As Agent T. F. Weiss has been engaged on these cases, which inelude the murders of W. D. SHITH, MRS. W. B. SHITH, CETTLE BROOK-CHIRE. CHARLES WITCHFORN, REMNY ROAN and ANNA BROWN for about two months actual time, and Agt. J. R. Burger is and has been, since Dec. 15th working in conjunction with Mr. Weiss, this report is made by Lgt. Weiss as a joint report and a digest of all the important evidence as to the murder of AINL BROWN in particular, secured to date. This digest is made because the reports by Agents C. T. Weshley, T. F. Weisand J. R. Burger in the past have always covered the results in all of said investigations, and are therefore voluminous, full of information that is not strictly essential at this time, and involving all the mur-COOK II DO NOT WRITE IN THESE SPACES ders. murder evidence in the ANNA BROWN only, and even that in as brief a form as is possible.

Will testify that for some time revious to May M1, 1821 she lived in Fairfax, just across the alley from AMA DROMM'S hone; that she had been employed at different times by AMA ROWM to do sewing and housework, knew AMA BROWK well, and was on friendly terms with her; that AMMA, shortly before said date, had had staying with AMMA, at AMMA'S house, one RETTH DAVIS, whom AMMA had a sort of combination friend, servant and parasite: that AMMA often quarreled at EDITH DAVIS, and talked very insultingly to her, which EDITH did not apparently resent greatly, probably because EPITH was "sponging" on AMMA and living on her.

ARS. SITTERLY will testify that on the morning of Hay 21, 1921 ATTLE BROWN calle to MRI. SITTHRIY'S house and woke her about 5 m. m.; that she got up and went with ATTL to ATTLES house with ATTLE: ANNA stated she had just got in to pairfax, and was afraid to go into her house alone, and asked IRO. ATTIREM to go in with her and get her breakfast help her aress, etc.; that ANNA was arinking, which was a common thing with AMA, as AMA drank a lot of whiterey and was of very loose morals with white men who had whisley, etc.: that MMD. BITTEMEN helped ANDA bathe and dress and got her breakfast; that shortly before 8 A. M. ANYA was called to the phone and told in . TITIZZEY that it was ERIEST BURNARY calling her from his home at Orayhorse, and telling her that her mother (LIMBIE "4", who lived at that time with her daughter, MRS. ERVEST BURNELRY) wanted her, AFFE, to cons out there, as said mother was very ill; that ATTA then called a taxi driver of Fuirfax, named BOB CARTER, and had him come at 8 A. M. and get her, And, and drive her to graphorse to see her mother. Graphorse is about four miles from Puirfax.); that now C. Rows case and got Arms about 8 A. M. and left with her for Grayhorse; that MM. GITTWILY helped

had with her a rather large handbag, a quart of corn whishey, some quilts a small bundle of clothes, and wore red house shoes; that LRE. SITTERLY worked at ANNA'S house till about ten that morning, and made all the beds, cleaned all the rooms, washed the dishes and put the house in clean and complete order all over, and left some of the windows open for fresh air.

Pairfax they entered Ann.'S house with a key IMS. SMITH had, and that IMM. SITTERLY found the house in precisely the same ship shape she had left it the preceding Saturday after ANNA had left; that no heds, dishese etc. had been used, the windows were still raised, but that lying on a table in the front room was the handbag ANNA had taken away with her that morning she went to Grayhorse, but with the whiskey bottle and some toilet articles missing, and that lying over the back of a clair in the front room were the two quilts ANNA had taken when she left for Grayhorse that Priday morning. All of which indicated to MRS. SITTERING that ANNA, or someone had just stapled into ANNA'S house, left these articles there, and had gone almost immediately out. (IMS. SITTERING



is outspoken in her belief that Bynin Tymring (illed invi.)

BIE CARTUR, taxi man, Fairfax, will testify that ie was called by ANNA and got her and took her to Grayhorse that morning, and that ANNA had a round quart bottle full of corn whiskey in her handbag, and offered him a drink, which he refused; that ANNA took a drink or two herself; that he left her out of the car at ERNEST BURKHART'S home at Grayhorse about 8:30 that morning, and never saw her alive again. (CARTURE is also convinced that BRYANZ BURKHART killed ANNA.)

IRT. MARTER UPRIGHT DOTY, who now lives five miles west of yale. Okla., will testify that she went to work as a domestic for it. and it. ERNEST BURNARD at Grayhorse, about May 17th, 1921; that the family there then consisted of IR. and IRB. EREST BUREART, their two children MRS. LIEVIE Q, who was the mother of ANNA, and of MRS. ERMEST or MOLLIE BYPYFARY, and BRYAN and DITE BURNHARD: that LIZUID Q was an old Indian. sick abed; that BOB CARTER brought ANNA BROWN to the house that mornium; that ATTA had a big bottle of whishey and was drinking, and quarried during the day with her mother, her siexter MOLLIE, and BREAR STRIBLER; that All A spent much of the day sulking in the summer house at ERIEST BURNHARTS with her whishey; that AMA told MARTHA that she, AMA, was jeslous of BNYAM, and would kill any woman she caught flirting with him: that BRYAN told HARTMA that ANNA had threatened to kill him unless he married her, and he was going to beat her to it; that IMS. BRIDGES, the BURNHARTS aunt (a sister to BILL HALE) was also there that day, and making very uncomplimentary remarks about Indians, and her nephews having married Indians.

