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instructions from you, on September 29, 1923 ex-Agent T. Weiss was employed as Special Employe for sixty days, to investigate the above entitled matter.

It was also requested at that time that agent Barkhausen of the Denver office be assigned to assist him in this investigation. It resulted that agent barkhausen was going to be in Grand Jury and court in a few days, and it seemed not worth while to have him come for the few days that it might have been possible for him to have been here, so that the matter of the Agent Barkhausen come to assist Mr. Weiss in this integration was postponed.

Mr. Weiss was also under subpoens to a term of the Grand Jury at Tulss, to a term of court at Ardmore, also a term of court at Lawton, and a term of court at Fort Scott, Kans., which have taken up a great deal of his time, so that he has been able to date to devote only twenty-one days' time to the W. B. Smith case. While attending court at Tulsa, Ardmore and Lawton, I have assigned other work to him in those towns, which has kept him busy during the entire time. While at Lawton, on account of the great floods that we had immediate and the impossibility of being able to get witnesses to court, almost nothing was done for a week in the trial of cases in court, but it not being possible to have Mr. Weiss go to Osage County to continue this investigation and return. Agent assigned other work at Lawton and Fort Sill to him to do while there, awaiting the last of cases on the docket.

I knew that agent Barkhausen was to be at court at Fort Scoting.

Kans., and instructed Mr. Weiss to talk to him to ascertain what the condition of his work was, and the probability of his being able to assist Mr. Weiss in the Smith case. Mr. Weiss now informs me that Agent Barkhausen states that he will be engaged in court in a very important automobile theft case the Steve Brownlee case - for an indefinite period of time.

The Steve Brownlee case - for an indefinite period of time.

The Agent Barkhausen states that he will be possible for him to leave that work at this time.

Agent Burger of the Kansas City office has worked with Mr. Weiss on automobile theft cases, and while Mr. Weiss was at Fort Scott and was informed that it would be almost impossible to have Agent Barkhausen taken away from his work, he spoke to Agent Burger and also to Agent in Charge Eberstein about the possibility of having Agent Burger assigned to assist him in this investigation, and while it was stated by both of them that their work was very heavy in the Kansas City District, that they would be very willing and very glad to assist this office in this assignment, if the Director desired to assign Agent Burger to this work.

The sixty-day period of special employment and special assignment of Mr. Weiss expires at the end of tusiness the day of November 28th.

Weiss report on the W. E. Smith case, dated November 19th, in which you will note that he has obtained some very valuable information relative to the Annie Brown and Charlie Whitehorn cases, and he is now in Osage County, and will remain there until November 28th, following up this investigation as rapidly as possible.

It is my opinion that this investigation should proceed as expeditiously as possible, and I know of nothing at this time which would take Mr. Weiss away from the investigation except that he is subposaned in court at Chickasha December lith for one case which is a short case, and if reached promptly on the docket would only take one day. There is no other term of court in this District, and unless subposaned outside this state, there would be nothing known to at this time which would prevent his continuing uninterruptedly on this investigation.

Please let me know tefore November 28th what your desires are with respect to this investigation, and if you desire to continue same, whether or not it meets with your approval to assign Agent Burger to assist Mr. Weiss, and if so, please instruct the Kansas City office to assign Agent Burger at the earliest possible date.

City, Okla. pplementing my previous reports, 62-5033 entitled above. The second report sovers investigations for dates shown as above, and the fallowing places, to-wit: Tulsa, Collinsville, Skiatook, Barns dall, Pawhuska, Fairfax, Okla., and Kensas City, Mo. RE: MURDER OF ANNIR BROWN, May 22, 1921: On you. 15th Agent interviewed a confidential informant, whose name cannot be disclosed at this time, but who will be available whenever necessary, even to the point of testifying. Agent secured information from this confidential informant in material substances as follows: That about July, 1921, informant was emplayed indirectly by ERNEST and BRYAN BURKHART to make confidential investigation and secure certain evidence for them in re. the ANNA BROWN Informant states that BRYAN and **グロ 05C-8** ERNEST BURKHART explained to him that their chiect in having him get this evidence at that time was to meet

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probable charges against BRYAN BURKHART for the murder of ANNIE BROWN as they stated they had learned that a number of people had seen BRYAN BURKHART with ANNIE BROWN at different places from Fairfax, Okla. and hours later than BRYAN BURKHART had previously stated and testified he had delivered her to her home in good health, at Fairfax, Okla. Informant called the evidence that the BURKHARTS were wanting him to secure an alibi, but the said evidence was not in the nature of an alibi, but was a building up of evidence and testimony to corroborate what BRYAN BURKHART would evidently set up as his defenses if brought to trial for the murder of ANNIE BROWN.

