which is on the corner in Fairfax, that same evening. MR. BRACKETT states further that this was in June, 1921 when he was investigsting the case for the Gustafson Agency, and that when he got
this information from HALE, he, BRACKETT, interviewed MRS. ROSS
at the Ross Cafe immediately and MRS. ROSS stated that she knew
ANNA BROWN well and for a long time, and that ANNA BROWN had
not eaten in her restaurant that evening. That she, MRS. ROSS,
had not seen her and had not heard of anyone else that had seen
her, ANNA BROWN, eating there that evening, and that she,
MRS. ROSS, was quite positive that ANNA BROWN had not been in
her restaurant that evening.

Feb. 9th at Tulsa, BILL BRACKETT let Agent Weiss read the letter which BRACKETT had received from our confidential informant being the letter mentioned above. This letter contained me information as to these erimes, but in substance proposed that he ear informant, would embody all this evidence or information in a report and send it to BRACKETT, and that BRACKETT was then to take the information to the "proper persons" in Osage County and get them to pay money for same, and that if these persons refused to pay money, then the information was to be returned to information undisclosed. Informant did not mention any particular sum that he desired for his information, but requested that BRACKETT wire him when he received that letter, and that he, informant, would then furnish the information, which it was proposed to send to the proper persons in Osage County.

MR. BRACKETT stated that by "proper persons" gas meant a.

JOHNSON, attorney at Fairfax, whom Agents have confidence is.

this case as being on the right side, and MR. BRACKETT them

arranged with Agent Weiss that he, BRACKETT, would send a telegram to informant, telling informant to forward the evidence to

RACKETT at once and to state what sum he desired for same, and
tating that if this sum was not paid then he BRACKETT, would return the evidence to confidential informant, undisclosed.

MR. BRACKETT sent the above telegram and had agent read it before sending it, and then MR. BRACKETT and agent Weiss agreed that BRACKETT would keep in touch with Weiss and when the information was received by BRACKETT, Weiss would join him and they would go together to D. E. JOHNSON with informant's proposition, and work it out in the best possible way for the good of this investigation.

Feb. 9th Agent Burger, as per our plans, drove to Forsker. Okla. with JOHN MORAN and got ELLA HALLETT to accompany them. Our plan is to take ELLA FALLETT to Yale, where MARTEA UPRIGET mo my now lives, and have as long an interview as is necessary with both of these young women, and obtain from them full signed written statements of all the facts they know, as it appears that they are in possession of vital information. After this is done, an attempt will be made to get a full and truthful statement from MRS. NORA BENNE at Fairfax, with the assistance of BILL BRACKETT who is on very friendly terms with MRS. BENNE, and who interviewed her in June, 1921, at which time she told a different and more favorable story from the one she told Agents when they interviewed her at Bartlesville. At the time Agents interviewed MRS. BENNE at Bartlesville, they were not informed that MRS. BENNE had ever been interviewed by BILL BRACKETT or anyone else before, and therefore were not aware that she was changing her

BRACKETT'S assistance MRS. BENNE will tell her original and truthful story, as we have since learned that her husband, the was present when Agents interviewed her in the first instance is tavorable to the BURKHARTS, and that it was probably the influence of his presence that induced her to tell the different story to Agents.

Nothing has been heard of or from KEISEY MORRISON, alias, LLOYD MILLER, to date since the interview with him at Jalian.

A lot of hearsay information has been gathered during the past ten days re. the BILL SMITH, HENRY ROAN and CHARLI WHITEHORN murders, but this report will not be encumbered with that information, as we will investigate same and only report that which is pertinent and evidence.

RE: MURDER OF ANNA BROWN:

Feb. 13th we located MRS. MARTHA DOUGHTY, sometimes heretofore called MARTHA UPRIGHT. She had moved and her present address is Norfolk, Okla. She states that she and her husband intend moving again in the near future, but that they can best be located when wanted through her husband's father, LR. JIM DOUGHTY, R. F. D., Glencoe, Okla. We had LUELLA HALLETT present when we interviewed LARTHA DOUGHTY this time, as these two women have known each other a long time, and by talk-

ing together, refreshed their memories on this subject. We secured the follow-

ing signed statement from MRS.

## reb. 10, 1924. TRATHENT OF MARTHA DOLOFTY.

Hy name is Mrs. Martha Doughty. I am 18 years old. Present home is Morfolk, Okla.

About May 17, 1921 I went to work for Mr. and Mrs. Ernest Burkhart at Grayhorse, Okla. About May 19, 1921 an aunt of the Burkhart men came from Texas, with her children, two boys and a girl, to visit at Ernest Burkhart's. This aunt came in a rord touring car. I don't remember that this aunt's husband was there.

Ernest Burkhart and wife had a Ford touring car and also a new Buick touring car.

On Saturday, May 21, 1921 Anna Brown came from Fairfax in the morning to visit her mother, Lizzie "Q", who was lived with Mrs. Ernest Burkhart. Mrs. Ernest Burkhart and Anna Brown were sisters and Lizzie "Q" was their mother. They were all Osage Indians.

On that Saturday Duke and Byron and Ernest Burkhart were at the home in the morning but Byron and Ernest went to a horse-race that afternoon, and took one or two of the children. They drove Ernests Buick touring car to the horse races.

This left Lizzie Q the aunt, the children, Mrs. Ernest Burkhart, anna Brown, myself and I think Duke Burkhart at home. I am not sure whether Duke Burkhart went to that horse race or not.

During that day there was a lot of fussing between Anna Brown, her mother, the aunt and the others. The aunt said a lot to the effect that she was ashamed that her nephews had married and associated with Indians, of whom the expressed a very poor opinion.

Anna Brown was drinking and told me she would kill any woman that she caught flirting with Byron Burkhart.

The men got back from the horse race about 5 PM. We ate supper about an hour before sundown, about 6 PM; Anna Brown had stayed out in the summer house nearly all day, and had refused to come in and eat dinner, but ate some supper, with Mrs. Ernest Burkhart and I.

About 3 PM that afternoon Mrs. Nora Benne and Ella Hallett and Charley O'Farrell came to see me at Ernest Burkhart's, and we arranged that they would come by and take me to a dance near Ralston that night.

That afternoon the aunt and the Burkharts talked of going to a show at Fairfax that night, and talked of going over and getting Horace Burkhart and his wife to go to the show with them.

Shortly after supper, just before sundown, Ernest Burkhart, Byron Burkhart and Anna Brown got in the Buick car and Mrs. Bridges and some of the children got in her Pord car and they all drove away about the same time. I saw the cars going out north of the house,

but did not watch or see which way they turned when they hit the main road, and don't know whether they went to get Forace Burkhart and wife or not. Duke Burkhart stayed at home when the rest started to go to the show that night. It was between six and seven PM. when they all left to go to the show that night.

About dark Mrs. Benne, Ella Hallet and Mr. Fred Benne came to Ernest Burkhart's and I went with them to the dance.

