Possible Racial Violence Major Urban Areas



During the weekend of April 19, 1969, incendiary devices were thrown through the windows of the residences of both Newallo and Jackson. They failed to ignite and minimal damages resulted. Newallo has publicly stated these acts were perpetrated by his enemies in the CCGP. Hempstead police officials are investigating these incidents but no suspects have been developed.

It is noted that the trouble described above concerns blacks only and there are no whites involved. Therefore, any tense racial situation in Hempstead is the result of blacks disagreeing with each other and there is no evidence of white involvement.

80 year old labor and givil rights leader, recently retired as president of the Brotherhood of Sleeping Car Porters, urged militant Negro youths to reject confrontationism and violence in their struggle for freedom and justice. He said "we must reject racial separatism and together with the conviction that one day our nation can cease to be divided within itself, reaffirm our abiding faith in integration. We cannot reject these principles without also denying ourselves the possibility of freedom".

The May 13, 1969, issue of the "New York Post", a New York City daily newspaper, on page 24 carried an article indicating that Roy Wilkins, Executive Director of the NAACP, stated "It's not how a black man wears his hair but what he has inside his head", thereby explaining his, Wilkins', stand that the demands for black studies are "a lot of nonsense".

SANITATION WORKERS DISPUTE OKLAHOMA CITY, OKLAHOMA

Reference memorandum dated August 11, 1969. at Oklahoma City, Oklahoma.

The August 11, 1969, issue of the "Oklahoma Journal" contains an article reflecting Roy Wilkins, Executive Secretary of the nation-wide NAACP, had pledged wholehearted support for the Oklahoma City garbage workers' demand for a \$100 per month pay raise and five-day work week. According to the article, Wilkins, in New York, stated "We haven't made any definite plans. It's just a question of what form the action will take." The article quoted another NAACP official in New York, Henry Lee Moon, as comparing the Oklahoma City situation with earlier confrontations in Tennessee and South Carolina. Moon stated. "There is no question that we will stand behind them just as we stood by the workers in Memphis and Charleston."

The August 12, 1969, issue of the "Oklahoma Journal" contains an article indicating that a group of ministers representing 26 black members within the 75-member Interdenominational Ministerial Alliance in Oklahoma City, announced that they were "shocked by the city sanitation" workers' wages, working conditions and gave their support to the workers' threat to strike. Reverend J. C. West. President of the Alliance, was asked by newsmen what form the pledged support would take and West replied, "If it's necessary to say some more later, we'll say some more. If it's necessary to do some more, we'll do some more. The August 12, 1969, issue of the "Daily Oklahoman"

contains an article stating that City Manager Robert H. Oldland, Oklahoma City, had reiterated his pledge that any sanitation worker walking off his job on August 19, 1969, will be dismissed. He said volunteers from the parks, street, rater and sewer work forces will supplement sanitation crews TAINED THIS document contains



if regular workers do refuse to work August 19th. Oldland stated that the city will continue to refuse to respond to demands or ultimatums butindicated some complaints by sanitation workers may be resolved soon. Oldland stated that no action on a pay raise for the sanitation workers will be taken until a scheduled review of pay raises for sanitation workers and other city jobs is completed around the end of the year. According to the article, the Oklahoma City Youth Council of the NAACP has pledged to stand or lie down in front of garbage trucks to halt sanitation operations August 19th, if the workers strike.

The August 13, 1969, issue of the "Daily Oklahoman" reflects that City Manager Oldland would meet on August 13, 1969, and August 14, 1969, with city sanitation workers for a general dialogue and briefing on new working conditions. Oldland outlined the new job conditions which includes a five-day, 40-hour week beginning September 2, 1969. He had presented this report on job conditions and changes to the Oklahoma City Council on August 12, 1969, and the council members approved the report and urged Oldland to make the same report directly to the sanitation workers. The article quotes Mrs. Clara Luper, Advisor to the NAACP Youth Council, as stating she did not think the sanitation workers will be satisfied with Oldland's program. She said she felt a pay increase which has been rejected by Oldland is a key issue to the workers. According to the article, State Senator E. Melvin Porter, former NAACP official in Oklahoma City, said he is personally satisfied that Mrs. Luper and other supporters of the sanitation workers aren't planning any activities involving violence. He confirmed that several East Side residents of Oklahoma City had asked him to check on rumors that a sanitation strike may lead to violence and widespread disorder. He said that about 10 persons have expressed concern to him about the involvement of young men that have identified themselves as Black Panthers, in the sanitation controversy. In addition, Porter 🥪 stated that all indications he has indicate that the Black Panther group intends to follow Mrs. Luper's lead in making a non-violent stand on behalf of the sanitation workers. Porter stressed that he believes the sanitation workers have a legitimate complaint but said he hopes some compromise & can be reached before August 19, 1969.

