SYNOPSIS OF FACTS:

Witness, Eugene E. Peel returned to St. Louis. Will leave town and return again January 2, 1926, when subpoena will be served on him. Pending.

DETAILS:

Referring to Agent's report of 12/29/25 in this matter, shortly after this report had been sent out Mr. Lake informed this office that witness Peel had returned to this city. Agent immediately called on Peel at Lake's office, where Peel stated that he did not remember the details of his investigation of the murder of Henry Roan or Roanhorse. However, that if he had a copy of the report made by him to refresh his memory, he would be able to recall all the details. He further stated that he was leaving town and would return Saturday morning, January 2nd, at which time he would accept service of the subpoena at his office. Inasmuch as up to this writing subpoena has not arrived the matter will be kept in abeyance until January 2nd.

Further information secured regarding movements and actions of Ernest Burkhardt and Bill Hale on night Smith home was destroyed. Place of murder of Henry Roan definitely fixed on restricted Indian land. Further information secured regarding actions of Roy Bunch shortly before, and after the finding of Roan's body. Continued.

DETAILS

CONCERNING THE MURDER OF W. E. "BILL" SMITH.

HENRY WARD, Fairfax, Oklahoma, stated to this Agent that he was at scene immediately after the explosion of W. E. Smith's home and while there saw ERNEST BURKHARDT, who was dressed in a bath robe or a night robe, the night robe being on the outside of his trousers. Also that he, HENRY WARD, saw W. E. "Bill" Hale late Thursday evening in Fairfax, Oklahoma, which was the day before the explosion, talking to a man, whose name this Agent will ascertain and furnish later.

MELVIN A. MARION (nick name "BOOGIE") captain of the Fire Department of Fairfax, Oklahoma, stated to this agent that he saw ARNOLD BURKHART at the scene of the explosion of fire immediately thereafter. That he had a conversation with BURKHART and said to him that the explosion was a terrible thing and ARNOLD BURKHART replied that it was some fire. MARION then said that the one who did this ought to be thrown in the fire and burned. BURKHART made no reply and walked away and left immediately. MARION also stated that ARNOLD BURKHART was dressed in a night robe or bath robe, that is the bath robe was on the outside of his trousers. MARION further stated that he found parts of burnt fuse on the south side of the SMITH home, that is the kind of fuse used for the purpose of exploding dynamite and glycerine. MARION is familiar with the use of explosives.

W.M. HAZEN, a carpenter of Fairfax, Oklahoma, stated to this agent that he found on the south side of the W. M. SMITH house, which had been blown up, burnt pieces of fuse. HAZEN is also familiar with the use of explosives.

CONCERNING THE MURDER OF HENRY MOON.

E. M. RICHARDSON, Indian Agent, located at Fairfax, Oklahoma, accompanied this agent and S. H. PECK to the scene where HENRY MOON's body was found. The place where the boy was found was marked by this agent, MR. RICHARDSON and S. H. PECK and it was determined that the body was found on Indian land, allotment No. 188 Section Thirty four (34) Township Twenty five (25) North and Range Five (5) East and allotted to Rose-Pah-Pe (Rose Little Star). The southeast corner of this allotment was located and shown to this agent by E. M. RICHARDSON, who determined that HENRY MOON was killed on restricted Indian land. Maps, plats etc were secured by this agent and turned over to the Bureau office.

GEORGE PRATT, an Indian, was interviewed at the Fairfax Hospital by this agent. PRATT stated that on Tuesday he and a man by the name of ACE BAUMER were hunting together; that they separated and that he saw a Buick car on the side of a little creek, but did not go to the car. That when he, PRATT, met ACE BAUMER again after the hunt, that he commented about the car to ACE BAUMER. That BAUMER told him that a man by the name of ALDO said he saw the car on a Saturday or Sunday before this Tuesday; that when he, PRATT, got to Fairfax he immediately went to PAKKAMAN and told him that there was a Buick car out there. PAKKAMAN went there with some fellows and found HENRY MOON's body in the car.

BOB PARKER was interviewed and stated that the Indian boy, PRATT, came to him and advised him that there was a car out there on the side of the creek about five or six miles from Fairfax. That he, PARKER, and JIM KNODLES visited the scene where the car was located and found the body of HENRY MOON in the car. That HENRY MOON was behind the steering wheel with his feet on the pedal and his hands on the steering wheel and his head laying on the right hand side of the car. That the curtain on the left side of the car was down and that the car was on ignition and from the blood and glass scattered around, it was evident that HENRY MOON was killed a few feet from where the car had stopped.