Informant stated that while the BUKKHARTS never admitted to him that BRYAN BURKHART actually murdered ANNIE BROWN and that in fact BRYAN BURKHART denied that he had in killed ANNIE BROWN, still BRYAN and ERNEST BURKHART conveyed to him the idea that his duty lay in getting withwases who would swear as BRYAN BURKHART wanted them to swear in BURKHART'S behalf.

Informant stated further that he noted that BRYAN BURKHART and ERREST would not discuss this case or talk it over with him the presence of MOLLIE BURKHART, wife of ERNEST BURKHART, and sister of the murdered ANNIE BROWN.

Informant also stated that W. K. or BILL HALE, uncle to the BURK-HARTS, steered entirely clear of the conferences between informant and the BURKHARTS, and had nothing to say or do in the matter.

Agent deems the following statement by informant as extremely important, as it coincides and checks perfectly with all the evidence Agent has been able to gather re. this particular case beforehand:

Informant stated to Agent that he was informed by BRYAN BURKHART

that he, BRYAN BURKHART, was at ERNEST BURKHART'S home on May 21. 1921: ANNUE BROWN was visiting there that day also, and an uncle of thet the BURKHARTS from Texas named BRIDGES was there; that/BURKHART and ERNEST BURKHART and ANNIE BROWN and some of the others named left the BURKHARTS about 6:30 P. M. that day; that BRYAN BURKHART stated to informent that he, BRYAN BURKHART, drove to Ralston, Okla, with ANNIE in the Buick touring car belonging to ERNEST BURKHART: that at BROWN Raiston. Okla. they stopped a short time and then drove west to the Belford crossing over the Arkansas River, back to Osage County, and north a mile or two to a roadhouse. That at this roadhouse BRYAN BURKHART and ANNIE BROWN met another party of people, and that this party stayed at this readhouse until about 10 P. M.; that upon leaving the readhouse BRIDGES and BRYAN BURKHART drove in the Buick car north until a mile or so west of Burbank and then turned east and went into Burbank and through Burbank two miles to a corner where a roadhouse was also situated, and then another one mile to another roadhouse situated at what is known as Shotgun Corners.

That BRYAN BURKHART stated that at this first roadhouse near the Belford Bridge, ANNIE BROWN left BRYAN BURKHART and went with the other party in the other car. That when BRYAN BURKHART and his uncle, BRIDGES, arrived at the Shotgun Corners roadhouse, they found ANNIE BROWN and the other party also there.

That BRYAN SURKHART stated that both parties stayed at this Shotgun corners roadhouse (which was then run by PAUL JOHNS, and which will
be hereinafter referred to as "Johns' roadhouse) until about 1 A. M.:
that at 1 A. M. Sunday, May 22, 1921 ERNEST BURKHART and his uncle,
BRIDGES, took ANNIE BROWN with them intommernest BURKHART'S Buick

touring car and started back to Fairfax, which is about seventeen miles! almost due south, but a few miles east of said PAUL JOHNS' roadhouse. That BRYAN BURKHART stated that a man and woman of the party they had met at said roadhouse also left at the same time in a Ford touring car. immediately following BURKHART in the Buick; that me both cars stopped at the readhouse was one mile south of the PAUL JOHNS Readhouse. (which readhouse was then run by one LER MORGAN and wife) and got some whiskey! that both cars then proceeded at the same time south and toward Fairfax the Buick car with BRIDGES and BRYAN BURKHART ลกนิ ANNIE BROWN the lead, and the Ford touring car with the other man and woman following. That both cars thus proceeded along the road until they arrived at a point about one mile north of Fairfax. Okla. . where the road forks and one road turns east going toward Pawhuska or Grayhorse, and the other road continues due south into Fairfax.

That BRYAN BURKHART stated that at the forks of this road he and BRIDGES and ANNIE BROWN continued south into Fairfax, while the Ford touring car with the man and woman which had been following turned east en the road leading to Pawhuska and Grayhorse.

