Dear

We are a group of Harvard students, faculty, alumni, and friends who have joined together in a nationwide drive to bring an end to the war in Indochina. The invasion of Cambodia and the killings at Kent and Jackson have brought a new level of commitment in the University community. We are channeling that commitment into constructive nonviolent political action.

The main thrust of our activities has been in the area of electoral politics. Recently over one thousand of us lobbied in Washington, D. C. for the McGovern-Hatfield Amendment, and we are presently canvassing against the war in local areas, conducting research on antiwar topics, and preparing students for campaigning in their home districts.

The continued success of our efforts depends upon your support. Political action on the scale contemplated is extremely expensive; in the immediate future upwards of \$100,000 is needed:

- (1)to provide peace action fellowships on a subsistence basis for students who could not otherwise afford to participate in campaigning and canvassing;
- (2) to maintain a coordinating anti-war research bureau in Cambridge;
- (3) to aid related activities: an anti-war publicity drive, a student-faculty speakers bureau, etc.

The Board of Trustees will be responsible for the application of the funds contributed for the three purposes listed above.

If you believe, with us, that peace at home and abroad depends on peace in Vietnam, and that the political system can, with enough support, achieve that peace, please lend us your assistance.

Please help us bring an end to the war and a beginning to national unity. Billions have been raised for war; we should be able to raise millions for peace.

THE STRUGGLE against Communism in the Western bemimphere will not be won by brandishing the Big Stick. None of

HE BELIEVED IN MAN'S RIGHT TO DIGNITY

Author Dashiell Hammett dead in New York at 66

ASHIELL HAMMETT, renoved author of detective fiction and a longtime progressive, died on Jan. 16 in a New York hospital of a chronic lung allment. His age was 66.

Hammett's hard-boiled detectives, created in the late Twenties and early Thirties, set a trend in mystery fiction. His movels included The Maltese Falcon, The Glass Key, The Dain Curse, Red Harvest and The Thin Man, They were circulated throughout the world and some were adapted for movies. Radio series were based on characters from his books—Sam Spade, the Pat Man and the Thin Man.

Hammett was blacklisted from work in movies and television because of his disociation with progressive causes. In 1851 he was sentenced to six months in jail for contempt because he refused to name persons who contributed to the Civil Rights Congress Ball Fund of which he was a trustee. He served three months and was released for good behavior. He also taught courses in writing at the Marxist Jefferson School of Social Science in New York.

HIS CREDO: Hammett invoked the Fifth Amendment in an appearance before Sen. McCarthy's committee and as a result his books were removed from U.S. overseas libraries. They were returned in 1953 after President Eisenbower, at a press conference, said he was an admirer of Hammett's books.

Hammett was born on Maryland's Eastern Shore. He left school at the age of 13 and worked as a newsboy, reight elerk, railroad laborer, longsboreman and advertising man, As a forerunner to his writing, he worked for eight years as a Pinkerton detective. He once caught man who had stolen a ferris wheel.

He served in World War I with the Motor Ambulance Corps. In World War II, at the age of 48, he enlisted in the Army and served for two years in the Aleutian Islands. At his request he was

Hammett's devoted friend, said in a sulegy: "Dash wrote about violence, but he had contempt for it, and thus he had contempt for beroics. He believed in man's right to dignity, and never in all the years did he play anybody's game but his own—he never lied, he never faked, he never stooped."


EUGENE LYONS, in the "Red Decade", states that the Third Congress of the League of American Writers was not aware of what was going on in Europe, for the reason that at that very time secret negotiations between Moscox and Berlin were taking place. Despite this situation the Call for the Congress listed among the aims of the Congress the following: "Cooperation of this country with other nations and people opposed to Facism, including the Soviet Union, which has been the most constant defender of people."

The "Red Decade" states that of the 72 signers for the 1939 Call, at least fourteen were generally known to be members of the Communist Party, while the others were names that had become fixtures on Stalinist manifestos and whitewash documents. DR. ROBERT COLES was born in 1929 and is presently Research Psychiatrist at Harvard University Health Service. He has not been investigated by us, but files reveal he was active as an Advisor to the Council of Federated Organizations in connection with its Mississippi Summer Project in 1964.

NORMAN DORSEN, general counsel of the American Civil Liberties Union, has not been investigated by us, but files reveal he has supported the aims of the National Emergency Civil Liberties Committee, a cited organization. He prepared a brief submitted before the U. S. Supreme Court requesting it to review the conviction of Robert Soblen, convicted in 1961 of conspiracy to commit espionage. Dorsen was one of a number of law professors who attacked the Department's claim that the Government may wiretap and bug organizations considered subversive without court supervision. In March, 1970,he participated in a TV debate with Abbott Hoffman, Jerry Rubin, and Rennie Davis.

LILLIAN HELLMAN was born on 6/20/05, at New Orleans, Louisiana, is a noted playwright and the subject of a closed security-type investigation initiated by us in 1943. Hellman was active in CP movement late 1930s and continued to be strong supporter until 1945. 1952, refused to answer questions before House Committee on Internal Security concerning her CP activities the two years previous and has been active in some 18 cited organizations in the past.

