Capture of Wilbur Underhill, one of the outstanding among the outlaws who caused peace officers of the middlewest no end of worry, crases another same from the long list of those whom the federal government some time ago set about to eliminate as a menace to the whole country.

The remarkable stamins of the man is revealed in the fact that he again actually escaped a cordon of armed officers, only to fall ethanisted in a vacant store when five bullet wounds proved too much for him.

With Underhill accounted for there now remains unseptured only one of the 11 desperate convicts who escaped from the Kansas State penitentiary last Memorial day. Underbill was the leader in that affair. He has a reputation for being a ruthless killer and the deaths of many men are laid to his quick use of the gun.

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The striking thing about this chase after Underhill and others of his kind, Harvey Balley and "Machine Gun" George Kelly, both of whom are back in prison to remain for the rest of their lives, is that in each instance the department of justice has been largely responsible for the capture. Entrance of this branch of the federal government into the chase was made possible by the violation of national laws, the rebberies of national banks and the conveyance of loot across state borders. Local and state officials were compelled to give up after a time. The department of justice simply kept eternally in pursuit of the men wanted until one by one they were run down.

During the last everest months many of the most hotorious criminals have been accounted for. A goodly number will never bother peaceful citizens or prison efficials again. All died violently.

Sooner or later the few still at large will be rounded by. More lives may be sacrificed before this is accomplished but ultimately the menses of the machine gun bandit and killer will be removed. It has been a long and bloody battle, but it is mearing stappes.

Let Him Die Now, Says Mrs. Underhill, If Living Means That He Must Be Made to Suffer Any More

Bride of Wounded Desperado, Spurning Our God, Pours Out Heart To Girl Reporter

By FRANCES CORRY I am talking to the bride of the most motorious bandit of the southwest, Hazel Underhill. Her husband, the terror of three states, lies in the McAlester penitentiary hospital riddled with bullets, an unexpected wedding gift from a posse's guns on their first-hight "at home."

Should he live, he must face charges of killing at least five men in cold blood, and death again, perhaps, if he is convicted of taking part in the merciless Kansas City massacre. Should he die he'll leave behind his bride of scarcely more than a month.

The church ladies have begun their afternoon services. Chords from the piano best against the low gray walls of the basement section reserved for women in the county jail here. The singing of hymns rasps against the

A small woman in green broadcloth pajamas bows her black head. Tears alip from her eyes and fall greasily on the brown back of the hymn book, unopened in her hand.

She is pray-ing to the only god a bandit's wife feels she can confidently trust— Chance, If she has ever realized the god of chance isn't to be dickered with, Hazel Underhill realizes it

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For two months she continued her studies in the eighth grade, then quit to move with her husband and family to Nowata County, Otlahoma. When she was acarcely 16 a son was horn, and three years later a daughter.

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She had a third child, a daughter, born during her second marriage.

And thus in a few scarcely audible words, she completes her story of her first two husbands.

She sits, biting a thin underlip, and twisting four rings round and round on a finger, holding back teers which repeatedly some to her brown eyes.

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"If he has to suffer any more, oh, I wish he could die now," in a half whisper she says, and with hardly a look at me flees to her cell, a sobbing heap in green pajamas, with a soft, warm-toned arm, flung helplessly above a black tousled

Notorious Killer and Suspect in Kansas City Massacre Succumbs to Wounds Received in Shawnee Capture 🧀

LIPS ARE SEALED AS CRIME CAREER

Nurse Only Person With Desperado in Final Moments; Brought to Penitentiary Following Mysterious Gangster Warnings

M'ALESTER, Okla., Jan. 6.-Wilbur Underhill, tri-state terror and killer, died at 11:42 Saturday night. in the prison hospital here.

Underhill took with him five deadly bullets given him by officers as souvenirs of the five men he ruthlessly killed during his seven-year reign of blood and powder.

Underhill made no statement before his death.

Nurses in the prison hospital were the only persons at his bedside when he died. Dr. J. A. Munn, prison physician, had examined him a short time before his death and ex-

reseed the belief he could not live

Although his death had been expected for a week, attending playsiciam said he appeared to be in an unchanged condition shortly before his death.

The suspected Kaness City mass acre outlaw was brought here today Physicians said from Shawnee. that an examination of him after the trip showed that it had changed into condition.

Underhill was brought here on dere from Washington which stated that "several mysterious telephone calls" indicated gangater friends were preparing to rescue him from the Shawnee hospital.

Warden Ban Brown said that an army could not take him from the hospital in the center of the forti-

fled prison yard. Prison physicians earlier had pre dicted he probably would live and should be on his feet again before many weeks have passed.

Brought from Shawnee in an embulance escorted by machine gunarmed officers, Underhill returned to McAlester to complete a life sentence for slaying George Okmulges drugstore clerk, in the holdup on Christmas night of 1926

Called Kill-Crasy Underhill's death stilled the killcrasy brain of a heedless machin gun bandit.

Between 5 and 10 persons knows the exact number for a certainty-fell dead beneath his blazing guns during a seven-year career in major crime.

Underhill's doom was sealed when federal officers, their concentration on the pursuit of the Urschel kidnapers out of the way, turned to hunting the man they believed held one of the machine guns when four officers were moved down at the Union Station Plaza at Kansas City on June 17.

For weeks he eluded nets thrown out by R. H. Coivin, U. S. agent-incharge here, but the "last roundup" found him the target for a half dozen blazing machine guns and

Traced To Store

Three hours later, about 6 a. m., emeone saw a man in his underear, bleeding profusely, enter the ear end of a furniture store. When theriff Stanley Rogers, accompa-pled by Oklahoma City officers, arfived, they found Underhill, gasp-ng, wet, cold and delirious, shiver-ing in a bed while R. E. Owens, store owner, tried to ease his pain. Owens and his wife said that Underhill had knocked at their foor and they had let him in, but they claimed that they had never en him before.

Taken to the Shawnee Municipal Hospital, Underhill was given but a Yew hours to live. He amazed physicians who were gradually removing bullets and buckshot from his 13 wounds by hanging on day after

Underhill's mother and sister, who have been at his bedside throughout the slow death, were to plan funeral arrangements.
Bride Taken To Jail

Every person that Underhill asso-ciated with immediately became a suspect and a prospect for jail.

His bride, Hazel, whom he boldly married at Coalgate in November, is accused in federal court of harboring him, as are Lon and Bleepy Johnson, who live between Okia-homa City and Shawnee.

Flees to Tules -

The sandy-haired bandit fled to his girl at Tules and was holding her in his arms when, a week later, officers burst into the apartment and arrested him for the murder.

Underhill's brain had not yet been set aftre to the extent that he would shoot it out with officers, but his determination not to stay behind jail bars immediately manifested itself. The State

Within three days he had sawed his way out of the Okmulgee jail. lowering himself to the ground by a rope made of twisted sheets. .:

A posse cornered him at Picher, and here his "genius" for shooting his way out first appeared. He killed a young miner as he shot to freedom-his second known murder.