A characterization of the Black Panther Party appears in the appendix section of this communication.

On April 29, 1969.

advised he has no information which would indicate racial violence will occur in this area in the near future and pointed out that the NAACP continues to discourage acts of violence on the part of their members. He said they will continue to protest matters which are of interest to their race but in a peaceful and legal manner.

On May 2, 1969.

Roy Wilkins, Executive Director, NAACP, on May 1, 1969, while the latter appeared before student body at the Virginia Phion University (VUU) under the sponsorship of the VUU upward bound program.

pointed out that Wilkins was outspoken against militant students who are responsible for campus disorder throughout the country and stated "guns have no place on a campus".

advised that Wilkins conducted several press interviews and repeated the same remarks he had uttered before the students during his visit in Richmond, Virginia.

The morning edition of the Richmond "Times Dispatch", May 2, 1969, a local Richmond, Virginia newspaper, contained an article captioned "Militants Demands Scored by Wilkins". The article indicated Wilkins had appeared on the VUU campus as noted above.

On May 2, 1969.

The BPP intends to dominate the conference and claim it will be held at Merritt College, Oakland, California. The President of the college has advised local law enforcement officials that no official request for campus facilities has been received to date, and further, that the college will be holding its regular summer session at the same time.

The BPP claims that it has secured the following as speakers during the conference:

On July 1, 1969, Bobby Seale, Chairman of the BPP, gave a press release by reading the text of a telegram received from Roy Wilkins, Executive Secretary for the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People (NAACP).

Wilkins' telegram read as follows:

*I am desirous of exploratory conference with officers of millitant group and particularly with you as chairman of the Central Committee of the Black Panther Party. Do not desire public meeting at this time. Certainly cannot arrange trip to West Coast before late July account prior committments. At this time my desire to explore areas of possible agreement and disagreement is purely an administrative one on my own authority as Chief Executive Officer of NAACP. It is official, of course, but not binding nor does it have the formal endorsement of my Board of Directors. simply feel very strongly that present situation of our race requires trying to reach some common ground and arrival at some sort of strategy that will be effective even if used in only a few areas. I may be in error and there is not unamanous support even among my immediate co-workers on staff, but I feel I must try. I hope we may continue the effort to arrive at a mutually satisfactory meeting date and place late in July or early in August. /s/ Roy Wilkins, 1072 Lynch St. after July 7,790 Broadway New York."

It should be pointed out during the time this telegram was sent, the NAACP was conducting its national convention in Mississippi.

Seale stated he sent Wilkins a telegram on June 30, 1969, stating the Central Committee would meet with Wilkins on July 4, 1969, at a public meeting in DeFremery Park, Oakland, California, in connection with a rally and picnic originally scheduled.

Seale stated the BPP will meet with Wilkins only under these terms and to date, no answer has been received from Wilkins. Seale stated that it is obvious that Wilkins does not want to meet with the people and that he is separated from the Black community. He commented that if Wilkins was really concerned, he would have accepted a public meeting.

The "Black Panther" newspaper, for July 5, 1969 published a copy of the telegram and a picture of Roy Wilkins. Under the picture was a subtitle, "The Grand Cop-Out".

6. Reaction of Leaders and Members of the Community to Minority Demands and the Existence of Channels of Communications, San Francisco California Area

The Community Relations Unit, of the San Francisco, California Police Department, which has been under fire in the past months from minority leaders, has seen the previous leader of the Unit retire and a Negro patrolman appointed to head the Unit.

The new head of the Unit has been presented with a new plan of action. The plan was drafted by a member of the Hayor's Crime Committee and calls for sweeping changes and broad community involvement.

