PERSONAL AND CONFIDENTIAL

Dear Sir:

In re: Osage Ingian hurder Cases.

With reference to the above matter, will state that I have been at Pawhuska, Oklahoma, almost continuously since May 23rd as a witness and to assist in the trial of Ernest Burkhart, who is being tried there in the State Courts for his part in the murder of W. E. Smith, his wife and servant girl. Burkhart was only charged with the murder of W. E. Smith.

The Attorneys for Hale - S. P. Freeling, J. I. Howard, J. H. Springer and W. S. Hamilton - resorted to every conceivable means of deceit and unfounded malicious charges against all of the Agents to bring about the acquittal of Ernest Eurkhart. Their object in doing so of course was to thereby defeat justice in the Hale case, for they well knew that if Burkhart was convicted, that he would probably testify against Hale in not only the W. E. Smith case but the case involving the killing of Henry Roan.

In their efforts to succeed in this scheme to bring about the acquittal of Burkhart, they endeavored to exclude from the Jury the statement which was taken from Burkhart by Special agent Frank Smith and myself, also to exclude the testimony given by Burkhart before the Federal Grand Jury at Guthrie and the statements made to Agents John K. Wren and J. A. Street while these Agents were with Burkhart in New Mexico, El Paso and San Antonio, as well as the statement made to Mr. John Leahy, Special Prosecutor of Hale, Hanney and Burkhart, Assistant County Attorney Jeffries and myself at Arkansas City, Kansas, just before the Preliminary Hearing of Hale OF HALSTON, and Ramsey, held March 12th.

PER DIVISION

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Various witnesses were used to submit their evidence as to the exclusion of these statements. Among these witnesses were all of the Agents, including myself, Er. Leahy and Ar. Jeffries. To support the defense's side, they used Burkhart as a witness, as well as Bill Hale and John Namsey, all of whom testified to a very ridiculous story that we had punished them to secure the statements, Brill Hale claiming that we had put a black cap over his head and placed him in a chair charged with electricity, threatened him with death and otherwise abused him, in order to get a statement, all of which he resisted and refuse to do. Ramsey and Burkhart had similar stories of lesser degree.

The Court excluded the statement made by Burkhart to Special Agent Smith and me but submitted the evidence given by Burkhart to the Federal Grand Jury at Guthrie in January and also the statement made to Lr. Leahy, Assistant County Prosecutor Jeffries and myself at Arkensas City. The Court remarked that in excluding the statement made to Special Agent Smith and myself, it did not take into consideration the story told by Hale, kamsey and Burkhart as to the punishment used by us, etc., as these stories seemed to be very unreasonable, but that the statement there made was not considered voluntary as the man was under arrest changed with first degree murder and had been taken from Fawhuska, Okla., where he was arrested, to Guthrie, Okla., arriving there at midnight and there told that the Federal Grand Jury was in session hearing the murder case against him and others - that the Court considered, under these circumstances - the statement made by Eurkhart at that time was not voluntary but that the other statements, made before the Federal Grand Jury and in Arhansas Clty. The voluntary statements and they would be submitted to the Jury. There's a the Jury was recalled and evidence submitted.

The state proved a conspiracy between Hale, Remsey and Burkhart to bring about the murder of these Indians who were related to Burkhart's wife and thereby allowing the fortune to come to Folly Burkhart (Ernest Burkhart's wife) and Bill Hale, Ramsey and Burkhart secure the same, and the State thereby submitted all the evidence with reference to the murder of Anna Brown, J. E. Smith, his wife and servant girl, but did not bring in any evidence with reference to the Roan case.

During the entire progress of this trial, innert surkhart seemed to be very restless and nervous. The Deputy Sheriffs who had charge over him

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stated that he was unable to sleep. On Tuesday, the 8th, Burkmart slipped a note out of the Jail by one of the Deputy Sheriffs to Mr. Leahy, but had a great deal of trouble communicating with Lr. Leahy, due to the fact that Bill Hale's attorneys had segured a Court Order preventing anyone from seeing Burkhart, except his Attorneys, his wife and relatives. The note requested hr. Leahy to come to the Jail the night of the 8th, that he would like to see him. Ar. Istay appeared at the Jail and Burkhart promptly told him that he was tirca and disgusted with endeavoring to go through with the lies that were being sworn to and that he had been prompted to swear to and that he wanted to tell the truth, go before the Court, plead guilty to the charge and take his medicine. Mr. Leahy promptly informed him that he was prosecuting him and would be unable to advise him in any way and further talk with him about the matter; that he had better get himself an Attorney and confer with him for going before the Court to plead to first degree murder would be hard to do and a very serious matter. Burkhart told him he would like to go through with it anyway and promptly informed hr. Leahy that he would like for him to send for \*Clint Moss, a very reputable and good attorney at Tulsa. Mr. Moss was communicated with and came to Pawhuska on June 9th. After conference with his Attorney and State's Attorneys, Burkhart came into open Court, announced to the Court that he wanted to discharge his Attorneys, Freeling, Howard, Hamilton and Springer, employ Clint Moss and to enter a plea of guilt to the charge he was being tried upon.

Defore accepting the plea of guilt, the Court asked him a number of questions as to whether or not be understood what he was pleading guilty to and if it was of his own free will and accord without any promises whatsoever and whether or not the Agents of the Department of Justice had used any force in order to obtain a statement from him. Burkhart told the Court that we had not; that all we did to him was to talk to him and keep him up all pight; that he had received the kindest treatment from us. After a few more questions, the Court accepted Burkhart's plea of guilt and deferred sentence until June 21st.

