The Council on African Affairs and the Communist Party have been designated by the Attorney General of the United States pursuant to Executive Order 10450.

New York in June, 1950, advised that PAUL ROBESON was known to him, prior to 1945, as a concealed Communist.

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New York in April, 1944, advised that PAUL ROBESON'S Communist Party name was JOHN THOMAS.

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advised that he could think of no one else who would be familiar with this period of the appointee's career.

advised

that he was affiliated with Miss ANDERSON from approximately

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He stated the appointee 1926 to 1929, had not furthered her career to the extent that she desired in the late 1920's and he advised her to go to Europe. He noted that SOL HUROK became aware of the appointee in Europe, in about 1934, brought her to America, and has been her manager since. He stated Miss ANDERSON was refused the right to sing at Constitution Hall, Washington, D.C., in the late 1930's, and in its place, Mrs. ELEANOR ROOSEVELT, wife of the former President, planned an open-air concert for Miss ANDERSON. He stated this concert won the appointee continued that he has had national acclaim. no business contact with the appointee for five or six years but he had close contact with her through her present manager in prior years. He added that she is truly a "great lady" and he trusts her implicitly. stated that in show business one has the opportunity to meet famous people without their aura of publicity and Miss ANDERSON is a great person, both professionally and personally, with or without attendant publicity. noted that SOL HUROK has managed the appointee for the greater part of her American career and brought her to America from Europe, in December, 1935. He stated he is not acquainted with the earlier, relatively unknown phases of Miss ANDERSON's career and has no knowledge of WILLIAM KING, her accompanist during her early stated the appointee is worthy of any position requiring unquestioned patriotism, character, and reputation.

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Concerning SOL HUROK, the following information is noted:

The New York "Herald Tribune", dated March 18, 1956, reflected that S. HUROK, American impresario, and VLADIMIR STEPANOV, head of the Foreign Department of the Ministry of Culture, announced at a joint press rally in Moscow, Union of Soviet Socialist Republics, on March 17, 1956, that Hurok Artists, Inc. will handle future American visits of Soviet artists.

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Records of the Bureau of Special Services,

Russian War Relief, Inc. These records further reflect
that HUROK was listed as a guest to be seated on the
platform at a rally held under the auspices of Russian
War Relief at Madison Square Garden, New York City, on
June 22, 1942. The report of the Special Committee
on Un-American Activities, House of Representatives,
78th Congress, 2nd Session, pages 364 - 365, reflected
the following:

"Communist Party, under whatever name it has operated, has maintained front organizations and conducted enterprises for the sole purpose of carrying on propaganda on behalf of the Soviet Union. Some of the more important of these frants and enterprises have been Russian War Relief."

These records further reflected that S. HUROK was on the mailing list of the American Council on Soviet Relations (ACSR), New York City, February 17, 1941. The ACSR has been designated by the Attorney General of the United States, pursuant to Executive Order 10450.

A pamphlet entitled, "Investigation on Un-American Propaganda Activities in the United States, Special Committee on Un-American Activities, House of Representatives, 78th Congress, MARTIN DIES, Texas, Chairman", reflects on page 1202 that S. HUROK was a sponsor of a Congress of the National Council of American-Soviet Friendship, Inc., 232 Madison Avenue, New York City.

The National Council of American-Soviet Friendship, Inc. has been designated by the Attorney General of the United States, pursuant to Executive Order 10450.

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advised that Mr. HUROK signed Miss ANDERSON in June, 1935, and first presented her in December, 1935. He stated she has been under Mr. HUROK's management since that time and had previously been singing in Europe. He stated that previous to her European experience, she had been

lady that this office knows and is probably the greatest person, from a personal standpoint, of the artists managed by this office. He stated her patriotism, background, demeanor, and integrity are unquestioned and he recommends her highly for a responsible or trustworthy position.

