Ralston, Okla. Joe McGuire is a material witness in the above murder case. Joe McGuire is a white man.

Wayne McVey, who is a material witness in the Anna Brown case, and has been reported as being somewhere in Idaho, is now back in Fairfax, Okla., and has just recently been seen there. McVey is a white man.

Maggie Clark McClure, a material witness in the Anna Brown case, is an Indian woman, she is still in Rairfax, Okla.

Bob Shrofe, rairfax, Okla., a white man and a crook. He is the present detective or spy for Bill Hale and the Big Hill Trading Company, and does all the framing for them in their crooked deals in skinning the Indians. He is also a very close friend of arnest and Bryan Burkhart. Shrofe keeps Hale informed of any activities regarding Hale and his allies. This man is yellow and will talk if put under the "hammer" when the time comes.

One Smith, Fairfax, Okla., a material witness in the Anna Brown case. This man's name has evidently been reported in error, as his correct name is MOMAN SMITH. He is a white man, the son of andy Smith, and the one who found the body of Anna Brown.

Walter Gray, Fairfax, Okla., an Attorney who took the evidence given at Coroner's inquest and made transcript of same. He has the reputation of being crooked and will take the money. He is a white man.

Frank Hickey, an Indian boy, is still living at Fairfax, Okla. He is about 15 years old. Frank Hickey is alleged to have found the 32-calibre pistol that killed Anna Brown.

scott Mathis, rairfax, Okla., a white man, and is president of the Big Hill Trading Company at Fairfax. Mathis is a close pal of Bill Hale's; he is a crook and evidently in the power of Hale, as Hale handles him. Mathis has in his employ a Bob Shrofe, who is an intormant of his (Mathis) and Bill Hale, on their crooked deals with the Indians.

Mr. Turnden, an Undertaker, Fairfax, Okla. This man's correct name is TURTEN. He is a material witless in the Anna Brown case. He is a white man and has a good reputation.

Fred Wheeler, an Indian boy, rairfax, Okla. This boy died about a year ago. Fred Wheeler was one of the four parties who talked to Anna Brown and saw her with Bryan Burkhart in malston the night she was murdered.

W. R. (BILL) SMITE MURDER CASE.

Dock Hawkins, Jhief of Police, webb City, Okla., a material witness in the Smith marder case. He is a white man and has the reputation of being crocked.

John Hazlitt, Rairfax, Okla. He is in the insurance business in Fairfax.

Z ..

He is a white man, the son of the wife of sol Smith, and Sol Smith's stepson. Sol Smith's wife is now being kept by Bill Hale. Hazlitt will do as his mother says, who will be directed by Bill Hale.

- P. C. Hoefer, Fairfax, Okla. This man is a white man; he is Agent for Ford and Lincoln cars; he is closely connected with guardians of Indians, and they work together to get the Indians' money. He is friendly to the Hale faction.
- J. W. Hutchinson, rairfax, Okla. He is a white man, and is now and was at the time of Bill smith murder, a Deputy Sheriff of Osage County. He has reputation of being crooked and will take money; he is a "snake."
- W. E. Copeland, Fairfax, Okla. He is a white man; he is Asset. Cashler of the First National Bank of Fairfax, where Bill Hale does most of his banking business; said to be friendly to Bill Hale faction, and is N. G.
- C. M. Crossland, Lyman, Okla. He runs grocery store situated one Mile West of Lyman, Okla., which is 20 miles North of rairfax. He is a white man.

walter Doolin. This witness has a home in Oilton, Okla.

Ed Fincher, Fairfax, Okla. He is a white man. This man is a material witness in this case. This man is very reluctant to talk at this time, like many others, due to the fear of Bill Hale and his allies, but when the principals in the Bill Smith murder case are in custody, then this witness, as well as many others, will talk. Fincher is proprietor of silver Moon Cafe.

- Dr. A. H. Friedman (Previously reported as Dr. A. M. Freedman), Fairfax, Okla. He is a white man; he is a dentist; is a gambler and a close friend of the Hale faction.
- I'. M. Richessin (previously reported as n. M. Richeson), Fairfax, Orla. He is a white man; he is the Indian Agent at Fairfax; he is reported as being a crook, and is in the power of Bill Hale and will do what Hale says.
- ir. D. A. Shoun, was previously reported as living in Denver, Colo.; he is now residing at Canyon City, Colo. He is a white man.
- ur. J. G. Shoun, rairfax, Okla. He is a white man. Both the Shouns will talk when brought into rederal Court and when they know Hale and his allies are in custody.

George Bolton, Manager of Palace Trading Co., Fairfax, Okla. He is a white man; had trouble with Bill Hale over some cow hides, went to Court over it and Hale beat him in Court. From information gathered, do not believe that George Bolton was in the conspiracy to murder Bill smith. George Bolton has a brother street who is a squaw man and who is a close friend of the Burkhart brothers.

Charles Hembres, Fairfax, Okla., is a young man and if the same party who has same name and is material witness in Smith case, is a auto thief and is said to be now out on bond. It is not known who made Hembres's bond, but is

reported that the Hale faction generally makes the bonds of the crooks in that will inity

a state impresentative. This man, like many other Osage Indian, and is now or will not talk until he knows that Bill Hale and Hale's co-conspirators are in custody.

W. C. Spurgin, Fairfax, Okla. He is a white man, and owns the Sourgin Motor Company of Fairfax. This man will talk after Hele and his allies are in custody. Have been confidentially informed that this man has very good general manual information regarding the Bill smith and other Osage Indian marders.

Sam Tulk, Chief of Police, Ponce City, Okla. He is a white man, and is a close friend of Bill Hale. Is said that Tulk has taken money from Bill Hale and the Big Hill Trading Co.

Henry ward, J. H. ward and J. E. Ward are the same, and correct name is Henry Ward. He is a white man, and is the Jewett automobile agent in Fairfax. He is said to have served time in the penitentiary in Texas, before coming to Fairfax, on charge of cattle stealing. He is an enemy of Bill Hale.

J. G. wismeyer (previously reported as J. G. Wismier) Fairfax, Ckla.
He is a white man, retired from active business, and former state Representative.

w. G. Iynn, Fairfax, Okla. He is a white man, and is guardian for several Indians. He is absolutely OK. He sat on Coroner's jury in the Bill smith case. He talked to Bill smith two days before the smith home was blown up, and smith told him (Iynn) that he did not expect to live very long as he was afraid that he (Smith) would be mardered. Iynn lived just a short distance from Bill smith when the smith home was blown up, and was one of the first men to arrive on the scene of the blowup.

Alva Wilson, a white man, who was formerly Clerk at the smith-williams Hotel, Fairfax, Okla., is now residing at Hominy, Okla., and is the Night Clerk of the Unoberlyn Hotel. It has been learned by this Agent from reliable sources that Mr. Wilson has very good general information of the conditions existing in and near rairfax at the time and after the murder of Bill Smith. This agent advises that wilson not be interviewed at this time, but that he be subported for the Grand Jury, at which time he will be thoroughly questioned.

HENRY ROAN MURDER CASE.

C. E. Ashbrook, Cashier, rairfax, First National Bank, is a white man. He is a close friend of Bill Hale and will not talk against the Hale faction, for the reason that Hale has too much on him.

Bob Parker, Chief of Police, Fairfax, Okla. He is a white man, and a close friend of Bill Hale. He will favor Hale in any way that he can, and will do nothing against Hale whatsoever.

ur. M. B. Prentiss (previously reported as ur. H. B. Prentiss), Reirfax,

Orla. He is a white man, and is a material witness in the Roan Burder case.

This man is "on the fence" but will talk with reference to the Roan surder when Hale and his allies are in custody, and Prentiss is put under the "hammer.