At the time Burkhart plead guilty, I was in Oklahema City having returned to the office after testifying, in order to lock after other matters coming up in the Oklahema City territory, expecting, however, to return to Pawhuska to testify in the rebuttal. Upon receiving the infor-

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as to Burkhart's plea of guilt, I immediately wired you and proceeded to Pawhuska, there to get the details as to how burkhart came to swear to the story he did, his change of heart, etc. I had been informed before leaving Oklahoma City (at the time I was told about Burkhart's plea) that he had been persuaded by Bill Hale and his attorneys to change his statement and swear to the stories which he did, etc. Upon my arrival at Fawhuska, I was immediately told that Burkhart wanted to see me, and so I had him prought to the County Attorney's office. Upon first appearance, he was very much disturbed and, with tears in his eyes, told me that he had lied and that he was now going to tell the-truth; that he had considered that was always the best course out of anything and that he would not only tell the truth in the Smith case but would tell what he had told us in the Roar case and would testify to any Court in the United States to that effect. He did not materially change the statement he had already made us in these cases but re-affirmed their truth and told me he wanted to testify to it.

He stated that he was influenced to change from his truthful statements to the lies which he testified to in the Learing of his case and in the Preliminary of rale and Ramsey in Earch by Hale's friends and his attorneys. He states that when he got upon the stand at the Hale-Ramsey rrelimimary Hearing in Larch, where he was placed by the State to testify, that he fully intended to tell the truth, but when Attorney Hamilton made such an objection to his testimony and requested the Court's permission, and secured same, to confer with him, that Hamilton took him into the Judge's charlers and told him if he tectified for the State he would implicate himself. Burkhart states that Hamilton did not ask him what he was going to teching to but stated that if he testified he would implicate himself, also that the magistrate before whom he was testifying could not offer him immunity; that Hamilton thereupon called in Attorney Howard, making the statement to Burkhart that Howard was a better attorney than he (Hamilton) and that Howard would rend the law to him. Burkhart claims that Howard thereupon secured a law book and read the law to him to the effect - so Burkhart stated - that the County Judge before whom he was being tried could not offer him immunity and they both advised him that he was only getting himself in serious trouble by testifying for the State. After quite an argument, they secured arnest Burkhart's promise that he would delay his testimony until next morning, and they all returned to the Courtroom when Attorney Freeling sunbunced to the Court that he would like an adjournment until tomorrow, it being then about 5:00 b'clock, and this move was granted. Burkhart stated that at that time (after he had talked with Howard and Hamilton) his intentions were swill good, but that that night Lou Oller, one of Bill Hale's close, personal friends,

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also partner in the cattle business and former associate in many cattle steals of Bill Hale's, took him (Burkhart) in an automobile from Pawhuska to Fairfax and went to Bill Hale's home. He claimed that that night, before Lou Oller and about twenty of Bill Hale's friends, including Mrs. Hale and her daughter, Willie, he was talked to almost all night and plead with to not allow the Agents of the Government and the Attorneys for the State to persuade him into testifying; to listen to Attorney Hamilton and take his advice. The Attorneys told Burkhart before he left for Fairfax that they would not come down; that they thought it best for them not to be with him in Fairfax, and that Bill Hale's friends would take care of 1 ha. Burkhart states these people talked to him almost all night, returning the next morning to Pawhuska. Upon their return, Attorney Freeling talked to him and then Attorney Hamilton came in. That he (Hamilton) did not ask him what he had told us but told him that Bill Hale had told them that the Government Agents had put a black cap over his head and had set him down in an electric chair, threatened him with death and otherwise abused him, and if they had so treated him (Burkhart) that he should get up and tell it in Court. In this manner, they went over a great many things that Hale had told them, and then would say to Burkhart, so he states, that if this same thing occurred to him, he should so state and if what we had testified to as to the statements, etc. which he had made was not true, that he should deny everything. Attorney Springer came in after being coached by Freeling and Hamilton for quite a time and told Burkhart that he should make it as strong as possible. He states that he then got on the stand for the Defense and denied all his former statements and told the lies about the abuse he had received which prompted his giving said statements.

Burkhart states that during one of the conferences he had with http://
ey Freeling, Springer and Gross (the latter, a partner of Hamilton) what if
was advised by these atterneys that he should bring a suit immediately against
the Government Agents for kidnaping him and taking him against his will to
New Mexico and Texas; that they knew, of course, that they could not recover
any money from such a suit as we are only employed and paid salaries by the
Government and had nothing, but that the suit would bring about an influence
on public opinion which would be in their favor and against the Government
Agents. Freeling and Gross - after Burkhart vola them, "Well, it was all
right if they saw fit" - stated they would draw up the papers for the suit.
Burkhart claims that that was the last he ever heard of such suit, that he
signed no papers and had no further talk with them about the same.

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After receiving this information from Burkhart, I immediately took the matter up with County Attorney C. K. Templeton of Pawhuska, and after going over the matter of Burkhart's statement with reference to his testimony, etc., Mr. Templeton advised me that, as soon as Osage County secured some funds, he would call a Grand Jury and investigate the Attorneys' part as well as Bill Hale's friends' part with reference to having Burkhart testify falsely. Osage County at this time is complotely without funds but will have funds available at the beginning of the next fiscal year, July 1st, and we expect a State Grand Pary to be called shortly thereafter to not only hear evidence in the case of having Burkhart swear falsely, but to hear a case against Attorney J. M. Springer for having framed other witnesses to testify falsely. Attorney Springer had two witnesses at Tulsa, whom he had framed through a couple of City Detectives there, to come into Court at the Burkhart trial and swear to some statements that they were supposed to have heard Bill Smith make, while they (Bill Smith and others) were at Henry Grammer's ranch, about being away with Smith's wife. This case, in all probability, did not reach the stage where Attorney Springer can be handled criminally ; liable but hr. John Leahy tells me that he is going to take these facts · before the Oklahoma State Bar Association and have them hear evidence in reference to distarring Springer.