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that she has known Miss ANDERSON for the entire time she has been managed by Mr. HUROK, or approximately 22 years. She noted that the appointee had previously been traveling in Europe, and under contract. She stated that the earliest days of the appointee's career were and that WILLIAM KING

was her accompanist during the earliest days of her career. She has no knowledge concerning Mr. KING and stated the appointee has known PAUL ROBESON only as a professional colleague. She stated Mr. ROBESON and Miss ANDERSON have never been close friends and that Miss ANDERSON has nothing in common with Mr. ROBESON's point of view. According to she has never had any reason to doubt Miss ANDERSON in any way and she considers her

She was born in Philadelphia, attended high school there, and came to New York, where she won a prize in a competition at Lewisohn Stadium. A few years thereafter she went to Europe for study and Mr. HUROK subsequently became her manager. He noted that she lives at Marianna Farm, Danbury, Connecticut, but also has an apartment at 1200 Fifth Avenue, New York, New York, which is also the business address of her husband, ORPHEUS FISHER, an architect. continued that the appointee is acquainted with PAUL ROBESON but their differences in politics make their contacts very infrequent and superficial. He explained that Miss ANDERSON has never been involved in politics and is primarily interested in her music and in her Connecticut farm. He stated she does not approve of Mr. ROBESON's political activities or affiliation. He continued that the appointee's character, reputation, and patriotism are above reproach and she enjoys very great stature and respect. He stated her conduct on her recent goodwill tour in Asia was exemplary and her statements were non-political, which is typical of her attitude. recommended Miss ANDERSON.

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advised that the appointee's family consists of her husband, ORPHEUS FISHER, her mother, ANNIE ANDERSON, and her two sisters, ALYSE ANDERSON and ETHEL ANDERSON DEPRIEST, the latter three of which live in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania.

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American National Theatre and Academy, (ANTA), 1545 Broadway, New York, New York, stated that his knowledge of Miss ANDERSON

is purely professional but he has found her to be a person of the finest character, patriotism, and reputation. He stated she is a great person, who is charming, intelligent and dignified. He noted that ANTA has a charter from ongress in the performing arts field as an agency

Nothing has ever come to his attention that would cause him to question the character, reputation, associations or loyalty of either Miss ANDERSON or her husband and he highly recommends her for a government position requiring tact, discretion, confidence, and undoubted patriotism.

here. He stated the FISHERS have been and are well regarded by their heighbors. Their conduct is above reproach, according to and he has had no reason to doubt their loyalty or character. He stated he would recognize PAUL ROBESON from newspaper publicity and he has never known ROBESON to visit Miss ANDERSON'S apartment. He considers her to be a devout person who is devoted to this country and he recommends her.

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of the above address, stated that she has known Miss ANDERSON socially for twenty years and as a neighbor for the past year or so. She also knows SOL HUROK, whom she stated has closely guided Miss ANDERSON'S career since 1934. She stated she is acquainted with WILLIAM KING who was the appointee's first accompanist in about 1923. He has not been accompanist with Miss ANDERSON since the late 1920's. She stated she does not know KING well but has never had reason to question his patriotism or character. In her opinion, Miss ANDERSON is extremely devoted to her career as a contralto singer and is most anxious to use her talent to further the best interests of this country. She stated there is no question as to the appointee's associations or patriotism and she is positive that Miss ANDERSON has had no social contacts with PAUL ROBESON. She stated they have nothing in common except their music. She highly recommends the appointee.

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housewife, stated she has known Miss ANDERSON and her husband as neighbors for about the past year. She occasionally visits in the FISHER apartment and has had the opportunity to discuss political id. gv with Miss ANDERSON. She stated that the latter expressed a strong loyalty to this country and is anxious to use her talent to further the foreign policies important to this country. She stated the character, conduct, reputation, and associates of the appointee and her husband are above reproach and she has never known PAUL ROBESON to be associated with Miss ANDERSON. She recommends the appointee as an extremely loyal American, a very devout person, and one who would be well qualified for a position of trust.

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neighbor and social acquaintance for the past year and has closely followed her career for the past thirty years. She stated WILLIAM KING, the appointee's accompanist during the early days of her career, is presently the organist at St. Luke's Church in New York City. She stated she has no reason to question KING and has never known Miss ANDERSON to be associated with PAUL ROBESON except to have possibly appeared on the same program with him. She characterized Miss ANDERSON and her husband as loyal citizens of good character, reputation, and associates and recommends Miss ANDERSON without hesitation.