MRS. MARTHA DOTY will testify that about 2 or 2 P. M. all the BUAL-HART men took the children and went to a horserace at Grayhorse, and did not return till about 5:30 or 6 P. M.; that MRS. BRIDGES returned home

to grayhorse that evening before supper "some way". That ANNA was at the KRNEST BURKHART home all that day; that supper was had about 6 or 6:30 p. M. and all the BURKHART men were present and ate. but ANNA BROWN remained in the summer house, and sulken, and refused to eat; that about 7 P. M. the BURKHART men all left, and ANNA left with them; that they drove two cars, a Ford touring car and a Buick touring car. but she, MARTHA, did not notice who was driving, or riding in each car, nor watch to see where the ears went after leaving the house, but is positive that ANNA BROWN, BRYAN BURKHART and KRNEST BURKHART all left together in the two cars, and that it was just sundown, and that ANNA had been at the ERNEST BURKHART home all that day until she left about 7 or 7:30 that evening with BRYAN and ERNEST BURKHART in the cars; that MRS. RRNEST BURKHART. LIZZIE Q. the children and herself remained at the house: that about dark, about 9 P. M. MR. and MRS. FRED and NORA BENNE came by the BURKHART home, and got MARTHA and her suitcase; that she went to a dance with the BENNE'S that night, and never returned to ER-NEST BURKHARTS to work, as they drank too much, and she was afraid of the men, anyway.

(MRS. MARTHA UPRIGHT DOTY will have to be interviewed further by Agents. After getting the above facts and later, we learn that MRS. FRED BENNE was at ERNEST BURKHART'S twice that day, FRED BENNE once, and ELLA HALLET once.)

MRS. NORA BENNE, now of Bartlesville, Okla., will testify that she and her husband, FRED BENNE, were living a few milesm northeast of Grayhorse in the spring of 1921; that she has known the BURKHARTS well since before that time; that on the Saturday in May (May 21, 1921) that ANNA BROWN was last visiting at KRNEST BURKHART'S at Grayhorse, she, MRS. BENNE, was at his home in Grayhorse, in order to have a short



wisit with Martha Upright, nee Brookshire, now Mrs. Doty; that Mrs. Benne called at Ernest Burkhart's place in the late afternoon and talked with Martha Doty and Anna Brown, visiting perhaps half hour or more; that Anna was in the summer house, with a round, qt. bottle of corn whiskey about wiff maping three-fourths empty; that Anna was in a bad humor, slightly drunk, but not very drunk; that Anna offered MRS. BEENE a drink, stating that she, Anna, could not take it back to Fairfax with her or Sam Tulk would get her. MRS. BENNE states that it was about 4:30 or 5 p. M. that she left BURKHART'S to go on home, do her own evening chores and get her husband to come back with her in the car and get MARTHA at ERNEST BURKHART'S that night and take her with them to the dance, as she and MARTHA had agreed upon while talking at BURKHART'S that afternoon.

MRS. NORA BENNE will testify that when she first arrived at BURK-HART'S that afternoon, none of the men were there, but had gone to a horserace, so she was informed, at Grayhorse; that no men was at the home at the time, but LIZZIE "Q" was there sick abed, and MRS. ERWEST BURKHART, and BURKHART'S aunt, MRS. MERKE, we that the said aunt returned to Fairfax zbout 4:30 P. M. while MRS. BENNE was still there, but ANNA BROWN remained in the summer house, and will was still there when MRS. BENNE LEFT, some minutes later. (MRS. BENNE is somewhat confused, and stated to Agent that her recollection was that BRYAN BURKHART drove said sunt to Fairfax in a Ford ear that afternoon, but that she is sure ANNA BROWN did not go either with BRYAN BURKHART or the aunt, but was still in the summer house, grumbling, when MRS. BENNE went on home, about 5 P. M.)

NORA BENNE will testify further that she and her husband returned to ERNEST BURKHART'S that night, about dark, and got MARTHA and her suitcase, and took MARTHA to a dance, and a day or two later returned

with MARTHA to BURKHART'S to get some clothes MARTHA had forgotten; that MARTHA told MRS. BENNE that afternoon that she, MARTHA, was not coming back to BURKHARTS to work, as there was too much drinking and quarrelling, and she was afraid of the BURKHART men. (MRS. BENNE was also somewhat confused in her memory of this second trip to BURKHART'S that night as she stated that BRYAN BURKHART was there at that time, and carried MARTHA'S suitcase out to the ear. Agents did not know that MRS. BENNE had ever been interviewed before, but were informed later by BILL BRACK-BTT who worked some months on this case for GUSTAFSON and MORAN that he. BRACKETT and JEFF HUTCHINSON had interviewed MRS. BENNE thoroughly in June, 1921, and that MRS. BENNE at that time stated that none of the BURKHART men hadk been at the house while she was there that afternoon and that none of them except DUKE BURKHART were there that night, and that the TRNEST BURKHART Buick touring car was not there. MRS. BENNE told Agents that she is convinced that BRYAN BURKHART killed ANNA BROWN as she knows he did not take ANNA home that afternoon like he swore at the inquest he did. In the light of what Agents have since learned from BILL BRACKETT, who is reliable, it will be necessary to confront MR. and MRS. BENNE with their fresh and former statements, and ascertain the truth. FRED BENNE has always been reported as crocked, and friendly to the HALE- BURKHARTS, but he stated positively that he is convinced that BRYAN BURKHART killed ANNA BROWN. MARTHA UPRIGHT DOTY declared this to be her conviction, also.)

I. R. HEDGES, Ralston, Okla., ED HAINEY, Ralston, and JOE McGUIRE now of Okmulgee, Okla., will all testify that just as it was getting dusk Saturday, May 21, 1921, they and FRED WHEELER and T. B. JONES were in a group on the sidwalk at the south side of the Jones Hotel at Ralston, when BRYAN BURKHART and ANNA BROWN drove up from the east in

a Buick touring car; that the ear stopped within twelve feet or less of them, and Anna Brown called out, "Helle, Joe" and JOE McGUIRE replied, "Helle, Annie"; that Anna then stated she was hungry and WHEELER or one of them, directed her and Bryan Burkhart to McSPADDEN'S cafe, about 100 feet west; that Burkhart and Anna them drove on west, pulled up to the curb at McSpadden's cafe and Bryan Burkhart got out of the ear, went into the restaurant; that after a few minutes Jones started to the car to talk to Burkhart and Anna, but Bryan came out of the cafe with a small package in his hand, got into the ear and drove off just before JONES got to the ear. (JONES stated that as he had sold them whiskey before, he suspected Anna and Bryan were after whiskey, and he, WHERLER went to the ear to see, or rather started.)

