On 10/2/65, LENNIE BRUCE, the nightclub and stage performer widely known for his obscenity, who gave his current residence address as 534 Broadway, San Francisco, California, appeared at the San Francisco Field Office headquarters.

BRUCE, who advised that he is scheduled to begin confinement, 10/13/65, in New York State as a result of a conviction for a lewd show, alleged that there is a conspiracy between the courts of the states of New York and California to violate his rights. Allegedly this violation of his rights takes place by these lower courts failing to abide by decisions of the U.S. Supreme Court with regard to obscenity.

BRUCE admitted that he has failed to exhaust his rights of appeal from the courts of either state, explaining that he has dismissed his attorney and is now a pauper. Further, he admitted that the Legal Aid Society locally refused to furnish him assistance and that several attorneys, whom he did not name, had refused to give any support to his contention that such a conspiracy as he described did, in effect, exist.

BRUCE advised that he had made no other attempt to make a similar complaint at any other FBI field office.



On October 14, 1965, the following article appeared on page 13 of the "San Francisco Examiner" newspaper, captioned "Comedian Bruce & Pauper":



Lenny Bruce was many things to many people. Following his recent death, there was a spate of editorializing about his life and career, some of which must be giving Lenny some graven chuckles.

Stan John did, the editor of the West Side News and Morningsider, and this column is reprinted with his permission.—Ed.

He had been found guilty of obscenity that morning and now, late in the afternoon, in the Hotel Marlton in Greenwich Village, Lenny Bruce was talking about it to a reporter from the old World-Telegram and Sun.

Now let me tell you, first hand, that newspaper reporters are trained to seek out facts, and so they almost never catch the sense of the event they are covering; therefore they conclude interviews by asking questions like, "How do you think all this will end for you, Lenny?"

"What, the trial," he asked, "the appeal?"

"No, the whole thing, all the trials, the arrests, do you think they'll stop?"

Lenny was leaning against the wall, his hands jammed into the pockets of his denims, the tails of his green-striped dress shirt hanging loose. His eyes, puffed with the profit of lost sleep, were fixed on the debris of legal documents, tapes, trial transcripts, precedent cases, which covered his bed and spilled over onto the floor of the small room. Then he smiled and looked up and he told it in the only way he knew, his private route to truth, he told a story:

. . . . .

"Okay," he said, "here's how it ends. One day I'm going to get an order to appear in court. Oh, shit, what is it this time? But when I get there the courtroom will be all decorated, dig, with balloons, and streamers, and confetti, and when I walk in they'll all jump up and yell 'Surprise.' And there'll be all the cops that busted me, and the judges and DA's who tried me, and they'll say: 'Lenny, this is a surprise party for you, we're giving you a party because even after everything that happened you never lost respect for the law." "

Well, Lenny Bruce never lost his respect for the law, but he won't get his party, because he's dead now. The cops said it was an overdose of drugs, and a friend of his said it was an overdose of cops, but probably it was an overdose of respect for the law.

You see, the trouble with Lenny Bruce was that he really believed he would get his party. Somehow, he never learned that freedom of speech in America meant the right to speak everything but the truth. He never quite understood that he was living in a place whose standards of morality were set by Frank Hogan and Cardinal Spellman and J. Edgar Hoover. How could you tell him that this was their America, and in their America justice means the preservation of power and religion means you don't pay

But you couldn't really tell that to Lenny, because despite the brutality of his satire, despite the language and the insight and the wit, Lenny Bruce lived with a child's innocence and a naivete which allowed him to believe that he would find justice in Judge Murtagh's court. It was a pretty trial, the kind of a trial in which 15 eyewitnesses testified that Bruce did not make an obscene

gesture during his act but the court found that he did on the lone testimony of the arresting officer. That's how the trial went, and if you were there you knew that the Christians stood a better chance in the Colosseum. Still, Lenny thought he would be acquitted because according to the interpretations of the Supreme Court he was clearly not guilty of obscenity. And that was the Law.

"The law is a beautiful thing," he told me once. "The people who attack the law don't really understood it. You know what it's like?" he said. "It's like the Supreme Court, that's the daddy and it runs the store because it knows how. All the state courts and the civil courts, they're the clerks, and the daddy says, 'Now you just sweep the floor and unpack the stock and that's it. I don't want you to place any orders or change the displays, and keep your hands out of the register.' But the minute he turns his back all the clerks think they know how to run it better, and they start changing everything and ordering the wrong things and it's a mess. The Supreme Court's the big daddy, it knows what is, but the little guys keep trying to run the store."

America is like a giant supermarket whose many departments are independently operated. They are run by such as Johnson and Hoover and Hogan and Spellman.

We have become a nation of clerks.
