

Civil Division Paul Robeson v. John Foster Dulles (C.A. D.C.), No. 12,983

On February 27, 1956, a motion for leave to file brief as amici curies was filed by attorneys Milton H. Friedman, William L. Patterson and Ralph E. Powe on behalf of Dr. W. E. B. DuBois. Dr. Alphagus Hunton. - Dr. Herbert Apineker, Balanda Goode Robeson, Rev. Quarles Hill, and Dr. Samuel Sillen as amici curiae. Leave to file the brief was granted by the Court of Appeals and the brief filed on March 6, 1956.

Permission to file the brief on behalf of the amici curies in support of Paul Robeson's appeal was based on the following grounds:

- (1) This case involves the right to speak out against the oppression of Negro Americans, and the smici curiae are particularly interested in defending the appellant's freedom of speech on that subject wherever exercised;
- (2) In the view of the amici curiae, if a Negro American may lawfully be penalized by administrative act of the Secretary of State for voicing the grievances of the Negro people in the United States, the struggle of the Negro people against discrimination, segregation and persecution would be gravely impeded thereby:
- (3) The arbitrary administrative denial to the appellant of opportunities accorded to other Americans. if judicially approved, poses a special threat to the Negro people. EX-12:

On page 13 of the brief it is contended that:

"To silence Paul Robeson is to immobilize an eloquent, devoted, determined and respected fighter for the full 80-12304 emancipation of the Negro people. And it is precisely for the purpose of gagging Mr. Robeson that the Secretary of Staté has withheld his passport. For Mr. Robeson to accept the gag and thus win a passport would be the surrender of that weapon of Negro struggle, discussed above, the publication here and abroad of the truth about segregation, oppression and enalgrement of the Megro people in the United States.* The weapon of turning a searchlight on the white man's inhumanity to the black man in America helped to win emancipation a centry ago, and it is equally necessary in order to help realise the thirteenth smerdment today. smendment today."

Trecalls that during his visit ROBESON sang a song he now remembers as being "That Old Black Magic" and after his performance ROBESON circulated among the prisoners, particularly the Negro prisoners of war, and he allegedly attempted to convert them to the Communist way of life. stated this was done by ROBESON's comparing the life of the American Negro and discrimination and segregation in America with the life they could expect under Communism. stated ROBESON used himself as

In the way of descriptive information; stated he noticed ROBESON and the Britisher were carrying a small caliber pistol while circulating among the prisoners. When specifically asked during this interview whether or not he was sure this was PAUL ROBESON stated he was so sure he would be glad to testify to this information if necessary.

This information is being furnished to the Bureau as it is not known by the Oklahoma City Office whether or not the alleged fact that ROBESON visited American prisoners of war at the in North Korea has been previously brought to the Bureau's attention. It should be noted further added that ROBESON and the Britisher talked to American prisoners of war, British subjects, and other United Nations prisoners of war during their visit.

In view of the foregoing information, no further investigation is contemplated in Oklahoma City pending advice from the Bureau.

In addition, during the review of approximately 250 counterintelligence files furnished to the Bureau by the Department of the Army there was no indication that Robeson was in Kerea during the pertinent period. Consequently, no investigation is desired in connection with the information furnished in your referenced letter.

On 7/18/58 Paul Robeson accompanied by his attorney, Leonard Boudin, consulted with officials of the State Department, Washington, D. C., concerning Robeson's obtaining a valid passport for travel abroad.

Boudin wanted to know if the State Department was still following what he termed "the passport regulations as scrapped by the courts," referring to the previous court decisions in the cases of Otto Nathan and Max Shachtman wherein the State Department issued passports rather than grant "quasi-judicial hearings." Boudin was informed by State Department officials that the passport regulations regarding limitations on the issuance of passports to persons supporting the communist movement as set forth in Sections 51, 135, Title 22, Code of Federal Regulations, was still being followed by the State Department. Boudin was informed that in view of these regulations, Robeson was being refused The attorneys for Robeson subsequently a passport. filed motion for a preliminary injunction and summary judgement to be heard 8/16/55 before the U. S. Circuit Court of Appeals for the District of Columbia for a decision. On 6/7/56 Mr. Bartlett, Liaison Section, telephonically advised that State Department officials had on that date received information to the effect that the U. S. Circuit Court of Appeals unanimously affirmed the denial of a passport to Paul Robeson.



The 66th CIC Group, Stuttgart, Germany, have now stated that the organization publishing "Welt Jugend" should have been correctly designated as the "Weltbund der Demokratischen Jugend" - World Federation of Democratic Youth (WFDY). No such organization as the Democratic World League is known to exist and its use was due to a faulty translation from the German.

The WFDY has been cited by the Congressional Committee on Un-American Activities as one of the "long established Soviet-controlled international organizations" which "speak identical lines of propaganda and stand together on all phases of Soviet foreign policy." (Report No. 271, April 17, 1947, pp. 12 and 13; House Report No. 378, on the Communist "Peace" Offensive, April 25, 1951, original date, April 1, 1951, p. 77.)