W. K. "Bill" Hale is not a member of the K. K. K. Agent learned that worth that the search of the Big Hill Trading Company; Homer Huffaker, President of the Big Hill Trading Company; Homer Huffaker, President of the Big Hill Trading Company; Homer Huffaker, President of the Pairfax First Mat'll. Bank, and W. K. "Bill" Hale are very closely connected. Further, they know so much on each other that neither will talk regarding any of the others. They all have been in various deals together in cheating the Indians cut of money. On one occasion, Hale loaned an Indian, named wick Newella, a small sum of money on a big Cadillac coupe, and when the Indian could not pay the money, Hale bodily took the car from the Indian, and he was backed up in his action by the Indian's guardian, he, (guardian) making no effort to assist the Indian. Other Indian guardians conspire with Hale in cheating the Indians, in the sale of horses, cattle, automobiles etc.

A white man named Bob shrofe, living at Fairfax, Okla., is the "Medicine Man" for the Hale-Mathis gang; shrofe gets all the dope on the Indians and frames the crooked deals for Hale and his outfit. Shrofe is in the power of Hale and his outfit; he is a real spy, is yellow and will "squak" if pressure is brought to bear on him.

A white man named John Luppy, who with his wife, runs the Lohans Cafe at Fairfax, Okla., and has lived there about two years. He is an ex-convict, ex-car thief, and before coming to Fairfax, he and his wife ran a road house near Ponca City. This man and his wife are close friends of the Hale faction, and are continually trying to find out who all strangers are and their business that appear in Fairfax, and are very sharp in their way. From confidential sources, this agent learned that Luppy and his wife know considerable about the activities of the Hale and Burkhart gang. It is not deemed best to interview this man at this time, but when the Grand Jury is called it would be advisable to have him and his wife subposmed and thoroughly questioned and if desired then have them before the Grand Jury.

A man named Jim Moss, living at Fairfax, Okla., interested in the cattle business, is another spy of Bill Hale's, and really endeavors to find out the business of each and every guest that registers at the Smith-Williams Hotel, rairfax. This man is a "wolf" and very foxy.

The majority of the citizens of Fairfax, Okla., are members or were members of the K. K. They are not active at this time. while the K. K. Cof Fairfax, as a body, have not made any attempts to molest Bill Hale or his faction, they have no love for him or hisgang. Hale is a big power in his country, and at present is endeavoring to win the good graces of the people of that vicinity by his gifts or horses and ponies to the small boys, and other gifts.

Through a confidential informant, a Catholic Priest, Agent learned that Mrs.Mollie Burkhart, who professes the Catholic faith, and who is the wife of krnest Burkhart, and a daughter of the deceased Lizzie "Q", sent word to the Priest just recently that she was afraid of being poisoned at her home with whiskey, and the Priest advised her not to drink any liquor of any kind under any circumstances. The Priest also told Agent that Krs. Burkhart had not attended church for some time and is being kept from doing so by her husband, armest

Burkhart because of the fear that she might talk to some of the church members.
This confidential informant has just recently been moved to another church in Oklahoma and left with his successor instruction to pass to Agent any information obtained.

The Indians and several white people in Fairfax and vicinity are value of that some deed of violence is going to befall them, probably by the hands of the Hale faction, and have placed in the rear and front of their homes electric lights, which they burn all night. Quite a number of these people that to sell their homes and leave the Osage country. This igent knows this to be true as he has observed same while out at night conferring with confidential informants, who have also called his attention to these facts.

This Agent met an old friend from al Paso, Texas, a Mr. Adams, who has a number of cattle pastured on Bill Hale's pasture lands. Mr. Adams has assisted this Agent very much in keeping Agent under cover. Agent's undercover occupation is that of agent for banking people of Southwest Texas, who have placed loans on Texas cattle, which are now being pastured in Osage County in the immediate vicinity of w. K. "Bill" Hale's ranch.

This Agent has several distant relatives living in various towns in Osage County, Oklahome, and through them will secure additional general information regarding these murder cases, and will report on same at a later date. These relatives have not been interviewed up to this time regarding these murder cases.

Pitts Beatty, who is Mayor of Fairfax, Oklahoma, was found to be a very close personal friend of Subject Hale, and further it was ascertained that this man is an arch crook and is the guardian for Molly Burkhart, the wife of REMEST BURKFART - the Subject of this report.

Dick Gregg and myself to meet him and Bill Hale in his, Bill Hale's pasture on the following morning. Dick Gregg. John Bregg. and myself left Bartlesville, Okla., in a car and went to Bill Hale's pasture east of Pairfax, Okla., where we met Bill Hale. Hale then told us John and wick Greek and myself, that he wanted Bill Smith and wife killed, and smith and his wife would be alone and he Bill Hale, said if we would kill both of them. Bill Smith and wife, he would pay us \$5000.00. That he, Hale, had give Fred Rows \$5000.00 to pay off when smith and wife was killed. Hale said for us to go look Smith home over and when we got ready to blow smith home up and to let him know day before so he. Hale, could be away and he, Hale, would go to Ponca City or Wichita or some other place where he could register at some prominent hotel for alibi. Hale then pointed Bill Smith's home out to wick Gregg and myself and told us to do a good job and put them out of theway. Dick Gragg and myself then called at Bill Smith's home and visited with smith and his wife and found several people there and, after seeing women and children, refused to do the job as we did not want to kill several innocent women and children. Hale said for us to shoot them, Bill smith and wife, or kill them any way we wanted to just so we got them out of the way. 

I am forwarding to you, under separate cover, a digest prepared by the agents assigned to the cases of Henry Roan, Anna Brown and W. B. (Bill) Smith. Murder of Osage Indians, all of which is for your ready information. I would like to state in this connection, that by reference to these digests you can get a complete and comprehensive view of the cases in a short time.

The entire file in these cases has been reprepared and numbered and these digests made in order that when the case is presented to the court for prosecution, the attorneys will have no difficulty in intelligently presenting the matter. The way the reports herefore reflected the case, it would have been almost impossiff, to get all of the details before the grand jury or court, but the way it has been prepared. I believe that every detail fact can be brought out. As further information is leveloped in the case, I am having this digest revised and it kept up to diffe so that all of the information will be in it when prosecution is started.

Agent street obtained statement from Henry Mayse at Phoeniz, Arizona, Bureau office in which Mayse states conversation of one R. W. Dunham, involving Blackie Thompson and three others in the blowing up of the N. E. (Bill) Smith home. Telegraphic instructions received from Agent in Charge, T. B. White, for agent Street to proceed to Los angeles. Calif., to locate sid kwers, an important witness in the Smith case. Agent endeavored to locate Wid . Ewers in Los Angeles and vicinity, but was unsuccessful. Agent Street endeavored to locate at al Paso, Texas, and vicinity, Jlaude Farker, a material witness in the Anna Brown case. No success. Photograph of Parker given local officers at al Paso with instructions to hold Parker for this Department if apprehended. agent J. R. Burger obtained statement from Harve Freas, Sheriff of Osage County, Oklahoma, relative to w. E. (Bill, Smith case, stating that Bill Hale owed him \$7000.00 and refused to pay it, also that Hale circulated statement that he was going to marder smith. CONTINUED.

CONCERNING MURDER OF W. E. (BILL) SMITH.

On September 21st Agent J. A. STREET at the Phoenix, Arisona. Bureau office obtained the following statements from Henry Mayse, a former Deputy sheriff of Osage County, Oklahoma.

STATEMENT OF HERRY MAYSE:

That he resides at 1326 Grand Avenue, Phoenix, Arizona; that he formerly resided at Pawhuska, Oklahoma; that he is 36 years of age; that he was Deputy Sheriff under C. A. COOK, of Osage County, Oklahoma in the years of 1913 and 1924.

