Mr. Leachman, who is employed by the People's

Motor Bus Company, stated that in July of 1920 he was in Pawhuska, Okla. planning, to open a garage and car repair shop; that he lacked money and shen discussing the matter with another garage man, who spened garage in an old frame church in the town, was informed that a Jewish banker, a man about 55 years old, whose bank is located in a two story yellow brick building a block and a half from the Court House and County Jail, would finance the erection of a garage, provided that he played the game" the way the banker wanted it. Leachman states he does not remember the name of either the garage man or the banker, however that he called an the banker and that the latter offered to build a garage for which Leachman would pay a reasonable rental and that the banker, who claimed to be guardian and administrator of the estates of some two hundred Indians, would give Leachman all of the car repair business of the Indians under his care, provided that Leachman would give him blank receipts for the bills; that the banker told him that he could charge any sum he desired and that it would be paid, however hat Leachman was to give blank receipts in return.

Leachman states that domestic trouble of his own prevent a him from entering into this arrangement.

He further stated that about nine months ago he ras Wichita Kansas, gathering evidence of linear liquor violations fo Sheriff Chester Connor; that while engaged in this work he became asquainted with one John Kennedy, an Indian, whose wife, a white oman; has posted a \$10,000 reward for the apprehension of those responsible for the killing of Indians in Osage County, Oklahoma: that Kennedy was continually drunk, was picked up by the police and lodged in jail. then taken to the sanitarium; that he (Leachman) was informed by a garage man, whose name he does not recall, in whose garage Kennedy kept his Buick car and which is the first garage on the East side of Emporia Avenue. North of Douglas Avenue; that a certain wrestler, whose name he does not know but who was employed as a detective by the Jack May Detective Agency of Michita and his restler/companion, known as crey slim, that Mrs. Kennedy gave them \$400.00 to keep Kennedy drunk and to have him locked up in the jail an taken to the Sanitarium. Leachman further stated that his wrestler and Ropey blim apparently carried out their part of the agreement until Leachman and one Ray Tender, an attorney located at 917 Beacon Building Wichita, heard of this and frightened the wrestler and dopey slim away by making inquiries in Mugarage on Emporia Avenue.

Leachman stated that it was rumore around Wichite that are. Kennedy's purpose in wishing to keep Kennedy drunk and away from home was to prevent his appearance in a suit filed against him for \$10,000 by some of her relatives.

When asked as to his and kay Tender's interest in the matter Leachman wrote down on a piece of paper the letters K K K and stated that it was by reason of this he and Tender interested themselves in the Kennedy case.

Leachman further stated that he believes that the unknown wrestler and dopey slim may know something about the murders of the Indians in Osage County as they are a tough lot and may have been hired by others in the same manner and for the same purpose as by Mrs. Kennedy.

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





I might add that Mrs. John Kenny is obsessed with the idea that the Tillmen's are responsible for all the wrongs of this state and I understand that she has attempted to murder Tillman on several occasions.

She is not so far wrong in her opinion of the character and activities of Tillman, especially his mixing up in the outlawry of Osage County in the way of representing the criminals operating in that district, however I might add that Fred!Tillman is not awarse to double crossing his clients and has given confidential information on several occasions that led to the apprehension of some of Oklahoma's bank robbers.

As soon as Agent DiLillo returns from Tulsa which will be within the dext day or so will take up this case and follow out your suggestions, however, I might add that the work in this office is very heavy - thirty seven new cases being received to-day and the day not yet over - and agent DiLillo is the only agent here who can keep things moving while I am out of the office.

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

Helsay Morrison about 5 or 6 years ago came to the Oscae Cole country and shortly after arriving married Matherine Polit or They got along all right. She married Morrison to free her from Platcher. They ran away. The girl became disaatisfied and homesick so they returned to the Csage country. The girl had a guardian, Charlie Ashbrook. The guardian prewented their going on ranch. Kelsey began drinking and divorce between Katherine and Kelsey resulted, She married Mose Starr. pretty good fellow, with sutomobile business at Ponca. Starr was attacked same way as others. About this time Bill Stepson, once a good fellow but attacked in same manner, was sued by girl for bastardy, although married to a white woman. the girl living with the legal wife; Bill Stepson was called out one evening about five o'clock and sometime during the night staggered through town, and early in the morning was found on Smith's doorstep and died a fes hours later. Kelsey Morrison later married the widow Stepson and there is one child by the former marriage and one child by the marriage to Morrison. Kelsey by this time appeared to be insane and the widow Stepson was acting peculiar. Mrs. Stepson died and before her death she called Kelsey to her bedside and asked him to take the children away and care for them. She made a will dividing property between children. Hale controlled Kelsey at this time. took the children and went to Mexico and finally had to come back. sickness making it impossible for him to work. Thompson, Osage field man, works under Government for Indians but paid by tribal Kelsey argued with Thompson over sighing away property to Bill Hale. He is understood to have been arrested and Thompson draw a gun and Kelsey drew his gun and fred a shot through Thompson's finger but was never brought to trial. Mrs. Kenny was interested in Mose Starr's condition and wanted to know whether Mose Starr was put under the same condition of others because he was a 33rd Degree Mason. She want and talked with Starr and told Tillman his lawyer.

