Captioned individuals have never been the subjects of an FBI investigation. Roy Wilkins has been associated with the National Association for Advancement of Colored People (NAACP)

National Association for Advancement of Colored People (NAACE) since approximately 1931. His name, therefore, has appeared frequently in the public press as he has endeavored to further the publicly known aims and purposes of this nationally known organization

During the 1930's and 1940's various communist publications contained articles concerning Wilkins' activities when those activities coincided in purpose with programs sponsored by the Communist Party (CP). No information has been received, however, that Wilkins has ever been a CP member.

An article captioned "NAACP Leaders Dumped Rights on Negroes" appeared in the July 2, 1950, edition of "The Worker," east coast communist newspaper. This article stated that it had been remarked that the Forty-first Annual NAACP Conference, concluded on the previous Sunday in Boston, was the "best-organised public gathering run by the United States State Department since the 1949 CIO antisommunist bee in Clebeland..."

A National Conference of the NAACP was held during the weekend of April 6, 1957, in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania. At this conference, Roy Wilkins, National Secretary, NAACP, announced that all delegates to the March on Washington to be held in May, 1957, would be closely screened in order that all "leftists" be definitely omitted.

advised that Roy Wilkins was one of the speakers who spoke at the Lincoin Memorial, Washington, D. C., on May 17, 1957, in connection with the above-mentioned March on Washington. Mr. Wilkins stated that the CP was an evil force, that it attempted to use the NAACP as a front for CP activities, and that the CP can only mean poverty, economic strain and slavery.

In recent years Wilkins has been active in the establishment and promotion of demonstrations of a peaceful nature and has seemingly taken a moderate stand on civil rights issues. His speeches have dealt primarily with voter registration, school segregation and civil rights legislation in Congress. He has been observed at rallies, mainly as a speaker, and at memorial services for civil rights participants who have met with violence.

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heard that Roy Wilkins, President of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People (NAACP), is scheduled to speak some time during the month of July 1969 in Selma, Alabama. He did not know the exact date that Wilkins was to be in Selma, nor did he know the nature of Wilkins' visit. It was his conjecture that Wilkins was probably coming to Selma in order to remold and regroup support from the responsible members of the Negro community, many of whom have become disgruntled with the Reverend Louis Lord Anderson and some of the direct action activities of the Southern Christian Leadership Conference (SCLC).

wilkins will be in Selma, Alabama, on July 24, 1969, and will deliver a speech at the Selma University Auditorium at 8 p.m. on that date. The source further advised that the Reverend C. A. Lett, 821 First Avenue, Selma, Alabama, who is the Pastor of the Greene Street Baptist Church, is in charge of all arrangements in Selma, Alabama, in preparation for Wilkins' visit. Reverend Lett is the Treasurer of Selma University and is also Treasurer of the Negro Alabama State Baptist Convention.

At a press conference in NYC on 4/8/68, Roy Wilkins explained that the NAACP was distributing antiviolence stickers across the country, one of which read "Hot Head, Hot Lead, Cold Dead."

"The New York Times" issue of 4/9/68 quoted Roy Wilkins as saying "millions of Negroes in this country" were opposed to violence and rejected what he said was the "shrill" contention of militants that they were taking over the Negro community. Wilkins stated that Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., would be "outraged" by the disorders following his assassination. He acknowledged that New York's militant Negroes "have chosen to be good citizens" cooperating with Mayor John Lindsay in his efforts to keep NYC calm.

According to the "Evening Star" dated 4/3/68, Washington, D.C., Roy Wilkins, in a speech before the National Press Club in Washington, D.C., on 4/3/68, warned that black militants who called for violence and separatism were actually playing into the hands of white racists and were causing officials in some cities to give police departments "blank checks" to buy heavy weapons. He then displayed several stickers being passed out by the NAACP, whose slogans pertained to nonviolence.

The "Washington Afro-American" dated 5/7/68, Washington, D.C., newspaper, reported that Wilkins, after a visit to the White House in early May, stated that he saw "no immediate danger of the whole colored American population going off on a violence kick."

The following serials in the file captioned "Southern Christian Leadership Conference" made reference to Roy Wilkins and Whitn Young, of the National Urban League, as being of the conservative Negro faction. Discussion among SCLC members disclosed that these two individ were considered by President Johnson as his men which was just what they wanted, thus placing Martin Luther King, Jr., head of SCLC, in a less advantageous position. King differed somewhat in his ideas and seemingl had no desire to be identified with them. It did not appear that Wilkins endorsed the SCLC; on the occasion of a civil rights rally in Cleveland, Ohio, he failed to mention a forthcoming SCLC campaign. Also set out was a scheduled meeting in NYC with Senator Eugene McCarthy who was publicly endorsing the Poor People's Campaign on that date. Information covered the period 4/23/66 to 5/19/68.

A Paul Harvey news release on 7/2/68 by General Features Corporation, Los Angeles, Calif., spoke of the abortive poor people's march on Washington, the failure of the militants and the final emergence of the responsible Negro leaders. He quoted Bayard Rustin, Negro scholar, as saying that Negroes of the prominence of Roy Wilkins, Whitney Young and Philip Randolph, with the help of others, had led 2 million Negroes out of the slums by encouraging them to work. He then mentioned the NAACP convention in Atlantic City (date not given) where Wilkins told a group there advocating violence that they "ought to be ashamed!" Harvey concluded that self-made, successful Negroes were beginning to preach what they practiced.