That in the year 1924, acting as deputy sheriff, in company with one K. A. DUNHAM, who now resides in Shidler, Oklahoma, he was taking from Shidler, Oklahoma, to Pawhuska, Oklahoma, a party who formerly worked at a dance hall at webt Dity, Oklahoma, who had been arrested, charged with being implicated in the Shidler Bank Robbery, and this party volunteered and told us the following with reference to the Osage murder cases and the blowing up of the house of W. E. SMITH, at rairiax, Oklahoma, which occurred on "arch 9, 1923.

This party said that he was going to tell all he knew on BLACKIE THOMPSON in connection with the job of robbing the Shidler Bank. He said that he was sitting in the pool hall at Drumright, Oklahoma, talking to BLACKIE and his (informant's) brother, and BLACKIE told his (informant's) brother that BILL HALE owed him cl.000 yet for the blowing up of the a. S. SMITH property in Fairfax, Oklahoma, and if he did not pay it he was going to blow him up, and they would go and get the money and send a certain woman away to Salitornia.

MR. MAYOR stated that he did not know the woman's name, but that she is a blond, who ran around with BLACKIE THOMPSON, and believed she formerly lived at Drumright, also that he (MR. MAYSE) believed she is now residing somewhere in Balifornia in the vicinity of Los angeles.

He (BLACKIE THOMPSON) said that they would get out and make themselves some money and leave the country and go to this woman; that there were certain jobs which could be pulled in Osage Jounty which they could make some money out of.

This party also implicated three parties in the blowing up of the w. L. SMITH house. He stated that BLACKIE THOMPLOK stopped at his father's house, who resides at Drumright, Oklahoma. MR. IMYDE does not remember this party's name whom he had under arrest at that time, but states that he formerly worked in a dance hall at Shidler, Oklahoma, and his brother was then down around Oilton and was associated with bLACKIE PROMPSON.

DOCK HALMINS, former city marshal at shidler, Oklahoma, will remember this party's name, and if discreetly questioned can give the names of these two brothers and their whereabouts, and also the name of the blond headed woman and where she now resides, who, as above stated, was associated with BLACKIE THOMPSON.

This arrest was made the same day that the phidler Bank was robbed, and BILLY HITL and ROY (although on another party were arrested on the same day that this party was, all on suspicion of being connected with the phidler bank abbery.

MR. MAYOR told this party that his brother had been shot and was in jail, and this party said that BLACKIE THOMPSON had been laying around and running around with his brother at prumright, and that he was going to tell all he knew on BLACKIE. He then told the story that has been heretofore set forth. This party was then taken to the jail, where he learned that his brother was not contined there, whereupon he refused to talk any more and was later released. DOC HAMMINS knew all of these parties and it is believed that information may be obtained from him.

Kalail Muchailon told MR. Mayor at one time that he was the man who surnished the nitro-glycerine that blew up BILL chirms house, but there is no dependence to be placed in what Kalail said, as he take a great deal, especially when drunk. It is suggested by MR. Mayor that DOC Haurins be discreetly interviewed in order that the names and location of these two brothers above mentioned may be learned, as no doubt they can give some valuable information to the Jovernment regarding the Osage Murder cases.

Ther, is a girl supposed to be around Ponca Jity now, called "BLON, Himph BILLY", who used to run around with DIJN, GREGG, and it is believed that she could give information on any crime that DIJN GREGG (or any one of several others) was connected with. This girl is well known to BAM TULN, now Jhief of Folice.

(This girl BILLY was living with Jack Sampbell and his wife with a sweetheart named BENNIL, a Cherokee Indian boy. Jack Sampbell got into a fight with the police not long ago!

MR MaYor amows the girl called "SQUA# DABY" very well. She is a black neaded girl and formerly lived at rawnee, Oklahoma,

but does not think she was ever associated with pICK GRAGG, but believe that the girl called BILLY knows about and was connected with pICK GRAGG on several different jobs.

Before leaving Oklahom, MR MAYSE gave this information to MR. A W DOMSTOOK He learned the next day that his statement had been conveyed to william K.

H.L. and others, and that they had been told that he,
(MR. MAYSE) was supposed to be working on this case and that he had better be watched.

Just before leaving Oklahoma some three months ago, Mn. MaYor stated that he had reliable information that CFARLIM QUICK was residing in Drummight, Oklahoma; that MOR QUICK is now confined in the penitentiary at McAlester and that JIM BOSWELL is probably at Cromwell and can probably be located through DICK CARAGAY, Chief of Police at Cromwell, Oklahoma.

MR. MAYSE also stated that he had no information as to the whereabouts of CHARLIE BOSWELL. That MON QUICK was sent to the pen from Sapulpa, Oklahoma, for robbery or hi-jacking he thought and that he should be now in the McAlester Penitentiary.

There is a boy in the Ecalester Penitentiary who was send there for robbing the Shigler Bank at the time that ROY ANDROCH and BILL WHITE were, who can give some good information if he will talk, regarding the connection of JOHN GRENG and HENRY WELLS, DIJK GRENG, and others with the robbery of the Shidler Bank. (See court records at Pawhuska, Oklahoma, also ex-sheriff Cook).

Mr. MAYSE stated that he is now preparing to move from Phoenix, Arizona to Colorado Springs, Colorado, and that on his arrival he will notify the Department of Justice Office at Oklahoma City of his whereabouts in order that if he can be of any help to the Department in solving these cases, he may be located.

CONCERNING MURDER OF CHARLES WHITEHORE.

STATEMENT OF HAIRY MAYSE:

BOB PLETCHER was hauling rock from the hill to town and he heard three shots fired, and a few minutes afterwards he saw a fellow coming from the direction

NOTE

where the shots were fired, walking very fast.

BOB FLETCHER drove on around and past this man with

the load of rock and after passing him cut across a
wheat field and came by him again, and went on to
town. This fellow was a tall, light complexioned man.

BOB FLETCHER told MR. MAYSE that he was not going
to get mixed up in the affair, but that if there
was any way in which he could help MR MAYSE he would
do anything in the world to help him.

MR MAYSE believes that he can get an affidavit from BOS FINTOWER as to who this party actually is, as MR. MAYSE firmly believes that BOS FINTOWER knows just who this party was and has told MR. MAYSE that he would do anything that would help MR MAYSE in his case.

Pursuant to telegraphic instructions from Special Agent in Charge T. B. White, Agent J. A. STRIDT proceeded to Los Angeles to locate and interview WID EWERS in connection with the blowing up of the W. E. (BILL) ELITH home. This Agent made various inquiries at the addresses of several people by the name of EWERS in Los Angeles and vicinity, also at Clive, California, a small village near Santa anna, Jalif., relative to the whereabouts of WID EWERS. WID EWERS apparently is not known to anyone in that vicinity and the EWERS 1.ving in Los Angeles and vicinity state that they have no kin folks by the name of EWERS, who have ever lived in Oklahoma. A check was made of the Post Office records in Los Angeles and vicinity in an endsavor to locate EWERD but without success. Agent conferred with the sheriff's office and with the Folice Department at Long Beach and other towns in the vicinity of Los Angeles, but no information as to EWERD was received.

agent STRIMT departed from Los Angeles Sept. 26th for all Paso, Texas, where he endeavored to locate CIAUDE PARKER. This Agent conferred with the Sheriff's of ice. Police Department, and the Custom and Immigration Department in an endeavor to locate PARKER, but was advised by all that PARKER was not known or had been seen in that vicinity. Agent left with local officers of all Paso a photograph of PARKER requesting that if located that he be held for this De artment.

Recently Special agent, JOHN R. BURGER, obtained from HARVE FREAS, SHERIFF of Osage County, Oklahoma, the rollowing statement relative to J. E. (Bill), SMITH.

CONCL FING MURDER OF W. E. (BILL) SMITH.