The Informant advised that the details of ROBESON's itinerary during his three-day visit to New Jersey were purposely withheld from MARTHA STONE and EMANUEL CANTOR, Essex County CP Organizer. The Informant noted that the program arranged by THOMPSON and his associates included a tour of Negro taverns and night clubs in the Newark area on Friday evening, 7/27/56; appearance at a picnic of meat-packing plant workers sponsored by the United Packinghouse Workers Union, on Saturday, 7/28/56; attendance at church services in a Negro church on Sunday morning, 7/29/56; and appearance at a public barbecue that Sunday afternoon at ERNEST THOMPSON's home in Orange, N.J. The Informant noted that THOMPSON and his associates planned only to make efforts to have a few white persons attend the barbecue and not any of the other activities.

The Informant advised that at a CP club meeting

EMANUEL CANTOR told the

members that ROBESON was visiting the Newark area and that
he was doing all that he could to make the visit successful.

CANTOR stated that while he did not have complete information
on ROBESON's plans, it was his opinion that more organization
in advance should have been made for such an important person.






A. Residence



The "Guide to Subversive Organizations and Publications," dated May 14, 1951, prepared and released by the Committee on Un-American Activities, United States House of Representatives, Washington, D.C., reflects the following concerning the WIDF, also known as the International Democratic Women's Federation:

"1. Cited as a Communist front 'which was founded and supported at all times by the International Communist movement.' Also cited as an 'organization (which) frankly stated that it intended to follow the lead of the Soviet Union, "the only country truly working for peace" and which joined in issuing the call for the World Peace Congress, held in Paris in April 1949.'

"(Congressional Committee on Un-American Activities, Report on the Congress of American Women, House Report No. 1953, April 26, 1950 (originally released October 23, 1949); and House Report No. 378, on the Communist 'Peace' Offensive, April 25, 1951 (original date, April 1, 1951), p. 71.)






"2. Cited as a 'Red international' organization, formed in 1945 in Paris at an International Congress of Women 'at the call of international Communist forces.' Mme. Eugenie Cotton and Mme. Marie-Claude Walllant-Couturier, Communist members of the French House of Deputies, were cochairmen of the Paris congress. The American affiliate is known as the Congress of American Women.

"(California Committee on Un-American Activities, Report, 1948, pp. 228-232.)"

advised that ESLANDA GOODE ROBESON was a Communist Party (CP) member in 1945, but that she does not hold herself out as a Communist and denies membership in the Party. Stated that ESLANDA ROBESON was a devoted member of the CP along with her husband, PAUL ROBESON.



On October 5, 1956, Special Agents of the Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI) observed a package of books addressed to Mr. PAUL ROBESON being delivered to 16 Jumel Terrace, New York City.

B. Employment

The "Daily Worker" of April 24, 1956, page five, column three, contained an article entitled "Canadian Storm Over Robeson." This article relates that PAUL ROBESON, who

had been granted the right to travel in Canada by the United States Department of State as a concert artist, had a contract for a tour of seventeen Canadian cities to begin April 15, 1956. The article then reports the banning of ROBESON's proposed tour by Canadian authorities.

The "Daily Worker" is an East Coast Communist newspaper, the Sunday edition of which is "The Worker."

The "Daily Worker" issue of June 14, 1956, page five, column one, contained an article entitled "Un-American Racists" This article describes PAUL ROBESON as the "world-famous singer."

It is noted that the July-August, 1955, issue of "Freedom," Volume 5, Number 6, page two, listed PAUL ROBESON as chairman of the editorial board of the newspaper.

With regard to "Freedom," the December 31, 1950, issue of "The Worker" contained an article which describes "Freedom" as a monthly newspaper published by Freedom Associates, which was introduced in November, 1950. This article pointed out that the purpose of the newspaper was to promote Negro matters, the selecting and writing of all material from the viewpoint that is interesting rather than necessary to the Negro worker and to point out the importance to the Negro people of their alliance with the labor movement of the workers class.

advised that the editorial poard of "Freedom" was composed of Communists and Communist sympathizers. According to "Freedom" was intended as a replacement for the Harlem Edition of "The Worker."

On June 21, 1956, LOUIS BURNHAM, Editor of "Freedom" was contacted under a telephonic pretext by a Special Agent of the FBI. BURNHAM advised that "Freedom" was going out of business due to a lack of funds and future issues of the paper were not contemplated. According to BURNHAM, subscribers to "Freedom" were being asked to transfer their subscriptions to the "National Guardian."

The 1949 report of the California Committee on Un-American Activities cited the "National Guardian" as a publication launched in New York in 1948 aiming at national circulation which it found to be from its inception notoriously Stalinist in its staff, writers, management and content. (1949 report of the California Senate Fact Finding Committee on Un-American Activities, page 394.)

The masthead of the "National Guardian" issue of May 14, 1956, reflects that it is published weekly by Weekly Guardian Associates, Inc., 197 East Fourth Street, New York City.

On advised that Freedom Associates, Inc. had dissolved as of August 15, 1956, and was no longer in existence.



