I am enclosing herewith a photograph of John Ramsey who is one of the parties now under Federal indictment in the Western District of Oklahoma for the murder of an Indian, Henry Roan, in Government restricted territory - Indian country.

I would like for you to take this photograph and make further investigation by having your agent further interview Robert M. B. Rutherford, alias J. R. Melson in the Webrasha State penitentiary at Lincoln, who bears penitentiary number, in that institution, 9051.

When your Agent interviews this man, have him show this photograph of Ramsey and ask whether or not he knows him and if so whether or not he ever saw him at Henry Grammer's place and if so, when and whether or not, if he recalls seeing him there, he ever saw Ramsey talking to Bill Hale or Ernest Burkheart, and when, and as to whether or not he was ever in Fairfax, Okla, and if so whether he ever saw Ramsey in company with Henry Roan - the murdered Indian - and if he ever saw Ramsey driving around in a new Ford car and, if he did, what if anything he knows about Ramsey's statement as to how he came into possession of this car.

The facts in this case are, briefly, that Ramsey shot and killed Henry Roan in the latter part of Jamuary or the first of Yebruary, 1925 and that the plot was laid for this act of Ramsey's at Henry Grammer's place by . W. R. (BILL) HALE & JNO. RAMSEY Murder Osage Indiane.

With reference to the above entitled case, I am enclosing you herewith, a photograph of John Mamsey who is, with Hale, under Federal indictment in the Western District of Oklahoma for the murder on a Government restricted territory, Indian country, of an Indian by the name of Henry Roan.

Ramsey committed this murder, having actually killed Henry Roan, for and at the instance of W. K. Hale, and received for his services in this connection, a Ford Roadster and \$500.00 in cash. Hamsey purchased this Ford Roadster from the Vigton Motor Co., Ponca City, Okla. and the salesman selling the car to him (my information is) was M. Durham who at the present time resides at 2721 Merrimac Avenue, Chicago, Ill. The car in question was purchased Am. 4, 1925 by Ramsey, personally, from Durham. It was a ford Roadster and he paid between 3400 and \$500 for the car.

Would like for you to assign a good Agent to this case and have him interview Mr. Durham, show him this photograph of Ramsey and see whether or not he recalls the transaction. If he does, have him state everything in detail that he knows with reference to the transaction and what he may know about Ramsey. Let me have a report as soon as pessible.

Fith further reference to my letter of January 14th, in the above connection, will say, as stated in this letter, I am enclosing to you a photograph of Seth Levis as well as one of his brother, Damon. The photograph of Seth is not a very good one and I am trying to get another and better one and will forward to you as soon as I receive the same. The photograph of Damon is very good. You may be able to locate Seth by locating Damon as I am sure they will be together.

Demon, your agent perhaps knows, inasmuch as he was at one time Chief of Police at Miami Beach. I understand at the present time, however, that he is not Chief of Police, having been put out. I also understand that Seth made an effort to get to be Chief of Police at Miami Beach when Damon was put out, but he failed, also.

I have been unable yet to connect Lewis directly with any of the murders of the Owage Indians but am diligently working upon the same and the information is coming in daily. Should I ever receive enough information to connect Lewis, I will notify you immediately so that you can arrange to have him in custody when prosecution is instituted.

I will forward you another photograph as soon as I receive the same.

In pursuance to the efforts of the attorneys for the above Subjects, J. I. Howard, Prince Freeling and Hamilton, to compel the Government to produce Eracst Burkhart, they made application through the Indian wife of Ernest Burkhart, Kollie Burkhart, for a writ of habeas corpus to compel Roy St. Lewis, United States Attorney, John Wren and mygelf to produce Ernest Burkhart, alleging that he was being unlawfully held and restrained of his liberty without authority To this writ the respondents replied, denying such was the case, and on February 2nd, 1926, this habeas corpus hearing was had bolore State District Judge Babbook and the application was demied. Her attorneys, thereupon, on February 2, 1926, attempted to put a motion before United States District Judge Cotteral compelling the Government to destroy the alleged confession of John Ramsey and to support their contention, they had numerous witnesses subposnaed, among them Brnest Burkhart. This motion was These attorneys have threatendenied by the Court. ed this Agent with a slander suit with reference to conversation had with Mollie Burkhart in the Bursau office in Oklahoun City, which conversation was brought out during the habeas corpus application.

