MEMORANDUM

MURIEL RUKEYSER

Muriel Rukeyser is the author of articles appearing in the September 1, 1936, the September 14, 1937, and the December 7, 1937 editions of the "New Masses." She has also published an article entitled, "The Lively Art" which appears on page 160 of the February 5, 1938 edition of "The Nation." (61-9182-1x p.5,19,28.; 61-901-37x p.18)

Miss Rukeyser was reported in 1938 as being one of the "John Reed Club" authors. This club has been described as "a revolutionary organisation composed of artists and writers in the United States. It was organised by Communists in memory of the American Bolshevik, John Reed, who was deported to Russia and died there. (Dies Committee Report Vol. I p. 60; Dies Committee

Report, Walter Steele, Vol. I. page 256.)

Muriel Rukeyser was listed as a member of the Writer's Division of the Committee for the Arts Project in a letter sent out by that Committee to newspaper editors on January 11, 1939, which letter purports to explain the purpose of the Five Arts Committee. This letter defends the work of the WPA Pederal Arts Project and states that the Five Arts Committee is sponsoring a mass movement of citizens who are requested to send letters or telegrams of protest against the dismissal of the 1,526 workers on the Project in New York City to the President, to Congressmen, and to the head of the Work Projects Administration. The name of Muriel Rukeyser appears on a list of members of the League of American Writers in a pamphlet issued by that organization announcing the Third American Writer's Congress to be held in New York City on June 2-4. 1939. The following is an excerpt from this announcement:

"We will discuse the following subjects, and shape a policy in relation to them:

"The defense of democracy in the United States, cooperation of this country with other Nations, and peoples opposed to Fascism including the Soviet Union, which has been the most constant defender of peace; cooperation with writers exiled from Fascist countries; support for the anti-Fascist policies of the present administration; support for the labor unions; cooperation among all democratic and progressive forces; opposition to race prejudice; to attacks on social legislation and to efforts to cripple or abolish the Federal Arts Project; in general, the defense of a free would in which writers can function."

It should be noted that the members of the Losque of American Writers have been said to possess Communistic tendencies and the League has been reported to closely follow the Communist Party line. (61-7554-94)

The following notation appeared on a list of members of the "Sponsoring Committee" in an announcement of an "Alumni Homecoming Dinner" to be held in New York City on March 21, 1937:

"Muriel Rukeyser, Vassar".

This dinner was sponsored by the American Student Union and was held for "graduates and present participants in the American Student Movement who, by their efforts during the years of this century, have created and fostered a liberal tradition on the American campus."

In a news release put out on February 2h, 1939, by the American Student Union, it was stated that Muriel Rukeyser was one of the Individuals who spoke at Runter College as a part of the National Student Protest Against the Embargo on Spain as a part of fifteen campus meetings in the New York City area arranged by the American Student Union. It should be noted that the American Student Union is an alleged Communist front organization.

With some reluctance, Miss Sukeyser admitted the presence of some Communistic influences in the "league" which also was disinclined to reward as a serious or important matter on the basis that the felt the purpose of this "Lungue" and many other similar organizations was to combine all forces in the fight against fascion. In the same manner that classic, today, is an ally of ours, fighting on our side, so was Communisa likely to be found working as one of the combined forces of these organizations.

Miss Aukeyser's object/to faccism is based upon the fact the it was intent upon the destruction of desceration powers at least some it, freeded of thought and speech could not survive and the least solid, noting progress. When it was pointed out that her impress in preserving freedom and democracy would probably produce in her a similar reaction against other issue lies Rukeyeer demied the existence of any other force sufficiently possible to be considered a member; that our fight is exainst fascian alone, but six state that she would naturally be opposed to any movement where freedom of apecch and the democratic way of life were demied.

In her remarks throughout the interview, has aukeyper stressed her opinion that the presence of Communism in this country, or in the organisation to which she belonged was a matter of little significance; that or fight was against Pascism, not Communism and that Communism and not be reparted as a manage to this country. She woised the crimion that we, as individuals, and as a nation should be willing to join forces with any opponent of fascism, and that, in doing so, we should feel strong enough to work along with other move musta and nations without feer of leaing our identity as a free person or as a democratic nation.

Miss Rukeyser was quite reluctant to enter into a discussion of Communism, attempted to ereste the impression that her interest and knowledge of this movement were superficial and she answered all questions pertaining to Communism with hesitancy and vagueness. She stated that although collect-ivian may have some merits, she favored free private enterprise but opposed the rule or control of one group, whether it be capital or labor. She did not feel that the introduction of any so-called foreign ideas of government would improve the conditions of our country and she stated that, in her opinic the cooperation of all groups within our democracy, without special privileges to any particular group would be necessary to hold together our strength as a mation, and to offset any opposing influences. Miss Rukeyser declined to make any statement relative to the advantages of Communism, the result of this movement in Russia or the possibilities of Communism in America on the grounds the her limited knowledge on this subject and her inability to foreses what might develop after the war, made it impossible for her to qualify an opinion. Although she stated that she was opposed to the ambitiousness and "land-grabbi tactics of fascism, she withheld any opinion relative to Russia's invasion of Pinland on the basis that she was not acquainted with the issues conserned.