II. AFFILIATION WITH THE COMMUNIST MOVEMENT

A. Evidence of CP Sympathies

advised that on March 9, 1950, a birthday celebration in honor of WILLIAM Z. FOSTER was held at the Chateau Gardens, 105 East Houston Street, New York City. Stated that ROBESON was present and prior to singing several songs, gave a short talk on FOSTER and stated that the country from which he had just returned (Canada) had sent their greetings to FOSTER through him.

advised that WILLIAM Z. FOSTER was introduced as National Chairman, CP, USA, at the above-mentioned birthday celebration held March 9, 1956.

The "New York Times" newspaper, issue of May 28, 1956, page six, contained an article entitled "Paul Robeson Is Called." This article, in part, stated:





"Washington, May 27 - The House Committee on Un-American Activities announced today it had summoned Paul Robeson to testify Tuesday in its investigation of alleged passport irregularities by Communist sympathizers. Mr. Robeson, leftwing basso, has traveled as an honored guest in the Soviet Union..."

The "Daily Worker" issue of June 13, 1956, page one, column three, contained an article entitled "Un-Americans Cite Robeson as He Blasts Racism." This article reports the citation of ROBESON for contempt by the House Committee on Un-American Activities on June 12, 1956, and details of ROBESON's testimony before the committee. In part, the article read:

"He (ROBESON) said he had testified on behalf of the first Communist Party leaders tried under the Smith Act, which was now obnoxious to millions of Americans and would one day be declared unconstitutional as Justice Hugo Black had said it was.

"Asked whether he was a Communist, Robeson replied by asking Arens (committee counsel) whether he referred to the Communists 'who were the first to die in the fight against fascism,' the Communist Party which had 'sacrificed so much for my people!' Ben Davis, one of the Communist leaders who was jailed under the Smith Act, he said was one of his 'dearest friends,' one of the 'best Americans' in contrast to the members of the committee who he added 'belonged with the Alien and Sedition Acts.'"

BENJAMIN J. DAVIS, JR. is one of the eleven members of the National Committee of the CP, USA, who was convicted on October 14, 1949, in the United States District Court, Southern District of New York, for violation of the Smith Act of 1940.





The "New York Times" newspaper issue of June 13, 1956, page one, contained an article entitled "House Group Favors Citing Paul Robeson." In part, this article read:

"Contempt of congress proceedings were begun against Paul Robeson today as the upshot of a shouting, table-thumping and gavel-banging hearing at the Capitol.....Mr. Robeson brought a stormy morning session to a sudden close by raising his resonant bass voice to shouting pitch and asserting, 'You are the non-patriots and you are the un-Americans and you ought to be ashamed of yourselves.' Before the final blow-up, Mr. Robeson angrily denounced the committee, Senator Eastland and others in response to questions about his activities and his travels to Soviet Russia."

The New York "Daily Mirror" issue of June 14, 1956, contained an article entitled "House Group Cites Robeson." This article related the citing of PAUL ROBESON by the House Committee on Un-American Activities for contempt of congress and, in part, read:

"Though the singer invoked the Fifth Amendment when queried about Red affiliations, he shouted his contempt for the committee time and again."

B. Evidence of Membership in or Sympathy with CP Front Organizations

People's Artists, Inc.

The "Guide to Subversive Organizations and Publications," previously mentioned, reflects the following concerning People's Artists, Inc.:

"(California Committee on Un-American Activities, Report, 1948, p. 392.)"







On February 27, 1956, who has furnished reliable information in the past, made available the winter, 1956, edition of "Sing Out," Volume 6, Number 1, issued by People's Artists, Inc., 124 West 21st Street, New York City. Page two contained a list of the publication's staff and under contributors listed PAUL ROBESON.

C. CP Associates

On advised that on that date BENJAMIN
J. DAVIS, JR. was in contact with PAUL ROBESON.

On PAUL ROBESON was in contact with BENJAMIN J. DAVIS, JR. and informed DAVIS that he had just returned from the hearings in Washington, D.C. DAVIS complimented ROBESON on his appearance.

Subject's Activities In and/or Subversive Ramifications of his Passport Case

The "Daily Worker" issue of April 12, 1956, page two, column one, contained an article entitled "Canada Denies Robeson Visa." This article reflected that Canadian immigration authorities had refused to allow PAUL ROBESON to enter Canada for a concert tour.

The "Daily Worker" issue of June 6, 1956, page six, column three, contained an article entitled "The Cry Grows in London - Let Robeson Sing!" by Hined "John Williamson." This article concerned a meeting of the "Let Robeson Sing Committee" which met in Manchester, England, on May 27, 1956. The purpose of this committee was to unite the scattered activities in England in connection with supporting PAUL ROBESON's passport case. The article also stated that an inspiring letter was read to the committee from PAUL ROBESON in which he told of his few weeksof freedom in Canada.

JOHN WILLIAMSON was convicted on October 14, 1949, in the United States District Court, Southern District of New York, for violation of the Smith Act of 1940. On October 21, 1949, he was sentenced to five years imprisonment and fined \$10,000 by Federal Judge HAROLD R. MEDINA. WILLIAMSON was released from federal prison on March 1, 1955. He was granted permission to leave the United States voluntarily under warrant for deportation and departed the United States for England on May 4, 1955.