Kelsey got Kathering back in Pawhuska, Mose Starr and Kathering Poll being divorced. She remarried Kelsey, again secured divorce, and returned to Mos e Starr which brought about another killing.

Mrs. Kenny never knew about the Anna Brown happening before coming to Oklahoma. In 1909 she and Kenny were married at Winfield, Mans. They were married about two weeks when Kenny went to Ralston on business; he was gone 3 or 4 days when an Indian rode up and told her Kenny was at Ralston in trouble. The went to locate him. Bob Jones said "We'll fix you for your inference. They were arrested at Pawnee charged with adultery. She did not have her marriage certificate with her and was not permitted to get it but was lodged in jail. Henry Hudson, partner of A. W. Comstock and Tampleton, sent word for Kenny and Mrs. Henny to come to Pawhuska. They went and were kept until toward evening and efforts made to get them to sign away certain lands, they being threatened with arrest for gigamy if they refused to sign. Until midnight they talked and then brought in a woman (her head covered) and asked her if the man (Kenny) was her husband. This woman evidently was Anna Brown but she did not claim Kenny was her husband but said he used to be. Things did not seem right to Lrs. Henny and she demanded that the matter be tried in the courts

Hewitt, 3755 W. 58th Place, Los Angeles, California, and procure all facts in his possession with regard to conditions in Osage County, Oklahoma, and with special reference to any facts bearing upon the wholesale Indian Mr. Hewitt formerly resided in Csage County and is understood to have suffered some difficulties there at the hands of the same parties who are believed to be involved in the murders.

For your information generally, the Osage Indians are represented as the wealthiest persons per capita in the world, due to oil and other rights protected by the Government. A long time past certain unscrupulous individuals in the County have been engaged in well organized plots to acquire interests through the mismanagement of guardianships of these Indians, 'and even have gone to the point of murdering almost entire families. The particular murders in which the Department is interested at the present time involve one ANNA BROWN, her mother, ALIZZIE Q., also known as LIZZIE KYLE, and her daughter, IRS. W. E. SMITH, as well as W. E. SMITH himself, and a servant.

The parties indicated as responsible directly for the Courder of these individuals include principally one BILL HALE, who formerly was a wealthy ranchman. Get particularly from

STATEMENT OF STARGE W. HEWITT.

Made to A. A. Hopking, Special Agent, Department of Justice at Les Angeles, California, June 26th, 1925.

Los Angeles, California. I was formerly a residence 5755 West 58th Place; Los Angeles, California. I was formerly a resident of Oklahoma residing at Rewhaska and Oklahoma City from about 1965 to 1915, after which time I moved to Kansas, later coming to California where I have been the past three years.

In 1908 I married one ROSIS MATRENS at Pauluska, Orlahoma. She is part Osage Indian (about one sixteenth) and has Indian rights. By her I have four children, two of my children have Indian allotment rights. I kept a store at Pauluska, Orlahoma and at the Osage Indian Village at Pauluska. By divorced wife is now residing at Ralston, Orlahoms.

During the period of the past three years there has been a wholesale murder of Osage Indians who had allotments and Indian rights. The first murder I know of was that of ANN, BROWN, who was shot and left dead in a cornfield between Fairfax and Fonces Olty. This was about two or three years ago. Her death benefitted the estate of LIS/IE Q. I do not know of any investigation that was ever made of this surder, or anything being done about it.

The next morder that I know of was of an Osage Indian known as "Roan Horse" who was found mordered (shot through the head) in his automobile in a caryon between Fairfax and Eurbink, Oklahoma. This morder econred, I think, about a year and a half ago. I do not know who would benefit from his alletment, but I understand that one BILL HALE had an insurance policy on "loan Horse" amounting to \$25,000.00 and Eals would benefit from this. I have never heard that any investigation was made of this death or that anything was ever done about it.

The next marder that I heard of was that of an Osage Indian boy, the sum of Chas. Tinker, and his wife who is a daughter of A. W. COMBTOOM and another Indian boy named HARRIS. They were samping along the readside about four or five miles from Pawlmaka. Tinker was shot and killed from a passing automobile. He investigation or mything was ever done to my knowledge in connection with this matter. The wife, father and mother of Tinker would have benefitted by this death.

when now I do not know, where killed it Fairfax, Oklahoms about a year and half ago. Their house was dynamited. Hrs. Smith had Indian rights and was also an heir to part of the LIZZIE Q. setate. The setate of Ers. Swith would benefit the nairs of the LIZZIE Q. estate, although Smith, who lived a few hours after his wife's death, would have also benefitted. The affair was investigated by the Attorney Several's affice at Fairfax. I have never heard that saything has been done about the case. The investigation evidentally was dropped.