He was soon recaptured, however, convicted and sentenced to life at Before many months McAlester. had passed, the penitentiary warden let him outside prison walls by putting him on a guarded road gang.

Kills Polloeman 🖺

One day Underhill dived into weeds beside the road, ran to a cliff edge, and dived over into a creek below. He swam to the opposite bank while guards peppered the water from above, and vanished in the woods.

Within three weeks an officer began questioning him at Wichita, Kan, and Underhill whipped out a pistol and killed him. For this he Kan. was caught and sentenced to life imprisonment at the Kantas state penitentiary at Landing.

On May 30, 1933, Underhill led 10 ther convicts, among them the noperious Harvey Balley, in a dash for breedom. They took with them Warden Prather, and if was over the protests of Underhill, who

Underbill vented his kill-in sleying a Kansas constable during the flight

The band divided in Oklahomi and Underhill, with a gang only partially identified, began a series of daylight bank robberies in Okiahome, Kansas and Arkansas

On his deathbed Underhill confessed to six of these holdups, but refused to implicate his companions.


Officers believe that within three weeks of his escape from Lansing. Underhill participated in the Kansas City massacre. Frank Nash bandit, had been accredited with being the "outside man" on the Landing escape, and he was a pol of Underbill

When Nash was arrested in Arwith them the McAlester, Okia, police chief and were met at the Kansas City Union Station as they left the train by two Kanas City police detectives.

Becall Mannere.

Nash had just been put in the front seat and Pederal Agent Frank Smith had just sat down in the back seat when two machine gunners opened fire without warning from a distance of a few feet.

Nash, whom they apparently were trying to rescue, was killed instantly, and all the other officers except Smith, who escaped without acratch, were killed before I could raise their guns. Just the machine gunners escaped, and with whom, has never been deter mined, though Verne Miller and Harvey Balley were suspected meanbers of the gang. Underhill was formally indicted in federal court for the wanton killing.

McALESTER, Okla., January 6.—
Wilbur Underhill, Southwestern desperado, died in State's Pehitentiary at 11:42 o'chock tonight of bullet wounds.

Prom Washington, the United States Bureau of Investigation announced the transfer was ordered because of rumors that gangsters were planning to deliver the "tri-State terror."

As the ambulance and its two-car escort approached the east gate of the prison, an unidentified cabin plane, flying low, caused apprehension among prison guards.

However, it disappeared quickly and did not attempt a landing here.

Tri-State Terror Dies In State Prison.

SEMINOLE, Jan. 7.—(P)—Shortly after Wilbur Underhill, "Tri-state Terfaded out of Oklahoma's crime picture through death in the McAlester penitentiary hospital, one of his sonfederates, Fimer Inman, was wounded and captured near Bowlega Bunday.

Inman, one-time confederate of Ray Perrill, member of the now decimated Terrill gang of killers and robbers of the yesteryear, escaped temporarily from a posse of Seminole officers after midnight raid on a rooming house pere, but the outlaw was wounded turing the chare that followed. Docors said he would lose the sight of бае еуе.

He was captured with Grace Cun-mingham, a Seminole woman, but a second man escaped. He has not been

Second Woman is Reid Lena Nichols, sister of Eva Mae Wichols, who was wounded fatally when Underhill was captured at Shawmee eight days ago, was left behind in the rooming house by her fleeing companions and was taken into

Inman, wanted for the recent rob-bery of a Coalgate bank in which Un-derhill and a third man participated; the attempted burglary of a bank at Harrah and a number of other fobberies, was armed, but offered little resistance when a posse overtook him at a filling station near Bowlegs. He and the woman were placed in jail at Wewoka

W. I. Eads, Oklahoms City officer, told county officers here that In-man had been identified positively as one of the Harrah burglar gang, led by Underhill. Eads and W. E. Agec, another deputy, returned the outlaw to Oklahoma City Sunday night. Flee in Underhill Car

As officers drove up to the rooming house hideout here, Inman and his two companions rushed outside, got into a sedan identified as that used by the Underhill gang in the Coalgate hank robbery and sped north on highway 48, with the officers in pursuit. The sedan, was the same car in which Underhill escaped from a posse near Konawa several days before he was captured at Shawnee, officers said.

Seven miles north of Seminole, the Inman car stalled in a waterhole and at the same time the posse's car stalled. An officer fired at Inman just before he and his companions took to the hills. The windshield of the outlaw's car was shattered and he

After searching for house in the hills for the fugitives, posses took to the highways and dirt roads. The outoutlaw Caught Soon After found at the filling station near Bo law and his woman companion were legs where they were telephoning for e texicab.





The capture of Inman came only a few hours after the death of Underhill.

UNDERHILL DIES SHORTLY BEFORE PAL IS CAPTURED

Bad Man's Confederate Is Wounded.

Seminole, Okla., Jan. 7.—(P)—Shortly after Wilbur Underhill, "tristate terror," died of thirteen builet wounds in the McAlester penitentiary hospital, one of his confederates, Elmer Inman, was wounded and captured near Bowlege early today, further reducing the rôle of the southwest's fugitive had men.

Inman, one time confederate of Ray Terrill, member of the now decimated Terrill gang of killers and robbers, escaped temporarily from a posse of Seminole officers after a midnight raid on a rooming house here, but was wounded during the chase that followed. Doctors said he would lose the sight of one eye.

He was arrested with Grace Cunningham, a Seminole underworld character, who fied with him by motor car. Lena Nichols, sister of Eva Mac Nichols, who was fatally wounded when Underhill was captured at Shawnee eight days ago, was taken in custody in the rooming house.

End of Criminal Trail.

The trail of crime of Underhill, narcotic addict and killer, was ended by death late last night.

Buffering from thisteen builet

wounds he received in the gun light with officers who surprised him in his Shawnee hideout, he died twelve hours after he had been taken in a machine gun guarded ambulance from a Shawnee hospital to the better fortified prison hospital.

The desperado's body will be shipped to Jonlin, :Mo., for burial. His aged mother, Mrs. Almira Underbill, and his unmarried mixter of Kansas City burried to McAlester this morning.

"I wish they had not brought Wilbur to McAlester when they did," sobbed the mother. "If they had not moved him when they did be might have lived. I just begged them to let Wilbur stay in the Bhawnee hospital a few days longer."

Freedom Plot Rumored.

The United States bureau of identification said at Washington it had ordered Underhill transferred because of rumors of a plot to deliver him. Federal authorities had jurisdiction because of Underhill's indictment in the Kansas City Union station slaughter of four officers in what was an apparent attempt to free their federal prisoner, Frank Nash. Nash also was killed.

The capture of Inman came only a few hours after the death of Underhill.



Assuring his wife the officers "have nothing against you," Underhill told her where she could find his motor car and valuable papers.

But 'he only "valuable papers" officers hat located were \$5,300 in bonds of the Franklin Title and Trust Company of Kentucky, found in the outlaws clothing after he staggered from the raided house.

Before his wife went to the hospital the outlaw had boasted that he would live."

The Capture Expected.