On the basis that she "did not know the answer", Miss Rukeyser also refrained from making any consont on current issues, such as the part capital is playing in the fight against fascism; what place capital should occupy in post America; the continuation of control by various government agencies and the re tion of America to world politics and economy. Although she recognized the ne for some system of social security, she claims to have reached no decision as what plan might be for the best, - whother revitalised industry with Government assistance, may abolish unemployment; whether complete governmental control of industry would be necessary to safeguard the worker's interests or whether the continuation and expansion of our present social accurity system will solve on problem.

Miss Rukeyzer assumed a disinterested attitude toward the activities of the lies Committee, merely remarking that our real enemy was fuscism and that it was not well to lose sight of or divert our attention from the fight against fascism.

There is also attached hereto a resume of statement given to agent heed in the course of this investigation by Eugene Lyons, editor of the American Mercury, and an acknowledged authority on communism in New York City, concerning Miss Rukeyser.

furial Rukeyser was closely associated with and one of the more important members of the League of American writers; that her name appeared on the mauthead of the "New Theatre" magazine, and she was one of its contributors; that also wrote articles for New Lasace and she associated with a group of known Communist sympathisers. On this basis, I would clausify her as a fellow traveler; I did not know liss nukeyser personally nor was I personally acquainted with her activities, but her various convictions were obvious and she was pointed out to me by sources widely I regard to be unquestionably accurate. I have that it has been possible for well-meaning persons to be drawn into these associations, but I agree that aryone who continues these types of associations for the length of time wise Eukeyser did, must be awfully ignorant not to recognize the Communist influences, or also must be a port of them; and from all that I can gather, I would not consider Miss Rukeyser an ignorant person. I am not surprised that she would have dropped out of the picture in 1939, - so did all of the rest of them. Starting with Fitler's invasion of Europe, there was a noticeable "soft medaling" of open tectios on the part of this group and they have nearly become inmudible, but I do not believe that their apparent inmo-tivity is the only proof that their interes has distantahed or that they have revised their opinions. In the case of Hiss aukeyser, whose literary works, I understand, appear to be quite harmless and insubversive in character, I would draw a comparison with other known cases where persons of intellect and prestice and definite Communist leanings could not be distinguished as such through the medium of their utterances. In many cases, these same persons have expressed opinions or taken a stand in matters which was definitely contrary to the Communist marty policy. I know of very few who alvertise their connection with the Communist party, and I feel that the most dangerous ones are those that hide or demy their affiliations.

I would place some importance on the fact that although Miss makeyeer may have discontinued her interest in Communism witer 1989, it is highly probable that she would rave expressed some apposition to the party or its doctrines or its methods, if she had changed her ideas. I know or no instance where wies dukeyeer did this.

An article in the Saturday Review of Literature by LOUIS UNIXAMIRA, dated August 10, 1940, entitled "Language of MURIKL HURITER", states that applicant is a most inventive and challenging poet of the generation. It went on further to state that after the first publication of "Theory of Flight", she went to Spain and worked with the Spanish Medical Bureau, returned and explored the U.S. Highways from Maine southward. The native exploration was shiefly in terms of human values of the conditions which have particularized in the Atlantic seaboard and the direct influence of places upon the people. The poem, U.S. I deals with the industrial disintegration of the peoples in a West Virginia willage riddled with silicosis. Other poems by this suther indicate they could not have been written except in a period of disordered economics. Instinctively a pacifies, she is against everything in any organi-

sation which represents the brutal life of enforced regimentation and national slavery, and she is against war, conscription and the forcing of others to fight. She is unconditionally pleaged to oppose Hitlerian and preserve civil liberties.

Time magazine in December 16, 1935 made a review of her poems.
"Theory of Flight", and in his preface SIEPHEN VINCENT MENET discussed her as essentially an urban poet and the article goes on further to state she is a left-winger and a revolutionary, but her poetry contains no direct appeals to the preletariat and her symbols of revolt are imaginative.

The Saturday Review of Literature on July 31, 1937, under an article of Artist as a Proletarian by Alan Calmer here listed the picture of MURIEL RUKEYSE; with a caption underneath "Proletarian Poet". The article goes on to state that a number of young protagonists sought refuge in the JOHN HEED CLURS and the organization, like so many literary societies, consisted of minority of young men of letter and a majority of frustrated authors and amateur intellectual However, later these same intellectuals discovered that the proletarian arts were chained to a political movement and at this time how was literary sincerity possible. As a result of this connection with the Communistic Party, people discovered the inconsistencies of the reasoning and some had dropped out of the groups.

of the WPA office, 500 Park Avenue, New York, New York, checked their records to ascertain if the applicant was a member of the Committee for the Art Projects, Writers Division, with negative results. A check of the literature on the Congress of American Soviet Friendship shows the applicant was listed as a sponsor of this organization in 1942.

Confidential Informant W. whose identity is known to the Bureau, states that the applicant is known to have been active in communistic literature circles as a writer and is employed by the Office of War Information. Subject is listed in the Orford Book of American Literature as a left-winger post.