I am having Agent Frank Smith prepare a detailed report for you in this connection, including the whole affair in detail, and I will submit the same to you in the near future. In the meantime, I am giving you this letter for your information as to the occurrences in connection with these cases.

The result of what hearings we have already had in State Courts has been very gratifying indeed. The State authorities, from the Attorney Ceneral on down, have rendered all the help they possibly could. The County Attorney and the Sheriff at Pawhuska are certainly to be commanded for the good work they did in these trials. They afforded us all the assistance they possibly could. I believe, however, that the one man who is more responsible than any other for putting over the success of the prosecution in the State Courts at Pawhuska, Is all Sohn Leahy. Lr. Leahy is one of the best attorneys in the State of Okhaholm and had a wide reputation not only as an attorney, but as a splendid character. He has the confidence and respect of the people in Osage County.

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Public opinion in this state is entirely with the prosecution of Hale, Ramsey and this gang of murderers, and now is the time for us to try the Henry Roan case in Federal Court. Arrangements, I believe, are being brought about by United States Attorney Roy St. Lewis and Special Assistant to the Attorney weneral Miwin Brown to bring about prosecution in the moan case of Bill Hale and John Ramsey. Everyone consents to this prosecution in Federal Court, except District Judge Jesse Whorton of Pawhuska, who tried Burkhart. He claims. I believe, that he thinks the matter of the cases should be tried in Osage County, inasmuch as Osage County has received nation-wide publicity in reference to the crimes committed there by Hale and his gang and that he wants to show the nation that these murderers can get a fair and impartial trial in Osage County. This County, at the present time, is without funds to have another trial and will be until after July 1st. The next term of Court at that place is scheduled to take place September, 1926. Judge Whorton claims that he does not feel it would be right to call a special term during the summer months and keep the Jury together for two or three weeks during the uncomfortable summer days and thereby places it over until the September term when he fixed Hale's case for trial.

Everyone concedes that the general public in Osage County even the Judge, himself, admits this - wants to see the Federal Court get a chance to try Hale and Ramsey in the Roan case; first, as it will be a great cost to the County and a long, drawn-out trial to be had in State Courts and will evidently end up in a mis-trial which will add additional costs for another; then, should a mis-trial take place, they think that Hale and hamsey will appear for bond and probably secure same.

I will keep you advised at all times as to the progress of these cases. By time has been so taken up during the progress of the Burkhart trial that I have had little time to write you a summary report in this matter and then matters were changing to such an extent that it was impossible to give you any definite information.

Trial progressed until June 9, 1926, at which time Defendant Ernest Burkhart announced in open court he had discharged his attorneys and employed Attorney Flint Moss, and withdrew his plea of not guilty and entered plea of Guilty to murder of W. E. Smith. Burkhart told Court his testimony on witness stand reference to duress by Federal Agents to obtdin confessions, was false and no duress was used and his confessions were voluntary. On June 21st, defendant Ernest Burkhart sentenced to life imprisonment in Oklahoma State Penitentiary. In case of Anna Brown murder, Defendant Byron Burkhart, on habeas corpus proceedings, obtained bond of \$25,000., which was made and defendant CONTINUED. Agents Notes. released. 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(deceased) and Henry Grammer (deceased) with the murder of U. E. Smith, was granted severance and his trial was set for May 24, 1926, at Pambuska, (kla., in the State Court of Osage County. Trial of Ernest Burkmart commenced on May 24. 1926. A Panel of 60 veniremen were drawn.

Based on information obtained by Special Agents of this Bureau of Hale's influences to bribe this panel of 60 veniremen, on presentation of these facts by the prosecution, the Court immediately discharged this first panel and ordered a new panel of 100 veniremen drawn, from which a jury was obtained to try Ernest Burkhart.

The trial progressed until June 9th at 10 A.M., at which time Defendent Ernest Burkhart appeared and stated in open Court that he wished to discharge counsel representing him, consisting of Hamilton, Springer, Howard, Freeling, et al, and advised the Court that henceforth he would be recresented by Attorney Flint Moss; that he wished to withdraw his plea of not guilty 2 3: to the murder of W. E. Smith and in lieu thereof enter a plea of guilt, . Before accepting his plea of Guilty, Judge Worton questioned Burkhart Lith reference to the truthfulness of his previous statements made from the witness stand to the effect that Government Agents Waite and Smith had used force [ B f ] and duress in obtaining confessions from him. Burkhart stated that all previous statements made by him on the witness stand were false and untrue and that the only duress used by Agents White and Smith was the fact that they kept him up long hours at night and questioned him. Burkhart further advised the Court that he had not been promised immunity from prosecution for his participation in the murder of W. E. Smith, Henry Roan, et al, and that all his confessions regarding same were made voluntarily. The Court then announced that Defeniant Burkhart's plea of Guilty of the murder of W. E. Smith was accepted, and that he would impose sentence on June 21, -1926. The Court proceedings in the trial of Ernest Burkhart were halted.

#### TESTIMONY OF ERMEST BURKHART, W. K. HALE, AND KELSIE MORRISON GIVEN IN THE TRIAL OF THE STATE OF OKLAHOMA VS ERNEST BURKWART.

During the trial of Defendant Ernest Burkhart, be testified on the witness stand that Special Agent in Charge Thite and Special Agent Smith forced from him confessions with reference to the murder of W. E. Smith and family and Henry Roan, and used force and duress, keeping him up at late hours, applying electricity in the form of an electric prod pole, placing revolvers against his body and other manners of cruelty; that statements were not read by him, but written by Agents and presented to him and he forced to sign them.