That BRYAN BURKHART stated to him, informant, that he drove on into Pairfax at that time, and delivered ANNIE BROWN home safely about 2:30 A. M. Sunday, May 22d.

That BRYAN BURKHART further told him, informant, that he, BURKHART drove from Fairfax to home that morning, but did not arrive at home at Brayhorse, just three miles from Fairfax, until about daylight (about two hours later); that BRYAN BURKHART further stated that he met a man near Grayhorse as he, BURKHART, was going home about daylight that morning who recognized BRYAN. Informant states that BRYAN did not give him

this man's name, but stated that he was a man who lived near there, and who BRYAN know me very well, and that BRYAN remarked that he could fix that man all right, and could depend on him to not say anything about seeing him at that time of the morning.

The above, it is to be remembered, is the statement made by BRYAN BURKHART to informant.

The following is what informant states he learned personally by his own investigation covering about a week in July, 1921:

Informant states that BHYAN BURKHART about July, 1921, drove him, informant, from Grayhorse to Ralston and from Ralston to the Belford Bridge, across the Arkansas River, thence north a few miles to the first roadhouse mentioned above, thence north into Burbank, Okla., thence eastate the roadhouse then run by LEE MORGAN, thence north one mile to the roadhouse then run by PAUL JOHNS, thence back to Fairfax and Grayhorse

Informant states that BRYAN BURKHART did this in order to make point out to informant the exact road that BRYAN BURKHART traveled that night with BRIDGES and ANNIE BROWN, and to introduce him and acquint him with the road house keepers who were friendly to BRYAN BURKHART at that time. Informant also states that at Burbank, Okla. BRYAN BURKHART introduced him to the woman who BURKHART stated was in the party that they met at the PAUL JOHNS Roadhouse about 11 P. M. the night of the murder, and who BRYAN BURKHART also stated was the woman that was in the Ford touring car that accompanied the Buick touring car from PAUL JOHNS' roadhouse back to the forks of the road, north of Fairfax.

Informant states that BRYAN BURKHART told him the names of all the persons referred to above in BRYAN BURKHART'S statements, to-wit:

the name of PAUL JOHNS, and wife, roadhouse keepers, LEE MORGAN and wife, roadhouse keepers, and the names of the woman who was in the Pord dar that accompanied the Buick car back toward Fairfax that night and the name of the man that was with her, and the name of the man whom BRYAN BURKHART met about whit daylight the next morning, and whom BURKHART stated he could handle.

Informant, however, was not sure of all of these names except that of PAUL JOHNS and wife, and LRE MORGAN and wife, but said that the woman the who was in the car accompanying/BRYAN BURKHART - ANNIE BROWN car that night from PAUL JOHNS Roadhouse back towards Fairfax was a medium height woman, red hair, good looking, about 28 years old, well built, and pleasant-voiced.

Informant states that he interviewed PAUL JOHNS and that PAUL

JOHNS stated that on the night in question that red-headed woman and the
man with her, ANNIE BROWN and others arrived at PAUL JOHNS' roadhouse about 10 P. M. in a Ford touring car; that about forty minutes
later BRYAN BURKHART and his uncle arrived in a Buick touring car, and
both parties stayed at the place and drank until about 1 A. M.; that about
1 2. M. BRYAN BURKHART and ANNIE BROWN and BRIDGES got into the
Buick touring car and left, going south, and the red-headed woman and
the man got in the Ford touring car at and left, going south, at the
same time, just following the Buick car with BRYAN and ANNIE and
BRIDGES.

Informant states that PAUL JOHNS was very friendly to BRYAN BURK-HART, but that PAUL JOHNS fully believed that BRYAN BURKHART had murdered ANNIE BROWN later that night, and that PAUL JOHNS remarked to him, informant, that BRYAN BURKHART made one big mistake when he'

ether people, and left with her; that PAUL JOHNS stated that there were a number of other people besides those mentioned, including his wife, who saw BRYAN BURKHART leave with ANNIE BROWN in his car that night

Informant states that he interviewed LEE MORGAN and wife, and that LEE MORGAN stated that on the night in question BRYAN BURKHART and another man with ANNIE BROWN arrived in a Buick touring car at his, MORGAN'S place about 1 or 1:20 A. M. and that there was a Ford touring car accompanying them with another man and woman, and that the parties did not get out of the cars, but he, LEE MORGAN, brought them some whis key to each car, and the party drove on south toward Fairfax.