Special Agent reported on December 10, 1941 that the applicant was listed in the Third Congress of American Writers, which ran June 2, 3, 4, 1939 and was a signer of the FRed Decade, and further stand that of the 72 signers for this 1939 call, at least 14 were gammally known to be members of the Communist Party, while others were considered to have communistic leanings.

A check of the voting list at Borough Hall, 400 Broome Street, New York, indicated that in 1936 the applicant registered as a voter, but did not affiliate with any party. In 1942 the applicant registered as a voter in the American Labor Party. The files of the Credit Buresu of Greater New York were checked by Special Reployee Agent which showed a cally one credit inquiry and no other credit information. The files of the New York City Police Department were checked by Special Agent Semes E. Amos, with magniture results.

The files of the New York Public Library, at 42nd Street and Fifth Avenue, New York, were re-checked to determine additional articles on part of the applicant in the NEW MASSES magazine and one was discovered in this magazine under date of September 14, 1937, pages 18, 19 and 20, titled, "Mediterranean" Preface on this poem pointed out that the applicant and writer of the poem was evacuated on July 25, 1936, after the outbreak of the Spanish Civil War, with other Americans attending the Anti-Fascist Olympic Games at Bercelona. The only men who remained were those who had volunteered in the Loyalist forces and became the future corps of the International Brigades. The poem itself is about the author's impression of the evacuation as she watched it.

In the NEW MASSES issue, dated April 26, 1938, the applicant wrote a book review on "We aren't Sure We Are Wandering". Searches through the NEW MASSES magazines from 1936 to 1939 on additional articles written by the applicant, not previously mentioned, were made with negative results.

A well-known young poetess, who is alleged to have mixed considerable left-wing politics with her lambic pentameters, is under investigation by Government autherities who are probing political activities of the 1,300 OWI employes in New York City.

RUKEYSER, 5 East 10th Street, New York City, wrote LUDYIG RENN, care of Dr. RIC DE LA LUZA, 86, Mexico, D.F., inquiring concerning one OTTO BOCH who had been with the THAELIMAN Battalion of the International Brigade. RUKEYSER had been informed by JACK BJOZE of RENN'S address.


The copy of the letter from New York to the Director, dated April 25, 1944, advised that one MURIEL RUNEYSER, 5 East 10th Street, New York City was a former employee of the Office of War Information, New York City, but resigned May 17, 1943. On April 4, 1944 she sub-let her apartment at 5 East 10th Street, New York City, leaving a forwarding address of 6635 Dana Street, Oakland, California. This letter also stated that a review of the information contained in the files of the New York Field Division indicated that RUKEYSER possessed Communist sympathies and associations.



With regard to JACK BJOZE, Source C advised that one JACK BJOZE, 1501 Undercliff Avenue, New York City, deported from Fort Worth, Texas, enroute to Mexico City via American Air Lines to attend a conference of the Joint Anti-Fascist Refugee Committee at Mexico City, which conference was scheduled for August 20-22, 1943. BJOZE, at the time of his departure from Fort Vorth, Texas stated he was born August 28, 1913 in Poland and claimed naturalization through his father, Naturalization Certificate No. 1809226. He claimed to be secretary of the Abraham Lincoln Brigade, 100 Fifth Avenue, New York City, and to have served as a lieutenant in the Brigade in Spain in 1936 and 1938. He left Spain in December of 1938. BJOZE claimed to have been born JACK COLDSTEIN, but that his name was legally changed in New York in 1942 in the City Court, New York City.

Special Agent ascertained through that on July 13, 1944 MURIEL RUKEYSER changed her address from 6035 Dana Street, Oakland, California to 5 East 10th Street, New York 3, New York.



is employed as an accountant by the Pacific National Fire Insurance Company, San Francisco, California stated that about the first of April, 1944 an unknown person at the University of California sent MURIEL RUKFYSER to Mrs. BARBARA COTLES to sub-lease the COWLES apartment while Mrs. COTLES was east for an operation.

apartment from Mrs. CO'LES she was not acquainted with her. RUKEYSER occupied Mrs. CO'LES' apartment until about the middle of July, 1944 when she left for the East. understands that RUKEYSER was doing research work at the University of California library in connection with a new book. On one occasion RUKEYSER stated that MFALE RUKEYSER, the well-known financial writer whose syndicate column appears in the San Francisco Examiner, was her father's cousin.


Library, Berkeley, California produced records which reflected that from April 5, 1944 until June 30, 1944 MURIEL RUKEYSER was accorded access to the library stacks as an employee of the Institute of Experimental Biology in accordance with a letter dated April 5, 1944 from Dr. HERBERT R. EVANS, Director for the Institute.

University of California, advised that the records of the University did not reflect that INMETEL RUKEYSER was employed with the Institute of Experimental Biology, part of the University.

FORMEL RUKEYSER was an acquaintance of Dr. HERBERT K. EVANS, Director of the Institute of Experimental Biology, and that she was accorded library stack privileges through Dr. HERBERT K. EVANS.