BURKE MARSHALL was born 10/1/22, Plainfield, New Jersey, and was subject of favorable applicant-type investigation by us in 1961, following which he was appointed Assistant Attorney General of Civil Rights Division, resigning in early 1965. We had frequent contact with him and he was not considered a friend of the FBI. In 1964 he made false allegations to White House that we leaked information on Martin Luther King's background to the press. Regarding this the Director noted 'Marshall is a liar," and he was subsequently set straight on his allegation.

COMMITTEE FOR PUBLIC JUSTICE:

The 11-18-70 issue of 'The New York Times' reported the forming of captioned Committee to be financed by the Woodrow Wilson School of Princeton. The Committee was to consist of prominent private citizens who were concerned that the Nation has entered what was called "a period of political repression. " Former United States Attorney General Ramsey Clark made the announcement concerning the Committee and stated that the FBI had failed to maintain itself as a 'disenthralled seeker of truth' and had become intolerant of diversity within its own ranks. Clark stated,"The FBI for reasons I find unfortunate became ideological sometime back and this put a scale over its eyes. " The article further identified the members of the Committee as Roger W. Wilkins, an executive of the Ford Foundation; Blair Clark, journalist; Dr. Robert Coles, psychiatrist; Norman Dorsen, general counsel of the American Civil Liberties Union; Lillian Hellman, writer: Burke Marshall, former Assistant United States Attorney General: Robert B. Silvers, editor of the New York Review of Books; Telford Taylor of the Columbia University Law School; Jerome Wiesner, scientist; and Harold Willens, businessman and national cochairman of the Business Executives Move for Vietnam Peace. It is noted that Willens' name is no longer carried on the letterhead of this Committee. Thumbnail sketches concerning these individuals are attached (exhibit 3).

The April 28, 1971, edition of "The Washington Post" contained another article concerning captioned Committee and reported that Burke Marshall and Roger Wilkins, chairman of the Committee, acknowledged that the work of the Committee can be criticized as being stacked against the FBI because most of those involved are liberals and Democrats. The article continued by stating that according to Marshall the Committee would examine the FBI documents stolen 3-8-71 from the FBI office at Media, Pennsylvania. Marshall indicated the Committee did not have possession of the stolen papers. Wilkins said a cross section of the 'best brains and experience" would be sought to present reports.

At Mr. Tolson's instructions, Inspector Bowers discussed the Committee For Public Justice and the proposed conference at Princeton with Congressman Richard Ichord (D-Mo.), Chairman of the House Committee on





On 6/27/50. advised that from the late 1930's on, DOROTHY PARKER, a writer, (whom he never met) was constantly referred to officially by w. J. JEROME and ALEXANDER TRACHTENBERG in the Cultural Commission, as an active adherent of the CP. In the late 1930's and early (ALIF 1940's, according to the case specifically mentioned in 1940's, according to these discussions as being the chief co-worker for the Party, together with DONALD OGDEN STEWART in influencing writers in CF Hollmood, California, and in the Party Writers' Unit there. stated that she played a large part in assembling the Committee to Defend Harry Bridges





6. On 4/13/51, DOROTHY ROTHSCHILD PARKER, was, was interviewed by Bureau Agents and denied ever having been effiliated with, having donated to, or being contacted by a representative, of the CP. She stated that she knew LILLIAN HELLMAN, DASHIELL MAMMETT, DONALD OGDEN STEWART, and ELIAMINTER, but not as members of the CP. She stated that she had hever calif attended a CP meeting with them. She advised she knew JOHN HOWARD LAWSON but stated that he had never asked her for money for the CP. She stated that she could not recall sponsoring CALIF the American Committee for the Protection of the Foreign Born, or the American Committee for Yugoslav Relief. She stated that she may have been a member of the American Council for Democratic Greece and that she may have taken part in the American Youth for Democracy Program but was vague as to her participation in the Civil Rights Congress. She stated that she had been associated with the Joint Anti-Fascist Refugee Committee, the Hollywood Anti-Nazi League, the Hollywood League for Democratic Action, the League of Women Shoppers, the United Spanish Aid Committee, and the National Committee to Win the Peace.

on April 13, 1951 the subject was interviewed at her home, 216 South Westgate, West Los Angeles by Special During the course of this interview, she denied ever having been effiliated with, having denated to, or being contacted by a representative of the CP.

She advised that she was personally acquainted with LILLIAN NELLMAN, DASHIELL HAMMET, DONALD OGDEN STEWART and ELLA WINTER. Miss PARKER advised that while she was personally acquainted with the above individuals, she denied that she had any knowledge that these persons have ever been members of the CP or that she ever sat in a CP meeting with them. She further advised that she was personally acquainted with JOHN HOWARD LAWSON and that this association had come about through her activities in the Screen Writers Guild. She said that LAWSON had never contacted her for financial contributions to the CP and she denied ever making any contribution to the LACCP.

The subject advised that she was unable to recall her having sponsored the American Committee for the Protection