Informant stated further that BRYAN BURKHART mentioned the fact that MRS. GEO. JAMES and others had seen him with ANNIE BROWN at various times that Saturday might and Sunday morning, and that BRYAN BURKHART was getting this line of evidence to combat that evidence on the part of a possible prosecution. Informant stated further that BRYAN BURKHART did not explain what became of his uncle, BRIDGES, after the two cars separated just north of Fairfax that morning about 2 A. M., as BRYAN BURKHART did not mention where BRIDGES was when this man near Grayhorse saw BRYAN BURKHART about daylight just getting in home.

THE Informant states that he made further reports at the time showing all the above, including the names in full of all the persons mentioned and alluded to, and that said reports are not now in his possession, but that he can get them. Agent has arranged with this informant to get his former original reports at the earliest opportunity.

The above evidence is highly important, as it will be remembered

that BRYAN BURKHART swore at the inquest of ANNIE BROWN'S murder that he, BURKHART, returned her to her home at Fairfax from her visit to his brother, ERNEST'S, that Saturday, May 21, 1921 at four or 4:30 p. M. in the afternoon, and swore further that he had never seen her since.

This line of evidence that the BURKHARTS employed informant to secure was not sought for by the BURKHARTS until it became generally known that JOE MCGUIRE and others had seen BRYAN BURKHART with ANNIE BROWN at Ralston, and that some other parties had seen him with her at the roadhouse near Burbank, and that MRS. GEO. JAMES had seen him with ANNIE BROWN at Fairfax between two and three A. M. Sunday morning, May 22d.

Informant states that it was quite apparent to him that PAUL JOHNS and wife and LEE MORGAN and wife and the other persons including the red-headed woman and her escort that night had all been seen previously by the BURKHARTS and lined up as they were all very friendly and seemediate have their stories down pat ready to relate.

It is Agent's opinion that BURKHART'S story of this trip from Grayhorse back to the fork in the road north of Fairfax the next morning about 2 A. M. is substantially the truth, but that the further facts are that BURKHART did take ANNIE BROWN to her home in Fairfax after these cars separated, but that the uncle BRIDGES was not in the car with BRYAN BURKHART and ANNIE BROWN at the time, or at least left them and got in the car with the other party that went into Grayhorse, and that BRYAN BURKHART drove alone with ANNIE BROWN in his brother ERNEST'S Buick car from the fork of the road north of

Fairfax, and that BRYAN BURKHART and ANNIE BROWN did stop and talk, as related by MRS. JAMES; close to MRS. JAMES house about 2:30 that morning, after which BRYAN BURKHART and ANNIE BROWN drove to ANNIE BROWN'S house and got out just as MRS. JAMES relates she saw them do, and went into ANNIE'S house, but that they stayed in ANNIE'S house but a very short time and left, and drove to the place on the road between Fairfax and Grayhorse where ANNIE BROWN'S body was found, and that BRYAN BURKHART either murdered her at her house that morning, or on the road, and placed the body where it was later found, or which is more likely, was out of the car with her and shot her right mear the spot where her body was found.

At least, the above evidence shows positively that BRYAN BURKHART was with ANNIE BHOWN parametrized the time practically all the time before and up until at least 2:30 A. M. the next morning, and was the last person seen with her when she was alive, and was with her ten hours later than he swore at the inquest.

PAUL JOHNS roadhouse was raided and PAUL JOHNS arrested, and made

tona at Pawhuska, Osage County, in Oct. 2121. His bond was for feited,

and his present whereabouts are unknown, but we are tracing him.

LEE MORGAN was arrested and his place raided and closed in October, 1921, and IRE MORGAN also made bond and forfeited and his present whereabouts are unknown, but we are tracing him.

It now appears that the red-headed woman to whom informant talked and whose name he has forgotten, was either one MAYBELLE MAYFIELD or EDITH DAVIS. We are tracing both these women. It was possibly also

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one ROSE COCHRAN, and we are also tracing her.

white man, married to an Osage Indian woman who is the MOLLIE MERCER heretofore referred to.

