That Crady Drake, who was convicted at Denver of automotile theft, and is now paroled to the Sheriff at Perry, Okla. was propositioned to commit some of these murders, but that to the present time they have not been able to make proper connections with Grady Drake to cause him to tell the truth of what he knows about these murders, and that this matter is now receiving their attention and they hope in a short time to obtain valuable information from Grady Brake.

You will also note that Osage Indian Superintendent J. Goo. Wright and Mr. Woodward, the attorney for the Osage Trite, have recently been to Washington and have examined the reports of these agents, and are anxious that the investigation continue, and also have hopes that the investigation will ultimately be successful. Also, that they have agreed to furnish and as a matter of fact have already furnished a Ford car and the upkeep of same for the use of Agents Weiss and Burger as they continue the investigation.

I realise that this has been a very long, drawn-out and extensive investigation, as well as expensive. Agents Weiss and Burger state that they feel confident that they will ultimately be able to secure the evidence which will warrant conviction in some of these cases, but they of course cannot and neither can I state how long it may take them to secure said evidence.

I will state that agents Jeiss and Burger are confident that they can complete this investigation satisfactorily, and I know of no agents in this service in whose ability I place more confidence than in these two Agents, and will state that I believe if these murders can be solved, that they can ultimately solve them.

Knowing as I do that this has been a long, drawn-out investigation, with the statement above. I leave it entirely to you to state whether or not the investigation should be continued or discontinued.





July 18th, interviewed CLEVE TOLLISON, Deputy Sheriff at Bristow. Okla. who stated that it appears a certainty that BLACKIE THOMPSON was in the Avery bank robbery and killing July 2, 1924 and that he and fellow officers have a line on the bandit who was shot and he will notify us promptly of all he learns regarding BLACKIE THOMPSON and his movements.

July 19th, COL. WM. C. KEY, Warden, state prison, McAlester, phoned that the officers of Creek County had informed him that BLACKER THOMPSON was one of the bandits who killed an officer and robbed the Avery bank July 2, 1924



July 20th interviewed MRS. MAMIE GILL, 911 V. 9th, Okla. City. who stated that she remembers that about March, 1923 PELSEY MORRISON came 56.

that she did not see him when he first arrived, but that the neighbors told her he was drunk; that she did notice he left the car at the curb, and that his wife (now dead) drove the car down town and put it in a garage; that she, RS. GILL, thinks this was the time MORRISON had a case against him in Federal court at Oklahoma City over some whiskey.

MRS. (It is a moral certainty that MORRISON was at her house the night of March 9, 1923 in Okla. City when the SMITH home was blown up at Fairfax, 120 miles away.)

FOSTER, Undersheriff at Perry, Okla. and requested them to go with us or get GRADY DRAKE in, as per our previous agreements, but Sheriff RICKER stated that GRADY DRAKE left BERT DAVIS some weeks ago and he, RICHER, has been unable to locate DRAKE or get word from him; that he, RICKER, will be very busy on official business for a few days, but will locate DRAKE and have him in to Perry and question him and try to get his sevidence within the next three or four days.

MRI RICHER promised also that when he does get hold of DRAKE he will notify us at once and hold him till we can get there.

(We have been promised by MR. RICKER and MR. He talked this matter over with me, and I informed him that I had no knowledge of the intentions of the Director in his case, and could only be, guided by instructions.

DIGEST OF FACTS AND EVIDENCE RE. MURDER OF HENRY ROAM, FULL BLOOD OSAGE INDIAN, Osage Co., Okla., JAN. 26, 1925. Henry Roan was a full blood Osage Indian about 40 years old who at the time of his murder on or about Jan. 26, 1923 was living with his wife, Mary,

also a full blood Osage, and his children, at Fairfax. Okla. This report made jointly by Agents/

J. R. Burger and T. F. Weiss.

DETAILS:

Feb. 6, 1923 ROAN'S body was found in the front seat of his own ear aboutthree miles northwest of Fairfax in a swale, about 200 yards from the road. He had been shot through the heat from the rear. and had evidently been dead about ten days. Was evidently murdered Tat the spot the body was found, as the glass of the windshield had been shattered by the bullet, which passed through his head and through the windshield, was scattered all about the car and pieces still lay on the side of the car.