MR. HEDGES, MR. HAINEY and Mr. MCGUIRE will all testify that they had known ANNA BROWN and BRYAN BURKHART well and personally for years before this occurrence, and that they are positive of the identity as stated above. Also that ANNA and BRYAN BURKHART drove on west after leaving the restaurant that evening, for several blocks, at least.

each one stated his firm conviction that BRYAN BURKHART Murdered ANNA BROWN, and that they are sure he perjured himself when he swore before the coroner's inquest at Fairfax (May 28, 1921) that he had left ANNA BROWN safely at her home in Fairfax between 4:30 and 5 P. M. that afternoon, and had not seen her alive afterward.)

T. S. JONES is now dead. FRED or SHORTY WHEELER is a drug addict, unreliable, transitory, and his present address unknown, but he will not be needed, anyway.

HARTY LUNTZEE, torpedo man, Pawhuska, Okla., stated that on that Saturday night (May 21, 1921) he was on his way from shooting a well

west of Ralston to Pawhuska; that just out of Ralston he had tire trouble and was delayed; that about 9 P. M. he saw a vacant Buick touring car standing at the side of the road, about two miles east of Ralston, on the road from Ralston to Fairfax and Grayhorse; that he stopped his car and looked into the vacant car, and saw a woman's shoe, and shawl or apron. When recently interviewed by Agent LUNTZ did not mention seeing the shoe and shawl, and talked rather irresponsibly, but he will be o. K. when his memory is refreshed.

Agents made personal investigation and ascertained that it would have been a very easy thing for BRYAN BURKHART and ANNA BROWN to have arrived at the place where LUNTZ saw the vacant Buick, within twenty minutes after they left McSpadden's restaurant, as all they had to do was to drive several blocks west, turn south a few blocks, then east a few blocks, then north a few blocks, and come back into the Ralston read back to Grayhorse and Fairfax, without passing by the Jones Hotel where HEDGES, HAINEY, MCGUIRE and the others saw and talked to them. This not only explains how ANNA and BRYAN got back to where LUNTZ saw their ear, but also explains how ERYAN could have gotten back m to Grayhorse with ANNA to borrow HAL GOODE'S gur from JOHN CLAREMORE late that night as will be shown later herein.

Confidential informant, whose name and address will be furnished at proper time, will testify that he was an operative for a private detective agency in June and July, 1921; that as such he was employed by ERNEST and BRYAN BURKHART, late in June or early in July, 1921, to get evidence for what they termed BRYAN'S alibi in this case; that BRYAN BURKHART then explained to informant that he, BRYAN, had to get evidence to show innocence of killing ANNA BROWN; that BRYAN then went on to state that he had testified at the inquest that he had taken when when

to her home that day at 4 or 5 P. M., but that this was not true, and that MRS. JAMES (MRS. GEO. JAMES of Fairfax) had seen him, BRYAM, with ANNA BROWN on ANNA'S porch at her home, about 3 A. M. Sunday after the Saturday he had claimed to have left ANNA at her house; that BRYAM stated further to informant that other people had also seen him, BRYAM, with ANNA that night, and he, BRYAM, had to get evidence to overcome this. "an alibi".

Informant stated, and will testify, that BRYAN then told informant that BRYAN had not taken ANNA BROWN home that Saturday, but had taken he from grayhorse to Ralston in ERNEST BURKHART'S touring car, and that some people at Ralston had seen him and ANNA at Ralston, about dark, that might; that BRYAN stated further that after he left Ralston that night with ANNA BROWN they drove on due west out of Ralston to the Arkansas River bridge; that they turned north, crossed the said bridge. drove a couple of miles on north to a joint, where they got some whiskey; that he, BRYAN, left this joint in ERNEST'S Buick ear and with his uncle. J. L. BRIDGES, drove on north and west, passing through Burbank okla. and driving to PAUL JOHE'S Joint, about two miles east and one morth of Burbank; that BRYAN stated that he and his uncle BRIDGES arrived at JOHES joint about 11 P. M. that Saturday and found ANNA BROWN with another woman (KDITH DAVIS) and a man or two there; that is, that BRYAN stated to informant that at JOHNS joint, BRYAN, BRIDGES, ANNA BROWN RDITH DAVIS and enother man (name never given) made up a party. that, with others, stayed at JOHNS' joint, drinking whiskey until about 1:30 Sunday morning; that BRYAN stated further that when this party left JOHNS joint BRYAH, ANNA BROWN and BRIDGES rode in the BURKHARE Buick and EDITH DAVIS and the other man rode in a Ford towing car: that both ears left JOHNS at the same time, the Ford following the

Buick, and grove to LEE MORGAN'S joint, about a mile south and on the road back to Fairfax and Grayhorse; that both ears stopped at LEE MORGANS and the occupants got some more whiskey, but did not get out of the ears; that they all left LEE MORGAN'S about 2 A. M. and drove south on the Fairfax road, the Ford following with EDITH DAVIS and her man; that about a mile north of Fairfax, where the road forks, BRYAN took the right hand road into Fairfax with ANNA BROWN, while the Ford with EDITH DAVIS and her man took the left hand road that goes towards Grayhorse and Pawhasks; that BRYAN stated he had then taken ANNA BROWN home, arriving there about 3 A. M.

Informant states that BRYAN further stated that he, BRYAN, did not get home at ERNEST BURKHART'S at Grayhorse, only four miles from Fairfax, until AFTER daylight, and that BRYAN stated that a man at Grayhorse, who knew him well, saw him just getting home, but that he, BRYAN felt sure he could fix this man so he would not tell, as the man was a friend of his, and informant need not see that man. (This man's name or identity was never given, either, by BRYAN.)