It was just good dark when we started for the dance and am quite sure Duke Burkhart was at home (Ernest's) when we left. But none of the other Burkharts or Aunt that started to the show had returned I took my suit case and left Ernest Burkhart's for good that night because they quarreled too much, and I was afraid of them.

Byron Burkhart told me that day that Anna Brown had said she would kill him unless he married her, and that he was not going to marry her.

I have never been back to Ernest Burkhart's since that night. Ernest Burkhart kept his Buick in his garage, which was only large enough for one car, and kept the Ford standing in the yard. I don't recall seeing the aunt's husband, J. L. Bridges, there, but he may have been there.

Feb. 14th, upon our return, received report from GUSTAFSON Agency enclosing some reports on ANNA BROWN murder, and the following, by "Operative #10" (who is J. J. MORAN of Tulsa, Okla.) is hereby copied as it shows additional information and evidence by MRS. MARTHA DOUGHTY, given by her on Aug. 20, 1921, when the facts were fresh in her mind. Said report reads as follows:

"Pawhuska, Aug. 20, 1921.

Leaving Pawhuska about 6:30 All. in company with #28, in an automotile, we drove to Bartlesville about 8:30 a.m., and shortly after that located Mrs. Martha Brookshire (now Mrs. Martha Doughty) at No. 400 N. Morton Ave. We made ourselves known and talked to her for sometime as to what she knew about the Burkhart family with whom she was staying at the time that Anna Brown was murdered

Mrs Brookshire was at that time a single woman and she worked for Earnest Burkhart four days leaving on Saturday evening May 81st, about 8:30 p.m. when her sister-in-law Mrs. Benny came by and took her to a dance.

Hrs Brockshire says that Anna Brown came to the Burkhart place in

the forenoon on saturday, May 21st, and was there all day; that she was arinking and did not come into the aining room at noon for dinner, but later came in and got something to eat; that she stayed there all afternoon and about 5:30 PM. while Mrs. Brookshire was getting supper Anna came into the kitchen and asked her to go the store and call a taxi for her (Anna) as she was going home. Mrs Brookshire told Anna that she was busy, that she had supper to get and she could not go to the store and she did not. She said that later wrs Burkhart came in and asked her where she had put the clean clothes that had been ironed and told her that she wanted a clean paron for Anna to wear home, and said that Mrs Burkhart got the clean clothes and went out; she says that she did not see Anna Brown any more during the evening; that she finished supper did up the work and finished about 8:30 or nine p. m. and that Benny's folks came for her and she took her suit case and left and had never been back.

Mrs Brookshire says that Bryan Burkhart and all the men were gone all afternoon and came in just before supper; that Bryan came in and talked to her and asked her to go to the dance with him, and said Earnest had refused him the car to go to the dance, but thought that if she would go that he could get the car. Mrs Burkhart says that she refused him and told him that she was going with Benny's folks. She said that he then went in and changed his clothes and came out to supper; that he wore a pair of dark thousers, light shirt and no coat and wore a white hat, or that is what he usually wore when he dressed up.

Aug. 20, 1921. Mrs. Brookshire says that there was an aunt visiting at the Burkmarts, and that she had a ford car, a touring car; that when she finished the dishes and work after supper that the Ford was gone and she did not see the Buick but it might have been in the garage as they kept it in the garage when they were at home.

Mrs Brookshire said that Bryan told her about Anna Brown said that she was drunk and wanted him to marry her and that she had drawn a gun on him and said that she would hill him if he didn't marry her and that he had told her that he would beat her to it. Mrs Brookshire says that she does not think that Anna had a gun as she had opened her stachel when talking to her and that there was just a few toilet articles and an empty pint bottle in her stachel, and she believed that Bryan was just lying to her. Mrs Brookshire says that when she left the Burkhart home that there was none of the men at home except Duke, the youngest brother and he carried her mix stachel to the car. Mrs Brookshire says that Anna did not wear any shoes around the house while she was there, but she did not see her come or go and does not know what she wore.

Mrs Brookshire says that Anna talked to her and said that she did not think she would live so very long, and when she died she wanted the Burkhart children to have her property; she says that Anna spent most of the day she was there out in the summer house; also says that she did not leave until near six o'block as it was nearly six when his Burkhart came for the clean clothes.

This witness is honest in her statements and can be relied on to

give what information she knows. She does not like Bryan Burkhart on account of his advances toward her but do not think she would let that prejudice her in her statements."

Feb. 14th also secured following signed statement from MISS LUELLA HALLETT:

## Feb. 14th, 1924. AFFIDAVIT OF LUELLA HALLETT.

"Personally appeared before me, the undersigned authority, this date, Luella Hallett, who being first duly sworn, upon on the denoses and states:

My name is Ella Hallett. I am 23 years of age. My home is at Redfork. Okla. where my mother, hrs anna Hallett lives.

I have known Duke, Horace, Ernest and Byron Burkhart since about 1917 personally and well. I have also known ANNA BROWN, late of Fairfax, Okla. since about the same time. Ernest Burkhart's wife, Mollie, is a sister of Anna Brown. In May, 1921 Duke and Byron Burkhart were living with Mrs and Mr Ernest Burkhart at crayhorse, Okla. The said Burkharts are brothers, and W. M. Hale is their uncle, and also lived near them at that time.

On Saturday, May 21, 1921 I rode with Chales O'Farrell and Mrs. Nora Benne, whom I was visiting at the time, from her home, about 6 miles east of crayhorse, to Fairfax, Okla. We rode in O'-Farrell's Ford coupe. We left Mrs Benne's home about 1:30 PM and drove to Fairfax, about 9 miles. We stayed in Fairfax about 2 hours, and then we three drove to Ernest Burkhart's home, at Grayhorse, to visit Martha Upright, now Mrs Martha Doughty.

We arrived at Ernest Burkhart's about 3:30 pm. No men were there that I saw, but Mrs. Ernest Burkhart, Lizzie Q. (Anna Brown's aged mother) Martha Doughty, Anna Brown and some small children were there. Anna Brown was sulking in the out or summer house, and was plainly somewhat under the influence of liquor. I went out and talked with Anna Brown. She as ed me to come and work for her at her home in Fairfax, and I agreed to do so. Anna promised to come to Mrs Benne's in a car and get me and take me to her home at wairfax the next morning. Sunday, and to come for me about 8 A. M. We visited at Ernest Burkhart's about 30 minutes, and agreed to come by there that evening and get Marsha and take her with us to a dance that night, on the Wheeler place, east from Ralston, and south of Grayhorse. None of the men folks returned while we were at Ernest Eurkhart's that afternoon, and none of the women folks left.