The "New York Herald Tribune" newspaper issue of June 8, 1956, page 12, contained an article entitled "Robeson Loses Passport Appeal." This article reported that the United States Court of Appeals that date had unanimously upheld a district court order dismissing ROBESON's suit against Secretary of State JOHN FOSTER DULLES.

advised that on June 13, 1956, the Emergency Civil Liberties Committee (ECLC) sponsored a concert at Town Hall, New York City.

advised that this concert was held as a tribute to PAUL ROBESON and the proceeds from same were to help pay the cost of ROBESON's suit for his passport.

Padvised that 1,239 persons attended this affair.

The "Daily Worker" issue of October 8, 1951, page one, columns four and five, in an article entitled "150 Notables Form Emercency Civil Liberties Committee" reflected that the formation of the ECLC had been announced on October 7, 1951. It was shown that the purposes of the organization would be to help mobilize public opinion in support of the traditional American constitutional guarantees of civil liberties and to render aid to victims of abridgement of these liberties in politics, education and the professions. The founders, according to the article, included more than fifty members of the clergy and many educators and professionals.





who was in a position to furnish reliable information, on October 21, 1955, furnished information reflecting that the CP felt that help should be extended in building a "united front civil liberties organization" in the United States which, while not led by the "Left" would contain labor, liberal and "Left Forces" within it in a commonly agreed program, including defense of the rights of Communists.

The information further indicated that the CP felt that this aim can best be achieved by helping the ECLC to become a national organization with local chapters operating on the basis of its program.

The headquarters of the ECLC is located at 421 Seventh Avenue, New York City.

The "Daily Worker" issue of June 20, 1956, page four, column three, contained a letter entitled "Robeson's Passport Case" by-lined "William L. Patterson." This letter compliments the "Daily Worker" for its angry reaction to the decision of the United States Appellate Court in the PAUL ROBESON passport case and notes that this passport fight is a struggle to defend the constitutional liberties of all American citizens.

advised that at that time WILLIAM L. PATTERSON was National Executive Secretary of the Civil Rights Congress (CRC) and known to the informant as a Communist.

The CRC has been designated by the Attorney General of the United States pursuant to Executive Order 10450.

The "New York World Telegram and Sun" issue of September 6, 1956, contained an article entitled "Robeson Appeals to Top Court." This article reported that PAUL ROBESON had asked the United States Supreme Court, through his attorneys, on September 5, 1956, to intervene in his three year old passport controversy with the State Department.

II APPILIATION WITH THE COMMUNIST NOVEMENT

A. Evidence of Communist Party (CP) Sympathies

The August, 1953 issue of "New World Review" contains an article entitled "Why I Am a Friend of the USSR," by-lined ESIANDA ROBESON. In part, this article states "As a woman and a Megro who has always worked and fought for my full rights as an equal human being, I discovered that the Soviet people accepted women and minorities as equals, and treated them as such officially and unofficially.....For many years my government took no interest in my friendship with the Soviet Union. This was normal because for many years my government took no interest at all in me and my Negro people." The article continues that she (ROBESON) will not break off her friendship with the Soviet Union; that the United States cannot tell her who may be her friends.

It is noted that the publication "Soviet Russia Today" changed its name to "New World Review" in March, 1951. The citation of "Soviet Russia Today" applies to the new title.





The "Guide to Subversive Organizations and Publications," dated May 14, 1951, prepared and released by the Committee on Un-American Activities, United States House of Representatives, Washington, D.C., contains the following concerning Soviet Russia Today:

"1. Cited as a Communist front.
(Special Committee on Un-American
Activities, Report, March 29, 1944,
p.167; also cited in Report, June 25,
1942, p. 21.) "

The August, 1954 issue of "Jewish Life," page 25, contains an article entitled "What is a Ghetto?" by-lined ESLANDA ROBESON. This article in part states "We can no longer remain as sitting ducks in our ghettos, now all of us know to survive and make a future, we must organize and rise up and wipe out our ghettos. Not wipe them out as HITLER did, barbarous, murderous destruction, but wipe them out with constructive, progressive housing projects, recreation programs and most of all by tearing down the barriers which have been built up to separate us and to keep those barriers down forever."

The "Guide to Subversive Organizations and Publications," dated May 14, 1951, prepared and released by the Committee on Un-American Activities, United States House of Representatives, Washington, D.C., contains the fillowing concerning the "Jewish Life:"

"1. 'Among typical examples of the Communist Press and publications.' Published by the Morning Freiheit Association, Inc. -(California Committee on Un-American Activities, Report, 1948, pp. 49 and 225.)

The "National Guardian" issue of May 9, 1955, page two, contains an article entitled "What About This 'Soviet Colonialism' Business," by-lined ESLANDA ROBESON. In this article, ROBESON gives various meanings to the word "colonialism" including such definitions as occupation and





domination of a territory by foreigners, control of government and the Army by foreigners, control of the economy by foreigners and control of educational institutions by foreigners. According to the article none of these conditions exist in any of the Peoples' Democracies. It is pointed out that the colonial powers first called the Union of Soviet Socialist Republic's (USSR) allies, satellites, and now call them colonies in a desperate attempt to prove that Russia is as bad as themselves.