STATEMENT OF HARVE FREAS:

MR. FRAND stated that ... E. Smith called at his (FRAND) office a few days before his (SMITH'S) home was slown up, and asked him for some protection

stating that BILL HALE owed him \$7000.00 and refused to pay it, and he (SMITH) was going to bring suit against HALE; that HALE circulated around that he was going to murder him(SMITH). About two or three days before the murder of SMITH, HALE came to PREAS' office and advised him that he owed SMITH several thousand dollars and that SMITH was going to sue him; that if he did sue him and he (FREAS) wanted to serve him to just call him on the 'phone, and stated "You know I cannot afford to be sued", and remarked that SMITH was a G-- D-- S-- of a B--- for suing him.

P. S. SMITH and J. V. MURPHY, Special Agents, of the Dept.
of Justice, that I do not have to make a statement and any
statement I do make can and may be used against me in the
trial of the cases concerning which such statement is made,
and after having been so warned and with no promises having
been made me of immunity from prosecution, I now make the
following free and voluntary statement without fear of
consequences.

By name is Burt Lawson. I have been a resident of Usage County, Oklahoma, for 23 or 24 years. I am now serving a seven-year sentence at McALESTER STATE PENITERTIARY. The definite date I have forgotten, but as nearly as I can recall, I was in the employment of w. R. "BILL" SMITH as a foremen on his farm and ranch, located near GRAYHORSE, in Osage County, Oklahoma, covering a period from semetime in 1918 up to some time in 1921. while in the employ of SMITH, I lived in his ranchhouse with my family. Some time around the early part of 1921 I discovered an intimacy between my wife and w. R. "BILL" SMITH, which finally developed in breaking up my family and caused me to leave the employment of SMITH.

After leaving the employ of SMITE. I then moved with my family to a place about three and one-half miles Southeast of HOMINY, Okla. Some time, as near as I can recall, in July, 1922, KREEST BURKHART came to my house, which was a two room house, a bedroom and a combination kitchen and dining room. By wife and my mother-in-law, MRS. S. J. CASK. were at the house at the time and in the kitchen. This was about two o'clock in the afternoon. KHIRST came into the bedroom and sat down and after talking a few minutes, turned to me and said - "Bert, I have get a proposition I want to I remarked, "What is it krnest?" Ernest make to you". said, "I want you to blow up and kill BILL SMITH and his He is the dirtest principled man in Oklahoma and he wrecked your home and you have good reasons for killing him. and if you will blow him and his wife up with nitroglycerine I will pay you \$5000 cash." Ernest then said that BILL SMITH's wife and his, armest's, wife were sisters; that if he could get rid of BILL SMITH and SMITH'S wife, that his, ERNEST'S, wife would fall heir to all their property, which would then make him worth around two million dellars. I turned to ERREST BURNLARF and said, "Ernest, L-don't know any thing about using nitroglycerine and I would liable to get my hand blown off, and I just did not mant to do anything like that anyhow." BURKHART then said, "The reason I mentioned it to you was because I knew you was solid and would not talk; that you had been working for eld man HERRIOD for six years and knew everything on him and never told anything on him." I then told ERNEST that I just did not went to do it and

would not do it. ERWEST then got up and started to go and as he walked out of the house, my wife came in from the kitchen and said to me, "What is it of his durn business of our family affairs."

In the next two or three days, possibly four days, W. K. "BILL" HALE came to my house between eight and nine o'clock in the morning. My wife, my mother-in-law, MRS. S. J. CASE, and my sister, MRS. BESSIE C. LACY, were in the Mitchen. There was a curtain between the bedroom and the kitchen. BILL HALR set down in my front room and began talking about things generally. and them turned to me and said, "BURT, I've got a proposition I want to put to you." I said, "What is it MR. Halk?" He said, "BURT, I'll give you \$5000 cash, and it won't be a sheek, if you will blow up BILL SMITH and wife. The reason I want him blown up is that I borrowed \$10,000 from SMITH and he is crowding me for the money and I can't raise the money at the present time, and if I don't pay it he will forclose on me and cause me a lot of trouble, and if I have SMITH out of the way I will not have to pay him this money. You can use nitroglycering with a fuse and I will fix the nitro and the fuse and all you will have to do is place it under the corner of his house and touch it off. The fuse only furns only so many feet to the minute, and I will but the fuse long enough to give you plenty time to get away." HAIR then pulled from his pocket a piece of white fuse about three feet long and said, "I will show you how to use it." He then took his pocket knife and cut off a piece about six inches long, then took his knife and split the end of each piece of fuse and spread the ends open, then took a match from his pocket and lighted the end of the short piece of fuse, then placed the ends of the short piece and long piece about an inch apart and said, "You see, the spark will fly from the short piece to the long piece, which will be a more sure shot of setting it off then by using a match." About that time my wife and sister, MRS. BESSIK C. LACY, came into the room and my wife remarked, "what in the world is he doing?", meaning BILL HALE. BILL Hall answered and said, I'm teaching BURT how to be a By that time the short piece had burned down close to HALE'S fingers and HALE threw it on the floor. My motherin-law, who was in the kitchen, put her head in the door and said, "I smell rubber burning." She looked around and saw the piece of fuse burning on the floor, and remarked, "What are you trying to do, blow up this place?" BILL Halk remarked, "No. I'm just pranking with BURT." My mother-in-law then took a broom and swept this fuse out of the door. in-law went back to the kitchen, and my wife and sister left the room. I then turned to HALE and said, "HaLE, I can't afford to do that and I'm not going to do it." HALE then said, "Well BURT, I will see you later." HALE then left my house.

about two weeks later, as near as I can remember, after BILL HALE

left my house. I was driving to MIRPAL Orial. in my car and when water I got near SalT CREEK bridge, which is about a mile out of FAIRFAX I met KELSIE MOERISON in a car driving towards GRAYHORSE. As we passed, KRISIE called to me to stop. I had got a little past hims and backed my car up to his. KELSIE got out of his car and came around to me and said, "BURT, I got a good deal on and I want you." to help me to pull the job. There will be good money in it. \$2500 The reason I came to you is I know that HALE and ERWEST BURKHART had been to you, and that you are solid and will not tell anything." "The job is to blow up BILL SMITH and his wife, and up can do it and do a good job and there will be no danger. " I asked KELSIE who was going to pay the money, and he said, "BILL HALE and ERNEST BUHKHART will pay half each of \$5000." I told KELSIE that if I had wanted to do it I would have taken the first offer made to me by HALE AND ERREST BURKHART. KELSIE said. "Well I know that they offered you \$5000." We then parted.

a few days after I talked with KELSIE MORRISON, I was in FAIREAL and met BRYAN BURKHART near the first blacksmith shop on South side of town. BRYAN said to me, "BURT, why didn't you take up that proposition that KELSIE offered to you to help blow up BILL SMITH and wife? That would have been easy money for you." I told BRYAN that the proposition did not look good to me; that if I wanted the electric chair I would have taken the proposition, but I do not want anything to do with it. He remarked, "I know that BILL HALE, ERMEST and KELSIE had talked to you about it, and know that you are all right." This was all that was said about it.