Urs. Benne, O'Farrell and I left Burkhart's about 4 PM. drove back to Mrs. Benne's home, about 6 miles, did the work, had supper, and about 7:30 PM. Fred Benne, Mrs Benne and I started in O'Farrell's rord coupe to get Martha and go to the dance. O'Farrell remained at Mrs Benne's with her children. We arrived at Ernest

Lurkharts just as it wasketting dark enough that lights were lit. It Burkharts I saw a car standing in their yard, but did not distinguish the make of it. Mrs. Benne got out of our car and went into their house, Mr. Benne and I remained in our Ford. We waited about 20 minutes for Martha, and then she and Mrs. Benne came out and got into our car to go to the dance. At that visit I only saw one man at Burkharts and that was DUME Burkhart, who brought Martha's suitcase from the house and put it in our Ford. I did not see Anna Brown at that time.

Martha, Mrs. and Mr. Benne and I then drove to the dance. We stayed at the dance till about 3 AM. and then started for home. Martha went home about the same time, but with Joe Morrell. Our car ran out of gas in a few miles, so that we did not get back to Mrs Benne's till after noon that day, SUNDAY. Martha had been there some hours before we arrived.

That same Sunday afternoon, about 5 PM Duke Burkhart came in a car to Mrs Benne's and asked me to go back to Ernest Burkhart's with him to work for Mrs. Ernest Burkhart. I told Duke that I had promised to work for Anna Brown, and that Anna was to have come for me that morning. Duke replied that Anna Brown was gone, or away, and not at her home, so I went back with Duke and began working at Ernest Burkhart's, and stayed there with them for about three weeks. I often noticed Bill Hale and the Burkhart men holding very private conversations. After Anna Brown's body was found I asked Mrs Mollie Burkhart, Ernest's wife, and Anna's sister, who was with Anna last, and who took Anna home from Burkhart's that 3 turday. Mollie told me that Ernest Burkhart and herself had taken anna home from their house that Saturday.


I have read the above and foregoing, understand the contents thereof fully, and the facts therein recited are true and correct.
WITNESSED: J. R. Burger; J. J. Moran;

Feb. 15th, we saw BILL BRACKETT, who states that he has received the promised report of evidence from our confidential informant; that said report consists of one report wherein the main facts are stated, but names of suspects and witnesses not given, but designated by numbers; that the other report consists of a key showing these names; that informant insists that this key be kept by BRACKETT, until money is furnished to pay all expenses of informant and necessary witnesses meeting with agents at Okla. City or some other suitable agreed upon place, where informant promises to have them; that informant insists further that when he thus produces these witnesses, and they furnish the evidence promised, then

informant is to be paid \$500.00 for same. .... BRACKETT states that informant has developed a grudge against J. J. MURAN (which we know to be a fact) and that informant exacted the word of honor that this proposed new negotiation be kept confidential from every one until completed. We are now trying to work this out, and get informant's evidence. Informant and BRACKETT also exacted the promise that this informant's evidence be never divulged to any state authority, except in the event of arrest and prosecution, assisted by Government, as they both expressed entire lack of confidence in all state authorities in these cases.

IR. BRACKETT turned to Agents, with this understanding, the first part of informant's report, mentioned above, but kept the "key"

These Agents, however, by means of our previous knowledge, have positively worked out said "key" as to all names of "suspects" and "witnesses" with the exception of "witnesses" #5 and #6, and feel confident that we can ultimately work out the name and identity of witness #5, as he is informan't informant.



New evidence contained in informant's latest report to BRACH-ETT was that "witness #6" saw BURKHART'S Buick parked at ERHEST BURKHART'S home at Grayhorse about 10 PM that Saturday night.

The balance of said report was practically a statement of the

facts as heretofore told us by informant, and reported by us at previous times. MR. BRACKETT turned this latest report of evidence by informant to agent Weiss, but with the agreement that same will be kept from all state authorities until arrest and prosecution has begun.

The reports re. the ANNA BROWN murder investigation, as furnished by GUSTAFSON, are not complete, but contain some heretofore unknown "leads" that apparently have never been followed out. We will follow these out, which will necessitate interviewing ROBT. KISSEE, WH. KISSEE, LEE UTO, LEE HIMMLE and ascertaining the identity of "some cafe man at Fairfax".

Agents upon reading these reports from GUSTAFSON and comparing some of the information therein recited, are strongly of the belief that in some manner the BURNELART-HALE-BRIDGES outfit have secured the information guthered by the GUSTAFSON agency. And this belief is strengthened by the further fact that one MITCHELL, an operative for GUSTAFSON, who worked on this case in 1921 for GUSTAFSON, has been doing some secret work in this section for the past six weeks and IRS. GUSTAFSON told Agent Weiss that GUSTAFSON has an under cover man working on these cases, and that LEAHY, McDONALD, etc. are paying for same. She refused, however, to disclose this under cover man's identity, or to have him consult with Agents, for the good of the investigation.

We received a letter on the 14th from our confidential informant from pallas, stating that he would be in Oklahoma soon, and communicate with us.

RE: IMPROER OF HEIRY ROAM:

Feb. 15th interviewed GEORGE PITTS, heretofore mentioned, and he stated that LAMIN PLETCHER, whom he states he intends to marry, denies positively to him that she knows anything about the murder. MR. PITTS stated further that MARY BUNCH, who was MRS. HENRY ROAN. recently told him that MRS. JOHN MCKINLEY told her thatMRS. ANGEL: MCKINLY had told her, MRS. JOHN MCKINLEY. that ALFRED MCKINLEY and MAMIE FINTCHER were out riding together about Jan. 26th (the day HENRY ROAN disappeared) at night, and that they, LAMIE FIRTCHER and ALFRID MCHINLEY, had seen HENRY killed, or dead, that night. IR. PITTS stated that he also questioned ANGELL MCKINELY about this, but she denied telling it. GEORGE PITTS and all the others mentioned in this paragraph, are full blood Osage Indians, aind we are endeavoring, through GEORGE PINTS, to get the truth of this information, as GEORGE PITTS is said to be unusually reliable, and well educated, and sincere in his desire to help us.

IR. PITTS reports that MARY BUNCE also told him that she is now willing to tell agents all she knows about ROAN'S murder, and we will take IR. PITTS and interview her at Enid, where she now resides, as soon as possible.

# RN: MURDER OF CHARLES MAITEFORN.

Feb. 11th and 12th, Agent Weiss again interviewed 1788. HATTIE SMITHERMAN, but all the new information Agent was able to secure from her on this subject was that DELILA MA-SHUNK-A-SHA, of Pawhuska, had told HATTIE that BRYAN GRIFFIN had twirled a small gun on his finger, and told DELILA that that was the gun that had killed CHARLEY WHITEHORN. BRYAN GRIFFIN has been laying up with MINNIE CAVAGE for the past year or more. We are trying to get the truth of this from DELILA through GEORGE PITTS, as DELILA is also an Osage Indian. Agents are still convinced that HATTIE SHITHERMAN is not telling ALL she knows of WHITEHORN'S murder, and will continue to work on her. We are now convinced, however, that J. J. FAULKEER has no evidence in this case, but is trying to graft HATTIE all he can.