estate vested at his death in his said wife and children. ROAN'S THE was well liked but drank considerably. He had no enemies with the gerception of one ROY BUNCH. ROY BUNCH was a worthless sort of white

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man, about twenty-six years old. who had been intimate with ROAN'S wife at and for some time previous to ROAN'S murder and who married her a few months after ROAN'S death. However, infadality and immorality is very common among the younger Osage women. knew of **ROAN** this intimacy between BUNCH and MRS. ROAN and at one time took his gun and hunted BUNCH with the avowed purpose of killing him and at other times cried and complained to SAM TULK and others that BUNCH was invading his home, etc. ROAN also shot himself twice in apparent attempts at suicide but did not seriously wound himself so that the common opinion is that he was just trying to frighten his wife into doing right.

There was a rumor that SAM TULK and BOB PARKER, officers of Fair-fax, had been seen chasing ROAN for whiskey about the time of his disappearance but this was investigated and shown to have been a week or more before ROAN'S disappearance. ROAN took his car and left home about noon, Jan. 26, 1925 went downtown got a little money from his guardian and was not seen again until his dead body was found as related above. Robbery could not have been the motive, as none of his money or valuables were taken, but were still on his body when found.

Shortly after ROAN'S death, W. E. (BILL) HATE of Fairfax,

Wealthy influential and unscrupulous rancher and stockman, produced an

insurance policy in the Capitol Life Insurance Co. of Colorado in

HALE'S favor, in the amount of \$25,000.00. HATE has since brought suit

as the insurance company refuses to pay, on the grounds of fraud and

misrepresentation and said suit is now pending.

J. A. GUSTAFSON and his operatives and WM. BRACKETT and JOHN MORAN also private detectives, were employed for some months on the case by

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some of ROAN'S heirs, including his widow. WORAN and BRACKETT readil furnished the Government Agents all information they had. but GUSTAFSON evaded doing so. In April, 1923, Frank V. Wright, a then Special Agent of this Bureau, made a preliminary report but very little investigation. In July, 1923, C. T. Weakley, Special Agent of this Bureau, was assigned to this case and the allied ones of the w. E. SMITH ANNA BROWN and CHAS. WHITEHORN murders. Agent weakley was called back to Ohio in September, 1923 and the same month Agent T. F. Weiss was assigned to these cases and has been working on them continuously since. with the exception of three and one-half months lost by having to be in Federal court for the Government on other cases. Dec. 16, 1923 Agent J. R. Burger began working jointly with Agent Weiss and has continued to do so with the exception of about six weeks that Agent Burger was in Federal Court on other cases for the Government. One HERMAN FOX DAVIS was employed about April. 1923 by the Attorney General's office of Oklahoma but was taken off after about five weeks and sent to prison on a plea of guilty for bribery and graft practiced by him while ostensibly working on these cases. He apparently secured no evidence in these cases. HERMAN FOX DAVIS was soon pardoned by Governor J. C. WALTON but early in 1924 was tried and convicted for the murder of PAUL McCarthy, attorney at Oklahoma City, and sentenced to life imprisonment at McAlester. Okla., where he is now serving time. county authorities have done nothing in this matter. ROAN

SUSPECTS AND POSSIBLE MOTIVES OR EXPLANATIONS OF ROAN MURDER:

These Agents have impartially followed out every lead as far as
possible to date and will state shortly that the evidence convinces us

that RCY BUNCH and MRS. HENRY ROAN had nothing to do with this murder (though this is still remotely possible). That ROAN was not killed by officers as at first rumored, no doubt on this point. We are now convinced that HENRY ROAN was murdered by assassins employed by W. K. HALR for the purpose of enabling HALE to collect the \$25,000.00 on the policy he held on ROAN'S life and this is the general opinion among the better people in the county and among the Osage Indians.