The 1949 Report of the California Committee on Un-American Activities cited the "National Guardian" as a publication launched in New York in 1948 aiming at national circulation, which it found to be from its inception notoriously Stalinist in its staff writers, management and content. (1949 Report of the California Senate Fact Finding Committee on Un-American Activities, page 394).

The masthead of the "National Guardian" issue of May 14, 1956, reflects that it is published weekly by Weekly Guardian Associates, Incorporated, 197 East 4th Street, New York City.

B. Evidence of Membership in or Sympathies with CP Front Organizations

American Federation for Polish Jews (AFPJ)

The 1943-1944 American Jewish Yearbook reflects that the AFPJ was founded in 1908 for the purpose of promoting social and cultural activities among its affiliates and guarding and promoting the interests of the Jews in Poland.

advised on that at the Convention of the AFPJ held in New York City on March 26, and March 27, 1949, the "right-wing elements" were eliminated and the "left-wing Communist element" was elected.





On reported he had been informed by a member of the CF that the above Federation was under the full control of the "left-wing and progressive elements."

On advised that the AFFJ continues to function from its headquarters, 1133 Broadway, New York City, and is still controlled by Communist and "left-wingers."

On advised that on April 21, 1954, a meeting commemorating the "lith Anniversary of the Revolt of the Warsaw Ghetto" organized by the AFPJ, was held at the Manhattan Center, New York City. Advised ESLANDA ROBESON was one of the speakers and spoke of the wakening of the colonial peoples of the world, pointing out that Korea was part of the struggle as was the fight against colonial imperialism in Indo-China. She stated in part "The people of Africa and Asia, the black people of the world are marching to freedom. There isn't a power in the world that will ever be able to stop this march."

American Peace Crusade (APC)

The APC has been designated by the Attorney General of the United States pursuant to Executive Order 10450.

chapter of the APC planned to hold a meeting on April 24, 1954, the title of which was to be "Southside Salutes Second Anniversary of Africa's Fight for Freedom." advised the meeting would be held at the Metropolitan Community Church, Chicago, Illinois, with ESLANDA ROBESON as the featured speaker.

advised the "Second Africa's Freedom" celebration was held under the auspices of the AFC at the Metropolitan Community Church, Chicago, Illinois, on that date. Advised that the subject was the featured speaker and spoke at some length on the advances that were being made by the colored peoples of the world in combating white supremacy and colonialism. She stated the United States now stands alone in the UN in its policy of rejecting or opposing the admittance of the Feoples Republic of China to the UN.

advised that the Committee for the 300th Anniversary of Jewish Settlement in the United States of America was a Communist front group organized about June, 1954, to celebrate the tercentenary during 1954-1955, of the arrival of the first group of 23 Jews in America, in September, 1654. According to the organization was formed because the "right-wing" anti-Communists had formed their own committee to celebrate the tercentenary and had excluded all organizations which followed the CP line.

On June 15, 1956, a Special Agent of the Federal Bureau of Investigation, by means of a pretext telephone call, to New York City, determined that the Committee of the 300th Anniversary of Jewish Settlement in the United States of America was now better known as the Tercentenary Book Committee, 1133 Broadway, Room 732. New York City. It was further ascertained that was the for of the latter Committee.

October 16, 1954, a "Grand Celebration of the Tercentenary of American Jewish History" was held at Carnegie Hall, New York City, and was organized by the Committee of the 300th Anniversary of Jewish Settlement in the United States of America. Madvised that the subject was a featured speaker and spoke concerning the strong ties between the Megro and the Jewish masses in their struggle for full rights against "national and racial discrimination."





Council on African Affairs (CAA)

The Council on African Afrairs (CAA) has been designated by the Attorney General of the United States pursuant to Executive Order 10450.

of a letter, dated June 25, 1954, on letterhead paper of the CAA, which announced that Mrs. ESLANDA G. ROBESON, Chairman of the Executive Board of the CAA, desires the reader to attend a meeting of the CAA to be held July 1, 1954, at 212 West 139th Street, New York City. The letter lists topics to be discussed at the meeting as the Kenya-Aid Frogram, Promoting Action on Africa in other Organizations and fund raising pans.

advised that on June 9, 1955, a report on the Bandung Conference sponsored by the CAA was held at 310 Lenox Avenue, New York City. Stated the subject was chairman of the meeting and delivered a summary of the African-Asian Conference, stating that the conference represented a new alignment of world forces.

Families of the Smith Act Victims (PSAV)

The Families of the Smith Act Victims (PSAV) has been designated by the Attorney General of the United States pursuant to Executive Order 10450.

The "Daily Worker" issue of January 27, 1953, page three, column one, contained an article entitled "150 Women Sign Plea For Amnesty for 11." This article listed ESLANDA GOODE ROBESON as one of the signers of a letter, which appealed to the White House to grant amnesty for the eleven leaders of the CP convicted under the Smith Act. The article pointed out that the announcement of this letter was made by the FSAV.





The "Daily Worker" is an East Coast Communist daily newspaper, the Sunday edition of which is "The Worker."

Jefferson School of Social Science (JSSS)

The Jefferson School of Social Science (JSSS) has been designated by the Attorney General of the United States pursuant to Executive Order 10450.