Informant states that BRYAN BURNFART gave informant to understand that his business was to see the persons BRYAN directed him to see, and who had all been prepared beforehand, and get statements, signed, from them, in accordance with BRYAN'S story, but that BRYAN denied that he had killed ANNA BROWN, but indicated that it was understood by informart that of course he had.

Informant states that BRYAN was very vague about the joint north of the bridge, and did not mention how ANNA BROWN got from that joint to PAUL JOHNS, nor how BRIDGES came to join BRYAN there, nor who else was there, nor with whom ANNA BROWN went from there, and did not give the name of the joint keeper, nor any names at all, except BRIDGES and

ANNA BROWN and himself as being at that joint. Informant stated that he has always been convinced that ANNA BROWN and BRYAN did not go to that particular joint at all. if there was in fact any such joint there.

Informant states that BRYAN BURKHART drove him to Burbank, and there introduced him to EDITH DAVIS, who was evidently expecting it; that BRYAN also drove informant to PAUL JOHNS and IRR MORGAN'S, and introduced them, and that they were evidently expecting it. Informant states that one ROBERT J. EWING, then doing some other detective work. was present, and heard much of BRYAN'S Statements to informant, and can corretorate informant, if necessary.

Informant states that he interviewed EDITH DAVIS, IRR MORGAN and PAUL JOHNS and wife, and that each made written statements in accordance with BRYAN BURKHART'S story to informant; that, in addition, PAUL JOENS remarked that BRYAN BURKHART made one big mistake when he took ANNA BROWN into his car with him that night at JOHNS joint, as several people besides he and his wife had seen him do it, and that JOHNS was convinced BRYAN had killed ANNA BROWN that might. That IRE MORGAN stated that mone of the party had gotten out of their two cars had him bring them whiskey to the ears in pop bottles, which they grank

Informant states that he made written reports along with the statements he took from these people, and that they were filed with the agency for which me was working at the time. This last December we had informant search said files, and make discreet inquiry, and he reports that said reports are not in said files, but are said to have been destroyed, because of being so old.

In December, 1923, we also had informant reinterview RDITH IMVIS, at 40 E. Yorktown, Tulsa, where she is now living, and he reports that she recognized him, and he recognized her: that she admitted her identity

and statements to him, but was unwilling to talk on the subject, and declined to tell him the name of the man she claims to have ridden with in the Ford ear that night.

that she had ever met, or known BRYAN BURKHART, and declared she had not seen ANNA BROWN since the Friday night before the murder, and that that was at Pawhuska, at which time she and ANNA had quarreled and parted; ANNA going on to Fairfax, where they had all started, and EDITH DAVIS returning to Pawhuska, so she claimed. Agent noted at the time, however, that EDITH DAVIS kept laughting to herself, and was convinced that she was not telling the truth, but was concealing some facts in her possession.

ever, know her to be a sport, and what is called in Osage County a "potlicker", one who associates with the Indians as a sort of parasite or "sponger".

Informant also made a trip to Pairfax for us in December but reports that he was unable to get BRYAN BURKHART to discuss the case at
all, but that a certain person, close to BRYAN BURKHART, is working
with informant, and on Jan. 7th we received a letter from informant
that he would furnish in a few days information that will complete the
evidence.

MRS. GRO. JAMES, Fairfax, will testify that about S.A.M. that Sunday morning, she was awake, worrying because her husband had not come home that nig t; that she had known ANNA BROWN and BRYAN BURKHART well for a number—years; that she lived a short block due south of ANNA BROWN'S home s—block due north of the main road at the south side of Fairfax, f.—Fairfax to Grayhorse and Ralston; that about S.A. that Sunday she saw the lights of a big car stopped on said road just south of her house, and heard a man and woman's voices; that the man exclaimed. "Stop your foolishness, Annie, and get into this car" and a woman's voice answered, but was unintelligible; that in a few minutes the car drove on west a block, turned north for two blocks, and then east a block, and then turned south, with the lights directly toward MRS. JAMES. and stopped at the sidewalk in front of ANNA BROWN'S house; that ANNA BROWN and BRYAN BURKHART got out of the car, and walked up on ANNA'S front porch, where an electric light was burning; that they stopped at ANNA'S front door, and she, MRS. JAMES, recognized ANNA BROWN and BRYAN BURKHART as being the two persons on the porch, and that had just come up from where they had been stopped in the road south of her house. (This MRS. GEO: JAMES is a woman of the best of reputation and her husband is said to be above the average, and both are convinced that BRYAN BURKHART committed this murder. MRS. JAMES has been interviewed by so many detectives and investigators, etc., that she has recently been quoted as saying that she is not positive it was BRYAN BURK-HART that she saw that morning, but Agents are very reliably informed that she will testify that she was certain at the time, and still is certain in her own mind, but that, of course, it is possible she might have been mistaken, but does not believe she was, but is convinced it was BRYAN BURNHART, as she knew him well, and saw him plainly, and right in the light of the porchlight, and with a clear view a short distance away, possibly 250 feet. BRYAN BURKHART also told confidential informant that MRS. JAMES saw him, BRYAN, and that that was one of the reasons he, BRYAN, had to change his story.)

Andy Smith, ONA SMITH and I. L. ELISWORM of Fairfax will testify that while hunting on Three Mile Creek on May 27, 1921 they discovered an Indian woman's dead body, badly decomposed, at the head of a branch of Three Mile Creek, and about three miles northeast of Fairfax; that they went to an Fairfax and reported their discovery to MR. TURBIN. an undertaker, and took him and others back that same day and showed them where the body was.