Preliminary investigation has disclosed that Dr. HERERT N. EVANS is a professor of anatomy, University of California Medical School, Morris Herzstein Professor of Biology, Director of the Institute of Experimental Biology and Research Association in Experimental Biology, College of Agriculture, University of California. Dr. EVANS was born September 23, 1882 in Nodesto, California. He was educated at the University of California and at Johns Hopkins University, and holds honorary degrees from a number of Universities in North and South America.

On September 17, 1905 he married ANNABELIE TULLOCK, his first wife, and on June 28, 1932 he married his present wife, MARKERY E. SARKER. Records of the San Francisco Field Division disclose that Dr. EVAIS is listed as a Berkeley Chapter donor to either the Joint Anti-Fascist Refugee Committee or to one of the committees from which it was formed.





The University of California library made available a copy of "Current Biography" edited by MIXINE TLOCK and ANNA ROTHE, Published in 1943. There was contained in this current biography considerable biographical data concerning EMERIC RUNCASER, the pertinent parts of which are as follows:

MURIEL RUKEYSER, care of Doubleday Doran and Company, New York City, is considered one of the most important of /merica's younger poets. She is the author of three books of verse and a biography of "TLLARD GIBBS, the latter published in 1942. She was born December 15, 1913 in New York City. Being born in a period of beginning economic and political change followed by depression years, the new deal and the united front efforts, her early work like that of other poets of her generation reflects a strong "left-wing" view-point.

She is the daughter of LATENCE and MYRA RUKEYSER. She attended Fieldston High School, New York City, graduating in 1930; attended Vassar College until 1932, and during that year and the next she was on the staff of the Student Review, Left-"ing Undergraduate Opinion Publication.

During the summers of 1931 and 1933 she studied at Columbia University. In March of 1933 RUNEYSER drove south with two friends to report the Scottsboro trial. When the police discovered them talking with negro reporters and found in their possession some "Calls" to a negro student conference at Columbia University, they were held for "inciting the negroes to insurrections" but were released.

After leaving Vassar College RUKEYSER was for a while editor of the Hensatoric, a New England literary journal. In the spring of 1935 she was associate editor of the New Theatre magazine. Heanwhile, she had also taken a course in flying at the Roosevelt Aviation School in order to learn the mechanics of eviation for her poems in the "Theory of Flight."

Visiting England in the summer of 1936 she was sent by "Life and Letters Today", a literary journal, to Spain to represent the first Peoples Olympic, organized by the Workers Sports Clubs.

She found herself a witness to the opening events in the Spanish Civil Ver. In sympathy with the Republican Government she worked with the Spanish Medical Bureau for some time before returning to the United States. In 1940 she gave a series of five lectures on poetry and communication at Vassar. The next year she was busy on film work translating JEAN RENOIRS People of France and writing "/ Place to Live" which was produced by the Philadelphia House Association.

From June to December 1941 she was associate editor of the "Decision" a literary magazine edited by KLAUS MARI. On May 1, 1943 she resigned from the Classification Division, Office of War Information six months after she had been engaged to plan poster campaigns because she said most of the posters had been rejected through a policy of down with the world or through fear of these issues.

A review of the files of the San Francisco Field Division also disclosed during the school year 1932-1933 NUMNYSER took two courses, one entitled "The Revolutionary Spirit in Literature," and another entitled "The History of International Sociology," at the Rand School of Social Ecience, 7 Mast 15th Street, New York City, which school has a reputation of being communistically inclined.

An article in the "Saturday Review of Literature" by LT/IS THINTEL, dated August 10, 19/6, entitled "The Language of IN/IEL AUGUNSIA", states that ROFLIER is instinctively a pacifist. She is against everything in any organization which represents the brutal life of enforced regimentation and national slevery, and is against war, conscription, and the forcing of others to fight. She is unconditionally pledged to oppose HITLIMIST and preserve civil liberties.

The "Saturday Review of Literature" for July 31, 1937, under an article entitled "Me Artist as a Prolectrian," by ALAN CANER, featured a photograph of SPFM. SUMFISER, with a caption beneath "Froletarian Poet."

A review of the literature of the CONTESS OF ANTHLESS FRIEDSHIP, New York City, reflected that MIKENSER was listed as a sponsor of this organization in 1942.

According to the April 6, 1937 issue of the Daily Worker, page 9, MURIEL RUKEYSER was a member of the Advisory Board of the Newly Organized "Frontier Films" which was said to be an independent, non-profit film-producing organization.

The January, 1937 issue of the Daily Worker, page 7, contains an article reflecting that MURIEL RUKEYSER "A young American Foet" had contracted to make the adaptation of the new film from Spain "The Defense of Madrid", a Spanish Civil War film. This article reflects further the fact that MURIEL RUKEYSER was in Madrid during the first week of the Civil War, baving been enroute to the Workers' Olympics in Barcelona.

An advertisement appearing in the February 20, 1939 issue of the Daily Worker, page 8, reflects that MURIEL RUKEYSER was scheduled to speak at the Keynote Club in New York City on February 23, 1939.

An article appearing in the February 25, 1939 issue of the Daily Worker, page 2, reflects that MURIEL RUKEYSER was a speaker at a Hunter College meeting relative to the National Student Protest against the Embargo on Spain, the meeting having been arranged by the American Student League.