To the death or marker of LIZZIE Q. It is my belief that a gang or wing headed by BILL HALE of Fairfax, Oklahoma are behind this ceries of murders and benefit by some by obtaining control of these Indian estates and by some trailing certain of the heirs and missanaging the estates. The following, I believe, are in this "ring.": BILL BALE, CLYDE VANDIFF and one MORGIS, som-ingless of Moradian who runs a restaurant at Relaton, Oklahoma.

TON MATHEWS is a nephew of BILL SMITH who was dynamited.

RES. ROSE BORROR is a nigon of BILL SMITH who was dynamited and was a payamour and has lived in adultery with BILL HALE in about 1915 and 1918. She might be made to talk.

The following persons are not commected with BILL HALE, but have full knowledge, and would make good witnesses, if they can be made to talk: MARY MOSER, Halston, Oklahoma, EVART GOODSON, Halston, "ARKAESAS" SHITH, or any of his sons, Raiston, Oklahoma, MART WILLIAMS, last address Fewnes, Oklahoma, He is a dope and whiskey peddler and an ex-convict. Bill HAIR, in my epinion, did not personally will these Indians as he is a coward, but without dealt he will their rilled. Who he used as a tool I do not know. HAIR has been head of a gang of criminals for years — cattle thieves, robbers, etc., and has dealt with the young Indian boys solling them eattle and them beating them out of the eattle.

Indicate have been entil. Henry of the guardians of the Indians in consistence with Deuters and Lawyers are debauching the Indians. They formulate the young boys with prostitutes, get the boys to marry these prostitutes, and then the women sue them for alimony with the connivance of the guardians, who, of course, get a split of the alimony. A MR. MEASE, the son-in-law of A. W. COMSTOCK and JOHN TILLMAN, are both engaged in this practice to my knowledge. I have heard that FRED TILLMAN is doing the same thing.

The Indians are also being furnished and debauched with dope, marcotics of some description. FORM TILLMAN, IR. 6083, RED JACOSS and DAN TIMEONS, all of Pawinsks, are doing this to my knowledge.

When last heard of, he was living in Oklahoma dity with a family of indians, named James. Terrell has made the statement that he knows a great deal of the murders.

Also, I am advised that one Dick Greeg, formerly & mber of Blackie Thompson's gang, is not serving a lifteen year sentence in the Lungae Mate Penitentiary, he having been defendant for some offense of fillmen, who is supposed to know a great deal about Blackie Thompson's movements and commection with the marders.



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
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

Dear Sirs-

Further with regard to the OSAGE INDIAN matter I have had another visit from the Kennyps and feel that you should have the following information, at least a portion of which, so far as I know, is positively new and somes not entirely from Mrs. Kenny.

First, I am emclosing herewith the original of a letter and envelope addressed to Bras Kenny, evidently from one Art Kendall, at Burrance, Kansas. Mrs. Kenny believes that this letter was written in Pandmaka, and if you can identify the typewriter and paper, and thereby the writer, it is possible this information can be obtained. If you are able to reach him you might ascertain whether he is Oleck Maddam. There was one Arthur Kendall swrested in Ranc, Nevada, November 7, 1912 on a charge of petty largeny and sentenced to 60 days in the County Jail. An examination of Kendall's photograph here shows a striking resemblance to one Cleo Maddam, who formarly was known to have been employed by Hale.

I think it would be advisable for you to look up Eattie Church of Pashuska as it is possible she can give you information.

With especial reference to the unries of Ama Brown, my attention has been called to one Asa A. Thomas who was confined in the Kansas Penitentiary, and I am enclosing herewith a copy of his criminal identification record. I find after inquiry that there is an Asa A. Thomas, who according to the printed membership of the Kn Klux Klan for San Antonio, Texas, lives at 120 Hermitage Court in San Antonio, and I have not a doubt that this is the same Thomas. After he had been confined for forgery in the Kansas Penitentiary the newspapers carried a

report to the effect that he had made a confession to having been hired as one of those who killed Anna Brown. Then this report was published Bill Rale and Scotty Matthews insediately proceeded to Lamsing, Kansas, where Matthews aprend before Thomas a number of pictures asking him to identify Anna Brown, when he claimed to have killed, and Thomas was unable to identify her photograph. Of course, the interesting question is why should Kale have gone to see Thomas.

Another rather remarkable incident referred to by John Newmy himself is that several months later the Kennys were seated in front of the hetel at Fairfax when Scotty Hatthews, who never had been seen by them before, approached them and marely said in a threatening memor, "I am the man with the bad thumbs".