RD: MURDER OF W. D. SLITH, HIS WIFE, and SERVLET.  $V_{\phi}$ 

Feb. 15th. Were informed by J. J. MCRAN that one "DOC"
HAWMINS, of Webb City, Okla., has stated that he, -ANKINS, has
some evidence in this case, and that "BLACKIE THOMPSON" and
"CURIEY JOHNSON" are implicated, and also BILL HALE. We will
follow this out.

circumstances he was driving with BILL SMITH the night SMITH'S house was blown up, what time he and SMITH returned to SMITH'S house that night, etc., but COLOMBE refused positively to answer or to make any statement whatever of the facts, though he was fully advised of Agents' positions and objects. We have arranged for confidential person to try to get facts from COLOMBE.

Feb. 18th interviewed DOC HAWKINS, Chief of Police, Webb City, Okla., who stated that he has known BILL HALE for a long time, and feels sure HALE caused the BILL SMITH explosion.

HAWKINS stated his reason for so believing is that he knows that BILL SMITH would have killed BILL HALE some day, and FALE knew this; that he, HAWKINS, in fact kept SMITH from killing HALE on one occasion. Also that HALE owed SMITH \$7,000.00 and did not intend to pay it.

HAWKINS then stated that BILL HALE suggested to HAWKINS that he, HAWKINS. hi-jack BILL SMITH, HALE saying at the time, "The son of a bitch always has a couple of big rocks (diamonds) and \$300.00 or \$400.00 on him".

That HALE at another time was intimate with a certain widow in Osage County who had no faith in banks, and kept about \$8,000.00 in her house in the country;

while corrowing the widow's money; that finally the widow and HALE fell out, and the widow hired a tough negro to work for her; HAYKINS states that when the widow and daughter dropped HALE, HALE came to HAWKINS and proposed that HAWKINS go the widow's place, kill the negro and rot the widow.

HAWKINS states also that HALE also tried to frame with him to rob a LR. DENOYA of Osage County of some very valuable diamonds, and that shortly afterward someone did rob DENOYA of these diamonds, and HALE later brought DENOYA to HAWKINS for aid in recovering the diamonds, and he, HAWKINS, feels sure HALE had some other man do this job.

HAWKINS states that HALE also proposed that he, HAWKINS, hi-jack a man near Ponca out of some fine diamonds, that HALE offered to show MAWKINS where this man was, and be on hand when HAWKINS rothed the man and buy the diamonds for cash from HAWKINS at once.

HAWKINS states that once while discussing the SMITH murders, CUPLEY JOHNSON, an Osage county criminal, told HAWKINS that SMITH'S house was blown up by the man whom SMITH had hurt with his car some time before, and mentioned JIM PARKER, alias BILL PARKER, and BLACKEY THOMPSON, another Osage County criminal.

HAWKINS was not inclined to go into details regarding this information from CURLEY JOHNSON at this time, but promised to see CURLEY JOHNSON, who is in jail on Federal narcotic charge at Pawhuska, this week, and to get all information possible from him. HAWKINS states it as his opinion that HALE hired JIM PARKER to blow up SMITH'S house and that BLACKEY THOMPSON and CURLEY JOHNSON were in on the job. This is the same JIM PARKER that KEISEY MORRISON suspects of doing this job.

HAVEING is a rather notorious gun man, being now chief of police at webb City. Okla. and has been known to kill several bad men in the past. HAVKING is suspected of several bank robteries, etc., but no evidence has ever been found against him, and he has never been arrested, except on murder charges, which he has always come clear from. He has an apparaently strong ill will toward BILL HALE, but says it is only because Hale is a murderer, thief and every thing else that is

criminal.

HAWHINS says HAIR has the BUNKHARTS do just as he tells them, and that BRYAN BURKHART is a real criminal.

Feb. 19th interviewed TOM 30GGUS, Sheriff. Guthrie, Okla., and searched jail records in efforts to trace CHAS. MORGAN, alias JOHN J. SMITH, but no record exists there of that man.

Learned from those records that ED HAUCHER was put in that jail Sept. 21, 1922 on state check charge, plead guilty, sentenced to McAlester state penitentiary for two years, and discharged from McAlester penitentiary in January, 1924. This being so, if FRANK FARRELL told BAUGHER what BAUGHER claimed, FARRELL must have been talking of the ANYA BROWN murder.

GEO. PITTS states he knows FRANK FARRILL well; that FARRELL is a white man, ex-husband of MARY FINTCHER, Osage woman of Hominy, Okla.; that FARRILL is said to be in and out of Oilton, Okla., and an oil field crook. (We will investigate this.)

county on the 19th inst. and was said to have sent word that he would meet agents in BILL HALE'S pasture, about sixteen miles from Pawhuska, the Fet. 21st we drove out at night to meet our informant, in a pasture about sixteen miles west of Pawhuska, as per his alleged request, but he did not show up. It may have been because the night was cold, and his messenger was two hours late in getting us to the meeting place.

### MURDER OF CHARLES WHITEHORN:

February 25th, Agents have kept in touch with A.W. COMSTOCK and HATTIE

SMITHERMAN during past week, but no information of any value has been furnished by them.

#### CONTACTOR TABLES ANHA BROWN MURDER:

Feb. 20th, at Okla. City, was informed by LUTHER BISHOP that he was jailer at the county jail at Okla. City in July, 1921; that the man we are seeking as CHARIES MORGAN, alias JOHN J. SMITH, was lodged in said jail on a charge of interstate auto theft, in July, 1921, but not under either of above names.

BISHOP states he remembers the man well as said man was brought to Okla. City from Pawhuska, where a jail delivery had occurred; that said man brought some saws from Pawhuska jail to Okla. City jail in his shoes, and an escape was attempted by said man and others, but frustrated by shooting the first escape as he came out.

"CARTER" in the Okla. City county jail; that he is sure this man was about 50 years old, 180 lbs., and was taken to Muskogee by Federal to stand trial on auto theft charge there. This explains why no record of CHAS. MCRGAN or JOHN J. SMITH has been found at Okla. City, but we can now trace the man by either the name of CARTER or his removal to the Eastern District of Oklahoma.

Fet. 23d interviewed CLARENCE BARNARD and ROY BUNCH in county jail at Enid. BARNARD states he was not in jail at Okla. City in July, 1921 but knows of the attempted jail delivery at that time, and that one BIAYLOCK was the man who was shot in the attempted escape and that the man "CARTER" (mentioned by BISHOP) was a tall, slim, dark young man in on a whiskey charge. BARNARD claimed to have no knowledge of the man "CHAS. MORGAN", alias JOHN SMITH.

ROY BUNCH stated that he was in jail at the same time with CHAS.

MORGAN at Pawhuska in July, 1921; that MORGAN was about fifty years

taken to Okla. City and he, BUNCH, never heard of him since. BUNCH also claimed to not know MORGAN by any names but MORGAN and SMITH, and gave no further information, except that he said he had heard that "MORGAN" had taken the same saws from Pawhuska to Okla. City and same were used at Okla. City for the attempted escape there.