Emphasis of the new plan is for the police department to go to the people rather than wait for the people to come to them. The plan proposes seven Divisions; Ethnic and Racial Relations; Youth Relations; Bomestic Relations; Complaint Division; Social Abuses; Communications and Research and ibrary. On 3/10/70 a meeting of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People (NAACP) in Augusta was held at which ROY WILKINS was the principal speaker. There were no incidents. On 7/11/70 a march and rally were held in Augusta, Ga., led by WILBERT ALLEN, a self-proclaimed organizer of the Augusta Black Panther Party, without incident. Both gatherings were well attended and received local news attention. Speeches made at both gatherings called for the identities of the Augusta police officers responsible for the deaths of six individuals during the rioting on 5/11-12/70 in Augusta, Ga.

PERSONAL EVALUATION

Sources report that following both of the above gatherings, as well as during regular contacts, tensions appear to be easing in Augusta, Ga. I do not expect at this time that the Savan hah Division will have any major racial incidents. No indications have been received to date indicating that the integration of public schools in September, particularly in the rural areas, will be marred with any violence. It is expected that friction among the students will be present initially and perhaps generate minor incidents, however, no major difficulties are expected at this EX-110

people attended the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People (NAACP) meeting at the Tabernacle Baptist Church at Augusta, Georgia, at 8:00 p.m. on July 10, 1970, where Roy Wilkins was the principal speaker. Bight or ten whites were present and the remainder were Negroes. The meeting was quiet and orderly with no violence. Those in attendance included Daniel Cross, Augusta, Ga., NAACP official; Frank Madison, a soldier with the U.S. Army at Fort Gordon, Georgia, as well as Matthew Mulherin, Chairman of the Richmond County Board of Commissioners.

According prior to the meeting Wilbert Les Allen, self-proclaimed local Black Panther leader, and 15 to 20 unidentified individuals, all dressed in khaki shirts and blue jeans wearing black berets, were lined along the sides of the church in parade rest positions. Immediately before the meeting began, Allen and others in uniform left. Two or three of these uniformed individuals returned inside the church for the meeting but Allen did not return. A characterization of the Black Panther Party is attached hereto in the appendix.

observed throwing the fire bomb which was found to be a fifth-size whiskey bottle containing kerosene. There was no structural damage to the lounge and the persons responsible were not identified or arrested.

On September 23, 1969, 188 Negroes, all high school student age, were arrested at the Clarksdale High School, a white school, where they had assembled and marched to protest the segregated school system in Clarksdale. They were arrested after they were advised by local authorities that their arrest would result if they trespassed on the school grounds. There was no violence during the incident.


Following the above incident, frequent marches were held at Clarksdale sponsored by the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People (NAACP) to protest the segregated school system which operated on a district plan and to protest the above arrests.

A boycott of white businesses and picketing of the downtown business area as well as the businesses of the members of the Clarksdale City School Board, was also instituted by the NAACP. Marches were held regularly on Saturdays with as many as 1,700 Negro participants. There were no acts of violence during the marches, meetings or picketing.

Mr. Aaron E. Henry, president, Mississippi NAACP and Coahoma County Chapter of the NAACP, Clarksdale, arranged for speakers to participate in several marches and meetings, including Mr. Roy Wilkins, Executive Secretary, NAACP, New York, New York, who spoke and led a march on November 22, 1969.

Reverend Ralph D. Abernathy, Southern Christian Leadership Conference (SCLC), addressed a group of Negroes at Clarksdale on February 2, 1970, without incident.

WASHINGTON-Mississippi civil rights leaders Thursday launched a campaign for a massive demonstration to protest a acheduled speech by Atty. Gen. John Mitchell to the Delta Council-the epitome of the state's upper-crust white society.

Aaron E. Henry, Mississippi NAACP president said he had failed ir quiet efforts to ersuade Mitchell not 'o address the Chamber of Commerce-type organization, which Henry branded "segregationist and recist."

A spokesman for the attorney general said Mitchell does not consider the organization to be reacially exclusive and plans to make the speech at its annual meeting on May 19 in Cleveland, Miss.

In letters mailed to other civil rights figures Thursday, Henry accused some Delta Council members of supporting private schools to thwart public (school segregation.

Among those he is inviting to Cleveland are Roy Wilkins, the Rey. Ralph David therpathy Whitney Young Bayard Rustin and A. Phillip Kandolph.