Information under eath having been filed before this court by Mollie Burkhart, the wife of Ernest Burkhart, that you amu each of you now have in your possession or under your custody and control the lodg of said Ernest Burkhart, and that you are unlawfully holding him as a restraining him of his liberty, and that such restraint is without authority of law, and is not in obedience to any rit or process or under any charge, and graying that a writ of habeas corpus issue cut of this court directed to you and each of you, commanding you at a time and place to be timed by the court, to then and there produce the body of Ernest Burkhart before this court in order that invairy may be made into the cause of his unlawful detention by you and each of you.

Now the court, whom combideration of said petition of Mollie Burkhart, finds that said writ of habeas corpus should issue.

This is therefore to command you, the said T. B. White, Rey S. Legis and John Wren, and each of you, all excuses laid aside, that you do on Tuesday, the 2 day of February, 1920. In the point room of the undersigned District Judge in and for Oklahama County, Oklahama, and at the hour of 9:00 elclock A.M. of said duy, produce the body of Ernest Burkhart before said court, and that you then and there make the turn to this writ showing your action and deings thereand.

RETURN TO WRIT OF HABRAS CORPUS

Now into this Honorable Court comes T. B. White, in obedience to

the Writ of Habeas Corous issued on the 29th day of January, 1926, requiring that respondent to have in Court the body of one Ernest Sandart on the 2nd day of February, 1926, at 9 o'clock.

For a return to the said Writ of Habeas Corpus respondent atates:

First. THAT he has not in his custody or under his control the body of Ernest Burkmart.

Second. THAT said Ernest Burkhart is not unlawfully held by me and not restrained of his liberty by me.

Third. THAT said Ernest Burkhart was never in my custody or under my rectraint, and has not been transferred by me to another.

The application of these attorneys was, supported by an affidavit grade by Ernest Burkh rt's wife, Mollie Burkhart, evidently at the argent request and apagestion of these attorneys; the affidavit having been taken January 23rd, 1806, at which time Mollie Burkhart was in Oklahoma City, having been brought to Orlahoma City Bryan Burkhart, Ernest's brother, and Pitts Battey, her gashding and good friend of Bill Hale, and taken to the Orfice of these attorneys. They also at this time acane to the United States Attorney's office and called upon United States Attorney 15 Toy St. Lewis where they asked for Iraest Burkhart.

Mollie Burkhart also talked to this Agent on this trip, but did not gask about her nusband. Irnest. She was given a little civica by Arent to the effect that wheat Burkhart was being protected at his own resulest and had in good hards land that she need not worry and that she could expect at long as she and her that lots of crooks and Bill Hale's lawyers would be after her and worry her. She pagreed with Agent and appeared to be satisified when she left the outlies.

The application for the habeas corrus to produce Ernest burkhart that is was filed January 20, 1926, and hearing set for February Ind. 1926, was heard upon that date by State District Judge Babooch and quite a lively sussion took place. The rapplicants produced several witnesses, among them Bryan Durchart, and also had this sagent testify. No proof was produced that Ernest burkhart was being restrained of this liberty or that he was in our custody, but on the contrary that he was being protected by us. The attorneys in this application endeavored in every were possible to have Agent disclose the whereabouts of Burkhart, but applicately failed in doing so. The letter quoted on pages 8 and 9 of Agent Smith's report, dated January 20,1926, addressed to Agent and signed by Ernest Burkhart, with other evidences, was given to resert and the result of the hearing the court denied the application.