Peb. 254 BRIGHT RODDY, Pawhuska, informed Agents that FRANK FRELL, formerly of Fairfax, now on the scout, had come to him, RODDY, shortly after Anna BROWN was murdered; that FARRELL told RODDY that on the night of May 21, 1921, he FRANK FARRELL was with JIMLIE HICKS, alias JOE ALLEN, and ROSE OSAGE and ANNA BROWN till about midnight; that he, FARRELL, left JIMMIE HICKS, ROSE OSAGE and JACK HALE together; that afterward JACK HALE told him, FARRELL, that he, JACK HALE, was present at the car that night when ROSE OSAGE killed ANNA BROWN.

MR. RODDY stated that FARRELL stated he was after the reward in the case, RODDY stated further that JACK HALE is now working on the Indian Reservation at Mayetta, Kans., and that he, RODDY? had told all the above to Agent C. S. Weakley, who worked on this case last August. RODDY was quite insistent that we see JACK HALE as soon as possible, and appeared certain that JACK HALE would tell the above to Agents.

BRIGHT RODDY expressed himself as a great friend and admirer of BILL HALE, and lauded HALE highly. RODDY also stated that he fully believes that MOLLIE BURKHART knows the above, and that she and ANNA'S mother knew it before ANNA'S mother died (July 17, 1921).

This is the same BRIGHT RODDY mentioned in Agent Weiss' report re. RALPH W. PONTIUS, auto thief, RODDY-being found in possession of a stolen cadillac car he had gotten from PONTIUS.

This FRINK FIRRELL is the same FRINK FARRILL previously mentioned in Agent Weiss' reports as the man who told ED BAUGHER - confidence man in jail at Guthrie in November, 1922 that he, FARRELL, knew all about the ANNA BROWN murder, heard it planned, and that a very wealthy stockman, living at Fairfax was guilty. FARRELL proposing to BAUGHER that he, FIRRELL, furnish all the evidence to BAUGHER and BAUGHER to "shake down" this wealthy stockman for thousands of dollars (by blackmail) and BAUGHER and FARRELL divide this.

(BAUGHER was discharged from the state pen. at McAlester in January, 1924, his third term in prisons.)

Owing to our knowledge of BRIGHT RODDY'S character and friendship for W. K. HALE, and of FRANK FARRELL'S statements to BAUGHER in 1922, we view with great suspicion this new "information" from RODDY, but have arranged with RODDY that he will get FRANK FARRELL, if possible, to make his statement direct to Agents (that we may get a chance to sweat FARRELL fully as to these alleged statements by him to ED BAUGHER and RODDY).

We have been endeavoring during the past four or five days to make some arrangement to get the balance of the evidence our confidential informant claims to have and hope to succeed.

We note that one MELOM CASE testified that LEC JEANNETTE was with ANNA BROWN at Pawhuska the 21st of May, 1921.

From D. E. JOHNSON we learn that LEE JEANNETTE was living at Ralston at that time, and still lives there; that JEANNETTE is a pretty fair sort of a young man.

That MELVIN CASE also lives near Frirfax, but is not considered very straight, and is rather thick with the HALE-BURKHARTS crowd.

It appears very protable that LEW JEAN ETTE is our informant's

inf mant, and the whird man in the party coming from PAUL JOHNS' and LEE MORGAN'S joints the night of May 21st, with BRYAN BURKHART, J. L. BRIDGES. EDITH DAVIS and ANNA BROWN.

If this is so, then LEE JEANNETTE is a highly important witness in this case, but this will have to be worked out very cautiously, because of our informant's present attitude.

A very decided activity is now becoming manifest toward blocking our progress by cutting off funds from our colleague, who furnishes us automobile transportation and other aid and in the getting to us of alleged but very suspicious appearing information, designed apparently to mislead us, and to extract information and beliefs from us. We are, and at all times have been, exercising the utmost secrecy and caution in these respects.

Feb. 25th Agent Weiss spent several hours at Okla. City searching jail records for trace of CHAS. MORGAN, alias JOHN J. SMITH. Neither of those names appeared of record, but by a process of analysis and elimination agent ascertained positively that CHAS. MORGAN is really J. W. CARTER, subject of Okla. City file #6277; that MORGAN was lodged by the Government in Okla. county jail Sept. 25, 1921; transferred to Muskogee Oct. 12, 1921; sentenced to two and one-half years in Leavenworth on Natl. Motor Vehicle Theft Act charge on Jan. 16, 1922.

Feb. 26th at Mansas City Agents ascertained that J. W. CARTER, alias CHAS. MORGAN, was pareled in September, 1923 to the Volunteer warriors of America; that CARTER'S last known address was 1018 E. 16th St. Inquiry at that place elicited information that CARTER left there some weeks ago, was said to work in the sausage dept. of Armour & Co... Kansas City, and possibly living with a MRS. LEVY at 1605 Wyandotte St.

Interviewed confidential informant again in effort to have him

BRACKETT, stating that BRACKETT had full authority from him to act according to BRACKETT'S judgment in the case, and that GUSTAPSON and MORAN owed BRACKETT about \$600.00 for work BRACKETT had done for them on this case, and that BRACKETT was entitled to get this money, or the requested information would not be furnished to us. (BRACKETT claims informant is demanding the money and informant claims it is BRACKETT who demands this money.)

We have been negotiating with a representative of the ANNA BROWN estate in an effort to make some sort of deal by which the balance of informant's evidence may be secured from him and thus shorten this investigation, but have not been successful to date, but have hopes of final success.

Feb. 24th J. J. MORAN reported that on that date a man came to MORAN and in strictest confidence stated that he would deliver to us (for \$50.00 "expense money") the man who killed ANNA BROWN.

MORAN refused to give us this informant's name, and declined to give the fellow \$50.00 in advance, but offered him \$200.00 when he delivered the goods.

We figure this fellow is either HARVE FREAS or DECK WALLACE, neither of whom is at all reliable.

Feb. 27th, had another talk with confidential informant of Kansas City, but he refused to disclose his evidence further, but stated that BILL BRACKETT has it all now, and that any deal we can make with BRACKETT will be agreeable to him, as BRACKETT has authority from him to do as he sees fit.

per his alleged request, but he was not there.

Fet. 27th, interviewed J. W. CARTER in private office of MR.

McCla manager armous & Co., Kensas City, Hans.

CARTER is an old time crock and "con" man". He was very much on guard, admitted his identity and being in jail in Pswhuska in July, 1921 and that BRYAN and ERNEST BURKHART were in jail at the same time, charged with the murder of ANNA BROWN, but CARTER would not admit remembering any conversation between the BURKHARTS and anyone regarding this murder, and at first declared he had not heard of the murder.

Later, CARTER declared it was a dirty murder, and proceeded to relate that ANNA PROWN was gotten drunk by a man, taken out of town and shot in the top of the head while sitting down, drunk and leaning against a rock or a tree.