Underhill's capture had been expected for weeks. Some time ago, he escaped an early night raid on the farm home of George Nash near Konawa, thirty miles southeast of Shawnee. At that time he left the farmhouse scaptily clad and ill.

While officers were reticent as to the clues leading to the desperado's capture, it was disclosed that one clue came indirectly through Mrs. Nichols after Underhill went to her shop in Seminole to be treated by a doctor following the Konawa escape.

Pederal officers found the Underbill trail last night as a result of the desperado's visit to Oklahoma City, and Colvin organized the posse that went to the Shawnee house.

A light was burning in a bedroom. Colvin and Clarence Hurt, Oklahoma City policeman, cautiously approached an open window after other officers had surrounded the house.

Standing in the Room.

"Orivin and I walked up to the window of a northeast bedroom in the bouse," Hurt related. "We could see a light burning. When we got to the window there was Underhill standing near the bed in his under-wear, and his wife was sitting on the

Colvin was armed with a machine gun, Hurt with a machine gun and a tear gas gun.

When the officers shouted at him to surrender. Underhill whirled, seized two automatic pistols off a small table and fired straight at the officers.

Underhill's first shot resulted in a rain of lead from the possemen's machine gune, shotguns, rifles and revolvers. The officers shot not only into the Underhill bedroom but into an adjoining room which was dark. Roe and Ella Mas Michols were in the

A Dash Into the Darkness.

There was a pause. The diring lulled. Then Underhill darted from the front door and ran across muddy ground into the darkness and disappeared behind another house.

Hurt estimated 200 shots were fired in the exchange. He said he be-lieved Underhill fired at least sixty of them. None of the officers was wounded.

They trailed Underhill to the furniture store, forced entrance and arrested the outlaw as he lay exbausted on a bed. He was too weak to offer resistance. Rewards for his capture were comparatively small. In Kansas rewards totaling \$600 are posted; in Oklahoma, the state peni-tentiary offered a \$100 reward for delivery of the fugitive.

On the outlaw's record are three cold-blooded killings. He shot down a clerk in an Okmulgee drug store robbery several years ago. He escaped from the Okmuigee County jail, was captured and sentenced to life. Some months later he made a sensational escape while on the way with a group of prisoners to the brick yard. Later he killed a policeman in Wichita, Kas., and was sentenced to life in the Lansing penitentiary.

Convicted as a Robber.

Roe, caught in the Shawnee raid, completed a sentence in the Mc-Alester penitentiary last June. He was committed for robbery with firearms. While in prison he was de-moted for making beer within the walls. After his arrest he figured in a traffic collision at Ardmore, but "jumped" a \$500 bond and has been sought since then.

Back in her jail cell Mrs. Underhill said she loved her husband and

would "stick by him." "I probably won't see him alive again," she continued. "I guess I'll go back home. I still have a home in

Okiahoma City. I'm sure-I will be turned loose, because, you see, I haven't done anything."

Asked if she knew when she married Underhill that there might be a tragic ending, she replied:

"Sure, I knew it would have to end sometime."

Officers have arrested two men suspected of having harbored Underhill. Seedell (Sleepy) Johnson, 21, was held in the county jail for federal investigation after he was arrested loday at the home of a brother, Lon Johnson, near here. Lon Johnson was arrested yesterday by federal agenta.

PROBING SHOTGUN SLAYING

Slaying Is Linked to Nash Plot

A federal agent from the office of Melvin Purvia chief of the bureau of investigation of the Dopaniment of Justice, to-day identified J. George Zeigler, who was slain in Cicero at midnight, as resembling one of the gunmen wanted for the machinegun massacre of five officers and Frank Nash, a priconer, at the Kansas City Union Station June 17, 1933, in an effort to liberate Nash.

But this much is certain: He was wrong, because he was killed in typical gangland manner. And he was wrong because he had his mail delivered at a gasoline filling station, where he could easily be 'tipped aff' if anyone tried to check up on him."

Zeigler stood in front of a Ologo tavern where police said he had been visiting with an attractive weitress. As he lit a match and held it, so his cigaret the killers swung their automobile to the curbing and discharged four shotguns at him. Zeigler died as they drove away.

Police, seeking a motive for the killing, found cards identifying Zeigler with the exclusive Onwenteds Golf and Country club, the Chicago Yacht club and the Mohawk Country tlub.

Gang Murder Bares Strange Tale of Crime

(Pictures on Back Page,)

The mysterious J. George Zeigler, who was slain by a shotgun gang early yesterday in front of a Cicero restaurant, was identified last evening by his fingerprints as Fred C. Goets, former army flyer and University of Illinois graduate, who had been sought by the police since 1925. In one identity or another-Goets or Zeigler-be was wanted for murder, attempted rape, and bank robbery.

Police records revealed that Goetz had forfeited a \$5,000 bond and fled after indictment for the attempted rape of a 7 year old girl was sought for murder in a north side robbery. and had a \$5,000 reward on his head for participation in a \$352,000 bank holdup at Jefferson, Wis.

Sought by U. S. Agents.

Melvin Purvis, chief of the Chicago bureau of investigation of the United states department of justice, revealed that his men bad sought "Zelgler" for participation to the its union station massacre of last June, when a federal prisoner and four guards were alain.

Police Capt. John Stege said "Zeigler" had been hunted as a participant in the Valentine day massacre of seven Moran gangsters in 1929

The dead man was reported to have been a confederate of Fred [Killer] Burke, notorious outlaw now serving a life term in a Michigan prison for the murder of a policeman. He was also said to have had dealings with Gus Winkler, north elde gang leader who was siain several months ago.

A Strange Story of Orime.

The identification of Zeigler as Goetz proved the connecting link in one of the strangest stories of modern crime.

In 1929 Goeta the college graduate. disappeared after his clashes with the law. The police sought him vainly.

Presently in the underworld appeared the figure of Zeigier, robber and killer Police sought him, too, but never found

It took death to prove what had never been suspected before—that the college graduate and the desperado were the same. It was a figure

Bought After Boldup Murder.

He was pext sought after an attempted robbery of Dr. Henry R. Gross, who was held up in his automobile in front of his home at \$30 Galt avenue. In the gun battle that followed the doctor's resistance the doctor was wounded and his chauffeur. Barney Hernandez, was slain.

Investigating the murder, the police arrested Roger Bessmer, who subsequently confessed and named Goets as one of the robbers. Bessmer was later tried and convicted for his part in the crime. That was in 1926.

In 1929 the Farmers and Merchants bank at Jefferson, Wis., was robbed of \$352,000 in each and bonds. War-anip were issued for six men. Only of thim was Goets. Another Winkler. Goets was not caught, he

ever, and thereafter he vanished. Soon the man named Zeigler appeared in the underworld.

The Kaneas City Massacre. Then came the Kansas City Union rtation messacre.

At first she made no definite statement except to say she felt the dead man was not her brother. She added, bowever, that she had not seen Goets for nine years.

Identified by Tavern Owner.

Mangan was taken to the station for questioning when a check for \$5, made out to the F. M. Mangan, Sealty Company, was found among the victim's effects. The check was dated Feb. 7, 1934, although Mangan masted he had not seen Zeigler, whom he knew as a landscape gardener, for about two months.