In 1921 I was married to Kelsie Morrison and living in Fairfax, keeping house. Some time in May, 1921, and about a week or ten dage before Anna Brown was found murdered, and some time around eight or eight-thirty P. M., Kelsie Morrison came into the house and told me to get ready that he was going on a party; that Bryan Burkhart was ont in front in a car with an Indian woman. In a few minutes I went out with Kelsie and found Bryan Burkhart in a Buick car sitting at the front seat, and Anna Brown sitting on the back seat. I could plainly see that Anna Brown was very drunk. Kelsie told me to get in the front seat with Bryan Burkhart, which I did, and Kelsi got in on the back geat with Anna Brown. Bryant Burkhart then Land south to the next corner, turning east a block or two, then south and into the Grayhorse road, going towards Grayhorse. We drove on and down the big hill, at the foot of the hill taking the old Grayhorse road continuing east. We continued on the old Grayhause made. turning on the section line going south past George Elgheria's place, then by the Grayhorse schoolhouse and on thru Grayhorse, crossing the creek at Grayhorse, taking an old road leading east to Bill Hale's ranch house. Bryan stopped his car some distance Than this ranch house, and he and Helsie got out, leaving I and Anna Brown the car, and they went to this ranch, where one of the Burkhart boys, either Duke or Horace, was living. Bill Smith had a ranch just west across the road from Hale's ranch where we stopped the car. Melant Morrison and Bryan Burkhart were gone something like thirty or for mirutes, and returned to the cer, Kelsie getting back in the recr seat with Anna Brown, and Bryan got on the front seat with me. We backed out on the road and drove north and by the Grayhorse demeter going north some distance, then turning west and followed and real on west until we came to a gate or entrance in a fence. Buy and all and into this entrance, going north and on down thru a pasture, where Bryan turned in by the head of a gully and drove on west beside this gully about a hundred yards and stopped the car near a tree, which stands about a hundred feet or more from the gully. Just belove to stopped Bryan and Kelsie got out of the car and helped Anna Brown out of the car. Anna Brown was very drunk, and Bryan took her on the right side and Kelsie on the left and walked her off from the oar, going in the direction of the ravine and towards the board of the ravine. I realized that they were going to do something to Amna Brown, and it 54 scared me very much, and I was afraid to say anything to Kelsie for 55 fear that he would do something to me. When they got to my house, Bryan remained in the car and Helsie went into the house with me. Then we got into the house Kelsie said he was going to town. I started to ask Kelsie some question, and he turned to me and cursed me and tald me to keep my mouth shut. Kelsie then got a suit of clothes and left my house, going out to the car, and told me he was thru with me, that he was going to quit. He and Bryan Burkhart doors off north. I heard the car turn and go back towards town. following day about 3:30 or 4:00 o'clock in the afternoon Malitie came back to the house. I had a Buick car and Kelsie had soll it. and I asked himsabout the money he got for it. He said ha \$100. for it but later on I found out that he got \$450.00 for it. Helsie showed me a paper that said he had \$2700. in the bank, and left me under the impression that it was a deposit clip. I think or this deposit was in the Fairfax National Bank, for helple free al his banking there. Kelsie said that his mother gave him the \$2700. His mother had been visiting us about three weeks before this time, and I knew Kelsie was not telling me the truth when he said his mother gave him this modey, because she would have said something to me about it if she had. When Kelsie came to the house he had the same suit on that he wore the night we were out with Anna Brown and Bryan Burkhart. The buttons on his shirt were torn off. believe that Helsie files suit against me for divorce at Isrim. De the same day he came to the house. He came to the house with his brother in a second hand Hudson speedstor. I asked him where he got this car and he told me he bought it. I later found out that he bought this Hudson from my uncle, Dick Rusk, at Heminy, Olika. While at the house Kelsie seemed to be very nervous, and can a second contact. and said he would stomp me to death if I didn't keep my mouth almu. Kelsie asked me to go with him and his brother for a ride in his Hudson. We went out west of Fairfam about two miles. Where there were a bunch of men, whom I think were shooting dice. We want there about thirty or forty minutes. Then we drove back to Fairfax, and I got out of the car and walked up to my mother's house.

When Anna Brown's body was found, about a week or ten down at an We were riding with her in Bryan Burkhart's car, it was reported and Fairfax that they had found a dead Indian woman, but they didn't know whether it was an Osage or a Kaw. As everyone was going out to the place where the body was found. I hired a taxi and Margare's walters and I want out to the place. When we got there the body was already in the hor and I did not be the body. was already in the box and I did not get to see it, but when I noticed that the body was found at the same place where Kelsie and Bryan Burkhart assisted Anna Brown out of the car the night we areve

out the Grayhorse road, then I knew it was Anna Brown's body they 1. I never mentioned to anyone that it was Anna Brown, or this we had been out riding with her. Kelsie Horrison had threatened de several times if I did not keep my mouth shut and I was afraid to say anything about it.

On the night of January 29, 1926, I went with Mr. Smith, Mr. Parker and Mr. Tom Hubbard to my house in Fairfax and we started from there going over the same route that we traveled when Bryan Burkhart, Kelsie Morrison, Anna Brown and I went riding the night that I-last saw Anna Brown alive, when she was assisted out of the car by Bryan and Kelsie close to the ravine where her body was found. I would have told about this, but I did not have any confidence in the officers of Osage County, and I knew that if I told them, that Kelsie Morrison would soon learn about it and would either kill me or have someone else kill me.

I have read the above statement, and the same is true and correct.