The following sworn statement was given by ARNOLD BURKHART to this agent

in the presence of J. M. PIERS.

Fairfax, Okla.

December 18th, 1925.

"My name is Arch Burger, I am 29 years old, married, and have resided in Fairfax, Oklahoma, for 17 years. I am the proprietor of the B&H Billiard parlor, located in Fairfax, Oklahoma.

I have known Mr. Roy Bunch intimately for 12 years, and he frequented my place of business located in Swanson Bldg., for several months prior to the death of Henry Moan, and at various times stated to me that he loved Mary Moan, the wife of Henry Moan, and would marry her if he could get her.

On or about _____ or about ten days prior to the finding of Henry Moan's body, while on my way home from my place of business at about 12:30 A. M., I met Roy Bunch in front of the Ford Garage in Fairfax, Oklahoma, and he stopped me and we entered into a conversation. Mr. Bunch asked me if I had ever heard Henry Moan make any threats against his (Bunch's) life, and I stated to him that I had not. Mr. Bunch then asked me that in case I have to kill Mr. Moan, would I swear that I had heard Mr. Moan make threats against his (Bunch's) life, and I told him that I would not. Mr. Bunch then stated that Mr. William Hale had told him that he would swear to having heard Moan make threats against his (Bunch's) life, and that he, (Bunch) wanted to get someone else who could swear the same. Mr. Bunch cautioned me to say nothing about having asked me to swear to such a statement.

The morning of the day on which Henry Moan's body was found, Mr. Bunch entered my place of business, apparently in a nervous condition, and handed me a .380 automatic revolver and asked me to keep it for him, saying at the time that he had heard that Henry Moan's body had been found, and that he did not want to be caught with a gun on him. He also stated at that time that there were not many guns in the country like the one which he had just handed me. Previous to that time, I had seen in Mr. Bunch's possession, a pearl handled, nickel-plated revolver, and he told me, Mary Moan had bought it for Henry Moan, but Mary had taken the gun away from Henry and gave it to him.

As planned the State authorities placed Bill Hale and Ernest Burkhart under arrest upon information filed by State Attorney General at Pawhuska and they were ordered confined here reaching here midnight Monday, the day Federal Grand Jury convened to hear Indian cases. Have obtained confession from Ernest Burkhart, Pope, Hale and John Ramsey of the murder of Henry Roan. Ramsey also confessed both furnish positive information as to blowing up Bill Smith's home. Nothing further yet developed on Anna Brown case. Expect to hexuvvu Hale tonight. Federal Grand Jury certain to indict in Roan case and get all facts developed in Smith case to hand to State. Report will follow as soon as work will warrant.



Dear Mr. White:

PERSONAL & CONFIDENTIAL.

We are receiving numerous requests here at Washington for information concerning the Osage Indian murders. A number of the special writers attached to the newspapers have been seeking information upon which to base a series of articles. I have advised the Attorney General's office that I thought it was inadvisable at this particular moment to give out any information concerning this situation in Oklahoma in view of the fact that the cases were pending in court and we might be adversely criticized.

I have stated, however, that upon the conclusion of the cases I could see no objection to the information being furnished to the representatives of the press who desired it. Anticipating, therefore, that this latter recommendation will be followed out, I wish that you would take the necessary steps towards having prepared for me a full and detailed summary of these cases from the beginning up to the present time, emphasizing particularly such portions of it as are of human interest. There is, of course, as you can appreciate, a difference between legal aspects and human interest aspects and what the representatives of the press would have an interest in would be the human interest aspect, so I would like to have you emphasize this angle in having the memorandum prepared.

Kindly expedite this matter so that I may have it at an early date.

In reference to your telegram of January 14th, concerning one Seth Lewis, alias Jackson, now at Miami, Florida, and his probable connection in Osage Indian murder cases, will say that on January 3rd, I received information from Special Agent Harry H. Stroud at Tulsa, Oklahoma, where he had been on assignment in connection with bond frauds, that he understood that Seth Lewis had left for Miami, January 1st; that he had further information from James Graham, who was recently convicted with Seth Lewis and others at Pawhuska for violation of the Harrison Narcotic Act, that Seth Lewis while in jail at Pawhuska, after conviction and before making bond, had expressed considerable concern as to what the Federal Grand Jury might do in connection with its investigation of these murder cases, and stated that if he were indicted, the Government would never see him again - that he would make a getaway.