No Permanent Address.

Pirelli was roused from sleep at his home and informed of the murder, but contributed no substantial clew to the dead man's activities other than that ne, too, had known him as a representative for a land-scaping concern. He said Zeigler had used his gas station as a maining address for the last two years. Zeigler had explained that he had no permanent address and since he was a customer had been permitted to get his mail at the station.

BURKE GANG LEADER KILLED IN CHICAGO

Victim of Gunmen Identified as Long-Sought College-Bred Criminal 3

Chicago, March 21.-(F)-Gangland assassing have caught up with Fred (The Brain) Goetz, sought for years as the leader of the Fred Burke combination of extortionists, bank robbers and killers.

The bullet-punctured body of the college-bred criminal was found in a Cicero gutter Tuesday night but it was not until tonight that Bertillon measurements revealed his identity.

Goetz, 34 years old, was said by Pat Roche, former investigator for the state's attorney's office, to have been the organizer of the Burke gang, which was an off-shoot of the old "Egan's Rats" mob of St. Louis.

Into the fold he brought as chief lleutenants Gus Winkier. Ted Newberry, John (Whitey) Connolly, Roy-(Crane-neck) Nugent and Louis Waite, and the band set forth on an expedition of depredations that has no equal in criminal records of the nation.

They "bired out" as executioners for the Capone liquor syndicate, ac-cording to police, and shot scores of competitors of the scar-faced gangster out of existence.

Among crimes in this category attributed to them was the St. Valentine's massacre of seven followers of George (Buge) Moran, the assassination of Frankia Itale in Brooklyn and

the killing in New York of Frankis Marlowe.

Toledo police sought the group for the slaving of a policemen during the holdup of an express company truck. Louisville headquarters said they shot a cashier during a bank robbery there.

Son of Pretty Boy' Floyd Brought Here for Proper Rearing

Lad of 9 Comes to City with Mother to Be Placed in Church Hands.

Jack Dempsey Floyd, 5-year-old son of the widely sought Oklahoma desperade and killer, Charles Ar-thur "Pretty Boy" Floyd, has been brought by his mother, Mrs. Ruby Hargrove Floyd, to St. Louis where she is making arrangements for the youngster to be enrolled in church and Sunday school.

Resembling his notorious father in facial appearance, the boy, when seen yesterday with his mother, seemed interested in the usual childish attractions, but did not like to talk about the activities of his bad-man father, known as the phantom bandit of Oklahoma.

"Pretty Boy," who is 80 years old, has been a fugitive from justice for about five years. During that time he has been accused of approxi-mately seventy-five bank robberies in various states, thefts of a score of automobiles, innumerable minor crimes and machining gunning to death a dozen peace officers and others who have sought to capture

He is known as a ruthless killer who has been hunted with armored cars, airplanes and machine guns, but eluded capture and kept defying the law while his list of reputed crimes mounted steadliy.

Defends Father.
"I den't like to hear the things people say about my daddy." He is light-halred, has a ruddy complexion and appeared to be bright and healthy.

THE has been swell to me, giving me money and taking me for horseback rides and I wish I could see him soon. I don't believe those things they say about him.

The boy's mother, a slender, attractive blond, showed the imprint of anguish she has suffered by countiess nights and days of worry over the whereabouts of her ben dit husband. Her sed eyes indi-

eated the grief she has sustained.

Besides bringing the child here for baptismal coremony, which is expected to take place today, she is erranging for publication of an allegorical chart touching on the life of her husband and child. She said it was "Pretty Boy's" wish that Jack join the church, lead a Christian life and not following his outlaw deddy's footsteps.

While her husband keeps the police forces of various states, from Oklahoma to Massachusetts, on the jump following his depredations, she makes her home with relatives in Fort Smith, Bixby and Sallisaw, Okia. Sometimes the phantom ban-dit, while not engaged in robbing banks and mathine-gunning pursu-ing officers, manages to visit her for a few minutes at various places in Oklahoma but she said she has not seen him for a year and does not know his present whereabouts.

Was Pine Husband.

"Charley and I were schoolmates in Sallisaw," she said, "and he was e fine husband after we were married 14 years ago. Then about 1925 he went north looking for a job and got into bad company. His first offense was a Kroger store holdup in St. Louis for which he served a penitentiary sentence.

"He adores Jackie and tree-4 see the boy and me whitness he can. He wants the boy baptised and enrolled in church and Sunday school. His ambition is to give the boy a good education and have him go into a profession

Floyd's Days Are Numbered, Federal Agents Here Assert

If He Is Not Affeady Dead or Dangerously III, He Will Be Captured, Uncle Sam's Detectives Say With Determination.

That is the question in the minds of special agents of the division of investigation, United States department of justice, as they push forward more determined than before their search for the desperado and murderer of Oklahoma. Some federal agents believe Floyd is dead, either by the hands of other outlaws or gangsters, or as a result of a bank raid or killing. Other agents believe Ployd has taken refuge in virtually solitary confinement until accusations of crime against him lessen and he is able to disguise himself.

Few Reports of Him.

Ployd, to whose lists of crimes has been attached bank raids, killings, a part in the union station massacre here last June 17, and scores of other crimes, left the Cookson Hills in Oklahoma several months ago and he has been reported seen only a few times since. Agents assert he left his hide-outs in the Cookson Hills. because of the pressure of the chase. Where can an outlaw hide out indefinitely, without being captured? That is what the special federal

agents are seeking to find.

"And we will determine it, too," a high federal official said yesterday. "We will catch up with him. It may take time. He is wanted by the federal government as a participant in the union station massacre, in addition to many other crimes. get him, no matter how much money, time or men it takes."

Is ST Years Old.

Floyd, 27 years old, and sometimes called "the boy with a girl's face," in addition to his more familiar nickname, "Pretty Boy," last was reported from Holdenville, Ok., when C. M. Reber, ballistics expert for the state bureau of criminal identification, said May 15 that Floyd was crippled and his days were numbered. Reber asserted Floyd had made his last raid. Floyd, at that time, was represented Kansas City.

of Reber, said here that if Floyd was suffering from that nature of poison, and considering other information that has reached the ears of the department of justice, the outlaw cannot walk without the aid of crutches.

May Be Walting the End.

Therefore, the agents who are working on that theory believe Floyd has taken refuge in some virtually impassable hills and is awaiting the end, providing the end has not arrived.

The alaying of Clyde Barrow and Bonnie Parker leaves at large only a few of the more dangerous outlaws who have blazed a criss-cross trail of crime across the Southwest the last year or two.

Names that still loom on federal and police blotters over the United States and Canada include, in addition to Floyd, those of Jim Clark and Prank Deimar, Richard T. Gallatis, under federal indictment in Kansas City in the union station massacre, and Adam Richetti, described as a former crime companion of Floyd. Clark and Delmar are sought as escaped convicts from the Lansing. Kas., penitentiary last January 19.