The references listed below in the file captioned "Racial Matters" set forth the activities of Roy Wilkins as executive director of the NAACP during the period 1/10/66 to 1/27/69. He addressed several affairs in the District of Columbia, Tennessee, Ohio, NY, South Carolina, Missouri and Mississippi and was scheduled to appear or to spea at other functions in Virginia, Kentucky, Pennsylvania, and Louisiana. These gatherings included civil rights meetings, protest rallies and regular NAACP conferences. Wilkins' topics primarily concerned racial murders, discriminatory employment practices, voter registration and open housing legislation. Wilkins took a moderate stand on civil rights issues and claimed that violence was not the solution to Negro discrimination. He even distributed antiviolence stickers over the country through the NAACP. Statements made by him regarding violence and unfair practices against the Negro were set out. Also mentioned was his appearance on TV's 'Meet The Press' and his visit to the White House.

On August 14, 1969, Marvin Davies, Field Director, Florida National Association for the Advancement of Colored People (NAACP), informed that Roy Wilkins, the Mational Executive Director of the NAACP, is scheduled to arrive in Tampa, Florida, on August 22, 1969, aboard Morthwest Airlines Flight 719. Mr. Davies pointed out that Mr. Wilkins is to appear at a Freedom Fund dinner at 8 PM, August 22, 1969. The dinner is to be held at the Sheraton-Tampa Motor Inn, according to Davies. Mr. Wilkins is to remain overnight in Tampa, departing this city on August 23, 1969; via an unidentified airline. Mr. Davies continued by saying that the Freedom Fund dinner at which Mr. Wilkins is to appear, is being sponsored by the Tampa Chapter of the MAACP. He said that Bob Gilder, President, Tampa Chapter of the MAACP, Elahas been instrumental in arranging for the Freedom Fund dinner and has a responsibility for arranging accommodations for Mr. Wilkiha during the night of August 22, 1969. Mr. Davies, who said he possessed no information, indicating violent activity toward Mr. Wilkins, concluded by saying that he wanted representatives of the Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI) to be aware of the presence of Mr. Wilkins and to take whatever precautions are necessary in connection with Mr. Wilkins' visit.

Aaron Henry, President, Mississippi National Association for the Advancement of Colored People (NAACP), Clarksdale, Mississippi, announced through news media on November 20, 1969, that Roy Wilkins, Executive Director, NAACP, New York, New York, would participate in a protest march at Clarksdale, on Saturday, November 22, 1969. David Self, Negro male, active in Negro protest activity at Clarksdale, confirmed on November 20, 1969, that Wilkins was expected in Clarksdale, Mississippi, on November 22, 1969.

Aaron Henry advised a Special Agent of the FBI on November 21, 1969, that Wilkins would be present for a memorial service for President John F. Kennedy at the First Baptist Church, Clarksdale, Mississippi, 8:00 A.M., Saturday, November 22, 1969, after which there would be a meeting of Mississippi Chapter Presidents of the NAACP in what was termed "An Antomy of a Movement", which Henry described as a discussion of the legal means of protest. He stated that

the meeting would be followed by a protest march at 10:00 A.M., through downtown Clarksdale to the front of the Coahoma County Courthouse where Wilkins was to make a brief speech concerning the school desegregation issue in Clarksdale and Coahoma County, Mississippi.

A memorial service for President Kennedy was held at the First Baptist Church, Clarksdale, at 8:30 A.M., November 22, 1969. The service was led by Aaron Henry and Reverend Willie B. Crump, pastor of the Haven Methodist Church, Clarksdale. Wilkins was late in his arrival from Memphis, Tennessee; however, he arrived about 9:15 A.M., and he spoke briefly concerning his admiration for President Kennedy, particularly mentioning the fact that Kennedy had the courage to face the issue of his religion as a major factor in his campaign. Wilkins advised the group of about 80 Negroes that they should recognize that there are many white people who are willing to give assistance to Negroes.

The service was followed by a meeting of 40 Mississippi NAACP Chapter Presidents, according to Henry, who advised on November 22, 1969, that the chapter representatives contributed about \$1,700.00 to the NAACP at the meeting.

At 10:00 A.M., 480 Negroes marched from the First Baptist Church through downtown Clarksdale, escorted by local police officers, to the Coshoma County Courthouse, where a public address system had been installed on the Courthouse steps.

Wilkins addressed the group at that location, with particular reference to the decision of the Federal Court in Mississippi, to exclude children from school if they have refused to take achievement tests on which their assignment to particular schools will be based. He cited the need for white and black citizens to resolve this problem because it was his opinion that keeping children from school would not be the solution. He indicated that Negroes whould follow the instructions of their leaders in the current protest movement at Clarksdale and he pointed out that neither the Negroes nor the whites of Coahoma County were going anywhere and it was important for them to resolve their problems.

The group marched back to the First Baptist Church, again led by Aaron Henry, Roy Wilkins, and Alex Waites, who is employed by the NAACP Welfare and Relief Board in Jackson, Mississippi.

There were no arrests or incidents.

Wilkins arrived and departed in a black over green 1968 Plymouth four door sedan, bearing Shelby County, Tennessee, license KO 7790. He left Clarksdale at 11:45 A.M., November 22, 1969.

Aaron Henry advised on November 22, 1969, that he is attempting to secure an appearance of entertainer Aretha Franklin for the protest activity of November 29, 1969, but no definite agreement had been made.