The "Daily Worker" issue of September 28, 1956, page seven, column five, contained an article entitled "Lecture Series on Asia, Africa and Latin America". This article stated that a new course entitled "The Underdeveloped Countries: Role of U.S., USSR and UM, "would begin October 4, 1956, at the JSSS. The article noted that ESLANDA ROBESON would be among persons giving one or more lectures in the sourse.

Labor Youth League (LYL)


The Labor Youth League (LYL) has been designated by the Attorney General of the United States pursuant to Executive Order 10450.

, advised that the subject was the featured speaker at an LYL Youth Rally held en December 10, 1954, at Yugoslav Hall, New York City. National Committee to Defend Negro Leadership (NCDNL)

On December 31, 1952, T-13 advised the NCDNL had been formed to stop attacks against the Negro people.

In a printed leaflet furnished by
Howard University, Washington, D.C., in October,
1952, the NCDNL stated that its aims included amnesty for HENRY
WINSTON and Associates; stopping prosecution for political teachings and advocacy under the Smith Act; repealing also other repressive legislative acts, especially the severe restrictions
of immigration from the West Indies in the McCarran-Walter Act;
the anti-labor Taft-Hartley Act, and the "thought control" and
"concentration camp" McCarran Act.

HENRY WINSTON was National Organizational Secretary, CP USA, since July, 1946, according to his own statement made in the United States District Court, Southern District of New York, September 20, 23, 1949.

WINSTON was convicted October 14,1949, for violation of the Smith Act of 1940 and sentenced October 21,1949 to five years and fined \$10,000. He became a fugitive upon issuance of a bench ward United States District Court, Southern District of New York, WINSTON surrendered himself to custody of the United States Marshal, New 1 City, on March 5, 1956. On March 26, 1956, WINSTON was sentenced three years for contempt of court to be served subsequent to the sentence imposed for Smith Act convictions.

On advised that the NCDNL is highly infiltrated by the CP and has expanded its energies in behalf of Negroes indicted under the Smith Act.

A pretext telephone call was made on April 12, 1956, by a Special Agent of the Federal Bureau of Investigation to the head-quarters of the NCDNL and it was ascertained that the Committee continues to exist and is located at 1660 Fulton Street, Brooklyn, Ne York.

The November 10, 1954 issue of the "Daily Worker", page three, column one-five, contained an article entitled "Rally Support Patterson, Hunton." This article stated that on November 8, 1954,

a "fight back rally to defend WILLIAM L. PATTERSON and ALPHAEUS HUNTON", had been held in New York City, sponsored in part by the NCDNL. This article described PATTERSON as Executive Secretary of the Civil Rights Congress (CRC) and HUNTON as executive director of the CAA. The article further pointed out that ESLANDA ROBESON acted as Co-Chairman of the rally.

The Civil Rights Congress (CRC) has been designated by the Attorney General of the United States pursuant to Executive Order 10450.

on advised that the subject spoke at the above rally on November 8, 1954 and pointed out the role of women to be played in fighting for the rights of Negroes and for freedom and brotherly love.

The "Daily Worker" issue of March 31, 1955, page eight, column two, contained a column entitled "What's On?" This column announced a symposium for April 4, 1955, on the subject of peaceful coexistence to be held under the auspices of the NCASF at the Yugoslav-American Home, 405 West 41st Street, New York City. Mrs. ESLANDA G. ROBESON is listed as one of the speakers.

On advised that on April 4, 1955, the subject was among the speakers at a symposium on peaceful coexistence held at the Yugoslav-American Home, New York City, under the auspices of the NCASF. stated the subject charged the United States with securing bases all over the world in order to deliver atomic bombs on other nations. She stated the SEATO Conference had a primary aim in erecting military barriers against Communism whereas the Asia-African Conference is being called to fight outside encroachment, oppose colonialism, and western domination.

advised that on June 7, 1955, a reception sponsored by the Committee of Women of the NCASF was held at the Yugoslav Hall, New York City. And advised that the subject acted as Chairman of this meeting.

Women's Committee for Equal Justice (WCEJ)

The WCEJ, according to the "Daily Worker" issue of October 2, 1951, page three, was a group that was organized to review and strengthen the world-wide demand for the unconditional pardon of Mrs. ROSA LEE INGRAM and her two sons.

It is noted that Mrs. INGRAM and her sons are serving life term sentences in a Georgia State Prison having been convicted of homicide.

On advised that the WCEJ utilized the headquarters of the CRC in New York City as its address. Subsequent to its re-activation in late 1953, the WCEJ benefited from the support of the CRC with regard to personnel, funds, and direction in accomplishing its objectives. In the informant's opinion, the WCEJ was an organization in name only, actually operated as a sub-group of the CRC and it was directed by CP members in the CRC.

On advised that the WCEJ was defunct and had been inactive for an extended period of time.

On September 29, 1955, a Special Agent of the Federal Bureau of Investigation, through a telephonic pretext call, contacted WILLIAM L. PATTERSON, then National Executive Secretary of the CRC, who advised that the WCEJ was disbanded in July, 1955.

GOODE ROBESON of the WCEJ had during 1954 sent a
communication to Governor HERMAN E. TALMADGE of Georgia
protesting the continued incarceration of ROSA LEE INGRAM.