We had not mentioned any of these details to him. CARTER also remarked that if the persons guilty learned that a witness had over-heard them discussing the crime, they would certainly bump this witness

- J. W. CARTER has served four terms in prison, according to Warden BIDDLE, two at Jefferson City, Mo. and two at Leavenworth, and was very suspicious.
- J. W. CARTER declined to give us his residence address, but stated that he will continue to work in the sausage dept. at armour & Co., Kansas City, and proposed that our informant meet him rersonally as it may be that his memory will be refreshed by talking with and seeing our informant.

CARTER asked to see our credentials as Government men, and then asked where this case had any Government jurisdiction. He seemed to fear that we were Agents for the guilty persons, or else after him for some other crimes he is guilty of. We shall try to have our informant get him to talk, as we are convinced he knows semething, but is concealing it through fear.

### HENRY ROAN MURDER:

Enid, Okla., Feb. 19th and 20, 1924, ROY BUNCH, sounty jail, stated to Agents that EARNEST NEWTON, who is serving six months sentence at Enid, Okla. on whiskey charge, sent up from Fairfax, Okla., had engaged in conversation with him, BUNCH, and in said conversation said that while he, NEWTON, was at a dance sometime ago, HENRY CORNETT had told him, NEWTON, that ALBERT STEPHENS, who then resided at Burbank, Okla., had killed HENRY ROAN because ROAN had turned in some bootlegger to officers.

That CORNETT was drinking, in fact drunk when he made this remark and at this time someone came up to them and he told CORNETT he did not want to hear anything about the killing, or he witness, and CORNETT did not say anything more about the killing of ROAN.

That this man ALBERT STEPHENS is well known bootlegger at Burbank, Okla., and that vicinity. That recently W. W. THOMASON, Indian Officer, Fairfax, Okla., confiscated a still operated by STEPHENS near Burbank, Okla., and during said raid STEPHENS made good his escape, and now a fugitive. MR. THOMASON will be interviewed in this connection later.

Description of ALBERT STEPHENS, possibly STEVENS: Age, 40; weight, 200; height, six feet and last lived on JOHN CARRELL farm.

MARY BUNCH stated that a short time before her husband mix disappeared and later found shot, BILL HALE came to their home at a time when she, her husband and children were all ready to go the country for dinner, and called her husband out and talked with him for some time and her husband then told her to go shead to dinner, that he was going with BILL HALE; that she went on to dinner in the country and

returned late that day and found her husband home drunk and he told her about MALE taking him to some bootlegger who had an old Dodge car with boose in it. That her husband told her this bootlegger had said he wanted to meet her, and her husband prevailed on her to make the trip to see said bootlegger but she never made the trip with him and did not see the bootlegger.

That WILLIE WABASH, who ran around with her husband, hadm made the trip with her husband and their bootlegger refused to sell him any booze while he was with WABASH and told her husband that he had warned him not to bring anyone with him other than his, ROAN'S, wife.

That WABASH was with ROAN a great deal while alive, and they had had BERTHA, a one-half breed pawnee squaw that worked for PEARL MCKINLEY, out on several parties.

NEWTON further stated to BUNCH that SOL SMITH knew who killed 52D ROAN (Note: ROAN found on or near SMITH'S farm.

, says JACK HALE, Kansas Indian, was with ROSE CSAGE when ANNA BROWN was killed and knows ROSE killed ANNA.

Informed by J. J. MORAN and WM. BRACKETT that HALE has not been questioned in this connection other than talked to by BRACKETT about others that night of being implicated in murder, etc.

HALE resides at Maryetta, Kans. on Indian Reservation.

MRS. MARY (ROY) BUNCH stated to Agents that MRS. PEARL MCKINERY, wife of JOHN McKINLEY, Fairfax, told MRS. BUNCH (who was formerby MRS. HENRY ROAN) that ANGELA McKINLEY told MRS. PEARL McKINLEY that her husband, Alfred McKINLEY and Mamie Fletcher were out joyriding together a week or so before ROAN'S body was found by the officers, and that while so joyriding said Hamie Fletcher and Alfred McKINLEY saw HENRY ROAN dead; that MAMIE FLETCHER remarked to ALFRED McKINLEY

(now dead) Withat is my cousin, HENRY ROAM"; that ALFRED MCKINLEY and HAMIE FLETCHER kept this secret and ALFRED told ANGELE that "they" will kill us if we tell".

MRS. BUNCH, MAMIE FLETCHER, ANGELA MCKINLEY, MRS. PEARLY MCKINLEY and ALFRED MCKINLEY are all full blood Osages, and as usual very cowardly. Agents have interviewed MAMIE FLETCHER personally and have had JOHN WHITEHORN and GEORGE PITTS, two full blood Osage men, close to her, Also questioned her, but she curtly denies any knowledge of the above alleged facts, and declares same to be untrue.

ANGELA MCKINLEY is reported to have denied all the above to GEORGE PITTS, but we shall continue on this line, as MRS. DAN SCOTT declares positively that ANGELA MCKINLEY told her the same story. (These Osages are all in craven fear of telling anything of their own personal knowledge regarding these murders, for fear of their own personal safety.)

Dear Sir;

Inasmuch as we, the undersigned Agents, have been working on these murder cases for some months, we believe the following facts in this letter form are appropriate and advisable for your information.

Agent Weiss was assigned specially to these cases Sept 29, 1923. Since said date Agent Weiss has been engaged in Federal Court, under subpoens for the Government, and other investigations, about two and a haf menths, the balance of the time being engaged on these cases

Agent Burger was assigned specially to work jointly with Agt Weiss on these case Dec.16th,1925,but has been in Federal Court,under subpoens for the government in other cases about 15 or 20 days.

We have directed most of our efforts to the solving of the Anna Brown murder, for the reason that we believe that solving that will also furnish the key to the Smithe and Roan Murders, as these three cases seem to be interrelated, and in many instances the persons having knowledge or information re the Anna Brown Kurder, also have some re one or both of the others. We have ascertained the real facts in the Anna Brown Murder, but still have the difficult task of locating certain known witnesses, and inducing them and others to tell the Escata, and this is now our immediate work.

We have just recently gained the confidence of two members of the underworld, who have promised to work under cover for us, and who are in positions to get all the underworld information on these cases. These two men have already furnished us information on theses cases that justifies our hopes that they are working in good faith with us.

We also have a list of some 25 names of pursons to be intermitated, whom we have not heretofore seen, owing to the fact that persons intimately/with these persons to be interviewed have been proxising us to arrange interviews under the most favorable conditions, but have not kept these promises. We are now convinced that we shall have to locate personally, and go direct to interview said persons, wherever found, whether in or out of this State. Many persons necessary to be interviewed have left this County and State; some as fugitives from criminal charges, some for ordinary reasons, and some, we are informed, have been paid by suspects to go away and stay away. A number of reputable and conservative citizens have repeated advised us that in view of suspects known desperate characters Agents should be together at all times and prepared for any kind of trouble on short netice. We have no reason to doubt that this is good advice, and intend to follow it.