J. MERCER is the man from whom A. W. COMSTOCK has been receiving his, COMSTOCK'S, information heretofore relating to the alleged knowledge by MANDY CLAREMORE and MARY BLACKBIRD in the case also, so that Agent is getting this direct now, instead of through two or three hands. J. MERCER stated to Agent that his wife is a sister to ROSE LASLEY with whom BRYAN BURKHART is now living as man and wife.

And that MARY BLACKBIRD, Osage Indian woman, is also a sister to MERCER'S wife.

MERCER states that all his information comes to him through his wife, who in turn gets if from MARY BLACKBIRD and MANDY CLAREMORE and ether Osage Indian women; that his wife, however, only tells him enough to help him break up, if possible, the relationship between BRYAN BURK-HART and ROSE LASLEY, as they fear if BRYAN BURKHART succeeds in marrying ROSE LASLEY he will have her killed to inherit her property, the same as ANNIE BROWN and RITA SMITH were killed.

J. MERCER stated, however, that his wife does not willingly give him all the information she learns from these other full-blood Osages, for the reason that she does not want them drawn into the case, and the further main reason that they are afraid that if the BURKHARTS and HALES knew that they are talking, they will be killed. MERCER'S wife is a convent raised and educated Indian young lady.

MERCER states that his information, in substance, from his wife is

the shout midnight of May 21, 1921 BRYAN BURKHART and ANNIE BROWN CAME to MANDY CLAREMORE'S house at Grayhorse in a ear together, and BRYAN BURKHART borrowed from MANDY CLAREMORE a small calibered gun that belonged to HALL GOODER, MANDY CLAREMORE'S brother. That MANDY CLAREMORE stated that BRYAN BURKHART has never returned this gun, and HALL GOODE, from for some reason, probably fear, has never asked for it back - (the hole in ANNIE BROWN'S head indicated a small caliber gun).

MERCER stated further that his further infermation from his wife is that later that same night MARY BLACKBIRD and MANDY CLAREMORE saw BRYAN BURKHART and ANNIE BROWN together at the spot where ANNIE BROWN'S body was later found, and that MARY BLACKBIRD and MANDY CLAREMORE had stated that they were at the place where the murder was committed, and knew all about it, but would not tell.

whether MARY BLACKBIRD and MANDY CLAREMORE were with BRYAN BURKHART and ANNIE BROWN just before or just after or at the time that ANNIE BROWN was killed, but that it is one of these three. J. MERCER states further that both MARY BLACKBIRD and MANDY CLAREMORE are very dissolute full-blood Osage women.

that the Osage

Indian women are very fond of all white men, while the Osage Indian men are all very fond of all white women.

MERCER states further that these Indian women mentioned talk in their own tongue among themselves, but will not tell or talk such thing to white people, and that he is firmly convinced that the only way to make MARY BIACKBIRD and MANDY CLAREMORE talk is to arrange with the

agency and cut their finances off until they come in and tell the whole truth, or to throw them in jail and keep them there.

Agent found MARY BLACKBIRD in Fairfax, and after first having MR. M. RICHARDSON, Indian farmer, and a very reliable and discreet man of long experience and good standing with the Indians, prepare her as well as possible, to tell the truth, Agent interviewed her.

MARY BLACKBIRD Agent found to be a full-blood, fat, rough, low Indian woman, very sullen on this question, but speaking and understanding English perfectly.

MARY BLACKBIRD took the same attitude from the statement that MAMIE FLETCHER did, to-wit: She stated at the outset that she knew absolutely nothing about the case, and in response to all questions all that she would answer was, "I don't know a thing about it", in a sullen and defiant manner, and she would not look Agent in the eye, and plain-ly indicated that she was lying.

That only information that Agent was able to get out of MARY BLACK-BIRD was that she had heard another Osage Indian woman named MYERTIE KING of Grayhorse telling some woman that she, MYRTLE KING, had started out to go somewhere in her car before daylight Sunday morning, May 22, 1921, and had met ANNIE BROWN and BRYAN BURKHART in a car. MARY BLACKBIRD declared that she did not learn where this KING woman had met them, whether it was at Fairfax, Grayhorse or some other place, and in fact claimed to know nothing further.

ARDSON to get this MARY BLACKBIRD to tell the truth, but she kept insisting that she knew nothing further, but plainly showed that she did.