(Ill of the above, Defendant Ernest Burkhart later stated were false and untrue)

During the trial of Defendant Ernest Burkhart, W. K. Hele testified as a witness in a dramatical manner that Special Agent in Charge Waite and Special Agent Smith used force and duress by placing him in an electric chair with a black cap over his head, with revolvers at his ribs, with

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threat that if he did not sign confessions he would be murdered, stating to him that they had previously electrocuted pals of his in the electric coair hey pointed out to him, and that they sniffed the air and waked him it he could smell burning flesh, and used all manners of threats and duress to get him to sign a confession, which he would not do. He stated that hey charged him with the murders of twenty-seven, numerating many of them, of which he had never heard, and further charging him with a conspiracy with prominent business men of Osage County in the handling of "hot" bonds, etc.; that he stoutly denied his guilt at all times.

Kelsie Morrison, charged jointly with Byron Burkhart for the murder of Anna Brown, testified in the trial of the State of Oklahoma vs Ernest Burkhart that he shot Anna Brown in the head while Byron Burkhart held her the the gun which he used was furnished him by W. K. Hale, and she was killed at the instigation of Hale.

The Court forced the State, in the absence of the Jury, to primite proof that allegations made by defendant Ernest Burkhart and Hale's Automeys, to the fact that duress and coercion had been used in the obtaining of confessions regarding the murders of W. E. Smith, Henry Roan et al, and this proceeding consumed five days before the Jury was permitted to hear the direct evidence.

The Court, after accepting Ernest Burkhart's plea of Guilty for the murder of W. E. Smith, set the cases of the State of Cklahoma vs W. E. Hale and John Ramsey for the murder of W. E. Smith for trial on Sept. 20, 1926, in the District Court of Osage County at Pawhuska, Cklahoma.

ATTEMPTED BRIBERY OF WITHESSES IN THE TRIAL OF THE STATE OF OKLAHOMA VS. ERIEST BURKHART FOR THE MUPDER OF W. E. SMITH.

#### AT TULSA, OKLAHOMA:

The following statement was obtained from Mrs. John Mayo, wife of John Mayo, an immate of the Lansing Kansas Ponitentiary and a material State and Government witness in the Osage Indian murder cases.

"June 13, 1926. Tulsa. My name is Mrs. June Mayo, the wife of John Mayo. I work at the Mayo Hotel Coffee Shop as waitress.

About the 28th or 29th of April, 1925, near 8 A.M. two men came in the Coffee Shop and sit down. The small man with a mustache asked me if I was John Mayo's widow. I told him that I was John Mayo's wife. He then began asking me when I got off duty and when I was not busy, as he wanted to talk to me. I told him I got off late in the afternoon, but if he came back about ten thirty in the morning I would not be so busy. I did not at that time know who either of the men wers. I asked the small man who they were and he told me they

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represented Hale & Ramsey, and the tall man with him was Mr. Springer, and his name was Weaver. The tall man, Mr. Springer, said to Weaver not to talk to me there at the Coffee Shop, but make a date with me and talk somewhere else. They both left. About 10 O'clock that same morning the small man, who said his name was Weaver, came back. He started talking to me saying he represented Hale & Ramsey and talked as though I knew all about the case, but I told him I knew very little about it and didn't want to know any more about it. He then said "you know you don't want to see those people go to the penitentiary, you are not that hard hearted." I told him it was immaterial to me what happened to them; that I was not mixed up in the affair and was not going to get mixed up in it, if I could keep from it. He asked me a few other questions, and said that I was their last chance to help save Ramsey and Hale, and he believed I could help. I asked him how he figured I could help them. He said that John Mayo made a statement in the preliminary trial about a lot of things, some of which were not true, and we believe you could talk to John and get him to change his testimony. I tola him to go talk to John, and he (Weaver) said he couldn't afford to and wouldn't be allowed to. I told him that if he couldn't go, why didn't he send some of his friends. He said for the simple resson that I would have more bearing on John and John would understand me better than anyone else. I commenced to get mad and told him to go on and leave me alone as his conversation did not interest me in the least. He than wanted to meet me somewhere or take me out in a car and talk to me, saying he would treat me just like he would his sister or mother. I told him I did not want to talk to him and could do nothing for him, but he said I could after I talked to John and for me to see John. I told him I was going to see John and tell John about him being here talking to me, and Weaver said he wanted me to tell John and that he was to see me and what his business was, and that he, Weaver, would be back Honday to see me. I told him not to come to see me anymore as I did not want to talk to him again. He said I would want to talk to him after I came back from seeing John, as I would understand better, and that he hoped he had not offended me. He then left.

At the time I told him I did not know anything about the case, and flad all I could do trying to work and make a living and pay doctor bills, he (Weaver) said you need not worry about expenses or doctor bills of any kind, for we will fix them up if necessary.

The following Saturday May 1st, I went to Pawhuska and told John about those two men. I returned to Tulsa Saturday night. John got word to Kr. Smith and Mr. Kurphy and they

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came to Tulsa to see me and prepared to catch Mr. Weaver and Mr. Springer if they came back to see me. Mr. Weaver nor Mr. Springer never came back to see me.

(signed) Mrs. John Mayo."

Statement obtained from W. P. McSparren, Mid West Hotel, Tulsa, Oklahoma.

"On or about May 18, 1926, Bob Ryan told me we could make \$150.00 or \$200.00, but never gave me any details as to how, but told me we would both find out in a day or so.

On the 20th of May, we met at Ryan's hotel where I met Mr. Elliott, who told us how and what we were to do. Said all we had to do was sign an affidavit that I was at Henry Grammer's ranch house about 16 miles east of Ponca City the last part of Jan. 1923 with some friends of mine. That we dreve into the yard and parked. When another car drove up, there was a man and a woman in this car, who was Bill Smith and Laura Tuttle. They were drinking and arguing with one another. The woman said I see you havn't got rid of that squaw of yours yet. And if you dont and give me the money you promised me, I will blow you both to hell.