The February 27, 1937 issue of the Daily Worker, page 7, contains an article reflecting that MURIEL RUKEYSER was present at a birthday celebration held in New York City by the American Artists School.

The March 11, 1936 issue of the Daily Worker, page 5, contains an article mentioning new revolutionary poems appearing in a then current issue of the "Partisan Review and Anvil" which states that one of the poems had been written by MURIEL RUKEYSER.

An article in the November 16, 1936 issue of the Daily Worker, page 7, reflects that MURIEL RUKEYSER, who was in Spain when the Spanish Civil War broke out, is writing a novel about her experiences in Spain.

According to an article in the November 18, 1936 issue of the Daily Worker, page 7, MURIEL RUKEYSER had contributed poems to the late issue of "The New Caravan".

An article in the September 8, 1936 issue of the Daily Worker, page 5, revealed that MURIEL RUKEYSER "A poet and a recent

arrival from war-torn Spain" was a member of a committee producing and sponsoring a play given in New York City, based upon the theme of the Spanish Workers' present life and death struggle against Fascism.

An article contained in the November 7, 1936 issue of the Daily Worker, page 3, reflects that MURIEL RUKEYSER was to give a talk on the subject "Tribute to Spain", held under the auspices of the League of American Writers.

In the November 28, 1933 issue of the Daily Worker, there appears an article which reflects that MURIEL RUKEYSER wrote a favorable commentary on the Operetta "Strike me Red" which was given by the Young Pioneers in New York City on November 25, 1933.

As revealed by the December 3, 1940 issue of "New Masses", page 28, MURIEL RUKEYSER was a signer of an open letter sent by the Council for Pan-American Democracy to the President of Brazil with regard to one LUIZ COLIOS PRESTES, who was shown to be honorary chairman of the National Liberation Alliance of Brazil.

According to the March 15, 1938 issue of "New Masses" page 19, MURIEL RUKEYSER was a signer of a statement on the Internation Situation, prepared by the American League for Peace and Democracy.

As shown by the September 14, 1937 issue of New Masses, page 18, MURIEL RUKEYSER wrote an article regarding her impressions of the sights and sounds of the first days of the Spanish Civil War.

According to the March 16, 1937 issue of "New Messes", page 1), MURIEL RUKEYSER contributed a poem entitled "Course".

According to the October 26, 1937 issue of New Masses, page 27, MURIEL RUKKISER wrote a review of the film "China Strikes Back."

As shown on page 7, of the December 7, 1937 issue of "New Masses", MURIEL RUKEISER contributed poems entitled "The Diseases" and "The Corn Field".

As shown on page 9 of the September 1, 1936 issue of "New Masses", MURIEL RUKKYSER wrote an article entitled "Barcelona on the Barricades".

The January 1935 issue of "New Theatre", page 8, appears an article written by an individual concerning the Jewish State Theatre in Moscow, in which it is shown that the article was translated for "New Theatre" by EURIEL RUYEYSER.

According to information contained in the April 1935 issue of "New Theatre" page 3, MURIEL RUKEYSER was one of the associates to the Editorial Board of "New Theatre". The April 1935 issue of "New Theatre" on page 27, of this issue, is an article written by MURIEL RUKEYSER on "The American Ballet."

These indices further reflect that WALTER S. STEEL, National Representative Chairman of the American Coalition Committee on National Security in testifying before the House Committee on Un-American Activities on August 18, 1936 as shown on page 560 of the "Extracts from hearings before a special committee on un-American activities, House of Representatives, 75th Congress, 3rd Session, on H. Res. 282, in speaking of the "JOHN REED Club" which Mr. STEEL said is a revolutionary organization composed of artists and writers in the United States, listed the names of some of the officers of the club. Among this list of authors of the "JOHN REED Club" is the name of MURIEL RUKEYSER.







This information reflected that the subject had been employed by the Loyalists Spanish Medical Bureau during the early part of the Spanish Civil War.

CRIMINAL RECORD

The above-mentioned "Current Biography" also contained information which reflected that during March, 1943 RUKEYSER drove South with two friends to report the Scottaboro Trial. This article further reflects that when the police discovered them talking to Negro reporters and found in their possession some "calls" to a Negro Student Conference at Columbia University, they were held for "inciting the Negroes to insurrections" but were released.

BOCA

Records of the Police Department, as reviewed by SA on March 11, 1952, failed to reflect any information which can be identified with the subject.

EMPLOYMENT

APPILIATION WITH THE COMMUNIST MOVEMENT

Communist Party Membership

Confidential Informant T-3, of known reliability, advised on January 10, 1951 that MURIEL RUKEYSER is a concealed member of the Communist Party. This informant further advised that he met the subject in New York City, either at a National Convention or at some conference connected with the National Convention, involving the Communist publication "New Masses". Informant also stated that he had heard MURIEL RUKEYSER referred to many times as a Communist. However, he could not recall any specific instance but he stated there is no question in his mind about her being a Communist.

It may be noted that the Congressional Record dated September 24, 1942 states that Attorney General FRANCIS BIDDLE cited the magazine "New Masses" as a "Communist periodical."

