Attached is a copy of "An Invitation to Join N.O.W." which was forwarded to the NYO by Atlanta, having been furnished by [REDACTED]. This paper sets forth the aims and purposes of the organization which are to bring about an end to discrimination against women in all fields. No investigation was undertaken in the NYO in view of the fact that there is no evidence of the organization being influenced or infiltrated by the CP or of the organization participating in or having any interest in anti-Vietnam and other New Left activities. *pd*

By means of a suitable pretext, DOLORES ALEXANDER, 328 West 12th Street, New York City, was contacted on 6/24/69. She stated that the headquarters for the N.O.W. is currently being maintained in her apartment at that address and that she is the only paid staff member of the organization in NY. She indicated that there are chapters in 28 states and Canada and that their purpose is in equal rights for women. Indices of the NYO contain no references identifiable with ALEXANDER.

The only information in the files of the NYO indicates that the organization has taken part in picketing against Alcoa Corporation for its job discrimination against women and in disrupting hearings on abortion laws in NY because most of the speakers at the hearing were male.

In view of the fact that there is no information indicating a need for an investigation of a security nature, no further action is being taken in this matter.

AN INVITATION TO JOIN N.O.W.

N.O.W. is a new national organization formed in Washington October 30, 1966, "to take action to bring women into full participation in the mainstream of American society NOW, exercising all the privileges and responsibilities thereof in truly equal partnership with men."

The men and women of N.O.W. work to initiate or support action, nationally or in any part of this nation, to break through the silken curtain of prejudice and discrimination against women in government, industry, the professions, the churches, the political parties, the judiciary, the labor unions; in education, science, medicine, law, religion and every other field of importance in American society.

Discrimination on the basis of sex is now prohibited by federal law, in Title VII of the Civil Rights Act of 1964. But officials of government and industry have not taken the prohibitions against discrimination based on sex as seriously as they have the prohibitions against other forms of discrimination. N.O.W. was formed to remind them that someone was watching, someone cared.

On a national level, N.O.W. has already achieved results. To cite one example, a major N.O.W. campaign sought — and won — amendment of the Presidential Executive Order prohibiting job discrimination by government contractors and subcontractors, and by the federal government itself. N.O.W. urged that the word "sex" be added to "race, religion and national origin" as a prohibited basis for discrimination. President Johnson did amend his order in this fashion.

Other activities during N.O.W.'s first year included a campaign to declare sex-segregated "Help Wanted - Male" and "Help Wanted - Female" ads illegal. (The Equal Employment Opportunity Commission held public hearings on this subject as the result of a N.O.W. petition.) A drive for appointment of many more women to policy-making government jobs Appeals for re-examination of pension rules and divorce laws which might discriminate against men as well as women A campaign against airline regulations which force stewardesses to retire upon marriage or at age 32 or 35 And an attack upon so-called "protective" labor laws in individual states which discriminate on the basis of sex. N.O.W. insists that these protective laws violate the Civil Rights Act of 1964 and other federal laws, and that they are being used as a "subterfuge for depriving women of good jobs and promotions."

N.O.W. supports victims of sex discrimination with legal assistance, press conferences and publicity, seminars, agency, public demonstrations and other techniques to effect change. N.O.W. attorneys are currently aiding women in

Indiana and New York. The cases aim to overturn a California law that restricts women (but not men) in hours of overtime work, to establish that women cannot be denied jobs because of unfair weight-limit restrictions, and to open up white collar jobs aboard ships to qualified women.

The more-than-2000 members of N.O.W. have supported its policies with concrete actions of their own -- through letters and visits to government officials and legislators, through meetings and press interviews, through petitions, through surveys, through effective campaigns to arouse public opinion. Local and state chapters of N.O.W. have been taking root throughout the country, to support N.O.W.'s national campaigns and correct local inequalities. For example, in 1967 the New York chapter campaigned for inclusion of a prohibition against sex discrimination in the new state constitution. And the Wisconsin chapter worked for revision of laws that prevent dissemination of birth control information.

N.O.W. members participate in its actions on three levels: as individuals, as members of local chapters, and as members of national Task Forces dealing with such matters as Equal Employment Opportunity, Women in Poverty, Sex Discrimination in Education, Marriage and the Family, The Image of Women, Women in Religion, and Political Rights and Responsibilities. N.O.W. members will work vigorously during the election year of 1968 to win the active support of political parties and candidates for the unfinished business of woman's equality.