Some time in August, as I recall, the latter part of August, 1922, I mat Roy BUNCH at FAIRFAX near a white church, which is about one block West of the SMITH-WILLIAMS Hotel. I had known HOY BUNCH for a long time, and we got into a conversation about making money. BUNCH said, "BURT, do you want to make some easy money?" I said, "It depends on how you want me to make it. " BUNCH said, "HENEY ROAK is a good friend of yours and you know him well, and he will go any where with you. I will give you a \$1000 if you will let me put some strychnine in some whiskey and you give the whiskey to HOAN and kill him. I have got HOAN and his wife separated and we are on bad terms, and I am going to have his wife if I have to kill him myself." I told ROY that I liked HENRY ROAM, and would not burt a hair on HENRY'S head, and would not have anything to do with it; that if he wanted to kill him, that was his business and for him to hop to it. A short time thereafter I was arrested in september, 1922, as I remember, and put in jail at PAWHUSKa, charged with murder, and remained in jail until April 4, 1923, at which time I was released after the jury found. me not guilty of the charge of murder. I was released from jail about il o'clock at night. Ly brother-in-law, CHARLIE BIAIR, and my mother-in-law, MRS. S. J. CASE, took me in a taxi cab to PERSHING, Okla., where we caught a oim o'clock M. K. & T. train going to HOMINY. After arriving at HOMINY we walked three miles



Southeast to my home. About two or three days after I got home, about two e'clock in the afternoon, BLLL HALE and ERNEST BURKHART came to my house. My brother-in-law, CHARLIE BLAIR, and mother-in-law, MRS. CASE, were in the bedroom, and my wife and my sister-in-law, MRS, CHARLIE BLAIR, were in the kitchen. BILL HAIR and SHEEST BURKHART came into the bedroom. HALE appeared week to have been drinking a little. After a few remarks, HALE turned, 200 to me and said, "BURT, I got that job done, and a good job of it, and now what I want to ask you to do is not to say anything about what we said to you, for if you did there would be no way under the sun to keep me from getting hung." KREEST BURKHART spoke up and said. "BURT ain't going to talk. I knew him when he werked wanted for old man HKRROD for six years and knew everything on him and didn't tell nothing on him. HALE then said, "BURT, if you ever need a friend or anything just let us know." ERNEST BURGHARD then spoke up and said, "Yes BURT, if you ever need a friend, HAIR then turned to my money or anything just let us know." mother-in-law, ERS. CASE, and said, "BURT knows enough on me to hang me if he would tell it, but I know that you folks never meddle with other folks business, so I can't be worried. " by mother-inlaw, MRS. CASE, then remarked to HAIR. "It takes all of our time to tend to our own business." In a few minutes HALE and KERRSE left my place.

Some time about the middle of April, 1923, I was in an automobile with HAL BUIE, going from HOMINY to RALSTON by the way of SHATHOREM, Onla. Between the SAND ROCK school house and store at GRATHORSE we met ROY BUNCE, who was in his car. We stopped and all got out, and BUNCH turned to me and said, "BURT who is that fellow you have in the car with you?" I answered him and said, "He is just another crook like we are", referring to HAL BULK. remarked, "BURT, you just as well had that thousand dollars as not, you would have got some good out of it on the farm. That he KRISIE and BRYAK will not get any good out of it, they will spend it for cook and whiskey. Them crasy S- of B- KELSIE and BRYAN said they took that whiskey and strychnine that I gave them to give HENRY ROAN, and they said they gave it to him and it did not work fast enough and they shot him. I think they drank the whiskey and shot HOAE, and I told KEISIE so, and when ever you see him you want to josh him about it." Later on, about a week later, Hal Bulk and I were in FalkFak and met KRISIK MORRISON neer we stopped and get inte the corner of the First Estional Bank. conversation, and I remarked to KELSIE, "ROY BUNCH is telling a garage had tale on you, he said that you took that whiskey and strychning to give to HENRY ROAM and drank it then shot HENRY ROAM," KRISTS remarked, "Did that s- of a B- tell you that?" I said, "Tell that is what he told me. " KKISIR said, "That crasy S- of & ... B- will tell you anything. I learned one thing in this dan Corn whiskey kills the effect of strychmine.

The first part of this year, 1925, I was sent to MoALESTER State when Penitertiary to serve seven years, and since there RELSIE MORRISON came there as a prizoner with a nine-year sentence. On last LABOR = with MIT, while all the prisoners were on the yard, I was walking aroun with HAL BUIE and met KELSIE MORRISON near the entrance to the laundry. KELSIE MORRISON remarked, "I wish I was out of this dam place, I would kill me some more Red Asses if they were not all broke." I said, KELSIE you are going to get yourself in a crack if you don't look out." KEISIE said, "Oh hell, do it at night I remarked. like I did the other jobs when nobody can see you." "I could put my finger on those fellows who did the jobs as soon as I heard of them being done." KELSIE remarked, "I guess you could after we had talked it over together." I said, "Yes, and I know who paid you the money and how much they paid you." KRISIE said. "Well I don't care for you knowing it for you never did turn any one in." I said, "Well you got good money for the job." KELSIE said, "Yes, and they are liable to be out a dam sight more before Later on I had another conversation on the yard, it is over with." when there were not many prisoners around, and I told KELSIE that he had better be ready to protect himself, that HAIE and the BUHK-HaRTS are liable to frame up on him and unload the blame on him, and KELSIE said, "Well I am going to take care of myself."

ORIGINAL STATEMENT BY HAL BUIE:

Oklahoma City, Oct. 20, 1925.

After being warned by T. B. WRITE, Special Agent in Charge, F. S. SMITH and J. V. MURPHY, Special Agents, of the Dept. of Justice, that I do not have to make a statement and any statement I do make can and may be used against me in the trial of the cases concerning which such statement is made, and after having been so warned and with no promises having been made me of immunity from prosecution, I now make the following free and voluntary statement without fear of consequences:

My name is Hall Buile. I am now serving sentence at McALESTER State Penitentiary. Covering a period of 1915 to latter part of 1922, I was in and around the OSAGE country many times, but have actually lived in OSAGE County from latter part of 1922 to March 6, 1925. Covering the period of my residence in OSAGE County I was closely associated with the criminal element, and was generally considered a criminal and classed as a bank robber.

Some time about the middle of April, 1923, BURT LAWSON and I, in my automobile, were on our way from HOMINY to RAISTON going by way of GRAYHORSE. Near the store at GRAYHORSE we met a ... dar and BURT Lawson and the man driving this car saluted one another and both cars stopped. This man in the other car got out and walked over to where we were, and BURT and I got out of 🎎 our car. This man, whom I later learned was ROY BUNCH, remarked to BURT LAWSON, "Who is that fellow with you?" BURT answered and said. "Oh he is a crook like we are." This fellow then spoke to me and told me his name was ROY BUNCH, and I told him my name. BUNCH then remarked to BURT LAWSON, "BURT you should have made that \$1000, you could have put it on your farm and got some good out of it, that KELSIE MORRISON and BRYAN BURKHART will not get any good out of it, they will spend it for whiskey.* BUNCH then said something about KELSIE and BRYAN taking the whiskey and strychnine that he gave them to kill HENRY ROAN with, and giving it to HENHY ROAM; that it did not work fast emough to suit them and they shot him; that he, BUNCH, believes that they did not give ROAN the whiskey, but drank it themselves, and them BUNCH said to BURT, When you see old MELSIE you want to josh him about it."

Several days later BURT LAWSON and I were in FAIRFAX and met KELSIE MORRISON on the street near a bank. KELSIE and BURT LAWSON got into conversation, and BURT remarked to KELSIE, "ROY BUICH is telling a bad tale on you; that you took the whiskey and strychnine that he gave you to kill HENRY ROAM with and drank it and then shot HENRY ROAM." KRESIE MORRISON said, "Did that S— of a B—— tell you that?" BURT said, "Yes." HELSIE then remarked, "That crasy S— of a B—— will tell you anything." KELSIE also said, "I learned one thing, that Corn whiskey kills the effect of strychnine."

While I was in jail at PAWHUSKA about Christmas, 1924, awaiting trian on the case I was later convicted on, I met and talked with one AMOS TUCKER, who was also in jail at PAWHUSKA at that time. TUCKER told me that ever time KELSIE MORRISON would get drunk, MORRISON would tell him, TUCKER, about blowing up BILL SMITH and family, and that he really believed that between the whiskey he, MORRISON, drank and this crime preying on his mind, that KELSIE was going crazy.