Gallatis is sought as a "connec-tion," formerly of Hot Springs, Ark., that added a link in the chain that resulted in the massacre in Kansas

Virtually all of the Southwestern "bad men" of the Floyd-Balley-Underhill type, who became "big time" outlaws, appear to have been products of the "bootleg era." Many of the hoodlum gang leaders turned to kidnaping and other acts of major crime when the liquor-running profits dropped to the bottom before repeal.

Dick, with such aliases as Gladis, Galatis, Galates and Sheridan, has been branded by J. Edgar Hoover, director of the Division of Investigation of the Department of Justice as the "tip-off" man in the ambush which cost the lives of a Federal agent, three local officers and their prisoner, the notorious Prank Nash.

All other major figures sought in the massacre have been captured or killed—and this within a period of approximately six months from the day of the alayings in front of the Kansas City Union Station on June 17 last.

FLOYD SEARCH GOES ON

OFFICERS OF THE SOUTHWEST HUNT THE OUTLAW INCESSANTLY.

Cookson Hills Are Under the Eye of U. S. Agents From Four Cen-ters, White Residents Say Few Bad Men Are There.

(By a Member of The Star's Staff.) OKLAHOMA CHY, Aug. 34.—The un ceasing search for Charles (Pretty Boy) Floyd remains the chief occupation of peace officers in the South-west. The wild Cookson Hills, na-tionally famed as a harbor of crimi-nals, are the center of the search as far as the United States bureau of investigation is concerned.

investigation is concerned.

The people who live on the edge and even in the very heart of the hills do not think Ployd is hiding there. The hill people are indignant. A young lawyer in Miami said only one-tenth of the robbers and killers identified with the hills were actually there. A filling station attendant at Ballisaw said not even one-tenth. The proprietor of a store near Muskogee said there wasn't any reason to talk about the hills at all.

ASSISTANT CHIEF IS THUSE

ASSISTANT CHIEF IS THERE.

The United States division of investigation apparently thinks otherwise. The government has spotted the hills from four bureaus—those of Little Rock, Oklahoma City, Fort Emith and Dallas. Significantly, Harold Nathan, assistant to the bureau chief, J. Edgar Hoover of Washington, has been placed in the Oklahoma City office, working there with Dwight Brantley, the special agent in charge. The capture of Charles (Pretty Boy) Floyd is the main objective, and both Raymond Hamilton and Blackie Thompson, the Texas killers, have been reported authoritatively in Oklahoma.

Floyd, the federal men know, has not attempted the tricks of personal deception that the late John Dillinger, practiced. A recent photograph, less than six months old, shows him as him was five years ago—round-faced, dark-haired, of youthful appearance. And the hill people are right as fagure of the last few months.



ew, shot to pieces, there remains "Pretty Boy" Floyd, who is a bandit in the same class as Barrow and Dillinger, and apparently too clever for hundreds of detectives of the United States Department of Justice. Floyd is hiding in the wild lands of Oklahoma. He knows every foot of the country, has friends everywhere among the rough natives, and the county, State and Federal officers have no stomach for poking their noses into this hideout. He has robbed 100 banks and killed eight or ten persons who got in his way.

In the helplessness of the Depart-

ment of Justice detectives to get their hands on Dillinger or Floyd, Congress was asked to pass a law allowing the United States Attorney-General to issue a reward of \$25,000 for any criminal who was too smart for the department to run down. It was hoped that a huge sum like this would tempt some friend of Dillinger to "turn him in."

And that is what happened. For months Government detectives by the dozen had been hunting for the desperado-not a trace of him was found. Dillinger was living in Chicago, went Dillinger was aving in Cincago, were where he pleased, attended the movies with his friends, but the Department of Justice men there had no idea of where he was. Then the reward was offered and one day a message came to the bewildered detectives that if they would stand out in front of Dillinger's according the street they would stand out in front they would stand out in front of Dillinger's

would stand out in front of Dillinger's favorite movie theatre they would see him attend the performance as usual. The detectives followed the tip, shot Dillinger, and the reward will be paid. 

Erv Kelly told Mrs. Floyd that he would capture her husband alive and have him in the Tulsa jail within thirty days.

If you think you are so damned smart I am going to give you a chance to find him," Ruby Floyd told the officer. "I'll fix it so you can meet up with Charley and he'll kill you dead."

That's just what happened on the night of April 8, 1932. Charley Floyd came riding down the road, accompanied by Birdwell and the ever present artillery across their knees. When elose to Ben Hardgrave's house Erv Kelly stepped out into road and demanded that the outlaws throw up their hands. He had the drop on them, but they drew and fired, and Erv Kelly went down with four bullets through his brain.

And then for months, in fact until Nov. 28, Oklahoma banks were robbed by the dozen. Floyd and Birdwell got into positions in the hills and sent word to the officers to come and get them. They seemed to be looking for battles with officers so they could pick them off. In a daylight battle on the Echols farm near Ada, Okla., on July 7, Floyd and Birdwell, barricaded in the old-barn, drew fire from a half dozen officers and managed to drive them all away, wounding several.

BONDSMEN MAY GET BODY

Underworld Information is That "Finger" Is On Another Man
... Now Held in Jail.

Coldly, bitterly, vengeance is stelking the slayers of John Lazia, who fell before assassins' bullets July 10.

Men who are close to the Lazia case are saying that the finger of death is leveled at all of the gang who put John Lazia "on the spot."

"One Death So Far."

The reports flying about the underworld that one of the slayers of the North Side Democratic leader had been killed in reprisal were given support today in the matter-of-fact pro-

ceeding in a justice of the peace court, Louis J. Mazuch took the bench in his courtroom at the courthouse and began to call his docket of thirtynine cases. He came to the name of Jack Gregory, the alias of Jack Griffin, charged with first degree robbery in the holdup of two clerks of the Merchants' Bank about a year ago.

"Jack Gregory," Justice Mazuch called once.

There was no answer.

The court called the name again. No answer.

Some of the colookers glanced at each other. The courtroom in the basement of the courthouse had become quiet. Justice Mazuch called Jack Gregory a third time. Neither the voice of Jack Griffin, alies Gregory, nor the voice of any other person answered. The bondsmen, Pr ank DeLuca and Paul Ferrantilli, who had put up real estate for a \$10,000 bond about one month ago, did not appear.

Bond is Forfeited.

Finally, William J. Gilwee, assistant presecutor, who had informed the court that the state was ready for the preliminary hearing, asked Justice Mazuch to forfeit Gregory's bond and issue an alias warrant for the defendant as a fugitive. Following the fules of procedure, Judge Mazuch formally declared Gregory's bond forfeited and called upon the clerk, Harry Austin, to issue the fugitive warrant.

A Link With Massacre.

Another interesting phase of the Lazia case was developed when it was learned in Washington today that the department of justice was holding Michael LaCapra for investigation and questioning. La-Capra, a Kansas City gangster, ia held in the county jall under a government order.

It had been reported previously that there was a similarity between the machine gun used in the killing of Lazia and one used in the union station massacre, one investigator going so far as to express the opinion that the same machine gun was used in both cases.