New York, on May 27, 1958, advised that he has known the appointee on a social basis as well as a basis from ten to fifteen years, but stated he is not intimately associated with her. He stated Miss ANDERSON has good traits, is very tactful, and very dignified, and makes a good impression. He stated Miss ANDERSON and PAUL ROBESON have nothing in common except their music and he doubts very much if there has been any association between them. He stated he would recommend the appointee without hesitation in regard to character, patriotism, and suitability for a position of trust.

on May 27, 1958, advised SA she has known Miss ANDERSON for the past twenty-five years and considers her one of her best friends. She characterized the appointee as a great human being as well as an artist of international stature. In addition, she stated Miss ANDERSON has a deeply rooted belief in freedom and democracy, is a deeply religious person, and is incapable of resentment or anger.

Stated she has never heard any personal criticism of the.

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appointee and Miss ANDERSON is humorous, outgoing, warm, and of unquestioned patriotism and integrity. She stated further that Miss ANDERSON furthered good relations in all vill tour and the countries she visited on her recent g her warmth, affection, and generosity were obvious to all. In her estimation the appointee is always gracious and responsive to the simplest people as well as to worldfamous individuals and she feels the appointee is an excellent choice for a government position requiring tact, responsibility, and trust or confidence. stated Miss ANDERSON knew PAUL ROBESON several years ago but has had no contact with him for many years. She explained that Miss ANDERSON feels that ROBESON'S way of thinking is no way of accomplishing good and she was never a friend of him. Further, Miss ANDERSON feels badly about ROBESON'S political activity and has felt that her job as an artist is to sing and not to be affiliated with any organization. that she never knew WILLIAM KING and has never had reason to doubt any of the appointee's associates.

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advised SA New York, on May 27, 1950, that he has been on a joint program with the appointee a few times but has had little association with her. He considers her to be a gracious lady concerning whom he has never heard any unfavorable information. He stated he has had no reason to question her patriotism, integrity, or character and he has no reason to think that her associates have ever been other than loyal Americans. He stated he recalls one WILLIAM KING, who was a piano accompanist. He stated that he has mever recalled him playing for the appointee. stated he has not heard of KING for years. He stated he is insufficiently acquainted with Miss ANDERSON to enable him to comment in detail but has no reason to think that she would not be qualified for a government position.

Records of the Board of Elections, Borough of Manhattan, as checked on May 28, 1958, reflected no information concerning the appointee or her husband, at 1200 5th Avenue, New York, New York, for the years 1950 through 1957.

A number of confidential informants, who are familiar with certain phases of Communist Party activities in the New York area, were contacted during May, 1958. They can supply no information concerning appointee, as named in the title of this report, or concerning ORPHEUS HODGE FISHER.

An article entitled "How It's Done" in the February 27, 1942 edition of "P.M.", a former New York daily newspaper, reflects that the Dies Committee lists the Marian Anderson Citizens Committee as a Communist front group. The article went on to say that this Committee was formed in the Spring of 1939 after the Daughters of the American Revolution had denied Miss ANDERSON the right to appear in Constitution Hall in Washington. It related that the Committee sponsored her appearance at the Lincoln Memorial there.

An article on page 3, column 3, of the September 17, 1943 "Daily Worker" identified Miss MARIAN ANDERSON as Co-Chairman

of the Citizens Emergency Conference for Inter-Racial Unity. This article also states that "A widely representative executive committee of the conference includes.... Dr. Max Yergan, Council on African Affairs."

The "Daily Worker" of April 22, 1947, described MAX YERGAN as Executive Director of the Council on African Affairs.

Information concerning the Council on African Affairs has been set out above.

The "Daily Worker" is a former East Coast Communist daily newspaper which suspended publication on January 13, 1958.

New York who is not available for recontact, in January, 1946, made available a letter on the stationery of the American Committee for Spanish Freedom. On the rear of this letterhead stationery appears a list of sponsors of the organization and this list contains the name "Marian Anderson" not further identified.

The American Committee for Spanish Freedom has been designated by the Attorney General of the United States pursuant to Executive Order 10450.

New York advised in January, 1946, that the Council on African Affairs held a mass meeting on January 7, 1946, at the Abyssinian Baptist Church, 138th Street, near Seventh Avenue, New York City. Two to three thrusand people were present and one of the speakers was Miss MARION ANDERSON. - New York continued that Miss ANDERSON said the audience, as members of her race, should stand by the Council on African Affairs and support it with contributions of money and foodstuff. The informant also said PAUL ROBESON sang 3 numbers and asked

the audience for complete support of the Council.

New York was recontacted on May 28, 1958, and could furnish no additional information concerning the above meeting or Miss ANDERSON.