Despite all the talk about isolated gains made by women in recent years, the actual status of women in the United States has been declining, rather than advancing in the 1950's and '60's. Although more than 46% of American adult women now work outside the home, the overwhelming majority -- 75% -- are in routine clerical, sales, or factory jobs; or they are household workers, cleaning women, hospital attendants. Some two-thirds of Negro women workers are in the lowest paid service occupations. Working women are becoming increasingly concentrated on the bottom rungs of the job ladder. N.O.W. is dedicated to reversing this trend, so that our national life will be truly fair and truly representative of the best our citizens can offer.

Southwestern Bell picketed by women charging job bias

About 12 members of the National Organization for Women (NOW) picketed Southwestern Bell Telephone Co. offices at 8010 Pine Monday noon, protesting what they called discriminatory hiring and promotion practices of the company.

NOW members distributed brochures quoting statements by the Equal Employment Opportunity Commission criticizing employment practices of the American Telephone and Telegraph Co. and its Bell Telephone subsidiaries.

"AT&T has continued to classify jobs in terms of sex and color and this is in violation with the 1964 Civil Rights Act," said Miss Marilyn Worceline, a NOW member.

MISS SANDY ROBINSON, a telephone operator, disagreed that the company's hiring policies are adequate.

The demonstration was one of 10 NOW protests conducted Monday across the country against AT&T.

ZACK F. BETTIS, general staff manager for Southwestern Bell, defended local company policies, saying, "As far as our promotion policies I see no discrimination. When someone asks if we have vice presidents who are women or who are black I have to say we don't have any. But you can't pull all the strings over night," he emphasized.

"We have a lot of women in management levels," he added.

Bettis pointed out that of 1,580 managerial and professional jobs in the local Southwestern Bell offices, 579 or 34 per cent are filled by women. The highest job held by a woman is at the district level.

He said that 5,200 of the 8,900 Southwestern employees in St. Louis are women. About 65 women, he said, hold jobs in such craft areas as switchboard cable repair and line work while 2,500 men are employed in craft areas.

New Haven Women's Lib

No Reserve Aug. 26 Strike

The New Haven Women's Liberation Front announced plans Monday to hold a demonstration on the lower green on Aug. 26, the date set for a national strike by women.

A member of the group said a permit is being sought to conduct a "day of activity" from 11 a.m. to 7 p.m. in the center of the city.

The national strike was called for Aug. 26, the 50th anniversary of women's suffrage, by Betty Friedan, former president of the National Organization for Women (NOW) and author of the best-seller, "The Feminine Mystique."

The three nationwide strike demands are: 40-hour child care centers, free abortions on demand and complete equality for

women in education and employment.

The New Haven organization plans to conduct a day care hunger on the green for non-working mothers who would

otherwise be unable to attend. Banners will be set up to distribute literature and encourage

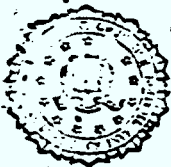
discussion on women's rights in education, divorce, consumerism and job opportunities in this

strike and throughout the country.

The national strike has been endorsed by the Women's Bureau of the U.S. Labor Department and, in the month since the initial announcement of the event, has drawn support from almost every urban women's liberation group.

The New Haven Women's Liberation Front urges women whose jobs would be jeopardized by attendance at the rally to "set aside the day to think and discuss the issues of women's liberation."

NOW has also urged women to hold an economic boycott on strike day and, wherever possible, a work stoppage to dramatize the economic impact of women, who comprise 57 percent of this country's population.

Dear Mrs. Seidenberg:

I have your letter of May 28, 1971, in which you express the concern of your organization over the policy of this Bureau of limiting our Special Agent position to males. I would like to outline for you the considerations which make our policy imperative.

Our policy is based on a careful, objective evaluation of all pertinent factors germane to the operations and effectiveness of the FBI, particularly those inherent in the broad range of challenges which Special Agents must satisfactorily meet to enable this Bureau to properly discharge the responsibilities entrusted to it and do so with optimum return to the public trust. It is not the intent of the FBI to confine this position to males without there being every good reason to do so.