It also was known in the underorld that Verne Miller, a leader of the gang in the union station massacre, whose mutilated body since was found near Detroit, was an associate in crime with Jack Griffin, alias Jack Gregory. That raises the theory that Griffin might have sought John Lazia's. death because of Lazia's known interest in helping to clear up the

LaCapra, associated with Griffin, and known as Jimmy Needles, was transferred to Kansas City from Wichita by the government, A gang of men from Kansas City made an unsuccessful attempt to kill LaCapra on a Kansas highway recently.



The car was a 1931 Buick sedan. It had armor plate between its ordinary outer and inner walls and bullet-proof glass in windows and windshield. A few years after the time his elder brother peased to wheel him: around Capital Hill in that highwheeled baby buggy, he entered Brent public school over in the Southeast section and from there passed to Central High School, where he graduated, as valedictorian, in 1913.

His first job was as a clerk in the Library of Congress, where he spent weary hours at cataloguing new books. Leaving there at 4:30 each afternoon, he hurried to George Washington University, where he attended law school classes from i to 7 p. m. and then went home for his supper. Eventually, he graduated from law school and was admitted to the bar.

Determined to make law his profession, he grabbed at a job in the Department of Justice when he learned of an opening there as a clerk in 1917. In two years he had been made a special assistant to Attorney General A. 



DISAPPEARANCE OF DOMINICK BINAGGIO STIRS 12TH STREET

Owner of Gambling Game Missing Since Last Thursday.

For the second time within a week habitues of Twelfth street are confronted with a mystery involving one of the thoroughfare's most conspicuous figures.

This week's mystery concerns Dominick Binaggio, one of the owners of Tiewfth street's biggest gambling game. He has been missing since last Thursday, when twelve men surrounded him as he and a part; stepped off a train in the St. Louis Union station.

Binaggio's disappearance followed closely on the neels of that of Frank B. (Fritz) Mulloy, another Kansas Citl gambler, who dropped from sight last Monday night. Mulloy and his wife had driven to Tweltih and McGee streets and Mrs. Mulloy remained in the family motor car while her husband went to a nearby drug store to make a purchase. She never saw him again until Friday, when he returned home bruised and disheveled, according to friends.

Files Writ Plea.
The twelve strangers who met Binaggio said something to the gambler's friends about representing the government. They refused to explain their actions, leaving immediately with Binaggio in custody.

j. Mulioy also was reported to be in dederal custody when he disappeared. But as in Binaggio's case, dederal—agents have denied any connection with the disappearance in St. Louis.

Attorneys for Binaggio Sunday filed application for a writ of habeas corpus, naming R. E. Vetterli, agent in charge of the St. Louis bureau of the division of investigation, department of justice. However, Vetterli had denied all knowledge of Binaggio's detention or whereabouts. Vetterli



Richard Galatas, Associate of Frank Nash, Faces Charge of Conspiracy to Deliver Federal Prisoner.

Arrest of Richard T. Galatas, hunted for more than a year for alleged complicity in the Kansas City Union station massacre, was announced Wednesday by the justice department in Washington and the United States district attorney here.

Galatas was seized by federal agents in New Orleans September 22, the department said.

Galatas, Little Rock, Ark., racketeer, was said to be the key man sought by the authorities in an effort to solve the Union station massacre.

Friend of Frank Nash.

Galatas, a friend and business associate of Frank Nash former convict, was with the latter when he was arrested in Little Rock June 16, 1988.

Galatas is held here and will be arraigned Wednesday on a charge of conspiracy to deliver a federal prisoner.

Galatas and his wife were arrested in New Orleans under the name of Mr. and Mrs. N. W. Lee, officials said.

The department of justice agents said Galatas' wife also is being held h**ere.**

Information that Nash was held by federal authorities was believed to have been sent to gangeters in Kansas City by Galatas. The fact remains that at least two cars filled with gunmen met geven officers at the Union station the morning of June 17, and shot down four of them and their prisobet.

Fled After Shooting.

Galatas fled immediately after the shooting and all effort to locate him by scores of federal agents and peace officers throughout the country was unavailing until Wednesday morning.

While the authorities have not revealed all the details of the plot to liberate Nash, which ended in his death and that of four of the officers who guarded him, it is believed that Galatas communicated with gangsters by long distance telephone and arranged for the delivery.

Galatas had numerous aliases and was known as a beer racketeer in Little Rock and as a confidence man. He also was believed to have been involved in a number of major crimes, probably as an associate of Nash, who was known as a murder, bank robber and confidence man. The man arrested in New Orleans is 43 years old.

KANSAS CITY, Oct. 10 W, — Solution of the Kansas City union station slaying of four officers and a convict June 17, 1933, was anmounced by the Department of Juan tice today as Richard Tallman Galatas and his wife, Elizabeth, were brought here for arraignment on sonspiracy charges.

Agents of the department said Galatas and his wife, arrested Sept. 22 in New Orleans, were the only ones to be arraigned today but that only 2 of the 14 named in the case werd still at large.

These two are the notorious Southwest outlaw, Charles Arthur (Pretty Boy) Floyd, and his heutenant, Adam Richetti, who with Verne Miller, slain gangster, were named as the actual killers.





R. T. Galatas and Wife Sent to Kansas City in Federal Probe of Killings in Nash Delivery Effort

The arrest here on September 22 of Richard T. Galatas, alleged instigator of the Kansas City massacre of June 17, 1933, which cost the lives of five men, and subsequent secret removal of Galatas and his wife by plane to Kansas City was revealed in New Orleans Wednesday by David W. Magee, acting special agent in charge of the division of investigation of the department of justice.

ALLEGED PLOTTER ARRESTED HERE IN DEPOT MASSACRE

Galatas and Wife Removed in Secret to Kansas City

Nash, notorious criminal, were slain in an attempted delivery of Nash at the Kansas City Union Station. Galatas was arraigned Wednesday in Kansas City on federal charges of conspiracy to deliver Frank Nash from federal and state officers on the morning of the massacre. Federal operatives here did not know whether Mrs. Galatas will also be charged in the case.

Arrest Secret
The arrest of Galatas and his wife in the Stern building at Baronne and Poydras streets, where he had been in business as a manufacturers agent for a Los Angeles paint firm for three months, and his subsequent removal to Kansas City were executed with such speed and precision that even those who witnessed the arrest had no idea that one of the nation's most hunted criminals had been taken.

When agents of the division of investigation of the department of justice went to the Starn building to arrest Galatas and his wife they left no loophole of escape, nor any chance for Galatas "to attempt to shoot it out."

Since Galataz was believed to have played a significant part in the unsuccessful plans for the Gallvery of Nash, federal officers guarded against a leak of information that he had been arrested.

Officials say that there is no question but that Charles A. "Pretty
Boy" Floyd, his confederate, Adam
Richetti, and the late Vernon Milber, were the gunnen who slew the

Pair Arrested Here in Massacre Plot

The arrest of Galatas, who with Harding Place under the name of Edwin W., or William Lee, resulted from information given to United States Attorney Rene A. Viosca by a man "who is not a resident of New Orleans, and who saked that his identity not be revealed."