Hale built Auna Brown's house in Fairfux and she farnished While living there she had a girl named Jessette Ledgent, or Largent, scretimes known as Jamestije, and at that time Anna Brown was running around with Jim Mores, the was a henchman of Hale, and she was about to give birth to a child, it being claimed at that time that Jim Meret was responsible for her condition, however, there was a well-founded rumor that Hale himself was responsible and had arranged with Jim Money to assume the responsibility. Jeanettie has made the statement that Anna Brown teld her she (Anna) would have to leave Fairfax, because some people were after her. This has been taken to mean one of two things; either that Hale and his gang were after her, or that members of the co-called Henry Sterr gong of outlaws, including particularly a man named Lamm or Dank with whom the also had been reming, were after her. See Talk, now Chief of Police at Ponce City, is known to have talked to Jessettie in an alloy way a short time after Jeanettie gave this information and I think it is important that every effort be made to locate this girl.

Moyrey, a field employee of the Indian Office since 1909, and who now can be reached in care of the Arapahe Agency at Concho, Otia, Movrey formerly was in Araphorse and he evidently was a friend of or used by Hale, particularly with regard to Arma Brown and her husband, "Old Man Brown". His job for Hale appeared to have been to been and the "Old Man" separated. Then Kenny was in the eastedy of Heurey, and while the former was in an extremely intericated condition, he was taken by Hourey to Arma Brown's house and was left there by Hourey, evidently it being hoped that the "Old Man" would appear there and kill Kenny, it being known that there was bad blood between the two. It should be remembered that an a number of occasions the so-called gang has tried to use Arma Brown against John Kenny, and another interesting incident just learned in connection

;

with the same name, is that as far back as 1910 Comptone sent for the Kennys and advised John that Anna Brown at that time was about to die with typhoid fever and wanted to know if John "would like to make plenty of money easily". His plan was that provided Mrs. Kenny agreed, that it would be an easy matter for John to go back and live with Anna Brown for the short time she was expected to live, and in view of the fact that John and Anna formerly had lived together they would be considered as having been serviced by common law, and that therefore John would inherit a large part of Anna's estate. John refused to agree to this but it gives an indication of the activities as far back as 1910.

If "Old Man Brown" could be induced to talk it is felt that he could give a great amount of information although he would demand some sort of protection.

Still another interesting angle is with regard to Henry Riley and Jim Oastle. Henry Riley is now dead but he was one of Halb's right hand men. Henry Riley was in the taxicab business and he and Jim Castle were constant companions shortly before and for some time after the surder of Anna Brown. There is a hint that Hiley and Castle drove the se-called death ear in the Anna Brown surder. Although Riley never earned more than \$15 a month, it is understood that he left approximately \$25,000 at the time of his death.

There is a Dr. D. A. Shown, who has a brother named Jim in Fairfax, and doctor it is understood having gone to Denvar. If it is possible to locate him, he should be questioned as to the driver of the so-called death car. Dr. Shows is understood to have been one of the many who were intimidated or driven from the country because of their knowledgedof some of the details of the marker.

As entirely different and very interesting version of the last time Anna Brown was seen alive by Mrs. George James as given by her to Mrs. Kenky is as follows:

Mrs. James' husband is an old gembler and she was lying in bed very late on the last night that Anna Brown was seen alive, Mrs. James worrying over the fact that her husband had not returned. She lived only a short distance from the Anna Brown house, and leeking out of the window saw an automobile step in front of Anna Brown's house and Anna and an unidentified man get out. He description of either the ear or the man was given in this version, however, Anna appeared to have been drinking and would not harry into the house as the man wanted her to do so that he called to her several times. She entered the house and was followed by the man. There was a light on the porch and a short time thereafter the man came out of the house and

and got into the machine where he waited. Anna still was slow in moving and the man finally became profess in his demands that "Anna stop her feeliabness and some en". (It is interesting to see that the same terms used in addressing Anna in this version are contained in the other version under which Earnest Burkhardt was supposed to be pleading with Anna to come into the house and step her feeliabness). Anna finally got into the ear and drove an across the railroad tracks.

You want to locate a men named Perris, who evidently is living in Fairfax, and who was pensioned by the Santa Pe Rail-road Company, because Ferris has said that near the railroad track, after an automobile had supposed, he heard a woman's scream and a generate.

A still more interesting angle is that the daughter of Mrs. James later married one of the Hales.

I am confident you will appreciate the importance of settling the differences between these two versions as to the last sight of Anna Brown.

I notice from your last letter that the Grand Jury has been ealled for August 17th. I have not received from you any detailed reports on progress for some time past and am particularly anxious as the same is being followed very elemely.