The FBI is responsible for investigations in upwards of 175 classifications in a nation of over 206 million persons in the 50 states and Puerto Rico. Accordingly, our force of Special Agents is comparatively small considering the sparse deployment of it, the magnitude and diversity of the population, and the wide variety of investigations our Special Agents are called upon to undertake. Therefore, the very basic tenet of our operations is flexibility in terms of maintenance of a staff we may properly and promptly deploy. We hire only one breed of Special Agent, the one who will be equipped and able to perform all duties of the Special Agent position. We do not need nor do we hire specialists or anyone with the understanding that assignments would be in any way short of the full range of Special

Agent duties. We insist that each Special Agent be capable of performing all duties of his position, whenever and wherever necessary. This means it is necessary that each Special Agent be qualified for the strenuous physical exertion required to effectively participate in arrests and raids which involve the use of firearms, physically subduing dangerous criminals, and self-defense. Performance of these duties frequently requires work during any time of day or night and exposure to all kinds of adverse environmental conditions. It is doubly important that those Special Agents in the more isolated areas where no more than one, two, or three will be assigned be equipped to fully represent the FBI and acquit themselves properly under any contingency.

With only one class of Special Agent, each assumes a certain mortal risk for himself and others with whom he may be associated in an assignment in the more dangerous aspects of our work, and we continue to hold firmly that this is inappropriate for women.

If the credibility of the FBI is to be maintained in the eyes of the public, the lawbreaker, fugitive, et cetera, and if we are to continue a flexible, mobile, ready-for-anything force of Special Agents, we must continue to limit the position to males. At a time when there is growing disrespect for the law and contempt for and abuse of law enforcement officers, including FBI Special Agents, such as increased senseless, unprovoked attacks on such personnel, we must continue to employ in our Special Agent position males who are fully qualified and whom we can count upon to perform the full range of duties for which they are responsible.

I sincerely hope you can understand the position of this Bureau on this matter.

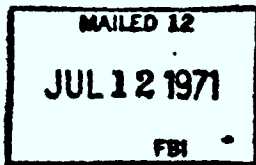

Less violence seen with female cops

Women police officers may lessen violent encounters between police and citizens, women's rights advocates told the city civil service board yesterday in an effort to determine how more women could be hired as police officers.

Police chief J. G. "Babe" Littleton sat quietly in the back of the city council chamber as two women talked a half hour about why women should be police officers.

Mrs. Lee De Cesare of the National Organization for Women (NOW) based most of her arguments on a recent study done by the Police Foundation and a 1967 report from the U.S. Crime Commission.

Mrs. De Cesare also noted Miami has 25 female police officers.

"Miami police chief Bernard Garmire, in a letter to me, said, 'My assessment of the performance of our female police officers remains high; there hasn't been an incident where I've been disappointed in their actions,'" Mrs. De Cesare said.

Systematically, Mrs. De Cesare struck down the traditional arguments against women serving as police officers.

She said the two main arguments are that women are the "weaker sex" and that they "don't want the jobs."

"Women do want the jobs. They offer higher pay than most jobs women have. And police work also is a form of public service," Mrs. De Cesare said.

"Women have been reluctant to apply because civil service ads invite applicants for jobs as policemen. Why not change that to police officer?" she asked.

As for the "weaker sex" attitude, "substantial research indicates that violent encounters between citizens and the police are fewer in number than popularly believed, and that in those encounters the personality and the training of the officer are more important factors than the officer's strength," the NOW spokesperson said.

"The level of one's physical strength may be a moot point in most dangerous situations," Mrs. De Cesare said, citing a report which showed the highest single cause of death to police officers was ambush.

Mrs. De Cesare cited other studies which showed many incidents of citizen run-ins with police involved a defiance of authority triggered by the police officer's attitude toward the people.

"Police women may elicit less violent reactions than policemen," Mrs. De Cesare said.

Jo Ann Palmer, a spokesperson from Tampa's Women's Liberation Center,

suggested Tampa may lack some federal crime control funds if it does not make some changes to enable women to join the force in a capacity other than working with juveniles.

Tampa's police department, according to Littleton, has four female officers and they do work in what the women described as "traditional jobs reserved for women."

After yesterday's presentation, Littleton noted some departments in other cities employ women as sworn officers in jobs reserved for civilians in Tampa's department.

In their presentation, the women said Miami has one woman who is a patrol sergeant and supervises night sector patrolmen.

Eight women in Miami are assigned to traffic. Others are in accident investigation units, and seven Miami policewomen are in criminal investigation.

Mrs. De Cesare suggested Tampa's height and weight requirements discriminate not only against women but also against some minorities. A police officer must be 5 feet 8 and weigh 134 to 184 pounds.

Joe Iglesias, acting civil service board director in the absence of board chairman Doug West, directed civil service director Marshall Jesse to meet with Littleton and see what they could do about some of the women's suggestions.