"I went at once to Mr. Magee, acting agent in charge of the division of investigation here," said Mr. Viosca, "and told him what I had learned. On the following day at noon, with as little ado as possible, the agents arrested the Galatases."

Little is known of Galatas in New Orleans or elsewhere in Louisiana in recent years. His father, J. A. Galatas, was at one time operator of a restaurant here and is said to have died in New Orleans in 1912.

Galatas was not armed at the time of his arrest, nor did officers find any guns in his bags which were packed and in his automobile. His car, baggage and other effects were selzed by the federal agents.

While records show that Galatas had been arrested on numerous occasions, generally in connection with confidence games, records do 'not show that he ever has been convicted

of a serious crime.

Galatas' known friendship for Vernon C. Miller, former South Dakota sheriff, who turned "bad man" and whose battered body was found in the Detroit river some time after the massacre, as well as his infimacy with Nash, put the government on his trail immediately after the Kansas City killing.

While the Kaness City shooting was largely responsible for enactment of federal laws which provide death penalties for the killing of federal officers, the government can only prosecute Galatas for conspiracy in the delivery episode, in the opinion of Mr. Viosca.

Records show that Galats was operating a handbook at Hot Springs in June, 1933, at the time Nash, an escapes from the Leavenworth penitentiary, was arrested there and started back toward Joplin, Mo., in an automobile.

Besides Neah, whose death was the result of a stray bullet from the machine guns of killers who sought his release as the officers placed him in a car outside the station, others killed were Raymond Caffary, special agent of the division of investigation of the department of justice; Otto Reed, sheriff of McAlester, Okla., and Police Officers Grooms and Hermanson of Kansse City. Two other special agents of the department of justice, F. J. Lackey and Reed Veterii, were wounded in the exchange of shots.

Galatas, authorities say, had been in Hot Springs for some time prior to the massacre and was known as the contact man for numerous no-torious criminals who are known to slip into and spend several days at a time in such points as Hot Springs, New Orleans and other American cities.

Figured to Leave

What his connection was with Miller or Nash has not been definitely determined by the governmet.

Since a short time after the futile delivery attempt Galatas has, as far as government officials know, had no contact with anyone connected with arrangements for the attempted delivery or the actual delivery attempt.

Galaias told federal officers that he and his wife had planned to leave New Orleans "for good" on the Tuesday following his arrest on Saturday.

Miller, supposedly the ringleader of the mob which did the shooting, occupied a residence in a fashionable section of Kansas City up to the date of the killings. He fled from Kansas City two days after the shooting.

Nash, who was a notorious bank and mail robber and killer of the Southwest, had escaped from Leavenworth in October, 1930, and often prior to his arrest had evaded expeture "with barely a minute to

Indictments have been returned against the following who were allegedly involved either in the actual slaying or in plans incident to the massacre: Harvey J. Balley, Harbert Allen Farmer, Mrs. Farmer, Mrs. Nash, Frank B. Mulloy, Wilhur Underhill, Robert C. Brady, Miller, Mrs. E. B. (Louise) Conner and Louis (Doc) Stacci.

Bailey is serving a life sentence in Alcatrax for the Urschel kidnaping; Underhill, Brady and Miller have been killed; Mrs. Nash, Mulloy, Stacel, Mr. and Mrs. Farmer and Mrs. Conner have been apprehended in the case and now are at liberty on bonds.

Sēized Here In Massacre

Station Killing Suspect Taken By U. S.

Prank Galatas, alleged go-between in the Kansas City Union Station massacre in which five men were killed, June 17, 1933, was arrested in New Orleans more than two weeks ago and spirited away by airplane to Kansas City.

This was learned today through a formal announcement made in Washington today by the Department of Justice.

Agents of the division of investigation of the department, tipped off by an informer, tailed and trapped Galatas here and, in Kansas City today, were scheduled to arraign him on a charge of conspiracy to deliver an escaped federal prisoner.

Under the name of E. W. Lee, Galatas had been living for three months in New Orleans. He had an apartment with his wife, Elizabeth Galatas, at 912 Harding place. The apartment letter was F.

He operated a legitimate business as a manufacturer's agent with an office in the Stern building, Baronne and Perdido.

It was in his office there, at 1 p. m., September 22, that he was arrested with his wife by a squad of Department of Justice men. He made no resistance when the agents swept in with drawn guns, ready for action. Neither Galatas nor his wife was armed.

Ployd was imperfectly identified by a witness—the story was, since he had no direct connection with the man the killers sought to free, that he was herving as a hired gunman for others, among whom were mentioned Harvey Balley. Involved in the preliminaries to the massacre, according to the department's agents here, are Herve Parmer of Joplin, Mo.; Doe Spect of Chicago and Frank Mulloy of Kansas City.

Story of Crime

Miller is dead and Floyd and Richetti continue as the objects of the department's never-ending search.

The story of the crime begins in Hot Springs, Ark., with the arrest of Frank Nash, bald-Readed, an escaped convict, not a killer but an important contact man for big-time desperadoes. It was Nash, according to the Department of Justice, who furnished the guns with which Harvey Bailey and 11 other convicts had blasted their way out of Lansing penticulary.

Raymond J. Caffrey, Department of Justice agent, trapped Nash at Hot Springs, speeding out of the resort with him, only to be stopped 20 miles away by pursuing police who thought it was a kidnaping. The agents identified themselves and Nash, who had disguised himself by wearing a wig, and were permitted to go on their way, but the cat was out of the bag.

Mrs. Nash remained in Hot Springs and got in touch with Galatas, it is charged, and he arranged for gunmen to make a desperate attempt to free Nash. Mrs. Nash, Galatas and a woman known as Louise Conner, went to Joplin, Mo., using that city as their base, according to the department. They used Herve Farmer's house there and, with Doc Spacel, of Chicago, and Frank Mulioy, of Kansas-City, engaged the gunmen believed to have been Miller, Floyd and Richetti.

Galatas took no actual part in the massacre, and his wife is believed wanted only as a material witness.

June 17, Nash, in custody of Caffrey and several other agenta, was being returned by train to Kansas City for transfer to Leavenworth penitentiary, from which institution he had escaped several years before.

Caffrey and his aide, with Otto Reid, chief of police of McAlester, Okla., left the train and walked out on the Union Station plans with their prisoner, to meet City Detectives W. J. Grooms and Frank E. Hermanson; who were waiting in an automobile. As the party started to step into the automobile, two men stepped out of an automobile parked a few feet away, and opened fire with machine guns.

Four Officers Killed

The four officers, with their prisoner, Nash, were killed, and severalother attending officers were wounded.

IN MASSACRE

ARREST TWO HERE AS-PRETTY BOY'S AIDES IN DEPOT MASSACRE

The United States government for more than two weeks kept secret the fact that New Orleans, on September 22, was the scene of one of the most important arrests of alleged gunmen in recent months. This was the arrest of Richard T. Galatas and his wife, the former Bettis McFadden, in connection with the bloody massacre on June 17, 1933, in Union Station Square in Kaneas City, Mo., in which a federal agent, three Kansas City police officers and a bank bandt ware killed.