An article entitled "ROBESON, ANDERSON Pack "Aid to Africa' Meeting", on page 40, columns 1 and 2, of the January 12, 1946 edition of "The Peoples Voice", a New York newspaper, reflects that MARIAN ANDERSON and PAUL ROBESON addressed a meeting sponsored by the Council on African Affairs at the Abyssinian Baptist Church on the previous Monday night. This article stated that MAX YERGAN, founder and executive director of the Council, addressed the meeting. The article went on to say that "Miss MARIAN ANDERSON received a standing ovation that lasted for several minutes before she was allowed to speak. After declaring that she wanted to go to Africa in the near future, she said she knew the audience would 'give until there was no more to give for the suffering South Africans'"... "PAUL ROBESON was the climax speaker and he had the audience hanging on his every wordt."

New York who is not available for recontact, in March, 1942, advised that MARIAN ANDERSON (not further identified) had agreed to be a sponsor of the congress "To Free EARL BROWDER".

The "New York Herald Tribune" of October 1, 1952,
a New York daily newspaper, refers to EARL BROWDER as
General Secretary of the Communist Party from 1930 through
1944. An article by LOUIS BUDENZ in the "Daily Worker" of
May 23, 1944, page 2, reflects EARL BROWDER was elected
President of the Communist Political Association on May 22, 1944.

The Communist Political Association has been designated by the Attorney General of the United States pursuant to Executive Order 10450.

The report of the Special Committee on Un-American Activities, United States House of Representatives, 78th Congress, second session, reflected the following:

"Communist Party, under whatever name it has operated, has maintained front organisations and conducted enterprises for the sole purpose of carrying on propaganda on behalf of the Soviet Union. Some of the more important of these fronts and enterprises have been . . . Russian War Relief."

The Southern Conference for Human Welfare has been cited by the Congressional Coumittee on Un-American Activities, United States House of Representatives, as a communist-front organization "which seeks to attract a sym liberals on the basis of its seeming interest in the problems of the South," although its "professed interest in southern welfare is simply an expedient for larger aims serving the Soviet Union and its subservient Communist Party in the United States."

The Communist Party, USA, has been designated by the Attorney General of the United States pursuant to Executive Order 10450.

The "Southern Patriot" was cited as an organ of the Southern Conference for Human Welfare by the Committee on Un-American Activities, United States House of Representatives, in its report dated June 12, 1945.

A confidential informant, who has furnished reliable information in the past, made available in January, 1946, a letter on the stationery of the American Committee for Spanish Freedom. A list of sponsors of this organisation appears on this stationery and this list contains the name Marian Anderson, not further identified. The American Committee for Spanish Freedom has been designated by the Attorney General of the United States pursuant to Executive Order 10450.

Another confidential informant; who has furnished reliable information in the past, advised in January, 1946, that the Council on African Affairs held a mass meeting on January 7, 1946, in New York City and that one of the speakers was Miss Marion Auderson. This informant continued that Miss Anderson said that the audience, as members of ker race, should stand by the Council on African Affairs and support it with contributions of money and food. This informant also said Paul Robeson sang and asked the audience for complete support of the council. The Council on African Affairs has been designated by the Attorney General of the United States pursuant to Executive Order 10450.



WINTERM Mrs. Orpheus Hodge Fisher, who you advised resides with her husband at Marianna Farm, Joe's Hill Road, Danbury, Connecticut, and is known professionally as Marian Anderson, was the subject of an applicant-type investigation conducted by the FBI during 1958. The results of that inquiry were summarized in a communication dated June 13, 1958, a copy of which is attached. (77-78164)

This Bureau received information during July, 1959, that the name of Marian Anderson, along with the names of a number of other prominent individuals. was included on the mailing list of an organization known as Gensuikyo, also known as the Japan Council for Prohibition of Atomic and Hydrogen Bombs. Gensuikyo has been described as a communist-infiltrated organization in Japan.

The May 30, 1960, issue of "The Washington Daily News" contained an article regarding a speech made by Premier Fidel Castro at Havana. A photograph accompanied the article showing Premier Castro talking with the singer, Marian Anderson, who was presented on a television concert prior to Castro's speech.

The central files of the FBI contain no additional pertinent information identifiable with captioned individuals.

The fingerprint files of the Identification Division of the FBI contain no arrest data identifiable with captioned individuals based upon background information submitted in connection with this name check request.