Well on Friday May 21, 1926, Elliott called Ryan's httel. I was there and told us to meet him in front of the Bliss Building on third & Main. We met him in front of the Bliss building and he told us not to tell anyone where we was staying that he would take care of that, so we went on up to Mr. Springer's office. As we went into the office Elliott said Mr. Springer these are the boys. We were told to sit down and Springer asked us what we knew, so I told him the same story as had been told to me by Elliott. Springer said very good only for a few things they might ask you. So he gave us the descriptions of Bill Smith, Laura Tuttle and Henry Grammer, telling us that Henry Grammer was dead, Laura Tuttle was gone no one knew where. He told us it would be about ten days or two weeks before he could use us, and thm asked where we were staying, and Mr. Elliott said I know and can find them anytime. So Springer said he would see us in Pawhuska in a week or-so.

(signed) W. P. McSparren."

Statement obtained from Robert Ryan, Hotel Glenn, Juls , Cklahonm.

"About three weeks ago I was approached by Mr. Elliott and was asked if I wanted to make some money and I asked him how and he said by signing an affidavit that I heard a certain conversation in January 1923 at Henry Grammer's ranch. I

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asked him how much and what I had to say. I was to get \$150.00 and was to say that I was at henry Grammer's runch the last part of January 1923 and was sitting in a car when Bill Smith whom I was supposed to know was arguing with some woman named Laura Tuttle .. She was supposed to say to him that if he didnt get rid of his squaw, treat her square, that the money wouldn't do him any good for she would blow them to hell. I wrote this down and gave it to Bill McSparren. Mr. Elliott was to let me know when to meet him so he could take us to meet Mr. Springer. So few days later Friday, May 21st he called me at my hotel to meet him in front of the Bliss Bldg. McSparren & myself met him and was taken and introduced to Judge Springer. Springer asked us what we knew about this and McSparren repeated what we were to say and he asked me what I was going to say and I said the same as McSparren so he gave us the description of Smith and Grammer and Laura Tuttle and we were ready to leave. He said hewould see us in Pawhuska in a couple of weeks.

(sigmed) Bob Ryan."

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Statement obtained from E. L. Erwin, No. 9 North Manthus Street, Pulsa, Oklahoma.

"Tulsa, Okla. June 11, 1926. I am employed by the City of Tulsa in the Police Demartment and am in the Detective Department and am assigned with Detective L. W. Elliott and have worked with him constantly since December 1925. Sometime around the middle of May 1926 the exact date I have forgotten Elliott and I parked our car in front of or near the New Drug Store 328 E. First Street and were on the side walk and Attorney Springer came up and addressing me asked me if I knew where Emma Weaver lived and I told him I did not, but knew a woman that did and that she stayed at the Blossom Hotel on list and Main streets. marked get in the car and we will drive up there and see. Springer, Elliott and myself got in the car and drave to the Blossom notel. Springer, Elliott and I got out of the car and started up the stairs and met the woman whom I had referred to a wirs. Hightower at the landing of the steps and introduced her to Mr. Springer and told her hr. Spainger wanted to talk to her about Emma Weaver. Springer asked Mrs. Hightower if she knew where are. Emma Weaver lived and she said she did not know the number but could show him the house. Une of us I do not recall possibly I asked her if she would go and show us the house and she said gus, but would not stop as she and Mrs. Weaver were not friendly. Mr. Springer, Mr. Elliott, Mrs. Hightower then got in the car and I drove the car and Mrs. Hightower had us drive to East

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5th place and pointed out to us a house as I recall 2513 3. 5th place as the house that Mrs. Weaver lived in. may be mistaken as to the exact number, but do recall was in the 2500 block. We did not stop but drove back to town and Springer got out at or mear Cincinnatti and 1st or Boston and lot streets. He said be was going to stop at some loan cifice. Elliott, Mrs. Hightower and I then drove to the Blossom Hotel and Mrs. Hightower got out. Sometime as I medall while we were with Springer that day. Springer remarked to us that there was a woman named Mayo that worked in some Coffee House and was laying up with some men and he wanted to get a line on her. Two or three days later Elliott and I were down town and Elliatt said I want to go up to Springers office and I went with him to Springer's office as I recall on the 3rd floor. We went in to a room and met Springer and he took us into another room. We sat down and Elliott asked him if he had been to Joplin and Springer said yes and had just gotten back. Elliott asked him something about if he found the woman and Springer said she was not there and had never been there, and said something about talking with the Chief of Police. Elliott then said that when he was investigating the Gazge cases that she was there and mentioned something about Capital hill or some hill where he said he had talked with her. I do not recall the woman's name being mentioned. Elliott then asked Springer, "Can you use that evidence that we were talking about" and Springer said "I have looked up the law and I can." Springer said "how long will it take you to get them here". Elliott said "I can send them to you in 15 minutes." Springer said "Dont send them come with them, that there were to many Government men around. You come with them and I will know who they are. We started to go and I remarked to Springer, whats the matter arm't you feeling well and he said no, I have been up all night. Elliott and I left the office going down on the Elevator Elliott remarked, I will meet you down at prodons in time to call in. I left Elliott in the lobby of the Bliss building and I walked down north and stopped in front of Cresses store and met someone and got in a car parked in front. I sat there for a few minutes, possibly 10 or 15 minu es and I saw two men enter the lobby of the Bliss building, one of whom I had previously seen and called to the attention of Elliott as being no good. Having heard Elliott tell Springer that he would have them there in 15 minutes, that these two men were likely the parties that Elliott had referred to as both of them looked suspicious to me as they passed, and I had realized that Springer and Elliott were figuring on something wrong. When they talked in the office and I now recall that Springer said to Elliott at the time Elliott told him he could get them in 15 minutes. Springer remarked that he had

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to get to Pawhuska tomorrow or next day as the trial would start then. As I recall, in ...out 30 or 40 minutes after these two men went into the Bliss building, they came out. After they had passed, possibly in five minutes, I then went to Bordons place. In a few minutes after I got to Bordens, Elliott came in. Elliott then called the Police station and we walked out of Bordens. On account of my suspicion of what I had heard Elliott tell Springer and the fact of seeing these two men go into the Bliss Building, I thought I would feel Ellight out and get an expression from him, so I said, "Elliott you are going to get yourself in trouble or in a jam fooling with that crippled hop-headed S- of a B--. " I was referring to one of the two fellows I had seen going into the Bliss building and coming out, and Elliott remarked, "Why, do you know him?" and I left him under the impression that I did, however, I did not know him. Elliott said no more. Elliott and I frequently went into the Southern Rooms and Elliott was very friendly with the landlady, Mrs. Grace O'Donell.