Women's Community Forum (WCF)

had been organized about four years previously and the majority of the WCF leadership were Communists.

advised further that the non-Communists in leadership capacity closely followed the CP line.

On advised that the WCF continued to be active. The informant stated the purpose of the WCF was to hold social functions to raise funds for the support of "progressive" and Communist supported activities.

; advised that on February 9, 1954, the subject was the featured speaker at a meeting of the WCF held at 107 East Burnside Avenue, New York City, in connection with Negro History Week. Mrs. ROBESON discussed the problems of the African Negro and the continuing work for reform in Africa.

Women's International Democratic Federation (WIDF) Also Known As International Democratic Women's Federation (IDWF)

The "Guide to Subversive Organizations and Publications," dated May 14, 1951, prepared and released by the Committee on Un-American Activities, United States House of Representatives, Washington, D.C., contains the following concerning the International Democratic Women's Federation:

"1. Cited as a Communist front 'which was founded and supported at all times by the International Communist movement.' Also cited as an organization (which) frankly stated that it intended to follow the lead of the Soviet Union, "the only country truly working for peace" and which joined in issuing the call for the World Peace Congress, held in Paris in April 1949."

C. Miscellaneous Activities

American Labor Party (ALP)

advised on September 9, 1954, that from the time of its inception in 1936, there existed within the American Labor Party a struggle for power among three groups. These were the Communist Party, the Socialist Party and the Social Democrats. By the early 1940's, the Communist Party emerged as the controlling force within the American Labor Party in the major industrial areas in New York State. Generally these were the areas around Albany, Buffalo, Jamestown, Rochester, Schenectady, Syracuse, Troy, the Hudson River Valley, Columbia, Dutchess, Nassau and Westchester Counties, and New York City, with the exception of Brooklyn. In 1942 the Communist Party was able to capture the American Labor Party in Brooklyn.

American Labor Party never developed into an organization of any real consequence in the nonindustrial areas of New York State.

advised on the that the Communist Farty today, as in the past, through its members in key positions in the American Labor Party, constitutes the force that controls it.

The "New York Times," a daily newspaper, issue of October 8, 1956, on pages 1 and 20, reflected that the American Labor Party State Chairman announced on October 7, 1956, that the American Labor Party State Committee had unanimously approved a resolution dissolving the American Labor Party and liquidating its assets.



On advised that on September 2 1954, the subject was in attendance at the ALP 1954 Gubernatorial Election Rally held at Manhattan Center, New York City. On this date, also made available material which reflected that ESLANDA GOODE ROBESON was among ALP officers and members elected at the ALP State Committee meeting on September 23, 1954. This material reflected that ESLANDA ROBESON was an ALP State Vice-Chairman at that time.

International Publishers

The "Guide to Subversive Organizations and Publications," dated May 14, 1951, prepared and released by the Committee on Un-American Activities, United States House of Representatives, Washington, D. C., contains the following concerning the International Publishers:

"1. 'The (Communist) Party's publishing house,' headed by Alexander Trachtenberg.

"(Attorney General Francis Biddle, Congressional Record, September 24, 1942, p. 7686.)"

On advised that on December 1954, the subject attended a dinner honoring the 30th Anni-versary of International Publishers and the 70th birthday of ALEXANDER TRACHTENBERG, held at 405 West 41st Street, New York City.

The records of the Clerk of the Court, Criminal Division, United States District Court, Southern District of New York, reflect that on July 31, 1956 (following a jury trial, United States District Judge ALEXANDER BICKS presiding), TRACHTENBERG was found guilty of violation of the Smith Act of 1940.

The above records reflect that on September 17, 1956, Judge BICKS imposed a one year sentence on TRACHTENBERG as a result of his conviction on July 31, 1956.

The records of the United States Court of Appeals, Second Circuit, reflect that on September 17, 1956, a notice of appeal was filed on behalf of TRACHTENBERG. Following the entry of this notice of appeal, Judge BICKS granted a defense motion to continue the defendants, in United States versus TRACHTENBERG, Et. Al., on their present bail. TRACHTENBERG is at present free under \$10,000.00 bail.

The "Daily Worker" issue of October 12, 1956, page 3, column 4, contained an article entitled "Hall in Newark Bars Concert By Robeson After Hate Story". This article noted that a November 30th concert by PAUL ROBESON, Negro baritone, had been cancelled by the management of the Essex House, Newark, New Jersey, following the publication of an article concerning ROBESON which had appeared in the Newark Star-Ledger newspaper.

The "Daily Worker" is an East coast Communist newspaper.

On advised that on that date CLAUDE LIGHTFOOT indicated a large Negro church in Chicago desired to have PAUL ROBESON perform a concert although no specific date had been set.

The "Daily Worker" issue of February 13, 1957, page 2, column 4, disclosed that CLAUDE LIGHTFOOT was among persons elected to the National Committee of the Communist Party of the United States of America (CPUSA) on February 12, 1957, during the 16th National Convention of the Communist Party (CP).