MR. TURDIN, undertaker, Phirfax, will testify to being shown the body at the spot mentioned, and further that he examined the surrounding carefully, noted the position of the body and the condition and position of the clothes, and is firmly convinced that ANNA EROWN was sitting just where her body was found when she was shot, as the clothes were not disarranged in the least, etc. and the arms in a natural position; that the body was decomposed and swollen in almost to the point of bursting and very malodorous; that because of these things he carefully removed

the body to the top of the bank, placed it in a box filled with ice and salt, and allowed it to freeze that night in order that it be better prepared for burial; that MRS. BILL SMITH, MRS. ANNA SITTERLY and others identified the hody as that of ANNA BROWN: that while preparing the body the skin of the scalp Slipped and disclosed a Small bullet hole back of the head; that DRS. D. A. and J. G. SHOUM, of Fairfax, perfor a rude autopsy in a search for the bullet, and did so by sawing the skull in halves, from front to back, then removing the brain, spreading it on a board, and searching for the bullet by taking sticks and f ing in the brain mass. MR. TURDIN states that no bullet was ever found; that the brain was not preserved; and the body was prepared for burial at that spot and taken direct to the grave, from there; that under the circumstances it is very probable that the bullet was present. but discovered, and probably lost with the brain, or by dropping out in the process of search, without being noticed. That a round, quart whiskey bottle, with about an inch of corn whiskey in the bottom, was lying near the body on the ground.

left half of said skull, which half contains the bullet hole. We examined this earefully, and find that the hole is undoubtedly a bullet holie, made by a .52 calibre gun at least it is smaller than a .58, and larger than a .25. By inserting a pencil of right diameter it clearly shows that the bullet entered the head about an inch below the "crown" and half an inch from the medial line, on left side, and ranged downward at an angle of about 50 degrees, and slightly to the left, so that it would have struck the floor of the brain cavity, if not deflected, or embedded in the brain. There is no indication that it passed through the brain, and reached the floor of the cavity, no marks, chips er

fractures, so that it is almost a certainty that it was fired from a chap gen of low velocity and lodged in the brain mass. The hole is a clear out perforation. MR. TURDIN will produce this exhibit whenever called upon, and has promised to keep it in his safe.

DR. J. G. SHOUN stated to us that the search by himself and brother was made in the time, place and manner as related by MR. TURDIN, and that it was very possible, in fact probable that they lost or overlooked the bullet.

How as to motive. MARTHA UPRIGHT DOT can testify as to the fact that ANNA was jealous of BRYAN BURKHART, and that BRYAN told MRS. DOTY that ANNA had threatened to kill him if he did not marry her, but he was going to heat her to it, etc.

MRS. ANNA SITTERLY can testify that BILL HALE had been intimate with ANNA BROWN for years, and she was boasting publicly of the fact, to HALE'S dislike, since he became a man of some prominence, and with a family. MRS. BRIDGES, aunt, also according to MRS. DOTY and MRS. BENNEW bitterly opposed to her nephews, the BURKHARTS, marrying Indian women, for whom MRS. BRIDGES expressed the greatest of contempt.

D. E. JOHNSON, attorney, and has brother, CHARLES, and the court records in re. estate of ANNA BROWN will show another motive in that ANNA BROWN'S death was calculated to enright the KRUEST BURKHART family to the extent of ever \$50,000.00.

CONSTOCK states that they have thus far refused to do so, and that MANDY and MARY have even refused to talk to him on the subject. Of course, these women are fearful of their own safety, and even if they know what MOL-LIE MERCER states they know, would be very hard to make tell. MOLLIE MRRCER, herself, is reported to be refusing to talk direct to Agents, so that we can hardly understand what the play is. Howayer. to believe these women know about what they are reported to know. but are not satisfied in our own minds what influences are keeping them from telling direct to agents.

PAUL JOHNS and LEE MORGAN left this county in August and October.

These ladies, however, both stated that they do not believe House knows anything about said murder, as she has never told them she did but has always insisted to them that

COMSTOCK that he, FAULKNER, knew a lot he had never told about HATTIE'S connection with her husband's murder, and they had better he careful how they talked to him; that MRS. HENRY MCKINLEY had called FAULKNER a s. of a b. and defied him to tell anything and told him to be blackmailing HATTIE.

They state they now intend to bring HATTIE to her home at 624 to Chickasaw, Okla. City, and that MRS. CHAS. CHOUTEAU will stay there with her and care for her and keep FAULKNER away, and that they will try to induce HATTIE to tell all she knows to Agents.

These two ladies are married to two full blood Osage Indian has bands and have their homes at Fairfax, Okla. MR. CHOUTEAU was very friendly and frank, and promised readily to help Agents but MRS.

KINLEY stated she was fearful of her and family's lives at Fairfax, is cause of these many Indian murders. MRS. McKINLEY was very reticent but correctorated the foregoing when appealed to. She, however, det. to furnish information or assistance to Agents regarding the HENRY. W. R. SMITH, et als. murders at Fairfax, saying it was dangerous for her living at Fairfax.

We Agents proposed to these sisters that in view of the fact the HATTIE is incurably ill and diseased, and apparently cannot live many months, that HATTIE will be given full immunity from prosecution if will make a full and voluntary confession, in writing of all she know as to CHAS. WHITEHORN murder, and MRS. CHOUTEAU, promised to begin at once in a determined effort to have HATTIE do this before FAULKERR or someone else furnished the evidence and HATTIE could get no consider ation from us.

Jan. 2d Agents inquired at 624 W. Chicksaw and were advised that MRS. CHOUTEAU had gone to the hospital to see HATTIE (as per agreement Upon calling the hospital learned MRS. CHOUTEAU had been there and left we had to leave Okla. City but arranged with all persons concerned in MRS. CHOUTEAU or MRS. MCKINLEY to deal with Agent in Charge Findley In any emergency while we were absent.

Jan. 1st also interviewed J. J. FAULKNER, 628 W. Chickesaw, and grilled him severely. Agent Weiss has known FAULKNER personally and be reputation for several years as an unprincipled, hypocritical erect.

FAULKNER, when questioned by Agents as to his actions toward HATTIC, and in the CHAS. BALINTI, a half breed Cheyenne Indien, whose home at Calumet, Okla.; that CLARK and BALINTI went to Pawhuska and HATTI brought CHAS. WHITEHORN down from the house that night to CHARK are LINTI and left WHITEHORN with them and they took him away, as he had been to a ball game that day and was drunk, and murdered him.