If you want Hourey endered to proceed to Uklahema City or elsewhere I think I can arrange the matter if you will wire us; also I want you to let us know promptly whether you need any additional assistance, and give us your confidential opinion in a suparate letter as to the prospects of Mr. Brown's successfully handling the prospection. There is too much at stake for the Government for any chance to be run.

Information at hand is to the effect that Mrs. MENEST BURKHART is in very poor physical condition, maffering with same mysterious malady and Assistant Attorney General Brown is now and has been in touch with Indian Agency Officials in an effort to determine her true condition.

It is the theory of these Agents, based on semi-authentic information and physical facts gathered from those closely allied with BILL HALE, directly and indirectly, and thought to be connected at least in one or more of the Indian Europea, that one Dick GREGG now confined in the Lansing State Penitentiary, serving a 25-years sentence for crime, bank robbery and directly participating in the murder of HOAN, under the direction of HALE. E. (Bill) SMITH murder case of interest, which may develop materially.

Mr. Brown impresses me as being able to handle this case with the assistance of the Agents in this Department up to the presentation to the Grand Jury, and I believe that he will be able to successfully present the case to the Grand Jury. Mr. Brown is devoting his entire time to this case and states to me that the successful prosecution of this case means more to him than a record to his Department and he is as anxious to convict the Hale-Burkhart faction as anyone could be.

I believe, however, that when the case is ready. for the Grand Jury that he should have some assistance so that there will be no possibility of a faulty indictment being drawn, and it might be a good idea to have assistance in the trial of the case as this case will require the best legal talent obtainable inasmuch as Hale will no doubt have in his employ practically every attorney of prominence in tois state, and the responsibility of successful prosecutfon will be too great to depend on one attorney.

Special Agents Smith, Burger and Street are preparing reports on the developments of the Osage case, and you will receive them within the next few days.

I have been tied up on preparation of the Annual refort and have not given this case the proper attention for the last
fifteen days and intended to devote my entire time to investigation
until it was completed. However, Special Agent T. B. White will
arrive here, I presume, in the next few days and I will take up
this case in detail with him so that there will be no further delay
in getting out reports.

Arrangements have been perfected to have a Frand Jury on Sept. 7th instead of August 17th, as previously suggested, this being the earliest date on which a Grand Jury could be secured, and I believe that the Grand Jury will return indictments, especially in view of the recent developments as set out in report of Special Agent Smith, under caption of BRYAN BURNHART ET AL, dated July 17th.

Plans were made for taking Bryan Burkhart in custody with a view of confronting him with Blackie Thompson. Thompson claiming that he could make Bryan Burkhart tell about the murder. I have not been too confident of this procedure as, in my opinion, Blackie Thompson is of rather low, cumming mentality and I feel that he believes he can force Burkhart to confess; but Burkhart is not of the type who could be dominated by Thompson. I do believe that Blackie will become incensed at Burkhart's mailure to confess when confronted by him, and will make a clean breast of his participation and furnish leads to develop evidence to implicate Burkhart as well as others.

DETAILS

STATEMENT MADE BY DICK GREGG:

6/8/25 "My name is pick Gregg, I am now confined in Kans. State Prison serving 10 to 21 year sentence for robbing Elgin Kans. Bank at Elgin, Kansas, in later part of 1922. Cambell Keys come to Nowata, Okla.

and teld me Al Spancer wanted to see me at Balter Philpot home at Orden, Galas or near there an farm where Philpot was them living. My sister and brother in-law Flayd Arrett took up from Novete to Philpet heme mear Omesa, Omis. where I met Philpet and milter ball, who informed me il Spender was gone. I femilyed at Philpet home for ecuple days and met il Spencer about dark that evening at Philpet home. Spencer and Wroolf then went out to verge near the home of Philpst and Spencer teld in about Elgin Kans. Bank and told me I was already in trouble and I had as well mice some memor and got out of the deputy, that we have been been would not have any trouble as it was already fixed with the bankers. In later part of 1922 in July or Aug. Al Spencer teld me that Bill Jale of Pairfax, Okla., wanted 2 men killed at er near fairfax. Couple days later Al Spencer and myself met Fred Home of Pawimska, Okla.. in Ford Hoadster on Pawimski and Pershing paved road about three or four miles east of Pawhuska. Max Billings who was with Spencer and myself when we met Rowe asked Rose where we ware supposed to meet Bill Hale. News replied feller me and he would take us to hale. Mr billings then met in our with Rose and drove to Bill Bale pasture to a spring about two or three miles merth cost of Pairfax Oklas, where we all Max Billings, Fred Rows, Dos Cor. Al Spencer and myself met Bill Bla. Max Billings or The Ogg introduced me to Bill Hale, Hale then asked Al Spensor what he, Spensor, thought of the propositions Spencer then said he did not care about the proposition it was the money he wanted. Hale then said his effer to Billings of \$5000.00 for the job, was what he would pay. Al Spencer then asked Hale who he, Hele, wanted killed. Hale then said Bill Smith and his wife, Al Spencer then told Max Billings that he, Billings, had told him, Spencer, a lie, that he teld him it was two men to be killed. Rule then said he did not remember whether he. Hale, told Billings It was two men or man and woman, but didn't make any difference if they wanted to do the jeb, that he, Hale, would pay \$5000.00 for the job. Spencer than teld Hale he might be cald bleaded but he would not kill a woman for money. Hale then took Spencer to one side away from us and talked to Spencer about 30 minutes and returned to where we were and Spencer told Hale we would seem back in week er ten days. Hale give Spencer note and told Spencer to give it to his, Hale, Banch hand who was on Hale Bench and told us to go there and stay but we did not ge to Bale Banch. We When went back to Omea, Onla. I did not see Bill Hale again until Jan 1825, when my father, John Grogg, Lee Clining and myself met Bale