Just after AMOS TUCKER told me this, KELSIE MORRISON and his wife, CATHERINE MORRISON, and another woman, who ran a road house and whose name I have forgotten, all three being pretty drunk, dame into the jail and brought some eatables and some whiskey. They gave us the eatables, and started to give us some of the whiskey, but the Jailor showed up and RELSIE hid the whiskey. KELSIE came around on the side of the cells where AMOS and I were and pulled open his overcost and showed us three pistols he had on his person, one being a pearl handled pistol. He pulled one of these pistols out, which was a

do you boys want this?" we did not answer, but pointed and motioned for him to hush, that the Jailor was coming, and AMOS shook his head no. I could painly see a bottle of whiskey in KELSIE'S pocket, and he started to give us a drink when the JAILOR appeared, and KELSIE later whispered that the bottle was full when he came to the jail, but had given most of it to the other prisoners on the other floor. When RELSIE saw that we did not want the pistols or whiskey, he then walked around in frent with the Jailor, and I could plainly see the Jailor take a drink from KELSIE'S bottle. KELSIE then gave the Jailor one of his pistols. KELSIE and these women then left.

On last Labor Day BURT LaWSOK, a fellow convice, and I were walking around the yards at the Penitentiary, and met KELSIK MORRISON near the entrance of the laundry. KEISIE MORRISON remarked, "I wish I was out of this dam place, I would kill me some more Red asses if they had any money and were not broke", or words to that effect. BURT told KELSIK that if he did not look out he was going to get himself into trouble. KELSIE remarked, "Hell, I'll do it at night like I did the other jobs, when everyone is asleep and no one can see you." BURT then remarked that he could have put his finger on the fellow who did those jobs as soon as he heard of them being done. KELSIK said, "I guess you could, you and I talked it over together." REMARKED, "I know who paid you the money and how much." KELSIE then said, "I don't care a dam for you knowing all about it, you wouldn't turn anybody in." BURT said something about KEISIE getting good money for the job, and KELSIE remarked, "Yes, and they are liable to be out a dam sight more before it is over with." The conversation then drifted into something else.

ORIGINAL STATEMENT BY CHARLES BIAIR.

Tulsa, Okla., Oct. 23, 1925.

Statement made by Charles Blair to Special Agents r. s. smith and J. V. Hurphy:

After being warned by Mr. SMITH and MURPHY that I do not have

to make a statement, and any statement I do make can and may be used against me in the trial of the case concerning which such statement is made, and after having been so warned, I now make the following free and voluntary statement, without any promises having been made me of immunity from prosecution:

My home is in Tulsa, Okla., 1109 My name is CHARLES BLAIR. I am now in the County jail at Korth Cincinnati Street. Tulsa, charged with grand larceny. On April 4, 1923, I was in Pawhuska, Okla., and was present when BuRF Lawson was acquitted on a charge of murder. After BURT'S acquittal and his release from jail, he accompanied my mother and I to HOMINY, Okla., and to my house, where he remained some time. About three or four days after BURT came to my house, which was around April 7 or 8, 1923, and about eight or nine o'clock in the morning, BILL HALE drove up to my house in a car, stopped his car for a few minutes and spoke to me and made some remarks about buying cattle and drove away. about two o'clock in the afternoon of the same day, BILL HALE and ERNEST BURKHART came to my house in a car. I was out in the yard when they drove up, and HAIE called "Hullo", and asked me who was there. I told him that there was no one but BURT LAWSOK and my home folks. BILL HALE and ERREST BURKHART got out of the car. HALE remarked to me, "Here you got anything around here to drink?" I told him no. KHNEST BUHKHART them reached down in the side pocket of the car and pulled out a bottle of whiskey, and said "Well we have some, take a drink of ours." I took a drink from the bottle and BILL HALE took a drink. HALE then asked, "Where is BURT at?" I answered and told him that BURT was in the house. HALE said. "Well, we will go in and talk with him a while." The three of us then went into the house and into the front room, where we found BURT and my mother, MRS. CASE. By sister, VIRGIE BLAIR, who used to be the wife of BUHT LAWSON, and BLANCH GRAHAM were in the kitchen. My house was a two room house, a bedroom and a kitchen, which were separated by a curtain. BILL HALE AND ERREST BURKHART sat down in the bedroom, and started talking. Some one mentioned about BILL SMITH'S house getting blowed up, and BILL HALE remarked, "They did a good job of it." I remarked to BILL HAIR, "BILL SMITH used to call you Burkshire a good deal", and HALE remarked, "Yes, but he will never call me that any more." I had heard a long time ago that BILL HALE had stole some Burkshire hogs and was driving them across the prairie and the owner rode up on him and whipped him with a quirt, and he was after that nicknamed "Burkshire", and after that BILL SMITH always spoke of BILL HALR as "Burkshire". I remarked then to Mr. HALE, "Well blowing up BILL 3MITH might have been all right, but blowing up that innocent girl, who was about to be confined, was pretty bad." Hall remarked, "Yes, but that couldn't be helped." Then BILL HALE turned to BURT LawSON and said, "BURT, now if you should tell what you know, there would be no way to keep us from being bung. ERNEST SURKHART spoke up and said, "You need not be afraid of BURT saying anything, he worked for old man and HERHAGE for six

years and knew everything on him and never did say anything about it. " BILL HALE then said to BURF, "Now BURF, if you ever need a friend, money or anything, bet us know and you meen get it. Then ERNEST BURKHART spoke up and said. Yes BURT, if you ever need any money or anything fust let us know and you can get it." HALE then turned to my mother and said. go "BURT knows enough on us if he told it, that there wouldn't be a change to keep us from being hung, but we know he don't never meddle with other peoples business, so we can't be worried." My mother than said, "We got all we can do to attend to our own business and never meddle with other peoples business", or After this BILL HALD and KRUEST BURKHART words to that effect. left our house. after they had gone, we all talked about what BILL HALE and KRUEST BURTHART had said, and my mother told us never to "cheep" it, because there had been so many of them murders, and if they, HALE and BUHKHART, ever heard of us talking we would liable to be kalled. My sister, VIRGIE, after HALE and BURGHART had left, came into the bedroom from the kitchen and said to BURT, "You must know something on them people. they are getting mighty good to you."

I have never mentioned this information to anyone else before, and I am sure that my mother, sister or BLANCH GRAHAM has never told anyone, because they were too much afraid that they would be killed if they did, and I know that if they ever find out that I have told what I have in this statement, that I had better never stick my head in that part of the country, for if I did I would be killed right now.

Statement made by BLANCH COVINGTON to FRANK S. SMITH and J. V. MURPHY, Special agents, Department of Justice.

My name is BLANCH COVINGTON. I reside at 1109 K. Cincinnati Street, Julsa, Okla., where I have resided for the past nine or ten years.

Last night about 8:30 or 9:00 o'clock, BURT LAWSON came to my came to my house and told me that he was just from Governor Trapp's office and was with a load of Government laws, and that Governor TRAPP had promised him a pardon from the penitentiary

and \$10,000 if he would get evidence against HALE and BURKHARTS in the BILL SMITH case, and that he wanted me to be a witness and asked me how much "plaster" was on my house and I told him 🦂 🐗 He then said that if I would be a witness and swear that BURKHART and BILL HALE came to his mother-in-law's, eld lady Blair, house at HOMINY and came into the kitchen, where VIRGIE and he. BURT, and I were sitting and made the remark that they had I said, "BURT, I don't made a good job of blowing up BILL SMTH. know anything about that, and I wouldn't know what to say: I wouldn't know what time to say they were there, and I never asw BURT LAWSON then said, "Well it was ten o'clock them in my life." when I placed the nitroglycerine under SMITH'S house, and you can be the judge for yourself in saying what time they were there." I said then. "BURT I never saw those men in my life and that would place me in an awful boat that I couldn't identify these men." But said "Well, I will show them to you", and said that if I would swear that I heard these fellows say they were the ones, he would give me 43,000 to lift the "plaster" off my home; that he would get the \$10,000 after they had their preliminary hearing, and he would then give me \$3,000. BURT said, "Dick (which he always called me) I never lied to you in my life, and I will give you the \$3000.