FAULKNER stated positively that HATTIE has never admitted or comme fessed to him that she knew any of the facts as to who planned or committed the murder. FAULKNER declared his "belief" that HATTIE was not present when the murder was done, but planned it with CLARK and BALTER and they did the murder for HATTIE, in order that they would later share with her the money she would derive from WHITEHORN'S estate.

FAULKNER declared that BALINTI became a chauffeur for HATTIR Show ly afterward and that he. FAULKNER, believes HATTIE has been giving money to AMOS CLARK from time to time since.

That HATTIE told him. FAULKNER, that the night WHITEHORN appeared (May 14, 1921) she came down with him from the MINNIE SAVAGE house to the street at Pawhuska, and left him there, and he, FAULER figures she left him drunk with BALINTI and CLARK to kill.

It will be noted that FAULKNER related two distinct and contrare theories as to his "beliefs". He did not seem to note the contradiction. He was undoubtedly unnerved to learn that we had so much information regarding his actions in this case and playing for time. also took occasion to say that his wife, RUPHEMIA FAULKNER, is "world of every virtue or honor that a woman should haveg".

We are strongly of the belief that FAULKNER has successed in of taining some sort of confession from HATTIE, and is using it to make her do as he sees fit, by threatening her with prosecution and exposinher, and that his object is to gain control of her child and propert at her death, and get money from her while she lives. We also expect that the separation of FAULKNER and wife, and their proposed divorce is just a scheme between them that FAULKNER may be able to marry HATTIE and inherit part of her estate.

FAULKNER stated that he would see HATTIE at the hospital and nake an earnest effort to have her confess, but later the same day, FAULKNER, reported to Agent in Charge Findlay that he, FAULKNER, had seen HATTIE at the hospital, and HATTIE had declared she knew nothing about who committed the murder, and that he, FAULKNER, did not believe HATTIE had any knowledge of the murder.

BRACKETT stated today that when he talked to JOHN LITTLE SCIENT JOHN LITTLE STAR would not tell much (this was in 1921), and was in fear, but that LITTLE STAR did say that the Indians all knew that Brown and had not left her safe at her home in Fairfax at 5 P. M. as BRYAN BURKHART had sworn at the inquest.

MR. COMSTOCK also advised us by all means to see MR. COOK, banker at Fairfax, on this case, stating that MR. COOK will be of great as sistance, but not indicating in what particular way.

Jan. 3d. While interviewing FOSTER N. BURNS on a car case, suggested that as he had been employed in 1921 by the BURKHART-Half ment investigate the ANNA BROWN murder for them, that he, BURNS, might be able to be of some assistance to us, but BURNS declared he had not made or had made, any investigation in this case, and had no information on the subject. We know positively that FOSTER H. BURNS did work for the BURKHARTS on this case in 1921, but as he stood pat to us today, we changed the subject.

That GEO. JAMES, who lives on the south edge of Fairfax, by the road the car was on, stated to him, CROSSLAND, that he, GEO. JAMES, also saw and heard said car and saw said car go east a short distance, turn around and go out of sightx, going west at high speed, and later the same night TOM CORNELIUS, living about four males west of Fairfax, heard a high car passing his house, going west, at a high speed.

HENRY OATS, Fairfax, stated to us that he has learned through the bakers at Fairfax that one CORBETT who works at the city water pump station, Pairfax, stole the nitroglycerine that was used to blow SMITH's house up, from some oil company's camp; that CORBETT turned it over two men who did the job, and that these two men lived about twenty-first miles from Fairfax. (We have OATS fishing these bakers out cautiously. This information is consistent with the statement by JOHN THOMPSON, Osage Torpedo Co., Pawhuska, that a magazine of said company, located on the Schidell lease, three miles west and half a mile north of places was broken into by tearing off some boards, and that then querts off nitroglycerine stolen therefrom just a day or two before SMITH'S house was blown up.

This information is also consistent with the statements of GRO JAMES and TOM CORNELIUS that he saw a big car going west from Fairfage at a high rate of speed right after the SMITH explosion, as HEIR GRAMMIR'S ranch is about twenty-five miles northwest of Fairfax. and the road and direction JAMES and CORNELIUS saw the car teking was in direction of GRANNER'S ranch.

Dear Sirs: -

We are herewith furnishing a confidential report that is a digest of the evidence so far secured in re Wille of Anna Brown near Fairfax, Okla May 22, 1921.

We have marked this "Confidential" for the recton that we are firmly convinced that all our reports in these lasge Indian Murder cases should be kept out of any but confidential Government hands until our investigations are finished, as otherwise our our results and plans would be presented when the present the property made known, and our work hindered and probably made fruitless.

Another thing that we feel should be stated here in order that the Bureau may be fully advised is that these cases are extremely difficult and slow and tedious to solve bewause of the following facts: Two of the murders were committed in May, 1921-over two and one half years ago. The others were committed in January and March, 1923-nearly a year ago. Private detectives especially John A. Gustafson and his operatives, spent months in 1921 and '22 and '23, on the cases, and interviewed many people many times, and talked too freely of the information thus secured, with the result that many of those interviewed have become unfriendly or have lost confidence that anything will ever be done toward prosecution or both and are unwilling to talk now. Another: obstacle is that many of the important witnesses have left the country, leaving no address, and in some cases, as Lee Morgan and Paul Johns, as fugitives under criminal charges. The class of citizenship, in this county, in general is very low, owing to conditions of oil fields, graft, easy Indian's money, whiskey, gambling, prostitution and parasites, so that it is very difficult to locate those who have left.or to get the truth out of many that are found. Among the Indians Tear and distrust is almost universal, so that they are of a almost no use whatever, except in a very few instances.