.Verbal statement of Katherine Cole, Maie January 31:

"About eight or eight-thirty o'clock, on the night Amas Brown rss killed. Kelsie Morrison came to my house in Fairfam and told me to get my clothes, that we were going on a party. I asked him who was going, and he said that they had a squar out there for Bryan Burkhart, and that they, Relsie and I wore going. When we get out to the car in front of the house, Bryan Bur mert and inna Brown were sitting in it. I got on the front seat with Bryan, and Melon. Morrison got in the back seat with Anna. We drove to a place on what I think is the old Grayhorse rosa, and stopped under a tree near a ravine. There was another car standing near where we stopped, but it had the curtains up, and I don't know who was in it. When the car stopped Kelsie walked around to the left side of the car, and Bryan got out on the left side. They went of the left back door and Kelsie reached in and caught Anna by the arm. They both reached in and helped her out of the car, Bryan being on the right side and Kalsie on the left side. They walked her away from the car, going toward the ravine. I looked out and back from the right side of the car and cleared my throat as to speak, and Helsie looked back at mo and said "you G. D. S. B., keep your mouth thut, keep quiet". They then walked on with Anna Brown, and I did not again look out of the car. I stayed in the car alone about twenty-five or thirty minutes.

Statement made by Dewey Selph to Frank S. Smith in the presence of E. H. Parker, J. V. Murphy and Ed Robertson.

After being warned by Mr. Smith that I do not have to make a statement, and any statement that I make can and may be used against me in the prosecution of the case concerning which such statement is made, and with no promises having been made me of immunity from prosecution: I now make the following free and voluntary statement.

My name is Dewey Selph. I was living with my wife at Pawhusha during May, 1925. I had just got back from Colorado. Kelsie Morrison, who was in the Pawhuska County Jail, sent word to me to come to the Jail and see him. I went to the jail and saw Heldie. Helsie asked me if I would do him a favor. I told him I would. He said that he felt that I was the only one he could trust to do it. Helsie said that he wanted to make some arrangement to get shut (shed) of Hatherine, his wife, because she knew too much about the Amna Brown murder deal. Kelsie said that he would give me a note to Bill Hale and that Hele would fix the arrangements for getting shut of Katherine. Kelsie did not offer me any money to help his get shut of Katherine, but said that Bill Hale would foot the bill, whatever it was. Kelsie gave me the note to Bill Hale, which said that I was a friend of his. Kelsie's, and that Hale could trust me to the full extent. I did not take this note to Hale the same day Helsie Morrison gave it to me, but it was a few days later that I went to Fairlax and found Bill Hale in a pool hall, where I gave him the note. As I remember, I believe it was the latter part of Major first day or so in June, 1925, that I gave Hale the note. When Hale read the note Kelsie Morrison sent him, he asked me if I wanted to help do the job. and I told him yes. Bill Hale told me to go on back to Pawhuska, and that he, Hale, would send a fellow to see me about the plans.

Two or three days later, when I was not at home in Pawhusha, a fellow wame to my house in Pawhuska and left a note for me to call him when I came home. He left me an address to call, a hotel, which I do not remember now, in Tonkawa, Okla. This fellow gave the name of-Little Skeet. When I came home I called the address he left, but 54 could not get him. I called again the next day and got him, and she told me he would be over in Pawhuska to see me. I told him I would either be at the Pappan Hotel or American Cafe. He came over that same day. I ket him at the American Cafe. We commended to lay our plans where we would take Katherine Morrison. we decided that I

58 59 was to take Katherine out on a drinking party with some others and re out on Dial Hill, just back of Pawhuska; that Little Skeet was no be blose by the Dial Hill in another car, and when I got out on the hill, if I had Katherine with me, I was to blow my horn, pretending that it was accidentally blown. If I did not have Katherine with most I was to flash my spot light up and down; that if I blew my norm to let Little Skeet know I had Katherine with me, then Little Skeet was to drive up to where our party was parked and hijack our party and shoot Katherine, and the rest of our party would not think that it was planned to kill her.

Little Skeet stayed in Pawhuska. During the latter part of June. 1925, just a few days before the 4th of July, I told Little Skeet that I would make up a party that night and try to get Katherine Magrison to go along. He said he would be out near Dial Hill and if I got her to go along, when I got out on the hill for me to give the Signal Labert