These Osage Indians for the greater part, are very dissolute and independent people, owing to the fact that their income is so large from oil that they do not work at all, but spent their time in dissipations of all kinds. They are also very independent of any white person, except those with the strings on their money, which of course is due to the fact that the greater part of the white people in Osage County are fawning and catering to the Indians in order to graft them out of their money.

It is Agent's belief that the only way to make MARY BLACKBIRD, man MAMIN

FLETCHER and MANDY CLAREMORE or any of these dissolute. stubborn Osage

Indians talk and tell what they know is to cut off their allowance at

the Agency if possible, and if necessary, throw them in jail whenever

they get drunk and treat them just as white people would be treated

Agent interviewed A. W. COMSTOCK heretofore frequently mentioned, but got absolutely no further information from MR. COMSTOCK, which of course is not necessary now as Agent is dealing directly with the persons from whom COMSTOCK was getting his information.

Agent spent considerable time driving to different points surrounding Pawhuska in endeavors to locate PAUL JOHNS, et als, in this case.

RE: MURDER OF CHARLIE WHITEHORN:

on Nov. 17th Agent located and interviewed MISS FRANCINAS BURDETT, who is now living with MRS. JOHN BENSON at 806 E. 10th St., Pawhuska, Okla MRS. JOHN BENSON is a white woman, married to an Osage Indian, who is said to now be in the Mayy, and the BENSON WOMAN and FRANCINAS BURDETT

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FRANCINAS BURDETT talked freely to A-

gent with practically no prompting, and her statement in material substance is as follows: B7C

That some time in the spring or summer of 1921 she was living at Hominy, Okla. and playing the piano at picture shows there; that she was acquainted with ANNA RIDDIE, LOUIS COPPERFIELD, LOUIS HOKOSHE, and others, living at Hominy. That COPPERFIELD and HOKOSHE are full-black owage Indians.

That about 9:15 to 9:30 P. M. one night in the spring or 1921 she came directly home from the theater where she was playing the little one-roomed house she and had rented in the rear of MISS JONES house at Hominy, and having done a washing that day and being very tired, had disrobed and had donned her nightgown immediately. then heard someone her breathing very heavily and loudly outside her door about 9:30 P. M. and opening the door, found LOUIS OPPERFIELD 17 ing on her front porch, or against it. That LOUIS COPPERFIELD was very Edrunk and mumbling: that she went to him and helped him up and that she waw that his coat was off and his shirt sleeves were torn and his shirt That his shirt on the breast and arms wa was torn in other places. sovered with blood. That she took him into her house and tried to feed him a raw egg to sober him, but he was so drunk that he dropped the egg en the floor. That she then thought to give him some fresh milk, which she did, and that the then proceeded to tell her of a terrible fight he and LOUIS HOKOSHE had had in a field that night with some other In-That COPPERFIELD kept glancing at the blood on his person and dians. shuddering, and repeating what a terrible fight it had been.

also noticed that he had either in his hand or had gotten it out of his pocket an open pocket knife with a rather long blade, and that this knife and blade were all covered with blood.

That COPPERFIELD told her that a big bunch, including himself and LOUIS HOKOSHE, had been drinking at Wynona, Okla. that evening, and had gone to a field where they all had a fight, and that he told her that LOUIS HOKOSHE, who was her sweetheart, then, wanted to see her.

She stated that she did not know how COPPERFIELD had gotten to her house, but that after a little he walked off in his shirt sleeves, and without his hat, stating that he had lost his hat somewhere, but that he walked off by himself and that she positively did not phone his folks to come and get him, and that MRS. JONES, her landlady, was not home that night.

She stated further that she sat there in her nightgown on the front steps in a sort of trance for possibly hours and then went to bed, but that LOUIS HOKOSHR did not come to see her that night.

That the next day LOUIS HOKOSHE came to see her, and he also told her that he and COPPERFIEID and some others had all gotten drunk on chocat Wynona the night before, and had gone out and had had a fight. That they drove out to a friend in some cars where they had another big fight; that HOKOSHE stated that they struck COPPERFIEID, and he wanted to help COPPERFIEID, but that a big fat Indian woman he had with him kept him from getting out of the car.