DIGEST 0 I EVIDENCE:

'Proof of death and its cause; identification of body.

can testify that on Feb. 6, 1923, they received BOB PARKER and word that an automobile was at anding at the JIM RHODES side of the road about three miles northwest of Fairfax, in the direction of Burbank; that they suspected it was a whiskey car and went out to investigate; that they found the ear standing about 200 yards of the back road between Fairfax and Burbank in a rocky swale, down which a dim trail ran; that the car was HENRY ROAN'S touring car, had all the curtains up and pointing north and a little east: that HENRY ROAN'S dead body was lying on the front seat with a bullet hole through the head; that the bullet showed to have entered just back of the left ear and emerged just over the right eye. breaking the windshield glass; that this broken glass was strewn for about twenty feet back along the car tracks and some pieces were still lying on the hood of the car; that ROAN was lying on the front seat with his foot just off the pedals and his head, with his cap under it, resting on the right edge of the seat; that the position of in the body plainly indicated that ROAN had been driving when shot from the left rear; that the back burtain was unsnapped partly at the top; that there was not much blood but some blood had dripped from the wound in the head. just inside of the right front door and some had dripped just outside the front on the right side and had been blown and lodged along the car on that side back from the front door, showing that a north wind had 48 been blowing at the time and that ROAN had fallen as they found him, and killed at that spot; that PARKER and JIM RHODES got the body back to Fairfax, where DRS. H. B. PRENTISS and J. G. SHOUN performed an autopsy on it. That they, JIM PARKER and JIM RHODES, knew HENRY ROAM 51 52 well in his lifetime and know positively that it was HENRY ROAN'S body that they found.

Can testify that they performed the autopsy above indicated and that the wound was as stated by Parker and Rhodes and that said wound caused the death of said Henry

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ROAN; that his body showed to have been dead some ten days as it had been frozen stiff at first but had begun to thaw and decompose at the time it was found; that the weather had been very cold from about Jan. 26th to Feb. 3d or 4th, 1923 at which time a warm spell set in, so that Roan must have been killed about Jan. 26th; that they, DRS. PRENTISS and SHOUN, both knew HENRY ROAN well in his lifetime, and know it was ROAN'S body that was found as no changes had occurred in the body to hinder an easy identification.

MRS. MARY ROAN, can testify that she last saw her husband, HENRY ROAN, alive on Jan. 24th or 25, 1923; that he left with his car, in which his body was later found, in the forencen of that date and she never saw him alive again; that she identified his body when it was brought in to Fairfax Mar. 6, 1923 and is sure it was his body.

(NOTE) Agents have made every effort to locate the bullet that killed ROAN, but so far it appears that no one ever found it.

EVIDENCE AS TO WHERE? WHEN and BY WHOM MURDER WAS COMMITTED:

SAM TULK and and a host of others can testify that ROY BUNCH and BOB PARKER ROAN'S wife were intimate for months before ROAN'S murder as BUNCH admitted it and it was of notorious and common knowledge and that ROY BUNCH married her a few months after the murder. But so far not one lots of evidence has been secured by anyone connecting BUNCH with the murder. Both BUNCH and the wife talk freely and BUNCH, when ROAN'S body was found, remarked right away to BILL HALE and others: "Now they will all blame that on me", or words to that effect, but his behavior has been that of an innocent man at all times. ROAN'S ex-widow insists that BILL HALE had ROAN murdered for the insurance, while her present husband, ROY BUNCH, stubbornly contends that he believes SAM TULK and BOB PARYER shot ROAN while chasing him for (Agents are morally certain that neither BUNCH nor his: having whiskey. BUNCH is rather dull and wife have any knowledge as to the real facts. slow-witted and has not much nerve.) The notorious relations between BUNCH and ROAN'S wife were calculated to furnish a good screen for some other person to murder ROAN, as suspicion would inevitably fall on BUNCE. HALE immediately spread broadcast what BUNCH had said to him about everybody blaming ROAN'S murder on ham. BUNCH.

JOHN MORAN, Tulsa, Okla. City. Can testify that they carefully gathered together some of the pieces of glass from the shattered windshield of HENRY ROAN'S car in the spot where said car and body were found, but a year after-3 ward, and that said glass was heavy plate; that the spot where the bullet had struck was found; that is, pieces of the glass that the spot where the struck, and that said bullet had gone completely through the glass, indicating a high-power gun must have been used; that a careful search failed to discover the bullet; that the caliber was apparently about .78.

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JOHN MOLEAN, Agent for the Capitol Life Insurance, Denver, Colo., can testify that W. E. HALE made application for life insurpance in said company through McIEAN for insurance in HALE'S favor on the life of HENRY ROAN in the sum of \$25,000.00; that he, McIEAN, took said application but privately advised the company to reject it, because of the fact that ROAN'S history showed him to have been syphilitic, contamptive and to have made two apparent attempts at suicide.