Confidential Informant T-4, of known reliability, advised on January 18, 1951

knew the subject to be a Communist as a result of conversations she had with the subject and with other individuals who knew the subject. This informant advised that no specific instances or statements could be recalled, but further advised that the subject had also visited with Mr. and Mrs. HANS KISLER on one occasion.

On September 24, 1947 HANS ENSLER testified before the House Committee on Un-American Activities that he had applied and had been accepted for membership in the Communist Party in Germany during 1926 and that he had never been active in Communist Party work.

Confidential Informant T-5, another government agency conducting security type investigation, advised on February 28, 1943 that the subject was known to that organization to have been active in Communist literary circles and as a writer. This informant further stated that the subject was listed in the Oxford Book of American Literature as a "left-wing poet".

Confidential Informant T-6, of known reliability, advised that the subject was known to persons at the Communist Party Headquarters, formerly located at 35 East 12th Street, New York City, during the middle part of 1950.

COMMUNIST PARTY FRONTS

AMERICAN STUDENT UNION

The "New York World-Telegram" for May 7, 1943 carried an article which reflected that the subject had been active in the Communist controlled "American Student Union".

It may be noted that the American Student Union has been cited as subversive and un-American by the Special Committee of the House Committee on Appropriations, April 21, 1943.

NEW MASSES

Records located at the New York Public Library, Fifth Avenue and 42nd Street, New York City, as reviewed by SA reflected that the subject has written the following articles for "New Masses":

12/7/1937 issue, two poems, "The Disease", "The Cornfield".

10/25/1937 issue, reviews of screen shows, "The Spanish Earth", "Heart of Spain", "Germany Strikes Back".

4/26/1938 issue, book review. "We Aren't Sure We Are Wandering."

9/14/1937 issue, poem, "Mediterranean"

The preface to this poem pointed out that the subject, who was the writer of the poem, was evacuated on July 25, 1936 after the outbreak of the Spanish Civil War, along with other Americans attending the Anti-Fascist Olympic Games at Barcelona. The only men who remained were those who had volunteered in the Loyalist Forces and became the future corps of the International Brigade. The poem is about the authoress' impression of the evacuation as she watched.

The New York World Telegram dated May 7, 1943 carried an article which reflected that the subject had written for the "New Masses" magazine during the period 1936 to 1943.

It may be noted that "New Masses" has been documented as a Communist front organization previously in this report.

PEOPLE'S RADIO FOUNDATION

The "People's Daily World", West Coast Communist daily newspaper, in its March 21, 1945 edition, carried an article with reference to a plan for the establishment of a People's hadio Foundation, which would operate a FM radio station in metropolitan New York. This People's Radio Foundation would provide a forum for progressive ideas and with regard to this, the subject wrote them, "I shall be glad to sponsor the Foundation The station you plan to establish can be a principal instrument of expression for forces which call for every expression in our times."

It may be noted that Peoples Radio Foundation Inc. has been cited by the Attorney General as coming within the purview of Executive Order 9835.

STUDENT REVIEW

Police Department, as reviewed by SA reflected that the subject was on the Editorial Board of the Student Review Magazine, published by the National Student League, 13 West 17th Street, during June,

It may be noted that the National Student League has been cited as a front organization of the Communist Party by Attorney General FRANCIS BIDDLE on May 28, 1942.

AMERICAN CONTINENTAL CONGRESS FOR PEACE

The "Daily Worker", an East Coast Communist newspaper, dated September 6, 1949, contained an article "Mexico Parlay Delegation Denounce Peekskill Mob". This article further reflected that MURIEL RUKEYSER was one of the North American delegates to the Congress which was held in Mexico City.

Confidential Informant T-7, of known reliability, advised on August 15, 1949 that the subject was a sponsor of the American Continental Congress For Peace, held in Mexico City, September 5-10, 1949.

It may be noted that the House Committee on Un-American Activities Report #378, dated April 25, 1951, cited the American Continental Congress For Peace, held on September 5-10, 1949 in Mexico City, as "another force in the Communist 'peace' campaign, aimed at consolidating anti-American forces throughout the Western Hemisphere."

CALIFORNIA LABOR SCHOOL

The February 18, 1945 issue of the San Francisco "Chronicle", the February 23, 1945 issue of the "People's World" and the February 24, 1945 issue of the "People's World" carried

articles reflecting that MURIEL RUKEYSER would conduct a course in poetry at the California Labor School, both in San Francisco and the Eastbay Branchin Oakland. Subject was to give a series of nine weekly lectures on "Poetry and the People" beginning February 28, 1945. Some of the lecture topics to be given were "The Fear of Poetry", "Poetry of Resistance", "Poetry of Russia, China and Latin America", "Poetry and Belief" and "The Background of Poetry". RUKEYSER was also to conduct a poetry workshop which would meet once a week, beginning March 1, 1945.

On February 7, 1945
University of California, Berkeley, California, advised
that RUKEYSER had obtained a renewal of her library card at the
University of California Library. Subject had stated that her
address was then the California Labor School, San Francisco,
California.