Two men, who stated they were Government men, and who were out in the car while BURT was talking to me, was then called into my MR. SMITH, one of these Government men, was inhouse by BURT. troduced to me by BURT, and Mr. aMITH remarked to me, "I suppose you was surprised to see BURT?" and I told him I was. BURT then turned to Mr. SMITH and said, "This lady is sick and not feeling well and said she would like to wait until tomorrow morning before she makes a statement. Mr. MAITH remarked, "Well, we are in a hurry to get back, however, I guess we will have to wait until Mr. aMITH then asked me what time it would tomorrow morning." be convenient to take my statement, and I told him around nine or nine-thirty o'clock. Er. akiTH then told me not to say anything about what we were here for or about our being here, that he would rather that no one would know that we had had BUHT out of the Mr. SMITH stated that they were Soverment officers penitentiary. and that they did their work quietly. Mr. SKITH and the other gentleman then took BURT and left my house, telling me that they would be at my house tomorrow morning at nine o'clock.

some time in september, 1924, BURT LawJOK, whom I have known for quite a while and who had placed confidence in me many times, while in a confidential conversation, asked me then about the mortgage on my place, and told me at that time that it would be an easy matter to blow up my house and set it after at the same time and I could collect the insurance of \$3,500, which would pay off the mortgage; that he mew how to blow it up; that he had blown up BILL SHITH and knew now to use the nitro, and tried to get me to let him blow up my house. I told him no that I would not do that. BURT at that time told me that he could blow

it up and it would never be known.

At one time BERT'S own wife, VIHGIE BLAIR, told me that when she was 12 years old that she herded cattle for BILL MITH, and that one day she told BILL SMITH that if he would support her family and buy her clothes, that she would be the same as a wife to him that SMITH teld her that she was too young and would cause him trouble; that she told SMITH that it would never cause him any trouble; that after that SMITH did support her family and got her in the family way, and was about to be taken into custody by the truant officers; that old lady BLAIR, her mother, got shold of BURT LAWSON and married her to BURT; that later on old lady BLAIR, her mother, would steal her out for SMITH, and BURT LAWSON objected to it; that finally BURT got mad and beat up old lady BLAIR on account of it, and BURT and old lady BLAIR were put in jail at PAWHUSKA over this trouble.

Last night, October 21st, 1925, after BURT told me what he did and amowing that he was the man that actually killed SKITH, because he had told me so, I could not sleep, and this morning bright and early I went to my lawyer, D. B. I told Mr. CREWSON that I wanted to tell the truth. and he asked me who the men who were with BURT, and I told him that they said they were GOVERNAMT man, but that there was so many things going on that I just did not know who they were, and I felt like I didn't want to talk to these Government men alone. My lawyer asked me if I would object to a plain clothes man being present when I talked to these Government men, and I said no. My lawyer called the Sheriff, who later came down and the Sheriff talked to Mr. CHEWSON and me, and I told the Sheriff just what I have told you in this statement, and I will confront BURT LAWSON and tell him just what I have told you.

SECOND STATE ENT FROM CHARLES BLAIR:

Tulsa, Okla., Oct. 22, 1925.

Statement made by CHARLES BLAIR to FRAIN S. SLITH, J. V. MURPHY, Special agents of Department of Justice, and E. D. SAMFORD, Sheriff of Tulsa County, Oklahoma.

After being warned by Mr. SMITH that I do not have to make a statement and any statement I do make can and may be used against me in the trial of the case concerning which such statement is made, and having been so warned, and with ne promises having been made me of immunity from prosecution, I now make the following free and voluntary statement, without fear of consequences.

My name is CHARLES BLAIR. I am in the County jail at Tulsa charged with grand larceny, and under the name of MARL DAVIS.

This morning about 9:30 I was called from my cell by the Jailor and told that someone wanted to see me. I came out into the lobby and there met BURT LAWSON. We sat down on a seat and BURT LAWSON began his conversation, by telling me he wanted me to help him out; that he had been paroled from the penitentiary, and that he was going to get a let of money for getting evidence against BILL HALE and BURYHART for blowing up BILL SMITH, and told me when he got this money that he was going to buy my mother and sister a home either in Yalk or BANHUNKA. He then asked me if I remembered about BILL HALE coming by our house one morning, about five and one-half miles Southeast of HOMINY. I told him, "Yes". He them said that BILL Half and BURKHART would have a trial at KKID, and he, BURT, was going to have me subpoensed as a witness, and he wanted me to swear that BILL HALE came by our house in the morning and later on that same day, about two or two-thirty in the afternoon, BILL HALE AND BUHKHART came back to the hours and came in and talked to him, BURT Laws Co., and told him that they did a good job of blowing up BILL SMITH'S house, but was sorry that the girl was killed because she was in the family way; that BILL HALE said that if he. LAWSON, told on him, they would be hung, but that he knew LawSON wouldn't talk, because he hadn't talked about an old man whom he had worked for and knew a lot on. BURT told me to say that my mother and sister and BLANCH were there at the time that BILL HALE made this talk.

About this time two man, who said they were Government man, took me and BURT LAWSON into a room, and Mr. SMITH began to question me, and I repeated to Mr. SMITH about what BURT LAWSON had teld me to say, and made Mr. SMITH and the other Government man a statement and signed it, and two other men came into the room and witnessed this statement. I now wish to state that that statement is not the truth and the reason I made it was that BURT LAWSON had talked to me and influenced me by telling me he would buy my mother and sister a home, and since having made that statement and talked to Mr. SMITH, the SHERIFF, and MR. MUHRHY, I am now telling the full truth.

Tulsa, Okla., Oct. 22, 1925.

statement made by BURT LAWSON to FRANK S. SMITH, J. V. MURPHY, Special Agents, Dept. of Justice, and R. D. SAHFORD, Sheriff, Tulas County, Okla., and LUTHER BISHOP, Investigator, State Bureau of Investigation.

My name is BURT Lawson. I am 46 years of age. I am now serving a term in McALESTER penitentiary for second degree burglary.