Henry wrote that he was asking national

church and civil rights leaders, as well as some political leaders, to convene in Cleveland on May 18 and 19 "for a demonstration of civil disobedience against Mr. Mitchell's presence here."

For years national political figures journeyed to Cleveland to speak at the nuncil's annual meeting. It was there on 1947, for example, that thenUndersecretary of State Dean Acheson first mentioned the European recovery program that a bit later was unfolded by Secretary of State George C. Marshall and became known as the Marshall plan. In his book, "Present at the Creation" Acheson wrote of the Delta Council meeting:

"Once a year the Delta Council meets on the tree-shaded lawn of the teachers college at Cleveland, bringing families and relatives with them to discuss their own area's interests and problems and to hear about the great world to which historically their products have gone. Those most immediately concerned listen to the speaker in the large gymnasium of the college. His words are carried to many more thousands on the surrounding lawn while they eat sandwiches, drink pop, and keep an eye on the aleeping children. The scene is an easyshirt-sleeved, good-natured, thoroughly American one. .

By the 1960s, however, the heat generated by the civil rights movement persuaded national politicians that the scene might not be so easy-going and they stopped addressing the council. One of the last invited was Agriculture Secretary Orville Freeman. A former council official recalled that "Freeman was supposed to come at about the time the freedom rides started and he suddenly decided he had to inspect the cranberry crop somewhere and couldn't come."

For more than two months Henry, a longtime civil rights leader, tried to convince Mitchell that lending the prestige of the attorney general's office to the Delta Council function would buoy segregationist sentiment.

ment. // / / / / / / After Henry first protested, Morris ewis. Jr. of Indianola council president, wrote him a letter saying that if the council's meeting is all-white "It will be only because no Negroes want to attend. At our annual meetings in the past Negroes have attended and at no time were they denied admittance. . . The Delta Council has never had any restriction on Negro membership."

A spokesman for Mitchell said the attorne general, after receiving a copy of Lewis letter, decided the council was not racially

Dear Friend of the Cause of Freedom:

I am sorry to have to report to you that all of our efforts have been futile in trying to persuade the Attorney General of the United States Department of Justice, Attorney John Mitchell to uphold the reputation of the Department of Justice of men who held the office before him. This list begins with Attorney General Brownell and goes thru Attorney General Ramsey Clark, and of course, in between were such dedicated Americans as Robert Kennedy, Nicholas Katzenbach, John Doar, Bob, Lisbon Berry, the Flannerys and many others.

None of these men deminished themselves to the extent that they would openly associate the name of the United States Department of Justice with an organization that was segregationist and racist.

Yet, on May 19, 1970, in spite of the persuassion of many of us, and some members of the U. S. Department of Justice, including Atto hey Jack Landau, who reportedly is now on his way t, being fired by the Attorney General. On Friday, April 17, I made another inquiry in the Office of the Attorney General, trying to persuade him not to make the same kind of "Mockery of a department in Washington called "Justice", as is a town in Mississippi called "Liberty". I was informed on that day "The Delta Council, although it has no Negro members, that this in the Attorney General's mind did not constitute segregation nor discrimination. * Therefore, we have decided to organize a demonstration of Civil Disobediance against this racist identification. We are inviting Mr. Roy Wilkins, Rev. Ralph Abernathy, Mr. Whitney Young, Mr. Byard Rustin, Mr. A. Phillip Radolph, Rev. Dudley Ward, The National-Council. & Churches and other Church Groups, The Delta Ministry, The American Friends Service Committee and several national politicismum both Democrat

and Republican, to join us at a Public Rally at the United Baptist Church, 1028 Christman Street, Ext., on Monday May 18th and at 9:00 A. 

The 36-page booklet captioned, "Who Controls Black Destiny?" is self-described as a publication of Communiviews, a newsletter of the Black Parent, Teacher and Student Coalition, a monthly publication, P. O. Box 17148, Chicago, Illinois 60617, special edition, Volume 111, No. 6, Fall 1972. Page 2 indicates this is the only edition published since Spring, 1972.

Page 1 states: "Our Objectives: The Seven Stages to African Liberation".

The table of contents indicates this booklet contains 20 separate articles of interest to Black people.