As will be noted, we have held the expense of this investigation down to the minimum. It has been necessary to travel thousands of miles by antemphile, through the oil fields and across country, but we have lavoided all expense on that score by availing surselves of the car and man furnished by the heirs of the murdered Indians. These investigations are very difficult, tedious and with many hardships, as explained in sour regular reports, but because of our personal pride, and pride in this Bursan's record, we are determined to continue to a successful end, and he quitters for any cause, while assigned to the case.

We have short conferences from time totime with the officials of the Ossge Indian Agency at Fawhuska, and are pleased with their interest in the cases, and expressions of their satisfaction with our work. They are unanimous in stating that they ernestly desire that we continue the investigations to a definite conclusion, and the gulty parties prosecuted

#### RE: MURDER OF ANNA BROWN:

Mar. 21st received word from under cover man for us to see him in day or two at some point in Kansas.

Informed by HARVEY O. BROWN, Deputy Marshal, Pawhuska, that he had warrants, whiskey charges for FRANK TERRELL and RAY R. SMITH and LER MORGAN, and arranged with ...R. BROWN to call us if he succeeded in locating them, so we can question them.

JACK ALLEN, alias JIMMIEVHICKS, is in jail, Federal whiskey charge at Pawhuska, but we want, if possible, to interview FRANK TERRELL and JACK HALE before questioning JACK ALLEN and his wife, ROSIE.

/Interviewed W. H. BRACKETT, who still refuses to divulge the balance of the confidential evidence unless he is first paid the \$500.00

Interviewed A. W. COMSTOCK and urged upon him the urgent necessity of him producing his promised "eye witnesses" at once, but MR. COMSTOCK was very busy.

Arranged with BILL CROW, HARVEY BROWN, TOM HUBBARD and HUGH MAYES, all officers, to let us know at once of any information they may get as to whereabouts of FRANK TERRELL or LES MORGAN.

Mar. 22d worked under cover at Pawhuska in effort to get a line on FRANK TERRELL and LEE MORGAN and JACK HALE.

March 23d and 24th interviewed confidential informant at Wichita, who stated that he knows personally that ERNEST BURKHART planned the robbery by which BILL SMITH and his wife, RITA, were robbed of valuable diamonds, as he, informant, drove the men who did the job, and that CHARLEY McDONALD, Okla. City crock, was one of these men; that he, informant, knows these men robbed the SMITHS at the request of ERNEST and BRYAN SURKHART, as ERNEST BURKHART told informant the robbers were back in Okla. City before the report was out.

Informant further states that BLACKIE THOMPSON (said to have been in jail at Newkirk on fur robbery in Feb. 1924) and BIG JIM PARKER, and a third man are the men who robbed FRED DENOYA and wife of valuable diamonds; that BIG JIM PARKER told this to informant, and also said that the third man took the diamonds to pones to dispose of them, but later reported he had lost the proceeds in a poker game; that informant drove BLACKIE THOMPSON and JIM PARKER out twice to do this job.

(DOCK HAWKINS says BILL HALE framed this DENOYA diamond robbery, and that the third man was CURLEY JOHNSON.)

over W. W. THOMASON, Indian police officer, Fairfax; that MEISEY MORRISON recently signed over to H. G. BURT the same oil interests he, MORRISON, once signed over to BILL HALE; that these papers to BURT were signed at Arkansas City about three weeks ago and HALE knows now where MORRISON is. (Looks as though THOMASON is being followed by, or has understanding with HALE.)

That harold Burt, son of H. G. Burt and SAM TURNER. Mayor of Shidler, met Morrison at Arkansas City and paid him \$250.00 to sign these papers to H. G. Burt. As H. G. Burt and Halk are very intimate, looks as though this was done for Halk.

Informant also stated that H. G. BURT and HAIR split on the boodle they got when GEO. BIGHRART, Osage Indian, was apparently poisoned at a hospital in Okla. City.

Informant stated further that just recently HALE, in response to overtures, suggested to EERSEY MORRISON that he, HALE, would arrange and persuade LIZA BIGHEART, wealthy Osage widow, to marry MELSEY MORRISON. (The significance of this is that MORRISON had told HALE he, MORRISON, was going to marry some rich Osage woman, and not wait for her to die, but was going to get her money in short order, meaning kill her or have her killed.

Informant also reiterated his former statement that about July, 1923, he was in jail at Pawhuska; that BRYAN BURKHART was in jail on ANNA BROWN murder charge at same time; that BILL HALE paid frequent visits to, and had conversations with BRYAN BURKHART at said jail; that on one of these occasions the conversation took place near where J. W. CARTER (criminal) was lying down; that when HALE left on this occasion, CARTER told informant, "I know now who killed ANNA BROWN."

Informant states that CARTER is an old crock, and "hot"; that CARTER knows HALE and the BURKHARTS and will be hard to catch, but informant will have him tell us what he overheard, if we can locate him, and to try to locate CARTER for us.

Mar. 26th. Learned from AR. McCLAIN, manager Armour Co., Kansas city, Kans. that J. W. CARTER left their employ right after our talk with CARTER some weeks ago, and that CARTER left no address. Made effort to locate CARTER, but with no success as yet. but have a good picture of him and will continue to look for him.

war. 26th and 27th also had long talk with confidential informant of Kansas City, trying to induce him to furnish balance of information he possesses, but he insisted he has turned everything complete, including names of third man in party and #6 witness, to BILL BRACKETT, and promised BRACKETT to let BRACKETT handle it, as BRACKETT claims MORAN and GUSTAFSON have not paid him in full. nor treated him squarely. The real truth is that BRACKETT and this informant are determined to get some cash or conceal their information

This informant finally stated he would phone BRACKETT on the 27th and urge BRACKETT to accede to Agent's requests to furnish the information and trust that their demanded money would be gotten somehow. if their information and witnesses stood up.

Mar. 28th, informant added today that in July, 1921 it was ERNEST BURKHART who brought informant the two fine steel saws and some nitric acid to informant at the pawhuska jail; that informant gave these to J. W. CARTER and who made a sort of sup out of soap to hold the nitric acid to soften the steel, then sawed same and made the hole by which about twelve prisoners escaped; that the hole was too small for CARTER who, however, stripped and scaped his

body in a vain . fort to get through.

Informant also reiterated that BILL HALR had proposed that he would help \_ELSEY MORRISON marry ELIZA BIGHEART.

That this proposition came up by MORRISON remarking to HALE recently that he, MORRISON, was going to square himself of present charges, marry an Osage squaw and when she died he, MORRISON, would sell the estate he would get by her death for \$10,000.00; that HALE replied that LIZA BIGHEART liked MORRISON, and suggested that MORRISON marry her; that could help.

Informant stated that LIZA BIGHEART would not live a month after this proposed marriage, but informant could not figure whom HALE had in mind to bump her off.

