two pistols and began firing. Underhill, wounded eleven times, escaped from the building, but was caught four hours later in a store 16 blocks away. He died Jan. 8.

Seeking John Dillinger and his gang of murderers and robbers, a squad of Chicago police, led by Captain John Stege, raided a fashionable Rogers Park apartment, with the net result of three lead gangsters, Louis Katz witz, Charles Tattiebaum, alias Chuck Tilden, and Sam Ginsburg, a paroled Michigan convict. None were members of the Dillinger mob.

Tritlebaum and Katzewitz escaped from the county jail at Othewa, Ill., June 15, 1932. They had previously jobbed a bank in Streator of \$52,000. While at large they shot and killed two Chicago policemen, John Skopok

Rat Catching.

The machinery of law enforcement slips a cog now and again, and some desperate death deserving criminal goes long unhung. But if anyone concludes from this that fustice has been hidnaped and the social order is helpless against gangs and their rackets let him take heart from the story whose latest chapter has been written in the capture and probable mortal wounding of Wilbur Underhill.

Beginning seven months ago there occurred in the southwest a series of events which constituted s ancering challenge to the forces of law and order. It began with the escape from the Kansas penitentiary of a group of hardened criminals, most of them serving time for bank robbery or murder. It was headed by Wilbur Underhill and Harvey Balley. Two weeks later it was followed by an attempt to take Frank Nash, another southwest gangster, from federal officials at the union station in Kansas City. Nash and four police guards were killed. Underhill and Bailey were accessories to that crime. Later came the kidnaping of Charles F. Urschel from his home at Oklahoma City. Bailey was one of the principals in that affair. In the meantime there had been numerous small bank robberies and holdups, all emphasizing the desperado's challenge to the southwest.

The southwest accepted the challenge. The federal government became its ally. Together they have mopped up. They have shown gangdom that the law is not impotent, that when it goes after its man in earnest it gets him dead or alive. 


