R. S. Jordan, in a statement made to Agent

J. A. Street and W. H. Brackett on July 15, 1926, said that on the night Bill Smith's house was blown up, Blackie Thompson, Jim Boswell and Charlie Boswell came to Grenada, Mississippi, and later went to the Ranch, and stated that quick action will be taken.

Sam Tulk is alleged to have stated to former Agent Weekly that after the discovery of Roan's body, Roy Bunch called Roan's widow on the telephone and told her that if any one asked her where he was that night Roan disappeared. 

Alleged that she can testify to Anna Brown being at home May 21, 1921, and to her receiving a phone call to come to Grayhorse to see her mother who was sick at the home of Ernest Burkhart. She leaving about 8 A. M. in Bob Carter's taxicab; that she took with her a small handbag of personal effects, and in this bag she had a .32 calibre revolver which she usually carried; that she did not see Anna alive again; that after Anna's body was found she went with the officers and unlocked Anna's house, which was still in the same condition as on the morning of May 21 when Anna left for Grayhorse; that the beds had not been used nor was there any sign of any disturbance there; that the same handbag Anna had carried away was there, but the .32 calibre revolver was missing. This shows that evidently Anna or some one else had been there and left the bag; that she later heard that Frank Hickey had found a .32 calibre revolver, while on a picnic near the place where Anna's body was found. Frank Hickey, on being interviewed, denied this.

It is alleged that Mrs. Bitterly stated that Wayne Moye was the taxi driver who frequently handled Anna. It is also alleged that he has been seen in the vicinity of Anna's house recently.

Mrs. LUCILLE HALLER. She can also testify that the next afternoon, May 22, "Duke" Burkhardt came to Mrs. Benne's house, where she was staying, and asked her to come to work for Mrs. Ernest Burkhardt; that she told "Duke" that she had promised to work for Anna Brown, and "Duke" replied that Anna was gone; that she, Mrs. Haller, knew that Anna often went away on sprees, opposed that Anna had gone away on a spree, and she, Mrs. Haller, went back with "Duke" Burkhardt to the home of Mrs. Ernest Burkhardt, where she worked for the next four weeks.

She stated that after the finding of Anna Brown's body, Mrs. Ernest Burkhardt told her that Ernest Burkhardt and himself (Mrs. Ernest Burkhardt) had taken Anna Brown home about 4 P. M. Saturday, MAY 21, 1931. (This is a direct contradiction of Mrs. Martha Dougherty Brookshire's statement.)

Mrs. Haller also stated that after she came to work for Mrs. Burkhardt she saw Bill Hale, Ernest and Bryan Burkhardt having a number of very private conversations together at Ernest and Bryan Burkhardt's house.

Hedges, Hainey and McGuire had known Bryan Burkhardt and Anna Brown well for years, and are positive of the identification as above stated. (2. B. Jones is now dead. When Edith Davis was interviewed by Agent Weiss in September 1923, she denied that she ever met or knew Bryan Burkhardt, and [REDACTED] Page 514 declared she had not seen Anna Brown since Friday night before the murder (May 20, 1921), and that was at Pawhuska at which time she and Anna had quarrelled and parted, Anna going to Fairfax and she returning to Pawhuska. (Agent Weiss noted at the time, however, that she kept laughing to herself, and was convinced she was not telling the truth.)

Agents Weiss and Burger have checked and investigated the theory that Rose Osgage and Jimmy Hicks alias Joe Allen killed Anna Brown, and are convinced there is no truth to it.

W. E. ("BILL") HAILE.

Alleged, as stated by George James, that Hale was in a party consisting of George James, Edith Davis, J. L. Bridges, Bryan Burkhardt and Anna Brown at a Whiskey Joint just west of Ralston on the night of May 21, 1921, where they stayed until 10 P. M. drinking, at which time the party broke up. Bryan Burkhardt and Bridges driving off in Ernest Burkhardt's Buick car in one direction, and the rest of the party in another car, in another direction agreeing that the party would meet again that night at Paul John's roadhouse, northeast of Burhenic; that Hale left the party somewhere in the meantime, and was not with the party any more that evening.

Conspirator.

Hale is a large cat-like man in the vicinity of Fairfax. He is a man of unscrupulous methods, and is believed to be the master mind in the murder of a number of George Indians, who were killed, ostensibly for the purpose of enlarging his fortune. The majority of the witnesses in these cases are afraid to testify to facts in their possession for fear of personal harm.

[REDACTED] stated that George James knew that Bill Hale furnished Bryan Burkhardt the .32 calibre pistol to kill Anna Brown that night (May 21, 1921), and that James overheard Hale, Bridges and Bryan Burkhardt planning Anna Brown's murder on the evening of May 21, 1921.

[REDACTED] an underworld character, accidentally stated to Agent Burger that one Catherine Cole, who was at one time the wife of Kelsie Morris, a notorious unscrupulous criminal, and a known探子 of Bill Hale, told her that Hale had been shot in the head on the night of the killing.