I was arrested and put in jail at PaWHUSKA, Okla., charged with murder. That was in september, 1922. My trial was on April 4. 1923, and I was acquitted by the jury of the charge of murder. While I was in jail awaiting trial, one night during March, 1923, a Deputy Sheriff, I believe his name is Void or something like that, came to my cell and said that there was a man outside that wanted to see me, and he let me out of my cell. I went out of the jail and in front of the jail I found BILL HALE sitting in his car. Halk told me to get in his car; that he wanted to talk to me. That was about eight o'clock in the evening. I started to get in the back seat and he told me to get in the front seat with him. He had his motor running and as soon as I got in the front seat with him he started the car off. I asked him what he wanted, After we got out and he said. "I want to talk to you awhile." of the edge of PAWHUSKA, HALE told me, "Now, BURT I asked you several times to blow AMTH up and you wouldn't do it. Now here is one time you are going to do it; I got you in my possession I said to HALK, "HALE you ought and you are going to do it." not do me that way, I am in enough trouble now." Halk answered me and said, "Oh hell, don't be so God dam chicken hearted." I believe I said to HALE then, "You are just a Dam fool." BILL HALE, that he had been trying to get BURT to do it. but we got him in a position now where he can't get out of it. HALE and ERVEST continued to talk among themselves. We stayed at EMMEST BURKHART'S house about an hour and a half or two hours, when HALE got up from where he was sitting and said for KRNEST to get that box and put it in the car, and told me to go out first. I got in the front seat of the car like HALK told me to. 'ERKEST got in the back seat and put the box on the floor between the back and front seats. HALE got in the front seat with me and drove the car. We drove down the main street to BILL SMITH'S house and stopped the car almost in front of SMITH'S house. I believe then HAIE looked at his watch and said it was ten minutes to twelve. HALE told me to get out of the car. He got out on one side and I got out on the other. HALE then told ERNAT BURFRIART to get out, which he did, and HALE told me to reach in and get that box. I got the box and then HALE said to get in front, meaning in front of him and ERNEST. HALE then said to take the box and put in down in the basement. HALE said to LRIEM. "Don't let him get too dam far ahead of you." "We won't give him any chance to get away, we will go right along with him to see that he puts it there. " THALE had his pistol in his outside cost pocket and had his hand on it. we three went to the basement door, which was open, and HALE and ERNEST BURNIART stood at the door while I went down in the basement and set it down. I set the box down at the far end of the basement. This box was a small wood box and had a jug in it. It had boards nailed over the top and a hole cut in them for the neck of the jug to stick out. The jug had a cork in it and it looked like the fuse was run through the cork. There was a long liese of white fuse coiled up on top of the box. when I set the box down I went out of the basement, and MALE and MRREST told me to get back in the car. I walked between them to the car. I got in the front seat, making got in the back seat, and BILL HALE got in the front sest with me. We started off and went back to ERREST BURKHART'S home, and let ERREST out, and HALE AND I drove off to FAURUSHA. While in the car, both ERWEST BURGHART and BILL HALE said to ma, "Now if you ever cheep this to anybody we will kill you." When we got out of the car at BILL SMITH's house to take the box down in the basement, I saw MELSIE MORRISON standing in the dark at the back of the house. I asked KELSIE, "That are you doing there MELSIE?" MELSIE did not answer me. On the way back to FAWHUSHA, neither HALE or I talked very much. We got back to the PANEUNE jail about two or two-thirty o'clock in the morning. When we, MALE and I, stopped in front of the PAWHUSKA jail, HALE said to me, "Now you had better not say anything about it, like we told you, or it wouldn't be good for you, (meaning that if I talked about the blowup to any one, HAIE and MENEST BUREHART would bump me off). Hale then blowed his horn, and the Deputy Sheriff came out of the jail and took me back to my cell. Before HALE called the Deputy out to get me, the last thing FALE said to me, "Now don't forget what we told you. I am going to be out of town", but HALE did not say where he was going.

About two weeks after I got out of jail at PAWHUSKA, after being acquitted by the jury of the charge of murder, I met KKISIE MORRISOK on the street in FAIRFAX. I said to KKISIE, "KKISIE, I have been in jail about seven months and I am awful hard run, and I understand that you got plenty of money for that job you pulled (meaning the blowing up of SMITH'S house) and I would like to have a little of the money. If you don't want to give me any, loan me a little and when I get on my feet I'll pay it back." KKISIE said, "I haven't get no money BURT, I haven't got over \$2.00 outside of my name." Then I believe I said to KEISIE, "I understand you get \$5000 out of that deals, and he said, "No, I hain't got nothing yet". I just walked off and left him alone.

about three or four weeks before CHRISTMAS, 1924. I was arrested in TULSA, Oala., on a charge of second degree burglary. I plead guilty to the charge and was sent to the State Penitentiary at MCALESTER for seven years. while at MCALESTER penitentiary on Labor May, 1925, I and HAL BUIE, a fellow convict, met KELSIE MORRISON, who had been sent up for a term of nine years, near the laundry entrance in the prison yard. KELSIE said to me and Hall BUIL, "I wish I could get out of this mam place, if I could I'll blow up some more med asses if they wasn't all broke." I said to KELSIE. If you don't watch, KELSIE you are going to get yourself in a crack that you can't get out." KELSIs answered and said, "Oh hell, I'd do it after night like I did that, while nobody can't see me", meaning blowing up BILL sMITH. I said to KELSIK, "Well you got good money for the job." KELSIK said. "Yes, and it is liable to cost them a dam sight more before they get through with it." Nothing more was said.

Some time in the latter part of August, 1922, as I recall it. I met ROY BURNH at FAIRFAL near a white church, which is about one block west of the SMITH WILLIAMS hotel. I had known MOY BURCH for a long time, and we got into a conversation about making money. BUNCH said, "BURT, do you want to make some easy money?" I said, "It depends on now you want me to make it." BUNCH said, "HENRY HOAK is a good friend of yours, and he will go any where with you. I will give you \$1000 if you will let me put some strychnine in some whiskey and you give it to HANRY ROAN and kill him. I am on bad terms with HANRY, and have got hom and his wife separated, and I am going to have his wife if I have to kill him myself." I said, "No, I like HANRY HOAK and would not harm a hair on his head, and won't have anything to do with it. If you want to kill him that is your business, and hop to it." A short time after that, about in September, 1922, I was put in jail at PAWHUSKA charged with murder, of which charge I was later acquitted by jury.

Some time about the middle of April, 1923, I was in an automobile with HAL BUIE going from HOMINY to RALSTON by way of GRAYHORSE. Between the SAND ROCK school house and the store at GRAYHORSE we met ROY BUNCH, who was in his sar. We stopped and all got out, and ROY BUNCH turned to me and said, "BURT who is that fellow you have with you in homeon, the car?" I said. "He is just another grook like we are." BUNCH then remarked, "BURT, you had just as well had that \$1000 as not, it would have done you some good. That dam KRISIE MORRISON and BRYAN BURKHART will not get any good out of it, they will spend it for women and whiskey. Them cragy S-- of B---. FELSIE and BRYAN, took that whiskey that I gave them to give to HENHY ROAN, which had strychnine in it, and because it did not work fast enough they shot him. I think they drank the whiskey and then shot ROAK, and I told KEISIE so, and when you see KEISIE you josh him about it." About a week later HAL BUIR and I were in FAIRFAX and met KELSIE MORRISON near the corner of the First National Bank. We got into conversation with him and I said, "KELSIE, ROY BUNCH is telling a bad tale on you. He sayd you drank that whiskey with strychnine in it that he gave you to kill HENRY ROAM with." KEISIE said, "Did that 5- of a B- tell you that?" I said, "He sure did." KELSIE said, "That crazy S- of a B- is liable to tell you anything, but I learned one thing in that deal, Corn whiskey kills the effect of strychnine."

for second degree burglary. Before being sent to McALESTER,
I last lived in TULSA, Okla. The exact date I have for
gotten, but as nearly as I can recall, I was in the employ
of W. E. "BILL" SMITH as a foremen on his farm and ranch,

a period from some time in 1918 up to some time in 1921.
While in the employ of SMITH, I lived in his ranch house with

I have received your telegram of October 29, 1926, advising that Special Assistant to the Attorney General Brown has been notified by the Attorney General that the latter had authorized the receipt by Leavenworth Penitestiary of BertsLawson, witness in the Lange case. I also note that Agent Murphy left with Langes on the night of the 29th.

I am somewhat surprised at the latter statement as I had assumed that every precaution was taken with a view to seeing that the Bureau was not obligated beyond its normal and proper responsibilities. The transfer of a prisoner from one place to enother is, of course, which the duty of the office of the Uni. States Mershal. I realise, of course, that the conditions here are manual but I am agreement arguiffed as to how Assate of the Pursen can secont even a State prisoner from one pince of incerceration to emother. The Marcan would naturally have been seriously embarrassed if this men had escaped enroute. It is my desire to assume no responsibility for the detention of any of these '-flyid' vals.