In response to questions, FRANCINAS BURDETT stated that she is positive that nothing was said by COPPERFIELD or HOKOSHE about anyone having a gun that night or any shooting having been done, and that neither one of them mentioned that anybody had been killed, and that COPPERFIELD and MCKOSHE with knew CHARLIE WHITEHORM, but neither one of them mentical his name or the name of CHARLIE in connection with this fight and neither one indicated in any way that WHITEHORM was in the bunch or had been seen at all that night.

FRANCINAS BURDETT furnished the further information that she is now staying with MRS. BENSON, and that she, FRANCINAS, has filed a breach of promise suit against an Indian named FRY at Pawhuska for \$35,000.00 damages; that her lawyers are TILIMAN & TILIMAN, at Pawhuska.

Agent made notes of what FRANCINAS BURDETT stated, but did not get a signed statement from her at the time, as Agent places absolutely

no confidence whatever in her statement, except that perhaps it is true that LOUIS COPPERFIELD was drunk in her yard one night.

In response to further questioning by Agent, FRANCINAS states that she knows ED SNYDER, formerly guardian of LOUIS RIDDLE. ANNA RIDDLE'S half brother, and that SNYDER lives in the 500 block on Bast Main.

FRANCINAS states that she has never discussed this case with said SETLER, and intimated that she had not taked to SNYDER for a long time.

SNYDER stated to gent that he has seen and talked to FRANCINAS three or four times recently, but on another matter. That FRANCINAS to told him of being called about a week ago FRANCINAS Room 207, Worten Blag., Pawhuska [where Agent makes headquarters at Pawhuska with JOHN MORAN.]

MR. SNYDER stated further that he never at any time discussed this WHITHORN murder with FRANCINAS, but that he was very giad to tell Agent all that he. SNYDER, knows about the facts, as he learned them from ANNA RIDDLE. MR. SNYDER then related as follows:

That about two years ago he was the guardien for LOUIS RIDDIA. whe is a half-blood Osage Indian, and a half-brother to ANNA RIDDIE; that ANNA RIDDIE was then fifteen years of age, and living at Hominy, Okla.

That about two years ago LOUIS RIDDLE and wife and ANNA RIDDLE, the latter carrying a little black Indian ball, all came together to SNYDER'S house in Pawhuska; that MRS. LOUIS RIDDLE, now dead, then told SNYDER that ANNA RIDDLE wanted help.

That ANHA RIDDLE then explained that her little baby was a child by FRANK COPPERFIELD (a full-blood Osage Indian, brother to LOUIS COPPERFIELD) and that she and FRANK COPPERFIELD had been living together as man and wife until FRANK had died; that FRANK'S estate had been inherited or would be by his mother and brother, LOUIS COPPERFIELD, and that that they refused to let her, ANNA, or the baby share the estate.

MR. SNYDER states that ANNA RIDDLE then related that LOUIS COPPER-PIELS 1121ed CHARLIE WHITEHORE, and stated that she knew this because about a week before WHITEHORN'S body was found near rawhuska she saw LOUIS COPPERFIELD at Hominy, Okla., where he lived at the time

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er he was going

with his fells, and that that afternoon LOUIS had told her he was going to pawhuska to get some whiskey, and she saw him leave Pawhuska for weminy.

That ANNA stated further that LOUIS COPPERFIELD'S mother lived bout a block from the RIDDLE home in Hominy at the time, and that that same night, about midnight or after, she, ANNA, beard a scream ind MRS COPPERFIELD came over and got her, ANNA, to go to the COPPERFIELD home, where LOUIS COPPERFIELD was lying drunk, in the front yard: that WRS COPPERFIELD told her that LOUIS had been brought home drunk by some other persons; that ANNA and MRS. COPPERFIELD helped LOUIS into the house, and she, ANNA, saw that LOUIS had blood on him; that LOUIS kept saying he felt worse that he had ever felt in his life, because he had killed his best friend, CHARLIE THITMEORN, in a fight over the wriskey; that LOUIS stated that he had killed CHARLIE accidentally in a fight.

MR. SKYDER stated further that ANNA stated further that she lad never told anyone about this, although the officers had questioned here but that she hald thought that LOUIS and his mother ought to let here and her baby have the FRANK COPPERFIELD estate (worth about \$110,000.00 besides the land) and that she, ANNA, wanted SMYDER to help her said.