LIZA BIGHEART'S estate is worth between \$150,000 and \$300,000.

ALLEN'S mother in which said mother stated in substance: "Surely
ROSE will not throw you down after that terrible deed you did for
her." (ZINSEL told Agent Weiss this same thing last ZINSEL
wrote us from Skiatook, Okla., a few weeks ago, and present to
come to Pawhuska for an interview, but has not shown up as yet.

AD Informant stated that it is his belief that BRYAN BURKHART was present when ANNA BROWN was killed, but informant
would not tell what he founded this belief upon.

Owing to BILL BRACKETT'S absence, and JOE ALLEN'S release and the further fact that FRANK TERRELL and FRED WHEELER are Federal fugitives and JACK HALE is in Boston, we have had to go slow for the past three days in order to avoid flushing some witnesses and exposing our evidence. We now have a very confidential informant under cover.

ELIZA BIGHEART is mother of ROSE OSAGE (now MRS. JOE ALLEN) and the three live together near Mairfax, but ELIZA BIGHEART is

unfavorable to this investigation by reason of certain influences and fear.

April 2d. Arranged to take W. H. BRACKETT to Kansas City in final effort to have E. M. PIKE give us all his evidence. BRACKETT states positively that PIKE has never furnished him the "third" man's name, but he, BRACKETT, will assist us all possible with PIKE

PRACKETT today furnished us following additional information which he secured from MATT WILLIAMS of Pawhuska, to-wit:

That in May, 1921, FRED WHEELER and MATT WILLIAMS roomed together at Ralaton, Okla.; that FRED WHEELER was bootlegging whiskey and on the night of May 21, 1921 FRED WHEELER went with ANNA BROWN and BRYAN BURKHART to the place of WALTER COLLINS for the purpose of getting some whiskey; that COLLINS then lived west of Ralaton, but now lives east of Ponca, Okla.; that FRED WHEELER got out of the car at WALTER COLLINS that night and got the whiskey for BRYAN BURKHART and ANNA BROWN, getting a quart and int and bringing it back to them at the car.

MATT WILLIAMS tells BRACKETT that FRED WHEELER told WILLIAMS these facts, and further that BILL HALE, ERNEST BURKHART gave FRED THEELER money afterward, and later when WHEELER was in jail at Pawhuska HALE fixed Sheriff FREES to let FRED WHEELER out as trusty, and ERNEST BURKHART furnished \$40.00 to FRED WHEELER to leave the country on.

That MATT WILLIAMS etates that FRED WHEELER is probably at a rooming house in K. C. Mo., run by ARCH LOOPE, and that LOOPE will know where Wheeler is if gone: that ERNEST BURKHART pays WILLIAMS some money from time to time now. (This corroborates ODE BROWN'S statement to Agents that FRED WHEELER told him where ANNA BROWN

and BRYAN BURKHART got the whiskey that night, west from Ralston. Probable ODE BROWN will recognize the name of "WALTER COLLINS" as WHEELER told BROWN the name of the man from whom they got that whiskey.) WALTER COLLINS is said to have since served a thirty-days sentence for whiskey violation.

April 3d, W. H. BRACKETT and Agents went together to Kansas City to have final conference with E. M. PIKE and endeavor to locate and get statement from FRED WHEELER, said to be rooming with ARCH LOOPE, who runs a rooming housexxx of forty-four rooms, on East 12th St., Kansas City, Mo.

BRACKETT today promised to arrange so that MATT WILLIAMS will talk direct to and work with Agents, and also promised to urge PIKE to give us all the evidence, information, names and assistance possible in this case.

April 4th, finally succeeded in setting name of tird man, and arranged to have him meet Agents on apr. 8th for per and full interview. Also are informed that said third man can give us names of about a dosen witnesses, and that both J. A. GUSTAFSON and his operative MITCHELL have had several talks with our informant during past three months, trying to get information on this case, evidently for HALE-BURKHARTS. Said third man is said to have been present with ANNA EROWN and ERYAN BURKHART within twenty minutes of the time ANNA was murdered, and ERNEST BURKHART personally took our informant to this third man and this third man personally told our informant the above, and also that informant heard the murder plotted by BRYAN and ERNEST BURKHART, BILL HALE and J. LXBRIDGES, and knows personally that HALE furnished BRYAN BURKHART the 132 gun to kill ANNA BROWN with. This third

man's reasons for keeping silent in the past are said to be because he was with a sporting woman that night, and is afraid to have his wife learn it, and also because he fears violence from the guilty ones if he is known to have told.

He is said, however, to be a man of courage, who really desires to see the guilty ones punished, and to be willing to assist when assured the prosecution will be ably, honestly and fearlessly pushed to the limit, regardless of expense, and danger, and in a way that will insure no selling out by the prosecution. (This fear that the prosecution will be bought off is almost universal in Osage County, and the consensus of opinion is that the Government should have an able, honest, gearless Government attorney from without the state, appointed to assist from start to finish of the prosecution.

Informant states he has mm more evidence that he give us after our interview with said third man, and reiterated loday that J. L. BRIDGES was present when the murder was committed.

Informant has promised to talk further to GUSTAFSON and MITCHEL who have been keeping tab on him, and try to draw them out as to their interests and objects in the case at this time.

Apr. 5th, confidential informant told Agents personally that the third man with BRYAN BERKHART, ANNA BROWN. J. L. BRIDGES and EDITH DAVIS on the trip the night of May 21, 1921 when ANNA BROWN was murdered, was and is now living at Fairfax, and gave us this man's name, under our promise to conceal same till trial if possible and further that said man heard the plan between HALE, BRYAN BURKHART and J. L. BRIDGES made that night to murder ANNA BROWN, and knows personally that HALE furnished BRYAN BURKHART

the gun to kill ANNA BROWN with, and that this third man can give us the names of ten or fifteen witnesses who can corroborate this evidence.

Arrangements were made to meet this third man at Pawhuska irg.
April 8th and have him give Agents his statement direct.

Apr. 3th met BRACKETT at Pawhuska as per agreement, but instead of having the third man as had been promised, BRACKETT produced a letter from PIKE reading as follows:

W. H. Brackett, Pawhuska, Okla.

Dear Brackett:

Am just in receipt of a letter from our friend down / are, and am sending this special delivery so that it will reach / early to-morrow morning.

There has been so much pressure to bear on this case recently that he is going to refuse to divulge anything to anyone and after his explanation I cannot hardly blame him, for he says that he will ignore all requests to talk in the matter, or that he knows anything whatsoever about the case.

For the information of all concerned, as most of us all know, there has been a great deal of pressure in this case during the last few weeks, and as I see it now there is only way in which the matter can be handled successfully, and that is by setting steady in the boat for a few days, and see if I can successfully accomplish anything by further correspondence with parties in that vicinity.

I will keep you fully advised as to what success I have with other parties. There has been a lot of cash put out for quietness, and it looks like they are going to be quiet.