After I had seen these two men go to the Bliss Building and heard Elliott's remarks to Springer and had cautioned him about getting in a jam, I saw both of these men going into the Southern Recha. I then drew my conclusions that Elliott was mixed up with these two men and that he and Springer were going to use them in some way as witnesses in the Gsage trials. So I conveyed my suspicions to Mr. Bueller and later ascertained these two mens' names from the Secy. of the Waiters Union and I phoned their named and locations to Mr. Smith at Pawhuska, as he had requested me to get this information for him if I could.

#### STATEMENT BY L. W. ELLIOTT, CITY DETECTIVE, TULSA, CKla.

On June 5, 1926, Agent Smith questioned Mr. Elliott, who stated that he at one time was employed by a private detective agency to make investigations of the Osage Indian murders; that recently Atty. Springer approached he and Ed Erwin, his partner, and stated that there was a Mrs. Mayo employed at the Mayo Coffe Shop in Tulsa who was in possession of information and letters that he, upringer, wanted, and asked them, Elliott and Erwin, if they knew or any one who could get under Mrs Mayo for the letters and information; that he, Elliott, told Springer he would see, and did approach one Pierce, the house detective of the Mayo Hotel and related to Pierce what Springer wanted, but that later he, Ellictt, decided that his superior officer, Vic. Ellis, might not approve of such action, and so advised Pierce and dropped the matter. Elliott flatly denied that he was in any manner connected with Springer in the securing or framing Ryan and McSparren inxxermixe to testify in Burkhart s trial, and immediately charged Erwin with framing him.

Elliott further advised that during the Jar period he was employed as a Special Agent in the Bureau of Investigation, Dept. of Justice, and worked out of the Kansas City office.

Agents Smith and Murphy visited the premises of Mrs. Crace C'Donnel...
Proprietress of the Southern Hotel, Tulsa, whom it was alleged in previous into the manipulations of Attorney J. M. Springer. in

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obtaining false testimony in the Osage Indian murder cases, and Mrs. C'Dom 11 in the presence of Elliott denied that she had any knowledge of sud manipulations.

Referring to the statements of McSparren and Ryan, in addition thereto, 13 these witnesses both stated that they were present at the Southern Hotel 14 and saw Agents Smith and Murphy and City Detective Elliott on the premises 15 of the Southern Hotel on or about June 5th in conference with the Proprietress 16 Mrs. O'Dormell, and further heard Agents Smith and Murphy in conference with City Detective Elliott at the foot of the stairs of the Southern Hotel after leaving the premises, and that the following morning thereafter that Quicity Detective ophoned Ryan at the Southern Hotel advising him that Government Agents were investigating and things looked dangerous and for him and 21 SMcSparren to "get out from under it" and for Ryan to seek another rooming house and get away from the Southern Hotel; that he, Ryan, asked Ellictt 23 if they, Ryan and McSparren, should leave town or whether or not each man 24 should look after himself individually, and that Elliott suggested that each 25 man look after himself, but for him, Ryan, to be sure and move his recording place; that Ryan immediately thereafter moved to the Glenn Hotel, where he was later located and interviewed by Agents Smith and Murphy.

Both witnesses, McSparren and Ryan, stated that at their conferences '30 with Attorney Springer in the Bliss Building in Tulsa in company with City Detective Elliott, that Attorney Springer suggested to Elliott the 32 matter of placing these witnesses under process and their availability as 33 witnesses at Pawhusks; that Mr. Elliott stated he could serve them himself. but Attorney Scringer did not approve of this and suggested that in lieu thereof, he would have them served officially by a Deputy Sheriff so that the service would be regular.

77.15 Witnesses Ryan and McSparren both stated to Agents Smith and Murphy that in their interview with Attorney Springer and Elliott in Springer's office in the Bliss building on May 21, that Attorney Springer stated to them that their testimony was all right with the exception of a few points and advised them that the State of Oklahoma in the trial of the Osage Wirder cases at Pawhuska would have high powered attorneys, and when McSparren. and Ryan were placed on the witness stand to testify, these lawyers would cross them up and ask them many points with reference to their knowledge of W. E. Smith, Henry Grammer and others; that they should be acquainted with the description of these people in order that they could properly answer questions propounded to them, and thereafter Mr. Springer gave each of them, Ryan and McSparren, a full description of W. E. Smith, Henry Grammer, Laura Tuttle and the location of Henry Grammer's ranch.

Witnesses McSparren and Ryan both stated to Agents Smith and Murphy that mither of them knew Henry Grammer, W. E. Smith or Laure Tuttle, mor did either of them know the location of Henry Grammer's ranch and had never heard of such persons before.

#### AT PAWHUSKA:

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On June 1st, complaint was filed before Justice of the Pease Crozier by County Attorney Templeton of Osage County charging Ed. C. Snyder and Charlie Johnson with attempting to run witnesses in the Osage Indian murder cases out of the jurisdiction of the State Court. This complaint was based upon information obtained by Agents of this Bureau from the following witnesses. Defendants were arraigned and placed under bond in the sum of \$5000. each, which was furnished and defendants released pending preliminary hearing.