Graham reports to Mr. Stroud that he overheard a bit of conversation between Seth Lewis and his Attorney, John Tillman, with reference to those murders but could not give any definite statement they had made. Lewis, as you know, was former sheriff of Osage County and John Tillman, his lawyer, located at Pawhuska, has a questionable reputation and it is believed that both of them know something or are probably implicated in some one of the twenty five murders committed in that county. We have not, however, up to this time been able to connect Lewis with any of these murders. The matter of his connection, however, will be kept in mind and if facts are obtained implicating him, I will immediately notify the Jacksonville office.

I am handing that office a copy of this letter with a request that they keep Lewis under as close observance as possible pending further developments in these murder cases.


I will endeavor to obtain a photograph of Lewis and forward to you for your use in keeping him under observation.

DETAILS: On January 4, 1926, at Pawhuska, Oklahoma, the State
Attorney General filed complaint with the District Court of Osage
County, charging A. A. Hale, Ernest Burkhart, Bert Lawson and D. A.
Dloved with the murder of E. S. Smith and family. This complaint was
based on a confession made by Bert Lawson to the Government. Hale and
Burkhart were taken into custody by the Sheriff of Osage County, and
on the same day removed to Guthrie, Okla., on the order of the County
Judge of Osage County.

A confession was obtained from Ernest Burkhardt, in which he implicated W. H. Hale, John Ramsey, and ~~two~~ other persons not being apprehended, and he made a confession in which he corroborated the facts as apprehended. Burkhardt signed a waiver of immunity and his trial was held before Burkhardt. Burkhardt signed a waiver of immunity and his trial was held before the Federal Grand Jury, convening at Guthrie, Okla., and on January 11 the Grand Jury returned Indictments No. 5659 and 5660 against W. H. Hale and John Ramsey, charging them with the murder of Henry Clay Haas.

On January 12, 1926, the U. S. Attorney filed complaint to have the U. S. Commissioner, Fred J. Green, at Guthrie, charging Fred R. Howe, of Fairfax, Okla., with perjury before the Grand Jury. Howe was released on bond of ten thousand dollars, which was furnished by George Oller of Fairfax, Okla., Hale's partner, and Walter Doolin, of Tulsa, Okla.

Copies of all statements and confessions are attached herewith and are a part of this report.

Subsequent developments proved the confession of Burkhardt to have been a fabrication, and on January 19, 1926, the State charges against Hale, Burkhardt, Lawson and Eloyd were dismissed. Hale was immediately taken into custody by the United States Marshal.

On January 12, 1926, the Federal Grand Jury was recessed until February 12, 1926, at which time it will resume consideration of these cases.

13 Statement made by Ernest Burkhart to F. S. Smith and F. B.
14 White.

15 After being warned by Mr. Smith and White that I do not have
16 to make a statement, and any statement I do make can and may be
17 used against me in the trial of the case concerning which such
18 statement is made, and after being so warned, and with no promises
19 having been made me of immunity from prosecution, and of my own
20 free will and accord, I now make the following statement:

21 Some time several weeks before Henry Roan was found murdered,
22 I went with Bill Hale to Henry Grammer's ranch, and while there
23 Bill Hale called my attention to a man who was there working for
24 Grammer, and told me this man's name was John Ramsey, and that he
25 was a man who would stand pat and keep his mouth shut. That on
26 one occasion in the past Henry Grammer was caught with some stolen
27 cattle and that Grammer got Ramsey to say that he, Ramsey, stole
28 the cattle, which cleared Grammer, and that Ramsey served a sen-
29 tence in McAlester Penitentiary for the theft of these cattle.
30 Some time around one year and a half before Roan's death Hale took
31 out a policy on Henry Roan's life for twenty-five thousand dollars.
32 and told me the reason he got this policy was on account of the
33 fact of Henry Roan having family trouble and drinking very hard
34 and he had made one attempt to commit suicide, and he did not figure
35 he would live long. After Hale and I left Grammer's ranch, and
36 after he pointed Ramsey out to me, Hale said he believed he would
37 put Ramsey on Henry Roan's trail, that Ramsey could either give
38 him some poison whisky, or shoot him and lay a gun beside him
39 and everybody would think he committed suicide. A few days later
40 Ramsey came down to Fairfax and I was walking down the street and
41 ran on to Ramsey and Bill Hale talking something about buying a
42 Ford roadster at Ponca City. Ramsey then left, stating he would
43 go to Ponca by way of Pawnee and Perry over Santa Fe and Frisco.
44 After Ramsey left, Hale told me he had given Ramsey the money to
45 buy a Ford Roadster, as Ramsey had no way to get around and kill
46 Roan and get away, that it would be necessary for Ramsey to steer
47 Roan around and keep up with him and get him to a place where he
48 could swap him. In a few days Ramsey returned to Fairfax in a
49 new Ford Roadster, which I understood he bought at Ponca City.
50 I saw Ramsey around town in this car for the next few days. About
51 a week before Henry Roan's body was found, Ramsey walked up to me
52 on the street at Fairfax and inquired for Hale. I told him I did
53 not know where he was. Ramsey then told me to tell Hale the job
54 was all right and not to worry, that it happened out in the Sol
55 Smith pasture. I later saw Hale and told him what Ramsey had said.