The editorial on page 4 applauds President Idi Amin of Uganda for expelling the "Jewish-like" blood sucking Asians from his Country. It derides President Julius Nyerere of Tanzania for invading Uganda and not Rhodesi; or South Africa.

The cover story on page 5 condemns present Black leaders in industry, social and civic organizations as powerless, informants who are really tools of the white man or konkies. Example of these Black traitors are: General Benjamin Q Davis, Jr., United States Air Force; Sammy Davis, Jr., Entertainer; Preston Wilcox, Consultant; Pow Wilkins, Executive Director of the NAACP; Dr. Andrew Felton Brimmer, member of the Federal Reserve Board, and Reverend Dr. Leon Howard Sullivan, founder of Opportunities Industrialization Center.

Black man of the month, on page 12 concerns a slanderous attack against George O'Hare, a white man, and the Black priest, Rev. George Clements. The article calls Rev. Clements a "traitor nigger" for naming O'Hare, Black man of the month for April, 1972. O'Hare is a merchandising manager for Sears, Roebuck and Company.

The National Black Political Convention in Gary, Indiana, is discussed on page 13. It was criticized for not being representative of Blacks in the United States, for allowing white "honkies" to be delegates and for not condemning Israel in their dispute with the Arab states. It condemned the actions of Rev. Jesse. Jackson of Push, "People United to Save Honkies"; Mayor Hatcher, and Legislators Diggs, Newhouse and Dellum's.

The article "From Gary to McGovern: Black Politics-Lost, Strayed and Betrayed", appears on page 16. This is an excerpt from a story appearing in the September, 1972 publication,



Numerous Negro leaders in the City of Memphis were in this "walk out" group including Reverend James Morris Lawson, Jr., pastor of Centenary Methodist Church; Reverend S. B. Kyles, Labor Director of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored Péople (NAACP); Maxine Smith, Executive Secretary of the NAACP, Memphis; Reverend Ezekiel Bell, pastor of Parkway Gardens Presbyterian Church; and an individual tentatively identified as H. Ralph Jackson, of the African Methodist Episcopal (AME) Church.

Reverend Kyles spoke before television cameramen and newsmen and addressed the audience, stating, "There is no justice for blacks at City Hall," whereupon he was loudly cheered. He was followed by Reverend James Morris Lawson, Jr., who spoke, saying, "We have to escalate our fight," and he emphasized that he would bring a wave of national civil rights leaders and other individuals from other parts of the country to Memphis to aid in the current strike struggle and also emphasized that Roy Wilkins, National Executive Secretary of the NAACP, would appear in town on March 14, 1968, and possibly Bayard Rustin of the A. Philip Randolph Institute would come to Memphis to address the strike supporters.

Reverend Lawson called for all of the protesters to march en masse to Clayborn Temple where they would hold a rally, following which they would all go to his church, the Centenary Methodist Church, 564 East McLemore, for a mass rally on the night of March 12, 1968.







NAACP leader says blacks should present united front

Blacks should present a united front and practice restraint in dealing with problems, the executive director of the NAACP said Monday in Minneapo-

"There is nothing sadder than watching a black community that constitutes about i percent of the population throwing its weight around like they are the controlling community," director Roy Wilkins said at the 10th annual Opportunities Industrialization Centers (OIC) Convocation.

Wilkins urged the black community to put together a coalition to help them in their causes.

"You won't hear a politician saying he doesn't lis- 1 are education, employ-1 ten to blacks, even if they are only 1 percent of the population," he added.

No matter how large or small a black urban community may be, he said, it must proceed along moral, legal and court persuasions to obtain its goals.

Two things have been realized by blacks in the last few years: The potency of the ballot and unity, Wilkins said.

"People are using the bailot. Even the Black Panthers have realized the po-tency of the ballot," he said.

Wilkins cited the number of black mayors in the nation. "They were not elected just because they are black but because they were the best men for the jobs," he said.

"There is a unity that never existed before among organizations." Wilkins said. He mentioned the cooperation between OIC and the NAACP: "OIC is a specialized continuation of the NAACP program."

The great majority of blacks in the community want to learn a trade and have a fair chance at the jobs available. We know OIC can give them that ' chance," Wilkins said.