As these murders are all violations of State law and no violation of Federal law is involved, we cannot get the benefit of Federal Grand Jury to force witnesses to tel

of the state authorities at Okla. Dity, charged with complicity in the murder of Paul McCarthy, attorney at Okla. Gity, about Nov 8, 1923. EMIGHT has confessed, implicating DAVIS as the instigator of the McCarthy murder, and Agent is confidentially informed that DAVIS has been positively identified as the man that phoned and lured McCarthy to the spot where he was murdered. KNIGHT and DAVIS are now enemies because DAVIS "squealed" in the McCarthy case, and it is hoped that they, one or both, will now tell the truth in the SMITH case. DAVIS and UNIGHTS had heretofore been very close associates and friends, and protected each other.

FIRTY WARD and FERRY CATS report to us that they have been informed that FRANK (or CHARLES) HIMBREE, at that time a truck driver for the Carroll Co. in the oil fields, near Fairfax, was coming into Fairfax the morning that the SMITH home was blown up; that UMITERE stated that his truck was out of order and he was stopped with it at a stone bridge about three miles southeast of Fairfax when he heard the explosion; that about three or four minutes later HEMBREE saw a big enclosed car approaching from the direction of Fairfax, "going like hell"; that HEMBREE states that as the car passed him he saw two men sitting on the front seat; that one of these men was LEESEY HORRISON, driving; that HEMBREE stated that he had known LEESEY MORRISON a long time, and is positive of his identity.

(FRANK - or CHARLES &- HEMBREE lived at that time in Fairfax and may still be there. Agent Weakley interviewed HEMBREE at one time - see his report - but we will interview (FIBREE again in view of new information.)

MALIER ORLY, attorney, Fairfax, states that he saw MEESDY IN THESE at Okla. City March loth about 9 or 10 A. M. and that MORPISON was then driving a closed Studebaker car; that on March 5th the roads had been dry, but that it rained that night, and this closed car that MORPISON was driving was muddy, and had red clay on it, indicating that it had been driven that night after the roads had become muddy from the rain.

(It will be remembered that ID FILOHER, CLYDE CREED and DR.

PRIEDMAN, all of Fairfax, have informed agents that they each and all knew MCRRISCH well at that time, and are positive that they saw MCRRISCH, together with his trother-in-law, ---- POWELL, in FILOHER'S restaurant at Fairfax about midnight that night, driving a large closed car. But MCRRISCH told Sah Mink and others that he, MCRRISCH, had not been out of Okla. Sity that night. A Stude-baker in good condition could easily drive from Okla. City to Fairfax, or vice versa, in four or four and one-half hours.)

(CHIRLES JOHNSON, attorneys, knows that CHARLES WEST, Indian of Fairfax, was a good friend of LEDSEY HORRISON, and that WEST had turned possession of his Studebaker car over to EUSTACE KNIGHT as security for a loan of \$75.00, so that it is possible that KNIGHT and MORRISON and a third man were in the car, as alleged to have been stated by HERMAN FOX DAVIS to GEORGE ED TIMER, of Pashuska.

kNIGHT states that DAVIS may have been just boasting when he said he had learned who the guilty persons were, etc., as DAVIS did not seem to have much money, and also claimed to have 30 men working under him on the case.

ENIGHT stated that he knows KELSEY MORRISON well and knows him to be just the type who could murder, and blow up homes;



that he, KNIGHT, tried to get information on these murderers from LDRRISON to tell DAVIS, but that MORRISON refused to talk about it at all; that about the time SMIH'S home was blown up, KELSEY MORPISON was driving a Big Six Studebaker touring car, and generally had the curtains up; that said car had side, or "goose-egg" lights.

KNIGHT states that he did not lend CHAS. WEST \$75.00 and kept WEST'S car for some time - a week or more - till WEST paid money back; that this WEST'S car, was a Studebaker, 4 passenger coupe; that it also had side lights, but they were square - or coach lights. KNIGHT states he was not out of Oklahoma City with WEST'S car, and in fact made but one short trip with it in Oklahoma City.

We have sent a picture and description of EUSTACE ENIGHT to CHAS. HEMBREE at Winfield, Kan., to see if he can identify him as the man he saw driving away from Fairfax the morning of the SMITH blow up.

KN IGHT has promised to learn all he can and think the matter over and we will see him again.

This is a joint report made for Agents T. F. Weiss and John R. Burger, and made jointly for the reason that both Agents are working jointly on this case during that's entire period, and this report is made jointly to avoid unnecessary duplication and confusion.

#### RE: MURDER OF ANNA BROWN:

On Feb. 2d Agents were informed by FRANK SHAW of Fairfax, that ex-judge STURGILL of Pawhuska had informed him, SHAW, that KELSEY MOR-RISON had been taken into custody for the Federal at Dallas, Tex. the preceding day.

Agents interviewed Judge G. B. STURGILL, who stated that this in-MAR 3 - 1924 formation was given him by a party living at Fairfax, and that the information was confidential, and he, MR. this rumor was unfounded. Our main object of inquiry of IR. STURGILL was to feel him out, as we had been confidentially informed that he was on the wrong side in this investigation, and we did find him very unwilling to disclose any information.

Feb. 4th at Pawhuska, WM. BRACKETT stated that he had recent ly seen confidential informant at Kansas City, and that informant had told him, BRACKETT, that he, informant, knows the name of the third man, the man that was with EDITH DAVIS and J. L. BRIDGES and BRYAN BURKHART and ANNA BROWN at PAUL JOHNS' and LEE MORGAN'S readhouses after midnight on May 21, 1921 and that said man is a resident of fairfax, and is the man that has been furnishing confidential information to our informant.

Feb. 6th at Kansas City we interviewed confidential informant exhaustively and diplomatically, and from him extracted the following information:

That the third man referred to above is a man of standing, living at Fairfax, Okla.; that said third man wants this crime solved, and the guilty persons punished, but is fearful of his own life if the HALE-BURKHARTS ever learn or suspect that said third man is furnishing any information or assisting in the investigation in any way.