Ramsey left Fairfax, going to his home at Ripley. In a few days Ramsey came back to Fairfax, and later went to Grammer's place. Shortly thereafter Henry Roan's body was found dead in his car. A few days later Ramsey came back to Fairfax and stayed a short time and went on to Ripley. Some time after Roan's body was found, possibly a month later, Bill Hale told me he had paid Ramsey the balance he owed Ramsey for killing Roan, which made the job cost him the Ford car and the balance, being a total of one thousand dollars. Some time after Roan was found dead I asked Ramsey how it happened, and Ramsey said he met Roan on the road running from Fairfax to Burbank and got in Roan's car with him, sitting on the back seat, and they drove off and up the hill, he telling Roan they would take a drink, and when they got to the right place out of sight of the road, he shot Roan, and walked back to the top of the hill where he had met Roan and left his car, and drove on in to Fairfax. He told me he shot Roan with a .45 automatic pistol.

14 Statement made by John Ramsey to F. S. Smith and T. B. White:

15 After being warned by Mr. Smith and White that I do not have
16 to make a statement, and that any statement I do make can and may
17 be used against me in the trial of the case concerning which such
18 statement is made, and after being so warned, and without fear of
19 consequences, I now make the following free and voluntary statement:

20 Some time in the early part of 1923, the date I don't recall,
21 Bill Hale came to Henry Grammer's ranch where I was working for
22 Grammer selling whiskey. I was in the bunk house, and Henry Gram-
23 mer called me. I went out and saw him and Hale standing together.
24 I walked over to them, and the three of us walked out several
25 yards to a road and stopped. Henry Grammer turned to me and said
26 that Hale had a little job he wanted done, and asked me if I
27 would do it. I said "it depends on what the job was". Grammer
28 said he wanted an Indian bumped off. I said "that's different".
29 Hale, Grammer and I then talked the matter over for a few minutes.
30 I don't recall just what was said, but I remarked that I would
31 look it over, and I went back to the bunk house. In a few days
32 Grammer told me that Hale was getting anxious to have that job
33 done. As I remember, the next time I saw Hale was in Fairfax, and
34 we had another talk about the Indian he wanted killed, and I told
35 him I would do the job but that I did not have any way to get
36 around. Hale said he would see me in a day or two or in a few
37 days. I again met Hale at Grammer's ranch and Hale told me he
38 was going to buy me a car, and gave me five hundred dollars.
39 Something was said about where I would buy me the car, and I said
40 I would buy it in Ponca City, and something was said about my get-
41 ting over there and Hale said he would drive me over to Pawnee
42 which he did, and I caught the train there and went to Ponca City
43 where I bought a new Ford Roadster from the Ford Garage. Before
44 I received the car I made application and the Ford people secured
45 a license. I drove back to Grammer's ranch. At some stage of the
46 game Hale pointed out to me the Indian that he wanted killed, on
47 the street in Fairfax. I don't remember Hale ever telling me the
48 Indian's name. Several days after Hale pointed this Indian out
49 to me I met this Indian in a restaurant in Fairfax, and he sat down
50 beside me and I smelled whiskey on his breath and we got into con-
51 versation about whiskey and I told him I could sell him some.
52 He said he wanted some and I told him to meet me out on the road
53 running through Sol Smith's pasture about 10 o'clock and I would
54 meet him and have the whiskey for him. I left him and went to
55 Grammer's and got some whiskey and drove back on the road leading