#### STATELENT OF MATE M WILLIAMS:

Witness Matt M. Williams stated to Agents that he had been approached by Charlie Tohnson (who is a character of the underworld of Osage County, a well known bootlegger and manufacturer and under charges now pending by both the State and Federal Government) and by Johnson taken to the office of Ed C. Snyder in the Citizen's Kational Bank Building, a former cattleman and a close personal friend of W. K. Hale, and by Snyder enticed and induced to leave the State and go into Mexico in the car of Charlie Johnson's, where he could not be reached or molested, and that he would be paid a sum of \$2000. not to appear in the trial of the Usage Indian murder cases against W. K. Hale et al.

#### STATEMENT OF FRED WILLIAMS, PAWHUSKA:

Fred Williams, a respectable citizen of Osage Countyand a brother of Matt M. Williams, stated that he was approached by Ed C. Snyder and the County Assessor of Osage County and by them was requested to use his influence to keep Matt M. Williams from testifying in the cases of the State of Oklahom vs W. K. Hale et al for the murder of Osage Indians.

#### STATEMENT OF JACK COFFEY AND ED CLEVINE, PAWHUSMA:

Jack Coffey and Ed Clevine both Deputy Sheriffs of Csage County stated they are now operating a pool hall in Pawhuska in the 100 block on Main Street, that they saw Charlie Johnson approach Matt Williams in this pool hall and hold a conversation with him and later saw Johnson leave with Williams. That later they heard Charlie Johnson remark "that if the Government Agents treated him as they had treated latt Williams, that there would be hell."

#### STATEMENT OF MR. QUIGLEY, FAIRFAX, OKLA:

Mr. Quigley stated that he saw Charlie Johnson in a conference

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,58 59 with Matt M. Williams and later saw Johnson take Matt Milliams to the office of Ed C. Snyder in the Ditlzen's National Bank Building, as previously stated.

Detailed developments of the manipulations of Attorneys representing Ernest Burkhart, W. K. Hale et al, and the corrupting of witnesses has been laid before the County Attorney of Osage County, Oklahoma, and T. J. Leahy, Special Prosecutor in the Osage Indian Murder cases, and Government Agents are assured by County Attorney Templeton that a Special Grand Jury will be called at the earliest possible date to investigate such matters, talso Special Prosecutor T. J. Leahy advises that vigorous prosecution will follow developments therefrom.

#### Re. MURDER OF W. E. SMITH.

On June 21, 1926, defendant Ernest Burkhart was brought before District Judge Jesse J. Worton and given a sentence of life imprisonment in the Oklahoma State Penitentiary for the murder of W. E. Smith.

#### Re. MURDER OF ANNA BROWN.

On May 21, 1926, Attorneys for defendant Byron Burkbart in a habeas corpus proceeding before the District Judge of Usage County at Pawhuska on presentation of evidence, obtained bond for defendant Byron Burkhart in the sum of \$25,000. On May 27th this bond was made and defendant released pending his trial.


#### AGENTS' NOTES:

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Defendant Ernest Burkhart since entering his plea of guilty to the murder of W. E. Smith has discussed freely with Agents White and Smith the manipulations of his Attorneys and others in causing him to rempudiate his original confession to the Government in the Smith and Roan cases, and further states that the case styled "Ernest Burkhart vs T. E. White, ... S. Smith, John K. Wren, J. A. Street, Edwin Brown, A. W. Comstock" for diamges in the sum of \$250,000. filed in Osage County on Mar 17, 1926, was erroneous and was filed at the suggestions of his Attorneys at that time, Enmilton, Springer, Howard, Preeling et al. Ernest Burkhart further states that he was advised by Attorneys Howard, Springer et al to file this suit in the interest of defeating the criminal case filed against him in Csage County.

After further conference with Ernest Burkhart, detailed statements will be obtained from him of the manipulations of his Attorneys in causing him to repudiate his original confession and the line of perjured testimony that he was induced to swear to. The reason that this has not been done heretofore, is due to the fact that Agents anticipate that all defendants involved herein will be transferred into the jurisdiction of the Government, at which time there will be a better opportunity to get all matters clearly in hand.

Dear Sir:

In Re: Osage Indian Murder Cases.

The former crooked attorneys of Ernest Eurlihart are circulating the story that Ernest OBurkhart is crazy, claiming that he was shell-shocked and gassed during his overseas service in the late War, and that he is not, therefore, responsible for what he says and does. They further have made public in the newspapers here that they had an alienist looking him over while he was being tried and are convinced that he is crazy. Therefore, in order to refute any such move that these crooked lawyers may make in any of the subsequent trials of Hale and Mamsey, where Burkhart will probably be used as a witness, I would like to get Burkhart's medical certificate and service record at the time of his discharge at Camp Punston, Kansas July 9, 1919. His full name is Ernest G. Burkhart and his serial number was 3510757. I have a copy of his discharge, which is a honorable one, and which gives briefly that his physical condition was good when discharged and briefly gives his service record, but it is not enough for the purpose it is intended to be used.

These crooked attorneys formerly representing Burkhart, in order to get out from under the publicity given them and public sentiment against them for their part in framing Burkhart to tell a great number of lies in his trial recently held at Pawhusha, have given all kinds of ridiculous lies to the papers in Oklahoma City with reference to Burkhart's insanity. One story was carried in the Oklahoma News to the effect that burkhart was never thee to get and state voluntarily at Pawhusha, due to the fact that he was constantly under the guard of officers, thus haplying that we had taken advantage of an insane man to get him to withdraw his plea of not ailty and plead guilty, and discharge his attorneys. As a matter of fact the

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attorneys for the defense, before they started in with the trial of Ernest Burkhart, had the District Judge to issue an order allowing no one to see him except his attorneys and immediate members of his family and this court order was adhered to strictly. Burkhart states that he found that this was one of the biggest barriers in his way to get word to someone outside of his attorneys as to what he really wanted to do.