en his, Hale Ranch, near same place we first met him. Hale then at this time told me the same offer of \$5000.00 still stood good for job and still manta man ed Bill Smith house blowed up and he. Hale, did not care how it was done just so it was done, and he. hale, would like for me to unit until the fellowing w might. That he, Rale, wanted to be at Wichita, Kans. that he. Hale, could have alibi for himself, Hale, when house was blown up, and that he, hale would got the soup, meaning Mitro Clycerine for me to do the jeb. After I had talked to Hale and told him I would do the job. Hale then said he. Hale, manted to talk to Olining. Hale, Clining and myself then had talk, Hale then told Clining, he, Hale and myself had come to understanding about jeb. Clining then told him any arrangements made by me was all right with him. We, Clining and myself, then left Hale with the understanding that Hale was to go to Wichita, Kans., and Clining and myself was to blow up bill Smith house the following night. The following day Clining and myself drove to Bill Smith home that Hale had pointed out to us. Arriving at Smith home about dark, then we called at front door of Smith home on pretex as Hale had told us that we wanted to buy his famr, we were met at door by Bill Smith who asked us in house. We engaged in conversation with Mr. Smith and farm hand who lived near and worked on Smith farm, also boy about 14 or 15 years eld, also his wife and girl and old lady was at the Smith home at this time. After looking house over and talking with Mr. Smith for thirty or forty minutes, after talking to Mr. Smith and seeing several people there. Clining and myself decided not to do the job as there was several people there some of them women. Clining remarked we did not want to massacre the whole country to kill two people. As Hale had told us we then went to Shidler, Oklahom, where we saw my father and told him to go to Pawimska. Oklahoma, and see Bill Hale. On arrival at Pawhnaka my father saw Fred Rows, who asked my Father what was the matter that we did not do the job. My father talk Rowe there was too many people there. At time Hale arranged with Clining and myself in Hale pasture to blow up Bill Smith house, he, Hele, told us that he, Hale, had put up the money to Fred Rows at Paulusks. and I mas to have my father, John Gregg, to get the money \$5000.00 and deliver to te Clining and myself. howe also told me at time Bill Hale first propositioned me to blew up Bill Smith home that Bill Hale had given him Rows \$5000.00 to pay to the party or parties that blew up home of Bill Swith and killed Bill Smith and wife. I have made this statement to Edwin Brown,

Assistant Attorney General and J. R. Burger of my emfree will without any promise or threat of any kind being first advised that above information would be used in prosecution of Owage Indian Murder Cases. Bick Grame.

STATIMENT HADE BY L. B. 066;

Artesia, 3.H. 6/23/25

"My name is I. B. Ogg. I reside at Artesia, H.M. post office box 565. On or about July or Aug. 1922, Max Billings met me at Okesa, Okla., and asked me if I knew where Al Spencer was, I told him I could locate him. Two or three days later I met Max Billings again at Okesa, Okla., and I teld him I had Spencer located. Billings then told me Bill Hale and Fred Rows wanted to meet Al Spencer, and Dick Gragg. I than told Billings to have Hale and Rowe to meet me an lease Sec 24 lo mile north and o mile west of Omea, Okla. and I would have Spancer and Gragg thereon the fellowing day. On following day in July or August, 1922, Dick Gregg, Al Spencer and myself met Bill-V.E. Hale, Fred Reve and Max Billings on said lease mear Greea, Oria. Spencer and Gregg was traveling on foot and Hale. Rose and Billings was traveling in ford coups. When we all met at this place, Max Billings introduced Hale and Move te Spencer and Gregg. We all had few drinks of whiskey and Hale called Spancer to one side out of hearing where they talked for about one hour. They, Hale and Spencer, then came back to where we ware. Hale and Raws then left in Ford coupe and Billings got drunk and I took him to his, Billings, home at Chosa in my car and Spencer and Gregg left a feet. When I first met Billings he told me to locate Spencer and Gregg, that Bill Hale had jeb for them to de. Billings also told me that Bill Hale was going to put up two thousand dollars in either my hands or his, Billings, hands to pay Spanoer and Greeg after they had done the jeb."