II. AFFILIATION WITH THE COMMUNIST MOVEMENT

A. Evidence of CP Sympathies

On:

that he had occasion to talk with PAUL ROBESON during the period 1945-1947. According to on one occasion ROBESON stated that while Communism is not perfect as it exists in Russia, it definitely was working for the betterment of the working man.

On June 12, 1956, PAUL ROBESON testified at a special hearing of the United States House of Representatives Sub-Committee of the Committee on Un-American Activities, Washington, D.C., which was





then conducting a series of hearings on the issue of the use of American passports as travel documents in furtherance of the objectives of the Communist conspiracy. During the course of his testimony ROBESON envoked the Fifth Amendment of the United States Constitution in answer to questions as to:

- 1) Whether or not he was then a member of the CP
- 2) Whether or not his CP name was ever JOHN THOMAS
- 3) Whether ROBESON had ever been Chairman of the Council on African Affairs
- 4) Whether or not there was a Communist core in the Council on African Affairs.

In addition to the above, ROBESON envoked the Fifth Amendment as to whether or not he was acquainted with various government witnesses who had previously testified and had furnished information concerning his subversive affiliations.

The Council on African Affairs has been cited by the Attorney General pursuant to Executive Order 10450.

that in a conversation with PAUL ROBESON, ROBESON had stated if he were allowed to visit other countries, he would denounce the United States as imperialists who practice segration at home.

The "Daily Worker" issue of January 2, 1957, page 7, column 4, contained an article entitled "Robeson Sands Greetings to Soviet People". This article stated

in part, "London, January 21, - Radio Moscow today broadcast a cordial message of greetings from American singer Paul Robeson to the Soviet people in which he said many American Negroes have to flee the South because of the forces of evil' there."

Advised that the loth National Convention of the CPUSA had been held February 9-12, 1957, at Chateau Gardens, New York City. Stated that during the Saturday session on February 9, 1957, BEN DAVIS spoke in favor of stating observers at the Convention. It was then suggested that PAUL RCBESON be among persons added to the list of observers. However, it was pointed out that these people, including ROBESON, had already been invited and were not available.

On advised that at that time, BEN DAVIS was a member of the National Board of the CPUSA.

B. Evidence of Membership In or Sympathy with CP Front Organizations

The "Daily Worker" issue of September 25, 1956, page 2, column 1, contained an article entitled "Paul Robeson to Sing Tonight". This article stated that PAUL ROBESON would sing and speak that date at an affair arranged by the "Morning Freheit" to be held at the Henry Hudson Hotel, New York City.

The "Morning Freheit" is a Communist Yiddish daily. (Attorney General Francis Biddle, Congressional Record, September 24, 1942, p. 7686.)

On advised that on November 13, 1956, a meeting of the National Council of





American-Soviet Friendship (NCASF) was held at 135 West 70th Street, New York City, Advised that PAUL ROBESON was in attendance and in a speech described the rise of the Negro from slavery and pointed out that their struggle for rights was aided by the dictators of Socialism as practiced in the Union of Soviet Socialist Republics (USSR). He called for peaceful co-existence and friendship between all peoples.

0n

advised that on November 13, 1956, PAUL ROBESON spoke at the NCASF rally, mentioned above, during which he paid tribute to the NCASF. ROBESON stated that we must live with war and the question of full citizenship for the Negroes must be resolved. ROBESON pointed out the struggle of the Negro today was brought forth in the October, 1917, Revolution as a result of which the Negro peoples know their struggles are possible because of the Soviet struggle.

The "Daily Worker" issue of November 15, 1956, page 5, contained an editorial entitled "They Want No Peace". This editorial concerned demonstrations against persons attending a rally of the NCASF held the week before. In part this editorial read, "There is more than passing significance in the fact that one of the persons reviled and physically threatened by the demonstrators was Paul Robeson, famed at home and abroard as a symbol both of the achievements of the Negro people and of the repressions they still suffer. Paul Robeson has never hidden his admiration for the Soviet Union - the land where he first found color to be no bar to equality nor his belief in the medd for American-Soviet cooperation for world peace."

C. Communist Party Associates

On October 7, 1956, who is in a position to furnish reliable information, advised that on that date BEN DAVIS visited PAUL ROBESON at his residence.












The "Daily Worker" issue of November 6, 1956, page 2, columns 4 and 5, contained an article entitled, "High Court Denies Hearing to Robeson". This article noted that on November 5, 1956, the Supreme Court had denied a hearing to PAUL ROBESON to grant him a passport.

The "Daily Worker" issue of November 7, 1956, page 5, column 1, contained in its editorial column an item entitled, "The Robeson Decision". This item read as follows:

"The Supreme Court has denied PAUL ROBESON a hearing on his fight to force the State Department to give him a passport. Thus one of America's finest and most famous sons, renowned in the four corners of the earth, is kept virtually







JOHN WILLIAMSON was convicted on October 14, 1949, in the United States District Court, Southern District of New York, for violation of the Smith Act of 1940. On October 21, 1949, he was sentenced to five years imprisonment and fined \$10,000 by Federal Judge HAROLD D. MEDINA. He was released from federal prison on March 1, 1955.

WILLIAMSON was granted permission to leave the United States voluntarily under warrant for deportation and departed from the United States for England on May 4, 1955.