That night I was riding around with a bey from Joplin, Missouri, whose name I have forgotten. This boy borrowed George Brunt's car. We drove down to where Marie Benson was living and I got her to go along with us. We then drove to the White House Pool Hall, Where Luther Provence worked, and as soon as he got off work we picked him up in our car, then drove down to the Markle Hotel, Where Buther got Katherine Morrison and a ukelele. We then drove out on 17th or 18th street and got a gallon of "choo" beer. Katherine Morrison had a gallon of "choc" hid somewhere, and we got that too. We then arove out on Dial Hill, I doing the driving then. As soon as we got out on the hill I pulled off the road and stopped. I was afraid to go through with the plans, and instead of blowing my hour to let Little Skeet know I had Katherine in our party, I classed my spot light to let him know that I did not have her. Little Shoot, who was parked a little below us at the foot of the hill, then drove off. drank that "choc" we had, then drove down in Pawhush: and got some "jake" (jamaica ginger). We drank this and then drove around town a while. We took Luther home, then took Maric home. Matherine would not get out at her hotel, so we drove down to the Model Rooms and got a room for her and out her to bed. She was pretty drunk then. After I put Katherine to bed, I went on down to the Pan-American Cafe, where I met Little Skeet. Little Skeet asked me what was the matter I could not get Katherine Morrison to go on the party with me. I told Little Skeet that Katherine was off schewhere drunk and I could not find her. Little Skeet than said that he did not care, that he was kind of proud of it, that he had half the money and he would just keep it anyway. He asked so if I wanted part of the \$500. Hale had given him; the half of which was to 30 to me, and I told him *I did not want it. I was afraid of getting in a jam if I took any of the money. Little Skeet left for Tonkawa end told me he was going to leave Tonkawa, but did not tell me just where he was going.

When I took the note to Bill Hale that Kelsie Morrison gave m, enhanter I told Hale that I would help put Matherine out of the way. Hall told me he would pay me \$500. for my part of it; that he would pay half of it before the job was done and he would send a guy to me with the money, and when we done the deal he would pay us the other \$500.00.

About the 12th or 13th of Bovember, 1925, Frank Kramer, Bessie Rusk, Grace Roan Matteson and I drove in Grace's Buick car from Pawhusha tonRalston, and got in Ralston about ten or eleven o'clock that night. We drove to the Jones Hotel and I let Frank and the girls out and they took the baggage to the rooms. I took the car to the garage across from the Jones Hotel to get the extra tire limid. The reason we drove to Ralston was because Bill Hale called the aver the telephone and told me he wanted to see me. I got the call, and talked to Bill Hale from the Pan*American Cafe, but Hale called me at the Pappan Hotel. When Hale talked to me over the telephone he said he would most me at Ralston at one of the filling stations. There are only two filling stations in Ralston. When I went to the garage and filling station to get the extra tire fixed Bill Hale was not there, so I waited a while. Finally Hale came and he asked me why we came to do him as we done. I told Hale I never did see that other guy that he was to send to me; that the guy did not come over to Pawhuska. Bill Hele then told me that he thought it would be a good idea for me to leave that part of the country for a while. I told him all right if he thought so. Hale asked mo if I was broke, and I told him I was. Hale then gave me \$100. and told me to take that as that was all he had with him. Hale then asked me if I was going to stay in Relaton that night, and I told him no, that I was going to leave right out. Hale told me to be sure and leave the country. did not leave that night, but left the next morning, with the two girls and Frank Kramer. We went from Ralston, Okla., to Arman as City, Kan., then Wichita, Kan., then to Pueblo, Colo., then on down to El Paso, Texas. I stayed in El Paso two weeks or so, and left the Paso with Charlie Choteau for Colorado Springs, where Charlie Lived. I stayed with Charlie in Colorado Springs two or three days, then left for Pawhuska, stopping on my way at La Junta and Los Animas, Colo. When I got to Syracuse, Kansas, the police picked me up there where I stayed in Jail until the Department of Justice brought me to Guthrie. Oklahoma.

I have read the above statement, and the same is correct and true.

I received your telegram of the 9th instant, in which you arge that I be in Suthrie on February 12th, the date set for the resultsiesies of the Congo Indian Murder cases. I think you know how deeply interested I have been in these cases and if it had been possible for me to have been in Suthrie on the 12th I would certainly have done so. However, we have just been completely swamped at Washington, with hearings before the Appropriations Committee and before other Committees of Congress which have started to investigate various cases in the Department of Justice. Consequently, I have been compelled to sit close to the scene of hostilities. I have, however, closely fellowed every report that has some in in connection with the Congo Marder cases and talked with Assistant Attorney General Lubring just before he left for Oxlahome.

I do hope that when the trial of these cases comes up that conditions at Washington will enable me to get away for a few days and to be at Gathrie when they are tried as I want to get first hand information and also want to personally convey to each of the men who have been devoting so much of their time and energy to these cases my official and personal appreciation of their loyalty to the service.