SNYDER states that AYMA was then visiting her said half-brother, LOUIS RIDDLE, and SNYDER told the RIDDLES he would be out to see them the next day.

SWIDER stated further that he then consulted A. W. WIDE.

SNYDER states that neither ANNA RIDDLE nor her nor anyone else mentioned that it was CHARLIE WHITHORN that LOUIS COPPERFIELD had killed.

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SHYDER states that the upshot of this conference between his and WIDDOWS and the RIDDLES was that an agreement was entered into to the effect that they. SNYDER and WIDDOWS, would try to get the FRAME COPPER FIELD estate for ANNA RIDDLE and her baby by having LOUIS COPPER FIELD get his mother to agree, and that this would be done by putting the COPPERFIFLES under pressure of what ANNA RIDDLE knew against LOUIS regarding the murder of CHARLIE WHITEHORE.

ED SNYDER states that by the agreement he and WIDDOWS were to get fifty percent of what they succeeded in getting from the COPPERFIEEDS.

MR. SNYDER states that pursuant to this agreement, WIDDOWS and the Probate Judge at Pawhuska at that time, to have him approve his contract, as ANNA RIDDIE was then but fifteen years cld. Let the them probate Judge, according to what WIDDOWS said, would not obtain the fifty percent fee; that later another Probate Judge named JUSTICE who is still Probate Judge, at Pawhuska, succeeded to the office, and that Judge JUSTICE did approve the fifty percent fee contract.

MR. SNYDER was careful to state that neither of said judges was informed by SNYDER or WIDDOWS of the information ANNA RIDDLE had agains COPPERFIELD, and that COPPERFIELD had killed CHARLE WHITELO

MR. SHYDER stated further that MR. WIDECUS planned to protest the protest of FRANK COPPERFIELD'S estate in the event they shall the

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settlement out of LOUIS COPPERFIELD in the murder trial to force the COPPERFIELDS to a settlement.

MR. SNYDER stated that ANNA'S baby died shortly thereafter (at seven months of age) and nothing has yet come of the deal. That in fact he does not believe any papers were ever filed in the case in court by WIDDOWS. (The real fact is that ANNA RIDDLE at that time had a lawful living husband named SILVERNAIL at Hominy, and therefore could not have entered into any marriage contract with FRANK COPPERFIELD.)

In enswer to questions by Agent, MR. SHYDER stated that neither he mor MR. WIDDOWS had ever communicated any of the evidence or information regarding the WHITEHORN murder to any officer or official at pawhusks, and in fast have not communicated it to anyone until he, SHYDER, teld HARVE PREESE about it a long time later.

That HARVE FREESE was telling him, SNYIER, that he, FREESE, was convinced that HATTIE WHITEHORN had killed CHARLIE WHITEHORN and was going to mend DICK WALLACE to Arkansas City on the ease; that FREESE said there was a \$10,000.00 reward for the conviction of the murderer of CHARLIE WHITEHORE.

MR. STYDER states that he then told MR. FREEZE that HATTIE WHITE-MORE was not the guilty one, but that Louis Copperficie was, and he, STYDER, told FREEZE what ANNA RIDDLE had told him, SNYIER; that FREEZE then remarked that he would have DICK WALLACE work with him and brought DICK WALLACE down to SHYIER'S home where SNYDER again told the story to HARVE TAXABLE, and DICK WALLACE.

The Office Vallace stated that he knew a woman, FRANCINAS, who could not this of LOUIS COPPERFIELD by getting him trunk, and that he would not this woman for this purpose. The STIDER said that DICK

COP-PERFIELD who called her that night, and that FRANCINAS name was never mentioned until about a year ago, and that he, SNYDER, never had any information that FRANCINAS BURDETT knew anything personally at all about the murder or was present when LOUIS COPPERFIELD was drunk that night.

FRANCINAS BURDETT'S story is that LOUIS COPPERFIELD was found drunk by her in her yard, and that neither ANNA RIDDLE nor any other person was present with her at the time that night.

the reports periodically to Mr. Short: First, Mr. Short stated that he was very busy and that he would prefer that the investigation proceed as we saw fit until some one or more of the investigations was completed, and that when the United States Attorney for the Western District of Oklahoma was satisfied that we had a case ready for prosecution, that he would at that time assign an Assistant Attorney General to prosecute the case.

Second, as stated above.