Gl's protest military racism

A group of 236 black, white, Chicano and Indian GI's-all of them members of the 173rd Airborne Brigade that recently returned from Vietnam-have signed an open letter to Defense Secretary Melvin Laird accusing the armed forces of racial discrimination. The GI's tried to present the letter to Laird earlier this month when the Defense Secretary visited Fort Campbell on the Tennessee-Kentucky border to welcome their brigade home from Southeast Asia. But Gen. William birdsong, the commander at Fort Campbell where the 173rd is now stationed, refused to allow the GI's to make the presentation. The GIs' letter asserted that "throughout our time in the service we've seen minority group GI's discriminated against. In Vietnam that's been evidenced by higher casualty rates. Other times it takes the form of slower promotions, higher penalties for rules violations and the worse job assignments. We feel that the Army fosters racism and has purposely avoided dealing with the day-to-day problems of minority groups."

In a press conference at the fort, Laird told newsmen he had not seen the petition, but acknowledged that the armed forces are beset with serious racial problems. "These are difficult problems," he said. "They are people problems." The secretary also contended, however, that progress has been made toward their solution. "We have made more progress in this area than any administration in American history," he asserted, and he said his source for that opinion is civil rights leader Roy Wilkins of the NAACP.

Another black leader who is less impressed with the administration! record, however, is Congressman Ronald V. Bellums, a Democrat from Berkeley, Calif. (See Race Relations Reporter, Vol. II, No 5). In an eight-page telegram to the protesting GI's of the 173rd. Dellums told them he supported their efforts to end racism in the armed services, to secure full constitutional rights for GI's and tobring about a complete withdrawal of U. S. forces from Vietnam. Pvt. Mike McIntire of Los Angeles read Deliums' telegram to the cheers of about 50 GI's who were demonstrating peacefully outside Fort Campbell following Laird's departure on Sept. 2. The group was predominantly white, but it also contained a healthy , sprinkling of blacks, Spanish-Americans and Indian McIntire, who is an Indian explained to RRIC that while non-white GIs may have a more dill most of the problems that concern-him are common to soldiers of all races. 

Analysis of Contents

The May, 1972 issue of the Black News consists of 32 pages of comments, illustrations, and a variety of advertisements from Black business establishments.

The Black News magazine bears no masthead but on Page 4 it is self-described as a YBlack nationalist publication", 10 Claver Place, Brooklyn, New York, telephone number 636-9400.

It is noted that telephone number 636-9400 is listed to African American Student Association, 10 Claver Place, Brooklyn, New York, whose telephone bills are paid by Youth in Action, 1180 Fulton Street, Brooklyn, New York, as of 1972. Youth in Action is an anti-poverty program.

Pages 1 and 2 contain an article by EUGENE A PAUL captioned "Young, Gifted, and Black But Their Souls' Not N Hardly Intact". This article seems to find that generation after generation of the Black people seem to be no more prepared for the future than the generation that passed. -It states that *the anti-poverty programs and extended welfare is used only to cool the revolutionary zeal among Black youths. Malcontents would get \$40.00 a week to hang around store fronts and take dope. Organized groups of youths that are threatening drug pushers with bodily harm are trying to solve the drug problem, especially among youths. They are taking the law into their own hands. The answer to where the Black youths are heading is more of a question of what are we doing now with our own wildren. Touths

On Page 15 is the magazine editorial. This article states that the "African nationalist too long has remained aloof and alienated from the Black masses". The article points out that if the average Black person does not go along with a so-called Black nationalist, he is called a nigger Tom, or Whitey lover. Some Black nationalists have even called for this "niggers" death. If the Black nationalist would take time to think about it and study the Black masses, he would find great majority of the Black people are concerned with their own day to day survivat.

The African nationalist who has made no inroad with the Black masses could never be elected since Blacks are faithful to politicans coming up for a re-election despite their records of doing absolutely nothing for the Black people. Therefore, a Black nationalist who is attempting to help his people cannot help them by revolutionary methods and cannot help them by attempting to be elected but first must organize an African nationalist party, that is, on the ballot as a result of legitimate petitions by the people. 
The article claims that the white racist regime in South Africa is supported by the investment of large corporations waitly from the United States and England. It goes on to criticize ACF WHIMINS of the HAACP for statements he hade about a recent trip to Africa in which he said that Africans would be worse off in American corporations pull out of Africa.