Confidential Informant T-8, of known reliability, advised during June, 1945 that MURIEL HUKEYSER was at that time employed as an instructor in poetry at the Communist Political Association dominated California Labor School.

Attorney General TOM CLARK, letters to Loyalty Review Board, released June 1, 1948 and September 21, 1948, cited the California Labor School as a subversive and Communist organization which was located at 216 Market Street, San Francisco, California

NATIONAL COUNCIL OF AMERICAN SOVIET FRIENDSHIP

The "Daily Worker", an East Coast Communist newspaper, in its February 10, 1944 issue, contained an article entitled, "American Women Leaders Greet Colleagues in USSR". This article states that Miss MURIEL RUKEYSER was one of the sponsors of the Committee of Women of the National Council of American Soviet Friendship. The article states that the Committee is sending messages to Russian women, the purpose of which is to develop exchange of information, model equipment and other materials between the women of the two countries as the means of promoting lasting friendship.

Confidential Informant T-9, of known reliability, advised on February 16, 1944 that the subject was a sponsor of the Committee of Women of the National Council of American Soviet Friendship.

It may be noted that the National Council of American Soviet Friendship has been declared by the Attorney General of the United States to come within the purview of Executive Order 9835.

Confidential Informant T-10, of known reliability, advised on May 7, 1943 that the subject has written articles for the "New Theater" magazine, published in 1938, which magazine, according to the informant, is Communist-controlled.

The House Committee on Un-American Activities, Report dated March 29, 1944, cited the "New Theater" magazine as a Communist publication.

NATIONAL COUNCIL OF ARTS, SCIENCES AND PROFESSIONS

Police Department, as reviewed by reflect that the subject was a sponsor of the Scientific and Cultural Conference for World Peace held under the auspices of the National Council of the Arts, Sciences and Professions at the Waldorf-Astoria Hotel, New York City, March 25-27, 1949.

The January 17, 1949 edition of the "Daily Worker" carried an article captioned "Trial of Twelve Communist Party Leaders Starts Today". This article further reflects that the subject was among the signers of this article which called upon the Attorney General to drop the indictment of the twelve on the eve of the trial. This article was aponsored by the National Council of Arts, Sciences and Professions and noted that "now for the first time in the history of the United States, there is an effort through the judicial process to outlaw an entire body of ideas and a political party exposing these ideas."

NY 100-102/41

The October 19, 1948 edition of the "Daily Worker" carried an article captioned, "Five Hundred Leaders of Arts and Sciences Back Wallace". Among the signers of this article was the subject. This statement charged "the bi-partisan alliance of Thomas E. Dewey and Harry S. Truman brought us to the brink of war and Fascism."

Confidential Informant T-6, of known reliability on March 11, 1949 advised that MURIEL RUKEYSER is one of the signers of a petition which was sent to Harry S. Truman and Attorney General Tom Clark and which petition reads as follows:

"We, the undersigned, subscribe to this statement of the Executive Committee of the New York Council of Arts, Sciences and Professions and call upon President Truman and Attorney General Tom Clark to withdraw the indictments against the twelve leaders of the Communist Party."

Confidential Informant T-11, of known reliability, made available information on April 21, 1950 which reflected that the circular issued by the National Council of Arts, Sciences and Professions, regarding a meeting held on April 19, 1950 to pay tribute to the Chilean poet PABLO NERUDA and protest the arrival of Chilean President GONZALEZ VIDEIA, listed as one of the speakers MURIEL RUKEYSER.



The National Council of Arts, Sciences and Professions and the Jefferson School of Social Science have been declared by the Attorney General of the United States to come within the purview of Executive Order 9835.

WORLD PEACE APPEAL

Confidential Informant T-12, of known reliability, made available a bulletin entitled "Peace Appeal Bulletin", San Francisco Committee for World Peace Appeal, in August, 1950. On page three of this bulletin, under the caption "Americans Who Have Signed the World Peace Appeal", appears the name of MURIEL RUKEYSER, poet, California, otherwise unidentified.

Confidential Informant T-13, of known reliability, furnished a release issued by the Peace Information Center, 799 Broadway, Room 413, New York, under date of April 14, 1950. The release contained a geographical list of persons identified by the Peace Information Center as "Frominent Americans Endorsing The World Peace Appeal." MURIEL RUKEYSER's name appears under New York.

It may be noted that the House Committee on Un-American Activities, Report 378, dated April 25, 1951, advised that the Peace Information Center was a Communist Party Peace Committee which is making available the Stockholm Peace Petition.

On February 9, 1951 this organization and five of its officers were indicted by a Federal Grand Jury for failure to register under the Foreign Agents Registration Act.

Confidential Informant T-14, of known reliability, made available an issue of the "Cultural Peace Bulletin", dated June 26, 1950. This bulletin contained the name MURIEL RUKEYSER as signer of the Stockholm Peace Appeal.

The House Committee on Un-American Activities Interim Statement issued on the Communist "Peace Petition" Campaign, July 13, 1950, cited the Stockholm Peace Petition as Communist.