Our confidential informant stated further today that said third man is furnishing him, informant, with information from time to time, and that he, our informant, has known and talked with this third man off and on since July, 1921, and that said third man has stated at all times positively that BRYAN BURKHART killed ANNA BROWN between two and five A. M. on Sunday morning, May 22, 1921, and that BRYAN BURKHART used a .32 automatic

pistol and shot ANNA BROWN in the head with it, and that BILL HALE furnished this pistol to BRYAN BURKHART that night for that very purpose; that said third man states further that BRYAN BURKHART at that time owned a big gun, a .41 or a .45 calibret, but HALE and the BURKHARTS agreed and HALE furnished this .32 calibre to BRYAN BURKHART because of the fact that it was generally known that BRYAN BURKHART had the larger calibred gun, and they wanted to use a smaller gun to avoid suspicion.

Informant states further that this .32 automatic that BRYAN
BURKHART used has since changed hands several times, but that said
third man knows where said gun now is, and that possession of it
can be obtained, as it is out of the possession of the HALE.
BURKHARTS, and that said third man will probably be able to get
that gun himself or me tell Agents where we can secure it.

Confidential informant also stated on this date further that LEE HINKIE was postively warned by BRYAN BURKHART that Sunday morning of the murder to never tell anyone that he, HINKIE, saw BRYAN BURKHART coming home with ERNEST BURKHART'S Buick touring car, and that BRYAN BURKHART has paid money to LEE HINKIE to keep his mouth shut.

Informant also states that this third man states that MARTHA UPRIGHT DOTY overheard the HALES and BURKHARTS, or at least some of the BURKHARTS, planning the killing of ANNA BROWN at ERNEST BURKHART'S that Saturday, May 21, 1921, and that this was what frightened MARTHA UPRIGHT DOTY into leaving the employ of MRS.

ERNEST BURKHART that night. Informant also states that he has information that MARTHA UPRIGHT DOTY is also "understood" to have seen BRYAN BURKHART with ANNA BROWN between midnight and

daylight of the night of the murder, and that MARTHA UPRIGHT DOTY is extremely frightened because of the knowledge which she possesses of this murder.

Informant stated further on this date that this third man was with ANNA BROWN and EDITH DAVIS at Pawhuska on Friday, May 20 1921, and is the man who drove ANNA BROWN and EDITH DAVIS to PAUL JOHNS whiskey joint, about three miles northeast of Burbank the night of May 21, 1921, arriving there between ten and eleven oclock, and being joined there about half an hour later by agreement by BRYAN BURKHART and J. L. BRIDGES.

confidential informant states further that he will try to have this third man meet Agents personally at some neutral and secret place, probably Oklahoma city, and talk directly to Agents, but that this will have to be with the full agreement that said third man's identity is to be kept absolutely secret from any but this Bureau's Agents; that this third man is very close and in the confidence of the HALES-BURKHARTS? and has some inside knowledge in regard to the BILL SMITH and HENRY ROAN murders also.

The above and foregoing information was rather reluctantly given by our confidential informant, as he stated again that from what he learns the BURKHARTS and HALE are not worried at all that they will ever be convicted or made to serve or pay any penalty for these murders, because f of their alleged influence and money with the state authorities, and informant stated positively that he did not have any hopes of getting any reward for his information, because of the fact that the reward was conditioned upon the arrest and conviction of the guilty parties, and he had no confidence that they could ever be convicted.

Informant indicated plainly that he had more information and in fact a did state that he had the names of three other reliable witnesses who could substantiate this third man's evidence, and our confidential informant and finally stated that he would write this third man and arrange with this third man to meet with igents and our informant at Okla. City, and possibly bring three other heretofore unnamed witnesses with him, and lay all the evidence on the table which would prove conclusively that the murder was planned by BILL HALE and the BURKHARTS and earried out by BRYAN BURKHART.

Informant, however, stated that he was a close friend of WM.

BRACKETT, and had the utmost confidence not only in BRACKETT'S

integrity, but in BRACKETT'S ability to keep his mouth shut, and

not disclose the evidence, and that he, informant, had an ill will

toward JOHN MORAN, and did not have confidence in MORAN'S ability

to keep his mouth shut, although he did have confidence in MORAN'S

integrity.

Informant stated therefore that as BILL BRACKETT had done a lot of work on this case for which BRACKETT had received no commensurate pay or credit, and informant wanted BRACKETT to be in these final negotiations, so that BRACKETT would get the credit due him and also possibly some recompense for his past work.

Informant finally stated at night, at our second interview, that he had written www. BRACKETT that afternoon, and that his informant's decision was that Agents should see BRACKETT upon their return to Oklahoma, and BRACKETT would furnish the name of the third man and the other three heretofore unnamed witnesses.

and a lot of other evidence that has not as yet been disclosed by our informant, and that his, informant's, plan was for BRACKETT to go to D. E. JOHNSON at Frirfax and produce this evidence and have JOHNSON pay the money to pay the expenses of the meeting at Okla. City, and to recompense BRACKETT for his services. Informant stated that Agents were authorized to read all the letters and information that he would furnish BRACKETT.

(This was all that could be extracted from informant, and it was quite plain to Agents that informant was wanting more money in hand before he would disclose all of his evidence, for the reason apparently that informant feels that he would not be recompensed by any reward because of the reasons stated above, and Agents agreed with informant that they would work with BRACKETT along the line indicated.)

Feb. 8th at Pawhuska learned from WM. BRACKETT that a letter from informant to BRACKETT was at Tulsa, and MR. BRACKETT arranged with Agent Weiss that Agent Weiss should go to Tulsa with BRACKETT and get the letter.

HALE told him, BRACKETT, that he, HALE, with his wife and daughter met ANNA BROWN and BRYAN BURKHART near Grayhorse the evening of May 21, 1921, and that BRYAN BURKHART was taking ANNA BROWN home in a Ford car at that time.