"Triple Jeopardy" claims that the large corporations are exploiting the African workers and that once the working people overthrow the white minority rule and replace it with a government controlled by the laboring class the exploitation will end.

WILKINS is attached as a "dangerous enemy of both the African and the Afro-American", as well as an apologist for United States imperialism in South Africa.


The paper stated that some of the black leaders were charging that the Police Department used excessive force in making arrests on November 21, 1969, and that the Board of Education had agreed to three separate actions which would give Negro leaders a greater voice in the administration of Memphis Public Schools, namely, to appoint two Negro advisors to the heard; to work for legislation that would provide for Negro representation on the board and a study of the school system's administrative structure to be made with the goal of appointing a Negro Assistant Superintendent and a Negro Coordinator, and that advisors to make this study would be appointed by December 1, 1969.

The paper reported that Roy Wilkins, International Executive Secretary of NAMCP, while passing through Memphis, on November 22, 1969, had "expressed confidence in the Negro leadership of the NAMCP in Memphis."

The paper stated that Jesse Epps, International Representative of AFSCME denied that the ending of the school issue would hurt his campaign against St. Joseph Hospital in which he was seeking recognition of AFSCME. He said that until this time his union had put a higher priority on the educational issue than on the St. Joseph strike.

Mr. Epps accused the Memphis Police Department of excessive force in effecting November 21, 1969, arrests. The paper quoted the Memphis Police Director Frank C. Holloman as stating that the police had movies and pictures of students arming themselves with bricks, rocks and bottles during the demonstration activities, particularly on November 21, 1969, described above, and that when orders







WASHINGTON-Mississippi civil rights leaders Thursday launched a campaign for a massive demonstration to protest a scheduled speech by Atty. Gen. John Mitchell to the Delta Council—the epitome of the state's upper-crust white society.

Aaron E. Henry, Mississippi NAACP president said he had failed in quiet efforts to persuade Mitchell not to address the Chamber of Commerce-type organization, which Henry branded "segregationist and racist."

A spokesman for the attorney general said Mitchell does not consider the organization to be reacially exclusive and plans to make the speech at its annual meeting on May 19 in Cleveland, Miss.

In letters mailed to other civil rights figures Thursday, Henry accused some Delta Council members of supporting desegregation. private schools to thwart public school

Among those he is inviting to Cleveland are Roy Wilkins, the Rev. Ralph David ther-nathy Whitney Young, Bayard Austin and A.

Phillip Kandolph.

Henry wrote that he was asking national church and civil rights leaders, as well as some political leaders, to convene in Cleveland on May 18 and 19 "for a demonstration of civil disobedience against Mr. Mitchell's presence here.'

For years national political figures journeyed to Cleveland to speak at the council's annual meeting. It was there on May 8, 1947, for example, that thenUndersecretary of State Dean Acheson first mentioned the European recovery program that a bit later was unfolded by Secretary of State George C. Marshall and became known as the Marshall plan. In his book, "Present at the Creation" Acheson wrote of the Delta Council meeting:

"Once a year the Delta Council meets on the tree-shaded lawn of the teachers college at Cleveland, bringing families and relatives with them to discuss their own area's interests and problems and to hear about the great world to which historically their products have gone. Those most immediately concerned listen to the speaker in the large gymnasium of the college. His words are carried to many more thousands on the surrounding lawn while they eat sandwiches, drink pop, and keep an eye on the sleeping children. The scene is an easygood-natured, shirt-sleeved. going, thoroughly American one. . ."

By the 1960s, however, the heat generated by the civil rights movement persuaded national politicians that the scene might not be so easy-going and they stopped addressing the council. One of the last invited was Agriculture Secretary Orville Freeman. A former council official recalled that "Freeman was supposed to come at about the time the freedom rides started and he suddenly decided he had to inspect the cranberry crop somewhere and couldn't come."

For more than two months Henry, a longtime civil rights leader, tried to convince Mitchell that lending the prestige of the attorney general's office to the Delta Council function would buoy segregationist sentiment.

Ment. After Henry first protested, Morris Lewis. Jr. of Indianola council president, Wrote him a letter saying that if the council's meeting is all-white "It will be only because no Negroes want to attend. At our annual meetings in the past Negroes have attended and at no time were they denied admittance. . . The Delta Council has never had any restriction on Negro membership.