It may be noted that the House Committee on UnAmerican Activities, Report 378, dated April 25, 1951, advised
that the World Peace Appeal, also known as the Stockholm Peace
Petition, was cited as a petition campaign launched by the
Permanent Committee of the World Peace Congress, at its meeting
in Stockholm, March 16-19, 1950; as having "received the
enthusiastic approval of every section of the international
Communist hierarchy"; as having been lauded in the Communist press,
putting "every individual Communist on notice that he 'has the
duty to rise to this appeal'", and as having "received the official
endorsement of the supreme Soviet of the USSR, which has been
echoed by the governing bodies of every Communist satellite
country, and by all Communist Parties throughout the world."

JOINT-ANTI-PASCIST REFUGEE COMMITTEE

Confidential Informant T-15, of known reliability, advised that subject was one of the Joint Anti-Fascist Refugee Committee's sponsors of the five lectures given by MURIEL Chaper during the week of April 8, 1949. This informant further advised that Dhaper is President of the Congress of American Women and the purpose of the lectures was to inform the public to keep FRANCO-SPAIN out of the United Nations.

It may be noted that the Congress of American Women and the Joint Anti-Pascist Refugee Committee have been cited by the Attorney General as coming within the purview of Executive Order 9835.

Confidential Informant T-15 further advised that the Joint Anti-Fascist Regusee Committee in April, 1949 directed a letter to President Truman uning the adoption of the anti-Franco position of the United States and to instruct the US Delegation to the General Assembly to oppose all moves fostering "cordial association" by any of the United Nations with Franco Spain.

Informant advised that the subject was one of the signers of the letter.

CHINA WELFARE APPEAL INC.

Confidential Informant T-11, previously mentioned, advised that the China Welfare Appeal, Inc. is a Communist front erganization. According to this informant, on March 8, 1951 the Board of Directors of the China Welfare Appeal Inc. issued a statement expressing their intention to continue to ship relief supplies to Madam Sun Yat Sen, Vice Chairman of the Peoples Republi of China.

WILLIE MCGEE

The May 2, 1951 edition of the "Daily Worker" carried an article which reflects that the subject was one of ninety prominent American women writers, artists, journalists, editors, leaders and personalities of stage and screen and radio, from all over the country, who have appealed to President Truman to save the life of WILLIE McGEE, victim of a legal frame-up.

Informant T-6 has advised that Communist Party groups with other organizations, including the Civil Rights Congress, promoted protest meetings, delegations and sent wires to local, state and national officials asking for their intervention in the case of WILLIE McGEE, a negro who was recently electrocuted, in the State of Mississippi after being convicted in that atate on charge of rape.


HARRY BRIDGES

The "Peoples Daily World" for April 3, 1945 carried an article listing the subject as one of the numerous individuals who requested President ROOSEVELT to quash the HAKKY BRIDGES deportation proceedings and grant him United States citizenship.

It may be noted that HARRY BRIDGES, President of the International Longshoremen's Union, CIO, on April 4, 1950 was convicted in the United States District Court, San Francisco, California, for perjury, arising from his alleged false statements at an immigration hearing by denying he was a member of the Communist Party.

RELATIONSHIP WITH ABRAHAM LINCOLN BRIGADE MEMBERSHIP

Confidential Informant T-16, of known reliability, advised that the subject on December 3, 1943 was in contact with LUDWIG RENN. Mexico City, and inquired concerning one OTTO BOCH who had been with the Thaelman Battalion of the International Brigade.



ELLA WINTER STEWART

Confidential Informant T-16, of known reliability, advised on September 8, 1947 that the subject was acquainted with ELLA WINTER STEWART.

Confidential Informant T-3, previously mentioned, advised that ELLA WINTER STEWART was a Communist Party member and one of the Hollywood group, as well as being a member of many Communist front organizations.

WILLIAM SCHNEIDERMAN



It may be noted that this informant advised WILLIAM SCHNEIDERMAN was State President of the Communist Political Association in California.

It may be noted that PAUL ROBESON was the star of the play "Othello" and that the Evening Star, Washington, DC newspaper, on June 15, 1949 contained an article which quotes ROBESON as telling an interviewer for the TASS NEWS AGENCY that





Legion Renews Its Attack on College Over Hiring 'Leftist' -Dr. Taylor Retorts

By MERRILL FOLSOM Special to The New York Times.

BRONXVILLE, N. Y., Nov. 13-The Westchester County American Legion has reopened an aitack on Sarah Lawrence College for allegedly retaining faculty members who have "Communist-front" records.

The college, a liberal arts school for women, has undergone seven years of periodic consure drafted by the Un-American Activities Committee of the Legion and endorsed by the county delegates and offi-cers of the organization.

Dr. Harold Taylor, president of the college, which has an enrollment of 417, reiterated today that none of the faculty took intellectual orders from outside authority, Communist or

otherwise.

College officials were less dis-turbed by the new charges than by the continuance of public attack after the disclosure of Sarah Lawrence policies. They considered the Legion's new reference to the college as a "girls" seminary" just as slanted a de-acciption of it as being termed notorious for its lefist, Socialist and atheistic background and record."

At a meeting in Mamaroneck last night, 150 delegates of the Legion applauded a report from its Un-American Activities Committee criticizing Dr. Tay-lor for overlooking "Red pene-