STATEMENT MARR BY R. J. JORDAN:

The street and W. H. Brackett. I went to work for Barney Jones on Thanksgiving day, 1923, and worked there until some time in Jan 24. Then I went to work for old man Lewis who lives three miles south and west of Dale Rose, Cole., which was a little store and P.C. in Cole. morth of Tray, Cole. Worked there awhile them I drove a freight wagen for his sons the Lewis Bros.

They live west of Froy, Colo., worked there until March 1924 then I worked for a man by the name of Jordan near Lamar, Colo., but no kin to me, spelling his name just as I do mine, them my Mother and brother came by and I went with them to Montana. The last time I saw Wid Ewers worked for Moarthur at Troy. Cole. in December, 1925, for I took a load of cake for Mr. Jones to the Dedge Banch east of Troy, and gaw Wid Ewers there helping brand some calves and I know he was working for MoArthur near the Dodge Banch at that time. Now going back my previous statement made at Pawimaka, I now want to correct some parts of it. The night that Bill Smith's house was blown up Blackie Thompson, Jim Bosvell, Chas. Boswell (known as Wingey Came to Henry Grammers house and about one hour some enchrought flow Quick or Chas Quick as I do not in know them a part, he was the short heavy set one. Then Quick and Chas Beswell went in the house and brought out a bottle of Fitro Glycerine er (soup). Looked like about a pint and some one in the bunch made the remark that there was enough to blow the whole town up. Then Blackie Thompson, Jim Boswell and Quick left in one car and told the others to fellow, Chas. Boswell and another man that owned a Paige readster followed them, it was then about eleven P. M. and it was the night that Bill Smith's house was blown up. I remember that the man that drove the Paire car had a fuss with a boy they called Dewis about a woman who was Dewie's girl, this occurred after the house was blewn up. This same night Wid Ewers taken a load of whiskey for Henry Grammer to Kaw City. returning in the night and on his return I borrowed his car and went to Shidler returning the next evening. When I returned to Grammers house I heard Grammer and a stranger talking about the blow up. I asked no questions as all ready knew of it. I left for Cole. in about three days and was not there anymore. Wid Ewers told me that he would make the soup for them but he did not make it, it was brought there by one of the Boswells or Quick, there was only one of the Quicks there and he was short heavy set. It was not Devie Hopkins that had the fuss with the Paige car man, it was another man called Dewie. Signed by R. J. Jordan."

STATEMENT MADE BY JOHN MATCH

"Innsing 7/8/25 Said Little John, webb City, Okla., age about 50 yra., 5 ft 7, dark complexion, paid Ace Kirby and Dook Hawkins \$1000.00 to blow up Bill Smith's home, that they got soup from magazine out

of Webb City on Apperson road. Mays said Ace Kirby and Hawkins left Webb City about \$30 P. M. night of blew up in Kirby Ford oar with eil can of soup, 9 or 10 qts wrapped in quilt, and returned to Webb City about 5 A. M. That little John met Hawkins and Kirby at his Mays home on fellowing day and Hawkins said we done good jeb blowed Bill Smith packer off, that he, Mays saw Ace Kirby pay Mawkins \$500.00 and teld Hawkins Bill Smith was in Hespital and if he, Smith, died, we, Kirby and Hawkins would get some more monay.

RESULTS OF INTERVIEW OF ROY D SHERRILL:

*6/8/25 at Leavenworth, Pederal Prison. Ray D. Sherrill, received at rederal prison Nov. 13, 1918. escaped June 22, 1921, returned June 2, 1923. Crime, robbing U. S. mail train, Paola, Kans. Sentence expires 1930-age 22 when convicted at Fort Scott, Kansas, in Nov. 1918. Interviewed by Edwin Brown, Assistant U. S. Atterney General and Agent Burger. Stated if allowed to go with some Government Agent into Oklahoma he could get . desired information in Osace Indian Murder cases. That he had no direct information other than while he was staying at Henry Grammers and engaged in making whiskey on Grammers ranch. Bill Hale propositioned him and fellew who he knew as John snly, age about 30, height 5 ft, 9 wt. 180, drove Ford roadster carpenter by trade, lived near Fairfax, Oklahoma, married and had three or four kids, and had built garage for James Balew at Penes City, Oklahoma, to blow up Bill Smith's home in Pob. 1925. This fellow John also done time at McAlester prisen for horse stealing several years age. That Bill Hale short time later again proposition him and Balph Skanel of Okla City, cattle man while at Kaw City, Okla., to blow up Bill Smith's home, that Skanel sent wire from Kaw City to some one at Oklahoma City the day Bill had propositioned them, did not know contents of wire neither did he know who wire was addressed ts. Sherrill was questioned by Mr. Brown and this agent for some time, and it was very evident to us that Sherrill did not have any direct information and was trying to form some kind of hearsay information in order to get out of prison, as above stated to be released to some Federal Agent, that he, Sherrill could make trip into Oklahoma and no doubt in our spinion to make good his escape. Warden Biddle stated that he was a bad oriminal."