A spokesman for Mitchell said the attorney general after receiving a copy of Lewis' letter, decided the council was not racially exclusive.

A former council official who has been a member for more than 20 years told the Los Angeles Times, "I've never seen a black face in the audience at one of our meetings. Negroes are not excluded by the by-laws, but they aren't included as members. It's just like Jews are not excluded by our country club's by-laws, but they're not admitted as members."

Council President Lewis, who is Jewish said in an interview that he financially supports a private school at Indianola. He said he also has supported public schools.

He said he does not know how many of the 18-county council's 4,000 members are Negroes "because our membership cards don't show race, but I recognize one or two names as friends of mine who are Negroes.'

"I can say uncategorically I have seen them quite a few times at the meetings. Lewis said. "I can't recall whether I saw an the last year or the year before, but I wa told by people I know that they saw some las year."



Shirley Mesher, a white civil rights worker, and Clarence Williams. This faction heads a small minority of young militant Negroes. The community support and political power in the black community appears to be centered with the more moderate group. The more moderate group is encouraged by, and receives political support from, the white community and this group is being encouraged to form a strong NAACP chapter.







Wilkins as Chief Executive Officer of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People (NAACP), requested a private meeting with officers of the Central Committee of the BPP and particularly with Bobby Seale as Chairman of this Committee. The same page of the BPP newspaper July 5, 1969 issue contained a reply to Wilkins from Bobby Seale, Chairman of the Central Committee, BPP. This telegram stated that the BPP would only meet with Wilkins in a public meeting in West Oakland.

The July 19, 1969 issue of "The Black Panther", Black Community News Service newspaper on page 27 lists the Central Committee of the BPP as Huey P. Newton as Minister of Defense; Bobby Seale, Chairman; Eddridge Cleaver, Minister of Information; David Hilliard, Chief of Staff; Ray "Masai" newitt, Minister of Education; Kathleen Cleaver, Communications Secretary; and Emory Douglas, Minister of Culture.

On page 27 of the same issue of the BPP newspaper, the rules of the BPP as established by the Central BPP Head-quarters and Central Committee members are printed for all .

Sources of the San Francisco Office have advised they knew of no plans on the part of the Black Panther Party (BPP) to establish a branch anywhere in Canada. Likewise they knew of no plans for reported regrouping or retraining.

The Black Panther Party (BPP) is a black extremist organization started in Oakland, California, in December, 1966. It formerly advocated the use of guns and guerrilla tactics to bring about the overthrow of the United States Government. Since early 1971, it has preached a policy of "survival pending revolution."

The "Los Angeles Times" of August 6, 1972, contained an interview of BPP leader Huey P. Newton, who claimed the BPP was very much alive with chapters "all over the country". No mention was made of any activity or interest outside the USA.

Recent issues of the Black Panther newspaper, as in the past, continued to refer to Party activities across the USA, but no mention has been made of any interest in affairs in Canada.

The chief thrust of the BPP at this period is in community political actions.

Current issues of the Party newspaper always mention that Bobby Seale, Chairman of the BPP, is running for Mayor of Oakland, California, in April, 1973, and urge its readers to register to vote. (See Black Panther issue of September 30, 1972).

Row Wilkins, head of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People (NAACP), in the Oakland "Tribune" of October 3, 1972, claimed that the BPP was "not the bogeyman" it was often charged to be, and now had joined the NAACP in following the strategy of working within the system by exercising power at the ballot box.

The Registrar of Voters, Alameda County, California, in October, 1972, advised that the BPP had furnished 105 out of 145 Deputy Registrars to work in the voter registration just recently closed.

The United States Circuit Court of Appeals, in a decision rendered in a case involving a member of the BPP, dated June 30, 1972, called the BPP "a dissident political party".

Chairman Bobby Seale was featured in a five part statement in San Francisco radio station RCBS beginning August 7, 1972. This series featured the "evolution" of the BPP from a revolutionary organization to one working within the system, under the first two paragraphs of the Declaration of Independence.

The prime interest in "The Black Panther" issue of November 4, 1972, was a printed guide to the California residents on how to vote on the various state propositions.