It was only with the announcement from Washington, D. C., today that Galatas and his wife would be arraigned this morning in Kansas City that it was revealed the pairhad been arrested in Mew Orleans more than two weeks ago.

Galatas, it is alleged, was one of the gunmen who sweeped down upon the Union Station in Kansas City and opened fire upon the officers in an attempt to deliver Frank Nash, who was being taken back to the penitentiary from which he had escaped. In the terrific fire from the gunmen, Nash himself was also killed.

The others who were shot down and died from wounds were Chief of Police Otto Reed and two policemen of Kansas City, and Raymond Caffery, special agent of the department of justice. The gunmen, who made the Tatu and the Union Station for the sole purpose of taking Nash from the hands of the officers, had no intention of slaying Nash. The latter, in the line of fire, however, received mortal wounds.

Galatas was arrested in New Orleans on September 22 in an office in the Stern building, Baronne and Perdido streets. Galatas at that address was maintaining an office while posing as a manufacturers' agent. In an adjoining room agents of the local division of the bureau of investigation of the department of justice found his wife. The arrest of Galatas and his

On September 21 United States Attorney Rene A. Viosca of New Orleans was paid a visit by a man who informed him that he knew Galatas and that he had seen Galatas at the Stern building office. The following day men picked from the local division of the bureau of investigation of the department of justice arrested Galatas and his wife.

Woman in Case

Galatas is said to have been the man who arranged the plans for the attempted delivery of Richard Nash from the hands of Sergeant Caffery and the three Kassas City policemen. He is said to have made a hurried trip in an airplane from Hot Springs, Ark., to Joplin, Mo., from which place he sent in a number of telephone calls, through which means the killers were contacted, and the descent upon the Union Station in Kansas City and the subsequent massacre fellowed.

Gaintan' wife is said to have been the former Bettie McFadden.

Assistant Attorney-General Stanley, from Washington, announced that Galatas and his wife are wanted as principals in connection with the conspiracy to deliver Nash from the officers. The two policemen who were killed along with Chief Reed and the federal agent were Patrolmen W. J. Grooms and Frank E. Hermanson.

Assistant Attorney-General Stanley also stated that Charles A. "Fretty Boy" Floyd had been identified positively as participating in the crime. He said the arrests of Galatas and his wife "cleared up the identity of those participating in the Kanaas City killings."

Stanley also revealed that the late Vernon Miller, desperate Southwestern bandit, had been identified as leader of the murdering mob. Miller was slain in a Detroit suburb in November, 1933, apparently to seal his lips about the Kansas City orime.

A thrilling story of the search for the Kansas City killers was related by Stanley. It revealed the tenacity and perseverance of federal agents in running down criminals.

He told how Nash had escaped from Lanvanworth. After a long search in the Middle and Southwest, he was captured in Oklahoma and taken to Kansas City en route back to Lanvenworth penitenilary. The party of afficers, reinforced with others from Kansas City, were attacked in Union Station plaza by a group of assassins, who opened up a deadly machine-gum fire. Four afficers and the prisoner were killed.

Resources of the department of justice were concentrated on the case and within a short time the identity of the principals was learned. A federal grand jury at Kansas City returned indictmental against Varnon C. Miller, Frank B. Mulloy, Galatas, Louis Stacci, Hebert Farmer, Mrs. Esther Farmer and Mrs. Frances Nash, charging conspiracy to daliver

a federal prisoner. Investigation disclosed that immediately upon the apprehension of Frank Naah in Oklahoma, Galatas went to a tourist camp and advised Mrs. Nash of her husband's apprehension. The department said that she communicated with Stacci, proprietor of an inn at Melrose Park, Chicago. Galatas and Mrs. Nash went to the home of Harbert and Esther Farmer at Joplin, Mo., where last-minute instructions were given to Varnon Miller relative to the reute being followed by the officers having Nash in charge.

Miller was identified as leader of the gunmen while investigation disclosed, the department said, that other assassins were employed along with the latter's lieutenant, Adam Richetti.

Miller was formerly a sheriff at Huron, S. D., having been convicted of dinberring public funds and later involved with gangiand criminals. He fled East after the Kansas City massacre, receiving protection from underworld leaders in New York and Montreal. Miller was found dead in a suburb of <u>Detroit</u> November 20, 1933, apparently slain by gangsters.

SUSPect Held In Missouri 'Massacre'

U. S. Announces Crime Solved By New Orleans Arrest After Long Chase

The long arm of the Pederal
Government, after 16 months of
relentless inquiry, today had
"solved" the notorious Kansas
City massacre through the arrest
of Mr. and Mrs. Richard T. Galatas in New Orleans, charged with
conspiring to effect the release of
a Pederal prisoner.

William Stanley, Assistant Attorney General, said the arrests had "cleared up the identity" of the murder mob, who shot down four police officers and a convict on the Union Station Plaza in Kansas City in June, 1933.

Looking for Floyd

Pederal authorities, meanwhile, are staging a tremendous manhunt for Charles A. "Petty Boy" Floyd and his lieutenant, Adam Richette, identified as participants in the Kansas City crime. Both were sid by Pederal officials to have wielded machine guns in the massocre.

The late Vernon O. Miller, southwestern robber, was identified as leader of the murder crew, said Stanley. Miller was slain in Detroit last November, apparently to seal his lips.

Department of Justice officials were jubiliant over the capture of Galatas and his wife. Mr. stanley said:

"It has been established conclusively that the other assasins were Charles A. Floyd and his licutenant, Adam Bichtes"

FLOYD WAS WOUNDED

He added that Floyd had been wounded by the return fire of other policemen in the manner. The Pederal Contemporaries

The Federal Government investigated the massacre and sought the participants, only because the sizin convict happened to be a Federal prisoner. The murders actually were local crimes.

A Pederal agent, an Okiahoma police chief, two Kansas City detectives and the convict, Frank Nash, jr., were killed in the massacre. They were shot down on the plaza by a machine gunner.

Mr. Stanley revealed Government agents had trailed each con-

Mr. Stanley revealed Government agents had trailed each comspirator step by step until a picture of the entire crime had been reconstructed. The trail led through Arkansas, Oklahoma, Missouri, and thence to several other States. Nash had been recaptured by Pederal agents in Hot Springs, Ark. After escaping from Leavenworth jail, He was being returned there when the massacre was staged.

Trailed Into Canada

Miller was trailed to New York and even into Canada before other gangsters shot him to death in Detroit.

Galatas was traced through a score of States until finally located in New Orleans. Kept under surveilance for a while, he finally was arrested—along with his wife—on September 22. Pederal agents held him incommunicado for 17 days before Stanley announced his arrest.

Federal agents followed Galatas' trail so closely they discovered he had disguised himself as a priest during his futile flight. They called him "suave" and "mild-mannered" but regarded him as one of the most dangerous criminals at large. His capture was conceded to be another "feather" in the department's cap.

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