"Pawhuska, Okla, Jaly 9, 1985, Statement unde by Dewey Selph at office of Sheriff in presence of J. A. Street, Sheriff Broose and J. R. Burger. That he, Solph, was being detained in Congo County Jail for violating his parole from State of Ark. That on the night before, Anna Brown disappeared, he Selph, Blackie Gore, Melsie Morrison, Bob Crane. ×Clarence Bailey, Wyron and Raynest Burkhart were all at Farnest Burkhart's home near Grayhorse. Oklahoma, playing poker and Rarnest Burkhart at that time said he would give \$2500.00 to get shut of Amma Brown and \$2500,00 after she was done away with. After E. Burkhart made this statement, Blackie Sere. Kelsie Merrison and E. Burkhart went into another room and stayed about twenty five minutes then returned to room where we all were and Morrison said he. Morrison had seen Anna Brown at Pawhuska. Orle .. that day and she was drinking. E. Marrison. Blackie Gore, Bailey, Crene, Earnest Burkhart and myself left E. Burkhart's home about midnight in 2. Burkhart Buick Car for Pawkuska. On arrival at Paulmaks K. Merrison found Anna Brown and Ke Morrison and Blackie Gore took Anna Brown in another ear dont know make of car and E. Buarkhart and Bailey. Crane and myself went to Balaton Okla. in E. Burkhart car where we met Estrison, Gere and Anna Brown about 4 A.M. Anna Brown stopped at Jones Rotel for few minutes and R. Burkhart, Bailey, Crane and myself left them there at Balston in front of Jones Rotel and went to E. Burkhart's home in Buick oar arriving at E. Burkhart's home after day light. We, Crane, Bailey, E. Burkhart, B. Burkhart, Bridges and myself went to horse races at Grayherse that day and returned to E. Burkhart's home same day about 4 P.M. and Anna Brown was at E. Burkhart's home at that time in summer hitches drinking and did mot eat supper with us. About 5:30 P. M. same day, the day she disappeared Byron Burkhart and Anna Brown left E. Burkhart's home in Ford car and drove away toward Bairfax. We then all of us including Bridges and wife got in E. Burkhart's car and started for Fairfax and

short way out of Pairfax we met Bill Bale and denghter and they turned around and went back to Pairfex where we all got out of car and the women and children went into ploture show where they were showing lift and Joff Comedy and us men talked for few minutes and E. Burkhart, Grane, Bailey and myself went to Pool Hall and later went to Raiston in E. Burkbert's car and got K. Merrison and Blackie Gore, and all of us then went to E. Burkhart's home in Earnest Burkhart Duick car. Grane. Bailey and myself then remained at M. Burkhart's home and E. Burkhart then took I. Morrison and Blackie Gere in his Buick car and drove away and I did not see E. Burkhart until mext day morning at Fairfax and did not see K. Morrison or Blackle Gore for several days. Before Byron Burkbart left E. Burkhart house with Anna Brown he loaded 52 Colts Automatic Revolver in presence of Crane, Bailey and myself. Katherine Cole now wife of K. Morrison was with Ama Brown at Balston when we picked Gere and Morrison up but I do not know what become of her after that time. The above statement was made of my own free will without threat or promise of immunity in any way. Pirst being advised that said information would be used in the prosecution of Osage Indian Marder cases."

STATEMENT MADE BY W. C. BAILEY:

"July 18, 1925. Statement made by W. C. Bailey to P. S. Smith, J. A. Street and Harve Freeze. About three years ago or possibly not quite so long I was at Fairfax, Oklahoma, with Dewey Selph and we met Barnest Burkhart, Blackie Gpard and Kelsie Morrison and some other fellows whose names I den't remember. We were all drinking and Earnest Burkhart suggested that we play poker and go to his house. We all got in Burkhart's car and drove to his house at Grayhorse. I heard Earnest Burkhart tell them that he wanted Anna Brown out of the way and would give them five thousand dollars to bump her eff. Blackie Gore remarked that he would bump off anybody for five thousand dollars. Sometime before day light Dewey Selph and I left and went to Fairfax. That same day we went to Person City. Sometime the mext day or so I heard that Anna Brown was found murdered. Sometime last fall about October I was at Pawhuska and handling some whiskey with Blackie Gore, we drove out on the Pershing read and stopped in a thicket off the read

to bottle this whiskey and we were talking over things and the conversation drifted to Coage Indians. and Blackie Gore remarked to me that he bumped one Osage Squaw.