Taking stock of what transpired during the trial of Ernest Burkhart at Pawhuska, and from what I understand these crooked attorneys are doing at the present time, they are going to have lined up at the time of the trial of Hale and Ramsey at Powhuska, which is scheduled now to take place September 20th, some of the wildest storis imaginable. For instance, I understand they have an ex-bank robber by the name of Henry Cornett, now doing 35 years in the Oklahoma State Penitentiary at McAlester for bank robbery, and who formerly pretended to give us some information in connection with these Osage murders, to swear that Roy Bunch had Henry Roan killed. I am having this story. as well as the many others, investigated and Special Agent Smith, together with Attorney General George Short, is going to McAlester Prison soon to interview Cornell and get from him, if possible, a truthful story as to who proposed that he swear to whese lies in court and I believe that we will be able to get a truthful statement cut if him. As a matter of fact he has told us many times that he knew nothing whatever about these Osage murders but thought, due to his wide acquaintance in the Osage County, that he could probably give us some information. All of these statements, of course, were made before these crooked attorneys got hold of him. Some of the attempts of these attorneys to have people perjure themselves have been investigated and a report from Special Agent Frank Smith sets forth the same and is being mailed you today.

The County Attorney, as I have previously informed you, is calling a special Grand Jury at Pawhuska in order to endeavor to indict those implicated and disbarment proceedings are being arranged for by the state prosecutors. When either Hale or Ramsey go to trial at Pawhuska on September 20th of this year, I expect there will be lined up all kinds of perjured testimony. We will, however, do our best to meet the same, if you muthorize our continuance for the state prosecution, which I sincerely trust you will do. I would like, however, to see the cases tried in Federal Court first, where we can try and be almost certain of conviction for both Hale and Ramsey by using Burkhart and Matt Williams as witnesses. We have been unable thus far

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to get these prisoners away from the jurisdiction of District Judge Thorten at Pawhuska. As I telegraphed you, District U. S. Attorney Roy St. Lewis made a formal application for Hale and Ramsey on June 24th and the application was denied, Judge Whorten stating that he would admit everything that the State and Government said in support of their application, but still he thought that the defendants should be protected and not given any injustice by being hauled around from one Court to the other, thus implying that the Government of the United States was going to deal them an injustice and the State of Oklahoma had to protect them. In this stand Judge Whorten stands alone, for all of the state prosecutors are desirous of seeing Hale and Ramsey taken over by the Government and tried, as well as a great majority of the people in Osage County. A number of delegations of these citizens have called on Judge Whorten in order to try and persuade him to turn Hale and Ramsey over to the Government for trial, which can be had at Guthrie at any time. These citizens believe, so they state, that Hale and Ramsey can be tried quickly and fairly in Federal Court at Guthrie, or the Western District of Oklahoma. They state on the other hand that it will cost the County from \$5,000.00 to \$10,000.00 to try them and it will be almost impossible to get a jury. The case will be dragged through the Courts for years and per-. jured testimony submitted to the State Courts and the final result will be that nothing will be gained except delays, all of which are beneficial to the defendants.

Everyone is alarmed as to what may happen to Burkhart. With him away and silenced, Hale would have a much easier time in the trial of his case, especially the Henry Roam case, and we think that it is likely that they will endeaver to kill Burkhart. Of course, every precaution is being taken to prevent such a step, but there are many ways that this could be done, for friends of Ramsey and Hale could probably slip poison to him through his Indian wife, who is an ignorant, unsuspecting Indian and she often takes him food to the jail at Pawhuska.

I am really very much alarmed at the delay in the trial of Hale and Ramsey in the Roam case, but I see nothing else that can be done at the present time, unless you can have some arrangements made by which U. S. Attorney St. Lewis can legally take Hale and Ramsey away from the state. In doing this there will be no friction between the state prosecutors and the Government. For they are all in accord and the only objector is Judge Whorten and Hale and Ramsey's attorneys.



As I have informed you before, everyone is willing that they be placed in Federal custody and prosecuted in Federal Jourt except the Judge at Pawhuska and it is my understanding that he is weakening considerably. Many delegations of citizens, so I understand, from Fairfax, Pawhuska, and other points in Osage County have called on the Judge at Pachuska and emplained to him their wishes in the matter that this case should be protecuted in the Federal Court, thus relieving the County of the supense and thereby coming nearer getting a conviction. Very few, if any, believe that we can ever be able to get a jury in Osage County to try these parties and, if they are tried in the State Courts in Osage County, trickeries and all methods of deceit will be resorted to and attempts made to bribe and have perjury committed. As soon as we are able to jet Male and Ramsey in Custody, I will immediately wire you accordingly.

MEMORANDUM FOR MR. J. EDGAR HOOVER. DIRECTOR:

Endeavoring to comply with the request of Special Agent White as contained in his telegram of the 13th inst., attached, relative to checking the tax liability of BILL HALE, under indictment for murder at Oklahoma, I got in touch with Mr. Mahoney of the Field Procedure Section, Internal Revenue Unit, and was advised by him that their files contain no record of the request sent in by Income Tax Agent Lynch as described by Agent White. I was further advised that the record disclosed that an examination had been made of Hale's tax liability for the years 1922 and 1923, and that it would require a letter from the Commissioner of Internal Revenue to Hale before a second examination could be made in accordance with Section 1105 of the Internal Revenue Act of 1926. Mr. Mahoney suggested that our Agent at Oklahoma have Agent Lynch communicate with his Supervising Agent at St. Louis, Missouri, and request that a telegram be immediately dispatched to the Deputy Commissioner of the Internal Revenue Bureau requesting authority to reinvestigate the Income Tax liability of William K. Hale for whatever years have already been covered by an investigation. Mr. Mahoney stated that immediately upon receipt of this wire the proper letter would be prepared and immediately sent to Hale.

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
